PENNSYLVANIA STATE POLICE TROOPERS PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. We have several distinguished guests here this afternoon.

At this time the Chair would like to recognize the gentleman from Dauphin, Mr. Marsico.

Mr. MARSICO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Members of the House, it was exactly 100 years ago today that Pennsylvania Governor Samuel Pennypacker signed into law legislation establishing the Pennsylvania State Police as the first uniformed police organization of its kind in the country.

Over the years many things have changed, both within the organization and in our Commonwealth, but one thing that has not changed is the level of commitment and dedication of these officers. From the very beginning, the Pennsylvania State Police troopers have been called upon to serve and protect the citizens of this Commonwealth in the most difficult situations, and each time they have not only risen to the challenge but have done so with great honor and bravery.

Today's troopers are responsible for patrolling more than 72,000 miles of roadways. They provide criminal and drug law enforcement, crime prevention, emergency assistance, liquor control enforcement, and more in all 67 counties across the State. In fact, the State Police serves as the primary, full-time law enforcement agency in 1241 municipalities and serves an additional 548 municipalities on a part-time basis. The State Police is also on the frontlines of the effort to secure our homeland in the fight against terrorism.

The men and women of the State Police are to be commended for their hard work and their commitment and bravery in protecting the public safety of our citizens. Their task is monumental, but they continue to prove themselves more than capable of doing the job right and doing the job very well. Their core purpose is to seek justice, preserve peace, and improve the quality of life for all. Congratulations to all of our troopers for a job well done.

I want to especially thank our State Police Commissioner, Col. Jeffrey Miller, who will give brief remarks after this presentation, for his outstanding service to the agency and to the Commonwealth. I have known Colonel Miller for many years, and I cannot think of a better person to lead our State's top law enforcement agency.

I also want to extend thanks and appreciation to Lt. Col. Ralph Periandi, the Deputy Commissioner of Operations at the State Police, and Capt. William McHale, who many of us know due to his outstanding work in the State Police Legislative Affairs Office.

Thank you, gentlemen, and would you please stand for recognition.

Congratulations on the first 100 years, and best wishes for continued success in the next 100 years.

I present to you Col. Jeffrey Miller for remarks.

COLONEL MILLER. Good afternoon.

Mr. Speaker, Majority Leader Smith, Minority Leader DeWeese, and members of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives:

It is indeed an honor and a privilege to stand before this honorable body and represent thousands of past and present department personnel as you acknowledge the Pennsylvania

State Police on this historic milestone of 100 years of faithful service to the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

During the late 1800s, our society experienced great change as Pennsylvania grew from a largely agricultural State into a complex industrial center, but this rapid change was not without cultural strife as bitter labor disputes arose around the coal fields, iron mills, textile factories, and railroad yards. The turning point came in 1902 when the great anthracite coal strike began on May 15 and lasted until October 23. The violence that erupted caused a nationwide coal shortage that subsided only after President Theodore Roosevelt intervened.

In the strike's aftermath, it was finally recognized that peace and order would be possible only through the creation of a strong, dedicated, and impartial police force employed by the public. And so it was that the Pennsylvania State Police was created as an executive department of State government by legislation signed into law by Gov. Samuel W. Pennypacker on May 2, 1905, becoming the first uniformed police organization of its kind in the United States.

Under the command of Supt. John C. Groom, 228 troopers accepted the awesome task of patrolling Pennsylvania's entire 45,000 square miles in an era ripe with violence and turmoil. Throughout our 100-year history, thousands of dedicated members of the Pennsylvania State Police have and continue to place themselves in harm's way each and every day. Ninety troopers have made the ultimate sacrifice rather than swerve from the path of duty.

We have advanced from horseback to air-conditioned vehicles and from pen and paper to mobile office. We have taken on many challenges but remain dedicated to our core purpose: to seek justice, preserve peace, and improve the quality of life for all. And now after a century of service, we stand ready to advance in the face of an unknown future, confident in our mission and strong in our convictions, for it matters not that the road is hard but that we carry justice and righteousness as our shield and mandate.

As Commissioner and on behalf of all department personnel, we thank you for recognizing the contributions of the Pennsylvania State Police on this very special day.

Thank you very much.

STEELTON-HIGHSPIRE HIGH SCHOOL BOYS BASKETBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. At this time the Chair would recognize the gentleman from Dauphin, Mr. Buxton, for the purposes of a citation.

Mr. BUXTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I am pleased to honor the Steelton-Highspire High School Boys Basketball Team for capturing the 2004-2005 State PIAA Class AAA Championship.

Joining me on the podium this afternoon are Dr. Kenneth Kitch, superintendent of the school; coach Rick Binder; and team captains Tristan Crawford and Tramayne Hawthorne.

Under the expert guidance of head coach Rick Binder and his assistants, the team completed the season with a record of 32 wins and 3 losses. They captured their fourth State title since 1992 by defeating the Johnstown Trojans.

The Steel-High Rollers are the only school in Pennsylvania with two 2,000-point scorers in the same 4 years – Tramayne Hawthorne and Tristan Crawford. This team has brought pride to Steelton and Highspire by showing the same grit and toughness that built the two communities.

It is my honor to present the Steel-High Basketball Team to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. The team is seated in the rear of the House with their assistant coaches and athletic director. Let us give them a warm welcome for this State championship.

TRISTAN CRAWFORD HONORED

Mr. BUXTON. In addition to the team State championship, we want to honor today Tristan Crawford. He is a senior at Steel-High. He has amassed 2141 career points, making him the second all-time leading scorer in school history. Tristan averaged 23.7 points per game and led his Rollers with 69 three-pointers this season. He scored 30 points for his team at the State championship and 28 points at the District III championship, where he surpassed the 2,000 point mark.

I am pleased to honor Tristan not only for his excellent skill and effort in competing on a level which demands perfection but also to honor his selection as the 2005 Associated Press Pennsylvania Class AAA Boys High School Player of the Year. Tristan Crawford.

RICK BINDER HONORED

Mr. BUXTON. And finally, but not least, a period of 7 years has produced 179 wins, 44 losses, 2 Mid-Penn Commonwealth championships, 6 District III championships, 1 District III runner-up, 3 Eastern State championships, 3 State championships, a playoff record of 51 wins and 5 losses – an impressive career. These are the numbers and career history for Rick Binder at Steelton-Highspire High School. Coach Binder has been selected as the 2005 Associated Press Pennsylvania Class AAA Boys High School Coach of the Year.

I want to congratulate Coach Binder and the rest of the team for his guidance and for bringing Steelton-Highspire School District the championships that they solely deserve.

I am wondering if the lady would just briefly explain the amendment and the need for it.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What amendment 776 to HB 267 does is it provides some parameters by which we will allow the municipality to fund these watershed associations.

Mr. Speaker, we also are providing for them to be able to use the funds that were given to them by the municipality for administrative costs, such as office rent, stationery and supplies, along with their regular duties as far as stream cleanup.

Mr. Speaker, we also in this amendment ensure, through language, that the funds that they are getting, because they are public tax dollars, cannot be used to sue any individual landowner within that municipality or the municipality itself.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. I would just like to continue with interrogation, if I could.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman.

Mr. VITALI. Two questions. One, have any significant environmental groups weighed in for or against this amendment, and are there any specific fact scenarios which have already happened that you are trying to avoid?

Mrs. MILLER. Mr. Speaker, as far as environmental groups weighing in on my amendment, I am not aware that any have weighed in either in favor of or opposing this.

What we are saying in this amendment is that these nonprofit watersheds doing the work that they normally do, which is wetland restoration, streambank stabilization, riparian buffer restoration, waterway cleanup involving removal of trash or other manmade debris, and also working to eliminate acid mine drainage, that these are the parameters under which they can spend these local municipal tax dollars.

This does not preclude these watershed associations from using any other sources of revenues that they have to do the work that might fall outside of these very typical parameters under which they currently operate.

Mr. VITALI. I was just thinking of a scenario where perhaps there might be a local landowner in some way degrading a stream and a group, environmental group, a watershed group, may feel that the best use of their funds might be to try to prevent that degradation from continuing. I just want to know how you might react to that.

Mrs. MILLER. Mr. Speaker, when it comes to regulating the Clean Streams Act in Pennsylvania, we have the Department of Environmental Protection. We also fund local conservation districts that are charged with that responsibility of regulation.

Mr. Speaker, it is not the typical job of a watershed association to go out and start doing regulatory work, and therefore, this is what we are suggesting that they continue to do

what they do best, which is work for the environment along these streambanks.

The majority required by the Constitution having voted in the affirmative, the question was determined in the affirmative and the bill passed finally.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the suspension of the rules.

This amendment would stop something that we just enacted into law recently, by an overwhelming vote of the legislature, and has not even had a chance to take effect. It is something requested by the Liquor Control Board and by the Food and Commercial Workers Union. So I would oppose suspension of the rules.

The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman, Mr. DeWeese, defer to the gentleman, Mr. Petrarca?

Not seeing the gentleman, it is assumed that the gentleman, Mr. Petrarca—

Mr. PETRARCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In late November last year, after Veterans Day, we passed HB 2105 that was, in a sense, an omnibus bill dealing with the Liquor Code, and what we did is we permitted the LCB to open liquor stores on Veterans Day. What my amendment simply does, at the request of a number of veterans from my area, it once again inserts Veterans Day as a holiday and therefore causes liquor stores to be closed on Veterans Day.

Amend Title, page 1, line 17, by striking out "entity." " and inserting

entity"; authorizing an alcohol access control tax credit; and imposing powers and duties on the Secretary of Revenue.

Amend Bill, page 3, line 22, by striking out all of said line and inserting

Section 2. The act is amended by adding an article to read:

ARTICLE VIII-A

ALCOHOL ACCESS CONTROL TAX CREDITS

Section 801-A. Scope.

This article authorizes alcohol access control tax credits.

Section 802-A. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this article shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Alcohol access control tax credit." The credit provided under this article.

"Department." The Department of Revenue of the Commonwealth.

"Qualified alcohol access control expense." That expense incurred by a taxpayer for the purchase and use of technology or software intended to control the access of minors to alcohol and which is capable of:

(1) Capturing the information from a magnetic strip on a Pennsylvania driver's license or identification card issued by the Department of Transportation.

(2) Producing a declaration of age in print, audible or visual form.

(3) Prompting a cashier for age verification when a purchase of alcohol is recorded by the point-of-sale system.

"Qualified tax liability." The liability for taxes imposed under Article III, IV or VI of the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971.

"Secretary." The Secretary of Revenue of the Commonwealth.

"Taxpayer." An entity licensed by the Liquor Control Board to sell alcohol to a consumer.

Section 803-A. Credit for alcohol access control expenses.

(a) Application for credit by taxpayer.—A taxpayer who incurs a qualified alcohol access control expense in a taxable year may apply for an alcohol access control tax credit as provided in this article. In order to receive the credit, the taxpayer must submit an application to the department by September 15 for a qualified alcohol access control expense incurred in the taxable year that ended in the prior calendar year.

(b) Amount of credit.—A taxpayer that timely applies under subsection (a) shall receive an alcohol access control tax credit for the taxable year up to the amount of \$500 per license per location.

(c) Notification of approval from department.—By December 15 of the calendar year following the close of the taxable year during which the qualified alcohol access control expense was incurred, the department shall notify the taxpayer of the amount of the taxpayer's alcohol access control tax credit approved by the department.

Section 804-A. Use of credit.

(a) Carryover.—

(1) The amount of the alcohol access control tax credit that a taxpayer may use against any one qualified tax liability during any year may not exceed 50% of the qualified tax liability for that taxable year.

(2) If the taxpayer cannot use the entire amount of the alcohol access control tax credit for the taxable year in which the alcohol access control tax credit is first approved, then the excess may be carried over to succeeding taxable years and used as a credit against the qualified tax liability of the taxpayer for those taxable years.

(3) Each time that the alcohol access control tax credit is carried over to a succeeding taxable year, it shall be reduced by the amount that was used as a credit during the immediately preceding taxable year.

(4) The alcohol access control tax credit may be carried over and applied to succeeding taxable years for not more than four taxable years following the first taxable year for which the taxpayer was entitled to claim the credit.

(b) Taxable year to which applied.—An alcohol access control tax credit approved by the department for qualified alcohol access control expense in a taxable year first shall be applied against the taxpayer's qualified tax liability for the current taxable year as of the date on which the credit was approved before the alcohol access control tax credit is applied against any tax liability under subsection (a).

(c) Limitations.—A taxpayer may not carry back, obtain a refund of or assign an unused alcohol access control tax credit.

Section 805-A. Determination of qualified alcohol access control expenses.

In prescribing standards for determining which alcohol access control expense is to be deemed a qualified alcohol access control expense for purposes of computing the credit provided by this article, the department shall require:

(1) A copy of the technology or software specifications demonstrating that the specifications meet the definition of a qualified alcohol access control expense.

(2) A copy of an invoice to the taxpayer for the technology or software purchased for qualification as a qualified alcohol access control expense.

(3) A copy of the check or checks and paid receipts for technology or software purchased for qualifications as qualified alcohol access control expense.

Section 806-A. Time limitation.

A taxpayer is not entitled to an alcohol access control tax credit for qualified alcohol access control expenses incurred in taxable years ending after December 31, 2009.

Section 807-A. Limitation on credits.

The cumulative amount of alcohol access control tax credits approved by the department under this article shall not exceed \$5,000,000. If the amount of alcohol access control tax credits applied for by taxpayers in any taxable year exceeds the remaining authorized amount for such credits under this section, then the alcohol access control tax credit to be received by each applicant for that taxable year shall be the product of the remaining authorized amount multiplied by the quotient of the alcohol access control tax credit applied for by the applicant divided by the total of all alcohol access control tax credits applied for by all applicants.

Section 808-A. Pennsylvania S corporation shareholder pass-through.

(a) General rule.—If a Pennsylvania S corporation does not have an eligible tax liability against which the alcohol access control tax credit may be applied, a shareholder of the Pennsylvania S corporation is entitled to an alcohol access control tax credit equal to the alcohol access control tax credit determined for the Pennsylvania S corporation for the taxable year multiplied by the percentage of the Pennsylvania S corporation's distributive income to which the shareholder is entitled.

(b) Double use of credit prohibited.—A Pennsylvania S corporation and a shareholder of a Pennsylvania S corporation may not claim a credit under this article for the same qualified alcohol access control expense.

Section 809-A. Report to General Assembly.

The secretary shall submit an annual report to the General Assembly indicating the effectiveness of the credit provided by this article not later than March 15 following the year in which the credits are approved. The report shall include the number of taxpayers utilizing the credit as of the date of the report and the amount of credits approved and utilized. The report may also include any recommendations for changes in the calculation or administration of the credit.

Section 810-A. Expiration.

The department may not approve an alcohol access control tax credit under this article for taxable years ending after December 31, 2009.

Section 811-A. Regulations.

The secretary shall promulgate regulations necessary for the implementation and administration of this article.

Section 3. This act shall take effect as follows:

(1) The addition of Article VIII-A of the act shall take effect in 60 days.

(2) This section shall take effect immediately.

(3) The remainder of this act shall take effect immediately.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Pallone.

Mr. PALLONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment has already been agreed to unanimously by the House under a prior bill. We are trying to run it again. It is nothing more than allowing for a tax credit for any liquor establishment to have a magnetic reader so that it can read driver's licenses and other LCB identification cards to ensure that minors do not purchase liquor in Pennsylvania. It is a good control device for controlling alcohol distribution to adults only, and it excludes the minors, more certainly, from the purchase of alcoholic beverages not only in the bars but also in the beer distributors and other liquor establishments.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Raymond.

Mr. RAYMOND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Amend Sec. 2, page 2, line 22, by striking out all of said line and inserting

Section 2. Section 461.1(a) and (f) of the act, amended June 18, 1998 (P.L.664, No.86) and December 20, 2000 (P.L.992, No.141), are amended to read:

Section 461.1. Incorporated Units of National Veterans' Organizations.—(a) The board shall have the authority to issue new

licenses to incorporated units of national veterans' organizations, as defined herein, in counties where the number of licenses exceeds the limitation prescribed by section 461. The board shall also have the authority to issue new club liquor licenses and club retail dispenser licenses to incorporated units of national veterans' organizations in any municipality in this Commonwealth regardless of whether the local option requirements of section 472 have been met.

(f) For purposes of this section, [a municipality which permits the issuance of club liquor licenses] the authority of the board to issue new club liquor licenses to incorporated units of national veterans' organizations also permits the transfer of such licenses to an affiliated organization of the incorporated unit of the national veterans' organization.

Section 3. This act shall take effect as follows:

(1) The amendment of section 461.1(a) and (f) of the act shall take effect in 60 days.

(2) The remainder of this act shall take effect immediately.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Belfanti.

Mr. BELFANTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Simply put, Mr. Speaker, this amendment would exempt military service clubs and organizations from the quotas that might be issued in a community that is considered a dry community. There is precedent for this, Mr. Speaker. We do it for golf courses, publicly and privately owned golf courses. And this amendment is being offered on behalf of the State War Veterans Committee, which is comprised of the VFWs (Veterans of Foreign Wars), the American Legions, the AMVETS, the Disabled Vets, the Marine Corps League, the Catholic War Vets, et cetera, et cetera.

There are very few dry municipalities in this Commonwealth; however, Mr. Speaker, many of these veterans' organizations must now operate speakeasies for their members. To keep their membership afloat, they need to have clubs, and to keep those clubs open, of course, they have to serve alcohol. So we are trying to make them legal, allow them to purchase a liquor license irrespective as to whether or not the community is considered dry. And again, these clubs are not open to the general public. They are only open to their own members who are veterans.

In light of what is going on in both Afghanistan and Iraq, I would hope that the members of the House, as it has done on previous occasions, vote this amendment in, and let us see how it goes in the Senate.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Raymond.

Mr. RAYMOND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the prior speaker makes some compelling arguments on behalf of the amendment. I would suggest for members on our side of the aisle that you should vote your district and decide upon it based on your own experience in your district.

I have a son who is in the Air Force, and I know a lot of veterans. I have a lot of veterans' groups in my district. I know how I am going to vote, but I would suggest you vote your own way. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Clymer. Mr. CLYMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I think we all recognize the fact of what our veterans mean to us and the fact that they are certainly our heroes, and we appreciate their service to our country and all the wonderful work that they have done, the sacrifice, the role models that they are. And we are inspired daily as we recognize their heroics not only in Afghanistan and Iraq but around the world. They are certainly people we need to continue to support.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment deals with a local municipality, a local government, to make that issue. I think we are taking away that right from them, and I think this is something that we should not be doing. We should allow local government to make that determination as to whether or not there should be a liquor license in that community, and so if for some reason in their wisdom and experience they have decided to become dry, then we should uphold that desire of the people who represent that district.

So I would ask the members respectfully to be a "no" vote on this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman. Mr. Belfanti.

Mr. BELFANTI. If there are no other speakers on this issue, Mr. Speaker, I would be glad to offer my remarks.

Again, the State liquor law already provides for certain exemptions in dry communities for publicly and privately owned golf courses.

Mr. Speaker, the House has on previous sessions adopted this amendment to other bills. Unfortunately, those bills were never taken up in the Senate.

But again, Mr. Speaker, I respect the right of any community to vote to be dry. This is a very limited amendment. It only applies to VFWs and American Legions, and in many of these communities, these clubs are already operating as speakeasies. They are unlicensed. They want to be licensed. They want to pay the State that license fee. They want to pay their local municipality that license fee. But they cannot because the law does not provide for them to obtain a license, when they have a golf course a half a mile down the road where people can congregate and drink.

Mr. Speaker, again, this is for our veterans. Our statewide veterans' organizations have requested this legislation, and I would hope that as the chairman of the Liquor Committee indicated, everyone here votes their district on this bill, but please keep in mind the sacrifices of all Pennsylvania veterans while doing so. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.
The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Vitali.
Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Could we just have a brief explanation of this bill?

The SPEAKER. Mr. Sather indicates that he will give a brief explanation of the bill.

Mr. Sather, you are recognized. I am sorry.

Mr. SATHER. Mr. Speaker, the intent of this legislation is to provide to foster parents consideration, consideration only. It does not prioritize but gives them an opportunity to be considered by the children agencies in the Commonwealth for consideration of adoption of children that they have in their care.

This is the, I think, third year that we have had this bill. It passed unanimously the last session.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. So it is the agency who makes the decision?

Mr. SATHER. Absolutely.

Mr. VITALI. You know, I do not know too much about this, but I understand generally that the concept of foster care is you are not supposed to get attached to the child because, at all times, you are supposed to realize that you are just sort of a temporary holding area. I mean, is that not true?

Mr. SATHER. Mr. Speaker, that is not my understanding, the time that I spent back in the county government. Children have every right to expect permanency in their lives and caring people.

There is no expectation or understanding that the foster parents will become, if the opportunity should arise, the family that the children might be placed with. But I think a caring family is absolutely necessary, and to detach oneself from that individual, I think, would not be fair.

Mr. VITALI. I used to, in a former life, do some family law and had the domestic relations courses in law school, and I just generally remember that, you know, foster care is supposed to be this institution between, a waiting area for adoption, and foster parents, their missions were not to view their role as permanent but just as an ongoing service to various children and sort of as a holding area until you could get adopted children, until you could get them to that permanent home, and foster care is never really viewed as permanent. Am I getting that down right, that concept?

Mr. SATHER. I think partially you are, Mr. Speaker. The fact is, though, there is no understanding— When these children are placed in a foster parent home, we do not know whether they are going to get permanent placement with an adoption. So to discord oneself or keep oneself separated from

that child in a loving community, possibly with other children, because a lot of these foster parents are foster parents to more than one, but there is no given, there is no understanding that these families, these caring families, will be given consideration, but just to have no concern or care about a child in your placement, I do not think that is even real-world ethics.

Mr. VITALI. So it is the county social service agencies who make this placement, right?

Mr. SATHER. That is absolutely correct.

Mr. VITALI. Has this group weighed in one way or the other on your bill? Have they taken a position for or against your bill?

Mr. SATHER. They have not been for or against. DPW (Department of Public Welfare) has been for the bill in the past.

Mr. VITALI. DPW is for?

Mr. SATHER. They have been for it.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question recurring,

Shall the bill pass finally?
