The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of this resolution, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Freeman.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to urge my colleagues to support HR 484. HR 484 would designate May 12 as "Chronic Fatigue and Immune Dysfunction Day" here in Pennsylvania.

Chronic fatigue and immune dysfunction syndrome, or CFIDS as it is known, is a very debilitating illness which affects some 800,000 Americans. Unfortunately, the disease is very difficult to diagnose, and as such, those who suffer from the

illness have had a very difficult time trying to convince their coworkers, employers, family, friends, and physicians of the debilitating effects of this illness. It is hoped that through this resolution and other efforts to create greater public awareness of CFIDS that we can hopefully make sure that there is proper diagnosis of those who do suffer from CFIDS.

I would be remiss if I did not recognize the hard work put forth by Priscilla deLeon, who is a guest in our gallery here today, who was recognized earlier by the Speaker. The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman, Mr. Cappabianca, desire recognition?

A lady came back from the Holy Land and brought me a healing rock; very nice, a healing rock from the Holy Land. Now, how can you not want to help people like that? It is great. A healing rock from the Holy Land, unbelievable. The only thing that bothered me about it was, it came from the Dead Sea. I told her, I said, you could have gotten it from the Jordan River or Jericho or someplace else, but it says the Dead Sea. But it makes no difference. It is a healing rock, and I will always keep it in my pocket, and I am very grateful to her, and I will always be grateful to all of you, to you and your staffs and everybody, the e-mails and everything else. And would you not know, the minute I start getting e-mail, they have to have viruses on "I love you"; unbelievable.

But anyhow, I am in there fighting, and I will stay in there. I will not give up on this disease. Whatever they tell me they have to do, we will do. The report shall include the commission's determination of methods to increase charitable giving within this Commonwealth.

(c) Expiration.—This section shall expire June 30, 2001.

Section 12. Appropriation.

The sum of \$100,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to the Charitable Giving Study Commission for the fiscal year July 1, 2000, to June 30, 2001, to carry out its duties under section 11.

The **SPEAKER**. On the question of the adoption of the George amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Clearfield County, Mr. George.

Mr. **GEORGE**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, when I learned about two young children in my district that needed insulin pumps and that DPW (Department of Public Welfare) was not saying yes, my office found that there were two charitable organizations in this country that came through and helped.

Mr. Speaker, we need to encourage more people to help, more people to contribute, more people to stay involved. You know, Mr. Speaker, some may say that we do not know what others feel, those of our constituents, but we do know. We hurt when they hurt. We agonize when they agonize.

What this amendment does is it creates a commission for 6 months to propose ways that Pennsylvania State government can encourage charitable giving. This 15-member commission would have 6 months to make recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on how to increase charitable efforts in Pennsylvania. On this body, the

General Assembly will appoint eight members and the Governor will appoint seven.

Mr. Speaker, I think we should support this effort. I ask for an affirmative vote.

The **SPEAKER**. The gentleman, Mr. Reinard.

Mr. **REINARD**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am going to rise in opposition to this amendment, and I am sure the previous speaker might have some concerns about my objections, but I am going to explain to the House what the two are.

First and foremost, the legislation that is before you right now establishes community trusts. It uses the Commonwealth as a conduit to do and promote good for those people with disabilities that are chronic, and it does not cost the taxpayers of this Commonwealth one red cent. This amendment, if it were to be successfully inserted into this bill, would raise and add a new appropriation of \$100,000 or, as the amendment says, as much as therein is necessary to complete this 6-month study.

First off, I think it is important that we deal with the taxpayers' money, and specifically in this bill, a bill that does not have any fiscal impact to the taxpayers, I would like to see it remain that way.

Second off, I guess I would like to say opposition on the point that we are creating another special committee, a committee that I believe we have the Health and Human Services Committee in this House that could also address that issue of charitable giving. I think it is a better and more appropriate place for it to be than a special commission.

On those two reasons, I would ask the House to oppose this amendment.

The **SPEAKER**. On the question of the adoption of the George amendment, the gentleman, Mr. George, is recognized for the second time.

Mr. **GEORGE**. Mr. Speaker, I have been standing here for 26 years, and from the kind of money that we spend in this Commonwealth, I would have never thought that \$100,000 would bankrupt a Commonwealth that has \$640 million in the piggy bank.

Now, the gentleman talked about debilitations and those that are suffering, and, Mr. Speaker, I am not going to take him on and challenge his reasoning. What I am going to say is that the other day I saw an ambulance coming next door, and they took out a 1-year-old infant who went into sugar shock. You know, Mr. Speaker, if it is not the right time and the right bill, it will never be the right time and the right bill. If we are going to stand up and say this is not the bill, then we will never find the cures or the reasoning.

I am going to let it up to those, I am simply going to let it up to those, without trying with any malice or forethought to blame the speaker for any underhanded activity, simply to say, it will not bankrupt the Commonwealth; it will not impede the bill; it might be the start of something very good. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Warren County, Mr. Lynch.

Mr. **LYNCH**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I really appreciate the maker of this amendment's attempt to increase charitable giving. I mean, I myself and my family, we give a lot of money every year to charity. But I could find a whole lot better method than spending \$100,000 of taxpayer

money. My recommendation would be, just simply call the Gideons and have them give everybody a Bible and read that Bible and you will have all the reason you will ever want to have to want to give money to charity.

I am going to oppose this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. KENNEY offered the following amendment No. **A2215**:

Amend Title, page 1, lines 1 through 8, by striking out all of said lines and inserting

Designating a portion of U.S. Route 1 in Philadelphia County as the Police Officer Daniel Faulkner Memorial Highway.

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 13 through 20; pages 2 through 18, lines 1 through 30; page 19, lines 1 and 2, by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting

Section 1. Designation of certain highway.

The portion of U.S. Route 1, Roosevelt Boulevard from the border with Bucks County at Poquessing Creek to the 9th Street intersection in the City of Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, is designated and shall be known as the Police Officer Daniel Faulkner Memorial Highway.

Section 2. Erection of appropriate markers.

The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs which:

(1) identify the portion of road designated under section 1 as the Police Officer Daniel Faulkner Memorial Highway; and

(2) state "In memory of police officers killed in the line of duty."

Section 3. Effective date.

This act shall take effect in 60 days.

On the question,  
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of that amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman.

Mr. KENNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment would designate a portion of Route 1 in Northeast Philadelphia the Police Officer Daniel Faulkner Memorial Highway in memory of police officers killed in the line of duty. This dedication will serve as a lasting tribute to not only Officer Daniel Faulkner but to all of our Commonwealth's fallen heroes who lost their lives in the line of duty. Their commitment to the protection of our Commonwealth and its citizens will forever be remembered by allowing this legislation to be passed.

Mr. Speaker, I would ask that the House join with me in supporting this amendment.

**PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY**

Mr. KENNEY. And, Mr. Speaker, if I could ask a question of the Chair.

The SPEAKER. Parliamentary inquiry?

Mr. KENNEY. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I had 105 cosponsors, and since we proceeded to amend this legislation, could the bill be delayed in its signing and reprinting to allow those cosponsors to add their names to the legislation?

The SPEAKER. In response to the gentleman, because the bill is being amended, there would be an opportunity to add additional sponsors. I am going to suggest that, assuming that the amendment is successful and the bill passes, the Chief Clerk will hold the bill here in the hall of the House until tomorrow, and any additional sponsors may be added by sending the appropriate form to the majority leader's office.

Mr. KENNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again I would just ask the House to join me in recognizing our fallen heroes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the question, Mr. Cohen.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Would the gentleman from Philadelphia submit to interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will. You may proceed.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there has been a little bit of public concern expressed to both of us about the effect of this amendment. For the purpose of clarifying the record, this stretch of land from Ninth Street on Roosevelt Boulevard to the Bucks County line, it still will be known as the Roosevelt Boulevard after passage of this amendment, will it not?

Mr. KENNEY. Yes, it will. This would only designate a portion of Roosevelt Boulevard, meaning the signs will memorialize Officer Daniel Faulkner and all officers killed in the line of duty but the road will remain legally the Roosevelt Boulevard.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

That concludes my interrogation.

Mr. COHEN. I support this amendment.
