CHAPTER 3

CAPITAL PROJECTS OVERSIGHT

- Section 301. Short title of chapter.
This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the Capital Projects Oversight Act.
- Section 302. Definitions.
The following words and phrases when used in this chapter shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
"Board." The Capital Projects Oversight Board established in section 303.
- Section 303. Establishment.
The Capital Projects Oversight Board is established in order to provide review and oversight of capital projects. The board shall also assist in providing information relating to ways each specific project benefits the community at large.
- Section 304. Membership.
The board shall consist of nine members. The board shall reflect the racial and ethnic diversity of this Commonwealth. The Governor shall designate one of the appointed members as chairperson of the board. The following shall serve on the board:
 - (1) One member appointed by the President pro tempore of the Senate.
 - (2) One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate.
 - (3) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 - (4) One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives.
 - (5) Five members from across this Commonwealth appointed by the Governor.
- Section 305. Term of office.
The terms of office for appointed board members shall be two years and until their successors have been appointed, but no member shall serve more than six months beyond the expiration of the member's term unless reappointed. In no event shall a member serve more than two terms. Terms of office of members shall expire on the third Tuesday of January of each odd-numbered year. In the case of a vacancy in a position filled by appointment of the Governor, the Governor shall make an appointment for the unexpired portion of the term. In the case of a vacancy in a position filled by appointment of a legislative leader, that legislative leader shall make an appointment for the unexpired portion of the term.
- Section 306. Quorum and meetings.
The board shall meet least twice per year, as well as at the call of the Governor. A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 307. Compensation and expenses.
(a) Compensation.—The members of the board shall serve without compensation. However, members other than the Governor shall be entitled to receive traveling and other reasonable expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties.
(b) Expenses.—The expenses of the board provided for in this section shall be borne by the Executive Office of the Governor.
- Section 308. Publication of projects on Internet.
The board, within 120 days of the final appointment to the initial board, shall electronically publish on the Internet, a list of the projects for which the board has oversight as well as the times and dates of all board meetings.
- Section 309. Annual report.
The board shall, no later than July 1 of each year, prepare a comprehensive annual report detailing its review of each capital project.
- Section 310. Applicability.

This chapter shall only apply to capital projects involving expenditures over \$5,000,000.

CAPITAL PROJECTS OVERSIGHT

Section 301. Short title of chapter.
 This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the Capital Projects Oversight Act.
 Section 302. Definitions.

- (2) One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate.
- (3) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (4) One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives.
- (5) Five members from across this Commonwealth appointed by the Governor.

Section 305. Term of office.

The terms of office for appointed board members shall be two years and until their successors have been appointed, but no member shall serve more than six months beyond the expiration of the member's term unless reappointed. In no event shall a member serve more than two terms. Terms of office of members shall expire on the third Tuesday of January of each odd-numbered year. In the case of a vacancy in a position filled by appointment of the Governor, the Governor shall make an appointment for the unexpired portion of the term. In the case of a vacancy in a position filled by appointment of a legislative leader, that legislative leader shall make an appointment for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 306. Quorum and meetings.

The board shall meet least twice per year, as well as at the call of the Governor. A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 307. Compensation and expenses.

DECISION OF CHAIR RESCINDED

The SPEAKER. Without objection, the Chair rescinds its statement that HB 2494 was agreed to on third consideration.

Mr. **ROHRER** offered the following amendment No. **A1790**:

The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of the Rohrer amendment, Mr. Rohrer.

Mr. ROHRER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the nonpreferreds that we are about to enter into here this morning are obviously, as you have stated already, bills for appropriations that require a two-thirds vote. In light of the budgetary problems that we have and a lot of the discussion that was on the floor yesterday relative to where we could reduce spending, the nonpreferreds are a category from a policy perspective, even though all of us would support and have voted for the nonpreferreds in the past, because frankly, most all of them on the list do extremely good things – so that is not the question, and I do not want that to be the question – but from a policy perspective, it just needs to be understood by the members that the reason that these have a two-thirds vote requirement is because they are not a General Fund line item, and as a result, all of these, though they be worthwhile, are not of the same caliber that General Fund line items are, and I know that as many members have already talked, the nonpreferreds are items in which we could reduce a little bit and help us to fund items that are in the main General Fund budget.

The amendment that I have reduces this line item by 5 percent. That is not a whole lot, but when you take and add together the entire category of nonpreferreds, it is a lot. Now, the members should remember as well that a long time ago, '90 I think it was, when we had major problems, it was Governor Casey at that point that eliminated all of them completely. Since that point they have been built back over time. In the past, some years ago, a lot of these almost— We almost failed to get the two-thirds vote out of this House for many of the nonpreferreds.

So this is really more of a policy issue, and it is whether or not the House is wanting to exercise some leadership, perhaps, in saying this is an area that we can do, not eliminate it but reduce by

5 percent, and if that is the case, then I would ask you to vote in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Speaker, that is essentially what this is about.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman, Mr. Birmelin.

Mr. BIRMELIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would echo the sentiments of the previous speaker.

One of the things that we really have to start doing is getting serious about the budget deficit, and we cannot get serious about the budget deficit until we start to cut spending and cut it to the point that it is actually going to save some money and make a difference in this year's budget. This is a way to do it.

I would encourage all of the members to vote for this Rohrer amendment. He will have amendments to all of the other nonpreferreds if we can pass them as we go along, but in the instance that perhaps we do not want to adopt the Rohrer amendment, I am going to be voting “no” against almost all of the nonpreferreds, because essentially most of them are a charitable gift, and I do not think that the State ought to be in that position of handing out charity to these different organizations, picking and choosing who we will decide to give them to.

If you want to be fair to these people, if you want to put them on notice that we are not going to continue to give them these gifts over the years, the Rohrer amendment is probably the fairest and the least painful way to go to help them understand that we are not going to continue what we have been doing over the past years.

So I would encourage you to vote for the Rohrer amendment on this and any other future amendments that are on nonpreferreds. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Roebuck.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to the Rohrer amendment.

Certainly the gentleman makes an argument about the need to control spending in a time of economic downturn, and that is perhaps a legitimate concern, but why do we take that course at the expense of educational institutions? It would seem that rather than reducing spending for education, we ought to in fact be about increasing it, particularly for education, for institutions of higher education, which produce the individuals who go out and create our workforce, who go out and fill those jobs that stimulate the economy of this State. We ought to be about looking at producing the best product we can. Reducing spending in this area does not do that, and it sends exactly the wrong message to young people in this Commonwealth; it sends a wrong message to the business community in this Commonwealth; it sends a wrong message across the board. If we want to reduce spending, there are plenty of areas where we might reduce spending. Higher education is not one of those areas.

This is an ill-conceived proposal that ought to be soundly rejected by the members of this legislature. I would urge all of us to look carefully at this proposal and understand if we do this, then the economic consequences will be longstanding, the harm done to

our higher educational institutions will be longstanding. It is wrong and ought to be rejected.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield, please.

Please. Conference in the center aisle, please.

Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to have us focus on what I call the facts. In this current year, the Governor has already recommended a 3-percent cut relating to Drexel University. The Governor has recommended under his proposal a 5-percent cut. So, Mr. Speaker, if you take the 3 percent in this current year, a 5-percent cut the Governor is recommending for next year, if this amendment should pass, that is another 5 percent, so you are really talking about

13-percent reduction in the investment of Drexel University.

Let us make that a connection to the economy. Governor Ridge and Governor Schweiker talk about the brain drain; they talk about the aspect of us losing people and not staying in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Well, you are talking about a 3-percent cut in the current year, a 5-percent cut with Governor Schweiker, and a 5-percent cut under the Rohrer amendment. There is a direct connection to the bottom line, which is the tuition cost. If you are going to begin to talk about investment in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and drawing people here, that just will not work. What I am saying to you, Mr. Speaker, if you begin to look at what this Commonwealth has asked Drexel University to do by forming the alliance with a medical school, Hahnemann Medical School, in terms of what we need to do from an investment standpoint, this is a counterproductive decision.

So I am saying to you, think about this before you vote: 3 percent this year in budgetary reserves; 5 percent by Governor Schweiker, recommended in February; and this is another 5 percent. That is a 13-percent reduction. Now, I am not saying that it does not need to be changed in the way we deliver education and what kind of investments, but just think about the reduction that we are making and the direct connection it has to our economy, to the people who come to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to the students who may decide to stay or not stay. Drexel University provides, provides the ability to draw people to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Is this the kind of message that we want to send? I would hope the answer would be no and we would vote "no" on the Rohrer amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Ross; waives off.

Mr. ARGALL. "State-aided" is the official term that is used.
 I wanted to be sure I got it exactly right.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Could you enlighten the House about the
 process that is used to determine which universities receive
 State aid? I have been a supporter of the brain gain initiative that
 was in last year's budget. We have many fine universities all
 across Pennsylvania. I come from the Lehigh Valley where we
 have Lehigh University, Lafayette College, DeSales University.
 What is the process that is used to select a university like Drexel
 but not other universities across Pennsylvania?

Mr. ARGALL. I suspect, in order to give you an accurate
 answer, I would need to do a few weeks of historical research.
 These are not decisions that were made in the last few days or few
 weeks. These are decisions, some of which were made, perhaps
 any member of this House, the Speaker included, before they were
 elected.

The SPEAKER. I am sorry?
 Mr. SAMUELSON. Is there an opportunity during the
 springtime for individual members of this House to have input into
 this process to decide which universities across Pennsylvania
 qualify for State aid? I am not talking about the public universities.
 I am talking about private universities that receive State aid.

Mr. ARGALL. These are all, if my memory once again serves
 me correctly, a result of statutory decisions made by the House, the
 Senate, and the Governor.

Mr. SAMUELSON. And we are making those decisions today?
 Mr. ARGALL. No. We are making budgetary decisions today.

We are not amending those laws in particular—
 Mr. SAMUELSON. Okay.
 Mr. ARGALL. —as to what category the Penn States, the Pitts,
 the Drexels fall into.

The **SPEAKER**. This bill originally was marked over and then put back on the voting schedule.

On the question of the adoption of the Rohrer amendment, the gentleman is recognized.

Mr. **ROHRER**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is the same as last time. I have, and for the benefit of the House members, I am not going to continue to—I will pull amendments that I have. However, I wanted to make sure that the House had the opportunity to exercise some will relative to policy.

The last question that was directed to the Appropriations Committee chairman was on the issue of, how do we come about funding private institutions and others when, frankly, there are a lot of institutions across the State that would like to have funding, and I know the question was answered. I think, to possibly clarify it,

I am thinking that the vote that we are having right now is the only vote. There is no other statute or law governing why we are funding these institutions other than this vote here, I believe. I am kind of looking at our Appropriations chairman to kind of confirm.

The **SPEAKER**. Mr. Rohrer, if I may, from a historical purpose—

Mr. **ROHRER**. Okay. Could you help?

The **SPEAKER**. —agree with you that a State-aided institution comes about each year as you pass the bill to aid them. I really think it is that simple. It is for State-aided.

Mr. **ROHRER**. Okay. All right. So that would clarify that.

So I just want members to know that the vote that we are making now is the vote, the only vote that governs who gets funding and who does not get funding. Therefore, that is what we are doing today, and I am just putting this out here as a matter of policy so that members have the opportunity to say that we either should or we should not, or understanding that it is not a General Fund line item, that in fact we have every right and policy perspective to reduce some spending that is going here, understanding that all of us can stand up and make a very, very good case for all of these. I can to the best of anybody because I understand the validity of all of these that we have funded before. That is not the issue. This is an issue of dollars and cents and understanding that this is not a General Fund line item.

So with that just being said, I am not going to say anything more than that. This is our opportunity, and if we as a group decide

that it is not an issue, then fine, and if we do, we can begin to make a statement on this important area.

Thanks, Mr. Speaker.

The **SPEAKER**. On the question of the Rohrer amendment, Mr. Wilt, on the amendment.

Mr. **WILT**. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I think it is important that we make an important clarification on exactly what Mr. Rohrer is attempting to do. I think a lot of times we make votes here that are misconstrued, and that is fine. We are all politicians. We have got to deal with perception. But the fact of the matter is that the private colleges in Pennsylvania are a distinct part of the fabric of the higher ed network within Pennsylvania, and for us to touch some on the forehead with this magic wand and write big checks to them every year just based on who they are or where they are located or perhaps the programs that they have, I think is somewhat arbitrary, and when we are facing a tough budget year, as we are now, I think we need to look at some of those things that are in fact arbitrary and tighten our belts a little. We had an amendment yesterday that gave us the opportunity to do that across the board in all line items or nearly all of the line items within this budget.

So I applaud Representative Rohrer in what he is attempting to do, and that is to simply make light of the fact that we have some very, very, very tough fiscal decisions that we need to make this year and on into next year, and for us to not exercise some type of restraint in an area such as nonpreferred appropriations where we are not mandated by law or through programs, then we ought to in effect do that.

Now, again, we could also stand up here and I could make a great argument for funding my private college that is not a nonpreferred, the one that I attended. We all have them either in or adjacent to our districts. Some of us have graduated from those colleges who are not on this list.

So the fact of the matter is this is another opportunity that we have had over the last 48 hours to exercise a little fiscal restraint, and I urge the support of the Rohrer amendment. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**. Mr. Ross, Chester County.

Mr. **ROSS**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Following the suggestion of the previous speaker, I am going to try and make a great argument for this particular line item.

Basically, the vast majority of the expenditures in the line item for the University of Pennsylvania go to the veterinary school, and we are unique in two ways in this particular line item. One is that this is the only veterinary school in the State of Pennsylvania, and also, veterinary schools in other States routinely are totally supported by their State’s general expenditures.

It is absolutely essential that we maintain a competitive posture, and a considerable amount of these moneys are going to support scholarships for veterinary students. If they are cut back, and they are already cut back, we will wind up having some veterinary students that will have to potentially discontinue their studies in the middle of the course of their attempts to get degrees. It is going to have a profound effect on the day-to-day operations of this university and this veterinary school.

And so I would strongly urge a “no” vote on the Rohrer amendment, and also, for the good of agriculture in Pennsylvania, make sure that we continue to train veterinarians in the future here in Pennsylvania at a rate that is sufficient to support our agricultural industry. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I do think this is a very excellent debate and discussion, and there are some members who may not have been around as long as some of us and really do not understand how this process works.

But, Mr. Speaker, this is the time to discuss this, and what I would like to say, like the gentleman from Chester, there is a specific connection of the veterinarian school to Pennsylvania's economy, from the agriculture to investment. There is a direct connection of this investment to Federal funds that come into the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. So this investment that we make, there is a connection from a Federal standpoint.

The other aspect to it, Mr. Speaker, is that every private school in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania receives some sort of contribution. If they do not receive it under what is considered nonpreferreds, they do receive it under what you call the institutional grant line item. So anyone who receives a fair student, although they may be a private college, receives some form of State contribution. So people have a way of thinking that these people are treated specially. They are not treated specially. We in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania do also fund private colleges. So let us be clear. We need to stop this issue of pitting one against the other. We need to begin to figure out how do we make strategic investments, and I agree this debate should occur.

The other thing I want to say in closing is, remember, this university is also receiving a cut of \$1.3 million in budgetary reserves, the 5-percent cut from the Governor, and then 5 percent on top of that. You are talking about a set, rounded-off, almost \$7 million, \$7 million – the budgetary reserve, the Governor's cut, and this amendment.

I do not disagree that we should have this debate and discussion about priorities in the way we make investments, but we should not be shortsighted in terms of making investments in people in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Again, I would ask that we be "no" on this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The lady, Ms. Steelman.

Ms. STEELMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As many of you know, I have been critical of the nonpreferred appropriations in the past and, in fact, served on a select committee that recommended stronger oversight of the nonpreferred appropriations and improved mechanisms for determining which nonpreferred appropriations we actually make.

However, I think that the idea of a 5-percent, across-the-board cut without any real consideration of what these institutions are and what services they provide to Pennsylvania is nonsense, and just as we decided yesterday that a 5-percent cut in the entire budget was not something that we wanted to support, I do not

believe that we should support mindless 5-percent cuts to the nonpreferred appropriations.

Secondly, I want to reiterate the fact that the Veterinary Medicine School is the primary institution at the University of Pennsylvania supported by this appropriation from the General Assembly, and agriculture, as I am sure you all remember, is Pennsylvania's first industry, its primary industry. A large part of our agricultural establishment in Pennsylvania is animal agriculture, and whether you are raising rabbits or whether you are raising beef cattle or llamas or ostriches, you cannot do it without the services of a veterinarian sooner or later, and if we are not training veterinarians, if we are not preparing them to work in

Pennsylvania, we will be hampering the growth and development and even the survival of our largest industry.

In addition, following September 11, we have all become more aware of the dangers of bioterrorism, and in this area also, veterinarian training and the skills of veterinarians, who in many cases may be our first line of defense against bioterrorism, need to be considered. We may actually be looking at expanding the training in veterinary schools in the discovery, the understanding, of possible bioterrorism events, and in that case, this is, again, something that we need to be thinking about as an issue of security, not just food security but our own personal security.

For all of these reasons I believe that we should not for a moment consider cutting the appropriation for the University of Pennsylvania. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

The lady from Montgomery County, Mrs. Cohen.

Mrs. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, is it my understanding that Representative Rohrer will withdraw this amendment? Did I hear him say that?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates his head in a negative fashion.

Mrs. COHEN. Okay.

The SPEAKER. I think that means, no, he is not withdrawing it.

Mrs. COHEN. All right. Otherwise, I would have saved the agony of my speaking.

But I want to speak against this particular amendment. Obviously, and everybody knows, Penn is very close to my heart, but continuing with what Representative Ross said, Penn's veterinary school, and that is the school at Penn that receives the bulk of these funds, plays an important worldwide part, aside from being the only vet school in this Commonwealth so critical to us, but I am not sure that everyone knows that the rescue dogs that went to Ground Zero after September 11 were trained by a faculty member from the Penn Vet School. Those dogs that did so much to save lives, to give us information, to recover the lost souls, the emergency services personnel, the innocent Americans that perished on September 11, those dogs were Penn dogs from Penn Vet School. It is the Penn Vet School that is the world leader in aquaculture, so that when our food supply is endangered, what the Penn Veterinary School is doing, it is feeding Pennsylvanians, it is feeding Americans, and it is feeding the world in a safe, healthy environment.

The dental school serves the community. Those students in the dental school are providing much-needed dental care free of charge to the people not only in the West Philadelphia community but in southeast Pennsylvania. So it is important that we continue to serve the public by allowing those students to be trained in the dental school, and without them, Pennsylvanians, people particularly in the southeast region, would not have proper health care.

The medical school is also a recipient of our funds, and I think if we check our newspapers almost on a daily basis, we will see the life-saving cancer research that comes out of the Penn Medical School; we will see the Nobel prize winners that come from Penn Med.

This school is a leader among schools in the dental school, the med school, and particularly, the veterinary school. The law school does not get money from us, so I will not even touch that, but we are talking about life-saving events and saving lives from the vet school, the dental school, the medical school.

It is critical that we defeat the Rohrer amendment and make

sure that our funding is maintained for the University of Pennsylvania.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

The gentleman, Mr. Horsey.

Mr. HORSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the Rohrer amendment.

The University of Pennsylvania is very important, as articulated by the previous speaker. I think Representative Taylor, E. Z. Taylor, has a division of the veterinary school in her county or district. The impact of cutting the University of Penn's funds in this matter to affect the vet school, you know, would be devastating, again, not just to the University of Penn, but they provide a great deal of services to the livestock in the State of Pennsylvania. Again, the number one industry in the State is agriculture, and that includes livestock.

Every State does not have a vet school. Vet schools are at a premium for States to have. It is important to have a vet school, an affordable and a good vet school, and the University of Penn's vet school goes all over the State to service livestock, and that is for people who are farmers in this State. They need to know that.

The other point, Mr. Speaker, is, I see he wants to do a cut in the museum. The museum that the gentleman would like to do a cut in is one of the oldest museums in this country. They have artifacts that are over 100 years old, that have been in the University of Penn's museum for over 100 years that are thousands of years old. For example, they are one of the only museums in this country or they are the number one museum in this country with mummies, with the number of mummies under their care. They have more mummies from Egypt, from South America, than any museum in the entire country. And initially I was going to stand up and interrogate the gentleman to ask him, did he know what he was doing? Did he realize that before, you know, I made my speech, but I decided to leave that alone.

We do not need to do these cuts. If anything, we need to provide additional funds to the vet school, A, because, again, we are an agricultural State with livestock, and this smacks of what we did earlier. We should not be trying to figure out ways of taking money from academic, successful academic institutions. We should be figuring out ways to get additional funds to academic—especially the good ones in this State—good academic institutions. We should be trying to get State dollars to those schools, and we do not get State dollars to those schools by taking them away from some other schools. You be creative. You figure out how to raise funds to get them to those institutions. This idea of taking funds

away to give possibly to others is backwards; it is not the way we should be going.

With that, I am going to have a seat.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And I advise opposition to the Rohrer amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Haluska.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to support the Rohrer amendment.

Basically, the 7 going on 8 years that I have been in the House of Representatives I have not voted for one of these ever, because I think it is a real travesty that these are institutional WAMs (walking-around moneys), and they come back year in and year out and year in and year out. I just have a hard time doling out money to a university like Penn, which, from what I understand,

has a \$2-billion endowment, and here we go. We are going to give them \$40 million to help them out because the veterinarian school is there.

It sort of makes me sick when I think of all the projects that we struggle with—flood control projects, community projects, all those. We cannot even recycle tires in Pennsylvania. We do not know what to do with them because we do not have any money to do that, and I see all these projects over and over and over again, but we can spend a billion dollars today and give it out free gratis. Here is the check; we will write it to you; we will hand you the check; go spend it; we do not care what you do with it; it is your money. Well, it is not your money. It is the people that sent us here, it is their money, and we are giving a billion dollars of it away today and we do not care what these people do with it.

There are a lot of fine institutions across this State. There are a lot of private colleges that do not have to raise tuition like some of the State-related universities, because they tighten their belt and they do not have a lot of waste.

So I believe what the Rohrer amendment does is good. If it were up to me, I would be like Governor Casey, and I would give them a real hit. I would save the taxpayers of Pennsylvania a lot of money, and we would get our budget squared away.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman, Mr. Metcalfe.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand up to support the Rohrer amendment and commend the gentleman for proposing the amendment, to give us a chance to actually debate this issue a little bit.

Now, this year, of course, as we spoke yesterday, we are facing a serious shortfall in revenues coming into the State and trying to find ways that we can deal with that. Certainly these nonpreferreds are one of those ways.

As has been stated by many of the previous speakers, as has been stated by many of the previous speakers, there are a lot of fine higher ed institutions out there, and many of them are not on this higher education WAM list. There are a lot of institutions out there that would be more than happy to accept more funds to help them in promoting their programs.

This is not saying anything against the programs or the institutions that we are debating here or that we are talking about reducing the funding for. There are plenty of fine institutions, and those that are receiving the funds are also very fine institutions and have very good programs to offer.

Our stand here today in support of this amendment is to stand up for the taxpayer. Somebody had mentioned earlier that this was a nonsensical amendment, this was nonsense. I believe that it is nonsense to continue to call upon taxpayers to pay for special interests, and these appropriations here are special interests. Many of you get lobbied for these year in and year out, making sure that not only do they receive what they received in the past but that they will receive more in the future. Well, I stand here before you today as a taxpayer in this Commonwealth, and I stand here representing the taxpayers of my district, saying we have had enough, enough of the redistribution of wealth, enough of taking from one to give to another. Government's place is not to be charitable or benevolent. Government's place is to provide for those constitutional charges that it has been called upon to provide for, and being benevolent is not one of them.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. METCALFE. You are not able to be benevolent with another's resources. As a taxpayer, as representing taxpayers of my district, many taxpayers that I have spoken with, they do not appreciate the fact that the legislature here in Pennsylvania appropriates and reappropriates their moneys. If you have money in your pocket that you would like to give to any of these fine institutions, then give it, but stop giving mine and stop giving the money of the taxpayers from my district to these institutions against their will.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster, Mr. Sturla. Will the gentleman yield for a moment.

Conferences on the floor, please break up. The noise level is entirely too high. Sergeants at Arms, keep the areas behind the rail clear.

Mr. Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there may be reason to call into question the process by which we choose nonpreferred appropriations, and that process, as was pointed out by Representative Steelman, can be reviewed over the course of the year and probably should be, but it seems like as soon as we get done with these, that issue seems to get dropped and we wait until it is time to come to fund these nonpreferred appropriations each year before we start raising these questions again. But I just want to take to task the idea that we should be reducing or defunding higher education institutions in the State of Pennsylvania.

For the past several years I have advocated that we actually look at ways that we can fund those institutions in a better way and in a way that promotes them as an industry in the State of Pennsylvania.

If you think of higher education, we are one of the top States in terms of the number of institutions of higher education in our State compared to other States. This is a non-smokestack industry that has high-paying jobs and attracts people from not only around the United States but around the world. When these people come to attend our institutions of higher education, they do not come here for a 7-day vacation to drop a couple thousand dollars in our State; they come here at the very least for 4 years to often drop as much as \$100,000 in our State.

These institutions we should be embracing and generating and advocating as an economic development tool. We need to better promote these institutions; we need to fund them, whether it is through nonpreferred appropriations or some other mechanism, but we should not be cutting these institutions. If anything, we should be advocating their expansion and giving them more money, because if we ever want to stop brain drain in Pennsylvania, we will need these institutions.

If you look at other States that have had success with attracting high-tech businesses that are on the cutting edge of the economy, look in California at the Silicon Valley. It did not start with some companies moving there and then saying, oh, let us bring some institutions of higher learning here. It started with the institutions of higher learning and businesses understanding that they could tap that as a resource, and thus the Silicon Valley sprung. If you look at the research triangle in North Carolina, it was not because businesses decided they wanted to locate there and institutions of higher learning decided they would follow. It was quite the opposite. The institutions of higher learning were there and

businesses were attracted to that area.

The very worst thing we could do and the most shortsighted thing we could do is to cut funding to these institutions, and for that reason I would hope that we would defeat this amendment and any other amendment that is proposed to cut these institutions from their funding.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Daley.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As Democratic chair of the House Ag Committee, I think it is incumbent upon me to rise to oppose amendment 1807 offered by Mr. Rohrer.

I think many speakers have reasoned why that this amendment is absolutely bad. It is bad not only in the fact that it is here at this time, not taking into consideration the value of any of these institutions, specifically the University of Pennsylvania Veterinarian School. I am sure that any member that wishes to go to the school will make arrangements. Representative Bunt and I will make arrangements so they can see what New Bolton Center does; they can see what the veterinarian school does. It is not one of the best in the country; it is the best in the country.

We do not take Pennsylvania to a third-world nation; we do not take Pennsylvania education institutions simply by the mere fact we want to cut taxes. We all want to cut taxes. We would all like to vote for a 5-percent cut; we would all like to go back during election time and say we will reduce taxes by 5 percent, but that is demagoguery.

We represent Pennsylvania, a major player in the United States, one of the largest States in the Union, one of the strongest, most vital economies in the world, this State. Agriculture is our number one business in Pennsylvania, and you just do not use a meat-ax to kill a fly, and that is what we are doing here. This is not good government. This is bad government at its very worst. This is not grown agrarian politics. This is the worst kind of politics you could ever see simply because we want to eliminate institutions of higher education like the veterinarian school that will have such a tremendous impact.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield.

Please. Conferences on the floor, please break up.

Mr. Daley, I apologize.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am a taxpayer like all of you, and we want our children and our grandchildren to be able to go to the very best and the very finest. We do not want to go to a third-world country in Pennsylvania. Our education system is renowned throughout the world. We have Nobel laureates at the veterinarian school in the University of Pennsylvania. We have Nobel laureates in all of our institutions.

These kinds of amendments are good for the front page of the paper, but it is bad government; it is bad politics; it is bad public policy. Vote "no."

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Roebuck.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to urge that my colleagues oppose the Rohrer amendment.

The issue is very simple, Mr. Speaker. The University of Pennsylvania Veterinary School is in my legislative district, and it is the only veterinary school in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The moneys we appropriate allow that veterinary school to give a greater preference to students from Pennsylvania who want to study veterinary medicine. If we reduce this funding, we make it far more difficult for those students to achieve an

education in veterinary medicine. The Rohrer proposal is in reality shortsighted and it does serious harm to students in Pennsylvania who want to study veterinary medicine.

I urge that we reject this amendment. I urge that we do in fact vote the moneys proposed to the veterinary school at the University of Pennsylvania. It is good policy; it is good for the Commonwealth; it is good for the agricultural industry in this State, and I urge that we do in fact reject the amendment and vote the appropriation.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. Samuelson.

Conferences on the floor, please; please.

Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have nothing against the University of Pennsylvania. A couple of months ago, after my niece's baptism, we had lunch at the Holiday Inn there at the corner of 4th and Arch Streets in Philadelphia, and on that corner on the outside of the Holiday Inn, there is a plaque which states that that is the exact spot where Benjamin Franklin founded the University of Pennsylvania back in the 1750s – Benjamin Franklin, a former member of this House, a former Speaker of this House.

The University of Pennsylvania is an outstanding institution with a worldwide reputation, and its veterinary school also has an outstanding reputation. I believe we have fine universities all across Pennsylvania, and I believe this discussion this morning, this debate we are having, shows that we have many questions as a legislature about the process that is used in determining nonpreferred appropriations – which private institutions qualify for State funding, which do not; what input do we have as a House of Representatives? We have heard that there is underlying statute that controls the nonpreferred appropriations. We have also heard that there is no underlying statute, that the decision we make on the nonpreferred appropriations is being made this morning as we vote on HB 2495 and the other bills.

I believe that we as a House need more information on this whole process. What is the history of the nonpreferred appropriations over the last 20 or 30 years? What is the history of the reduction in the nonpreferred appropriations that Governor Casey made a decade ago when the State was facing a very tight budget? What is the process that is used to determine

which institutions get aid and which institutions do not? And also each of us has to consider how the nonpreferred appropriations fit into this State budget where we are facing tremendous fiscal challenges.

MOTION TO TABLE

Mr. SAMUELSON. For these reasons and so that we can collect more information on all of the nonpreferreds, at this time I would like to make a motion. My motion would be that we table consideration of HB 2495, together with its amendments, until a date certain, next week, next Tuesday, May 7, which would give us the next 6 days to gather information as individual legislators. It would also give our Appropriations chairmen on the majority side and the minority side the chance to also collect that information about the history of the nonpreferreds and how they fit into the fiscal challenges that we face in this State budget. I so move.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman moves that the bill presently before the House, together with its amendments, be tabled until May 7, until the session day of May 7.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. This is not debatable except by the leaders.

Mr. Argall.

Mr. ARGALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would ask for a “no” vote.

I believe that each member with an interest in some of these issues and looking at some of these nonpreferreds, I notice that at least one of the enabling statutes dates back to the 1860s. If you want to do some research, some of these things you are going to have to do on your own rather than rely on your chairmen to do the research for you.

This also could very easily be not the last time that we see these bills. This is the first stage or perhaps the second stage of the appropriations, the budgeting process. It is very likely that we may see some of these bills again between now and June 30.

So I would ask for a “no” vote.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I, too, would ask for a “no” vote.

I would say to the gentleman that this particular institution did come before the House Appropriations Committee; they did make a presentation before that committee. So when the gentleman raises the question about accountability, we did question this organization about how they were using that money. I think that was a fair and open process. It was done by Democrats and Republicans alike, and I would ask that there be a “no” on tabling this particular bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The SPEAKER. On that question, the gentleman, Mr. Schuler. Mr. SCHULER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

An inquiry has been made as to how these appropriations came about, and I would like to make reference to the gentleman over here, Representative Samuelson. He made reference to the fact that Ben Franklin was Speaker of the House of Representatives, as he was. I suspect there are some people in this House that may have remembered Ben, but—

The SPEAKER. He was in my second term.

Mr. SCHULER. I was waiting for that comment, sir.

The fact remains that when Ben was the Speaker of the House, it was through his influence that this went into the budget for the University of Pennsylvania. So you do not have to go back and do too much research on that.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Rohrer, is recognized for the second time, which is permitted under the rules.

Mr. ROHRER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just a couple of comments here as we are about to vote on this. I think it is clear to everybody by all that has been discussed on the

floor on this amendment to understand that as we approach this whole issue of nonpreferreds, it does not make any difference which one will come before us. Everybody can stand up – well, not everybody – somebody will be able to stand up and make an absolute, wonderful case for why every one of them should be supported, probably increased in their funding. That is the point of what I was trying to make at the beginning; that is the issue with the nonpreferreds. They are here because at some point in time somebody founded that they were appropriate to fund, and they are staying funded because of that whole issue.

And again, I have no malice against the University of Pennsylvania. I am from Berks County, and we are very concerned about agriculture. This has no issue, this has nothing to do with support of the veterinarian practice or anything; that is not the point. The issue is the nonpreferreds are there because they are not a General Fund line item, and I do put forward that if we are unable to bring ourselves as a House to reduce but 5 percent more issues in the interest of trying to hold off the raising of taxes, then I would say we are not going to cut spending anywhere. To me, this is just a small step forward of a matter of policy saying that let us do a little something anyways in an area that makes sense to do it. That is all this is for.

The discussion, I think, has been profitable and has been good, but we have an opportunity to give a statement on this, and that is what this is intended to do.

Mr. **GEORGE** offered the following amendment No. **A1963**:

Amend Bill, page 3, by inserting between lines 19 and 20

Section 4. (a) The appropriation set forth in section 1(a)(2) of this act is conditioned upon the University of Pennsylvania agreeing in writing to make a good faith effort to ensure that at least 5% of its total medical school admissions are allotted to those who agree to practice for at least five years following graduation, serving in an appropriate health professional shortage area or a medically underserved area. The agreement must be submitted to the Secretary of Education.

(b) If the University of Pennsylvania acts in good faith in implementing an alternative method to ensure that their graduating doctors serve in an appropriate health professional shortage area or in a medically underserved area in this Commonwealth that is designed to achieve equivalent or more effective results than the requirements of subsection (a), the institution may utilize these methods to meet the condition of subsection (a).

(c) The University of Pennsylvania shall report on its effort, its success and/or challenges, and its recommendations on how the Commonwealth, its medical schools and other relevant organizations can jointly work together to better achieve the goal of providing quality medical care to the medically underserved population within this Commonwealth. This report may be included with other information submitted pursuant to this appropriation.

The SPEAKER. Mr. George, do you desire recognition?
Mr. GEORGE. If I may, sir.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is recognized, of course.

Mr. GEORGE. Thank you, sir.

Mr. Speaker, the matter which I wish to address at this time is one that I believe the vast majority of us who are here and wish to be responsible for those they serve will be in agreement.

Just a month ago the majority leader and the minority leader did a fine job along with the members that tried to do their very best to keep doctors in Pennsylvania because of the malpractice threat. I, even though 20-some years ago amendments were passed by this legislature to do what we should have been doing right along, I have decided to give these institutions the better of the doubt in that they say, well, you know, we have doctors in the rural area, you know, and we do do that, and I say to them, that is wonderful; all we are asking you to do is to put 10 doctors in Pennsylvania out of 200. Now, they will say to me, well, you know, they automatically – if a kid is born in Altoona and raised in Altoona, he wants to go back to Altoona as a doctor, and that is fine.

I think we should be assured, because, Mr. Speaker, areas of medical deprivation are not just one county; it is 56, and it is Adams, and it is Allegheny, and it is Armstrong, and it is Beaver, and it is Bedford, and it is Berks, and it is Bucks, and it is Butler, in Cambria and Cameron, and the list goes on. I sent you a letter. You know your county is evidently on here, and it is the bigger areas, those cities we are proud of – Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, as to the Scranton area, Erie – our first, second, and third and fourth largest cities, and it goes on to the smallest, which would be Clearfield or Huntingdon or Jefferson and Lackawanna and Lancaster and Lawrence, and the list goes on.

The amendment does not say they have to do anything except show us where you are putting 5 percent of your enrollment in the areas of medical deprivation or medically underserved. We are not telling them they are going to lose their money. We are saying, give this General Assembly— And you have just heard, Mr. Speaker, about a half hour of people that think that these institutions should not be getting money and some of them have been talking about they should get less money. They are already getting less money, Mr. Speaker. We should not do any worse than what we are doing, but let us let them show us, who stick up for them, that we can go home and say to our people, maybe something has to be done or maybe it does not. If something was being done all along, why, Mr. Speaker, would the biggest city in Pennsylvania have medical deprivation or Pittsburgh with all these universities and schools of learning?

Mr. Speaker, I could go on, and I will not. I think you have got the drift of what we are trying to do. They can choose any method they wish. They can show where they are already getting that. They can create a program. They can convince or induce. Whatever the meaning is, they can do this, and it does not hurt. We are just asking that they come forward, that they show this General Assembly next year that they have in fact given us 5 or 10 of their 200 students or 5 of their 100 students or whatever the case may be. It is not too much to ask, and I think the people would ask what we are asking here.

I would ask that we not forget that the doctors are threatening to leave. You know, if they agree to come into Pennsylvania and to serve 5 years in Pennsylvania, then they should not be so quick to want to leave. If we are helping them in some way to get their education, I think we are reasonable to expect that they are going to help us by settling in these counties that need their help so desperately, and it is getting worse, and I ask that we accept this amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. Tulli.

Mr. TULLI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I applaud Representative George's aim in getting more physicians to underserved areas, and I think many of us in this hall are working toward that. However, requiring a school to recruit students and have those students sign a guarantee of some sort that they will serve in those underserved areas is unrealistic.

The physicians are in a marketplace where they are free to move about and take jobs where they may, and I think the universities of Pennsylvania would join Representative George and myself and others in coming up with plans to make it more attractive to serve in those underserved areas, and I think we all need to work toward that goal. However, you must remember that medical students are not joining the Army when they go to medical school in Pennsylvania. They are not signing up to serve in certain areas as we would dictate. There are those medical students who indeed take Army and Navy and Air Force help in going through medical school and then agree to serve while they are in the Army, Navy, and Air Force. However, the bulk of our medical students do not sign up for military service when they come to Pennsylvania to medical school. So I think we all need to work on recruitment efforts and making it more attractive to serve in our cities and rural areas, and we shall do that, but requiring this kind of recruitment, I believe, goes beyond the need.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the maker of the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may begin.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

To the Representative, have you looked at this issue within the context of the Pennsylvania health-care practitioners loan repayment program?

Mr. GEORGE. Yes; I am aware of it, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. THOMAS. Because, Mr. Speaker, if I am not mistaken, that program, which was established as a part of the Children's Health Insurance Program, was specifically designed to encourage practitioners to put in at least 3 years in underserved areas of both rural and urban Pennsylvania, and if I am not mistaken, the latest data seems to indicate that it has almost reversed the flight of practitioners from Pennsylvania in that it has enhanced the availability of especially family practitioners in parts of Pennsylvania that did not have access to family practitioners prior to the implementation of this act, and there is a financial incentive associated with it. So my last question—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Thomas, are you interrogating or debating the amendment at this point?

Mr. THOMAS. Well, I am interrogating, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to shed some light on the speaker's answer, and so my final question is, if you have looked at this law within the context of your particular interests, my question is, what impact, if any, has it had, and is there a way of enhancing it so that it can have greater impact?

Mr. GEORGE. Mr. Speaker, I believe the way to enhance in Philadelphia, to enhance that matter, if you will look at the list, our City of Brotherly Love unfortunately has medical deprivation and areas that are medically underserved. The same as the gentleman from Dauphin County; if he will look, he will see that his county is underserved. I did not fabricate this list; it is provided by the

Department of Health. I was astounded to find out that the great big city that we all love is medically deprived. But again, it does not matter whether it is Jefferson County or Philadelphia County.

Now, the previous speaker, if I can answer, he said that we are charging; we are forcing. That is not what this amendment does. It tells them that in any way you can get to that figure, because most of them say we are there already. If they are there already, they have to do nothing. We do not recruit; we do not force. We are not doing like Jefferson College where there is a Federal program where they have to go into the rural areas to serve a 5-year program. It is not like the V-8 or the V-12 Program in the service where you have to stay in the service 5 years. If they are already going in, if you have 1,000 students out of the combination of these schools and 5 percent of them, 5 percent of them, 50 students, is that too much to ask for the millions of dollars that we are putting in to also educate people from out of the State, kids that are from out of the State? Then why cannot we, if the argument is true that we are spending a lot of money we should not, because nothing is more important than educating our youth in any field whatsoever so they can benefit our community.

The gentleman, Mr. Tulli, said we are forcing them. We are not forcing them. This is an alternative program. If they are already meeting that 5 percent, they need not do anything. Just come to the General Assembly and provide a letter to the gentleman, the majority leader, and say, we have met that request that you have just put into law; we have furnished 22 students in the State of Pennsylvania in one of these counties, and they have a lot to pick from, Mr. Speaker. Fifty-six out of the 67 counties meet that obligation or meet that unfortunate situation where they are medically deprived and medically depressed. All right?

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Horsey. Let us not beat a dead horse to death.

Mr. HORSEY. I will not, Mr. Speaker, and I got the joke, to beat a dead horse.

I am going to oppose the amendment because it is not needed. The University of Pennsylvania, first of all, they are the largest employer in the five-county area of Philadelphia. They are the single largest employer in the five-county area surrounding Philadelphia. They have one of the number one if not the number one hospital in Philadelphia. Most of their medical students go to that hospital. I do not understand what the maker of the amendment is trying to do.

The other point is, and this may be off the beaten track, they have a vet school, and they had the visions of that vet school all over this State. They service farmers. If we worked well, that is another issue, but if we were to cut, for example, 5 or 10 percent off of the vet school, that means less farmers that will be served in the State of Pennsylvania. If we are to implement this type of— It is not necessary, and with that I am going to sit down, Mr. Speaker. Thank you.

I would like either the maker of the bill, the Appropriations chair, or even perhaps the majority leader to stand for brief interrogation.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Argall, will stand for interrogation. The gentleman will yield.

The conference at the majority leader's desk, please. Mr. Argall is under interrogation.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I wanted to follow up on some of the questions raised by the gentleman from Northampton County, and I will ask him about this amendment particularly, but I think they apply to all the 28 or 30 nonpreferreds we will be considering today generally, and that is, no doubt that the University of Pennsylvania is a great hospital and perhaps deserves the \$40 million we are about to give them, as Drexel deserved the \$6 million we just voted for them and Hahnemann might deserve the \$12 million we are about to give them. But the question I have never really had answered in my years up here is, how do we arrive at these figures? So, Mr. Speaker, I guess my question to the Appropriations chair, if he can answer it, is, how was this \$40-million figure arrived at for the University of Pennsylvania?

Mr. ARGALL. I will repeat what I said earlier.

Mr. VITALI. No, you do not need to do that; you do not need to do that. Let me ask another question then, because I did hear that answer. If the gentleman cannot answer that question—

Mr. ARGALL. I did answer it.

Mr. VITALI. Oh, please do then. I apologize.

The SPEAKER. No; he said he did answer it.

Mr. VITALI. I apologize.

Mr. ARGALL. You look at the numbers year by year. We stay at a certain level. Representative Evans was correct; these are a matter of public hearings by the Appropriations Committee. Some years they get increases, some years they get decreases, depending on the will of this House. Right now, they have all been cut. There are suggestions that they be cut further. This is, of course, the first or second stage; this is not the final vote that members will be having on these, and currently, these numbers are still under negotiation. These are our best guesses as of today, but they could easily be different between now and June 30.

Mr. VITALI. With regard to Penn, was the criteria a flat percent increase from last year? Is that what we are doing here?

Mr. ARGALL. A flat percentage decrease from last year.

Mr. VITALI. A flat percentage decrease. And what was that?

Mr. ARGALL. 5 percent, I believe. Let me verify that. Yes.

Mr. VITALI. The institutions – now, we have hospitals; we have colleges; we have museums – what determines who is in that mix? Are they the same entities from year to year, or are more added and some deleted each year? How is it determined who is in the mix?

Mr. ARGALL. As far as which institutions receive nonpreferred appropriations?

Mr. VITALI. Correct.

Mr. ARGALL. 203 members of the House, 50 Senators, and the Governor of the Commonwealth.

Mr. VITALI. Well, that answer, let me follow up on that answer, because I do not feel, for example, this member was an

active participant in that process, and I would suspect many rank-and-file members were not. But I count 28. Is my count correct for this year, roughly?

Mr. ARGALL. If you are counting the ones on the calendar, we will assume that your count is correct.

Mr. VITALI. Right. Were they the same 28 as last year or were more added, more deleted?

Mr. ARGALL. I believe that they are the same as last year.

The SPEAKER. Gentlemen, the question before the House is not a history lesson in all nonpreferreds. We have one matter before us right now, and that is the final passage on one nonpreferred.

Mr. VITALI. I understand that, Mr. Speaker, but we are on the threshold of voting on 30 and—

The SPEAKER. We are on the threshold of voting on one nonpreferred bill.

So I would like to submit remarks for the record recognizing those award winners this morning.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. FLICK submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Keystone State Games Award Recipients**Kelly Cup Award**

Eric Bomberger, 38, won gold medals in both the 1M and 3M boards in the Diving open men's division. He scored a perfect "10" for a full twisting one and a half off the 3M board. Eric won both events by a 75-85 point margin. He has won 17 gold medals from 1990-2001 in the Keystone State Games open division. He set a personal best record of 535.00 on the one meter board in 1995; and 1998 1st on 1M board. Eric likes to help the athletes who participate in the Games through coaching and encouragement, sharing tips about diving and competing. Eric is a West Shore School District Health and Physical Education teacher and head diving coach. In 5 years as head coach he has coached over 50 divers, including 2000 Mid-Penn boys champ and reigning

district 3 girls champ and 9th place at PIAA (Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association).

Athletic Award of Honor, Allegheny Region

Kali Byers, 17, won a silver medal in the Softball 18&U division. Kali, whose team went undefeated in pool play, hit .412, scored 4 runs, and batted in 7. She pitched against and defeated the gold medal team in pool play 3-1 in a nine-inning game. Kali was named Outstanding Athlete in Softball. In high school, where she pitches and plays third base, Kali was named All-County for three years and made All-State honorable mention. Kali has also earned letters and honors in basketball and soccer. She is a member of the National Honor Society, Spanish Honor Society, Student Council, and Who's Who Among American High School Students. Kali is ranked 16 of 142 students in her class. Kali has signed an NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) Division 1 letter-of-intent to play softball at Robert Morris University.

Athletic Award of Honor, Blue Mountain Region

Matthew Lambach, 16, a junior at Eastern Lebanon County High School, was the gold medalist in the schoolboy 138# class with a :41 fall in the title match. He went 4-0 in the division of 10 wrestlers and defeated previous Keystone State Games medalists. Matthew was named Outstanding Athlete in Wrestling. As a freshman in 2000 Matthew was a PIAA Section II champ and District 3 5th place at 125#. As a sophomore in 2001 at 135# he was 2nd in both Section II and District 3 meets. Heading into his junior year he is ranked 9th in the state at 135# for AA. He has also won a significant number of high school titles and awards and has set school records with 30 wins as a freshman and 33 wins as a sophomore. Matthew is an honor roll student and member of the National Honor Society. He carries a weighted honors grade point average of 4.045 and an unweighted cumulative grade point average of 3.75 with a class rank of 22 out of 181 students. In 2001 he made the PA Academic All-State Wrestling team. He has been a student council member, and was elected both sophomore and junior class president. He has been a Junior Achievement participant and in career research has "shadowed" a pediatrician during office and hospital visits. As a sophomore, in addition to wrestling, he lettered in cross country, football, and track. He is a volunteer coach for youth wrestling and football, a peer mediator, and a member of his school's Environthon Team.

Athletic Award of Honor, Capital Region

Emily Hoffman, 17, won the gold medal in Synchronized Swimming team competition, and silver medals in duet and trio competitions. Emily was named Outstanding Athlete in Synchronized Swimming. Emily has competed in the Keystone State Games for eight years and has placed in the top 3 in at least one event in all eight years. She has won the gold medal in team competition twice. In Eastern US Zone Championships, her team has made it to the finals, which indicates a finish in the top ten teams. Emily has made the honor roll every semester of her middle and high school years. At zone competition she was presented second place in the Whiteley Award.

Athletic Award of Honor, Delaware Valley Region

Karen Dierks, 16, won gold medals off the 1M and 3M boards in her first year in the Games. She was named Outstanding Athlete in Diving. In 2001 she placed 5th and in 2000 placed 8th in the PIAA state meets. She also holds school and summer league records. Karen has won or placed at USD regional and zone competitions and is an inspiration to younger athletes in the sport. Karen was student council president last year, and was selected as Student of the Month in '01 and Gym Student of the Month in '00. She has earned a Presidential Academic Achievement Award, helped teach kindergarten as part of a community service class, and has been nominated for Who's Who in American High School Students.

Athletic Award of Honor, Great Lake Region

Geoff Meyer, 17, won a gold medal in Soccer. Geoff's defense was instrumental in limiting the opposing teams to an average of less than one goal per game. Geoff was named Outstanding Male Athlete in Soccer. He was a 2000 selection to the All-metro 2nd team and a member of the Erie Admirals team. On his high school team he was the leading scorer as a freshman and a junior. Geoff was selected Most Valuable Player of the 2000 Labor Day Tournament. Geoff is an honor student with a weighted grade point average of 4.27. He also volunteers as a youth soccer coach.

Athletic Award of Honor, Nittany Region

Jordan Grados, 17, won gold medals in Swimming in the 50 free and 100 fly in the 17-18 male division, and also swam in 100 free and 200 free. In 1999 he won a gold medal in 50 free, silver medal in 100 free, and bronze medal in 100 fly. In 2000 he won the gold medal in 100 free and silver medal in 50 free. In 1999, 2000 and 2001 Jordan was a PIAA district champion and finals participant, winning a state championship in 2001. He was a YMCA district champ for 8 years, YMCA state champ for two years, and YMCA National participant for three years. Jordan traveled to Australia with World Sports Exchange to compete in the New South Wales Short Course Championships, and swam against Ian Thourpe.

Athletic Award of Honor, Philadelphia Region

Jamell Beasley, 16, won a silver medal in Basketball, was the leading scorer in two games, and was named Outstanding Female Athlete. After coming up short of players the night before leaving for the Finals, the coach was given her name, and over the phone at 11:30pm offered her a position on the team. Jamell missed the bus that morning, but caught up on the turnpike and joined the team en route to the Finals. Without practicing with or knowing any of her teammates, the chemistry of the group led to a silver medal. Jamell was a 1st team Pioneer Athletic Conference selection, 1st team all-Pottstown area, and leading scorer on her high school team last season. A two-year starter, she helped her high school team reach the state AAA semi-finals last year, and also played on the AAU team that was a national qualifier. Jamell volunteers with Special Olympics and the YMCA. She is a member of the Student Advisory Council and plays on her school's lacrosse team.

Athletic Award of Honor, Pocono Region

Katie Grant, 17, won a gold medal in the scholastic division of Field Hockey and was also named Field Hockey's outstanding Athlete. As you remember, on March 26 of this year, by a unanimous vote, our House of Representatives adopted HR 493 recognizing April 3 as Kick Butts Day in Pennsylvania.

During the first week of April of this year, more than 1,500 students from Conestoga High School, Valley Forge Middle School, Tredyffrin/Easttown Middle School, and Devon Preparatory School in the Chester County portion of the 157th Legislative District and the Rosemont School in Montgomery County signed petitions addressed to the legislature of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Their petitions said, "Smoking is a problem in our schools and among our friends. We want you to dedicate more state funds to help kids avoid tobacco products."

Steven Berman, one of my young constituents, was the campaign organizer of this Kick Butts Day 2002 initiative as part of his Eagle project. He delivered the petitions to my district office, at which time he persuaded me of his passion and sincerity for this initiative.

I hereby submit the petitions delivered to me by Steven Berman as evidence of his desire and mine to see more State funds dedicated to tobacco prevention and cessation programs for children.

Section 108. The term "occupational disease," as used in this act, shall mean only the following diseases.

* * *

(r) Cancer, resulting in either temporary or permanent total or partial disability or death, after four years or more of service in

firefighting for the benefit or safety of the public, caused by exposure to heat, smoke, fumes or gasses, arising directly out of the employment of any such firefighter.

Section 2. Section 301(c) of the act is amended by adding a paragraph to read:

Section 301. * * *

(c) * * *

(3) The limitations of paragraph (2) shall not apply in the case of cancer in the occupation of firefighter. The employer shall have the burden of proving that the firefighter's occupation was not a major contributing cause of the firefighter's lung carcinoma.

Section 3. Section 307 of the act, amended July 2, 1993 (P.L.190, No.44), is amended to read:

Amend Sec. 2, page 7, line 5, by striking out "2. This act" and inserting

4. The amendment of section 307

Amend Bill, page 7, by inserting between lines 6 and 7

Section 5. The amendment of sections 108 and 301(c) of the act shall be retroactive to January 1, 1989.

The SPEAKER. On the question of the adoption of the amendment, Mr. O'Brien.

Mr. O'BRIEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This adds to the definition of "occupational disease" cancer for the occupation of firefighter.

Unlike many other occupations, firefighters are constantly entering uncontrolled environments. In many instances, firefighters are not aware of the potential toxic and carcinogenic substances that they may be exposed to. In light of the many fires that we have had in this Commonwealth along with the incidents of 9/11 where firefighters have been exposed to unknown toxins, I think this is an important amendment.

Just briefly, there is a list of people. I know that all of our constituents are affected by this who are firefighters.

Very simply, John Furlong in Philadelphia had no risk factors. He died of stomach cancer at 52 years old. He left a wife and two children. He had 25 years on the job.

Michael Janits, no risk factors; died at 46 years of age. He had rectal cancer. He had a wife and two children. He had 5 years on the job.

Richard Dougherty had no risk factors; died at 48 years of age. He had a wife and three kids; no risk factors.

John Plumley, no risk factors; had brain cancer; 58 years of age. He had a wife and kids.

Terry Kelly, no risk factors; esophageal cancer; 57 years old; a wife and four daughters; 30 years on the job.

It goes on and on, Mr. Speaker. The incidence of firefighters contracting cancer on the job is much higher than the average population. I ask for an affirmative vote on the amendment. Thank you.

On final passage, the lady from Philadelphia County, Mrs. Lederer, is recognized.

Mrs. LEDERER. Mr. Speaker, this bill is borne out of necessity because of the change of the divorce rate. The unemployment compensation bill that affects widows, widowers, and children was written in 1915. Since then, our divorce rate has risen to about 50 percent. Presently a widow or widower receives 51 percent of the unemployment compensation allocation and children receive 9 percent. However, children of a previous marriage receive no compensation.

Mr. Nacke— And I would like attention, please.

The SPEAKER. Conferences on the floor, please break up.

Mrs. LEDERER. Mr. Nacke was one of our heroes on Flight 93, right here in our own State. He was killed, along with everyone else on Flight 93. Mr. Nacke's salary was \$180,000 a year. His widow receives all of his compensation, which is \$644 a week, and his children by a previous marriage receive no compensation at all. I think it is time for us to equal the payments of workers' comp and take care of the children of the deceased workers. I ask you for an affirmative vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Eachus. The gentleman is recognized.

Mr. EACHUS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the gentlelady from Philadelphia County.

This is an issue that affects the sons and daughters, the children, of people who die so that their compensation will be passed on effectively to their rightful heirs. In the situation that the lady expressed where the individual is remarried, the children of the first marriage do not get adequate compensation under the 1915 Compensation Act.

Today is a good step forward, and I ask bipartisan support as vice chairman of the Labor Committee.

The SPEAKER. The lady, Mrs. Watson.

Mrs. WATSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of this bill and wish to commend Representative Lederer.

I was first contacted by Stephen Alexander, who is the

brother-in-law of Louis J. Nacke. Mr. Nacke, as Representative Lederer described, was aboard Flight 93 and killed on September 11. That was the first time I realized about the inequity in the law, and when I contacted our House Labor Committee to talk about a bill, lo and behold, Representative Lederer had already conceived and researched the idea. So I commend her, and I would respectfully suggest that somewhere perhaps in the record, too, we honor Louis J. Nacke; that this bill really is done in honor of him, his children, and the other children in Pennsylvania that this will indeed help. Thank you.

Very clearly, the intent of this language is to ensure that the applicant has available to him 7 hours of hearing time within the 100-day limit or the 100-day timeframe to conduct the three meetings. It is not required that the applicant use those 7 hours or that the municipality require any use of those 7 hours. Merely, they must make them available as part of the agendas.

Ms. HARPER. One more, Mr. Speaker.

Thus, Mr. Speaker, the intention of the Senate amendments is that an applicant may not get a deemed approval if they are offered the 7 hours and do not actually need it or use it. Is that correct, Mr. Speaker?
