KEYSTONE STATE GAMES AWARD WINNERS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. The Chair would like to recognize Representative Flick to recognize some special guests that he has.

Mr. FLICK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On behalf of Representative Gaynor Cawley, who serves with me on the Keystone State Games board of directors, we would like to acknowledge the winners of the competition in this year's games, which took place over the summer, and if you will sort of bear with me, my voice is sort of actually being restored to good health, but right now it is a little bit raspy.

The first award winner I would like to recognize is the award winner for the Kelly Cup, and the Kelly Cup Award is the highest award presented by the Commonwealth to an amateur athlete for participation in the Keystone State Summer Games. This award is given to an athlete who excels in their sport in the Keystone State Games and is also an active and positive role model in their community, emulating the true principles of amateur athletics and the spirit of the Keystone State Games, and this year's Kelly Cup Award winner is Mallory Weisen from the Nittany Region. Mallory, if you would stand. Mallory is from Middleburg High School. In the 2003 Keystone State Games, Mallory was the leading scorer for the gold medal team in the scholastic division, and for her achievement she was named the "Outstanding Athlete in Field Hockey." She has participated in the Keystone State Games every year for which she was eligible. Mallory, congratulations.

Other award winners – and this is the Athletic Award of Honor in the Allegheny Region – Dan Torie from North Allegheny High School is recognized. Dan, stand. In the 2003 Keystone State Games, Dan was the only goalie on the scholastic division gold medal team. He played every minute of six games in 2 days. He was the anchor and leader of the team's defense, and he competed in the sport of lacrosse. Congratulations, Dan.

The Athletic Award of Honor winner for the Blue Mountain Region is Marc Brown. Marc attends Conestoga Valley High School. In the 2003 Keystone State Games, Marc was unofficially named the "most valuable player" of the title game as he led his team to the gold medal in the scholastic division. He went 10 for 15 at the plate with a double, triple, and two home runs, one a grand slam. So he has taken after our colleague, Gaynor Cawley, in that regard. Marc, congratulations.

The Athletic Award of Honor in the Blue Mountain Region again is Ashley Wentzel. If Ashley would stand. In the 2003 Keystone State Games, Ashley won the gold medal in the girls 18-year-old singles and silver medal in the girls 18-year-old doubles. She was named "Outstanding Athlete in Tennis." In past Keystone competition she won gold medals in the 16-year-old singles and the 18-year-old doubles. Ashley, congratulations. The Athletic Award of Honor in the Capital Region goes to Janelle Young. Janelle attends Cedar Cliff High School. In the 2003 State Games, Janelle was the overall top female finisher with a time of 19.23 for the 5K – that is 3.1 miles, for those of you who are not familiar with that – and bested her nearest opponent by 18 seconds. She was named the "Outstanding Female Athlete in Cross Country." In past Keystone State Games she was named top female finisher and won the Outstanding Female Athlete in Cross Country Award. Congratulations, Janelle.

In the Delaware Valley Region the Athletic Award of Honor goes to John Kiely, and John was the silver medal winner in the 200 IM (individual medley) and bronze medal winner in the 50 free and 100 freestyle and the 100 butterfly. In past Keystone State Games John has earned at least one medal each year for the past 11 years, and he is the swimming champion. Congratulations, John.

In the Lehigh Valley Region, Steven Mytych. Steve won the initial take-down tournament for his division and won the gold medal in the cadet 121-pound division with three falls and one decision. The division had 10 wrestlers, and in earning the top spot he defeated the PIAA fourth-place finisher from last year. For this accomplishment he was named the "Outstanding Athlete in Wrestling." In past Keystone State Games competitions he won a gold medal at 115 pounds. So, Steven, congratulations.

In the Lehigh Valley Region the Athletic Award of Honor goes to Rigaberto Sargeant, and Rigaberto led his team to the scholastic division in basketball. In past Keystone State Games competition Rigaberto played a key role as backup center on the scholastic division gold medal team in 2002. So the basketball award goes to Rigaberto Sargeant. Congratulations, Rigaberto.

In the Metro Region the Athletic Award of Honor goes to Gina Kearns. Gina, in the 2003 State Games, scored seven goals in three games and had a hat trick – that is three goals, for those of you who do not know that – in two of those games; that is in ice hockey. In all three games she scored the winning goal. She led her team to the gold medal and was named "Outstanding Female Athlete in Ice Hockey." In past Keystone State Games Gina was the leading scorer and led her team to the gold medal. Congratulations, Gina.

In the Nittany Region, Stephanie Kudrick in swimming. At the 2003 State Games, Stephanie, in the 17-18 female division, Stephanie broke the Keystone State Games and pool record in the 100-yard breaststroke. She also took a silver medal in – that is probably not 100 yards, probably 100 meters; my mistake – she also took a silver medal in the 200 IM and a bronze medal in the 50 freestyle. She also entered the 200 freestyle, and in past Keystone State Games competition she set the 100-meter breaststroke Keystone State Games record and has won the gold medal in the 100-meter breaststroke for 3 consecutive years. Congratulations, Stephanie.

In the Pocono Region, Natalie Winters. Natalie averaged 18.5 points, 6.5 assists, and 2.5 steals per game during pool and ratcheted up her game to 28 points and 6 assists in the gold medal victory. Her daughter, Kiki, is a Summer Games participant and a commissioner. Kathy is a graduate of Wyoming Seminary and Sweet Briar College. She has 12 years of coaching experience including Crestwood High School, Wilkes University, and EPYSA State teams for U14 and U12. Kathy has also led Keystone State Games scholastic division soccer teams to gold and silver medals. So the Outstanding Sport Leader Award goes to Kathy Miller. Congratulations, Kathy.

And these are your 2003 Keystone State Games award winners. Can we give them all a round of applause, and we thank them for coming to Harrisburg. I will ask all of their family and friends who are in the gallery to stand also. All right. Thanks for coming.

STATEMENT BY MR. HARHAI

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Harhai.

Mr. HARHAI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to bring up a few statements, if I can make them?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed. Mr. HARHAI. Thank you.

While current law protects Pennsylvanians who buy cars, it is time that we take one step further and include recreational vehicles under the State's Lemon Law.

In light of the September 11 terror attacks, some Pennsylvanians prefer to see our beautiful Commonwealth and our great nation from the road. An RV (recreational vehicle) is becoming a more common mode of transportation. With RVing, there are no flights to catch, no security hassles, no long lines or lost luggage, no hauling heavy bags in and out of costly hotel rooms and airports, and no expensive, unhealthy food. RVs give people the freedom to do what they want, when they want, and on their own terms.

Nearly 7 million households in the United States now own RVs, and those numbers are growing. RVing is a uniquely enjoyable way to travel as a family. In fact, families that frequently vacation in an RV say it fosters an increased sense of togetherness and helps improve family communication.

A 2001 Harris Interactive study confirms that families with two or more children are more likely to consider purchasing an RV in the next few years. Additionally, 93 percent of RV owners agree that strengthening family relationships is important for their pleasure trips.

We have all heard the horror stories from people who think they are getting a great deal on an automobile, only to find out later that they have been duped by a dishonest dealer. Changing the Automobile Lemon Law to include recreational vehicles is a simple way to protect Pennsylvania consumers from inadvertently falling victim to unscrupulous dealers, and I personally had an incident in my district where a person did purchase an RV and drove it, out of a 2-year period, only about 3 months. So that is what prompted me to offer this legislation today.

If anyone would like to sign on to this bill, which is an addition to the Automobile Lemon Law for RVs, it will be over at the desk, and by the end of the day, if you would want to, please feel free.

BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 2042**, **PN 2692**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 34 (Game) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, further providing for wild turkey hunting.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Mr. HALUSKA offered the following amendment No. A4540:

Amend Sec. 1 (Sec. 2705), page 2, line 6, by inserting after "licenses."

Turkey harvest tags issued under this paragraph shall be valid beginning with the second week of the season.

On the question, Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Haluska.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have done a lot of work over the last 6 years with the National Wild Turkey Federation. I went to a lot of their meetings. I actually held a hearing on the license, and Representative Phillips' bill does get us to that point where the Game Commission will be able to issue a second turkey license for those hunters that want to participate and hunt turkeys.

What my amendments does, what this amendment does, basically, it just says, "Turkey harvest tags issued under this paragraph shall be valid beginning with the second week of the season."

Basically, what we are trying to do, and I have talked to a lot of the turkey hunters, so that if this is either in the spring or the fall season, that at least the turkey hunters will not be able to take two turkeys in the very first day or the first week of the season, that they would have to spread their harvest at least into the second week of the season, and I would ask for an affirmative vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Phillips.

Mr. PHILLIPS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Since this House bill was introduced and has been voted out of the Fish and Game Committee, there have been meetings held with the Sportsmen's Federation and the Pennsylvania chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation, with their officers and with their committee people.

And let me read to you a letter which I received that they are supporting this bill, and I will just read part of it:

"The Pennsylvania Chapter – National Wild Turkey Federation will be supporting HB 2042" – and this is the part I want to make clear – "as written and passed in the House Game and Fisheries Committee." They do not want to see any amendments. They do not want to see any changes.

There is an agreement. There is agreement by the Pennsylvania Game Commission; there is agreement by the Federation, the Turkey Federation; and the Pennsylvania Sportsmen's Association. They have looked at it. They went to meetings and they have worked out exactly what they would like to have or like to see as far as this bill is concerned.

And again, I want to go back. They only support as written and as passed, and as far as waiting the second week, it is not their desire to do that. What their desire is, and it is worked out with the Game Commission, that you can only take one turkey in a day, that you cannot shoot both turkeys in one day, and that is an understanding that the Turkey Federation and the Game Commission have.

And after all this work that was done and the meetings we had, we do not want to see any changes in this bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE (MATTHEW E. BAKER) PRESIDING

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Smith.

Mr. B. SMITH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I echo Representative Phillips' comments.

Please vote "no" on this amendment. All amendments are opposed. All of the amendments that will be proposed are opposed by the Wild Turkey Federation and also the Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, and at the same time the committee itself voted overwhelmingly for the bill in its present form.

I oppose this amendment, and I oppose all future amendments. Please vote "no."

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Haluska, for the second time.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, all this does, basically, is says that when the Game Commission draws up the regulations, that they cannot utilize this stamp in the first week of the season, and it gives everybody a chance to get out, you know, and turkey hunt for a week before those people go back and fulfill the second one. We are just putting it in the legislation so that the Game Commission knows that that is the way we want it to go.

It is not a major upheaval in the legislation. I think it is just some good-sense legislation that gives the Game Commission a little bit of direction.

I just want to go back again and say that these meetings that were held and included the federation and the Pennsylvania Sportsmen's, my office, and the Game Commission, that any questions that were asked by the federation were answered, were agreed to, and they have no problems with this bill. That is the way it is written, and I would hope that on any amendments that come before this House, that we would honor their desire of what they would like to see as quoted here, as they mentioned, "as written and passed." They do not want any amendments on it, and I would hope that we would honor their desire at the Turkey Federation, who has put a lot of work into this, and I am asking you to vote "no" on this amendment and all further amendments.

Mr. HALUSKA offered the following amendment No. A4542:

Amend Sec. 1 (Sec. 2709), page 2, by inserting between lines 15 and 16 $\,$

Moneys derived from licenses issued under this paragraph shall be used to implement the management plan for wild turkeys in this Commonwealth.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. On the amendment, Mr. Haluska is recognized.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the National Wild Turkey Federation has worked long and hard to put a turkey management plan together. Back in 1999 this was adopted, and basically, what this amendment does, it says that the moneys that are derived from the sale of a turkey license would be used to implement the plan for the wild turkey management in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

It is pretty simple, straightforward, something that turkey hunters that I have talked to think is a good idea. If you are going to charge people for an extra stamp to hunt turkeys, well, then that money should be used to manage turkeys.

There are a number of goals and objectives in this document that they printed in 1999 and agreed to. Unfortunately, many of the objectives and goals have not been met because of lack of funding. So all I am doing with this amendment is saying that these goals and objectives are agreed to by the National Wild Turkey Federation. They signed this agreement with the Game Commission, and we are just going to try to direct that money to fulfill some of these objectives and goals that the National Wild Turkey Federation, along with the Game Commission, agreed to back in 1999, and I would ask for a favorable vote.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Phillips.

Mr. PHILLIPS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Once again, I oppose amendment 4542.

There is a management plan in place. There is agreement between the federation and the Game Commission what moneys are generated from this new license, which, by the way, does not change anything with the license that is being issued now. It still allows a hunter to harvest one spring gobbler and his choice in the fall turkey season.

Like I said, the management plan is in place. There is agreement as to how the money involved with this license will be spent, and once again, the federation, the federation agrees to everything that is in this bill and how it will be implemented, and I ask for a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Smith.

Mr. B. SMITH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, I ask for a "no" vote on this amendment.

I do happen to already have a copy with me of the management plan for wild turkeys in Pennsylvania. It is an ongoing document. The Pennsylvania federation has already agreed to the language of the bill as written and passed by committee. There is no necessity for this amendment.

I urge members to vote "no."

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Haluska, for the second time.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the reason that this amendment is brought forward is because there are goals and objectives in the management plan for wild turkeys in Pennsylvania that have not been met, and the reason they have not been met is because the Game Commission just has not put the money in to get those goals and objectives met.

So this, basically, gives us a way to funnel the money into the management plan and to meet those goals and objectives, and I would ask for a favorable vote.

On the question, Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Haluska, is recognized.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, what this amendment does is allows them to issue the stamp for the spring turkey season only, which is commonly called spring gobbler season.

Basically, when we had our hearings and I talked to the biologists in the Game Commission and in the National Wild Turkey Federation, the gobblers, unfortunately, are expendable after breeding season and the hens become more valuable. So when we talked about adding an extra tag, they told us that it would make more sense to add it to the spring season than the fall season because, obviously, then those hens come through the fall and they are there for the breeding in the spring, similar to what we do in deer season with the harvest of bucks. For that reason I have offered this amendment.

If we are going to let somebody harvest two birds in our turkey season, it would make more sense to harvest the two birds in the spring season when you are hunting spring gobbler only and the male turkeys and not the females.

So I would ask for a favorable vote.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Phillips.

Mr. PHILLIPS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I ask for a negative vote on this amendment.

I do not think we should be here trying to micromanage the Game Commission. I do not think we should be here contrary to what the Turkey Federation desires.

What we have is an overabundance of turkeys in certain areas of the State. The Game Commission should have the option whether they want to just do spring gobbler season or whether they want to do some in the fall, but that option should be there in the districts, and they know, as does the federation, the Turkey Federation, they know where the turkey population is down and they know where there is an overabundance.

You always have to remember, when you get an overabundance in any kind of game, you can have disease, and we should let that option up to the Pennsylvania State Game Commission and the National Wild Turkey Federation. Let them decide where and when and what season our turkeys should be harvested.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Smith.

Mr. B. SMITH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would again ask members to oppose this amendment.

We have all heard about seasons and bag limits, and the one thing that we as a legislature do not want to do is get into setting seasons and bag limits. That is for those biologists who know more about the wild turkey, spring, fall. Let them set the seasons and bag limits. This is micromanaging.

I urge a "no" vote. We do not want to set seasons and bag limits.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Haluska, for the second time.

Mr. HALUSKA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We are not setting season and bag limits. We are just saying we are issuing a license, and if we issue a license for the spring turkey season, that is the spring turkey season. If we are issuing one for the fall, that is the fall season. So this is basically issuing a license for an additional tag for the spring turkey season.

So I would ask for a favorable vote.

STATEMENTS ON HR 682

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Does the gentleman, Mr. Stern, seek recognition?

Mr. STERN. Mr. Speaker, I think several members wanted to speak on that resolution. You may want to acknowledge several of the members at this time that they could speak on that resolution.

A point of personal privilege.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Geist, is recognized.

Mr. GEIST. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I stand to urge a "yes" vote on that resolution which just passed.

These facilities are very important in my district. We have the Veterans Home and we have the VanZandt Center, and they both serve a mission to serve our veterans, and any reduction in force, any reduction in funding, really hurts our veterans, and I would urge that we continue passing resolutions like this.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The lady from Erie, Ms. Bebko-Jones, is recognized.

Ms. BEBKO-JONES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, first of all, I would like to thank my colleague on the other side of the aisle, Representative Stern, who serves with me on the subcommittee for State facilities in the Committee on Military and Veterans Affairs. I think all of us in this chamber— Mr. Speaker, I cannot hear. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The lady is entirely correct. There is entirely too much noise on the floor of the House. Members will come to order.

Ms. BEBKO-JONES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We heard from the previous speaker regarding his facility in his district, and I think if you all look at your districts, many of you have medical centers; you also have State homes. To even think to cut these medical centers or close our State homes is absolutely outrageous.

I think we all know we are still at war. What do we do with our men and women that in a couple years, they are going to be veterans? We have to remember that all of us here today are here and enjoying the freedoms of our veterans. There is no veteran in this Commonwealth that should be homeless, that should be hungry, and that should be without health care, and I urge my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to support this most important resolution.

In Erie we had two hearings; Senator Specter was there giving us his full support, and as a result of those rallies and hearings, there has been a hold on our facility that I share with my colleague on this side of the aisle, Representative Flo Fabrizio, that right now it is on hold because of the outcry.

So I encourage all of my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to please, please support this resolution.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the lady.

Does Mr. Stern seek recognition?

Mr. STERN. Mr. Speaker, this is a bipartisan resolution. This is one that is very important to the veterans community in Pennsylvania. Every veterans group in Pennsylvania supports this concept. Very soon, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs on a national level, Secretary Anthony Principi, will be making a decision as to whether or not he is going to close or the CARES (Capital Asset Realignment for Enhanced Services) Commission will close several of these units around Pennsylvania. We have 10 veterans hospitals in Pennsylvania, we have 29 outpatient clinics, that are being looked at for reduction or loss of care.

The actual increase in coverage as far as some of these hospitals has increased tremendously over the last 10 years with the veterans community. We have many veterans in Altoona, for example; they have witnessed a 300-percent increase in attendance. My father, as a matter of fact, goes to the veterans hospital in Altoona. The Altoona hospital, the Butler veterans hospital, the Erie hospital and Pittsburgh also are targeted for closure, or not necessarily closure but reduction of services, and our veterans community cannot afford reduction of services at this time in our nation's history.

This resolution sends a very strong message not only to the congressional members of our delegation but also to the President and also to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs that our military community is very important, our veterans community is very important, and we should be providing the coverage of care for our veterans in this Commonwealth through the VA (Veterans Administration) hospital system, and I appreciate the support of my colleagues in adopting this resolution.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentlelady, Mrs. Dailey.

Mrs. DAILEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand and rise in opposition to this bill. I do not believe that there is anyone in this House that has ever worked in a veterans medical center. I have worked as a nurse in a veterans medical center, and I can tell you that I was appalled at the care that was provided to patients in the veterans medical center that I worked in. I believe that that probably permeates the entire system.

I understand that this is a bill about jobs, but I look at it from the perspective of patient care, and I believe that other hospitals within this Commonwealth that could be contracted with could probably provide better care than that which is provided in the veterans medical centers.

APPROPRIATIONS.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY MR. ARGALL

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The House will come to order. We have a very important announcement, and the chairman of the Appropriations Committee, the majority chairman, Representative Argall, is recognized.

Mr. ARGALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the House Appropriations Committee members have recently completed several weeks of hearings on the Governor's proposed budget. I would like to thank all the members of the committee. They put in a lot of time. They were very active participants in our budget hearings and worked in a very bipartisan and cooperative spirit.

Mr. Speaker, today I am pleased to keep this budget process moving along as we introduce the 2004 and 2005 budget bills. Since the Governor's budget address in February, the Appropriations Committee has heard from many of you, Republican members and Democratic members, as we have further investigated various items in the proposed budget, looking at the fundamental priorities as suggested to us by the Governor. And so today I am introducing the Governor's proposed budget with one modification. This bill, HB 2579, will fund the education accountability block grants at \$175 million. This is the amount agreed to by the Governor and this General Assembly as we adopted the budget in December. Now, if the Governor's revenue estimate numbers are proven to be in error, as we suspect, this will certainly provide us the opportunity to provide additional funding for this purpose in May or June, but that choice will be up to you, the members of this House of Representatives.

As a matter of information for the members, according to House rule 19(b), the budget bills which we have moved from the Appropriations Committee, HB 2579 and HBs 2521 to 2530 and HBs 2531 to 2559, must remain revenue neutral. The Appropriations Committee has met and certified that the members' amendments to the budget must include an appropriate decrease when an increase in spending is proposed. So therefore, Mr. Speaker, pursuant to House rules, it is my intent to call for the consideration of HB 2579 and the balance of the budget package when we return to session on Monday, May 10. As a matter of information to all of the members, your amendments to the general bill must be filed by Monday, May 3, at 2 p.m. You will be getting all of this in writing very shortly.

So once again I remind all of you that for all practicality, everything that was in here is now in this piece of legislation, and I look forward to working with all of the members on a process that is open to legislators of both parties, to work together to create a workable budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

INTERROGATION

The SPEAKER pro tempore. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. Samuelson, rise?

Mr. SAMUELSON. Is it possible to interrogate the chair of the Appropriations Committee on the budget process?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair has acceded. Chairman Argall agrees.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I noticed that earlier this week, the Appropriations Committee moved HB 2560, which is also a budget bill, and now today I am hearing there is HB 2579. I have already filed an amendment to HB 2560 to restore funding for Pennsylvania's public libraries. Are you telling us today that HB 2560 will not be moving and instead HB 2579 is now the budget that we would have to amend?

Mr. ARGALL. That is correct.

Mr. SAMUELSON. And I do understand that all of our amendments have to be revenue neutral. Let me ask this question: In the process of amending HB 2579 to reflect a reduction in the accountability grants from the Governor's proposal of \$250 million down to the \$175 million that you mentioned, where did you direct the other \$75 million? Is that other \$75 million still in the budget in a line item or have you—Where has that money been transferred to?

Mr. ARGALL. That money will be, of course, available for the members to otherwise allocate through the amendment process.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Okay. HB 2560, did that have the full \$250 million for education accountability grants and 2579 has the reduced amount?

Mr. ARGALL. No; no. That was also set at \$175 million.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Okay. Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Section 2. Section 4(1) and (3) of the act, amended March 27, 1980 (P.L.53, No.20) and December 3, 1998 (P.L.922, No.114), are amended to read:

Amend Sec. 2 (Sec. 4), page 4, by inserting between lines 11 and 12

(3) The moneys allocated in clause (1) shall be paid over, in the manner provided by law, by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> to the respective cities, boroughs, towns and townships, on the

first days of July and December, 1956, and the first day of April of each subsequent year.

Section 3. Section 5 of the act is amended to read:

Section 5. In order to qualify for its share of the moneys herein provided, each city, borough, town and township, shall-

(1) Furnish evidence, annually, to the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> that its treasurer is bonded in accordance with law;

(2) Submit a report, on forms furnished by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u>, concerning the way or ways the funds provided in section one of this act shall be expended;

(3) Submit a proper report, on forms furnished by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u>, on the fifteenth day of January for the period ending December thirty-first each year, showing the cost of work done pursuant to the funds provided in section four clause (1) of this act;

(4) Establish and maintain a special fund into which the moneys provided in section four clause (1) of this act shall be deposited and into which no other moneys may be deposited or comingled;

(5) Furnish evidence to the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> that a tax to provide funds for road and street purpose is being levied for the year in which the allocation is made.

Section 4. Section 6 of the act, amended August 13, 1963 (P.L.804, No.398), is amended to read:

Section 6. All materials used and work done with moneys herein allocated shall conform to the current specifications of the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> or specifications approved by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u>. All work done on State highways shall be subject to the approval, supervision and control of the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u>.

Section 5. Section 7 of the act, amended May 9, 1957 (P.L.125, No.52), is amended to read:

Section 7. (a) The calculation of mileage shall be determined, annually, as of the first day of January by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> from reports submitted by the municipalities.

(b) The calculations involving population shall be made by the [Department of Highways] <u>department</u>, and shall be based on the latest available official census figures determined on or before the first day of January in the year the money is to be paid to the municipalities. Where the population of any municipality changes by reason of annexation, withdrawal or dissolution, the [Department] <u>department</u> shall not be presumed to have notice of such change until furnished with a statement approved by all affected political subdivisions or with an order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 6. Section 8 of the act is amended to read:

Section 8. The [Department of Highways] <u>department</u> shall make available, to the corporate authorities of the municipalities, copies of the laws with special reference to the pertinent provisions thereof, and regulations relating to the receipt and expenditure of any funds authorized herein.

Amend Sec. 3, page 4, line 12, by striking out "3" and inserting 7

At 12 o'clock noon on Monday, May 10, 2004, the Pennsylvania State Lodge, Fraternal Order of Police, will hold its annual police memorial ceremony in the rear of the Capitol Building adjacent to Soldiers' Grove. It is at this time that the FOP along with the chief law enforcement officer of the United States, Attorney General John Ashcroft, will honor the memory of all law enforcement officers who were killed in the line of duty throughout Pennsylvania.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is with somber heart and mind that I rise today to honor the 635 officers who paid the ultimate sacrifice in 2003. It is today that we recognize these fine men and women for serving our communities and protecting our families. Today, let us remember their lives.

Overbrook Police Officer Anthony Johnson paid the ultimate sacrifice on January 7, 2003. Officer Johnson was coaching a basketball game when a young man began to cause a ruckus and the incident grew out of control. Johnson tried to subdue him, but the man swung at Officer Johnson and then took off running.

Officer Johnson went back to the school to call 911, and then he collapsed. He had a massive heart attack while trying to ensure the safety of the school's children and spectators. He was only 46 years old.

He was a detective for 22 years. His wife is also a police officer.

For those that knew and loved him, he is still missed every day. For those that did not, it is appropriate today to honor Johnson and other fallen heroes.

We all try to do our jobs as best we can, but when a life is given for another, we have to look to phrases that mean much more than "just doing our jobs."

To Mr. Johnson's family, thank you for sharing Officer Johnson with us.

Mr. Speaker, I would urge all of my colleagues to unanimously support this resolution.

STATEMENT BY MR. CLYMER

HISTORICAL TIMELINE OF CAPITOL BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Clymer, who would like to make a statement.

Mr. CLYMER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

We are continuing our historical timeline on the Capitol Building and the construction thereof.

One hundred years ago this week, 200,000 bricks were being laid in the north and south wings and the dome. To date, 352 railcars of granite had been delivered. The ironwork for a large portion of the groin-vaulted ceiling in the main corridor of the east wing was in place. Full-size models for the plasterwork arrived, and staging was being constructed for their use. The terra cotta foundation of the floors and partitions were being set

in the south wing on the first-floor, the entresol, and second-floor levels.

By the end of April 1904, the expanded metal groin-vaulted ceiling in the south main corridor was completed and work was progressing in other areas. The "pasting and folding" rooms in the House and Senate, or today's mailrooms in the basement, were being finished in preparation for receiving steel cases. The terra cotta arches were being placed for the upper floors in the south wing, and a reinforced concrete roof was being laid over the House chamber. Marble wainscoting was being set in the bathrooms on the first floor near the rotunda.

On May 5, 1904, the cornerstone of the new Capitol was laid by then Governor Pennypacker. We will be celebrating the laying of this cornerstone on Wednesday, May 5, 2004. I invite all of you to join us in this ceremonial event beginning at 2 p.m. outside the main entrance of the Capitol.
