REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to submit some remarks for SB 10.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may submit his remarks for the record.

Will one of the pages kindly pick up from Mr. Richardson his remarks.

Mr. RICHARDSON submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

SB 10 would provide law enforcement officers with greater access to fingerprints and photographs of juvenile offenders. In addition, the separate file on juvenile delinquents would be disseminated to allow enforcement officers on Federal, State, and local levels to access records.

Existing Law:

The availability of juvenile history records, including fingerprints and photographs, is currently strictly regulated by sections 6308, 6309, and 6341 of the Judicial Code. The child has to have been classified as a "dangerous juvenile offender" for such access to be permitted.

Analysis:

SB 10 would authorize law enforcement officers to take fingerprints and photographs of any child who is alleged to have committed an act designated as a misdemeanor or felony under the Pennsylvania Judicial Code or any other State for that matter, which would then fall under Federal law. Also, references to the requirement of classification as a "dangerous juvenile offender" would be stricken throughout the statutes involved and replaced with references to alleged juvenile delinquents. (DPR) This bill would have an adverse effect on our youth's ability to turn their lives around during such an early age.)

Furthermore, the arresting law enforcement authority would ensure that the fingerprints and photographs of an alleged delinquent child would be forwarded to the central repository for immediate usage.

However, if the alleged delinquent child is fingerprinted and photographed and it was later revealed by the court of law that the charges were in fact false, then the court shall direct that these records be immediately destroyed by law enforcement agencies (if it is not too late). Naturally, the expungement provisions of section 9123 of the Crimes Code would be available where otherwise applicable.

In conclusion, this bill would negatively impact delinquent children by denying their right to privacy. It would also serve as a "Head Start" program for career criminals within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, therefore leaving very little room for error. I VOTE NO ON SENATE BILL 10.

The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman, Mr. Scrimenti, desire recognition?

Mr. SCRIMENTI. Yes, sir. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

Having withdrawn my amendment to this bill and after sharing my concerns with the Ridge administration, I stand today in full support of SB 10.

We need to put repeat offenders behind bars, and as a former correctional officer, it does not matter whether they are 2 months over the age of 18 or 2 months under the age of 18. This bill would help law enforcement investigate and solve criminal acts committed by juveniles, helping to stop repeat juvenile offenders.

On that note, Mr. Speaker, I pledge my support to this bill. Thank you, sir.
