We had sent the bill over 2 weeks prior to that happening and they did some diligence with the bill, but now we have it, and now we are able to deliver this to the Governor.

We had only one negative vote on passage in the House on the first vote. I hope we have a unanimous vote. It was unanimous in the Senate. I do want to thank Chairman Belfanti and his incredible staff, Chairman DiGirolamo and his staff, on the great work they did; the Secretary of Labor and her staff for continuing to fight to make this happen.

We look forward to helping 57,000 people today and to set the foundation for helping 77,000 more people as we pursue this during the week. We are going to help, I hope, over 135,000 people this week get a paycheck.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Fundamentally, Pennsylvania was the leader among States in identifying last year, in the last session, and passing broad and bipartisan reforms to the mortgage industry to protect homeowners while ensuring the health and stability of the mortgages in the mortgage industry in Pennsylvania.

Because we were first and we passed legislation prior to the United States Congress passing legislation, we were compelled to revisit to conform with the Federal law. Most of that law and ours are in substantial agreement. As a matter of fact, Congress actually emulated our legislation in many regards, and the changes we are making are in fact modest in context to the

overall plan. However, the changes must be made to avoid Federal preemption, which does not distinguish between small differences and large differences.

As you may recall, we made most of those changes via this bill when it first made its way through this chamber. However, close examination by the Department of Banking identified three small remaining changes that were needed to finish the job. Those were made by the Senate with the support of my office and the minority chairman, Representative Hess, and they are back here on concurrence, and I ask for a concurrence vote, Mr. Speaker.

So what we have been asked to do is to remove the two parcels that the recreation group is interested in and just transfer the parcel that is important to the business park.

The amendment has been agreed to. It has been agreed to by the prime sponsor, Senator Corman, and I believe it has been agreed to by the other side. I see Representative Benninghoff standing, though, but I will leave that to him to indicate.

So I believe it is an agreed-to amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. MAHER. Can the Speaker please advise the members when the members were notified of this scheduled date for SB 850?

The SPEAKER. It has been posted on the voting schedule.

Mr. MAHER. With all due respect, Mr. Speaker, as of Saturday's voting schedule, there were many bills scheduled for today. SB 850 was not among them.

I repeat, can you advise us when the membership was advised of this scheduled date for SB 850?

The SPEAKER. The actual notice for SB 850 was noticed Monday, July 13, with a proposed— The answer to your question is it was noticed July 13, 2009.

Mr. MAHER. For today, sir?

The SPEAKER. For any day on or after July 27 and forward.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. MAHER. Then, Mr. Speaker, I would like to make a point of order.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will state his point of order.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The House voting schedule is not merely a list of bills and amendments but a list of bills and amendments as scheduled for specific dates.

Rule 19(b) requires that members shall be notified of "the," of "the" scheduled vote on the general appropriations bill no later than 4:30 p.m. of the Wednesday preceding the above-noted Monday. Insofar as the House voting schedule as of Saturday included many bills for today but not SB 850, "the" scheduled vote on this bill was certainly not notified to the members at least until yesterday's House voting schedule was published.

Consequently, SB 850 being considered today would be out of order. However, appreciating the important timeliness, I would actually withdraw my point of order and instead make a motion to suspend the rules so that we can consider SB 850 notwithstanding – a motion to suspend the rules to disregard the timeframes provided in rule 19(b) as we consider SB 850.

The SPEAKER. The bill has been properly noticed. Therefore, there is no requirement for a suspension of the rules to immediately consider SB 850.

Mr. MAHER. Mr. Speaker, then I will raise my point of order, which is the rules clearly state that the general timeframes provided in rule 21 do not apply to general appropriations bills and that members shall be notified of "the" scheduled vote not later than 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday preceding the Monday.

So SB 850, by an honest reading of the rules, would be out of order today, but I am aiming to move the process forward and allow us to consider it notwithstanding the timeframes provided in rule 19(b).

The SPEAKER. There is no motion necessary. The bill was duly noticed July 13. It could be considered any time the week of July 27 and forward. The amendment deadline for the bill was July 20. There is no amendment— The amendment deadline does not move. The rule is very specific. It is the ruling of this Chair that the bill is in order and can be called up at this point.

Mr. MAHER. And just for my education, Mr. Speaker, could you point me to the rule that supersedes rule 19(b) about notifying the members of "the" scheduled vote?

The SPEAKER. There is no rule that is superseding rule 19(b). The bill was duly noticed, and it is appropriate for the majority leader to call up this bill any time after July 27 and forward.

Mr. MAHER. Well, Mr. Speaker, perhaps next session we can amend the rules to coincide with that interpretation.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to withdraw my amendment to SB 850 with the understanding today that the veterans' benefits are still not being provided under SB 850.

Thirteen million dollars has been taken out of this bill for veterans homes, \$10,487,000 has been taken out from Scotland. We all know today that SB 850 will not be a final budget bill, and I will be withdrawing my amendment for the sole purpose that there are 77 National Guardsmen that are State employees that are currently serving in Iraq and Afghanistan. These members' families will not be paid unless we pass a stopgap budget.

So for that reason today and for the reason that we need to move the process forward to help our economy and bring the other 77,000 State employees back to having a paycheck and the ability to pay their mortgage, I will be withdrawing my amendment.

Section 104. State appropriations.—(a) General Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the General Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly elected or appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services, printing, public advertising by or through any medium, equipment, land and buildings and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(b) State Lottery Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the State Lottery Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(j) Milk Marketing Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Milk Marketing Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(k) Home Investment Trust Fund.—The following sums set forth

in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Home Investment Trust Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(l) Tuition Payment Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Tuition Payment Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(m) Banking Department Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Banking Department Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(n) Firearm Records Check Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Firearm Records Check Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(o) Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

(p) Tobacco Settlement Fund.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Tobacco Settlement Fund to the hereinafter

named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

Section 105. Federal augmentation appropriations.—The following Federal augmentation appropriations set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Federal augmentation funds to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of the expenses of implementing and carrying out the programs stated herein for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009. Unless otherwise stated, the appropriations include any carryovers from the prior fiscal year.

Section 106. Block grants.—(a) Appropriation.—The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the block grant (BG) funds to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the purposes and under the restrictions for which the funds are provided for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009.

(b) Small Communities Development Block Grant.—The Small Communities Development Block Grant (SCDBG) is to assist small cities and communities that have a high concentration of impoverished citizens and substandard housing to expand their low-income and moderate-income housing opportunities and to meet community development needs.

(c) Community Services Block Grant.—The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) is to provide a range of services and activities having a measurable and potentially major impact on the causes of poverty in the community or those areas of the community where poverty is a particularly acute problem. In addition, new focus may be placed on the unemployed, both old and new. Local agencies may lower their eligibility requirements for recipients to three months to allow greater flexibility to assure proper consideration of each recipient.

(d) Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant.—The Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant (PHHSBG) is for the provision of preventive health and other health services related to emergency medical systems, health initiative grants, comprehensive public health, hypertension, fluoridation, health education, risk reduction, home health, rape crisis and domestic violence services.

(e) Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant.—The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant (MCHSBG) is to enable states to maintain and strengthen their leadership in planning, promoting, coordinating and evaluating health care for pregnant women, mothers, infants and children, and children with special health care needs and in providing health services for mothers and children who do not have access to adequate health care.

(f) Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Block Grant.—The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Block Grant (LIHEABG) is to help lessen the impact of the high cost of energy on low-income families and individuals, including energy efficiency grants for low-income dwellings. No less than 15% of the LIHEABG funds received shall be used for weatherization. LIHEABG funds received pursuant to a Presidential release of contingency funds shall be exempt from the 15% requirement.

(g) Social Services Block Grant.—The Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) is for the provision of social services to eligible persons.

(h) Mental Health Services Block Grant.—The Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHSBG) provides funds for the provision of services to adults with serious mental illness or children with serious

emotional disturbance.
 (i) Substance Abuse Block Grant.—The Substance Abuse Block Grant (SABG) provides funds to establish and maintain programs to combat alcohol and drug abuse.
 (j) Child Care and Development Fund Block Grant.—The Child Care and Development Fund Block Grant (CCDFBG) is for the provision of direct child care or to increase the quality and availability of child care for low-income families.
 (k) Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant.—The Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant (TANFBG) provides funds for the provision of cash grants, child care, training and support services, child welfare and administration for eligible families and individuals.

Section 1751. Prior laws unaffected.—This part is not intended to be inconsistent with or to repeal any provision of any act enacted at this or any prior session of the General Assembly regulating the purchase of supplies, the ordering of printing and binding, the purchase, maintenance and use of automobiles, the method of making payments from the State Treasury for any purpose or the functioning of any administrative department, board or commission.

Section 1752. Compliance with other law before funds available.—No appropriation made by this part to any department, board, commission or agency of the Executive Department shall be available unless and until the department, board, commission or agency has complied with sections 615 and 616 of the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929.

Section 1753. Contracts prerequisite to encumbering or committing funds.—Funds for the purchase of supplies, materials and equipment shall not be deemed to be committed or encumbered until contracts covering the purchase have been entered into with the vendors.

Section 1754. Minority business set-asides.—(a) Each

department or other instrumentality of the Commonwealth listed in Subpart B, C or D authorized to contract for buildings, highways, commodities, equipment, supplies or services shall report to the General Assembly all information pertinent to anticipated procurement needs at the beginning of each fiscal year and each fiscal quarter thereafter.

(b) As used in this section, the term "minority business" means a minority business enterprise as defined in the act of July 22, 1974 (P.L.598, No.206), known as the Pennsylvania Minority Business Development Authority Act.

Section 1755. Appropriation of funds from miscellaneous sources.—(a) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this part, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies furnished to employees and other persons, except inmates, by an institution, and moneys received from the proceeds from the sale of any products of the soil, meats, livestock, timber or other materials sold by the department shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and maintenance of the institutions.

(b) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this part, all moneys received from any other source, except the Federal Government, as contributions for the programs provided herein or as payment for services or materials furnished by one institution to another, except those collections designated as revenues, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations.

(c) In addition to any funds specifically appropriated by this part, all moneys received by a department or agency of the Commonwealth from any other sources, except the Federal Government, as contributions or supplements to the department or agency for a program or administration of an act included in this part shall be paid into the General Fund and credited to the appropriation for that program or administration of the act.

Section 1756. Lapsing of unused funds.—Except as otherwise provided by law, that part of all appropriations in Part XVII unexpended, uncommitted or unencumbered as of June 30, 2009, shall automatically lapse as of that date.

Section 1757. Construction with prior appropriation acts.—Any appropriation in Subparts B, C and D of this part which is the same or similar to any appropriation in the act of July 4, 2008 (P.L. , No.38A), known as the General Appropriation Act of 2008, shall replace that appropriation.

Section 1758. Deduction of expended appropriations under prior law.—Any money which has been appropriated and expended under the act of July 4, 2008 (P.L. , No.38A), known as the General Appropriation Act of 2008, shall be deducted from the corresponding appropriation in this part.

Section 1759. Transfer from Oil and Gas Lease Fund.—The sum of \$143,000,000 is transferred from the Oil and Gas Lease Fund to the General Fund.

PART XVIII SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR FEDERAL FUNDS FOR 2009-2010

Section 1801. General Fund repository for Federal funds.—All moneys received from the Federal Government as contributions or supplements to the departments or agencies of the Commonwealth or the programs herein provided shall be paid into the General Fund.

Section 1802. Limitation on encumbering or spending Federal funds.—Federal funds shall be encumbered or spent only to the extent that such funds are estimated as being available during the fiscal year of the Commonwealth.

Section 1803. Appropriation of prior unspent Federal funds.—(a) Any Federal money which has been previously appropriated by the General Assembly and authorized or allocated by the Federal Government but remains unspent from prior fiscal years and will not be renewed for fiscal year 2009-2010 is hereby appropriated.

(b) The Federal appropriations to the Department of Public Welfare include any prior earnings that may be received during fiscal

year 2009-2010. In addition to the amounts specifically appropriated herein to the Department of Public Welfare, all moneys appropriated from the Federal Government during any previous fiscal year which are expected to be received as reimbursements may be carried forward until June 30, 2010, to the extent that obligations are carried forward. In addition, any reimbursements actually received to support such obligations may also be carried forward.

Section 1804. Subgrants between Federal fund appropriations.—Subgrants may be made between appropriations without further approval of the General Assembly. The Secretary of the Budget shall submit a list of subgrants to the chairman and minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the Senate and the chairman and minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives quarterly. No subgrant to a State agency, however, may be made from a restricted receipt account without a specific appropriation by the General Assembly.

Section 1805. Utilization of emergency Federal funds.—(a) Federal funds available for costs and damages resulting from natural disasters or civil disobedience may be added to an appropriation contained in this act or to funds appropriated or may be used for the purposes prescribed by the Federal Government.

(b) In addition to the moneys appropriated by this act, all moneys received from the Federal Government for the purpose of disaster assistance or relief, or other moneys received as a direct result of terrorist acts, moneys for homeland security and defense and moneys for avian flu/pandemic preparedness shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the departments, boards, commissions or agencies designated by the Governor.

(c) In the event of any emergency situation in which the General Assembly cannot act in sufficient time, the Governor is authorized through executive authorization to provide up to \$10,000,000 in Federal funds to alleviate the emergency situation. For the purposes of this section, "emergency" is defined as any situation in which there is a chance of or which may result in substantial human suffering.

Section 1806. Transfer of funds from TANFBG to CCDFBG and SSBG.—In accordance with Federal law which permits the transfer of funds from the TANFBG to the CCDFBG and SSBG, the Department of Public Welfare, upon approval of the Secretary of the Budget, may make such transfers of funds provided that any such transfer will not result in a deficit in any appropriation from which funds are transferred. The Secretary of the Budget shall provide ten days prior notification of any such transfers to the chairman and the minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the Senate and the chairman and minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives.

PART XIX MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS FOR 2009-2010

Section 1901. Prior laws unaffected.—This act is not intended to be inconsistent with or to repeal any provision of any act enacted at this or any prior session of the General Assembly regulating the purchase of supplies, the ordering of printing and binding, the purchase, maintenance and use of automobiles, the method of making payments from the State Treasury for any purpose or the functioning of any administrative department, board or commission.

Section 1902. Compliance with other law before funds available.—No appropriation made by this act to any department, board, commission or agency of the Executive Department shall be available unless and until the department, board, commission or agency has complied with sections 615 and 616 of the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929.

Section 1903. Contracts prerequisite to encumbering or committing funds.—Funds available to agencies, boards, departments, commissions or other governmental entities under this act for the procurement of supplies, services or construction shall not be available for payment of or to be committed to or encumbered for payment of

any such procurement unless and until the agency, board, department or other governmental entity has complied with all of the requirements applicable to the procurement that are set out in 62 Pa.C.S. (relating to procurement) and in the policies, procedures and regulations instituted in accordance with that code.

Section 1904. Minority business set-asides.—(a) Each department or other instrumentality of the Commonwealth listed in Subpart A of Part II authorized to contract for buildings, highways, commodities, equipment, supplies or services shall report to the General Assembly all information pertinent to anticipated procurement needs at the beginning of each fiscal year and each fiscal quarter thereafter.

(b) As used in this section, the term "minority business" means a minority business enterprise as defined in the act of July 22, 1974 (P.L.598, No.206), known as the Pennsylvania Minority Business Development Authority Act.

Section 1905. Appropriation of funds from miscellaneous sources.—(a) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies furnished to employees and other persons, except inmates, by an institution and moneys received from the proceeds from the sale of any products of the soil, meats, livestock, timber or other materials sold by the department shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and maintenance of the institutions.

(b) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, all moneys received from any other source, except the Federal Government, as contributions for the programs provided herein or as payment for services or materials furnished by one institution to another, except those collections designated as revenues, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations.

(c) In addition to any funds specifically appropriated by this act, all moneys received by a department or agency of the Commonwealth from any other sources, except the Federal Government, as contributions or supplements to the department or agency for a program or administration of an act included in this act shall be paid into the General Fund and credited to the appropriation for that program or administration of the act.

Section 1906. Lapsing of unused funds.—(a) Except as otherwise provided by law or by this section, that part of all appropriations in Parts II, III, IV, V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, X, XI, XII, XIII, XIV, XV and XVI unexpended, uncommitted or unencumbered as of June 30, 2010, shall automatically lapse as of that date.

(b) The appropriations in Part II to the Legislative Department shall be continuing appropriations.

(c) The appropriation in Part II to the Supreme Court for the unified judicial security programs shall be a continuing appropriation.

Section 1907. Appellate courts appropriation contingency.—The funds appropriated in Part II to the Supreme, Superior and Commonwealth Courts for justice and judge expenses are contingent upon a vouchered expense account plan being continued by the Supreme Court.

Section 1908. Transfer of excess funds.—The Governor may transfer any excess money in those funds receiving proceeds of Commonwealth of Pennsylvania general obligation bonds in excess of the amount necessary for the purposes for which the bonds were issued to the appropriate sinking fund for payment of debt service due on outstanding bonds. If such excess funds, together with any available balance, exceed the amount of debt service remaining to be paid, the funds shall be transferred to the General Fund or to the appropriate special fund responsible for such debt service.

Section 1909. Transfer from Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, for fiscal year 2009-2010, the total amount of funding available to the Department of Education for local library rehabilitation and development, to the State System of Higher Education for deferred maintenance and to the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum

Commission for historic site development under the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L.359, No.50), known as the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund Act, shall be transferred from the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund to the General Fund.

Section 1910. Transfer from Health Care Provider Retention Account.—The sum of \$300,000,000 shall be transferred from the Health Care Provider Retention Account to the General Fund.

Section 1911. Transfer from Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund.—The sum of \$30,000,000 shall be transferred from the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund to the General Fund.

PART XX
EFFECTIVE DATE

Section 2001. Retroactivity.—

(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), if enacted after July 1, 2009, this act shall be retroactive to July 1, 2009.

(2) Part XVII of this act shall be retroactive to July 1, 2008.

Section 2002. Effective date.—This act shall take effect immediately.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Representative Civera.

Mr. CIVERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, before I make my last request on this amendment, what I really would like to do – and if I am out of order, just tell me I am out of order – we have worked with the gentleman across the aisle for the last several days on an amendment that was drawn basically on a bipartisan situation.

What I would like to do is withdraw this amendment that is in front of us today, and if I could be so allowed to offer the Kotik amendment that I understand he is going to withdraw, since there has been a lot of bipartisan effort, since there would be no stopgap budget if this amendment were to pass, because the Senate has indicated to us that they will send it to the Governor's Office and he can choose what he wants to do.

I believe that what we are doing here today basically has put Pennsylvania back another month, and what is happening is the counties are involved now, the school districts are involved now, and for some reason, it just has to be the other side of the aisle's way or we cannot make any kind of a deal to move this budget process on.

In the month of June, every week, every day, I got up and asked for line items that the General Assembly could look at for a budget. In the month of May, the same requests were made, and then at the end of June, the request of the State workers, that they would not be paid adequately. And this was reminded to each and every single member that is sitting in this House today. This is no make-believe. Go back to the record and I can show you the dates.

And so today we are going to, if this amendment— Well, if what I am requesting to do cannot go forward, we are doing a stopgap. And what happens is the Governor controls the budget; the Governor controls what happens. And the other side of the aisle, as they look at this and they look at a spending plan that they could live with, a spending plan that they could go back to their district and say, we resolved the budget crisis of 2009, wishes now to ignore that because the leaders and the Governor are saying something else.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Civera, on the amendment. Are you offering the amendment?

Mr. CIVERA. Okay. If I may.

What I am doing, Mr. Speaker, is I am requesting that Representative Kotik give me the amendment so I can offer it.

The SPEAKER. It is the Chair's understanding that the sponsor of the amendment is withdrawing the amendment and is not granting permission for anyone else to offer the content of the amendment.

Mr. CIVERA. So what I just understood – because there was some noise in the chamber – what I just understood you to say is that the gentleman is withdrawing the amendment and refuses for us to offer the amendment. Is that correct? For me to offer the amendment; he is refusing to do that.

The SPEAKER. I do not think he is refusing; he is just not granting the permission.

Mr. CIVERA. So that is refusal.

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman offering an amendment?

Mr. CIVERA. Then will the gentleman stand for interrogation on the amendment that he is withdrawing?

The SPEAKER. It is your amendment— The question before the House is amendment A02617.

Mr. CIVERA. Okay.

Mr. Speaker, the question is— I will withdraw this amendment if I am allowed to introduce the Kotik amendment. Could I interrogate the Representative?

The SPEAKER. On your amendment?

Mr. CIVERA. Yeah, on my amendment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman does not indicate he will stand for interrogation.

Mr. CIVERA. Okay.

Mr. Speaker, then I will offer the Civera amendment.

The SPEAKER. The question before the House, will the House adopt amendment A02617? On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Representative Civera.

Mr. CIVERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment was looked upon last week on HB 1416, and when it was looked upon on HB 1416, my understanding was that certain comments were made dealing with the amendment such as that this was a procedural vote, that this 1416 would have to go to the Senate and we were moving the process along.

Little did we know that we would be back here today back in the month of June when I had requested that HB 1416 be relieved. I requested that SB 850 would be taken out of the Appropriations Committee after 2 days of public hearings, and I was denied that. And then we had 2 days of public hearings, and then we had to vote on SB 850, which the Republicans voted "yes" and the Democrats voted "no."

So why we are here today is because this process for some reason is stalling, and for some reason, for some reason, they do not want to have a practical, commonsense amendment, which this amendment is.

This amendment, what it does is, when we looked at what the Governor was offering and when we looked at SB 850, this amendment was in the middle of SB 850 and what the Governor was proposing. Our spending plan was considerably lower, and the reason that spending plan was considerably lower was because we were in times that situations are difficult to spend more money. We just do not have the money to spend, Mr. Speaker. We just do not have those types of dollars. We do not have the luxury that we had in previous years.

And for some reason, at this point, we are in the beginning of August and we are saying the same speeches over and over and over. Well, let me tell you right now what this is: You could go home with this amendment, you could be safe with this amendment, and you could get a budget done that you were supposed to get done on June 30, which it is August 3, okay?

I said to you last week when I asked you to pass this amendment on 1416: This is not a dress rehearsal. This is the real item here. There are people that are not being paid. When I said that in the month of June, you took me lightly, okay? There are counties that are not going to be reimbursed. There are school districts that are not going to receive their dollars. We are all worried about education funding, but if this amendment does not go through, what do we have? What do we really have? We have a stopgap; the State employees will get paid, which I think they should be paid as I told you in May, as I told you in June. And now we are at the 99th hour, and we had another proposal but that was not acceptable because that was too close to home.

So why are we rejecting different ideas? Why are we rejecting different ideas? Why can this Commonwealth not move forward in a bipartisan way and knock out the monkey business? Why? Is it because there is another motive; there is another motive? Is there a power play? Is there a play to take over this budget and say, we are going to do it this way; our revenue sources are going to be this high; our spending plan is going to be more than what we can spend? This amendment keeps us in line, Mr. Speaker. There is nothing wrong with that. That is what we are supposed to be doing as lawmakers, but for some reason, we run into a wall every single time.

I am going to tell you something. I am going to tell you something; I am going to forecast something here: Let it go. Let it go for another month; let it go for another 3 weeks. Let this go to the Governor's Office. Let this be a stopgap, and I want to see the other side of the aisle in another month when the school districts are not being reimbursed and the counties are not getting their fair share where they are going to get the revenues. Answer that.

And my other understanding is that if this stopgap passes, that the members of the General Assembly are going to get paid. False. They are not going to get paid. False. If anybody is telling you that, it is an outright lie.

Adopt the Civera amendment. Be safe. Go home and represent the constituents, and stop listening to the rhetoric that they are giving you on the other side.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Representative Evans.

Mr. D. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, we on this side recognize that this has to be a bipartisan effort. I have said consistently that we have to work together. Our side is willing to work with you to solve this problem. Our side recognizes things that we can do and things that we cannot.

Members on our side feel as strongly as your side in resolving this. They do not think that this resolves it. They have told their leaders specifically what they do not want us to do. Our members have said to us, our members have said to us that they do not want a personal income tax. They have made that very clear. We abide by what our members say.

So I am saying to you today, we have heard our members, we have heard trying to keep our spend number in a certain way and we recognize that, but this is not the answer with the Civera

amendment. We believe that the Senate Republicans and the Governor all have to be a part of this process.

And we all have to compromise. We have to compromise; you have to compromise. The Civera amendment does not do it. Vote "no" on the Civera amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Representative Turzai, the minority whip.

Mr. TURZAI. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

With all due respect to the majority Appropriations chairman, you are in the majority. The threshold question is this: Are you going to vote for any tax increase at all during this recession or not? And the fact of the matter is, you can run but you cannot hide. Sooner or later you are going to have to answer that question.

Personally, in this time of recession with a \$3.2 billion deficit for '08-'09 and another \$3 billion-plus for '09-'10, I recognize, like families and small businesses across this State, that Pennsylvania has to tighten its belt, and that means all of us. That means no walking-around money, no legislative priorities. That means fiscal discipline, and it means that families that are struggling and businesses that are struggling should pay nothing more in new taxes.

I do not support a personal income tax increase. I do not support a sales tax increase. I do not support a tax on Marcellus Shale that can provide jobs and opportunity for the citizens of Pennsylvania. I do not think we should tax cigarettes or smokeless tobacco. I think we need to tighten our belts, and that is what Pennsylvanians expect from us.

You continue to put off the tough decision. You are in the majority. You have 104 votes. If you want a tax increase, put up the votes.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield. The gentleman will yield.

This is the Civera amendment, and it is a spending plan.

And the House will come to order, the gentleman is absolutely correct. Members will please take their seats.

Mr. TURZAI. The Civera amendment, which everybody today has an opportunity to vote "yes" for, actually reflects responsible governing and does not push off for another day the tough decisions that have to get made in this chamber.

What the minority chairman of Appropriations has done, talking to people all across this State, is he said, we are going to tighten our belts, we are not going to increase taxes, but we are going to focus on priorities. And so he is focused on education; he is focused on hospitals; he is focused on law enforcement. And he said that in this time of times, all the walking-around money or the discretionary spending, the cardboard check-type governing, it has got to come to an end. And the other side cannot admit that that is the direction we want to go. They do not want to give it up.

Representative Civera has been a champion of responsible governing, and here is our opportunity today, by voting "yes" for the Civera amendment, to get this bill over to the Senate and on the Governor's desk, and let us see him blue-line or veto a bill that actually focuses on the needs of Pennsylvanians without increasing any tax at all – period.

The Civera amendment is responsible government. It is leadership. It is not putting off tough decisions for another day. We are in the minority, Mr. Speaker. If you want to show us that you have profiles in courage – and that is a book by a

famous Democratic President, "Profiles in Courage" – if you are going to vote "no" against the Civera amendment, what I would like to see, instead of some gimmick like passing SB 850 along so the Governor can blue-line it and hold everybody hostage in the State of Pennsylvania for another year or so, what I would like to see is somebody get up and say, I want ABC in spending and I am willing to vote for this tax and that tax to make it happen. Or if you think we need to move forward and tighten our belts and not increase taxes, well, we have prioritized spending – education, law enforcement, hospitals – then you should be a profile in courage in voting for the Civera amendment.

Either way, I would agree that that is a profile in courage. Put up the tax vote if you are against the Civera amendment for the spending you want and tell us what tax you are going to increase and tell us what spending you are going to increase and show us that you have the guts to stand behind what your rhetoric is. If not and you believe that the right way is to make sure we are responsible and living within our means and not increasing taxes, then today you should be voting for the Civera amendment.

Sooner or later the people of Pennsylvania are going to have a judgment with respect to each and every one of us, and this vote today is a seminal vote. You cannot hide and say that it is a procedural vote. You cannot hide or pretend that you are not going to ultimately have to decide where you stand on taxes. If you are in favor of responsible governing, vote for the Civera amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Greene County, the majority whip, Representative DeWeese.

Mr. DeWEESE. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The gentleman is correct when he says this is a seminal vote. He is incorrect, in my view, to embrace the Civera amendment at this juncture because what it would do is postpone the payment of our State workers.

Now, we have all arrived at a similar conclusion that, at least for the moment, there is no joining of forces in the House and the Senate amongst Democrats and Republicans and the Governor, and the honorable gentleman who preceded me at the microphone knows that. So what we want to do is obvious: We want to pay our State workers, and we want to pay them now. We want to pay them this week and to embrace the Civera amendment right now would delay the payment of those workers. This is a very unhappy juncture, but we have all arrived at it, and the Civera amendment would contravene our progress.

Number two. The honorable gentleman said that the threshold question of the year is a complete rejection of any additional revenues. Yet as I am reminded by my honorable colleagues on this side of the aisle, the honorable gentleman from Allegheny County endorsed a Civera amendment several weeks ago which did put a halt to the lowering of the capital stock and franchise tax, which is in effect an increase in taxes. So you cannot have it, my honorable colleague, both ways. You voted in favor of increasing revenues through the capital stock and franchise tax, and the Civera amendment was the embodiment of that effort.

So in conclusion, Mr. Speaker, for State workers in the big penitentiaries in Greene County and Fayette County and for my honorable colleague from Armstrong or wherever my

vociferous cohort is from, the bottom line is, if we are going to pay State workers this week, we are going to reject the Civera amendment.

I would ask for a negative vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Jefferson County, Representative Smith.

Mr. S. SMITH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just as an observation: It is clear that there are no Blue Dogs in Pennsylvania.

I just wanted to make a few points. Number one, the suggestion that Republicans are not in favor of paying State workers is just totally disingenuous. It is not accurate. Quite frankly, the Republicans came out early on in this debate and said that the Governor should be paying people that are working. We believe that to be the case, and quite frankly, I believe that the administration is probably feeling some heat because the Federal government is looking at this State in violation of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act for not paying people who are working. So we believe they should have been paid already regardless of our budget situation.

But, Mr. Speaker, there are some other facts that would speak to that. I have a condensed budget timeline and it just factually lays out what transpired from when the Governor first introduced the budget on February 6: the House Appropriations Committee hearings in February, March; SB 850, \$27 billion spending plan is introduced May 1; May 4, Democrats introduce Governor's budget embodied in HB 1416 that spent around \$28.9 billion; May 6, SB 850 passes; the House Appropriations Committee took an unusual course of action and held 2 or 3 days of hearings on the weekend before Memorial Day; on June 2 the Republican chairman of the Appropriations Committee stood on the floor at this very podium and asked the majority to bring an appropriations bill to the floor of the House in order for us to consider it, he was denied; on June 17 the Republican chairman of the Appropriations Committee stood at this podium and asked the majority to bring an appropriations bill to the floor for consideration, was denied; on June 24 the Republican chairman of the House Appropriations Committee stood at this podium and asked the majority to bring an appropriations bill to the floor and was denied; on June 25 the Republican chairman of the Appropriations Committee filed a discharge resolution to push to allow the membership, if not their leadership, to push to bring an appropriations bill to the floor of the House; on June 30 the budget deadline passes without this House considering any general appropriations bill. So I would suggest, Mr. Speaker, that if you really were worried about State employees being paid, if you were worried about the ongoing process of State government doing the job it is supposed to do, that the time to correct that was back in June when we should have been passing a budget and not be standing here on August 3 without a budget complete. We cared about them back then, too.

If you look forward, Mr. Speaker, it was clear till July 13 through 17 that the House finally debated an appropriations bill – a \$29 billion appropriations bill, I might add. The fact is, Mr. Speaker, even with this amendment – and this is not the perfect amendment; none are – but quite frankly, if we had a chance to consider the Kotik amendment, I am confident it would pass because it is a comprehensive amendment, it is a balanced budget amendment, it is something that would have actually served the people of Pennsylvania well in this recessionary environment. Mr. Speaker, this amendment, even

as it is – and it is not as good as the Kotik amendment, I will grant you that – this amendment, Mr. Speaker, actually provides more money in the GGO (general government operations) lines, those lines in which State employees are paid from, this amendment actually provides more money for that. And I do not know if you noticed in the paper over the weekend, but there was an announcement that the Governor was planning on signing SB 850 if it came to him and he was going to blue-line a bunch of lines and just keep the general operation lines so State employees could be paid, but what was not highly publicized is that even if he does that, he stated that he was going to have to furlough 300 employees. He was going to have to furlough 300 employees even with the signing of SB 850. So you have an opportunity, Mr. Speaker, to support an amendment that would at least improve the quality of this de facto stopgap bill that SB 850 has been kind of represented as.

Mr. Speaker, furthermore, the Senate has indicated both in the public media and as well in writing that they were willing to take an amended bill of this nature, in the nature of the Civera amendment, that spent something in the nature of it, in that realm, and they will be, they are on 6-hour call. They will be here tomorrow afternoon when this bill would presumably pass the House finally and go back to the Senate and it would be on the Governor's desk just as quickly. So there is no game here to sidestep the stopgap nature of this legislation, and quite frankly, when you get the calls and letters from some of those 300 furloughed State employees under the Governor's signing of SB 850, know that that could have been remedied and that type of hardship would not have taken place either.

Mr. Speaker, let me tell you what also would happen if we were looking at the Kotik amendment and not just the Civera amendment. Mr. Speaker, we would be looking at a comprehensive amendment that would adequately fund all the services in Pennsylvania. The fact is, under the stopgap theory, proposal, that we are indirectly debating today with the underlying SB 850, we know what the Governor has said. He said he is going to blue-line everything but the basic operations of government, the GGO lines, and pay State employees, and that is great. We understand that. He is going to release the State employees as hostages, but do you know who is going to be held hostage when we go to the next day, maybe a week or 2 weeks from now? You know who is going to be held hostage whenever the Governor line-items all of those other lines: all of your education, your basic education; charter schools for the deaf and blind; the school food services; Early Intervention; Head Start – all of those types of programs. I think many of you have already heard from county-based service providers that they are out of cash, that they are running out of money, some of them have already started to lay off people in areas of child welfare, child-care services, community-based MH/MR (mental health/mental retardation) type programs, the day-care centers; they are already on the cusp if they have not already laid off workers in those types of programs. Putting a little more money into that budget, which this amendment or the Kotik amendment would actually do a better job of, would keep that from happening.

People that work in regional cancer institutes, burn centers, critical access hospitals, trauma centers, county Human Services Development Fund – all these types of things – drug and alcohol programs, county-based programs. When the Governor blue-lines all of those programs just to make this a stopgap as he has presented it, he is merely releasing State workers from the

hostage that he has held them and that this process of not allowing us to vote an appropriations bill until the middle of July, he is releasing them as hostage and he is going to claim another whole group of hostages, and that, Mr. Speaker, is not the way to run State government. And why is he doing that? All in the name of trying to pressure this legislative body and the Senate legislative body into voting for a tax increase. It is plain and simple. I have said it before: We are not here by accident, Mr. Speaker, in August. This was by design. It was by design to hold these people, hold these service providers as well as the people that benefit from those services, to hold them hostage in the name of getting a tax increase in a recessionary environment, and quite frankly, the Republicans are not buying it, and we are not going to take the blame for voting for that tax increase or supporting that tax increase. We are not going to take the blame for holding people hostage. We have been pushing, the record is clear. I am going to send this around so that people can look at this timeline, and if there is anything on there that is factually incorrect, Mr. Speaker, I will stand for that correction, because it is not slanted; it is the straight scoop.

The bottom line, Mr. Speaker, is if you truly believe that it is a bad time to raise taxes on the people of Pennsylvania, then back in June is when we should have passed the budget. But even today we can pass a budget that does not require a tax increase and allow this Commonwealth to fight our way through this recession with every other State in the nation, because if we got through this year without a tax increase, Mr. Speaker, some say, oh, next year will be worse. I do not believe it, Mr. Speaker. It is going to be tough, I admit it, it is going to be tough, but the fact is, when this recession rebounds at whatever rate it does, the States that can get through it with balanced budgets, with reducing their spending, tightening their belt, living within their means, and not raising taxes, those are the States that are going to be ahead of the curve, because they are sending a message for that investment for those people that create the jobs. They are sending a message that we are serious about it, that we are serious and we want to make Pennsylvania a better place, and this is the way you do it, Mr. Speaker. You do it by tightening your belt just like all the families in Pennsylvania are doing right now and all the businesses of Pennsylvania are doing right now and all of the institutions in Pennsylvania are doing right now. I hear members say it, but I do not see the actions when it comes to the votes up there, Mr. Speaker.

So when this drags out, whether it is 2 weeks or 2 months or whatever the timeline is, and the majority gets its way and it says, we want to increase taxes because there is no other way out – and I do not know if I buy this, that the alleged deal that was struck, that the Kotik amendment would be pulled because the House Democratic leaders were going to take the personal income tax off the table. I do not know if I buy that. You know things go on and off the table occasionally over time and you find yourself here in October, November and the schools are ready to shut down like they did in 1991 because they have gotten no subsidies from the State. Mr. Speaker, I have a feeling that the personal income tax will be back on the table, and of course, that does not say anything about the sales tax. I guess it is still on the table and some of those other taxes. So, Mr. Speaker, when we get to that day, whenever it is, whenever it is, know that the tax votes are all on the Democrats. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader, Representative Eachus.

Mr. EACHUS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The gentleman from Jefferson mentioned blame, blame, blame, blame, blame I do not know how many times in his speech. When is the minority leader going to take responsibility for being a partner to solve a budget during the greatest challenge in our lifetime? That is what I want to know. And as far as the members of our side, the conservative Democrats, call them blue dogs or whatever color dogs you want to paint them to be, the reason why we are here today is because we listen to the members of our delegation, conservatives and liberals alike. We have a broad tent, and this amendment before us precludes the ability to pay State employees in a quick and timely fashion. There are 77,000 families in Pennsylvania out there. I have been here stuck in central Pennsylvania watching your news, and there are breadlines for people who are providing public service to this Commonwealth. That is indefensible, and what I am talking about is taking responsibility and moving this bill directly to the Governor's desk and making sure that the people who are impacted, who are State employees, get resolved.

Second, this amendment is deficient in many ways. It does not go far enough to protect children in children's health insurance. It does not go far enough, as far as I am concerned, in long-term-care lines to take care of senior citizens and nursing homes. It does not take care of basic education funding for our children, to guarantee that we do not end up with huge and historic school property taxes in the future. The Civera amendment is deficient in so many ways. Notwithstanding that, what about responsibility? The Democratic Caucus and the members of the majority on this side are willing to stand today, move the process forward, get State employees, and continue both a dialogue with Senate leaders, who are in the majority, Republican leaders in the Senate, to resolve this budget impasse, and secondly, continue a conference committee process in public should we need to.

Mr. Speaker, let us not blame each other right now; let us take responsibility. Where I come from in northeastern Pennsylvania, that is what we do. So let me just say to the gentleman: I hear the blame game. I hear the no, no, no to everything, but let us get on with it because the people do not care about timelines or process discussions. What the people want are results from us here in the General Assembly, and they want us to finish this State budget and that is exactly what we are focused on doing.

Mr. S. SMITH. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader, Representative Smith.

Mr. S. SMITH. That reminded me a little bit of a statement I heard a month or so ago, that the people of Pennsylvania just do not get it. I would say that the people of Pennsylvania do get it. What the people of Pennsylvania do not want to get is a large tax increase in a recession. That is what we stand for, Mr. Speaker. I think the House Republican Caucus has stood up straight on this budget. We tried to get people to move this. If there is anything about this timeline that is inaccurate – it speaks for itself, it speaks for itself, Mr. Speaker. It is not a matter of blame. This speaks for itself. It is up to the majority party to bring a bill to the floor for us to at least have the collective wisdom of this body to engage in. Why did we not

have a bill in June? Why did we not have an appropriations bill even the last week of June? We might have been able to avoid being here in the first part of August.

Mr. Speaker, the fact is, the people of Pennsylvania deserve better and it could have been taken care of if we would have engaged at this level of debate a month and a half ago, and that is the only point I am making, Mr. Speaker. The House Republicans did work together. Well, we were working together. We had an amendment. Want to bring the Kotik amendment up? Bring it up. I think you will see there is bipartisan support for that amendment, but we are even being refused the opportunity to have that amendment considered on the floor of this House. Bring the Kotik amendment to the floor of the House right now. It still can be called up. It can still be un-withdrawn. It even has a Democrat name on it. It can be brought up, Mr. Speaker, and I think if you vote it, you will find there is bipartisan support because it is a darn good amendment and we could be debating the specifics that are in it.

Mr. Speaker, I think we all know what has transpired here, and I know the Governor is really good at spinning things out in the public and that is the way that is; we will live with that. We all know in this body, we all know in this body, looking each other in the eye, we all know what has transpired. We did not get here by accident; it was by design. The Republicans in the House have stood here prepared to work on this budget from day one, from day one, Mr. Speaker. We presented changes. We came out with a \$27.3 billion budget and we compromised on that, we compromised on that. We have moved, Mr. Speaker. We have not been intransigent, but we did not start off with something unrealistic like a \$29.1 billion plan that was more than what the Governor had proposed and a \$1.3 billion hole in it that would require taxes to even make it come together. So we stand today, Mr. Speaker, prepared to work on a budget. We stood yesterday, and we will stand tomorrow.

The bottom line is, Mr. Speaker, we could be doing better. And to suggest that Republicans have not put forth an effort, that Republicans have not worked towards finding a balanced budget that does not raise taxes and still serves the people of Pennsylvania is inaccurate. We have and will stand by it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question before the House, the Civera amendment, we grant the leaders a lot of latitude. The question before the House is the Civera amendment. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from York County, Representative Saylor.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have been here for 17 years and I have never been so disgusted with this House chamber as I am in the last few months. We have played games with peoples' lives – the men and women in the military who represent us overseas right now and the State employees – and we sit here on the House floor and we squabble about whose plan is going to be passed. You know, last year we heard from the Governor, in his integrity, that he closed State parks a few days after June 30. Where are they at this year? They are open. So apparently, he was not being honest with us last year and we continue to hear threats from this Governor about these people being laid off, this group of people being furloughed, and everything else. We sit here today and continue to squabble when we know we have a responsibility to pass a budget on time. Had this process started on time, like it should have started, we would not be here in

August with State employees not getting paid, and we would not be standing here today passing SB 850—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield. The gentleman will speak to the Civera amendment.

Mr. SAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, we would not be here today having to worry about the Civera amendment if we had worked together, but instead, we have been working with fear and threats from that side of the aisle and particularly the Governor's Office. We have heard promises from that side of the aisle: Oh, if we drag this out long enough, Republicans will vote for a tax increase.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield. The gentleman will confine his remarks to the confines or the contents of the Civera amendment.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

If you vote for this bill, SB 850 without the Civera amendment in it, you will have voted to cut services, but last week everybody in this chamber talked about, on that side of the aisle, the importance of not cutting those items. Those agencies will be funded under the Civera amendment. I would have preferred today to get this done with the Kotik amendment. I have a great deal of respect for my colleague on that side of the aisle, he is a great guy. But, Mr. Speaker – and I apologize for using the gentleman's name, possibly, but it is his amendment – I believe that we have a responsibility. We have a responsibility to do this right and to quit playing politics and the Civera amendment takes care of that. If you believe that you will be back here next week voting on some compromise other than the Civera amendment, you are highly mistaken. This Civera amendment funds all the agencies while the Kotik amendment would have restored full funding to autism – would have restored and in fact increased funding to that.

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. Preston, rise?

Mr. PRESTON. Is the gentleman speaking on the Kotik amendment or is he speaking on the Civera amendment? It is getting rather redundant.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will be reminded to speak on the contents of the Civera amendment.

Mr. SAYLOR. Well, in closing, Mr. Speaker, the truth of the matter is, the failure to pass the Civera amendment today, I guarantee you, will mean that you will be back here voting for a sales tax increase later this session, Mr. Speaker. So you can go around and march in all the parades you want and say, I am not going to vote to raise taxes, but you are going to because that is what you do when you do not vote for the Civera amendment today. Promises are promises. If you are not going to vote for taxes, then live by those promises you have made. Do not be fooling the taxpayers by exchanging one tax for another. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Representative Adolph.

Mr. ADOLPH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the Civera amendment. I rise as a rank-and-file member just to remind my colleagues on both sides of the aisle what is in the Civera amendment. First of all, there is an 11-percent increase, average, for our school districts. Also, there is a dedicated funding source out of the General Fund for our State System universities. There is also a dedicated funding source out of our General Fund for our community colleges as well as our PHEAA (Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency) grants.

I heard my colleague on the other side of the aisle from Greene County mention that a freeze in the capital stock and franchise tax is actually a tax increase. Well, as someone who pays the capital stock and franchise tax, I thoroughly disagree with that. If someone tells me I am going to owe \$1,000 in 2009 and \$1,000 in 2010, that is not a tax increase. And in this time, the one thing that this Civera amendment does not do, it does not increase the Pennsylvania income tax. It does not increase the Pennsylvania sales tax. I have a letter on the other side of this note from State Senator Joe Scarnati saying that if we would have taken up the Kotik amendment today – and I believe the same goes for the Civera amendment – that our Senate would be called back today and vote this Civera amendment. This actually spends less than the Kotik amendment and would be favorable for our Pennsylvania Senate, and we could send to our Governor a balanced budget with no tax increases for the residents of Pennsylvania. I think that is an important factor because I will tell you what, as a rank-and-file member, I am getting phone calls from residents: Representative, what are you doing to get this budget passed? What are you doing? We saw what the conference committee tried to do last week and that was pretty painful. That was pretty painful when they could not agree on rules and regulations, and I think we could all agree to that.

It is time that the rank-and-file members of this Pennsylvania House of Representatives tell our leadership that we want to move a balanced budget to the Governor so we can move on to the other business of this State. I think that is what the residents of Pennsylvania want, and I believe that is what the majority of the people in this General Assembly want. However, promises are promises, and let us see how long it takes before we get a balanced budget from the other side of the aisle, because the last time a budget came from the other side of the aisle, it eliminated funding for our State System schools, it eliminated funding for PHEAA, it eliminated funding for our community colleges. So I am challenging the other side of the aisle to get us this balanced budget if the Civera amendment does not pass today. I challenge you to get it over to us tomorrow. Let us get it done. It will be August 4. Everybody knew what deficit we would be facing. We knew that in the spring.

If this amendment goes down, I challenge the other side of the aisle to get us a balanced budget this week. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster County, Representative Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have tried to sit quietly and listen, but there gets a point where the rhetoric just gets a little too deep. I have heard members talk about tightening our belt. Well, if it was just about tightening our belt, we have done that. The Governor in the past 6 years has cut more than a billion dollars out of government operations in the State of Pennsylvania. We have one of the lowest per capita rates of State employees per capita. We have done the job there. The Civera amendment, though, says, we are not just going to tighten our belt, we are going to tighten everyone's belt. We are going to strap it around their neck and we are going to pull it so tight, we are going to put some people out of business. We do not need to fund preschool and kindergarten. We do not need to fund hospitals. We do not need to fund health care. We do not need to fund people with disabilities. We do not need to fund attendant care. We do not

need to fund all those programs that people, particularly in tough economic times, depend on even more so than any other time. When I hear that now is not the time to find increased revenues, it begs the question, when is? When we are flushed with cash? When people do not need help? When people are not struggling? I do not get it.

You know, we have fiscally conservative Democrats over here who are trying to make sure that we do not overspend, and I understand that. But they also understand that looming out there next year is a budget deficit that is even bigger, and looming out there in year 3 when the Federal stimulus money runs out is one that is even larger than that, and so this notion that the correct, fiscally conservative thing to do is to vote for the Civera amendment – that is the short-term fix. You know, I can find enough one-time spending, I can empty the canteen and get the last drop out of it and we can get through this year's budget with the Civera amendment, but guess what happens next year? And guess what happens the year after that?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. Saylor, rise?

Mr. SAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, I was reminded to stay on the Civera amendment. I do not know why this speaker does not stay on the Civera amendment as well. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the Civera amendment.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I was trying to point out that the Civera amendment is fiscally irresponsible in that it does not look beyond this year in terms of what kind of deficits we will run into as a result of the Civera amendment. There were speakers who were concerned about there being 300 furloughs if we just vote for SB 850 in its current form and that we should vote for the Civera amendment, which would eliminate jobs permanently. Now is not the time to be playing politics. Now is the time to be serious about this. Let us get the workers taken care of in SB 850. Let us vote "no" on the Civera amendment, and then let us move forward with responsible budgeting. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Representative Maher.

Mr. MAHER. If my colleagues on the other side of the aisle believe what their leaders say, they should be eagerly seeking an amendment to SB 850. Back in May the Senate passed SB 850 and the Democratic side of the aisle spent a considerable amount of taxpayer money trying to educate the public on what they claimed to be the evils of SB 850, but today they want it unadorned with the Civera amendment. When the Appropriations Committee finally reported SB 850, the Democratic chairman of the committee asked that it be reported with a negative recommendation—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield.

Mr. MAHER. —and so it was.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield.

This is to the entire House: We are going to go back and forth and play these games with the words that we are all using. The question before this House is the Civera amendment and the content of the Civera amendment. A lot of this debate that is being bantered about on the floor today is fine for final passage of SB 850 if we get to it, but right now the question before this House is the Civera amendment, the contents of the Civera amendment, and we will confine our remarks – both sides of the aisle – to that amendment.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Could you have the clock reset to 4 minutes, where it was?

The SPEAKER. The clock was paused as I was speaking.

Mr. MAHER. No, sir. Mr. Speaker, with all due respect, it was not.

The SPEAKER. Continue on.

Mr. MAHER. The Civera amendment is essential so that you are not a bunch of hypocrites. The Civera amendment is essential because your Appropriations Committee chairman has told you SB 850 is no good. Make it better. The Civera amendment is essential because last week I heard the Democratic leader say he would be meeting every day in a conference committee, every day, Saturdays and Sundays, which lasted for about a day and a half. We need to go forward with this budget in a bona fide fashion. Yes, it is awful that the Governor has violated Federal law and refused to pay State employees, that he has violated the Federal Constitution, and that must stop; I agree. There is urgency. But it is not just about State workers, it is also about the people that pay the State workers, the State taxpayers. They deserve for you to stand up for them and pass a bona fide budget. The Civera amendment is a bona fide budget, not exactly the way any one of us might have constructed it, but it is genuine. The alternative, absent the Civera amendment, is a bill that most of the Democrats in this House have already said they find noxious, but now they want it without any changes. Sort of reminds me of the prisoners who went on strike because they had two issues: First they said the food was not edible and then they said they could not have seconds. That is the Democrat position on SB 850.

Let us have a bona fide budget. Let us adopt the Civera amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentelady from Montgomery County, Representative Harper.

Ms. HARPER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to support the Civera amendment. Today all of the legislators from Montgomery County received a copy of a letter sent to the providers of services of our mentally disabled citizens. The letter came from Montgomery County, went to the service providers, and told them that it could not afford to pay for services already rendered and services yet to come until Pennsylvania passes its budget. I rise in support of the Civera amendment. It is not perfect; it is a lean budget for a lean time. I personally prefer the Kotik amendment, which did not run, but I rise in support of the Civera amendment because it is like that sign that you see on the Schuylkill Expressway right before you hit the turnpike: last exit before toll. This is it, the last exit before the toll, the last budget that balances without a tax increase, the last budget that gets us done before anybody else gets hurt by the fact that we have not been able to get this done before.

The Civera amendment is the last exit before the toll. Let us get off here. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Representative Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the Civera amendment. I want to thank Representative Civera for stepping up. His amendment is praiseworthy, but in application, it is disastrous. If we support the Civera amendment, it will represent a retreat on pre-K; it will represent a retreat on the commitments that we

have made to public education, private education; it will represent a retreat on the populations of people in Pennsylvania, where unemployment and underemployment is well over the statewide and national averages; it would represent a retreat on health and human services. So while it is praiseworthy – its intent is good – its application is disastrous. And because it is disastrous and because time demands, time and circumstances demand that we act now on 33,000 State workers who were not paid on Friday, time and circumstances demand that we act now to do what is right and is in the best interest of Pennsylvanians.

On this, Mr. Speaker, I am going to stand with people over politics and vote "no" on the Civera amendment so that we can get people to the Governor's desk and get them paid as soon as possible.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Representative Krieger.

Mr. KRIEGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the Civera amendment. A previous speaker set forth some alleged facts in connection with his reasons why he would oppose the Civera amendment. He mentioned something with regard to the Governor cutting about \$1 billion over the last 6 years, and I rise to respectfully question those facts. The facts, Mr. Speaker, are these: During the first 6 years Governor Rendell has been in office, he has increased spending and borrowing each year. He has increased spending in fact by \$8 billion, 40 percent, while—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will yield. The question before the House is the Civera amendment.

Mr. KRIEGER. I understand, Mr. Speaker. The previous speaker set forth facts to support reasons why the members should not vote for the Civera amendment. I merely wanted to set the record straight here.

The SPEAKER. The question before the House is the adoption of the Civera amendment. Your remarks will be confined to the Civera amendment.

Mr. KRIEGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman, Representative Turzai, rise?

Mr. TURZAI. Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to the Chair, without a doubt throughout this debate, it seems to me that the members on the other side of the aisle, particularly the gentleman from Lancaster County, were given significant leeway. And on a number of fronts, to echo my colleague from York County, it seems that the rules are not being applied fairly here. If facts are going to be put on the record, we should have an opportunity to refute those particular facts. Nobody chastised the gentleman from Lancaster County. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Krieger, on the Civera amendment.

Mr. KRIEGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, I rise to support the Civera amendment. I am merely attempting to create the context in which my mind thinks as I think about these issues. Essentially, spending is too high. We all know that. We know it is not sustainable, whether we face the issue this year or next. Some of the gentlemen rose and suggested we are having a tough year, I think suggesting we raise taxes perhaps this year so we do not need to raise them next year. I think that is the wrong approach. We actually need to do the opposite. We need to cut spending and we all know that. That is difficult, but it is better than the alternatives we

face. With regard to some of the members from western Pennsylvania, we represent the same people. We know what we are hearing at home. You know what you are hearing at home.

I respect those on the other side of the aisle that have stepped forward and tried to be fiscally responsible. I would remind them that our people expect more than words; they expect action. If we are going to hold the line on taxes, let us do it right here and right now with the Civera amendment. If we are not, let us quit posturing. If you are going to cave in to the Governor's demands, vote for taxes now and let us just get this over with, at least the people of western Pennsylvania will know where you all stand.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Are there any other members wishing to be recognized?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Union County, Representative Fairchild.

Mr. FAIRCHILD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to take 60 seconds to make a correction. One gentleman stood up and said that we were not paying our military soldiers, men and women, and that is absolutely false and untrue. The facts are that if you are a reservist and are called up, every government employee in the State of Pennsylvania receives a stipend from the State; however, when you are called up under Title 10, the Federal government pays your service paycheck.

So that is just to correct the record so that if you get questioned, you will now have the facts. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster County, Representative Boyd.

Mr. BOYD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The question before us right now, to be very clear for all of us, is whether to support the Civera amendment which is an amendment to SB 850. I actually grabbed a comparison on the line items in SB 850 as it is before us now and what is in there compared to what the Civera amendment would put in. We are actually, with the Civera amendment, adding things to SB 850, things like for those in the agricultural and rural areas of Pennsylvania, money for ag conservation easements and payments to the Pennsylvania fairs and livestock shows and open dairy show and the junior dairy show and the 4-H Club shows. If you move from the Department of Agriculture and you move into some of the other line items, the Civera amendment actually increases funding over SB 850 for library access. You move into environmental protection and the Civera amendment adds money for storm water management, sewage facilities planning grants, sewage facilities enforcement grants. Moving to health, it adds revenue for the diabetes programs, rural trauma centers, epilepsy support, biotechnology research. If you move to— It also adds money in health for emergency-care research, osteoporosis prevention education, also for the Philadelphia pediatric outpatient and inpatient center, public welfare, it adds revenue from SB 850 for medical assistance, hospital-based burn centers, medical assistance for critical access hospitals and trauma centers.

Mr. Speaker, I could go on through here and pull out more line items that the Civera amendment actually adds into SB 850. Most of the items that I referred to, in SB 850, are zero funded, and the Civera amendment actually puts money back in the budget for those necessary services and it does it in such a

fashion that we do not have to raise taxes and it is a balanced budget. When SB 850 was debated in the House Appropriations Committee, one of the members of the committee from, I believe from Philadelphia made a very interesting comment. His quote was something like this, Mr. Speaker: I believe SB 850 ought to be put back where it belongs and that is in the trash can. It was just on my local news this past weekend.

So the vote before us today that we are going to vote, if we vote "no" on the Civera amendment, what we are saying is we support SB 850 in its current form, that we do not want money back in the budget for this series of lists that I just went through, we do not care about rural Pennsylvania, we do not care about fairs, we do not care about trauma centers in Philadelphia. Frankly, Mr. Speaker, I am not sure how anybody can intellectually support SB 850 when they support those programs, saying it just moves the process along, and here is why: because if we vote down the Civera amendment, SB 850 is out of balance and it cannot become law. What will have to happen is the Governor will take his magic wand, the veto pen, and he will carve SB 850 into whatever he desires SB 850 to do, and we will be delivering to the Governor how the ultimate budget process will unfold in the next coming weeks or months. Yes, State workers will get paid. Yes, that is absolutely essential. But if the Civera amendment goes in and the Senate concurs, which we have on record that it appears the Senate will concur within a matter of a couple days, it is to the Governor's desk and we have a balanced budget and we do not have to face any decisions in the future.

Mr. Speaker, I am not sure that— I just want to make it very clear that voting against the Civera amendment is voting for draconian cuts, draconian cuts to the budget that members across this side of the aisle said belong in the trash can. So in essence, voting against Civera is to support and resurrect from the trash what was already deemed to be not adequate for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. I just want to make sure that, on the record, it is clear what voting "no" on Civera is this afternoon.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentlelady from Luzerne County, Representative Mundy.

Ms. MUNDY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Nonsense. The vote today is about whether we are going to pay the State employees this week or a week or two from now. That is what this vote is about. It is not about voting to do a budget. I have a question for the Senator who sent the letter supporting the Kotik amendment: If you are for the amendment – Civera amendment or any amendment – if you have an amendment that you are supporting, why did you not bring that to the negotiating session on Sunday morning in the Governor's mansion?

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady will stick to the question before the House, the Civera amendment.

Ms. MUNDY. The Civera amendment has no agreement with the Senate. All we are doing, all we are doing is delaying and postponing the employees getting paid. Anybody who votes for the Civera amendment is voting against the employees getting paid this week.

Mr. S. SMITH. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader, Representative Smith.

Mr. S. SMITH. I will be brief. Mr. Speaker, perhaps what the gentledady from Luzerne that just spoke does not get is that the Republicans were not invited to the negotiation session at the Governor's mansion this weekend.

The SPEAKER. Anyone else wishing to be recognized?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Representative Civera, for the second time.

Mr. CIVERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will brief; this has been gone over. Mr. Speaker, let me explain to you how the Civera amendment came about and why we did what we did here. When SB 850 came over from the Senate and it went into Appropriations, the majority chairman of the Appropriations Committee, as you well know, had 2 days of hearings on SB 850. It gave me the opportunity at that point in time to get an amendment to SB 850 and an amendment to HB 1416, because I believed as the minority chairman that I just was not going to sit down and let this thing go by me and not do something. So we went to work. We got SB 850, we got the Governor's proposal, we got last year's budget, and we went across line by line, which is in this amendment, and restored the programs that were cut from SB 850. We restored those programs. We made a very sincere attempt to get a budget before the General Assembly.

Now, I have listened to the other side. I have a lot of respect for the leaders on the other side. We have to work together. I have a lot of respect for the majority chairman of Appropriations. But, Mr. Speaker – and the other side has got to listen to me now – where is your idea? Where is your budget? I put forthwith two budgets, one I shared with one of your members. Where is the Democratic budget? The Senate Republicans came out with a budget; you criticized it. It came to the House. The Civera amendment came before you last week, you voted again, voted it down, probably today you are going to vote it down again. Do you have an idea? Are you showing up for work? What are you doing?

We started out with a \$29.1 billion budget. We told the Governor that that was not acceptable, we are spending too much money. When this amendment came about and before I formally introduced it, I went down to the majority chairman of Appropriations and said, I have an idea, let me share it with you. Your idea is not going to work. You do not have enough money. We are going to run out of money. When we show him we are not running out of money, this is not going to work. When we ask him, why are you spending too much? Well, we have to put certain programs back in. This amendment in front of you restored the programs that were taken out of SB 850. This amendment was the first go-around of people saying that they did not want any more legislative initiatives, that we were spending too much money, so we took them out. This amendment on the operating end of the budget was increased. So I do not know what else you want us to do. We are working at it every single day here. We are not sitting down and saying, majority party, it is your show, you run it. We are trying to be a part of this. We are trying to be a part of the budget process, and you get up there and you say, well, you cut this, it does not do this – look at the amendment. It does not cut it; it restores it, but that is not good enough. That is not good enough.

You know what we have to work with. You know the dollars that were dealt with us. This amendment takes care of that. Had you let me, and we could have shared it on a bipartisan, you would have seen a genuine amendment, then I want to see how you would have voted against it. Now, they say it is about

putting the people back to work. Nobody wants to put the people back to work – or, no, get them paid; they are working now. I correct myself. Day after day, week after week, a reminder was made. The press said to me, are you not getting tired of getting up talking about it every day? And then you tell us that this is not about a budget, it is about putting State employees so they can get paid. It is everything about a budget. Last week, HB 1416, I heard it over and I heard it over: Education is not funded enough. Education does not go far enough with this amendment and your local property taxes are going to suffer. Well, I want to remind you of this, that when we are in the month of September and we do not have a budget and your school district has not been reimbursed, what are you doing to the property taxes then? Come on, you cannot have it both ways, Mr. Speaker. This is the real deal. You knocked it down on the first go-around. I do not know why. Now you are knocking it down on the second go-around. This is what happens: The amendment goes in today, it is on second. Now tomorrow it goes to third, you vote it, it goes to the Senate, the Senate sends it to the Governor. Why are we wasting time? Why are State employees not being paid?

Now, if you have an idea and you do not like this amendment, bring it up, put it on the floor. Let us see what the House Democrats have to say and how they want to do a spending plan. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Will the House adopt the amendment?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin County, Representative Marsico.

Mr. MARSICO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I was not going to speak, but after I heard from members on the other side of the aisle, saying how much they are supporting our State employees, I had to get up and say a few words about this. Where have you been for 33 days? Where have you been for 3 months? The House Republicans, central Pennsylvania Republicans, have been there since day one. Finally you come to the rescue for our State employees. Where have you been? It is laughable. It is unbelievable.

The SPEAKER. Civera amendment.

Mr. MARSICO. I support the Civera amendment because it is a— You know, it is very frustrating to see that our State workers are subject to the Governor's whim and to the whim of our House Democrats, friends on the other side of the aisle. Our State workers should not be used as collateral. This amendment will move the process forward. If we adopt it, the Senate will adopt it and it will go to the Governor and our State workers and our vendors will be paid.

Once again, where has the other side of the aisle been for 33 days now? We are past the deadline. Finally you are here to help our State workers. We have been there since day one. You have not been there for 33 days. Once again, let us move the Civera amendment forward. I ask for a positive vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northumberland County, Representative Belfanti.

Mr. BELFANTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also did not intend to rise and speak on this amendment, but those of you that looked on your desk this morning will see that the organized labor unions that represent our State employees were asking us to vote for SB 850 without Civera or without any other amendment. That is on your desks in your offices, if you care to look. The people that represent child care, pre-K, and all of the early intervention programs are also very upset

and worried about the Civera amendment. Mr. Speaker, it is tough to believe that we have a \$3.2 billion deficit, \$3.2 billion deficit, and we can restore all of the money that was read off while the gentleman was flipping pages really fast to make sure that he got the one or two per page that increased. How do we plug that kind of a hole and not raise taxes?

Mr. Speaker, I want to check and make sure I am not still in a coma. When I arrived here on July 1, the thing that I wanted most to happen was for the Senate Republicans to sit down and forge a workable budget. This has not been the House Republicans. I am not blaming the gentleman on the other side of the aisle. I am not blaming them; I am blaming your colleagues in the Senate. The Republican Senate has refused to budge. They have walked out of meetings. They have refused to meet, and for all of those Republicans that stood up in good faith and said that they were not invited, that is bull. The Senate Republicans have locked you out of the ball game.

The SPEAKER. Civera amendment.

Mr. BELFANTI. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Just in conclusion, I believe that it would be foolhardy for anyone to think that we could raise revenues for all of these great programs that we have in this State and plug a \$3 billion hole and not raise any taxes. I would like that person or that C.P.A. (certified public accountant) to do my Federal income tax. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

MOTION TO SUSPEND RULES

The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman, Representative Schroder, wish to offer amendment A03221? The gentleman is recognized for the purpose of making a motion.

Mr. SCHRODER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, late last week the Governor commented or he was reported to comment in a statewide newspaper article that should he receive SB 850 and go through the blue-line vetoing process, that he fully intended to blue-line veto the legislative appropriation. Now, Mr. Speaker, I would argue that that is in fact appropriate for what he is proposing to do. That is not my beef here. That is not the reason that this is being offered. The reason this is being offered is he made no mention—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield. Will the gentleman yield. You need to make a motion to speak on the motion.

Mr. SCHRODER. Well, I will do that, Mr. Speaker. I am going to move to suspend the rules to offer amendment A03221.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the motion?

Mr. SCHRODER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As I was saying, what the Governor did not say, or what was not reported is whether the Governor intended to in fact blue-line veto his own executive appropriation as well. Mr. Speaker, I do not think we should be in the position here in this General Assembly of sending the Governor a budget that we know he will veto because he has telegraphed his intentions, the legislative appropriation, without being sure that the executive level, the Governor's Office and those offices underneath the Governor, without being sure that they will also be blue-lined. This amendment would remove that funding from SB 850 before it even gets to the Governor. Now, why should we do that? This is not some tit-for-tat-type maneuver here. I have very grave concerns that if the Governor would only veto the legislative appropriation, then that radically tips the playing field, if you will, on this budget in his favor. Now, why should we care? Because I believe the Governor will use this as an attempt to basically starve the General Assembly into a tax increase.

Mr. Speaker, the last time the Governor blue-lined a budget, it was not until December when it was all finally resolved. We all know that we do not get anything really important or real heavy lifting done until there are deadlines around here, and there really are no deadlines coming up between now and the end of the year when December comes around. So I fully expect that once the Governor does this that this will probably, unfortunately, drag out for quite some time.

So I believe what we need to do, that it would be prudent to protect the interests of the General Assembly, to keep us on a level playing field so that a tax increase is not rammed down our throats and so that we are, in effect, not submitting to gubernatorial blackmail. I believe we need to adopt, suspend rules for the adoption of this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader, Representative Eachus.

Mr. EACHUS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Let me be clear one more time: This bill gets amended, it does not go straight to the Governor's desk, and State employees do not get paid in a timely fashion. That is the only thing that we are using SB 850 for. That is what it is about, and for that reason, I oppose the amendment.

The SPEAKER. On the question.

Mr. S. SMITH. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Smith. The Chair recognizes the minority leader, Representative Smith.

Mr. S. SMITH. On the motion to suspend the rules, while I am not going to challenge the ruling of the Chair, I did want to put on the record that we do not believe this or a few of the other amendments – I noticed the Speaker did not reference it when there was discussion about the Kotik amendment – we do not believe that any of those amendments require a suspension of the rules for two reasons, Mr. Speaker. Number one, these

amendments appear on the House voting schedule, and it has been the past practice for many years that the only amendments that appear on the House voting schedule are amendments that are in fact filed timely. Secondly, Mr. Speaker, it is our belief that under the rules, once an appropriations bill is noticed for a day specific, that if you do not vote the appropriations bill on that day but choose to vote it at a later day, that you have until 2 o'clock the previous day to file amendments. The reason we believe that to be the case, Mr. Speaker, is because we are at the way that you have currently interpreted the rules. The appropriations bill, arguably, could have been noticed for a vote back in the beginning of May, at which time the rules provide for an amendment to be introduced within, like, a week and a half or 2 weeks, and then the bill could be considered a week later.

The fact is, you could notice this bill for May 1, not vote it until June 27, and at that point, when a lot of things have changed – when revenue estimates may have changed, circumstances may have changed – no one would be able to amend it. So just for the record, we are not conceding this. I am not going to prolong it with a challenge of the Chair to make a ruling, but I wanted it to be on the record that for those two reasons we really do not believe a suspension of the rules is necessary. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, suspension of the rules, the question is only debatable by leaders, makers of the amendment, makers of the motion, and the prime sponsor.
