On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Mr. GEORGE offered the following amendment No. A5894:

Section 4.2. General Rule Making; Health and Safety .-\* \* \*

(f) (1) Any surface mining operator or any person engaged in government-financed reclamation who affects a public or private water supply by contamination or diminution shall restore or replace the affected supply with an alternate source of water adequate in quantity and quality for the purposes served by the supply. If any operator shall fail to comply with this provision, the secretary may issue such orders to the operator as are necessary to assure compliance.

(2) It shall be presumed, as a matter of law, that a surface mine operator or owner is responsible without proof of fault, negligence or causation for all pollution, except bacteriological contamination, or diminution of public or private water supplies within [one thousand (1,000)] two thousand five hundred (2,500) linear feet of the boundaries of the land affected or acreage assigned to the surface mining operation under section 4 by a permit issued by the department. There shall be only five defenses to the presumption of liability provided in this clause. A mine owner or operator must affirmatively prove by a preponderance of evidence that one of the following conditions exists:

(i) The landowner or water supply company refused to allow the surface mining operator or owner access to conduct a survey prior to commencing mining activities.

(ii) The water supply is not within [one thousand (1,000)] two thousand five hundred (2,500) linear feet of the boundaries of the land affected or acreage assigned to the surface mining operation under section 4 by a permit issued by the department.

(iii) The pollution or diminution existed prior to the surface mining activities as determined by a survey conducted prior to commencing surface mining activities.

(iv) The pollution or diminution occurred as a result of some cause other than the surface mining activities.

(v) The landowner, water supply user or water supply company refused to allow the surface mining operator or owner access to determine the cause of pollution or diminution or to replace or restore the water supply.

(3) If the secretary finds that immediate replacement of an affected water supply used for potable or domestic needs is required to protect public health or safety and the owner or operator has appealed or failed to comply with an order issued pursuant to this subsection, the secretary may restore or replace the affected water supply with an alternative source of water-utilizing moneys from the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Fund. The secretary shall recover the costs of restoration or replacement, including costs incurred for design and construction of facilities, from the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Fund. The secretary shall recover the costs of restoration of facilities, from the responsible owners or operators. Costs recovered shall be deposited in the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Fund.

(4) An operator or owner aggrieved by the secretary's order issued pursuant to this subsection shall have the right within thirty (30) days of receipt of the order to appeal to the Environmental Hearing Board. The secretary's order, when appealed by the operator or owner, shall not be used to block the issuance of new permits or the release of bonds when a stage of reclamation work is completed. Hearings under this subsection shall be in accordance with the act of July 13, 1988 (P.L.530, No.94), known as the "Environmental Hearing Board Act," and 2 Pa.C.S. Ch. 5 Subch. A (relating to practice and procedure of Commonwealth agencies) and Ch. 7 Subch. A (relating to judicial review of Commonwealth agency action).

(5) A surface mining operator or owner who provides a successful defense to the presumptions of liability shall be entitled to recover the costs incurred, including, but not limited to, the costs of temporary water supply, design, construction, restoration or replacement costs, attorney fees and expert witness fees from the department.

(6) Nothing in this subsection shall prevent any landowner or water supply company who claims pollution or diminution of a water supply from seeking any other remedy that may be provided for at law or in equity.

(7) A surface mining operation conducted under a surface mining permit issued by the department before the effective date of this act shall not be subject to the provisions of clauses (2), (3), (4), (5) and (6), but shall be subject to clause (1).

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is recognized. Mr. GEORGE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise at this moment to offer an amendment that is relatively a very simple amendment but nevertheless very important.

As I am sure, most of the legislators that hear my voice are knowledgeable that we do have rebuttable presumption in many of our laws, the purpose of which is to protect an individual's water supply by guaranteeing replacement in those instances where for some reason a water loss can be attributed to an operation of any sort.

This amendment simply extends that matter of protection, Mr. Speaker, from 1,000 feet to 2,500 feet. So for those of us that have experienced shortages of water and know what it can do to a community or to an individual, those of us that have lost our individual supplies and were just a couple of feet out of the realm of protection would surely think, where were we yesterday when this amendment was needed very badly?

It does not impose or force any activity on any operation. It does not insist that automatically an individual will have the water restored. It simply encourages and insists that the demarcation line is added by 1,500 more feet, and when it comes to the degradation of water, it is very important.

I ask that you support this amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the lady from Indiana, Ms. Steelman.

Ms. STEELMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to remind those members from urban constituencies how critically important something like this is to our rural constituents, because for many of the people who live in rural Pennsylvania, their only source of drinking water is their well, and if that well is destroyed as a result of mining operations, their house, the most valuable thing that most of them own, becomes valueless.

That is why we have felt historically that it is important to protect the residents of rural Pennsylvania against the consequences of water loss, and that is why I am asking you to support this amendment of Representative George's to extend the umbrella of rebuttable presumption to cover a wider area, an area that we believe is justified by the basic facts of hydrogeology. Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the lady.

The Chair wishes to recognize the gentleman from Clearfield County again, Mr. George.

Mr. GEORGE. Mr. Speaker, I neglected to inform my colleagues that in Act 97 and Act 108 we responsibly added the same language last year. If it is good for one, it should be good for all. It is nothing that impoverishes any operation. All it simply does is protect an individual's water supply.

Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. George? Mr. George, for the purpose of clarification for the members, on the board we have amendment A5894. Many of the members have a prior amendment No. A5737. Could you please describe the difference so the members know what they will be voting on?

Mr. GEORGE. Mr. Speaker, when we had the amendment drafted, they had missed the opportunity to change the 2,500-feet designation on the lower paragraph. The amendment we are now offering is just a technical amendment to correct what unfortunately was not provided to start with.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. So the gentleman is referring to line 34 of the amendment; is that correct? The gentleman nods in the affirmative; correct.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Jefferson County, Mr. Smith.

Mr. S. H. SMITH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this amendment.

The language that is proposed in the amendment would significantly increase the area of the rebuttable presumption, which goes well beyond the area that is currently evaluated in the process of receiving a mining permit. When a company goes about the process of getting a permit, under current law, with the 1,000-foot area within the rebuttable presumption, they do a certain amount of evaluation of water quality and quantity within that region. To expand that rebuttable presumption to 2,500 feet would be making a significant change in the process and in fact would require a significant change in how the permitting process is handled as far as evaluating the permit.

In addition, I would like to point out to the members that while the amendment would expand the area to a distance of 2,500 feet, it would not in fact change whether or not the mining company is responsible for water replacement if some water loss was caused outside of the current 1,000 feet. In other words, within the rebuttable presumption area, under current law at 1,000 feet, it is presumed that if loss occurs, it is due to mining, and it is up to the mining company to prove otherwise. Outside the 1,000 feet, if water loss or a problem does occur, the mining company is still responsible if it is proven that the loss of water was due to mining.

Because of that fact, Mr. Speaker, and given the significant change that this represents, the fact that it has not been, to my knowledge, substantiated as far as the technological process, scientifically speaking, I would urge the members to vote against this amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Elk County, Mr. Surra.

Mr. SURRA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the George amendment.

Mr. Speaker, under current law, as Representative George mentioned earlier, the hazardous waste law, Act 108, and the municipal waste and residual waste law, Act 97, already in those statutes the 2,500-feet provision is now enacted. All we are doing is being consistent and bringing the 2,500-feet provision under the mining law.

Mr. Speaker, for people who live in areas where there is city water, there are municipal water sources, this is not a problem, but if you represent areas – and I ask the members from the urban areas to listen to this and support this concept – if you live in a rural area where you happen to rely on a spring or you happen to rely on a deep well, Mr. Speaker, current law only gives you protection of 1,000 feet – and that is only a little over 300 yards – from a mining facility, and with some of the work and the heavy blasting that takes place, Mr. Speaker, it is not uncommon to lose or degrade a water supply that is 1,200, 1,500, 2,000 feet away.

Mr. Speaker, I have personally talked with constituents who have had good water supplies that they have utilized for 40 or 50 years, Mr. Speaker, that was their spring or their well, and a strip mine 500 yards away comes in, they start blasting, and all of a sudden their water is gone, their water is ruined. Mr. Speaker, these people have to go out and prove that the strip mine and the mining company took their water supply.

Under Representative George's amendment, we would just expand that rebuttable presumption to 2,500 feet. It makes it consistent with current law. Mr. Speaker, it is a good idea. It is good for people in rural Pennsylvania, and my colleagues from the urban areas, I appreciate your help on this. This is a good amendment, and I appreciate your vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker,

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman. The Chair recognizes the Democrat leader, the gentleman from

Greene County, Mr. DeWeese. Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker, we are in this chamber to help others. That has to be the central focus of our mission. Many of us, Democrats and Republicans alike, who live in rural settings are going to realize the diminution of property value when our mineral resources are exhausted. Coal, limestone, oil, a variety of other fossil fuels and mineral resources will be taken from us, and nothing will be there to replace them.

I think it is imperative upon us, Mr. Speaker, the General Assembly, to remember that nothing is more fundamental than the observations of Mr. Surra and Mr. George: water. It is quintessential to our existence, and in rural Pennsylvania it is being jeopardized by the day by mammoth companies, many of these companies owned by multinationals based in Europe and around

the world. I think if there is ever a point to be parochial, it should deal with our water; it should deal with our very life sustenance.

If we are not going to have an extraction tax in our State, what kind of communities will be left when water resources have been ruptured and the landscape has been fractured and seared and scarred and we in the General Assembly have done nothing to prepare for that day? Mr. George's amendment would ameliorate the difficulties that are inherent in surface mining as well as in the other forms of mining, and I believe that if 2,500 feet is an appropriate distance for the Hazardous Waste Act and 2,500 feet is an appropriate distance for the Solid Waste Act, then the gentleman from Jefferson County's argumentation is rendered comparatively vacuous. It should also be 2,500 for the strip act.

I would ask for the concurrence of Mr. George's amendment, I believe once again, sir, that water, water, is fundamental not only to all of the rural communities in our Commonwealth but inherently, secondarily, and very soon, immediately, to those of us who live in suburban and rural and urban settings also. So I would think that Mr. George's amendment is worthy and should be pursued. Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.
