This marks the first time that one school has had three students achieve perfect math scores at the same time. Students at MMI consistently average in the 600's on the math SAT, and the school usually has a student earn a perfect math score just about every other year.

One hundred fifty years later, persons with mental illnesses live in the community, not hospitals, but when funding is inadequate, once again we find them in jails and shelters. May we remain dedicated to the vision of our predecessors in 1845 and adequately support the care and treatment of our citizens who suffer from mental illness.

The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Fairchild. Mr. FAIRCHILD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is similar to a couple other bills that we have on the agenda today, and it has to do with the unincorporated town, and what we do here is allow certain types of municipalities to bid at public utility auctions. The problem comes in that your municipalities now must go through an advertising process whereby they advertise for 45 days and then 10 days. It also requires that they receive bids in writing. Well, many of you have been to public auctions, and obviously, that is not possible.

So at the request of a borough manager in my district, I put together this amendment. However, I found out that it had originally been put together by someone else other than myself and it passed unanimously in this House. So I am asking for your concurrence in this amendment to the bill. Thank you.

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On the question, Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Olasz. Mr. OLASZ. Mr. Speaker, this amendment would give borough councils the same authority that councils in third-class cities have to enact a land-value-based property tax. Instead of the current system in which property and buildings are taxed at the same rate, this amendment would give the boroughs the option – and I repeat, the option – to increase millages on property while tremendously decreasing millages on buildings. For most homeowners, this option would spell tax relief, because the property their homes are built on is generally worth much less than their home. They would pay lower taxes. That is what has happened in third-class cities that currently have the authority to levy this tax system.

Not only would most homeowners save money but passage of this amendment would encourage people to fix up their homes without being penalized with a major tax increase. Adoption of this tax option would also discourage land speculators who buy large parcels of industrial and commercial land for investment purposes and drag their feet at developing this property. These landowners would probably see their taxes increase, which would put the pressure on them to put their land to good use by developing it instead of leaving it vacant while neighboring communities bear the burden of their tax eroding.

Third-class cities that have enacted this form of property tax have seen increases in building permits and a decrease in urban sprawl. Land is a finite resource. Buildings can come and go, but the land is forever. By basing property taxes on land values, we will encourage landowners to put their property to its highest use.

I encourage you to support this amendment, which amends the Borough Code to allow borough councils the option of implementing this progressive form of property taxation. In just 1 year alone, 15 communities realized an increase of approximately \$89 million in 1 year, and for the information of the new members of this House, this same legislation passed this House last year with 176 or 166 votes. I would encourage you to give it a positive vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the lady from Berks County, Mrs. Miller.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Last session, as this legislation was being considered by the House of Representatives, I raised a concern regarding the impact of this amendment on boroughs that currently have farmland within their districts. The prime sponsor of the amendment at that point in time felt that this was not a problem, because he indicated that in fact boroughs do not have sufficient farmland for this to be a concern.

Today I rise to express my concern in opposition to this amendment until there is some kind of language incorporated which would exempt any land that qualifies to be considered under Act 319, the preferential land assessment for agriculture.

In the county of York, there are three boroughs; 97 farms are located within those borough limits, and those boroughs would include Winterstown, Cross Roads Borough, and Stewartstown Borough for a total of 6,598 acres. In Westmoreland County, we have Murrysville Borough with 60 farms numbering 2,823 acres; Washington County has Decemston Borough with 28 farms, 2,117 acres; Wayne County has Starrucca Borough, 22 farms, which total 2,829 acres; and Carbon County has Parryville Borough with 11 farms and 567 acres. These are farms included currently in ag security areas. This does not include those boroughs that may also have farms which are not part of ag security areas, so currently within borough limits, we have 218 farms with nearly 15,000 acres.

Mr. Speaker, my contention is this would be an onerous tax burden on these farms, and I ask my colleagues to oppose it.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

The Chair recognizes the lady from Butler, Ms. Carone.

Ms. CARONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to make a comment about the legislation, the amendment, and to encourage a "no" vote at this moment.

When we passed the legislation last session, one of my constituents has a trucking firm, and he had just moved into one of the municipalities that had this new ability to tax differently land and property and buildings. He has a trucking firm, and the only way that he uses the land is to put gravel and coal storage on that when he takes it from the barges or is preparing to put it on the barges to go down the Ohio River. His taxes went up astronomically, and in fact he thought it was a joke, and he called to find out where the decimal point really belonged on his new tax increase.

So I think perhaps the sponsor of the legislation does have a valid point, but I think we need to redraft it so that we can address the issues that have certainly proved negative. So I would ask for a "no" vote on this amendment and go back and try to improve on it. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to the Olasz amendment.

I have difficulty understanding the public policy served by encouraging the development of undeveloped land. We are going to be voting on a bill probably within the next week or two, SB 1, the prime bill in the environmental area of the Ridge administration, whose goal is just the opposite, which is to save greenfields from development.

I oppose this amendment, and I do not feel that this is the proper posture to discuss a bill like this. I would urge a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the Olasz amendment.

What this amendment does, in simple form, is to give more discretionary authority to locally elected borough officials. It gives them additional discretionary authority to create a mix of taxes at the

local level in their community that will best respond to the needs and the circumstances in that community.

We are not imposing any kind of decision on any community or any taxpayer or group of taxpayers anywhere in this Commonwealth. What we are doing is what so many people on this floor often say they are for: we are enhancing local control; we are giving a little bit more local authority to these locally elected borough officials. They will have to make the judgment, and they are in the best position to make the judgment about what kind of tax structure is most appropriate in their particular community.

I would urge we support the Olasz amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Washington, Mr. Trich.

Mr. TRICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I, too, would rise in support of this legislation.

As Representative Olasz has indicated, we are merely trying to let boroughs enjoy the same opportunities that third-class cities presently enjoy. I happen to come from the city of Washington, a community that has in fact seen a deteriorating tax base over the years – tax-exempt property, younger people moving out of the area. Remaining behind are the older citizens who are getting strapped more and more with a very difficult tax base.

This particular measure in the city of Washington has been helpful. Although it may not have been an opportunity to roll back taxes, it certainly has been an opportunity to hold taxes in line.

Therefore, I would hope that that same courtesy would be extended to the boroughs of the Commonwealth and would ask that we support Representative Olasz' amendment.

The SPEAKER. Does the lady, Ms. Steelman, desire recognition?

Ms. STEELMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the Olasz amendment and to offer a slightly different perspective on the issue raised by Representative Vitali.

I believe that in some boroughs, including my own, there are sites that were previously used for industrial processes, the buildings on which have been demolished. The land is now sitting unused, blighted.

I believe that the kind of freedom that the Olasz amendment would give local borough officials to look at the situations in their own boroughs and create a taxing system that would provide an incentive for the redevelopment of these previously industrial properties would be a desirable option for us to offer them.

So I hope that those of my colleagues who are interested in seeing former industrial properties redeveloped will not immediately dismiss the Olasz amendment, because I believe that it can also serve as a tool to promote that highly desirable form of development.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster County, Mr. Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the Olasz amendment.

While I understand the arguments made by a couple of the Representatives who cited specific cases in their boroughs where there would be an adverse impact, and I believe we should look at correcting those potential adverse impacts, the reason that I support the Olasz amendment is because it is optional. If it were mandatory, I would absolutely oppose it for the reasons that were stated. But this is optional, and within those individual boroughs, they will be able to decide whether in fact it is going to have a negative impact, like was cited in some of the examples, or whether it will not, and there are many boroughs, in the western part of the State in particular, where this would be a great benefit.

For those reasons I support the Olasz amendment. Thank you. The SPEAKER. On the question of the Olasz amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Serafini.

Mr. SERAFINI. Mr. Speaker, would the maker of the amendment answer a brief question?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Olasz, indicates that he will. You may proceed.

Mr. SERAFINI. Mr. Speaker, is there an exception in your legislation or within the context of the entire bill for farmland, whereby the assessment would be much different than developable property?

Mr. OLASZ. Yes, Mr. Speaker. To the best of my knowledge, farmland is not taxed at the rate that other lands are, especially in these industrialized municipalities. I think the local assessors take that into account when they make the assessment, that this is farmland.

Most importantly – and I repeat what previous supporters have said, Mr. Speaker – this is a local option, and I am certain that the representatives of those boroughs recognize the farmland that is in their area and mostly those boroughs where this is specifically targeted to. So in response to your question, I would say, yes, it is looked at in a lower rate of taxation and a more favorable light, in that it is farmland.

Mr. SERAFINI. Mr. Speaker, a brief statement on the legislation.

If farmland is taxed independently of the manner in which other real estate would be taxed and if this is a local option, I find favor in the opportunity for a municipality to tax real estate independent of buildings because that property is much more comparable to neighboring properties as would be a piece of property with an old building on and one with a new building on next door to each other being assessed the same rates because of their proximity to one another.

I appreciate the opportunity to speak and support the legislation. The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the lady from Berks for the second time on the issue.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In listening to the previous debate and questions of the prime sponsor of the amendment and the responses, it was stated that farmland is treated somehow separately than other land when a county is doing an assessment. Recently Berks County underwent a countywide reassessment. All the farmland was considered based on its ultimate best use. This was not given any kind of preferential assessment value unless the farmers who owned that farmland signed up under "Clean and Green," which is Act 319. That has to be done by the farmer paying a fee in order to qualify. So therefore, I contend that this is not something where farmers are automatically given a break.

This amendment, if it is inserted, would actually negate the preferential assessment opportunities that farmers currently have under Act 319 if they are unfortunately within the boundaries of a borough.

So therefore, again, until this discrepancy would be corrected, I \searrow urge my colleagues to look very carefully at this and address local tax reform as local tax reform and not in this piecemeal effort. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE CANCELED

The SPEAKER. The Chair returns to leaves of absence and recognizes the presence on the floor of the House of the gentleman, Mr. Gruitza, and asks that he be removed from leaves.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 683 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Olasz.

Mr. OLASZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This bill last year was debated at length in the committee and was voted out to the House floor overwhelmingly.

As you recall, Mr. Speaker, several years ago we passed legislation that would protect the farmland in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. There were benefits extended to those farmlands. But common sense would dictate we are all political horses, and if you as a councilman would dare to do that to farmland, I think you are well aware that that councilman could kiss his seat on that borough council goodbye.

This is a commonsense piece of legislation that is absolutely necessary. We all cry about the decay that is taking place in our center cities and that we, in turn, at budget time had to give extra amounts of money to preserve those cities. This is common sense to encourage people to keep their property values up by remodeling their homes, at the same time hitting the speculators that have all these industrial sites and sit on them and look at them as rust buckets, and that is a terrible invitation to send any business you are trying to attract to our areas.

Once again, I repeat and I repeat and I repeat, you think about it. This is a local option. We are not mandating that 67 counties and every municipality in them adopt this. If you are so inclined and your council seems to favor this, then you go and speak to them about it and let them think about it.

I would still encourage the same 166 that voted for it last term to support it again this time. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mrs. LAUGHLIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

A few years back we passed legislation for my district in Aliquippa. They have told me that over the last couple of years, since that legislation has been passed, 85 percent of the homeowners' taxes have gone down and only 15 percent have gone up. So this is very substantial and helped the homeowners, and it also brought in more taxes whenever the steel mills went down and left nothing but land.

So I am very much in support of this legislation. Thank you. The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of the

amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Nyce. Mr. NYCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just a brief comment on what is before the House right now.

We have been asked, myself as chairman and two other members, have been asked to review local tax reform issues during this session, and we have just been assigned several bills which will probably impact somewhere along the line on what is before us today.

I would encourage the members to be very careful. One of the reasons local tax reform has failed in the past is because of a lack of understanding by the constituents as to its impact on their personal lives or on their communities. That is exactly what the task force is reviewing, and I would urge the members to be very careful in passing any legislation today that is going to make the job even more

complicated as we move through this session and address those tax reform bills.

I would urge a "no" vote.
