FRANK ERRIGO PRESENTED

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is my honor today to recognize a gentleman from Lancaster County, who came to my attention through my local Italian-American Society, Mr. Frank Errigo, whose career in photography has spanned six decades.

Just a little background on Mr. Errigo. He was born in Curwensville, and he has been taking photographs since he was 13 years old.

"At the age of twenty, he enrolled in the Photo School at the United States Army War College in Washington, D.C., graduating in 1941 at the top of his class at the rank of Technical Sergeant." He then did "...self-directed...assignments for the Pentagon. He finished his training studying cinematography in Hollywood, California, under the tutelage of" – get this – "Colonel Darryl F. Zanuck. Lauded as one of the most prolific color photographers of World War II, Mr. Errigo led one of two color photographic teams assigned to the European theaters of combat..." where he "...earned four Battle Stars as a member of the Allied 5th Army. Following the Liberation of Rome, he took the world's first formal color portraits of Pope Pius XII. After the war, Mr. Errigo returned to the Pentagon, becoming the Staff Photographer for President Harry Truman. He photographed three presidential inaugurations between 1945 and 1952, and in 1994, he accompanied President..." Bill "...Clinton to photograph the ceremonies marking the fiftieth anniversary of the Liberation of Rome. Mr. Errigo currently works as an accomplished sculptor."

So today it is my privilege to honor him, and I hope you will help me in honoring him also. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Adams County, Representative Moul.

Mr. MOUL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My amendment basically does two things. It says that the court system would have the right to order an implanted device under the skin to track offenders and also detainees that spent time in Cuba after 9/11. I think we refer to them as Gitmo prisoners.

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentelady from Philadelphia County, Representative Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to ask everybody in this chamber to vote "no" on the amendment. I understand what the gentleman is trying to do, but I am concerned about, basically, the treatment of people in prison who have been subjected to subcutaneous implants because of something that a State or a Federal judge might have ordered. And it leads me to say that although prisoners, of course, have been deprived of their liberty for good reason, they have not been deprived of basic human and religious freedoms. I do believe that there are many people, some people, a large number of people, at any rate, who find themselves in jail and turn towards their religion to teach them better guidance so that they do not come back to jail, so that they leave imprisonment as a better person than they came in, and I think that there are many people, particularly those who have become born again, who would regard this implant as something they might call the mark of the beast and that they would not— It would be a violation of their religious freedom if they were forced to have this implant put beneath their skin.

I also believe that the Constitution of the United States says that we are protected from cruel and unusual punishment when there are other ways that have proved to be effective of tracking and controlling prisoners, which are bracelets or anklets. I believe that we are violating the United States Constitution and just plain human decency by forcing people who are before a court to accept as additional punishment under their skin a device which could be dangerous, could be bad for their health, would violate the Constitution, might be causative of cancer, and would violate their religious freedom.

So I am asking for a "no" on this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentelady.

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Armstrong County, Representative Pyle.

Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the Dan Moul amendment to HB 1175. I think what is being lost in today's discussion is the Gitmo prisoner portion of this thing. As of right now, we really do not know where we are going to put these guys. We know we want to close Gitmo.

I live in a district where one of my Congressmen has offered up use of our incarceration facilities, and in rural Pennsylvania, you know, you are turning loose people who, by religious fatwa, have determined to kill American interests. That being in my backyard, I feel a lot safer that we have a methodology for tracking these people.

Another aspect of the Moul amendment that makes it very attractive to me, as discussed with my good friend, the gentleman from Adams County, is an implantation of these devices to sexually violent predators and child predators.

Anything we can do out there to make it safer for our kids is definitely worth a look by every member of this chamber, and I would encourage support for A1935.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Adams County, Representative Moul.

Mr. MOUL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just two quick comments.

I want to thank the Representative from Armstrong for mentioning the fact that under the skin of child predators this would not be a bad idea. I have to wonder if a few of those cases of children who have been abducted or sexually abused or murdered might not have happened had the prisoner who was left out had a tracking device implanted within him. Maybe he would have made the decision not to do that knowing that every step he made could have been tracked.

And regarding the terrorists, I do not think they were considering our religious freedoms when they were flying those planes into our buildings, killing all those 3,000 innocent people in New York. I do not think their religious freedoms should be considered and our constitutional rights should not be extended to them.

Therefore, I am asking everyone to give me a positive vote on this.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentelady from Philadelphia County, Representative Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to point out that there is nothing whatsoever in this amendment that confines this kind of treatment to people who have committed the kinds of crimes that he is talking about. And I would hate to see people who are involved in minor auto accidents who perhaps are gun owners or people who have been convicted of some sort of summary kind of but annoying sort of crime be chipped in this way, and it is perfectly possible that this would happen under this kind of an amendment.

It may be that terrorists— It certainly is true that terrorists are not at all interested in our rights, but the people who are being held in Cuba at this time have not been convicted of anything, and as a matter of fact, the Uyghurs, who are Chinese Muslim separatists, the ones who were just released, have no quarrel with us. They were there because they were fighting the Chinese government.

Mr. Speaker, could we have some quiet here?

The SPEAKER. The gentelady is correct.

The House will come to order. The lady deserves to be heard. Members will please take their seats.

Ms. JOSEPHS. I am only saying that technology has become really scary, and I think we need to protect people in our prisons, people outside our prisons from being implanted with devices under their skin that may cause cancer, may cause them to suffer burns if they are in an MRI (magnetic resonance imaging).

And we should reject this amendment because Pennsylvania is a place where we do care about other people's rights and we do not want to trample on them.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

(a) Disclosure.—Except as provided under subsection (b), a
critical incident stress management team member who, while in the
course of his duties, has acquired information from any firefighter, first

responder or corrections officer secretly and in confidence, may not be compelled or allowed without the consent of the firefighter, first responder or corrections officer to disclose that information in a legal proceeding, trial or investigation before any government unit.

(b) Exceptions.—The testimonial privilege established under subsection (a) shall not apply if any of the following apply:

(1) The communication or advice indicates clear and present danger to the firefighter, first responder or corrections officer who receives crisis response services or to other persons.

(2) The firefighter, first responder or corrections officer who received crisis response services gives express consent to the testimony.

(3) The firefighter, first responder or corrections officer who received crisis response services is deceased and the surviving spouse or the executor or administrator of the estate of the deceased firefighter, first responder or corrections officer gives express consent.

(4) The firefighter, first responder or corrections officer who received crisis response services voluntarily testifies, in which case the critical incident stress management team member may be compelled to testify on the same subject.

(5) The court in camera determines that the information communicated by the firefighter, first responder or corrections officer who received crisis response services is not germane to the relationship between the firefighter, first responder or corrections officer and the team member.

(6) The communication or advice pertains or is related to any criminal act.

(c) Definitions.—As used in this section, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection:

"Corrections officer." A corrections officer of the Commonwealth or a political subdivision.

"Crisis response services." Consultation, risk assessment, referral and onsite crisis intervention services provided by a critical incident stress management team to a firefighter, a first responder or a corrections officer.

"Critical incident stress management team member." An individual specially trained to provide crisis response services as a member of a crisis response team that holds membership in the Commonwealth's critical incident stress management network.

"Firefighter." A member of a municipal or volunteer fire company.

"First responder." An individual who is certified by the Department of Health as a first responder.

This confidentiality protection is still necessary in such a case, for instance, since there are still ongoing business concerns that carry through to any new, successor entity.

Today we vote on legislation to honor the life and service of Sgt. David W. Wallace III, a native of Sharpsville, Pennsylvania, located in my legislative district. HB 988 will name the bridge carrying Walnut Street over the Shenango River in the borough of Sharpsville, Mercer County, as the Sgt. David W. Wallace III "Walleye" Memorial Bridge in honor of this fallen hero.

Sergeant Wallace was born on June 5, 1983, to David W. Wallace, Jr., and Carol J. McKenna Wallace. He was a 2002 graduate of Sharpsville Area High School. After high school, he enlisted in the Marines and served as a combat engineer with the 2d Combat Engineer Battalion, 2d Marine Division. He was a veteran of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. During his service he earned the Purple Heart, Combat Action Ribbon, Marine Corps Achievement Good Conduct Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Certificate of Commendation Individual Award, and the Good Conduct Medal.

On January 27, 2009, Sergeant Wallace was killed by an improvised explosive device while serving in the Helmand Province, Afghanistan. He leaves behind his mother, Carol; wife, Erica; daughter, Brooklyn; stepson, Landon; grandparents,

Jack and Ann Sandstrom; and maternal grandmother, Josephine McKenna, among other surviving relatives.

We cannot repay Sergeant Wallace and his family for his heroic service to our Commonwealth and our country. However, we can honor and remember his service. HB 988 will establish a permanent memorial to the memory of Sgt. David W. Wallace III.
