The House convened at 11 a.m., e.d.t.

THE SPEAKER (MATTHEW J. RYAN) PRESIDING

PRAYER

The SPEAKER. The master roll call taken in today's regular session will be the master roll call for the special session.

The SPEAKER. Does the majority or minority leader have any further business?

Hearing none, this House will stand in recess until 12:30 p.m., unless sooner recalled by the Speaker.

AFTER RECESS

The time of recess having expired, the House was called to order.

GUESTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. The Chair is pleased to welcome to the hall of the House today, as the guests of Representative Ramos, Cory Thomas and Rachel Soler, seated to the left of the Speaker. Would the guests please rise. These folks are interns in Representative Ramos' district office, as I understand it. We are very pleased to have you in Harrisburg.

Hearing none, the special session will stand in recess to the call of the Chair.

CALENDAR

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of HB 37, PN 37, entitled:

An Act making an appropriation to the Susquehanna River Basin Commission for flood forecast maps.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

The SPEAKER. It is the understanding of the Chair that the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, who was scheduled to offer an amendment, has withdrawn that amendment. Is that correct, Mr. Vitali?

Mr. VITALI. Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak to that. I have discussed this with the maker of the bill, and I would like to speak to that point.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is recognized.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr.	. Si	r. Speak	er,
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What amendment 2119 to HB 37 would do would require the Department of Environmental Protection to conduct a study of wetlands loss from the issuance of General Permit 15. It would require the department to assess the increased risk of flood damage that would result from this general permit and report back to us within a year. It would also nullify General Permit 15.

In this flood session when we will be authorizing a bond issue of in excess of \$100 million, it is important to deal with this policy, General Permit 15, which is going to cause increased risk of future flood damage. What General Permit 15 does is make it easier to develop individual lot sizes for wetlands use.

Specifically, if you have an individual wetlands lot of up to a half acre and it was subdivided before November of 1991, you can circumvent the permitting process. In short, you do not need a wetlands delineation, and the project is not viewed individually on a case-by-case basis. The net result of this will be the filling in and development of thousands of acres of wetlands in Pennsylvania, and this will result in increased flooding in the future.

Dr. James Schmid, who maps wetlands for the Federal Government, indicates it is his estimate that in Pike and Monroe Counties alone, 650,000 acres of wetlands loss will occur because of General Permit 15.

General Permit 15 has been opposed by many groups. You are starting to get letters from these groups. Today you have a letter from the sportsmen, the Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen, who oppose General Permit 15. Let me read that letter in part: "The public is strongly opposed to this permit and after the flooding of this past winter, Pennsylvania needs to retain all the stormwater and flood protection afforded by wetland areas that can be retained." The Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen opposes General Permit 15.

The Sierra Club has also written you a letter, today's date, and I will read that in part: "During the public comment period on GP 15, over 85% opposed DEP's proposal. DEP ignored overwhelming public opposition and approved GP 15. After the Flood of '96, scientists, environmentalists, sportsmen, and many major newspapers condemned the DEP decision for its impact on future flooding."

A professor at Connecticut College and a wetlands expert, William Niering, calls this permit, quote, "a recipe for disaster."

A biologist from Wilkes University, Ken Klemow – and I will quote – says, "When you turn a wetland into a driveway or a road, that water has to run off somewhere. This is going to mean flooding. Maybe not where that wetland was, but downstream."

From the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, who also oppose General Permit 15, Jared Brandwein, supervisor of the eastern Pennsylvania field office, says that this initiative – referring to General Permit 15 – signals a retreat by Pennsylvania from its traditionally strong stand on environmental issues.

In addition to the increased flood damage that is expected from wetlands loss, I think we also have to consider another class of victims, and they are the unsuspecting victims or the victims who buy home lots on lots that are now wetlands but will be developed as a result of this permit. What you are going to get is people who are going to have homes and their life savings invested, and basements are going to flood, foundations are going to crack—

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The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield.

Mr. Vitali, are you debating final passage?

Mr. VITALI. Mr. Speaker, I am speaking to this amendment with the intention of, at the conclusion, explaining my reasons for withdrawing the amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am withdrawing this amendment today at the request of Representative Fairchild, the maker of the bill, a good environmental legislator, who has requested I do so.

Additionally, I think because of the gravity of this issue and because in my opinion more thought needs to be given, a higher level of education on the part of the members as to this issue needs to be raised, I will withdraw it today with the intention of amending another special session bill so that prior to the conclusion of this special session, we can deal with this issue.

It is my hope that serious consideration be given to this very significant bill so that at the same time we are not spending Commonwealth money for flood damage; we are not at the same time causing us to spend more in the future.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On the question recurring. Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration? Bill was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.
