An Act enabling certain counties and municipalities to develop comprehensive watershed storm water plans and to regulate storm water within designated watershed boundaries; imposing duties and conferring powers on the Department of Environmental Protection, the Environmental Quality Board, counties and municipalities; and providing for financing and for waiver of use of certain grant or loan funds.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Mr. **FREEMAN** offered the following amendment No. **A01010:** 

Amend Sec. 4, page 4, line 17, by striking out "or second class A" and inserting

, second class A or third class,

On the question, Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Freeman, for a brief explanation.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My amendment basically would add third-class counties to those counties that could opt in to the comprehensive storm water management proposal that the gentleman, Mr. Steil, has brought before us today.

My county of Northampton County has experienced extreme flooding in the course of the last year. Twice we have been badly hit by flooding, and it is believed that a good portion of that is the result of poor storm water management. So our ability to opt in to this would be beneficial to the people of Northampton County, and we would extend this option to all counties of the third class.

I urge a "yes" vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentlelady, Mrs. Miller.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The lady is entitled to be heard.

Mrs. MILLER. Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to amendment 1010.

Mr. Speaker, in many of our third-class counties, there are considerable rural areas that still remain. What this bill if amended with the amendment 1010 would do is to require that a fee be assessed to all residents of that county in order to fund storm water management. Mr. Speaker, this fee would be placed on farmers, on residents of rural areas, where there is not high density – a lot of macadam, a lot of roof space. Mr. Speaker, this would be an additional tax on those residents, and I ask that we oppose this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentlelady.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Grucela.

Mr. GRUCELA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of my colleague, Representative Freeman's amendment. To echo his remarks, and I know all the 67 counties are unique in their various terrains in whether they are getting development or not, but Northampton County, as Representative Freeman stated, has undergone a tremendous amount of growth, a tremendous amount of development, and I know our legislative offices have been dealing, even before the two major storms of last winter and spring, with storm water runoff development. This gives the counties the opportunity to do a plan so that we can regulate the storm water in a much more manageable way.

So I would ask for a "yes" vote on Representative Freeman's amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Freeman.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, just to make a very important clarification here, there is nothing under the gentleman, Mr. Steil's legislation or my amendment that would mandate that a county have to participate in the comprehensive watershed plan. It is solely an optional tool to allow those counties that have been experiencing serious storm water problems to be able to opt in and to utilize it to address those problems.

So for those counties of the third class that would be rural, I doubt seriously they would want to participate, because they probably do not have the same level of storm water management problems. But for those that do, I urge the members to give them that authority, to allow them to address a serious problem which is going on in a lot of counties of the third class and has some tremendous negative effects on the environment and on the ability of those counties to cope with storm water problems.

So I urge them to support my amendment to allow for them to participate in this optional proposal. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the prime sponsor of the bill stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. Mr. Steil indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Now, I know we have discussed and debated this on the House floor before, but I just wanted to really thresh out the fee aspect of this. If the gentleman could just explain what fee this would authorize counties to charge, in what form would that fee come, the limit of that fee. Just thresh out the fee portion of this, if the gentleman could.

Mr. STEIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

There are two forms to the fee. The county, first of all, we have to emphasize that this is an optional bill for counties. It is a tool in the county's toolbox to manage significant storm water issues within that county. In order to pay for the planning and implementation of that, it allows the county to impose a fee on residential and business properties in order to fund those storm water improvements necessary within that county.

For residential properties, it is a flat fee. The flat fee is estimated to be, at least in some of the larger counties like Bucks County, somewhere between \$40 or \$50 a year to generate sufficient revenue. For business properties, it is based on square footage of impervious surface.

Mr. VITALI. Now, why, to fund this, are not counties simply increasing their county property tax by the amount necessary to fund this? Why are we seeking to have a different fee authorized?

Mr. STEIL. There is nothing that prevents a county from doing that if that is the wish, if that is the way they go. However, we are trying to ensure that property owners have a connection to the issue of storm water, the management of storm water, the planning of storm water, and in effect, the use of the public storm water drainage way so that in effect one could say that this is a user fee that all properties are responsible for the public storm water drainage system.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. So the county can do it by just increasing their millage, and if they did that, it would just be that each property owner would be paying based on the assessed value of their property. But under this system, it would be a flat fee, so each individual homeowner would be paying the identical amount?

Mr. STEIL. That is correct.

Mr. VITALI. But it would be each homeowner; it would not be just certain homeowners in a watershed. It would be, if a fee is imposed, it would be a flat fee on every single homeowner.

Mr. STEIL. That is correct.

Mr. VITALI. Is there any issue with regard to the taxing of business properties versus residential properties here?

Mr. STEIL. The only issue that was expressed to us is those businesses that have direct NPDES (National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System) discharge permits. In other words, they already have Federal authority to discharge water directly from their sites to the public water courses, generally rivers. In that case, the county is authorized to offset those fees

or to encourage those businesses that manage and detain storm water on their properties to have a reduced fee.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have no further questions.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

### **CONSIDERATION OF HB 88 CONTINUED**

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady, Mrs. Miller.

Mrs. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, before any of you who have now been included in this legislation, who have constituents in third-class cities, vote in favor of this bill, understand that while we keep hearing that this is an optional bill for our county commissioners to avail themselves of, if the county commissioners do in fact impose this on the county residents, it means that every constituent that you have, whether in urbanized portions of your county or in very rural farmland areas, is going to be paying this additional storm water fee. Mr. Speaker, understand that the problems that we are all facing because of uncontrolled growth and development have been passed on then by the builders, the homebuilders, the construction builders of Pennsylvania, on to the backs of every constituent to pick up the tab for not controlling the storm water that is going to be leaving the properties and has now become a public burden.

Mr. Speaker, I do appreciate the fact that in some older residential areas, because of new growth coming in and overloading storm sewer systems, these people are faced with additional costs. However, Mr. Speaker, I am extremely concerned about the umbrella that this is placing over areas that are in third-class counties that in fact allow for the recharge of surface water. We are in fact going to be taxing farmers, we are going to be taxing owners of forest land, in order to control the storm water of urban growth, and, Mr. Speaker, I do not feel that that is an appropriate way to finance storm water management in the Commonwealth. Therefore, I will be voting "no" on this legislation until those areas that should not be included in this kind of assessment are excluded from the bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentlelady.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bucks, Mr. Steil.

Mr. STEIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I need to correct a serious misstatement in the previous comments. This bill does nothing to alter the responsibility of developers in their projects. It only affects projects that are old and completed, projects built in the twenties, thirties, forties, fifties, sixties, up through the creation of Act 167 in 1978. That act placed the responsibility for storm water management for new development going forward on the developer. It does not place that responsibility on the homeowners.

Very clearly, this proposal does not alleviate any of the responsibilities that a developer has under Act 167. We are only seeking to give the counties authority to go back and fix old developments that are causing serious stream flooding

internally in the counties, old projects for which there are no responsible parties left.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentleman, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to follow up on interrogation and make one more point, if I could.

One of the staff has brought to my attention, this fee, it is my understanding that tax-exempt organizations like churches and other nonprofits would still have to pay it, unlike other property taxes. Is that correct?

Mr. STEIL. That is correct, because those properties also contribute storm water to the system.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. George.

Mr. GEORGE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I believe we are missing— I believe we are missing the point.

The SPEAKER. The Chair cannot hear the gentleman. Please keep the noise levels down. The gentleman is entitled to be heard.

Mr. GEORGE. There are very few problems that we face as citizens of this Commonwealth that we are able to remediate on our own. That is the reason that, rightfully so, we depend on this Commonwealth to be able to bring about the necessary funding and the needed alleviation to whatever it takes in rules, regulations, and such. This bill is a rightful bill that is long overdue. But please remember, whether it is mining, whether it is the 3,000 miles of degradated streams, whether it is the 400,000 acres in western Pennsylvania of destroyed land, the fact still remains, the reason that many of those acres and miles of those streams were not able to be handled is because, under the law, you cannot use any of the grant money to be able to get ingress and regress to take land positions or whatever.

This bill is proper. Until something better comes along, I would urge that we would do what we can do now, to support the Steil bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

### **STATEMENT BY MR. BENNINGHOFF**

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Benninghoff.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Mr. Speaker, a point of personal privilege, if I might.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will state his point.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. I just want to take a quick moment to recognize a gentleman from my legislative area. Some of you know that I live in Bellefonte. We like to proudly boast about being the home of five past Governors, a couple Senators, and maybe even a decent House member. But there is a nice young man named Jeremy Rose, who is a 1998 Bellefonte High School graduate, who is also the jockey who rides Afleet Alex.

I would like to recognize Jeremy for two reasons. Number one, Jeremy is an old wrestler from Bellefonte. Jeremy was a walk-on in Bellefonte who became a State qualifier in wrestling at a whole 103 pounds. In 1998 when he graduated, the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) changed their weight classifications from 118 to 126, and Jeremy experienced something that few of us ever did that wrestled, and that was, he could not make weight. But Jeremy could not make weight because he did not weigh enough, so his mother inspired him to go on to a different sport, and that was the sport of a horse jockey.

Well, as you know, Jeremy rode in the Kentucky Derby at the young age of 26 and came in third place, and only 3 weeks later ran in the next race, the Preakness Stakes, and by a remarkable victory took first place. I would like to recognize Jeremy, one, because we are very proud of him, but number two, because of his determination. If you watched the race in the Preakness Stakes, his horse actually buckled, and Jeremy, through his strength of 110 pounds, held on to that horse, kept it upright, and continued through, not only just to finish the race but to win that, and I think it is a great example not only of a great horse but of a great jockey and a great young man who, to me, is an example of hard work and self-determination.

I am very proud, as a member of the House of Representatives, to recognize Jeremy Rose and his trainer and the owners of the horse who have gone on to also promote the lemonade stand in honor of the young lady, the 8-year-old, who died of cancer. So this is just a great success story for everyone involved, and I appreciate the members' indulgence, and I thank you, Mr. Speaker, as well.

HB 1281, PN 1525
