The SPEAKER. It is moved by the gentleman, Mr. Quigley, that the House do concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Would someone stand for interrogation, because I just have a couple of questions.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Adolph, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman, Mr. Vitali, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This obviously is Growing Greener, an important piece of legislation, and it among other things distributes \$625 million in bond proceeds. My first question is repaying the bond. What is the source of funds to repay the bond debt?

Mr. ADOLPH. Tipping fee, the existing tipping fee.

Mr. VITALI. Are we sure on that point, because I think it may be a variance with some information I have previously received.

Mr. ADOLPH. Yes.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. And when does that start? In other words, let us say—

Mr. ADOLPH. The second year.

Mr. VITALI. I am sorry?

Mr. ADOLPH. The second year will be the first payment.

Mr. VITALI. Now, would that be the \$4 per ton tipping fee on trash that goes to landfills?

Mr. ADOLPH. The tipping fee is currently at \$4.25, and a portion of that will be used to pay the debt.

Mr. VITALI. And right now that money goes toward Growing Greener projects, right?

Mr. ADOLPH. That is correct.

Mr. VITALI. I mean, and I want you to be sure on this, are you saying that since almost right away the bond proceeds will be taken from that, repaid by the tipping fee then, will that money be taken away from existing Growing Greener programs? In other words, the moneys going to the bond debt?

Mr. ADOLPH. There is a net increase.

Mr. VITALI. You are not suggesting the tipping fee is increasing in this, are you?

Mr. ADOLPH. No, I am not suggesting that at all.

Mr. VITALI. Okay.

Mr. ADOLPH. We are increasing the spending. I saw your e-mail earlier, and if we can work from your e-mail—

Mr. VITALI. No, I do not want to work from my e-mail; I just want to ask questions about the bill. My question—

Mr. ADOLPH. Because your e-mail is completely incorrect.

Mr. VITALI. That would be a time for another discussion. But my point—

Mr. ADOLPH. Well, let us discuss it.

The SPEAKER. Would the gentleman suspend.

The gentleman, Mr. Vitali, is entitled to ask any questions that he would like about the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The gentleman, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. What I am trying to get at is, will moneys to pay off the bond in years 1, 2, 3, 4 be taken from existing Growing Greener programs?

Mr. ADOLPH. No.

Mr. VITALI. Is it going to be taken from the tipping fee, which currently funds existing Growing Greener programs?

Mr. ADOLPH. Yes.

Mr. VITALI. So is it going to be a loss then to those—

Mr. ADOLPH. No.

Mr. VITALI. And how do you reconcile those two apparently irreconcilable facts?

Mr. ADOLPH. We get back to your e-mail.

Mr. VITALI. I am not asking— The e-mail is not under debate now.

Mr. ADOLPH. Okay. But your e-mail refers to whether there is going to be a net loss or a net gain, and I can show you where there will be a net gain in the environmental programs.

Mr. VITALI. What I am really trying to get at is, if the bonds are being paid from the tipping fee and the tipping fee is funding current Growing Greener programs, how come we are not taking money from existing Growing Greener programs?

Mr. ADOLPH. I believe you are not adding in to your calculation the proceeds from the bond that will go toward the environmental programs.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Please explain that then.

Mr. ADOLPH. I will be glad to.

The \$625 million will be allocated - okay? - the following way: \$230 million to the Department of Environmental Protection for watershed protection, mine and acid mine remediation, oil and gas well plugging, advanced energy projects, flood protection, geological hazard mitigation, and brownfields remediation. Included in that \$230 million, Mr. Speaker, is at least \$60 million for acid mine drainage abatement and mine cleanup, also up to \$10 million annually to the Pennsylvania Energy Development Authority for advanced energy projects. Also in that allocation to DEP will be up to \$5 million annually to DCED (Department of Community and Economic Development) for brownfields remediation. We also have \$217 1/2 million to the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for improvements to our State parks and State forests, community parks and recreation programs, and open space preservation. Out of that \$217 1/2 million, at least \$100 million for improvements to State parks and State forests, \$90 million for open space conservation—

Mr. VITALI. Excuse me. Could I stop you there for just a second?

Mr. ADOLPH. Sure.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Vitali, the gentleman was answering a question. I asked him to stop when he was doing that to you; you will have to wait for the gentleman to be finished.

The gentleman, Mr. Adolph.

Mr. ADOLPH. I am trying to explain how the \$625 million from the bond is going to be allocated into these environmental programs.

Mr. VITALI. But that is not really my question.

Mr. ADOLPH. I believe it was; I believe it was. I think the gentleman was—

Mr. VITALI. Would it be better if I restated my question?

Mr. ADOLPH. Well, we have existing tipping fees and we have new money of \$625 million. You have to combine those two in order to find out whether you are going to have a net increase or a net decrease. In your calculations, you do not include the existing tipping fees in your calculation, and I refer to your e-mail—

Mr. VITALI. Again, my e-mail is irrelevant here. I am just trying to ask you to explain the bill.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Vitali, Mr. Vitali, address the Chair. You do not address Mr. Adolph.

Mr. VITALI. Shall I ask another question?

The SPEAKER. If the gentleman would like to ask another question, ask the question.

Mr. VITALI. Let me move on to the capital improvement projects designation. This, I believe, is \$90 million that the counties can earmark for projects in their counties to be paid for by the bond proceeds. What I really want to get at is and I want to get the record clear as to whether the county can substitute Growing Greener money for projects they heretofore have been using county dollars for. Could you speak to whether under this bill counties can or cannot substitute State Growing Greener bond moneys for county dollars?

Mr. ADOLPH. No.

Mr. VITALI. In other words, you are saying if a county has a-

The SPEAKER. He answered the question, Mr. Vitali. If the gentleman has another question, you may ask that question.

Mr. VITALI. I just wanted to make the record clear that it is the intent—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Vitali, you asked a question. The gentleman answered your question. He made the record perfectly clear. If you have another question, ask the question.

STATEMENT BY MR. ADOLPH

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Adolph.

Mr. ADOLPH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, because of the hour I would like to submit my remarks for the record, and I would like to thank my staff, Chairman George, my members of the Environmental Committee, Senator White and her staff, for working very hard on this. I hope I did not leave anybody out, and I think we have a good bill here and we are going to improve the environment in Pennsylvania for the entire Commonwealth.

Thank you very much.

Mr. ADOLPH submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HB 3, otherwise known as Green PA, builds upon the already successful Growing Greener Program signed into law in 1999 under the Ridge administration.

Green PA will provide \$625 million over 6 years to continue the funding of essential environmental initiatives in the Commonwealth. We will do this without imposing any new fees or taxes on Pennsylvania families and businesses.

Green PA was created following public hearings conducted by the Green Ribbon Commission, which was a bipartisan committee including members from the House, Senate, and administration.

In May, Pennsylvania voters overwhelmingly voted in favor of investing \$625 million in the State's top environmental programs, including open space and farmland preservation, watershed protection, mine reclamation, water and sewer system support, and the State's Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund.

With this allocation we will be able to provide some impressive increases in funding for many of our environmental programs. For example, farmland preservation, which is currently receiving \$20 million annually, will, under Green PA, receive more than \$43 million annually, more than double the current amount. Open space preservation, which now receives \$11 million, will get \$21 million under Green PA, and acid mine drainage, which will receive \$2.4 million this year, will receive an impressive and much-needed \$10 million under Green PA.

The best part of the Green PA plan, of course, is that it will place no additional financial burdens on Pennsylvania residents, as no new fees or taxes will be needed to fund these programs. This is responsible environmental stewardship!

It is worth noting that HB 3 has several common points that were contained in the original Green PA proposal first introduced in February. Those common points include 1) dedicated funding for open space; 2) dedicated funding for acid mine drainage; 3) continued funding for agriculture based on the original Growing Greener funding formula; 4) extending the tipping fee; and the most important component, 5) no new taxes or fees! These are all important elements of HB 3 that will continue to make Pennsylvania a great place to live, work, and raise a family.

This has been a long work in progress and would not be possible without the hard work and support of many dedicated people. At this time I would like to thank the staff of the House Environmental Committee, Joe Deklinski and Mark Brown, for all of their hard work; Senator Mary Jo White and her staff; the members of the House Environmental Committee; Democratic chairman of the Environmental Committee, Representative Bud George, and last but not least, Representative Tom Quigley, the prime sponsor of HB 3.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady, Mrs. Rubley.

Mrs. RUBLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also would like to submit my remarks for the record. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentlelady.

Mrs. RUBLEY submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

HB 3 is far from perfect, and many of us would like to see more money put into our environmental programs. I am, however, supporting HB 3 because it includes numerous projects that will improve our environment throughout the Commonwealth.

Many have been asking whether the \$2-per-ton fee from waste disposal that has been dedicated to our recycling programs is being used for the bond debt service. I am pleased to say that that proposal is not part of HB 3, and the recycling moneys remain intact.

I am also pleased that dollars will not be diverted from Growing Greener for housing projects. Although they are worthy, they are already funded from other sources. An amendment has been included to divert money to DCED for downtown revitalization projects which can contribute to environmental improvements. By helping to restore our boroughs and small cities, we are encouraging residents and businesses to remain in or move to these communities, thus helping to protect our farms and greenfields. Also, moneys are earmarked for improvements to our existing sewer and water facilities. This is an opportunity to continue and expand funding for our popular and effective PENNVEST (Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority) program.

HB 3 – Growing Greener II – includes funding for projects that will improve our environment throughout the Commonwealth. Mr. Speaker, I urge members to support HB 3.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady, Ms. Harper.

Ms. HARPER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have remarks to submit for the record on this occasion as well. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentlelady.

Ms. HARPER submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of HB 3, my Montgomery County colleague Representative Tom Quigley's bill, that will allocate the proceeds of the environmental bond recently approved by Pennsylvania's voters by an overwhelming margin.

The whole reason that I am here in the PA House of Representatives and the whole reason that I became involved in politics was the strong commitment I felt to Pennsylvania's beautiful natural environment and the historic character of our communities.

Twenty years ago I started out by going to township meetings to advocate for managing development and saving open spaces and trails. I served as a volunteer on my township's planning commission and realized that while development was inevitable in my home county of Montgomery, good, well-managed growth was not. I realized that if we did not work hard to save the places that should be saved, they would inevitably be paved over, plowed under, or cut down, and our community would lose its sense of place and the woods, meadows, streams, and glades that gave it its soul. Every day, even every hour of every day, in our communities in southeastern Pennsylvania, we are losing our farms, losing our woods, losing our streams, losing our quiet and peaceful natural areas, losing what matters, and losing cannot be replaced.

In my first term here in the House, I sponsored and championed a bill to create a perpetual funding stream for environmental programs here in the State called Making Trash Pay. The bill levied a \$4-per-ton fee on trash dumped in Pennsylvania landfills, and all of the money raised was deposited into the Environmental Stewardship Fund to pay for Governor Ridge's environmental initiative called Growing Greener. It has been very successful, providing about \$84 million a year for Pennsylvania environmental programs. Now we propose to rededicate that fund to its environmental mission in a new way.

Governor Rendell, taking a page from the Ridge administration playbook, proposed ramping up our environmental spending and asked the voters to approve an environmental bond. This ballot question, requesting permission from the voters to borrow \$625 million for "the maintenance and protection of the environment, open space and farmland preservation, watershed protection, abandoned mine

reclamation, acid mine drainage rededication and other environmental initiatives," passed with a resounding "yes."

Tonight we put in the place the authorization to borrow that money and spend it to save our farmland and important natural areas, to revitalize our State parks and create new community parks, to clean up our waterways, and rededicate funds to the important job of being wise stewards of our land and water resources. We have carefully crafted this legislation so that it was not necessary to raise fees or enact new taxes or to raid the Recycling Fund, which will continue to reward communities that recycle their trash. By directing a portion of the existing trash tax to debt service and leaving the balance in the Environmental Stewardship Account, we can ramp up spending while we need it and still continue our pay-as-you-go programs. Nonetheless, this bill allows us to double the amount of money we will have available for open space and farmland easement purchases for each of the next 6 years and to quadruple the money available for acid mine drainage issues that plague the rural areas of our State.

Mr. Speaker, tonight is a historic night for Pennsylvania's natural resources and for my neighbors back in Montgomery County who are losing an acre an hour to suburban sprawl. This funding comes not one moment too soon for us and provides us with the opportunity to work with our county and municipal governments who have already committed funds to these efforts and know full well that doing nothing is not an option for us or the special places and communities we care about.

I urge a "yes" vote on this bill to echo that big "yes" our voters gave this question in May on election day.

Again, I think we have done something good for the future of Pennsylvania. Thank you.

HB 823, PN 2569

An Act providing for the capital budget for the fiscal year 2005-2006, itemizing public highway projects to be constructed or acquired by the Department of Transportation, together with their estimated financial costs; authorizing the incurring of debt without the approval of the electors for the purpose of financing the projects to be constructed or acquired by the Department of Transportation; stating the estimated useful life of the projects; and making appropriations.

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. James, rise?

Mr. JAMES. Submit some remarks for the record on HB 1168.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. JAMES submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you Mr. Speaker.

I would first like to applaud the budget negotiators and members of leadership that worked so diligently at medical assistance restoration.

Clearly, most members in this chamber share my concern for providing medical services to some of the State's most vulnerable residents.

Through the continued dedication to this issue, the Medicaid restoration of nearly \$143 million is commendable, and I am sure that the people of Pennsylvania thank you. A tremendous gap in Federal funding was bridged through compromise and perseverance.

That being said, there is more funding to make up. We may have been successful in maintaining eligibility to coverage, but there is always more to be done.

We will face similar funding challenges in coming years, and I hope this chamber will consider my proposal to increase the beer tax by supporting HB 1882.

By adjusting the tax, which has been left unchanged since 1947, I anticipate a profit of \$50 million.

By increasing the tax from 8 cents to 25 cents per gallon, which would translate into a few cents difference on our beer purchases, we could offset future Medicaid funding shortfalls.

Again, praise on a noteworthy job by our leadership team for maintaining eligibility for some of our neediest people; the people of Philadelphia and Pennsylvania thank you for that.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER, Mr. Yudichak.

Mr. YUDICHAK. Mr. Speaker, on HB 3 I would like to submit remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman. The gentleman will submit the remarks.

Mr. YUDICHAK submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, I commend the people of Pennsylvania for their commitment to preserving our environment for future generations, as indicated by their approval of the \$625 million bond issue on the May 17 primary ballot. Pennsylvanians have demanded a better environment, and today we answer their demands with a historic investment in the preservation and protection of Pennsylvania's environment.

Growing Greener II will clean up polluted rivers, streams, and abandoned mine sites; it will prepare old sites for redevelopment; invest in alternate sources of energy; improve State parks; preserve open space and farmland; and revitalize our distressed communities.

Under the legislation before us today, the State Departments of Environmental Protection, Conservation and Natural Resources, and Community and Economic Development will receive more than \$495 million to implement and continue acid mine drainage abatement and mine cleanup, watershed protection, flood protection, brownfield site remediation, open space conservation, improvement of State parks and forest lands, and community development projects across the State.

This funding is critical in order to continue the success already realized by the original Growing Greener plan. Under that initiative, over 220 local conservation organizations have received millions of dollars in funding, allowing them to finance their continuing efforts to clean up watersheds, enhance environmental protection, and revitalize communities across the Commonwealth.

In my district alone, nearly \$8 million in grant funding has been provided for projects that have resulted in the restoration and preservation of thousands of northeastern Pennsylvania's environment since the program was first established in 1998.

Groups like the Pennsylvania Environmental Council, the Earth Conservancy, and the Greater Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Business and Industry have been instrumental in securing these grants and moving the projects forward.

The 2004 acquisition of 11,000 undeveloped acres from Theta Land Corp. to protect the area's main watershed and for outdoor recreational purposes is just one example of the projects that have benefited from the Growing Greener Program. In the small community of Warrior Run, a Growing Greener grant has empowered that community to restore an 11-acre parcel of abandoned surface mine land and remove over 2,345 feet of dangerous high wall. In other examples, Growing Greener dollars have leveraged private investments to jump-start the economy of struggling communities and create jobs.

It is imperative that we do not halt the momentum we have gained in completing these projects. The sooner we are able to provide our State agencies and community organizations with access to this funding, the sooner we will be able to continue making strides in the environmental upkeep and preservation that are crucial to the overall health of the Commonwealth and its citizens.

The successes we have enjoyed so far can now be continued as we prepare to implement the second phase of the Growing Greener Program. I look forward to the future accomplishments we will make with this major investment in the future of Pennsylvania's environment, communities, and potential for economic development.

The Commonwealth's citizens have shown they are committed to making our State cleaner and greener, and the legislature needs to act on that commitment and get the ball rolling. I urge my colleagues to act promptly and enact this funding legislation.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Turzai.

Mr. TURZAI. Mr. Speaker, if I could submit remarks for the record on HB 3.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. TURZAI submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

I stand in opposition to HB 3. The Governor's initiative is another bond scheme that continues a trend leading the Commonwealth into more debt which ultimately has to be paid back by our children in taxes with their hard-earned money.

This bond scheme calls for the State to borrow and spend \$625 million for the Governor's pet projects over the next 5 years. However, we will be paying approximately an additional \$325 million in interest payments and fees on top of the \$625 million in principal borrowed for an approximated total cost of \$950 million. The debt service costs, which include principal, fees, and interest, have to be paid over the next 27 years. Governor Rendell's bond scheme diverts millions of tax dollars to be used to pay attorneys and bond underwriters.

Why was all the money borrowed to be spent over the next 5 years? Could it be because the Governor has 2 years left in this term and hopes to be reelected to another 4-year term? He is prohibited from being reelected to a third term by State law. And yet, we will be paying back the borrowed money and more for the next 27 years.

If proponents of this program honestly believe that the projects are worth the expenditures, then they should not be advocating for a bond scheme to be paid out of future tax dollars by the next generation. They should be advocating for a pay-as-you-go program and should have the courage to justify the necessary fees to pay for the wish list they want today.

The original Growing Greener Program was never designed as a bond scheme; it was always a pay-as-you-go program during Governor Ridge's administration. The Growing Greener Program was recently bolstered in 2002 by an increase in a trash disposal fee, primarily with respect to out-of-State waste. This was part of Act 90 of 2002 which was signed by Governor Schweiker. Act 90 provides an average of over \$85 million per year to the Growing Greener Program through 2012. This plan for Growing Greener is in effect today and will be through 2012, with or without the enactment of Governor Rendell's bond scheme in HB 3. There would appear to be no need to revisit Growing Greener until 2012, given the work done during Governor Schweiker's administration.

And what happens when all the money borrowed is used up? Are the proponents going to argue we need to borrow more money for more pet projects all to be paid by future taxpayers?

This bill sets a bad precedent. In the end, the bill creates just another pot of taxpayer money for the Governor to hand out checks for political pet projects at the cost of taxpayers, present and future.
