PENNSYLVANIA DAIRY PRINCESS PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman, Mr. Saylor, come to the rostrum.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to present a citation from the House of Representatives to Gabrielle Murphy, honoring her on being the 2011-2012 Dairy Princess of Pennsylvania after a 3-day competition testing public speaking and creativity.

Gabrielle is the daughter of Donna and Greg Kennard and Patrick and Sheri Murphy. Accompanying Gabrielle today and seated to the left of the Speaker are Donna and Greg Kennard, and I want to thank them for coming as well.

Mr. Speaker, being crowned the State's Dairy Princess is just the latest milestone in this young, exceptional woman's career in a long list of achievements. At the age of 12, she came to work for her grandparents on their 112-acre chicken, dairy, and beef farm in Airville, York County. At that early stage of her life, Gabrielle was already displaying the kind of salt-of-the-earth work ethic that characterizes York County and makes Pennsylvania a national powerhouse in agricultural production. And Gabrielle's crown comes with a responsibility that will require even more work — representing Pennsylvania's 7400 dairy farms, the second most of any State in the nation.

Our dairy farms are the number one economic driver for agriculture in Pennsylvania, generating over \$5 billion in revenue annually and supporting more than 60,000 jobs. But being an advocate for such a major portion of our economy here in Pennsylvania should not be difficult for Gabrielle. Her list of accomplishments and activities is that of one who loves her community and gives of herself to enhance it for others.

In between working the family farm and attending high school and competing in equestrian competitions such as barrel racing and pole bending, Gabrielle made time to volunteer as a baseball umpire, a softball coach, and as a member of the Airville Fire Company.

Now at the age of 19, she is a sophomore at the Delaware Valley College studying livestock management with the goal of becoming a large-animal veterinarian. In her second year, she decided she should help pay for her college education and got a job at the Penn View dairy farm in Bucks County, where she milks 34 of the farm's 100 cows on her own, and that milk is then sold at the college campus market.

Mr. Speaker, the great architect Frank Lloyd Wright once said he knew "...the price of success: dedication, hard work, and an unremitting devotion to the things you want to see happen." Gabrielle obviously knows the price of success as well, because she has been building a solid foundation for her future by demonstrating those very qualities since she was 12 years old.

Becoming a prominent spokesperson for such a large portion of our State's economy is no small accomplishment, and I am certain we will be hearing more from this fine young lady in the years to come. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I am happy to present this citation from the House of Representatives to Gabrielle, and I ask my colleagues to join me in congratulating her.

The chairman of the Health Committee, the gentleman from Tioga, the maker of this conveyance, came before us and told us that the property was not being used. We had a different version from DGS (Department of General Services). If it is not being used, it is ours. If it is ours, we ought to make sure there is no gaming on it.

Please vote for my amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Tioga, Mr. Baker.

Mr. BAKER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to oppose this amendment and the gentlelady's subsequent amendment. This is about releasing, purchasing a restrictive use covenant, and it is based on market values but agreed to by the Department of General Services. In effect, if this amendment or a subsequent amendment would be adopted, it would impose additional restrictions and impact the value of the property. And it is private property. You have to remember that there was a reversion clause in this transfer, and this is merely a restrictive covenant. It releases the restrictive covenant for market value payment.

And I agree with the Department of General Services that the value, the market value, adequately reflects the value of the remaining Commonwealth interests, and all the parties are in agreement with this. This amendment and a subsequent amendment would affect the appraisal and could be construed as a de facto taking.

So for these reasons, I and the Department of General Services and all the parties heretofore involved oppose this and the subsequent amendment, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady, Ms. Josephs, for a second time.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The gentleman from Tioga says that all parties are in agreement, and as far as that statement goes, I am not going to challenge it. But we— Mr. Speaker, I think this is a conveyance a lot of people could get in trouble for if they do not vote the right way or if they do not realize what the discussion is about.

The SPEAKER. Members will please come to order and hold the conversations down. The Speaker would request the members to clear the aisles. Please hold the conversations down.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The lady may proceed.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you.

While it is true that the Department of General Services and the nonprofit which owns this land and the maker of the bill all agree, or the nonprofit which says it owns this land, I am not so sure that the nonprofit that says it owns this land really owns this land. I am not so sure that it has not reverted back to us, back to the people of the Commonwealth, which it can do automatically. We do not have to have done anything at all with this land; all it has to do is be not in use. That is what the gentleman from Tioga told us, it is not in use. Therefore, it is our land, if that is the correct interpretation.

If it belongs to the taxpayer, the people of Pennsylvania, the constituents of Pennsylvania, then I have to say all parties are not in agreement, because the people of the State have not agreed that this is a good idea. What we have set up is the situation where a nonprofit might very possibly sell this land for much, much more than we ever anticipated, and the taxpayers are being done out of that money. If that is going to happen, the very least we can do is make sure that we do not have a gambling facility in the middle of this town and on this land.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Those of you who want to protect yourselves, I suggest you vote with me. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Cambria County, Mr. Barbin.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to go just to speak on this amendment.

It appears clear from the discussion that has taken place on the floor that there is a legitimate question as to who owns this property. If the property is owned by North Penn Comprehensive Services, then it is just a question of whether or not the value of the restriction is really worth \$440,000 or not. But if the property is to revert to the Commonwealth, in the event that the property was not used by the nonprofit, then the question of whether this is a fair market value is a much bigger question, because if the property reverts back to the Commonwealth, then the appraiser never should have been valuing the restriction; he should have been valuing the property as a whole.

Now, we spent at least a month arguing about how difficult our financial situation was in Pennsylvania, and this appears to be a transfer of property for a bargain price. Now, I do not know whether or not the land transferred back to the Commonwealth or it did not, but there was never a public hearing on this at the committee that should have asked this question.

So I am going to make a motion that this bill be sent back to the State Government Committee to have a hearing to determine who really owns the land, because if the Commonwealth owns the land, then we should not be selling it for \$440,000. It was a zero-value gift when it left the Commonwealth's hands—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will suspend.

I believe you are making a motion, which would be in order, and the debate you were ensuing was more on the merits of the bill. The question before the House is the amendment. If you would like to make the motion to have the bill and the amendments recommitted, then I would ask the member to pursue that avenue.

MOTION TO RECOMMIT

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and that is exactly the motion that I would make. I respectfully request that this bill, along with this amendment, be referred to the State Government Committee to determine what it is we are trying to sell.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from Cambria County, Mr. Barbin, has moved that HB 1825 be recommitted to the State Government Committee.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. On that question, does the gentleman, Mr. Barbin, seek recognition?

Mr. BARBIN. I yield to the minority leader.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the bill be recommitted?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Tioga County, Mr. Baker.

Mr. BAKER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I respectfully request that we disapprove of this motion. It was very clear in the State Government Committee, which the madam chairman very well knows that this question was asked. It was answered by the Department of General Services that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania does not own this property. It was very clear, unequivocal, and I just do not understand why there is not the clarity here since that question was already answered. It was asked very, very clearly, answered clearly. The Commonwealth does not own this property. It had a restrictive use covenant, and that restriction has been offered to be released. The health-care services still operates services, social services in the building, but they would like to make some changes with that.

So based on the value of this restrictive use covenant, they would like to have it released under appraisals. So it is very clear what the answer is, and I am not sure if you are going to hear any other answers if it goes back to the State Committee. So I would respectfully request that we disapprove and vote "no" on the motion.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE CANCELED

The SPEAKER. The Speaker returns to leaves of absence and recognizes the gentleman from Cambria County, Mr. Burns's presence on the floor. His name will be added back to the master roll.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 1825 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the bill be recommitted?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the minority leader, Mr. Dermody.

Mr. DERMODY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, in the original conveyance for this land when it was turned over to North Penn Health Services, North Penn Health Services was required, as has been described here, to use it for health care and social services.

Now, I believe, as was the testimony at the State Government Committee and everything that I have heard, that it certainly is not clear that that is what is going on there now. And as a matter of fact, the purpose for this conveyance is what they are suggesting, is they want to use the property for residential housing, which has nothing to do with health care and social services.

As a matter of fact, we have heard that there is no longer health care and social services being delivered at all, in which case that property automatically reverted back to the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth may already own this property. I think it makes sense for this bill to go back to the committee so that we can clear up once and for all what they are doing with the property right now and whether or not the Commonwealth owns the property right now. If so, it is the Commonwealth's property; we do not have to change any covenants in this matter, and this property should revert back to the Commonwealth for use in the Commonwealth in the proper manner.

For that, I suggest and urge every member to support the gentleman's motion. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the bill be recommitted to committee?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would rise in support of this motion, because there were some unanswered questions at our committee meeting, and I think we could have benefited by airing out the issue a little more, perhaps even a hearing with some of the participants.

I do know that this land is on the Marcellus Shale play, and one of the questions that really was not answered at the hearing is, do we know if there is any intent here to explore the mineral rights? Do the mineral rights contain any natural gas? These are just sort of unanswered questions.

I know we are dealing here with the value of this selling of the reversionary interest, but that reversionary interest would be worth a lot more if in fact this was a Marcellus gas situation. So it is just another question mark to add to the other question marks. I think we ought to proceed on the basis of, let us just go slow. Let us be sure there is not any hurry here. Let us air out the issue a little more. Maybe it is a very good transfer, but until we really air it out, we just do not know.

So I would support the gentleman's motion.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the bill be recommitted?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Barbin, for the second time.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I made this motion for the purposes of trying to find out what the facts are. When this parcel of property, 8.6 acres, was transferred originally, it was transferred for the purpose of health-care services. That is an appropriate purpose. It is just like the type of benefit we provide nonprofits – they do not pay taxes, and the reason they do not is because the nonprofit provides a service to the government that we would otherwise have to pay. But that is the reason we transfer the property in the first place. If they are now asking to sell the property for a different reason and there is language in the deed that says if you do not use it anymore, it goes back to the Commonwealth, then we need to do that. We need to do it because the purpose of the transfer is no longer being met.

So I ask all the members of the House to make sure that we are not just giving away money, because a nonprofit CEO (chief executive officer) that finds out that he pays \$440,000 for a restriction but then goes out the next day and sells it for \$1.5 million has a million dollars more to use in his nonprofit. It could end up as his salary, and that is not appropriate when we are under such tight budget restrictions.

So I ask for a "yes" vote, just to make sure that this transfer is legitimate.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall HB 1825 be recommitted to the State Government Committee?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia, Ms. Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As a matter of fact, I made this same motion in the committee for the same reasons. On October 4, I have to say, we had testimony from the gentleman from Tioga, the maker of this bill, that the property was empty. Now he is saying it is not. I am not saying that he is deliberately or in any way trying to mislead anybody on this floor. I am only saying we do not know, we do not know if this property is empty. We do not

know if this property is being used by the nonprofit for the reason to provide medical and social services that we conveyed this land for nothing, for no money, for free, to this nonprofit. We do not know anything about it.

I asked for a hearing on October 4; we did not get one. I do not understand what the unholy rush is about that, this conveyance. This bill was in the State Government Committee last session. Nobody asked me to move it. Why was that? It was in the State Government Committee the session before. Nobody asked me to move it. Why was that? Now suddenly we have a different majority party. There is this whole big rush to move it. It makes me very nervous.

Those of you who want to protect yourself, vote to hear this thing out and let us get the facts right. How can it hurt us to get the facts? That is the question I want you all to ask your taxpayers and your constituents. What can be wrong with spending a couple of weeks to get the facts?

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall HB 1825 be recommitted to the State Government Committee? Those in favor of recommitting will vote "aye"; those opposed to recommitment will vote "nay."

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady, Ms. Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment 05334 would say that no drilling for mineral rights can be performed on this land, and the reason for this restriction is more and more important since now we have rejected twice the opportunity to learn what is actually going on there, something which I think your constituents and voters would be horrified if they knew, if they were listening to us.

We do not have any idea what this land is worth without the \$450,000 restriction, covenant put on it. We have no idea. This land could be worth millions of dollars. It very likely is worth millions of dollars, particularly if it is sold to somebody who is going to look for minerals underneath it.

I think we need to protect ourselves. I think we need to protect our taxpayers. We are in, as a gentleman before mentioned, we are in a situation where we are not funding education. Kids are not getting to go to school, and here we are handing something that is worth millions of dollars over to a nonprofit without actually knowing the facts about whether this belongs to us or belongs to the nonprofit? And I would guess the other party is going to now vote against the nonprofit owner doing mineral rights, looking for mineral rights and making this land even more expensive and cheating the taxpayer out of perhaps – perhaps – more and more money?

I just think people who want to protect themselves ought to be voting for this amendment, because we do not know what is going to happen in the future, and this kind of thing has happened to us before, where we conveyed property without looking at it carefully. There is a certain office building in Pittsburgh; it blew up in our faces. Let us not do that again.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would support the Josephs amendment because what we do not know right now on this House floor is whether there is a Marcellus mineral rights issue here. In State Government, at the State Government Committee meeting, the testimony was we simply do not know. I would suspect that the people closer to the transaction, the nonprofit in question, may in fact have an inkling, may in fact one way or the other know. If we pass this amendment and there is not a Marcellus issue, no harm, no foul, there are no consequences. There should not be an objection to this. We do not stop anything that nonprofit wants to do. However, if in fact there are mineral rights, Marcellus gas under there, by passing this amendment we will thresh that issue out. We will sort of thresh out the fact there is knowledge of this, and perhaps there will be further negotiations with the Commonwealth for this reversionary interest. I think this is a wise thing to do in order to ensure that the Commonwealth gets

full value for what they are giving up. I think we owe it to the taxpayers.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Vote "yes" on the Josephs amendment.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Cohen.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we are told that we are in very tough times now; that the State has a deficit for this year and the deficit for this year may meet or exceed our surplus for last year, meaning we will have to cut programs. Given this financial situation, why should we not be vigorous in trying to protect the erosion of State revenues? Why should we not support this amendment to put us back at the bargaining table if the purpose of the sale is to drill for natural gas? This is an amendment of great fiscal responsibility. This is an amendment that could be saving this Commonwealth more money than exists in some of the deficit-cutting ideas that people have. This is an amendment that is well worth supporting. I urge a "yes" vote.
