Would that guest please rise and be recognized.

She is visiting here at the Capitol for a 3-day event called Capital Days with her Girl Scout troop. She is a 10th grade student at Sharon High School. She is serving, again, as a guest page. Would that guest please rise and be recognized.

**BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION**

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 395, PN 422**, entitled:

An Act prohibiting any municipal pension or retirement system in a city of the first class from denying certain benefits to surviving spouses of firefighters or certain employees upon a subsequent remarriage of the surviving spouse; and making repeals.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Bill was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Could we have a brief description of this bill?

The SPEAKER. The Chair apologizes. I do not see the prime sponsor. I am looking for the gentleman. Would any other member of the Judiciary Committee wish to explain this bill briefly for Mr. Vitali, who is on the committee?

We will just wait for Mr. O'Brien's arrival, Mr. Vitali. The House will be at ease.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Reichley, indicates that he will stand for an interrogation by the gentleman, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. REICHLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will do my best just to fill in for the chairman. I believe this legislation requires that a pension continue to be paid to the spouse of a deceased police officer from a city of the first class. It is limited to members of the police department of the cities of the first class and would continue the pension benefits to a spouse even in situations of remarriage.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Now, why, Mr. Speaker, is this provision limited to the city of Philadelphia only as opposed to the balance of the State?

Mr. REICHLEY. Well, Mr. Speaker, the request was on behalf, I believe, in the situation related to the widow of Officer Faulkner, a police officer killed in the line of duty in the city of Philadelphia. While there are certainly numerous situations in which spouses of fallen police officers in other jurisdictions may be interested in this kind of a benefit, at this time it has been specifically limited to those widows of members of a city of the first class. I am sure if the gentleman is interested in pursuing it for other jurisdictions, he can take that up as the bill moves over to the Senate, but at this time it is just limited to the cities of the first class.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. If I am to understand the gentleman correctly then, this bill was crafted for the benefit of one person? Is that what the gentleman is saying?

Mr. REICHLEY. I beg your pardon; I stand corrected. This is for firefighters in cities of the first class. I am sorry; I could not hear the last question from the gentleman. And I see the chairman is now here, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. VITALI. Perhaps it might be best if I could just restate that question to the maker of the bill, and the question would be, why is this limited to the city of Philadelphia only?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. O'Brien.

Mr. O'BRIEN. This issue is the same legislation that we passed at the end of last legislative session dealing with police officers in a city of the first class. This issue came to my attention because Maureen Faulkner, the wife of the late Danny Faulkner, who was slain in the city of Philadelphia at the hands of Mumia Abu-Jamal, was visited the night that her husband was laid out by another woman whose spouse was killed in the line of duty. She explained to Maureen in the funeral parlor that night that she thought she would never find a relationship again like she had with her husband, and then she found someone. Two years later she found that this guy was a con artist who emptied the bank accounts, ran up the credit cards, separated her and her children from her husband's pension and from the medical benefits that they were so entitled and dependent on.

This is a harsh separation, Mr. Speaker, for individuals who lose their spouses protecting all of us in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is unnecessary; it does not cost us a dime, because each and every one of these families is already calculated into the actuarial studies. It is only when they decide to remarry that we should not say to these individuals, the only way you can hold on to your pension and your medical benefits—

Mr. VITALI. Point of order.

Mr. O'BRIEN. —is if—

Mr. VITALI. Point of order, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. O'BRIEN. —is if you live in sin.

### POINT OF ORDER

Mr. VITALI. Point of order.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will state his point of order.

Mr. VITALI. Mr. Speaker, the gentleman is speaking on the bill now. He is not responsive to my question. The question was, why is it limited to the city of Philadelphia only, not why are we passing this bill generally.

The SPEAKER. Mr. O'Brien.

Mr. O'BRIEN. Because the statutory provisions for the termination of survivor benefits upon remarriage were once a common feature of municipal pension plans.

Mr. VITALI. Mr. Speaker, why is this, if this is meritorious for the city of Philadelphia, why is it not meritorious for the city of Allentown or Scranton or Harrisburg or Pittsburgh? That is my question. Why just the city of Philadelphia here?

Mr. O'BRIEN. Because the other provisions in third-class county codes, officers in boroughs, incorporated towns, townships, and regional police departments, under the Municipal Police Pension Law have been repealed. So this provision is only applicable to the cities of the first class at this time, and that is why we need this exception.

Mr. VITALI. So is the speaker saying that this provision that will be installed in the city of Philadelphia occurs everywhere else in the State—

Mr. O'BRIEN. Yes.

Mr. VITALI. —but Philadelphia right now?

Mr. O'BRIEN. Yes.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. Speaker, the gentleman raises a very good point, and we are thinking about that. Of course it is hindsight, but one of the things we could have done was auctioned off those licenses and provided the additional money that could have been used for education and for a number of other services. We now realize, as the casino operators are coming in and spending anywhere from \$700 million to \$800 million to set up their grandiose program complex, that an auctioning of \$200 million per license would have been very feasible rather than the \$50 million.

So, Mr. Speaker, to answer the gentleman's question, when they begin their negotiations, when the House and Senate begin negotiations with the Governor, perhaps at that time they will find some money that could be used to fulfill the debt that I have incurred by taking the \$5 million from the teacher professional development funds. There is always extra money around, and perhaps they will be able to come up with that \$4.7 million.

Mr. Speaker, we all realize, the gentleman has also asked a question regarding why do we need the money now. Because I think you need to get people in the AG's Office to begin to look at this whole issue. You cannot wait until the gambling is up and running and then hire people to do the crime fighting job necessary. We need to bring people on board as soon as possible, and therefore, this money is very important to the Attorney General's Office to fulfill that mission.

Mr. STURLA. Mr. Speaker, if I could.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would just suggest that if there is money to be found later on, rather than trying to replace money for education later on, that we use that money that we find later on for enforcement purposes if need be for the Attorney General. But right now I see no reason for us to be funding positions that will be patrolling nothing, essentially. I mean, the Attorney General

would be looking at nothing at this point in time because we do not have those things in place.

So I would encourage a "no" vote on this at this point in time. Maybe in future budgets it might be a worthwhile program, but at this point in time, taking money away from teacher preparation and teacher education, I think, is an inappropriate use of these funds. So thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Waters.

Mr. WATERS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to concur with my colleague about not taking the funding away from public education or funding education. I think that the maker of the amendment is well intended as far as maybe there is a problem – maybe – but we know there is a problem with public education and the funding of the schools right now. So I would recommend that we keep the money where we know the money will be well served, and if there is a problem that comes up later on, then maybe we can address that problem when and if the problem does develop. But right now our children are in need for more and more funding. We have too many schools that are having to close down programs. We need more money to go toward public education, not take any money away.

I would support the fact that we do not support this amendment and be a negative vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Grucela, from Northampton.

Mr. GRUCELA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

If I may ask the gentleman a question, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Clymer, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. GRUCELA. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, I, too, agree for the need for the Attorney General to have the money that may be necessary when the programs come into place. My question is, we are taking the money from teacher professional development, and we are taking it from the Department of Education. Would that then, since we still have to have the teacher development, would that cost then be on the school districts? Would the school districts have to pick up the cost of the teacher development program if we are cutting the State aid to them?

Mr. CLYMER. No, not necessarily. The money is not that critical for that teacher training. But in addition, I want to explain that it is also necessary to have this additional \$5 million, because if we do not get it, it will require a layoff of 46 employees of the AG's Office – that is 46 employees – that are involved in such activities as consumer protection, health-care insurance protection, and civil and criminal prosecution. So the \$5 million— And had I had the opportunity to continue my dialogue, I would have mentioned that. So it is not only for the future for the gambling industry that is coming to Pennsylvania, but presently this \$5 million is required. The money for the teacher professional development is not that critical at this time. It is not going to curtail education in any fashion whatsoever. But the \$5 million is truly needed by the Attorney General's Office, and I would ask that you would support this amendment as well.

Mr. GRUCELA. If I may, Mr. Speaker.

During the Appropriations hearings, did the Attorney General's Office request an additional \$5 million? Did they

request more help, and did they say they were going to lay off these 48-some people? Did they during the Appropriations hearings make that request and make that statement?

Mr. CLYMER. Mr. Speaker, I do not know, since I am not on Appropriations and I was not there to hear the Attorney General present his testimony.

Mr. GRUCELA. Is there someone from the Appropriations Committee that could possibly answer that question?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Feese, will answer that question, the gentleman from Lycoming.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I cannot recall the specific testimony of the Attorney General. He clearly indicated that there would be significant layoffs without additional funding. This Governor has chosen to level-fund the Attorney General's Office. As a result, drug investigators will be eliminated, those positions. Individuals who investigate child molestation will be eliminated. Individuals who investigate organized crime will be eliminated. This Governor chose to increase funding for teacher professional development from \$4 million to \$13 million, a 212-percent increase, and all that the gentleman, Mr. Clymer, is suggesting is that we take \$5 million of that \$9 million increase and use it so we do not lay off drug investigators, so we do not lay off organized crime investigators, so we do not lay off investigators who investigate child molestation. Even with the gentleman's amendment, if adopted, teacher professional development will be increased under the Governor's budget by about \$4, \$5 million, even with the gentleman's amendment. So you have your choice. The choice is very simple: Lay off all these individuals who protect us or not.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. Grucela.

Mr. GRUCELA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate that answer.

Again, I concur with the need for the Attorney General. I would just like to see us take this money from someplace else other than the Department of Education. So thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also agree with the need for the Attorney General to have the tools that he needs to investigate and be proactive as this State enters the world of gambling. I do want to point out for the record the irony that is involved in these budget amendments. This line item seeks to add \$5 million to general government operations in the Attorney General's Office. Just yesterday this House of Representatives voted to cut that very line item by a vote of 196 to 2. I was one of the two Representatives that voted against cutting the Attorney General's general government operations. Now, that amendment yesterday was the Godshall amendment, and we were looking for money for regional marketing partnerships and tourist promotion. Well, I would suggest that the enforcement in the Attorney General's Office, with my negative vote yesterday I thought that the funding for the Attorney General was more important than trying to increase the tourist promotion and regional marketing partnerships.

So here we are with a vote pitting Attorney General versus teacher development. Yesterday it was Attorney General versus tourist promotion. The vote was 196 to 2. Unfortunately, that amendment passed, so this very line item that we are seeking to increase now is down a million from where it was when the Governor proposed it in February.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the Appropriations chair?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Feese, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman, Mr. Thomas, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, a question. It is my understanding that part of the \$51 million surplus that we voted on yesterday, a sizable part of that surplus went to the Attorney General's Office to deal with some of those things that you just mentioned were cut, and my question is, are you aware of that?

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, would the gentleman point out the amendment he is referring to?

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, I do not have the amendment in front of me but I am very familiar, because I recall yesterday the conversation centered around the loss of drug task force members and the loss of drug enforcement officers, and also, the reason I remember the amendment is because I was concerned about the witness protection and witness relocation line items of the Attorney General's Office being completely zeroed out.

So I had a concern about the Attorney General's Office, and I supported that amendment yesterday, and it was a part of the surplus. As soon as I am able to identify it, I will.

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, in response to the gentleman, I have just reviewed the 40-plus surplus amendments as quickly as I can. I do not see any surplus amendments addressing the Attorney General's Office. I could have missed one, Mr. Speaker, but right now I do not see a surplus amendment in that regard.

Mr. THOMAS. Well, until your staff is able to do a more thorough review of the surplus amendments that we passed yesterday and until I am able to provide for a more thorough review, can we lay this over, because I think if we did in fact do that yesterday, then it would either lessen if not eliminate the concern that you have raised this morning.

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the gentleman's comments. However, I just looked at the staff. The staff has indicated we have done a thorough review. None of the surplus amendments address this issue.

Mr. THOMAS. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Clymer, do you wish to be recognized?

At this time there appears to be no one left but the minority leader, Mr. DeWeese. Mr. DeWeese.

Mr. DeWEESE. Ed Rendell. Ed Rendell living within his means. Bob Casey living within his means. Jack Wagner living within his means. The Governor and our row officers took the ax to their own budgets. They came in here with lean budgets, and now we are trying to take money from education so that the Republican Attorney General can have a lavish budget. Why cannot the Attorney General live within his means like the Governor's Office, the Auditor General's Office, and the

Treasurer's Office? Democrats are fiscal conservatives. This goes to show my point.

I would ask that this amendment be rejected.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Feese.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the gentleman's comments, and I am sure he will vote for eliminating drug investigators, investigators of child molestation, investigators of organized crime who will be investigating the gaming industry.

Mr. Speaker, I support the gentleman's amendment.

The SPEAKER. Mr. McNaughton.

Mr. McNAUGHTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the minority leader has got to be kidding me. Those comments do not even pass the laugh test in this place. The Governor lives within his means? A 4 1/2-percent increase this year over last year's budget, that is living within your means? Give me a break, Mr. Minority Leader. Come with some factual information that passes the laugh test.

I vote for the gentleman's amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman, Mr. Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it was suggested that if the line item for the Attorney General remained the same, that what the Attorney General would do is choose to eliminate child-molester investigations and rape investigations and heinous-crime investigations throughout the State of Pennsylvania instead of eliminating public relations people in his office or various other things that go on over there that are not priority. I have much more respect for the Attorney General than that, and I believe that given the fact that he would be given a budget, he would live within those means and eliminate those positions that are not those high priorities. Apparently, some of my colleagues do not believe that, and they can vote for this amendment if they do not believe that. But I have more respect for the Attorney General than that and believe that he can live within his means and still protect us appropriately.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman from Lycoming, Mr. Feese.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, possibly the last gentleman had missed that Appropriations Committee hearing – I am not sure – but the Attorney General will be eliminating nonessential positions as well.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

I would like to see, and I hope that many of you will agree, that this is essential that we maintain this project, that we can consider to increase the quality of care establishing protocols and standards for treatment in our nursing homes.

#### CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENT A00503 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The House returns to amendment 503 and notes the presence of Representative Maher, the sponsor of that amendment, and recognizes him for comments on that amendment.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is a very simple amendment, and it is just a shame that it is required at all.

The Governor’s budget decided to, without discussion that I am aware of with parties interested in the issue of life, to add an audit requirement as part of the budget that would affect all funds used either for pro-life activities or other abortion-related activities, that is not just duplicative of what is already in place but seems to have been done with malice aforethought.

This amendment simply returns this budget to be coincident with the agreement that has stood the test of time now for a number of years.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. Vitali, are you seeking recognition?

Mr. VITALI. Yes, Mr. Speaker, to interrogate the maker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Maher, indicates he is willing to stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. I am just not quite sure what this does and how it cuts. Is this a pro-life or a pro-choice amendment?

Mr. MAHER. This is a commonsense amendment that seems to be supported by everyone who has a passionate point of view on any end of that spectrum.

Mr. VITALI. Do you consider the pro-life people have more compassion or the pro-choice— I will withdraw that.

Could you just explain what the thing does. I am really not sure whether this would be something that would please Planned Parenthood versus the Catholic Church. I am just trying to get a sense for where this is going. It tends to be a polarizing issue. I am just wondering what side this is on.

Mr. MAHER. Mr. Speaker, I certainly would not presume to speak for either Planned Parenthood or the Catholic Church. I am a bit puzzled – yes, I guess those in Rome are working on the latter question as we speak – but it is my understanding that

regardless of whether one is pro-life or not, that people understand that the agreement which has been in place for a number of years has worked well, and this unilateral attempt by the Governor's Budget Secretary to upset the applecart seems to have those with passion on every side of that issue concerned, and this simply restores the status quo. It is just that simple, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. VITALI. Okay.

This would delete an audit. Is that it? Your amendment would delete an auditing requirement?

Mr. MAHER. This restores the status quo, which provides for audits to be conducted by the Office of the Budget or by DPW (Department of Public Welfare) in accordance with their existing oversight responsibilities. There are in fact ongoing conversations with the Secretary of Public Welfare to provide a uniformity to some of these efforts so that all those who are subject to audits will be subject to the same standard across the State, which is we do as a matter of course with all sorts of expenditures that happen with DPW.

Now, what this amendment does is simply rolls back audits that would be required of the so-called family service providers and audits that would be required of alternative-to-abortion counselors that would be duplicative of audits which are already in place and could seem to serve no purpose in my mind that would be a bona fide one.

Mr. VITALI. So the budget bill we are voting on, in the absence of your amendment, requires an audit of the alternative-to-abortion groups?

Mr. MAHER. No. The status quo provides that DPW and the Office of Budget in the exercise—

Mr. VITALI. I am talking about this bill; this bill.

Mr. MAHER. The amendment as introduced or the bill as introduced, Mr. Speaker?

Mr. VITALI. My question is, HB 815, and I am trying to untangle or get through what you are saying.

Mr. MAHER. I am not sure where your confusion arises. So if you could help me understand your confusion, I will try to set your mind at ease.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Let us start with what HB 815 does with regard to the auditing of groups. Before we get to what you are undoing, let us get at what it is HB 815 is doing.

Mr. MAHER. Mr. Speaker, with all due respect, we are speaking on the amendment; we are not speaking on HB 815, and I am not sure why this is so complicated.

HB 815 as presented includes a duplicative requirement of new audits that would be on top of what is already undertaken by DPW and the Office of Budget, and it would seem to serve no good purpose. Those who counsel in the family planning, Planned Parenthood area, those that seek to advise about alternatives to abortion and support life across the board recognize that this requirement, which arose unilaterally without a discussion from the Governor's Budget Secretary, without discussion with any of those organizations to my knowledge, that it makes no sense to be expending funds on audits which are duplicative of authority already in place, and this simply restores the status quo and eliminates another mandate for a duplicative, senseless exercise.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, and notes that his 5 minutes have expired.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Ross, from Chester County. The gentleman, Mr. Ross, has been recognized.

Mr. ROSS. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, just for the benefit of the members, it is my understanding that the moneys that we delivered to both sides of this, both programs, are currently being audited anyway, and so therefore, what has been added is a secondary audit which duplicates the audits that previously were being done, and it is very complicated, the language that had been inserted previously. So we are attempting to clarify that both sides get audited but they do not get audited twice, and that is really the intent, as I understand it, of this language.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the lady, Ms. Mundy.

Ms. MUNDY. Mr. Speaker, I think the confusion over the word "audit" needs to be cleared up. It is my understanding that both sides get financial audits but the programmatic audit is only done on the family-planning side and not on the alternatives-to-abortion side; that is my understanding. And frankly, as someone who believes strongly in accountability in all aspects of our State budget, I want to know how folks are spending State tax dollars.

So I support additional audits. I believe everybody should be audited, and if two sides are splitting money down the middle, both sides should have the same kinds of audits. It is absolutely unfair to give a double audit to one side and a single audit to the other if you are going to divide the money down the middle.

So unless someone can explain to me how – and I would be happy to show Mr. Maher what is written in the Democratic analysis of this amendment – unless someone can explain to me how this differs from what is written here, I am going to have to vote "no" in the interest of accountability.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes Mr. Tangretti from Westmoreland County, who had asked to be recognized. Mr. Tangretti.

Mr. TANGRETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am trying to get some information myself, but my understanding is – and we have had this debate before – that when we separated the two issues on women's health services, going back to the Casey days, there was an agreement from both sides dealing with this issue, both with audits and with how the money is spent. And I am not quite sure where the Governor was going with this audit, but it seems to be, and I think Representative Maher is accurate, it is unneeded and unnecessary.

We have auditors in place to provide for the necessary review of all that is done by both sides, and I once again refer you to the arguments that we have had on this floor before relative to the alternative-for-abortion programs that we have. If we are going to have programs that prevent 60,000 to 100,000 abortions since its inception and everybody in this House always says, particularly those from the pro-abortion point of view, that abortions ought to be infrequent and we ought to reduce the number of abortions, why are we fighting this program? If we are preventing that number of abortions per year, why would anybody be opposed to this program? And I think what we have in effect is a process by someone in the Governor's Office, I guess, who wants to put an onerous burden on a program that is preventing abortions. If that is the point, then it makes no sense.

Regardless of where you are as a pro-choice member, a pro-abortion member, you want to prevent abortions. Right?

This is what this program does. Why are we making it difficult for them to do that?

So, Mr. Speaker, I think that the gentleman from Allegheny County's amendment is appropriate, on target. Let us not create a problem that is not there, and I would ask for an affirmative vote on the amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Maher, for a second time.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I actually rise just to respond to the gentlelady's question. She had asked the question, are the providers of services with alternatives to abortion subject to audits? And they are, not just financial but through every sort of scrutiny you can imagine.

And I, as a C.P.A. (certified public accountant) who made a living conducting audits, I am happy to subscribe to your notion that everybody should be audited. I agree with that. But to audit on top of audit on top of audit, all it does is distract providers of services, whatever those services are, from tending to the matters at hand.

We are engaged in conversations, ongoing conversations, with the Secretary of Public Welfare with the objective of providing some clarity, learning from the experience of recent years, so that there could be an evenhanded not just which sort of service but also where you happen to be in the State. It should be the same standard that is held, and it should be easily understood by providers, and the auditors should understand what they are testing and have a consistency that would add efficiency, provide the oversight, but to mandate some new audit that is really not very well defined in addition to what is already present just seems to be a terrible waste of money and time and counterproductive to an agreement which has stood the test of time.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Casorio.

Mr. CASORIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, may I briefly interrogate the maker of the amendment, please?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman indicates he is willing to do so. You may begin.

Mr. CASORIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am reading your amendment from the prepared booklet we have. A question: Your amendment would remove language which would have required an independent audit of these nonprofit agencies. Is that correct or incorrect?

Mr. MAHER. I think that is a fair statement.

Mr. CASORIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the amendment also removes language that would require the Department of Public Welfare to audit any project receiving funding that has not been audited within the previous 5 years? Let me repeat that. The amendment also removes – this is a question – language that would require DPW to audit any project or hospital receiving funding that has not been audited within the previous 5 years?

Mr. MAHER. With all due respect, I am going to need to take a peek at the screen and step away from here to give you an authoritative answer. So if you will bear with me, or maybe we should be at ease for a moment, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The House will be at ease for just a moment.

Mr. MAHER. Mr. Speaker, thank you for the opportunity to ensure that I am giving an accurate response, which is, you are correct.

Mr. CASORIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, on the amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. CASORIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the gentleman indicates what I believe to be true, and I am reading again from the amendment, that the amendment would remove language which would have required an independent audit; also would remove language that would have required an audit for a project or hospital that receives funding that has not been audited within the previous 5 years.

Mr. Speaker, I think we are setting an awfully bad precedent here. I do not see any language in this amendment that talks about a duplicative audit. Mr. Speaker, if we are going to say that we are not going to audit any agency receiving State funds and we are going to delete language that would require an independent audit, we are going down a very slippery slope, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, what those institutions do with that funding certainly has bearing on 12 million residents and the members of this body, and I believe it is well within the realm to ask for simply an independent audit. And to say, Mr. Speaker, that we are not going to do an audit; we are going to withdraw the provision that if you have not been audited within the last 5 years, we are going to withdraw the provision that you be audited. So, Mr. Speaker, within the past 5 years, there may be some mishandling of money; there may be some diversion of money. There may be something going on, Mr. Speaker, that we need to look at the books, and we are saying, no, you have not been audited in the past 5 years; you do not need to begin being audited.

Mr. Speaker, I do not really see this as an abortion or pro-life issue, and again, to suggest that any one of the 203 members here in the House is pro-abortion, I think, Mr. Speaker, is, quite frankly, disingenuous and inflammatory. I do not believe there is a single member in this body that is pro-abortion. Mr. Speaker, I think it comes down to a matter of fiscal responsibility, and to remove the language to require audits simply is wrong and simply sets a bad precedent and, quite frankly, opens the door to many other agencies requesting that their audits be removed as well, Mr. Speaker, and I would ask for a negative vote on the gentleman's amendment from Allegheny County.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the lady, Mrs. True, from Lancaster County.

Mrs. TRUE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just to clarify, since I was one of the folks around that got involved in 1995 in setting up how this program works, there have been numerous audits by the Governor's Office and DPW on the funds that we are discussing today. One of the components in this that has not been mentioned heretofore is that part of this audit process would mean that we have to audit the alternative to abortion to see if by any chance they are providing abortions. That is foolish. I personally believe this is a vindictive amendment and, you know, should not have been made an issue one way or another, but since it has, if we are

going to make it pro-life/pro-choice, then I suggest all the pro-life folks vote “yes.”

I would only point out for some other members, taking \$2 million from career and technical education could severely adversely impact those programs in their legislative districts.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this is not necessarily designed to protect people in my district. The Apprenticeship Program is a partnership which currently exists between the building trades community in Philadelphia County and the school district and a number of other partners. In fact, it is a program that was advanced by the Ridge administration under Secretary Johnny Butler. It has proved to be invaluable in being able to recruit young people who are not bound to go to college but to also give them a trade and turn them into apprentices so that they can become productive members of our community. But the Apprenticeship Program was one that was designed under the Ridge administration, under the aegis of Secretary Johnny Butler, and has been strongly supported by the House and Senate over the last 4 to 5 years, and what this appropriation would do is to continue that within the context of the Philadelphia School District.

I also would like to point out that Mr. Jim Nevels, who is currently the chair of the School Reform Commission that the Ridge-Schweiker administration put in place in Philadelphia, has called upon the building trades community to join in a partnership with the school district to train young people to become apprentices in one or several of the 35 building trades in Philadelphia County.

So this is a program that Mr. James Nevels, chair of the School Reform Commission in Philadelphia County, is advocating for, and it is a program that was originally designed under the Ridge-Schweiker administration.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Is the gentleman, Mr. Thomas, seeking to be recognized on his amendment?

Mr. **THOMAS**. Mr. Speaker?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Mr. Thomas.

Mr. **THOMAS**. Strike the board.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Mr. Thomas?

Mr. **THOMAS**. Yes.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Mr. Thomas, would you cease for a moment, please.

Nothing is in order but the taking of the vote at this point in time.

Mr. **THOMAS**. Yes, but, Mr. Speaker, before the vote is recorded, I want to at least make a point of clarification.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The time to do that, Mr. Thomas, was when I called the amendment up, and I did not see you there. Were you at the microphone before?

Mr. **THOMAS**. Yes. I had my hand up.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. I will take you at your word, sir.

The clerk will strike the board.

The gentleman, Mr. Thomas, is recognized.

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, point of clarification.

This amendment is revenue-neutral, and it only asks— There is a line item in the budget that deals with high school reform. It is a line item that is going to affect all of Pennsylvania, and what this amendment does, it only asks that of the money that is designated for cities of the first class, that that money be used to advocate high school reform where the reform involves high schools of no more than 800 students. Both national and local and statewide studies have indicated that throughout Pennsylvania we have high schools that are overcrowded and too big and that it is better that we can achieve a quality education at the high school level when we have smaller high schools.

And so all my amendment does is basically say that of the money that is going to cities of the first class of this line item, that cities of the first class use this money to bring about high schools that have no more than 800 students, because 800 students seems to be a manageable number. So it is not taking money from anywhere; it is not changing anything that is not already there. There is a line item for high school reform, and this only complements that methodology around high school reform, and I ask my colleagues on both sides to support this amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Is anyone else seeking recognition on this amendment?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The previous speaker said this amendment is not taking money from any other line item. I ask for some clarification. Maybe someone on the Appropriations Committee could help out here. I look at this line item on page 64, and there is \$4.7 million designated for high school reform statewide. This particular amendment is directed to cities of the first class and it takes \$1.175 million. This amendment takes 25 percent of the money for one municipality.

I wonder if anybody on the Appropriations Committee could answer whether or not— That seems to be higher than the percentage of population that that particular municipality has statewide. Is there a breakdown of where the \$4.7 million is supposed to go for high school reform?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair sees that the Appropriations chairman, Mr. Feese, is ready, willing, and able to answer that interrogation.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, in response to the gentleman's question, no, there is not a proposed formula to drive that money that we are aware of. There certainly is not in the budget; there is certainly not in any proposed legislation to date. So therefore, yes, in response to his question, this would designate about 25 percent of the money for Philadelphia, and the remainder of the State could pick over the remnants of three-quarters of the line item.

Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes his birthday pal, Mr. DeWeese.

Mr. DeWEESE. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The last speaker, my good friend, the honorable majority Appropriations chairman, said the rest of the State could pick over the 75 percent. My worthy colleague from the Lehigh Valley who posited the question is implying that

Philadelphia is being given better treatment. Well, I live 300 miles from the Delaware Valley. I am a long way from Philadelphia, but I have been around this building a long time, and I know that there are specific challenges within the school district of the city of Philadelphia that are axiomatic, that we all know about. Philly has got some problems in the schools. Those problems probably supersede some of the rest of our challenges, and once in a while they are going to be given special designation. So the gentleman's question and the gentleman's answer, as dismissive and potentially condescending as they may be, notwithstanding, I think sometimes the Philadelphia School District deserves a transfixing moment here on the floor, and this is one of them.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Feese.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In spite of the gentleman's efforts at rebuttal, the reality of it is, this legislature has been very, very generous to the Philadelphia School District, including \$25 million extra a year for 5 years, which this caucus was supportive of as well as the other side of the aisle. So we have been more than fair, more than generous, and I guess the gentleman from Greene County finds it offensive that we protect our constituents. Maybe he does not want to protect his. I intend to protect mine.

Mr. DeWEESE. Now, now, Mr. Speaker, that is— Well, that is the way it should be around here. We should—

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. DeWeese, you have not been recognized. Are you seeking recognition?

Mr. DeWEESE. Honorable Mr. Speaker, I am seeking recognition.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Well, I am more than happy to grant it to you, but I would appreciate your preserving the decorum of this body.

Thank you very much.

You may begin.

Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker, your adherence for protocol is admirable and my nonchalance was not acceptable. I take that as a proper admonition.

I do want the record to state that the gentleman from the greater Williamsport area and the gentleman from Greene County are always going to focus on our districts. That is the inherent nature of our assignment, the nub of our election effort, but at the same time, he is not going to be parochial, I am sure, as the Appropriations chairman could not be, and I am not going to be parochial. This is just a moment where we disagree.

I think the city of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia School District from time to time have unique problems. It is a city of the first class. It is a congested urban area. It is a wonderfully dynamic setting, but sometimes their problems are more severe than other school districts.

So I just wanted to make certain that that was on the record and a part of the debate. Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Luzerne County, Mr. Tighe.

Mr. TIGUE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I did not think I would get up today, because we all know that this is not a real exercise, but I have to at this juncture.

I support the Philadelphia School District, like the minority leader said, and I think they should have extra funding for a number of reasons. However, I do not think that we should

be taking from other school districts in order to fund Philadelphia. I think what should have been done, if our leaders on both sides thought that this was an appropriate thing, it should have been included in the amendments for which we did not have to take money from someone else. It should have been included in the money that was agreed to.

We have got to stop this cannibalism on education. This is just an indicator. This is not an important amendment, because we know this is not going to be the final budget. I do not want to be parochial either, as the minority leader said, but I do want to make sure that we take care of everybody in education. That is not the way we do it, by pulling assets from one school district and giving it to another. If one school district needs additional assets, let us put the votes up to give them additional assets or find a way to do it.

I ask you to defeat this amendment if you are not from Philadelphia.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, at the end of the day, we have an obligation to be honest not only to ourselves but to the people that we represent. In the budget, in the budget, HB 815, there is a line item called high school reform. It does not say Butler County, Erie County, Philadelphia County. It is transparent; it is transparent — high school reform in Pennsylvania.

This legislature issued a report when it looked at the problem in Philadelphia County and throughout the State. Throughout the State we have high school buildings that are more than 50 years old. We have high schools that are overcrowded. We have talked about the issue of violence around many of our high schools. And I almost resent, I almost resent this isolation of Philadelphia County.

Philadelphia County is a part of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It just happens to be a district in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which has over 300 different languages, 300 different languages in the Philadelphia school system. Its school buildings are much older than other buildings throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is the only first-class county in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. So to that end, this appropriation was going to be statewide, and because of the size of Philadelphia County, if we look at other formulas for appropriating education dollars to Philadelphia County, it comes out to about 25 percent because of its size and because of some other issues. This is not preferential treatment for Philadelphia County. It is not taking moneys from one place and putting it in another. It is only saying that of the money out of high school reform that might end up in Philadelphia County, I am only asking that that money be used to bring about high schools with no more than 800 students.

Now, I do not know whether this amount is the amount that Philadelphia County will receive. When I asked the people who do the numbers of the total amount, about how much do you believe will go to Philadelphia County, using other formulas that have been used, it comes out to about 25 percent, but I do not know whether it is going to be 25 percent; it could be 5 percent. The only thing my amendment says is, whatever goes to Philadelphia County, whether it be a dollar, that it not be used to bring about high school reform that does not involve high schools with no more than 800 students.

That is the gist of my amendment, and so I ask my colleagues, please do not label this as taking money from one place and putting it to someplace else, nor should you label this as Philadelphia County getting preferential treatment. I do not care how much of high school reform goes to Philadelphia County. My amendment only says that of whatever amount goes to Philadelphia County, that it should go towards bringing about high school reform that involves high schools with no more than 800 students.

Mr. **VITALI** offered the following amendment No. **A00564**:

Amend Sec. 251, page 150, by inserting between lines 6 and 7

No appropriations made in this act shall be used to pay for the purchase of or the reimbursement for the purchase of any radio or television broadcast time outside of free public service announcements; the payment to or the reimbursement for payments to contractors, corporations, associations, partnerships, sole proprietorships or any other business entity for the purpose of conducting telephone or telemarketing activities except limited survey studies to determine public opinion on various issues.

Amend Sec. 252, page 163, by inserting between lines 10 and 11

No appropriations made in this act shall be used to pay for the purchase of or the reimbursement for the purchase of any radio or television broadcast time outside of free public service announcements; the payment to or the reimbursement for payments to contractors, corporations, associations, partnerships, sole proprietorships or any other business entity for the purpose of conducting telephone or telemarketing activities except limited survey studies to determine public opinion on various issues.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Is the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, seeking recognition?

The gentleman, Mr. Feese, from Lycoming County is. You are recognized.

Mr. **FEESE**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the gentleman from Delaware stand for brief interrogation?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The gentleman indicates he will. You may proceed.

Mr. **FEESE**. Mr. Speaker, would the gentleman explain his amendment?

Mr. **VITALI**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This deals with the issue of the so-called public service announcements that House and Senate members use, particularly in the election season to increase their own name recognition. It also deals with the telemarketing services that House members and Senators employ to call constituents in their own districts. What this would do would be to, for both House and Senate members, would be to prohibit how tax dollars, dollars appropriated to the legislature in the House and the Senate's individual line items, prohibit those moneys from being used for, one, the paid commercial airtime for the public service announcements. It does not prohibit public service announcements but just buying commercial airtime for the public service announcements. That is one. And two, prohibiting hiring outside telemarketing firms to call into the districts, the exception being, limited surveying is accepted and permissible, and the reason for this is to not give the incumbents an unfair advantage to build their own name recognition using tax dollars, not to really campaign using tax dollars under the guise of doing public service announcements.

That concludes my explanation. I would be happy to answer more questions.

Mr. **FEESE**. Mr. Speaker, I thank the gentleman for his explanation.

Obviously, we have a fundamental disagreement, at least myself and the gentleman, regarding the efficacy and the importance of being able to reach out to your constituents through media such as television and also through use of the telephone and getting your message to your constituents regarding what services are available, what issues are important to them and to your community. So obviously we have a fundamental disagreement on that.

## CONSTITUTIONAL POINT OF ORDER

Mr. **FEESE**. Putting aside the merits, however, of the issue, I would move that this particular amendment is unconstitutional.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Feese, raises the point of order that amendment 564 to HB 815 is unconstitutional.

The Speaker, under rule 4, is required to submit questions affecting the constitutionality of an amendment to the House for their decision, which the Chair now does.

On the question,  
Will the House sustain the constitutionality of the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Feese, on that question.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, my argument on unconstitutionality is based on two constitutional provisions. First, Article II, section 11, of the Pennsylvania Constitution, which specifically states that each House has the authority to determine its own rules. That is, the Senate has the authority to determine its own rules, which this amendment would prohibit in terms of making expenditures for PSAs and telephone surveys, and the House has its right to determine expenditures for those same purposes. That is protected by our Constitution. We have debated this in the appropriate form in various ways when we debated our rules, and the gentleman has tried valiantly at those times to prohibit what we believe is an appropriate expenditure unsuccessfully. But that is the appropriate form, in the House rules, and it is appropriate for the Senate in the Senate rules.

I would also point out that it is my opinion that this amendment violates Article III, section 11, of the Constitution, which states that a general appropriation bill shall not have or not contain any language other than appropriation language, and this certainly goes far beyond what is intended by that constitutional provision.

Finally, I would point out to the members of the House that this exact amendment, virtually this exact amendment was considered in May of 2004 when we were considering the general appropriations bill at that time. The only difference was, that amendment, as I recall, included e-mail communications, which the gentleman has deleted from this amendment. But the House responded at that time and said, by a vote of 58 to 142, that in fact the gentleman's proposal was unconstitutional. The gentleman from Schuylkill County, the majority whip, who was the chairman of the Appropriations Committee at that time, argued this same issue based on those same constitutional provisions.

So based on Article II, section 11, and Article III, section 11, and the precedent of this House, Mr. Speaker, I submit that the gentleman's amendment is unconstitutional.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Here we go again. Every time this valid issue is raised, there is some procedural motion, be it germaneness or be it referring to Rules to work out some technical defects or be it constitutionality. There is always some reason to not deal with this very valid issue, and despite the gentleman's words to the contrary, this is just another attempt using parliamentary gymnastics to not deal with an important political issue.

On the merits, his citing of the Constitution to say that our voting on this somehow infringes on our constitutional rights to determine what we can do is the height of circular logic. We are voting on this. We are making this decision right now, and if this is passed, the Senate will be making the decision what we can and cannot do. So for the gentleman to assert that this is unconstitutional because we have a right to determine what we can do and not do is ridiculous, because the very act of voting on this is that determination.

The second point the gentleman makes, it is unconstitutional because it contains language, limiting language, or words rather than numbers or whatever that point might be, I mean, we have been doing this all day. I mean, just think of the Maher debate about the audits and issue after issue in this budget. We have done this on amendment after amendment after making some dollar appropriation, somehow limiting how it can be spent or putting certain conditions on that, and that is entirely acceptable within certain parameters, and the only thing we are doing here is we are allotting many millions of dollars to the House and Senate, and we are outlining the various things they can be used for – office expenses and flags and lunches and on and on and on – but we are also, by this amendment, simply placing certain limitations, too. We are simply saying, it cannot be used for paid programming.

So you can agree with this amendment or you can disagree with it on its substance, but clearly we have the right to spell out what we can or cannot do, and clearly, you may not like this, you may not want to do it, but clearly we have the constitutional right to do it. So I would ask that you vote "yes" on this motion.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to urge a vote that would allow this amendment. This is not unconstitutional. We should not try to sidestep a vote on public service announcements, whether or not they are appropriate, and telemarketing calls, whether or not they are appropriate. We should not sidestep that question by putting up a vote saying this is unconstitutional. It is not unconstitutional. I realize a year ago, in May of 2004, this House cast such a vote.

I rise to speak because of something that the Appropriations chair said during his remarks. He said that the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali, had tried valiantly to amend this and has tried amending the House rules to prohibit the telemarketing calls and prohibit the public service announcements. In fact, on January 31 of this year, the House rules were before us, and yes, Representative Vitali from Delaware County had an amendment that would have prohibited public service announcements and would have prohibited telemarketing calls, but, Mr. Speaker, let us recall what happened that day. That day on January 31, there was no valiant fight, because this House voted to not allow amendments – that is right – by a vote of 114 to 81. Look it up on your computers. Look up HR 2, which said, when we consider the House rules, HR 1, no amendments shall be permitted. And guess what? One hundred fourteen members of this House voted to not allow amendments. We were not allowed to vote on getting rid of that ghost-voting language. We were not allowed to vote on Representative Vitali's attempt to limit the telemarketing calls and the public service announcements. Because the majority in this House—

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, point of order.

Mr. SAMUELSON. —shut down amendments, we did not have that vote.

## POINT OF ORDER

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, point of order.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. Samuelson, would you cease for a moment. The gentleman, Mr. Feese, has a question.

Mr. FEESE. Mr. Speaker, are we on constitutionality?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair would gently admonish the speaker, Mr. Samuelson, to stick to the issue of constitutionality. I know he has got himself worked up and he is excited, but try to make sure that excitement is funneled in the right direction, if you would.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Yes.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Thank you, sir.

Mr. SAMUELSON. I will conclude gently.

We did not have a chance on January 31 to vote on the substance of this because no amendments were allowed. Today we have a chance to vote on it. This is clearly constitutional.

I urge the members of this House to defeat the motion that would say that this is unconstitutional. It is constitutional. We should be allowed to vote on the Vitali amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Thank you for that rather gentle conclusion. We appreciate it.

Mr. Feese, did you want to speak again?

Mr. FEESE. Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I apologize. I probably did express my one argument inartfully, and I will try to be clearer.

In regard to Article III, section 11, which states that a general appropriation bill shall not contain language other than appropriation language, one of my concerns in particular with the gentleman's amendment is the way in which it is drafted. Although the gentleman purports to limit expenditures under a Senate flag-purchase line item and under a new-member appropriation in the House of Representatives, the manner in which he has drafted the amendment goes far beyond that purpose. His amendment says, "No appropriations made in this act shall...."; "No appropriations made in this act shall...." That language being so broad substantively amends the entire budget, which would mean the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania could not use telemarketing techniques, could not use radio, television, et cetera, to market agricultural products, to market its tourism industry, to market its industrial sites, to market its CHIP program (Children's Health Insurance Program), et cetera, et cetera, et cetera. So what the gentleman has done by in probably very cleverly drafting his language to cover the entire budget but trying to hide it in separate line items is to substantively amend the entire budget, which would violate Article III, section 11.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Is the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, seeking recognition?

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. Vitali, I am asking you a question. Are you seeking recognition?

Mr. VITALI. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Under the rules of debate for the budget, you are only entitled to speak on one occasion, and you have already used up that one time.

Mr. VITALI. Let us review. Was that in interrogation by Representative Feese?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. No. That was when I recognized you at the microphone.

Mr. VITALI. As I recall – we may have to look back at the record – but as I recall the proceedings, I declined the opportunity to speak. Mr. Feese rose to the microphone and asked if I would stand for interrogation, and I got up at that point.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Would you let me check with the Parliamentarian for just a moment.

Mr. VITALI. Sure.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Even the Chair is fallible, and the Chair apologizes that you are accurate. You did not speak other than through interrogation, and you still have your one opportunity to speak, and I am assuming you want to take advantage of that now. Is that correct?

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. You may begin.

Mr. VITALI. Now, I just want to be clear. I think that the argument just made, one, is not germane to the issue of constitutionality. It may be an argument to policy that the speaker made. The argument may go to whether it is, if it were correct, which it is not, it might go to policy but certainly not to constitutionality.

Clearly, this language is inserted in two parts of the budget: one, in the line item dealing with the Senate, and by its placement clearly deals with limiting the Senate; and the other in the line item relating to the House, and that clearly relates only to the expenditures in the House line item, as do all of the other provisions of this budget. So this language by its placement clearly is only limited to that section of the budget where it appears. Each section contains its own positive assertions as to what can be spent. The intent of this and the effect of this amendment would be in no way to affect any other sections of the budget other than the sections in which the language is contained, and that would be in the legislative section of this.

Those arguments aside, the gentleman's arguments do not go to the issue of constitutionality. Those arguments might be more properly made in argument on the amendment in chief once we get beyond this, in my view, spurious argument of constitutionality.

So I would vote "yes," urge a "yes" vote on constitutionality. Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Are there any other members seeking recognition on this issue of constitutionality? If not, then we will proceed to vote.

For the benefit, especially those of you who are new members, those voting "aye" will be voting to declare the amendment to be constitutional. In this particular case, that would be the side proposed by Mr. Vitali. Those who are voting "no," or those who would be supporting the arguments of Mr. Feese, will be voting to declare the amendment to be unconstitutional.

Mr. **VITALI** offered the following amendment No. **A00565**:

Public access to community revitalization grant information.—(a) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, all community revitalization grant information in the possession of the Department of Community and Economic Development, including the following, shall be made available for public inspection and photocopying as soon as practicable:

(1) All submitted grant applications, within 15 business days of receipt.

(2) Finalized grant contracts.

(3) Logging and summary information.

(b) The cost to the public of the photocopying shall be reasonable, not to exceed the actual cost.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Maher.

Mr. **MAHER**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just observed that this amendment, which purports to be about open records, is offered by the only member of this chamber who voted against the bill which became our new open records law in the last session, and I would like to suggest that we give this a resounding “no” vote so that we can send a message that we like it when people practice what they preach.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. To no one’s surprise, the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, is seeking recognition. You may proceed.

Mr. **VITALI**. Although not totally germane, I think it is necessary.

The “no” vote on the open records law was a reflection of the fact that it was a poor bill that was not really a good step in opening up the records of this State to the citizens of this Commonwealth. It was a “no” vote to reflect that the bill did not go nearly far enough, and if that bill was a good bill, this amendment would not be necessary.

Having said that, let me explain what this amendment does, because it does make the records of this Commonwealth more open to the citizens of this State, and that is something we should encourage. Specifically what it does is say that the applications for the Community Revitalization Program – we may get 5,000 applications a year from various groups – those applications are public records and open to public inspection.

Right now citizens of this Commonwealth cannot see who applied for community revitalization grants. They can only see who got the grants. Now, the purpose for letting the public see the rejected applications as well as the accepted applications is to let the public make its own independent evaluation of whether we, their elected officials, have chosen wisely in choosing what group gets the money and what group does not get the money. For example, if we see that we have given a parade \$5,000 but rejected an AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) clinic of \$5,000, we might wonder, are we spending our money in the best way? That is why it is important that the public see not only accepted applications but the rejected applications, too.

The reasons that have been given to object to this in the past, in my view, have been red-herring arguments. We would be putting the groups at a disadvantage by revealing secrets that they do not want revealed and arguments along those lines. The reality is that people who apply for these community revitalization grants are municipalities, senior centers, Little League teams, and so forth. We are not dealing with State secrets. These groups, if they want tax dollars, have a right to have their applications, have the reasons they want money and the uses they would put that money to, open to public inspection. There are no State secrets here.

The point again is to shine sunlight on a program that has come under controversy – I think it was the words of Chief Justice William O. Douglas, sunshine is the best antiseptic – put sunlight on the program so the public can

evaluate whether tax dollars are being used. So quite simply what this does is say, you can see grant applications, you can see any computer information logged by the Department of Community and Economic Development, and other basic information like that.

So I would urge a “yes” vote.

### CONSTITUTIONAL POINT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lycoming County, Mr. Feese.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would again put before the House the question of constitutionality of this amendment. So I move that the amendment is unconstitutional.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Feese, raises the point of order that the amendment offered by the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, to HB 815, amendment No. 565, is unconstitutional.

The Speaker, under rule 4, is required to submit questions affecting the constitutionality of an amendment to the House for decision, which the Chair now does.

On the question,

Will the House sustain the constitutionality of the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Feese.

Mr. FEESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would raise the issue of constitutionality based on Article III, section 11, which, again, clearly states that the general appropriation bill shall embrace nothing other than appropriations.

In that regard, the Attorney General has issued an opinion which provides a three-prong test. Failure on any one of those prongs would indicate that the amendment is in fact unconstitutional, the first prong being whether the language is germane to an appropriation. If you read the gentleman’s language, it does not refer to any appropriation at all, not even an appropriation in the Department of Community and Economic Development, which is responsible for this program. So it fails on the first prong.

It also fails on the second prong, which states, the second prong being that the amendment should not repeal or amend any current statute. It in essence amends our statute regarding the right to know by stating that notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, all community revitalization grant information shall be made available.

Finally, it also fails on the third prong, which is that the language may not extend beyond the life of the appropriations act itself which you are amending. This language does in fact continue on after the life of the appropriations act.

I would also point out that this chamber considered this same amendment on May 11, 2004, and felt for the same reasons that the gentleman’s amendment was unconstitutional at that time and voted 58 to 141, holding that the amendment was unconstitutional.

So Article III, section 11, it is in violation of, Mr. Speaker. The three-prong test enunciated by one of our Attorneys General, it fails on all three prongs. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, in my view, an attempt to sidestep a politically charged issue using a parliamentary maneuver. If you look at our budget, you will see it littered with limiting language, modifying language, and so forth. All you have to do is think of the whole Planned Parenthood issue to think of all the things we have done with that: today’s auditing requirements; using language to bifurcate abortions in one facility and not in another. We have gone a long way in the budget on that issue and other issues to describe how money is spent, and this is just totally consistent with that. We spend, oh, maybe \$60 million a year on that Community Revitalization Program, and all this does is say, when we issue those \$60 million or so in grants, we just want to make sure that the public can see not only who got them but who did not get them.

So this is just consistent with modifying explanatory, limiting language; that if you look at almost any chapter in our budget, you are going to see something like this. So if you do not like the nature of this subject matter, vote against it after we vote it constitutional, because clearly we have done this and will continue to do language like this in the past, and it is constitutional.

So I would again ask for a “yes” vote.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Maher.

Mr. MAHER. As members of this body across the years, we get a lot of instruction from certain quarters about what we should be doing to be righteous. It is astonishing to me when those same quarters refer to our Constitution as a red herring, and I believe that is the same issue that was raised 2 years ago and last year. And again, I do not hear from the prior speaker why he believes that this issue is more important than the State Constitution. I do not hear any actual analysis from his standpoint as to why he believes it would in fact be constitutional, and it seems on its face that it would be trying to hide a little statute in the midst of a big budget. That is unconstitutional.

The name calling red-herring business just is tragically inappropriate, and I would ask for your vote recognizing that this is unconstitutional. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Those voting “aye” will vote to declare the amendment to be constitutional; those voting “no” will declare the amendment to be unconstitutional.

The previous amendment No. 439 by Representative Kenney was drafted improperly, has been replaced by amendment No. 787 presented by the gentleman, Mr. Kenney, which the clerk will read.

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration as amended?

Mr. **KENNEY** offered the following amendment No. **A00787**:

Amend Bill, page 210, by inserting between lines 28 and 29

Section 1899. Limitation on Department of Community and Economic Development.—The Department of Community and Economic Development shall not allocate any additional funds to any city of the first class or to any county of the first class coterminous with a city of the first class for the balance of the fiscal year July 1, 2004, to June 30, 2005, until that city of the first class provides written guarantees that all the existing municipal centers, also known as mini-city halls, will remain open and in full operation for the balance of the fiscal year July 1, 2004, to June 30, 2005.

Amend Bill, page 217, by inserting between lines 16 and 17

Section 2010. Limitation on Department of Community and Economic Development.—The Department of Community and Economic Development shall not allocate any funds to any city of the first class or to any county of the first class coterminous with a city of the first class for fiscal year July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2006, until that city of the first class provides written guarantees that all the existing municipal centers, also known as mini-city halls, will remain open and in full operation for the fiscal year July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2006.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just ask for a moment until that amendment can come up on the computer screens. It is 787?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. That is correct, sir.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Okay. The computer is not displaying that.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Is Mr. Kenney present on the floor? Mr. Kenney, would you give a brief explanation of your amendment while we are waiting for it to show up on the computer screen?

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Can I—

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Mr. Samuelson, do you rise?

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. In fact, the computer screen says, “amendment is not yet filed.” That is what it is reading on our computer screen.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Our information, Mr. Samuelson, is that it has been filed. I am not sure why it is saying that on the computer screen, but I am asking Mr. Kenney to explain his amendment, and if there are no further objections, we will have the vote on that, unless someone objects to it not being on the computer screen.

Mr. Kenney, would you please give a brief explanation of your amendment?

Mr. **KENNEY**. Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It would not allow any expenditure from the Department of Community and Economic Development to cities of the

first class until the assurances from the city that the mini-city halls in that city are kept open as a part of government services.

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. Mr. Samuelson, does that suffice?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. **THOMAS**. Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the maker of the amendment?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Kenney, indicates that he is willing to be interrogated. You may proceed, sir.

Mr. **THOMAS**. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, do I understand the intent of your amendment is to withhold all Community and Economic Development dollars from Philadelphia County until you have received assurances that one mini-city hall will remain open? Is that the intent of your amendment?

The **SPEAKER** pro tempore. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. **KENNEY**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Any moneys that would be intended to be used by the city would be held up unless— I believe there are two mini-city halls in the city of Philadelphia that provide government services, and as part of the Community and Economic Development dollars flowing to the city itself, that we want assurances that these services would be provided to residents at least in northeast Philadelphia where I represent.

Mr. **THOMAS**. So, Mr. Speaker, I should go back to Philadelphia County and say to the recipients of the Basic Systems Repair Program, of the Homeless Assistance Program, of the Business Support Program, of the Housing and Redevelopment Assistance Program, the LIHEAP program (Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program) that they cannot receive any of those services, which all come out of the Department of Community and Economic Development, that they cannot receive any of those services until you have assurances that one mini-city hall would be open?

And I say one, rather than two, because Representative Jewell Williams represents the other district where there was a mini-city hall, and they have worked that out. So he is unwilling to tell his constituents that they cannot take advantage of Basic Systems Repair, that they cannot take advantage of small business development centers, that they cannot take advantage of Weatherization Assistance, that they cannot take advantage of the myriad of other programs that come out of the Department of Community and Economic Development until this one mini-city hall is reopened. Is that what you are asking me to do through my vote?

Mr. **KENNEY**. To answer the question, the answer is, I believe the city of Philadelphia can spend \$50,000 to provide services for 110,000 northeast residents out of the hundreds of millions of dollars we send to them, yes.

Mr. **THOMAS**. And, Mr. Speaker, I hear you about the residents of your district that took advantage of this city hall, but I remember, I remember— Well, Mr. Speaker, this almost sounds like you want me to blow up the building to get to one baby. You want me to join you in denying life-saving services to children and families until the city provides you with assurances that this one mini-city hall will remain open?

Mr. KENNEY. I want you to join me in supporting this amendment saying to the city that we will appropriate \$50,000, because that is what it will cost to keep the northeast mini-city hall open, out of the hundreds of millions of dollars we send to the city for all those services that, I agree with you, are important.

The importance to my constituency, what I have heard from them is, keep mini-city hall open. It is a service that is important to the 110,000 residents of northeast Philadelphia, and the city can do it if they want to. They have chosen not to. So I am asking that they spend the \$50,000. I think we send in the State budget about \$3.2 billion to the city. I think they can afford \$50,000. It is very easy, and I would ask you for your support.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Mr. Thomas, your time has expired.

Mr. THOMAS. My time or his time?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. No, your time. You were interrogating the gentleman on your time.

Mr. THOMAS. But he asked me a question, and I would just like to answer that question.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Well, you should not have allowed him to do that.

Mr. THOMAS. Pardon me?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. You should have taken the use of your 5 minutes to say what you wanted to say. But when you began interrogating him, you have opened yourself up to allowing him to respond so that your 5 minutes are up.

Mr. THOMAS. That is true, Mr. Speaker. But, Mr. Speaker, I have been here 17 years. I have never disrespected a member. This member was talking, and I was not going to cut in on him to make my point.

Respect dictates that I allowed him to at least finish and at least answer the question of which he asked me. And I know that my time is gone, but I would at least like to answer that question, if I may.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. I am sorry, Mr. Thomas, but we cannot allow you to do that.

Now, what I would suggest to you is that you either personally go to the gentleman, Mr. Kenney, and talk to him personally or you have another member give the answer for you on your behalf in a separate 5 minutes that they may request, but we do need to adhere to that rule.

I apologize that we cannot give you that courtesy at this time. Normally we could, but under the House rules for the budget, we have to do that.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I appreciate your indulgence, and I would like for you to join me, along with the Speaker, to go to the Appropriations chair and get his \$50,000 to keep that mini-city hall open so that we do not have to put up a bad vote on this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is welcome.

Is there anyone else seeking recognition?

The lady, Ms. Josephs, from Philadelphia County is recognized at this time.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May I interrogate the maker of this amendment, please?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Kenney, agrees to do so. You may proceed.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My question is, many of us, all of us I expect from Philadelphia County like all of the other State Representatives and all of the Senators, get a chance to make individual legislative initiative grants in their district. Is this amendment going to make it impossible for people who represent Philadelphia, or whose districts at least cover part of Philadelphia, to make grants into Philadelphia County?

Mr. KENNEY. Mr. Speaker, this legislation does not prevent initiative grants to go to groups in the city of Philadelphia.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May I make some argument, please?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Some argument or debate?

Ms. JOSEPHS. Debate.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The lady is in a good position to do that. You may begin.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think this is the long arm of the State again telling people what to do in Philadelphia. I think that is not a good idea. I do not have any particular position on the mini-city hall. I do not want to see any Philadelphians be deprived.

I also think that the arguments used against the amendment proposed by the gentleman from Delaware, two of his, could be proposed here, but I am not going to try the patience of the House. I just want to point out that we could have a fairer and a better process if we would stop trying to avoid controversial amendments by calling them unconstitutional.

I do not want to buy into that process. If the gentleman from Delaware County had an unconstitutional amendment, well, this one is, too, but I am not going to move to vote on constitutionality.

Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

## PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Daley.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

A parliamentary inquiry.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman will state it.

Mr. DALEY. According to the last pronouncement from the Chair, you indicated that each member, under the rules of the House regarding the debate with regard to amendments for the budget, is entitled to a certain period of time for his or her presentation. Is that correct?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. That is correct, with the exception of the Appropriations chairman and the floor leaders.

Mr. DALEY. Now, if you would take that rule and tie it into Jefferson's and also the Robert's Rules, cannot a member use his or her allotment and another member get up and be recognized and yield their allotted time to, say, Mr. Cohen or Mr. Thomas or someone that would be that particular member's time that could be yielded under the rule?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. No, no; you are wrong. We do not yield time remaining from our 5 minutes to other members. That is not a part of that rule.

You, as a single member, have a single, one 5-minute allotment of time. If you choose not to use it, that is your choice, but you cannot transfer that to another member.

Mr. DALEY. Well, I am saying, Mr. Speaker, not yield a portion of my time, but yield all my time to a particular member.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. No, you cannot do that either.

Mr. DALEY. And that is not provided under Jefferson's that we can do that?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. We are operating under the temporary rules that we have established as a House that set the debate limits for the budget amendments, and that has been the rule for the last several years, as I am sure you are aware of.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. You are welcome.

### CONSTITUTIONAL POINT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Cohen, from Philadelphia County is recognized.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, not too long ago today, my fellow constitutional scholar, Brett Feese, quoted Article III, section 11, of the Constitution, and I think Article III, section 11, is relevant here.

Article III, section 11, says: "The general appropriation bill shall embrace nothing but appropriations for the executive, legislative and judicial departments of the Commonwealth, for the public debt and for public schools. All other appropriations shall be made by separate bills, each embracing...one subject."

Mr. Speaker, there is no appropriation in this amendment. In addition, there is a statutory mandate in this amendment for a local governmental agency, the city of Philadelphia.

I therefore move that this amendment is unconstitutional.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Cohen, raises a point of order that the amendment offered by the gentleman, Mr. Kenney, amendment 787 to HB 815, is unconstitutional.

The Speaker, under rule 4, is required to submit questions affecting the constitutionality of an amendment to the House for decision, which the Chair now does.

On the question,

Will the House sustain the constitutionality of the amendment?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Cohen.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, this is an appropriations bill. This amendment is not an appropriation. It includes no money at all. It certainly could include money. This is a \$24 billion budget. The item Mr. Kenney is concerned about costs \$50,000. There is nothing at all stopping the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from appropriating \$50,000 to the city of Philadelphia, to the mini-city hall in Mr. Kenney's district.

Mr. Kenney chooses not to make an appropriation for this. Instead, he seeks to withhold money from the city of Philadelphia unless the city appropriates money from its own budget for what Mr. Kenney deems a worthwhile object.

This is not an appropriate purpose, and this is not a constitutional purpose because this clearly violates the Constitution of Pennsylvania, Article III, section 11, just as the House voted that Mr. Vitali's amendments did, so this amendment does.

I would urge that we be consistent in the House and vote to uphold Mr. Kenney's amendment as unconstitutional. I would certainly support a suspension of the rules if Mr. Kenney wanted to introduce an amendment appropriating \$50,000 to the city of Philadelphia to set up a mini-city hall in his district. That would be a constitutional amendment, and I would support that. But this is not an appropriation, and I think it is therefore unconstitutional, and I urge the House to vote that it is unconstitutional.

### POINT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Point of order. This amendment is not on my screen and on some other members' screens that I am aware of.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman, Mr. Samuelson, brought up that point, and at that moment I had asked Mr. Kenney to give a brief explanation of the amendment.

It is exactly the same as amendment 439 with the exception of the last five words in each paragraph, which were stricken in the newer version. So I do not know if you have access to amendment 439 or not, but you may want to— You do? That is the only change, Mr. Vitali. Those last five words of each paragraph have been stricken in the current amendment that we are debating.

The gentleman, Mr. Kenney, is recognized to speak on the issue of constitutionality.

Mr. KENNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I believe this amendment is constitutional and does not violate Article III, section 11. As it relates to an appropriation, it instructs how the dollars are to be spent in that appropriation. That is what this amendment does. That is constitutional, and we have done it in the past, so I would ask the members to vote against the motion by Mr. Cohen. Thank you.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Are there any other members seeking recognition on the question of constitutionality?

Seeing none, those who are voting "aye" will vote to declare the amendment to be constitutional; those who are voting "no" will declare the amendment to be unconstitutional.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Cohen.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, on the amendment, I would urge a "no" vote on this amendment.

The county of Philadelphia, like all of the other counties, receives a great deal of money in this budget. For us to say that

all of the money in the budget is contingent upon a mini-city hall costing \$50,000 for Mr. Kenney's district is not a very wise use of our appropriations power. There are many things that are more important, even in Mr. Kenney's district, than the mini-city hall is.

It matters, for instance, whether there is education money spent in Mr. Kenney's district. It matters whether there is money spent for drug and alcohol abuse. It matters whether the police dollars that Mr. Sturla put in the budget for the city of Philadelphia and other cities are spent. It matters whether there is money for neighborhood redevelopment. Everything that we put into the budget matters.

There is a lot of money in this budget for the city and county of Philadelphia. There is a lot of money in this budget for all the other cities and counties of this Commonwealth. To withhold the money based on a solely municipal function is both unprecedented and rather troubling. I would strongly urge that we not get into the business of holding State money up on the city of Philadelphia's decision as to where it ought to spend its money.

We have the ability to appropriate money. We have the ability to appropriate money for Philadelphia just as we have for other things. If Mr. Kenney wants to appropriate \$50,000 to the city of Philadelphia, he has the ability to do that. To take money away from all the other districts in Philadelphia and from all the other functions in Philadelphia that benefit Mr. Kenney's constituents as well as our constituents for this mini-city hall is something that I really doubt that even Mr. Kenney's own constituents support.

Now, my personal opinion is that it would be a great idea for the city of Philadelphia to have a lot of mini-city halls, it would be a great idea for city councilmen like State legislators to have district offices throughout the city, but we ought not to be threatening to take away money for worthwhile State appropriations unless the city of Philadelphia appropriates this money.

This is a terrible precedent. God knows what somebody will come up with next year in terms of how the city of Philadelphia ought to appropriate money or how some other county ought to appropriate money unless they do something that we want them to do.

This is absolutely the wrong way to go. Even though the Senate will likely strike out this amendment as well as other amendments, it is rather trivial and rather an offensive use of State power. I would strongly urge that we act responsibly and defeat the Kenney amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Kenney.

Mr. KENNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In reference to some of the comments made by the previous speaker, if members would look at the amendment and take the time, which I do not know if the previous speaker did, it only refers to the Department of Community and Economic Development. So when he added education and some other departments, it is just not true. The city will still receive probably \$2 to \$3 billion in support from this legislature, and I am asking when it comes to the Community and Economic Development line, that communities in northeast Philadelphia, which I represent, and they did send legislators from Philadelphia here to watch their tax dollars – I do not know if the previous speaker knew that or not – that is why we are here, and I am asking that we adopt this amendment so services are

provided in northeast Philadelphia that are scheduled to be cut in the city budget.

Is it the intention of the maker of the amendment to take money from the Attorney General's Office?

Mr. **THOMAS**. Mr. Speaker, only, only, only, only, only would I take money from the Attorney General's Office for victims of rape. Rape is on the rise in Pennsylvania. We have got to put a stop to it. We cannot afford to decrease funding for victims of rape, and in this particular situation and only, o-n-l-y, only in this situation would I decrease funding to the Attorney General for victims of rape.

The **SPEAKER**. Mr. Clymer.

Mr. **CLYMER**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I believe the gentleman from Philadelphia has made the case. He is saying as to why we should not take money from the AG's Office, because he said rape is on the increase; crime is on the increase. So what you do is not leverage more money from the State's top law enforcement officer. What you do is provide them more funding so their professionals, their specialists can continue to put people who commit crime and send a message to other criminals that crime does not pay in Pennsylvania and send them to jail.

So, Mr. Speaker, I ask members, respectfully, that we provide a negative vote on this amendment.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. I would like to ask the maker of the amendment a question about the amendment.

The **SPEAKER**. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. The gentleman indicated, he talked about decreasing funding for rape crisis in the proposed budget. I am trying to look for that right now. Do you have the history of where that line item has been? The two line items you are affecting – the \$500,000 decrease in drug task forces and the \$500,000 increase in rape crisis – do you have a history over the last 2 to 3 years for where those line items have stood, for the benefit of the members?

Mr. **THOMAS**. Yes. In the Department of Public Welfare, there is a program to provide support to victims of rape, a rape crisis program. I am adding \$500,000 because we have a lot of people in Pennsylvania that are suffering as a result of this egregious act of violence. It is in the Department of Public Welfare. It is a rape crisis program.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think I found that line item – \$5.7 million 2 years ago; \$5.8 million in the current budget. You mentioned a decrease. Are you talking about in the last 2 years or prior to that? Can you give us some more information about what you mean when you say a decrease?

Mr. **THOMAS**. What I mean is that when you look at the budget and look at this, the budget bill – okay? – the budget, the original budget showed a decrease in rape crisis services in the Department of Public Welfare. What I think you are referring to are Federal appropriations that come into the Department of Public Welfare, but when you look at the State's contribution, there is a decrease, and this amendment would help with that.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Thank you.

Just in conclusion, as I look at the budget, the line item that is proposed right here, the current proposal, \$5.879 million for rape crisis; last year, \$5.879 million, the exact same amount; 2 years ago, \$5.7 million, about \$100,000 less. So I think the gentleman has a worthy effort to increase that line item, but I do not think we should do that by taking money away from the drug task forces. If the gentleman would be interested, I have a number of other line items we could look at to take money away from to fund rape crisis, but cutting drug task forces is not the answer.

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer.

Mr. ROHRER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today after we have made and redefined a whole new budget, most of which will never stay, I offer an alternative budget to the Governor's '04-'05 proposed budget. This alternative is carefully crafted to provide a budget that is sound, simple, and substantive. The option is a smart-growth budget, similar in construction to past budgets offered by the Commonwealth Caucus and voted on by this House.

The budget is restrained, responsible, and reasonable, and it should be supported by every member who is concerned about the increasingly unbearable tax burden being borne by our taxpayers of the State. There are numerous reasons why the budget as recommended by the Governor and under discussion by the House today is fiscally unwise and should be rejected and why the smart-growth budget alternative should be adopted.

The smart-growth alternative is restrained. Let me explain. We know that the people of this State are demanding no increases in State spending. In fact, the polls are saying that the voters even want reduced spending. Yet here again in this budget put forward by the Governor, spending is not only increased, it is increased beyond the rate of inflation. New programs are started, very expensive new programs. This budget as proposed would spend 3 1/2 percent more than last year, and once you add into it the \$110 million more we added in yesterday, it goes way over 4 percent, and by the time it is done in the process, it will be well over that.

To put things into perspective, the budgets proposed by this Governor and passed by the legislature these last 2 years average over 5 percent per year, and I ask you, how many of your taxpayers have gotten a 5-percent increase in their income? How can we in this House continue to adopt budget after budget that uses up every dime that we get and then go back and tell the people that we have done their business? So this smart-growth budget spends what we approved last year. It acknowledges most of the spending reductions recommended by the Governor in the executive branch departments.

Mr. Speaker, can anybody hear? Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is correct. There is entirely too much noise. If it continues, I will have to ask the staff to leave. Please. The gentleman is entitled to be heard.

Mr. ROHRER. I would like not to have it timed against me here.

But the budget also recognizes that there are certain key items that have to be retained. The alternative reinstates the necessary line items that the Governor cut out like plum pox virus control, black fly control, crop insurance, scrap tire cleanup. It reinstates the \$25 million for volunteer firemen the Governor cut out and increases the State Police contingent that the Governor cut out as well. It also recognizes that we have to increase spending for special ed and basic ed at levels of 2.5 percent. That is in there.

But the budget is also responsible, and what I mean by this is this: The alternative is a genuine option. If this budget would be passed, it could be adopted and it could pass necessary muster. All of the necessary line items are included: debt obligation, Social Security, retirement payments for teachers, necessary transfer payments. They are all in here.

The Governor's budget, on the other hand, while responsible and appropriate in some areas, is extremely irresponsible, particularly in the area of welfare, and let me explain. The total welfare budget line item would for the first time, if we adopt the Governor's budget, in the history of this Commonwealth surpass education and forge into the lead, becoming the single largest line item, \$8.5 billion. Not only that, the budget proposed by the Governor will catapult this legislature into guaranteed tax increases come next year.

And my time is about out, and I will have to cut it with this by saying, the Governor's budget in welfare guarantees we are a half a billion dollars short, if adopted, come this time next year, testified by the Budget Secretary. Transfer payments by the Federal government will be reduced come next year. We will be sitting here facing at least a billion-dollar-in-the-hole deficit next year. Do we want a tax increase in this House? Adopt the Governor's budget and we will have a tax increase. The smart-growth budget before us prevents that from happening.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would appreciate serious consideration of the amendment that is before us.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair would like to note that the gentleman did sit quietly while each one of you spoke all day long.

The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. DeWeese.

Mr. DeWEESE. Will my honorable colleague from Berks accede to one brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation.

Mr. ROHRER. I will be glad to, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. DeWEESE. Not with tongue in cheek, just because it is so vexing, I am not asking motive because the Speaker would hammer me down with his gavel, but hypothetically, why would one vote for several hundred amendments and add money to this process and then have the same perspective that you have enunciated? It just does not ring as clearly as it should.

Mr. ROHRER. If the minority leader wants a response, that is exactly part of the point of going through this process.

As has been reiterated by many members on this floor, what we have done today and yesterday bears no resemblance to reality. It is the assumption that the members of this House have that most of what has been done will not stay, either the additional spending or what has happened today. By the time we are sitting here right now, the budget as we have crafted it

has depleted many line items. Important operations of different agencies can never stand. This budget as passed out of this House today could not function, and yet we stand and we go through charades here for 2 days to make ourselves feel good, hoping that the Senate may clean up this mess that we have made. What I am offering is some fiscal responsibility. We cannot go out of this House with the budget that we have fully crafted today. It may make us feel good, but it cannot be done; it simply cannot be done.

And the point that I raised, Mr. Speaker, about just the area of welfare, do we want to be sitting here next year with a tax increase before us? We absolutely will, guaranteed. When the Secretary of the Budget confirms, confirms, he has no estimate of cost for next year, for 3 years or 5 years out, and he lies awake at night because he does not know how we are going to pay for this—

Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker?

Mr. ROHRER. Mr. Speaker, I think you have got the idea. Did you not? That is why we need something that actually can work.

Thank you for your question.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bucks, Mr. Steil.

Mr. STEIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to interrogate the prime sponsor of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. STEIL. Mr. Speaker, could you tell us how this budget treats the issue of Medicaid? Now, we are still not sure of whether the Federal government will fully fund Medicaid at last year's level or whether they will reduce it by some \$400 million. Can you tell me how this budget deals with that issue?

Mr. ROHRER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Yes, I can, the best as possible.

If everyone is aware, the bulk of the spending increases in the Governor's budget we have worked on today has been in the area of welfare, approximately \$800 million. As testified by the Budget Secretary, the predominance of that increase comes in the areas of medical assistance, long-term care, and then some other welfare items, and that is where the bulk of the money is. But it is that exact question that I asked the Budget Secretary, "Have you made a projection for 5 years out, for 3 years out, for next year?" The answer was, "No, Representative Rohrer, I have not. We don't know how to do it." I asked, how can we responsibly, how can the Governor responsibly put before us a budget in the single largest category now that at just a marginal 5-percent increase on \$8.5 billion, let alone the cutbacks in the Federal subsidies, we will be sitting here with a billion dollars in the hole next year? In our budget, this is not a budget to lay out program changes, so what we have done is we have taken what the Governor has laid out for changes in medical assistance, with capitation and inpatient/outpatient, feeling that what he has done in that category makes good sense for containing cost.

Long-term care, we took a 2 1/2-percent increase; he was well over 6. An increase, recognizing we need it, but restrained. In other areas we backed down just a little bit. As an example, the cash grant line item in welfare has been going up at the rate of 14 percent the Governor's first year, then 7 percent. It went up 15 percent last year. We took it to what it was last year.

Why is that important? Well, because the Governor in his book, in the budget book, says that we recognize that this House passed a 5-year limitation on cash assistance, which this House did to put restraint on that line item. The Governor through regulations has taken and expanded that and took away that 5-year cap to allow people to stay in the program for however long the department wants. As a result, that line item continues to go up at double-digit rates. That is irresponsible. We say we need to restrain that.

So, Mr. Speaker, we have tried to take into account, identify the categories that are outside of control, but obviously, this is not the budget to be putting in program changes, so we just highlight the fact that we have more work to do in this area before this budget is adopted.

Mr. STEIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

One follow-up question: If I am understanding correctly, then you have funded or proposed to fund medical assistance, Medicaid at the same levels the Governor proposed in his original budget. Is that what I am hearing?

Mr. ROHRER. In the area of capitation, inpatient and outpatient, that is correct.

Mr. STEIL. And there are areas of medical assistance where this State exceeds the requirements of the Federal mandate for medical assistance. Have you changed any of those areas where we exceed the Federal requirements? Have you reduced any of those?

Mr. ROHRER. A good question. Mr. Speaker, you are in fact correct. Part of the reason why our welfare costs are in excess of States that we could point to is in fact that we offer benefits that exceed the Federal. Again, those are program changes that we did not feel were appropriate to try to work into the budget. We say they need to be addressed. We are highlighting the fact of where our problem is going to be, and as testified by the Budget Secretary, they do not know how. We are saying that needs to be addressed somehow before we ultimately pass a final budget out of this House.

Mr. STEIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Mercer, Mr. Wilt.

Mr. WILT. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of amendment A00705.

You know, over a year ago we stood on this floor and we heard that we needed a tax increase in order to fund the Governor's budget. This budget recognizes the revenue that was derived from that tax increase a year ago. We heard that we needed to raise taxes a year ago because we had obligations into the future that needed to be paid for by increased revenue. We were told that we had a structural deficit. And if we pass the Governor's budget as proposed, we are mortgaging our future into more and more structural deficits down the road. You will need to come back to this floor and vote for a tax increase in order to raise the revenue that we have spent during this amendment process over the last day and a half. This amendment, A00705, fixes those structural deficits by limiting spending.

We heard the minority leader say earlier today that the Governor was fiscally responsible, that other people in the party were fiscally responsible. This is an opportunity to put your money where your mouth is. This is an opportunity on this amendment to go back to your districts and say, we went to Harrisburg and we held the line on spending.

I think Representative Rohrer and his people have done an absolutely outstanding job crafting a budget that makes sense in tough fiscal times. We have recognized where there were legitimate needs. We cut where there were not legitimate reasons to increase spending. This is a budget that we can win on. This is a budget that we can position Pennsylvania's long-term economic future and point back to this budget right now, this year, this alternative budget, and say, when we wanted to reposition Pennsylvania to be a business-friendly State, we held the line on spending.

We have an opportunity right now with this vote to send a message that we are prepared to enter into the final budget negotiations over the next 60 to 90 days by saying we are going to spend at the same level that we spent at last year but we are going to reshuffle the deck and reprioritize where we think we can best show our constituents that we need to emphasize where money should be spent. But this is an opportunity I wish we would have had when we started this process yesterday. We could have voted this amendment first. We could have locked in a different number, and we would have not been able to play a lot of the games that we play with our amendments.

But the point remains, you have an opportunity right now to go home and say we held the line on spending. We did it; we prioritized. We changed the way we did business. We repositioned Pennsylvania, and we did not mortgage our children's futures by spending at a rate that is going to increase the structural deficit from here to who knows when.

Mr. Speaker, I recommend that we vote this and we vote it now. Thank you.

Mr. DeWEESE. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. There is one additional speaker.

Mr. DeWEESE. This was just a quick response to the honorable gentleman.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. DeWEESE. I would only hope that the enthusiastic rhetoric that I just monitored would also be shared with the gentleman's United States Congressman and the President of the United States. It seems like mortgaging one's future and spending into oblivion is a problem with the United States House, the United States Senate, and the Bush administration. So I would just like the gentleman to be aware of that dynamic.

It is budget season. These kinds of moments of repartee are appropriate, I believe.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I do yield to the honorable gentleman, Mr. Wilt, my friend.

The SPEAKER. I am sorry, Mr. Wilt.

Mr. McNaughton.

Mr. McNAUGHTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also rise to support the Rohrer amendment.

The minority leader in his last comments wants to defer attention from what goes on in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to a national issue. Let us keep it focused on the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. This Governor, his Governor, has not found a tax he could not hike, and as according to his budget that we are going to pass here today potentially, next year he is going to be looking for more taxes that he has to hike. In fact, the only thing I think this Governor has voluntarily reduced is the speed at which he travels the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

I think a 2 1/2-percent increase in the Governor's budget is more than gracious in this year's fiscal problems we have as families. We are always talking about taking care of the

middle class. A 2 1/2-percent increase in spending is more than enough for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and I ask for a “yes” vote.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer, offering this amendment. I wish the rules of the House permitted him more than 5 minutes to discuss it because this is a comprehensive amendment that affects literally every section of the budget. If you look on your computer screens, it is 79 pages long. Much of the discussion over the last 2 days would be impacted by the passage of this amendment.

I offered one amendment over these last 2 days to try to restore public library funding. In the last 10 minutes, I took time to look at the comprehensive amendment on how that would impact the public library funding, and I know that many of the votes we have had over the last few days have been very difficult. We just had one about a half hour ago that pitted rape crisis funding versus drug task force funding, and each of us had to make a very difficult choice.

When I formulated my amendment, I looked for an appropriate section of the budget to reduce in order to fund our public libraries. Our public libraries have been cut \$15.9 million if you look at the last 3 years. So I looked at the Department of Corrections, and I found a line item that is actually proposed to increase by \$30 million. That is inmate medical care in the Department of Corrections. I proposed fully funding our public libraries, basically adding back the \$15.9 million that has been reduced over the last three budget cycles, by taking that money from the inmate medical care, and that amendment passed this House unanimously, and I appreciate the 199-to-nothing vote.

When I look at this amendment, which basically reverts to last year’s funding levels, it reverts to the 2004-2005 funding levels. Included in this amendment on page 17, I would actually be raising that inmate medical care back up to where it was last year, after we successfully cut it in order to fund our public libraries. On page 24 of this very same amendment, when I look at the public libraries, I would not only be cutting them back to where they are in the Governor’s proposed budget – the amendment that I funded took them back up to the \$75 million level – on page 24 we do not only go back down to \$59 million, which the Governor proposed, this takes it back to last year, which is \$57 million.

So if we vote on this 79-page amendment that affects literally every section of the budget, in the case of the specific amendment that I proposed to fully fund our public libraries, the effect of this amendment would be to negate my amendment and we would in effect be reducing library funding and increasing inmate medical care funding. I appreciate at 3 o’clock today the House found that unacceptable and approved my amendment.

I think that we have to look at this very carefully. As I said, I wish the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer, had more than 5 minutes to discuss it because it really does affect every section of the budget. I think the 2 days that we take to look through the line items of this budget are very important.

I would not describe this as a charade, as the gentleman mentioned. I think that we owe it to our constituents to take a look at every line item the Governor proposed and suggest

where we think that we should make adjustments as a House of Representatives. I tried to do that in the case of library funding. I know that 200 members of this House have tried to do that with other amendments, and I think we owe it to our constituents to look at the line items line by line. This amendment, unfortunately, would wipe out much of the work we have done over the last 2 days.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, you know, what is so difficult about speaking on this gentleman’s amendment is the thing about getting the facts all mixed up, because when I look at this gentleman’s amendment, I believe that he basically has all of the facts mixed up. If you look at the Governor’s proposed budget, not the one we have been playing with monopoly money but the one where the Governor has consistently over the last 3 years been trying to make reductions in what he was handed when he came in as Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and if you look at the Governor’s proposed budget, the administration has been proposing to erase over \$900 million in a funding gap. Specifically in medical assistance in this year alone, he is proposing close to \$400 million in the reduction of the medical assistance program.

Secondly, the Governor has been proposing an elimination of \$155 million in TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) spending. Now, Mr. Speaker, remember when I gave my introduction back when the Governor proposed his budget, when I said the Governor did not want to get into pointing fingers, but here we go again, and you know I have not said anything, Mr. Speaker, throughout this entire process because I understand this is a part of the process, but, Mr. Speaker, when misinformation is given out, I think I should say something, and there is some misinformation that is being thrown out here. The Governor is proposing the elimination of \$155 million in TANF. In addition to that, Mr. Speaker, the Governor is also dealing with the aspect of medical assistance. So when you begin to add up the reduction in TANF, medical assistance, and the overall reduction in general spending, it is \$900 million, first.

Secondly, Mr. Speaker, when the Governor came in and when the gentleman talked about the structural deficit, basically what he was talking about is our revenue money was down because we were in the middle of a slowdown. Secondly, Mr. Speaker, the gentleman was referring to that basically too much money had been spent on the Federal level. What the gentleman did not mention, Mr. Speaker, is that Washington was outsourcing its Federal deficit. Let me repeat that. Washington is outsourcing its Federal deficit, and this is not just unique to Pennsylvania. You may recall in the Governor’s speech he mentioned the Governor of Indiana, Governor Daniels, who was the Budget Secretary to the President of the United States. Even Governor Daniels is providing a tax increase in Indiana to fix the problem. Now, I know, Mr. Speaker, that does not have anything to do directly with Pennsylvania, but I wanted to point out what the Governor said about a Republican Governor from Indiana.

So when this gentleman talks about his particular amendment, we need to put it in context. We need to put his amendment in context in terms of what the Governor has been doing in the last 3 years to try to align the expenses with the revenue. The Governor is for a corporate net income tax.

The Governor is for the gross receipts tax to be reduced. He has stated that. So let us set the record straight. He has indicated that he is for those reductions.

In addition to that, Mr. Speaker, if you look at this gentleman's amendment, there is really no thought given in terms of where these reductions take place. These reductions, Mr. Speaker, are rather arbitrary, and it is not like the process that we just went through with the appropriations process. We just went through the appropriations process – 3 weeks of in-depth discussions about looking at the departments. These are rather arbitrary decisions, Mr. Speaker, that this gentleman is making.

So in my view, the problem with this amendment, Mr. Speaker, is that it basically is wrong-headed. It basically, Mr. Speaker, is not giving any full thought to exactly how we move forward in terms of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And to make the statement that if the Governor's budget passes – and I heard someone say this – if the Governor's passes, we all of a sudden will have a tax increase, well, Mr. Speaker, I do not see how we are going to have a tax increase, because under the Rendell administration, they have been controlling spending; they have been reducing spending. Like it or not, Mr. Speaker, spending has been slowing down.

Now, I do not want to get into pointing fingers, because the Rendell administration has been very careful about not pointing fingers to what took place under the previous administrations. And guess what? I agree with him. We do not need to talk about the past, but since some people here have a little amnesia, forgetting the fact that all the taxes they cut on top of the spending, the fact of the matter is, we are having some difficult times.

I know this gentleman well who is offering this amendment, and I know he is a part of the Commonwealth Caucus, but I do not recall, Mr. Speaker, that the gentleman voted against any of those budgets during the Ridge and Schweiker years. He voted for the tax cuts, but he did not vote to cut the spending. So you cannot vote for the tax cuts without cutting the spending. You cannot do both, Mr. Speaker. You cannot have tax cuts and increase spending, too.

So here we are today, all of a sudden the gentleman is offering an amendment that, in my view, is wrong-headed, and at this particular point, we need to continue on the Rendell trend.

I do not think that this amendment is well thought out. I understand the gentleman's attempt in what he is attempting to do, but the Rendell administration is moving in the right direction. It is slowing down the rate of spending. Even when a lot of members got upset about the libraries, when a lot of members got upset about the libraries, the Rendell administration said we are spending too much money. He pulled the rein on that. Then people got upset and said he does not care about people having libraries or books in it. What did we do? As a General Assembly, we increased the money that was spent for libraries.

So, Mr. Speaker, if we are going to put out this information, we need to put it out correctly. The Rendell administration in the last 3 years, going into this particular year, has been attempting to slow down the rate of spending. Face up to it, Mr. Speaker: Where we are today, we need to continue that trend; that if you look at what the gentleman has offered in this particular amendment, in my view, basically it is not moving in the right direction.

Mr. Speaker, can I get order, please.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is correct. Please keep the noise levels down. The gentleman has a right to be heard.

Mr. D. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, in addition to that, we had a lot of one-time spending, we had a lot of one-time spending that came out of Washington, DC, and as a result of that one-time spending, Mr. Speaker, that we all participated in, the fact of the matter is, Mr. Speaker, that is why we are where we are. Our revenues have not kept up with our expenses. The Rendell administration is trying to in a very methodical, well-thought-out way to wrestle down our expenditures with our revenue base, and face up to it, Mr. Speaker: I do not think anybody in this room overnight can make the kinds of financial changes that we need to make in this State. I do not think that the Rohrer amendment would do it, Mr. Speaker. I think that it is a huge mistake. I would not have a problem, Mr. Speaker, as I look at some of the changes that the gentleman has made, in my view, some of the adjustments that he has made, in my view, are not well thought out. I think this is wrong to do it in this particular process at this particular point. We had an Appropriations meeting. We went through entire hearings. We had all these particular discussions. I think this amendment is wrong, and I would be "no" on the Rohrer amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Yewcic.

Mr. YEWIC. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand to support the Rohrer amendment, because I believe it is the responsible thing to do. The Budget Secretary cannot forecast into the future, particularly the Medicare or Medicaid area of the welfare budget, because the costs and the programs are out of control to a point where the forecast cannot be made. If we look at next year's budget, we are looking at half a billion to possibly a billion dollars in the hole to start, and it is an election year.

Now, I know the politics here that nobody wants to vote for a tax increase next year. That means the only thing left is to make painful cuts. I believe if we do not get a handle on the budget this year, next year's budget will be impossible.

Therefore, I support this amendment to the budget because it makes sense, it is responsible, and it holds our fiscal house in order. To do otherwise would be irresponsible, and for the last 12 years that I have been here, I know that budgets have increased dramatically over the years. I came here in 1993; our budget was around \$14 billion. We are now close to \$23 billion. At some point we are going to have an implosion for the debt that we are causing upon our constituents. Therefore, I support this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Does the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer, wish to speak for a second time? I apologize.

The gentleman, Mr. Metcalfe.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr.—

The SPEAKER. One second.

Keep the noise levels down. The gentleman is entitled to be heard. Please.

Mr. Metcalfe.

Mr. METCALFE. Mr. Speaker, if it would be appropriate for me to interrogate the maker of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this morning we held a press conference, many of us, some of my colleagues joining me and many outside groups, to call for a constitutional amendment to cap spending by the State of Pennsylvania and to make it a lot harder for us to advance tax increases upon the taxpayers of this Commonwealth. As we are considering this amendment, I have been one that has advocated, as I know you have, the maker of the amendment, to reduce spending by State government, and we have voted against budgets in the past by Governor Rendell and Governor Ridge in the past, and we voted against those budgets that have increased spending. I know for the last 7 years that I have been here, every budget has increased spending continually – every budget, spend, spend, spend. What does this budget amendment do to rein in that continual growth of spending?

Mr. ROHRER. Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the question. What it does is this: This budget alternative, the smart-growth budget, recognizes the fact that we cannot continue to spend at well above the rate of inflation. This budget in fact will do that. The last budget did that. The budget before that did that. We do not have the money to continue to spend at the level that we are spending. This legislature passed a tax increase a year ago December, but the money was all spent. So now we are just spending more; we are continuing to drive the budget up.

In response to my good friend from Philadelphia, this budget is not capricious. It is not arbitrary. It recognizes simple basic principles. Number one, the cuts that the Governor recommended in his budget in executive branch departments we felt were legitimate. He knows his departments. If he thinks that can be done, then we say fine. We built those cuts in. Where those were not the case, we took last year's spending. Every person in here voted for that budget, or most did. That is a place to start. Nobody gets less than last year. That is appropriate. And then this budget that we put before us increases spending fairly significantly in all of the mandatory areas like debt, like transfer payments, and so forth, and then it adds a 2 1/2-percent increase for basic ed and special ed. This budget is a budget that we would be very glad to spend.

Three years ago we passed a zero-growth budget in this House when things got real bad, basically doing just what we have laid out right here today. So this is not a budget that cannot be supported. In fact, it is a budget that we have in a prior time supported.

My friend from Philadelphia said this is wrong-headed. What is wrong-headed about limiting our growth of spending? What is wrong-headed about trying to live within our means? What is wrong-headed about trying to reduce our spending increases to be more in line with what the people in this State are getting average increases in their income? That is not wrong-headed. As a matter of fact, I say that that is quite right-headed.

My friend from Philadelphia said that part of our problem that we have in this Commonwealth is that we are dealing with budget cuts or cuts from Washington, and therefore, we cannot do anything about it. Well, the fact of the matter is, that is what I said earlier. Whether we like it or not, we are getting reductions. So do we plow ahead without any planning? Do we plow ahead and increase our spending anyway? No. The responsible thing would be to take that into account and to back off on that.

And I would have to say in response to his comment as well, I have not seen where this Governor in fact is reducing

spending. Now, look, I do compliment him for things that are in this budget. There were good cuts; there were reductions, and where they are, we compliment that. But what I am drawing attention to is an area of welfare, because it is that budget alone, that line item alone, that is going to give us the maximum amount of grief in this legislature. We cannot walk away from it. Mark my words. If we do not deal with that now, we are going to be here with a tax increase next year. That is a fact of life, and let me state this as a reason why.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Rohrer?

Mr. ROHRER. When the Governor stood here—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Rohrer?

Mr. ROHRER. Is my time up?

The SPEAKER. We will do that in your 5 minutes.

Mr. ROHRER. Okay.

The SPEAKER. The Chair allowed a lot of latitude in answering a simple question because of the fact that the members treated you so disrespectfully the first time.

Is there anyone else that wishes to speak before the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer? Do you want to go before or after the gentleman, Mr. Evans? The gentleman is entitled to 5 minutes. Mr. Evans.

The House will be at ease.

Mr. D. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, the only issue—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. —that I take issue with the gentleman, and he is my friend, so I want to say that on the record. He is my friend. I have the utmost respect for him. But what I do want to say on the record is where I really disagree with him is the last statement he made about a tax increase, the last statement he made about a tax increase, and I want to be very clear about this. The only way, the only way, and the one thing he and I may agree is the only way you are going to have a tax increase is if you spend too much. The fact of the matter is, in the Rendell-proposed budget, he is talking about a reduction of \$900 million, and in next year's budget which he is talking about, there will be a \$500 million problem in medical assistance. So in this year we are dealing with \$400 million in reduction; next year we are going to talk about \$500 million.

So I do not understand – and the gentleman and I are on two different crystal balls – there is not going to be a tax increase. Let me say that again; let me say about reading my lips: There is not going to be a tax increase next year. There is not going to be a tax increase. And I want to be very clear. I want to be very clear, very clear. I want you to understand this clearly, because you only have to understand the numbers: a \$900 million reduction this year, there is going to be a reduction next year, and the fact of the matter is, what the Governor has done, what the Governor basically has done, is he has gradually done a reduction. So from his first year, if you recall with the two budgets that he did in that first year, in that first year, he basically had zero growth in that first year. The second part of that budget, if you recall, he tied the growth connected to the tax increase. In last year's budget, the spending also was reduced.

So I want to be very clear. What I did is I had people go get the printout of the gentleman's amendment, and what I wanted to do is go to the printout, because what I was saying to the gentleman is, basically, the kind of budget that he did, in my view, is he basically did not look at the outcomes, and the choices he made, the choices he made, in my view, Mr. Speaker, were not the kinds of choices that will give the

best outcome for the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

So I understand what he is saying; I understand what his objective is, but I still stick with my point about wrong-headed, wrong direction, and not fitting for the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And on top of that, Mr. Speaker, since in Washington they want to outsource the deficit, because that is basically what has happened: the Federal deficit is being outsourced to the entire United States. Now, there is a choice that has been made in Washington. May you agree or disagree with the choices, the fact of the matter is, as a State, it is being outsourced. So we have one or two choices: We either can make reductions in spending, which the Rendell administration is doing, or we can raise taxes.

The Governor has not proposed any tax increase this year, and obviously he is not going to propose a tax increase next year, because just in case you do not know, it is an election year; just in case you do not know, it is an election year. In my experience, no Governor – Thornburgh, Ridge, Schweiker, Casey, no Governor – I have never seen a General Assembly in my experience, and I have a little experience here, ever raise taxes in an election year. So when the gentleman makes the statement that there is going to be a tax increase, I do not agree with that. I do not agree with that; there is not going to be a tax increase. So we need to be very clear.

So we should not be trying to scare people, we should not be trying to scare people and say if we pass the Rendell budget, there is going to be a tax increase. You know, I go for a lot on this floor and I listen to a lot, but I am not interested in trying to scare people, saying if you pass this budget, magically there is going to be something. There is not going to be a tax increase.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Rohrer.

Mr. ROHRER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My comments will not be long here at the conclusion, but I will say this in response to, again, my good friend's comments. I compliment the Governor on cutting his \$900 million, but do you also know he spent \$2 billion more, because how in the world do you have a budget that is before us that spends 3 1/2 percent more, \$850 million more, than last year? Now, figure out that math.

I am talking about spending. The fact of the matter is, this budget as proposed is 3 1/2 percent more than last year, 4.6 percent the budget before that one, and 5.2 before that. Average them out; they are 5 percent. It is more than the rate of inflation, and we cannot afford it. Now, that is math. So there is no voodoo anything in that. That is just the facts; we can all look at it. That is what we have to deal with.

And the other item I just want to mention as well is this: In the area of welfare, I questioned the Budget Secretary on this, and I am harping on welfare because it is the biggest category now in our budget and it is going up the fastest of any budget. The Governor stood here during his budget address – the Secretary of the Budget confirmed it; the Secretary of Welfare confirmed it – the guidelines for welfare are this: No one on the rolls will be dropped; number two, no tightening of eligibility standards; number three, anyone new who comes into need, whatever that is defined to be, will be added to the rolls. I asked the Budget Secretary, is that not an absolute guarantee for an expansion of the rolls and an expansion in the budgetary obligations? The answer is absolutely yes. So as my friend says

we will not have a tax increase next year, I am saying this: That plan is going to grow the rolls. The Budget Secretary already said we will be a half a billion dollars short with this budget as is. The Federal cutbacks are going to be at least a half a billion more, so we got a billion dollars. We will not have surplus next year of a billion dollars.

This is not unusual math. All I am saying is this: We are going to have a problem. If we avoid it, it will be a miracle. But one thing for sure, the budget alternative before us covers our basic items, provides the increases where they need to occur, produces discipline where it ought to be, and gives us a budget alternative that is reasonable and restrained and responsible, and for that I ask our colleagues and those for us today to vote affirmatively on this amendment.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.
