Therefore, I am proposing this amendment which would hold harmless the existing county programs throughout the Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the Rubley amendment.

In my estimation, this amendment makes a lot of sense because there are already some counties, as the lady explained, that have established women's commissions, and those counties I do not believe should be burdened by unnecessary State mandates which would force these counties to spend more tax dollars. Quite honestly, if this amendment is not adopted, I

believe this bill may have the opposite effect of what the sponsor intended. Because of cost additions, these counties that have already established commissions may in fact choose to discontinue them.

Bill as amended was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again I rise in opposition to HB 675, and to be clear, I am not voting against funding for volunteer firemen. A "no" vote for this bill would not be a vote against funding for volunteer firemen. I think to the contrary it would be a vote to maintain the integrity of the volunteer firemen's relief association.

I direct your attention to page 11 of this bill, sections (13) and (14). This bill would allow this fund to be used for exercise equipment and health clubs, and to be quite frank, I feel that is an inappropriate use of this funding. I can see that fitness is important for volunteer fire companies and fitness clubs may aid in that, but I think when we ask our constituents to pay money, we must insure that this is a worthy use of the money. My constituents tell me when I speak to them, do not spend unnecessarily, and in my view, spending for this bill would be unnecessary spending. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. DeLuca, from Allegheny County.

Mr. DeLUCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support HB 675.

You know, one of the main criteria for volunteer firemen is to be physically fit. I do not know if the members here are familiar, in the last 10 years, we have lost 20,000 volunteer firemen. We are losing 1,000 a year, volunteers.

Now, God forbid, if we ever lose our volunteer fire associations, our communities could not sustain the tax increase, the magnitude tax increase that it would incur on the local taxpayers.

Certainly, this is a "may" bill, and if the volunteer fire companies want to make sure that all their members are physically fit, it would be a benefit to insure that when they are fighting a fire, that they are not going to be injured, enabling the taxpayers to pay more on workers' comp.

Therefore, I ask my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to please support HB 675. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cambria County, Mr. Wozniak.

Mr. WOZNIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to oppose this bill.

Once again we are giving more leeway to spend money that should be going for fire equipment and not for recreational weight lifting and other things. I guess next we will need a VCR (videocassette recorder) for their television sets and a whole myriad of other things. This is not the direction we should be taking with this funding. It should be based on taking care of the coats, the clothes they need to wear, the helmets, the oxygen masks, and the other necessary regalia of volunteer firemen everywhere.

This should not be passed. It is a foolish expenditure of the money that should be used for fighting fires and equipment there. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the Honorable Mario Civera.

Mr. CIVERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support this bill.

First of all, let me just clear something with the members and the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, from Delaware County.

These funds are from when you go out and buy your homeowner's insurance policy from an insurance company that is not in the State of Pennsylvania. There are dollars set aside from these different companies that go into this relief fund, and it is disbursed among the fire companies of Pennsylvania. It was referred to as a relief fund. This will not drain local taxpayers' dollars; it will not do that at all as far as on the local taxes to the fire companies or a borough tax to the fire company. It has nothing to do with that, nothing whatsoever to do with that.

What this does is, if a fire company now wishes to drive more volunteers to belong to the local fire companies and to give an incentive, if they want to go out and buy a piece of exercise equipment for the volunteers to do that and to congregate at a fire house, they are allowed to do that. There are fire companies in Pennsylvania—okay?—that maybe distribute some of this money to a different kind of a situation. In my situation mortgages are lent to the local volunteer fire companies.

This does not erode the local tax base whatsoever, not whatsoever. All it allows it to do is that if an individual fire company wants to buy this type of equipment, they are allowed to do that.

Therefore, I rise and support the bill, and I hope both sides of the aisle do. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Snyder, is recognized.

Mr. SNYDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in favor of the amendment.

I think the members have to realize that several years ago under the Federal regulations for hazardous material handling, there was a requirement that the volunteer firemen would have to pass physical examinations. In the past we have provided the funds for these physical examinations.

What this amendment does is recognize that there is now a need for volunteer firemen to maintain their health in order to be able to provide a continued service to their community.



Second of all, Mr. Speaker, there has been reference to health clubs, and if you examine the amendment, as the first speaker who opposed this had indicated, you would note that these are for health, physical fitness, and physical monitoring programs, and these programs must be approved by a health care facility. They are not just going to the local country club or health club and using it to use the sauna and the tanning machines. This has to be a health monitoring program that leads to physical improvement.

Third, Mr. Speaker, there is a limitation on the amount of the physical fitness equipment that can be purchased. The relief association may not purchase more than 2,000 dollars' worth of equipment in 2 years. Anybody who is purchasing equipment knows that one exercise bike will probably be the only thing they can purchase in a 2-year period. You are not going to be able to equip a weight room with \$2,000 every 2 years.

Mr. Speaker, I think we have exaggerated the impact of these amendments, and they are in the best interest of our volunteers who serve our fire companies, and we ask for your support. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Vitali, from Delaware County for the second time.

Mr. VITALI. Mr. Speaker, I would like to make three points, if I could.

The purpose of this fund is, if I can quote from section 2, "...affording financial protection to volunteer firefighters against the consequences of misfortune suffered..." in the "participation in the fire service." My view is that this goes well beyond the scope of this.

My second point is this: Ask yourselves—and I think you have to bring common sense to these votes—do you really need a health club or do you really need exercise equipment in a fire company for a fire company to be really physically fit? Are we talking about luxury or are we talking about necessity? And I say to you that the citizens of this Commonwealth do not want their tax dollars spent unless it is a necessity.

If I can respond to Mr. Civera's argument, this is funded, as I understand it, from a premium imposed on insurance policies, and perhaps that is not a tax per se but that is money out of the citizens of this Commonwealth's pocket just the same, just as if it was from their tax dollars. People are paying too much money and they are tired of it, and they are tired of pandering to the sacred cows of this Commonwealth.

I would urge a "no" vote for this. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Tangretti, is recognized.

Mr. TANGRETTI. Mr. Speaker, I am astonished and amazed at the gentleman, Mr. Vitali's terminology, "pandering to special sacred cows." I wonder if his house is on fire and he needs to have somebody come to him and save his family and his house from burning down, I wonder if he calls that pandering. It is an outrage to suggest that somehow because we are going to provide, by virtue of this relief association, moneys for these people who risk their lives every day for us, pandering. That is an outrage. We ought to do more than what we are doing for them.

I just believe that we have to provide all that we can for those individuals in our volunteer services and our fire services, and this is just one little way, providing them the benefit that they should have to be physically fit in the most strenuous job that you and I possibly could think of.

It is easy to sit here in our seats and talk about stress. I would like to see some of us respond to that fire whistle, jump on that truck, go to that burning fire and maybe have to go in and save somebody. You talk about stress. You have not seen stress. If we could help them, if we could help them by virtue of providing a little bit of assistance by virtue of this amendment to the Relief Act, then we ought to do it, and I think the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, although he probably has his interest of taxpayers in mind, although it is not applicable here, I think he is dead wrong, absolutely wrong.

I would like to read for you from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the United States Fire Administration's Physical Fitness Coordinator's Manual. I quote:

Firefighting is known to be one of the most physically and mentally demanding occupations today. Each year, over 50% of the firefighters who die in the line of duty succumb to heart failure and other stress-related problems. Studies have shown that an increased level of fitness for firefighters can reduce the risk of these deaths; thus, physical fitness is a critical aspect of firefighter health and safety.

I would urge every member of this House to support this legislation, to be able to provide to the fire service one little modicum of assistance to give them the physical durability and the physical strength to provide our safety. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Melio, is recognized.

Mr. MELIO. Mr. Speaker, I just want to remind my colleagues that in the last session the Local Government Committee had hearings throughout the State on ways to foster more volunteer firemen. We knew at that time that we were losing a lot of these volunteers.

We had a meeting in my district, and I represent six volunteer fire companies, and they are unanimously in favor of this bill. They urge me to support it, and I urge my colleagues to support it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question recurring,

Shall the bill pass finally?

Unless otherwise provided, any person wishing to exercise any of the privileges granted by this title shall first secure the applicable resident or nonresident hunting or furtaker license as follows:

(1) Adult resident hunting licenses to residents who have reached their 17th birthday but have not reached their 65th birthday.

(2) Junior resident hunting and furtaker licenses to residents who have reached their 12th birthday but who have not reached their 17th birthday prior to the date of the application for the license and who present a written request, bearing the signature of a parent or guardian, for the issuance of a license.

(3) Senior resident hunting licenses or, at the option of the applicant, a senior lifetime resident hunting license to residents who have reached or will reach their 65th birthday in the year of the application for the license. The commission shall develop, implement and administer a system to provide tags, report cards and applications to those residents who hold a senior lifetime resident hunting license issued under this paragraph. The system shall require the applicant or license holder to pay any approved fee assessed by the issuing agent.

(4) Adult resident furtaker licenses to residents who have reached their 17th birthday but have not reached their 65th birthday.

[(5) Junior resident furtaker licenses to residents who have reached their 12th birthday but who have not reached their 17th birthday prior to the date of the application for the license and who present a written request, containing the signature of a parent or guardian, for the issuance of a license.]

(6) Senior resident furtaker licenses or, at the option of the applicant, a senior lifetime resident furtaker license to residents who have reached or will reach their 65th birthday in the year of the application for the license.

(7) (Reserved).

(8) Adult nonresident hunting licenses to all nonresidents of 17 years of age or older.

(9) Junior nonresident hunting licenses to all nonresidents who have reached their 12th birthday but who have not reached their 17th birthday prior to the date of the application for the license and who present a written request,

bearing the signature of a parent or guardian, for the issuance of a license.

(10) Adult nonresident furtaker licenses to nonresidents of 17 years of age or older.

(11) Junior nonresident furtaker licenses to nonresidents who have reached their 12th birthday but who have not reached their 17th birthday prior to the date of the application for the license and who present a written request, containing the signature of a parent or guardian, for the issuance of a license.

(12) Seven-day nonresident small game license to persons eligible to procure a nonresident hunting license. The license shall be valid for a period of seven consecutive days. The holder of the license shall be entitled to hunt for, take or kill crows and small game.

(13) Antlerless deer licenses, bear licenses, archery licenses, muzzleloader licenses and any other license required to insure just and proper administration of this title and sound game or wildlife conservation to eligible persons, subject to the regulations, requirements and conditions which the commission shall establish. Any such license shall be made available to residents serving on active duty in the armed forces of the United States or in the United States Coast Guard without regard to quota limitations or application deadlines.

Years ago you used to purchase a hunting and trapping license, and what this does is go back to making it one fee for \$5 for a junior hunter; they will be purchasing a junior hunting and trapping license. It will not come into effect until next year.

So for now, instead of buying a hunting license and a separate furtaker's license, you will be able to purchase as a junior hunter a hunting and furtaker's license for a fee of \$5.

(1) Felony of the third degree, not less than \$2,500 nor more than \$15,000 and may be sentenced to imprisonment up to seven years.

Amend Sec. 1, page 3, by inserting between lines 23 and 24 § 2501. Hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance.

(a) General rule.—It is unlawful to hunt or take game, furbearers or wildlife or aid, abet, assist or conspire to hunt or take game, furbearers or wildlife anywhere in this Commonwealth while in possession of a firearm of any kind or a bow and arrow while [under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance, or both.]:

(1) under the influence of alcohol to a degree which renders the person incapable of safe hunting or furtaking;

(2) under the influence of any controlled substance, as defined by the laws of this Commonwealth and rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, to a degree which renders the person incapable of safe hunting or furtaking;

(3) under the combined influence of alcohol and a controlled substance; or

(4) the amount of alcohol by weight in the blood of the person is 0.10% or greater.

(a.1) Legal use no defense.—The fact that any person charged with violating this section is or has been legally entitled to use alcohol or controlled substances is not a defense to a charge of violating this section.

(b) Penalty.—A violation of the provisions of this section shall be a [summary offense] misdemeanor of the third degree. In addition to any penalty, the violator shall be denied the right to hunt or trap in this Commonwealth, with or without a license, for a period of one year.

(c) Definition.—As used in this section the term "controlled substance" shall have the meaning ascribed to it by the act of April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), known as The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act.

Amend Bill, page 5, by inserting between lines 12 and 13 Section 2. The act is amended by adding a section to read:  
§ 2522.1. Shooting at or causing injury to human beings while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance.

(a) General rule.—It is unlawful for any person while hunting or furtaking, while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance, to shoot at, injure or kill any human being through the use of a firearm, bow and arrow or other deadly weapon.

(b) Penalty.—The penalty to be imposed for any violation of this section shall be determined pursuant to the following classifications:

(1) To shoot at but not hit or injure, or hit and not substantially injure a human being is a misdemeanor of the second degree.

(2) To substantially injure a human being is a misdemeanor of the first degree.

(3) To kill a human being is a felony of the third degree.

(c) Denial of privileges.—In addition to the penalty imposed pursuant to subsection (b), any person who shoots at, injures or kills a human being while under the influence of alcohol or controlled substance shall be denied the privilege to hunt or take game or wildlife anywhere in this Commonwealth, with or without license, for the following periods:

(1) To shoot at but not hit or injure, or hit and not substantially injure a human being, the denial shall be for a period of three years.

(2) To substantially injure a human being, the denial shall be for a period of not less than seven years nor more than twelve years.

(3) To kill a human being, the denial shall be for a period of seventeen years.

(d) Nonpayment of fine.—In addition to any sentence imposed pursuant to subsection (b), any person who fails to pay the fine imposed by this section within 180 days shall undergo imprisonment not in excess of one year or until the fine is paid in full.

(e) Imprisonment for violation of sentence.—It is unlawful for a person to hunt or take game or wildlife or attempt to hunt or take game or wildlife, with or without license, contrary to a sentence imposed under subsection (b). (f) Mandatory hunter education.—Any person whose privilege to hunt or take game is suspended under subsection (c) shall, prior to obtaining a license after the period of suspension, present evidence for the successful completion of a hunter education course as prescribed in section 2704(b) (relating to eligibility for license) taken subsequent to each suspension of the license.

(g) Civil remedies preserved.—Nothing in this section shall bar the recovery of any damages in any civil action by any aggrieved party.

(b) Charges.—The commission may charge for these grants remuneration and damages as it deems the conditions and circumstances warrant.

(c) Approval.—The [director] commission may approve the granting, lease or exchange of any easement, right-of-way or license for use of commission property.

This amendment makes changes in the Vehicle Code definition of "commercial implement of husbandry," and primarily what we are talking about is self-propelled liquid manure spreaders, which the way the bill is written now allows them to only use them 1 day a week. That is what the Department of Transportation has determined. This change would allow them to use when they basically do, like 6 weeks in the spring and 6 weeks in the fall, and therefore, it will give them 180 days.

It also changes farm truck plates to farm vehicles, which now will allow semitractors and trailers to be registered as farm vehicles, broadens the CDL (commercial driver's license) expansions for farm vehicles, and allows the moving of commercial implements without having permits and by using oversize tires. That is some of the changes.

I would ask for an affirmative vote.

Police departments may refuse to furnish the complete copy of investigation of the vehicle accident whenever there are criminal charges pending against any persons involved in the vehicle accident unless the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure require the production of the documents.

(b) Exception.—This section does not prohibit the use of hearing aids or other devices for improving the hearing of the driver nor does it prohibit the use of communication equipment by the driver of a fire vehicle or by motorcycle operators complying with section 3525 (relating to protective equipment for motorcycle riders).

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes Representative Miller.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is supported by the Department of Transportation and is sponsored by both the majority and minority chairmen in the House Transportation Committee and others.

It amends the Vehicle Code to allow drivers of firetrucks to wear communication equipment, hearing devices, while operating the firetruck. The current Vehicle Code prohibits drivers from wearing headphones, earphones, or similar devices with the only exceptions being drivers of motorcycles or those wearing hearing aids.

The need for this statutory change was brought to my attention by members of the West Wyomissing Fire Company located in Spring Township, Berks County. Amending existing law will allow the firetruck drivers to wear a noise suppression intercom system, which will permit them to communicate with other firefighters who will also be wearing the devices - officers and jump seat persons and the dispatcher.

I ask for your support of this amendment. Thank you.

We hear nothing about it other than Mr. DeWeese and Mr. Itkin and the Appropriations Committee chairman from your side, Mr. Evans, time and time again have said, we want to work together with the budget; we want an early budget, yet the only working together that I have really come to feel is that you want some of our votes. You do not seem to want any of our input; you want none of our ideas, and frankly, I am bothered by it.

Now, just so there is no misunderstanding, come August 5, if that is what it is, when the budget is still unpassed, it is because you have not allowed us to share in it. We are not going to just blindly provide votes for you. If you have 102 votes, go to it, but if you want any of our votes, you better share with us some of the early-on responsibilities.

Mr. ITKIN. Mr. Speaker, I just want to assure the minority leader that it is not the intentions of the House Democrats to initiate and to fully develop a budget at today's meeting of our caucus. It is an opportunity, rather, to give our members the understanding that we have to start this budget process and to allow our Appropriations chairman to develop and present broad parameters for the caucus to consider. Certainly as we move closer to the adoption of a budget, which will not be next week, we will certainly involve the other side of the aisle and try to seek a consensus.

If you want us to participate, you better get us in on it now.

Mr. ITKIN. I appreciate the remarks of the minority leader and I certainly will take it into account as we move forward in the budget season. Thank you.
