STATEMENT BY MR. BARLEY

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats; members, please take your seats.

The gentleman, Mr. Barley, has asked for unanimous consent to advise the House of what he believes the Appropriations schedule will be with respect to the budget bill.

Will the gentleman yield for a moment.

Members, please take your seats.

The gentleman, Mr. Barley.

Mr. BARLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As all of you know, the House Appropriations Committee recently held their budget hearings, and we have taken a detailed look at the budget and the fiscal needs of the various State agencies. I would just like to take this brief opportunity to thank the members of the Appropriations Committee. The hearings went very well, very much a bipartisan spirit of cooperation, and again, it was, I felt, a very good experience.

Today I am happy to report that we are keeping the budget process moving. The bills have been reported out of the Appropriations Committee, and it was done, again, very much in a tone of teamwork that we were able to work together with both the Republicans and the Democrats.

Now, since the Governor's budget address, I have heard from many members, both Republicans and Democrats, about various items in the proposed budget. There were a few of the items that there was an overwhelming response to, and I concluded that to pass the budget, the House must make at least two modifications in the Governor's proposed budget. The first modification was to restore the funding for the Act 339 sewer grants. The second was to renew the funds for the Pennsylvania State Police. These were two areas about which you spoke loud and clear, and so I have made those funding changes in the budget.

I would also like to inform you today that according to House rule 19(b), the Appropriations Committee has met and we certified that the members may amend HB 980 by not more than \$275,430,000. As you may recall, House rule 19(b) is the provision that has been inserted into our permanent rules. That was the rule that we formerly adopted as the Manderino rule.

Therefore, pursuant to the House rules, Mr. Speaker, it is my intent to call for consideration of HB 980 when we return to session on April 12. Now, as a reminder to the members – again, this is very important to the members – your amendments must be filed by 2 p.m., Monday, April 5. Any amendments that you desire to be included in HB 980 must be filed by no later than 2 p.m., Monday, April 5.

As I have mentioned before, we are conducting this process that will be open to legislators of both parties, and it is a process that I am confident will lead to another timely budget.

Again, it has been a very good experience to date, and I thank you very much for all of your cooperation, and I look forward to continuing that cooperation as we continue through the budget process.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity here today.

Section 1. The definition of "facility" in section 103 of the act of November 6, 1987 (P.L.381, No.79), known as the Older Adults Protective Services Act, is amended and the section is amended by adding a definition to read:

Section 103. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Assisted living residence." A residential setting that offers, provides or coordinates a combination of personal care services, 24-hour supervision and scheduled or unscheduled assistance activities, or health-related services and has a service program and physical environment designed to minimize the need for tenants to move within or from the setting to accommodate changing needs and preferences.

"Facility." Any of the following:

(1) A domiciliary care home as defined in section 2202-A of the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929.

(2) A home health care agency.

(3) A long-term care nursing facility as defined in section 802.1 of the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48), known as the Health Care Facilities Act.

(4) An older adult daily living center as defined in section 2 of the act of July 11, 1990 (P.L.499, No.118), known as the Older Adult Daily Living Centers Licensing Act.

(5) A personal care home as defined in section 1001 of the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as the Public Welfare Code.

(6) An assisted living residence.

Section 2. Section 503 of the act, amended June 9, 1997 (P.L.160, No.13), is amended to read:

Amend Sec. 2, page 3, line 21, by striking out "2" and inserting

Mr. GEORGE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, if you will bear with me a moment, please.

Mr. Speaker, I met with the lady, Mrs. Taylor, this morning. Yesterday I met with the majority and minority chairmen of the respective committee, Mr. Schuler and Mr. Pistella. They have a concern about the amendment, but we all have a concern about what we believe the amendment will do.

I looked at the bill. The bill does absolutely nothing in the protection end of it to take care of those facilities that may not have certification or license caring for three or four of our wonderful older citizens, and that causes me concern, because even for those complaints that come in on facilities that are licensed, very few times are we made aware or can acknowledge it has been reviewed. But since this is a Governor's bill, I am told, and they do not want it held up, respectfully and with your permission, Mr. Speaker, I will remove this amendment pending their agreement to work with me on the next bill that comes up. Thank you, sir.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The amendment offered by the gentleman, Mr. George, is withdrawn.

Sometime tomorrow the Intergovernmental Council on Long-Term Care will be bringing down a definition of "assisted living," and I think it was proper that we wait until that definition arrives in our committee so we can take a look at it.

I will work with the Representative to try and resolve the issue. He does have a legitimate issue, and I think we can try to come to some resolve on that issue dealing with some of these smaller assisted living areas. So I thank the gentleman again. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the lady from Chester County, Mrs. Taylor.

Mrs. TAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, I, too, want to thank the gentleman, Representative George, and I also wish to make a statement that I understand his concerns. I think they are issues that need to be addressed, and I hope that we will be working together

to address the concerns that Representative George has. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Pistella.

Mr. PISTELLA. Mr. Speaker, I, too, would also like to thank Representative George and my colleague on the Aging and Youth Committee, the Republican chairman, Representative Schuler, for his being gracious enough to entertain a discussion with Secretary Browdie from the Department of Aging about this issue. I think the result was a bipartisan effort to attempt to assist our constituents and Representative George's constituents. I appreciate it very much and would like to thank those members.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. **BELARDI** submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

When the 2-percent loan program was established 22 years ago, it made sense to include provisions requiring equipment purchased under the program to meet National Fire Protection Association standards.

As these standards have been updated over the years, they have generally helped to ensure that our volunteer fire companies have been buying safe, reliable equipment to serve our communities.

When the national standards were last revised in 1996, my volunteer firefighters now tell me they added too many specifications that had nothing to do with the capability of fire trucks to perform their duties.

This has resulted in the elimination of a lot of good firefighting apparatus that was previously eligible for purchase under the 2-percent loan program because of the requirement to meet the revised 1996 national standards.

Without this used equipment available, our volunteer fire, ambulance, and rescue companies are now finding themselves restricted to purchasing only new or nearly new vehicles.

Needless to say, few can afford that.

My volunteer companies have asked us to modify these requirements in light of what we feel are unintended consequences of a good law that needs to be updated.

I would strongly urge a positive vote on **HB 371**.

Mr. WILT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to make a brief statement, Mr. Speaker.

First of all, I want to bring to the members' attention that today is the sixth annual private college and university student lobbying day, and I have run into many of these students around the Capitol. And for the members' attention, many of the students who are participating today in this student lobbying day are recipients of PHEAA (Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency) grants and loans, and they depend very much on this assistance to attend a private college of their choice. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

RESOLUTION

DECISION OF CHAIR RESCINDED ON HR 87

The SPEAKER. Without objection, the Chair rescinds its decision that HR 87 is over for today.

Mr. FLICK called up **HR 87, PN 1139**, entitled:

A Resolution memorializing the Senate of the United States to remove a provision containing a \$350 million offset from the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families program from the supplemental appropriations bill for disaster relief, etc., as marked up March 4, 1999, by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Lescovitz.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Will the gentleman, Mr. Flick, stand for a brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. He indicates he will. You may begin.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, just a couple of points on the resolution. You are requesting the United States Congress not to appropriate the \$350 million which is set aside for Pennsylvania to be used for TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families)?

Mr. FLICK. No. Mr. Speaker, the United States Senate put a provision in an appropriations bill that would have removed that money and would have denied the States the opportunity to draw down those funds in subsequent years.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Then I guess I have two questions relating to the resolution. Number one is, it is my understanding that the House Appropriations Committee in Congress took out the Senate language so that the money of \$350 million is currently okay in Congress. So although I do not oppose your resolution, the point is that the money is currently okay. So why are we introducing the resolution?

Mr. FLICK. Well, at the time I was down in Washington, D.C., speaking with the Governor's Office, that money was not in the budget because the Senate had taken it out. That is when I had the resolution drafted.

And, Mr. Speaker, I think it is a good idea, since the budget process has not reached its final conclusion in Washington, that we go on record as saying that that \$350 million is very important to the States for the TANF Programs in the ensuing years.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Okay.

The second point— And again I just want to make sure you are aware that the House Appropriations Committee did take that language out, so the money is safe. But relating to that, why has Pennsylvania not spent down those dollars from the Federal government, the \$350 million set aside for Pennsylvania for programs to be used under the TANF Program, programs that— Why are we not spending it for child care or for transportation? Why are we leaving that money in Washington and then ending up with a situation that we have to make sure they are not going to spend it on other programs?

Mr. FLICK. Mr. Speaker, that money is set aside for the years 2 through 5 of the Federal welfare reform legislation which passed.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. This is the second year.

Mr. FLICK. This is our—

Mr. LESCOVITZ. We are in the third—

Mr. FLICK. This is Pennsylvania's second year.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. We are in the third year right now.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentlemen yield.

Take turns. The reporters cannot transcribe both of you at once, although it might make more sense.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Let me make sure, the moneys, the \$350 million, are for years 2, 3, 4, and 5. We are currently in the year 3, so we have not— My question again is, do you have any understanding on why we have not spent down some of the dollars in year 2 and year 3?

Mr. FLICK. Mr. Speaker, I would suggest that the money is for future years as the States implement welfare reform under the Federal Welfare Reform Act. Whether it is specifically for years 2 through 5, 3 through 5, I cannot say, but I know it is for future years as the States implement the Federal law.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just a comment.

The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of the resolution, the gentleman is recognized.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Okay. Mr. Speaker, I certainly support the resolution. However, I just want to make sure it is clear that even though the Senate language was in the original version of the appropriations bill, it is no longer in that bill today.

And secondly, the dollars of \$350 million which is set aside for TANF use in Pennsylvania has not been spent by the administration either last year or this year, and if the administration does not start to spend these dollars, there is the chance in the future we will lose this \$300-and-some million. So although I support the resolution, my suggestion is that the administration start to consider spending the dollars this current year, which we are in the third year of welfare reform, and not take the risk for next year having these moneys lost forever by the Federal government.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
