(1) United States Navy Captain Edward Anthony Davis of Lancaster County, ex-prisoner of war, was awarded three Silver Stars, the Legion of Merit with combat citation, four Bronze Stars with Valor Device, five Air Medals, two Purple Hearts and three Navy Commendation Medals with Valor Device for military service during the Vietnam era.

(2) Born in Norristown and raised in Roxborough, Montgomery County, Capt. Davis was a champion rower at St. Joseph's Preparatory School, attended Villanova University and was a 1962 graduate of the United States Naval Academy.

(3) Capt. Davis was shot down over North Vietnam on August 26, 1965, during his 57th combat mission off the aircraft carrier USS Oriskany.

(4) Capt. Davis endured captivity at the prisoner-of-war camp known as the Hanoi Hilton through February 12, 1973.

(5) Released with other long-serving prisoners of war as part of Operation Homecoming, Capt. Davis returned with a puppy he had liberated from his captors.

(6) After repatriation, Capt. Davis completed graduate studies in international relations at the University of Virginia.

(7) Capt. Davis was the Navy's Director of Advertising and then Commanding Officer of Navy Recruiting District, Harrisburg, before retiring in 1987.

(8) An outstanding public speaker, Capt. Davis was POW consultant to the National Vietnam War Museum and member of the Lancaster Municipal Airport Authority, the Sertoma Club of Lancaster and the Penn Manor School District Board of Directors.

(9) Capt. Davis died November 7, 2006, at 67 years of age.

(10) Capt. Davis was buried with full military honors in Arlington National Cemetery.

(b) Designation.—The Edward Anthony Davis bridge on Dillerville Road in the City of Lancaster, Lancaster County, State Bridge No. 36-4009-0030-0000, is redesignated and shall be known as the Captain Edward Anthony Davis Bridge.

The purpose of this would be to actually have the Secretaries
or their designees from the departments that are most likely
affected by having this portal and that actually deal with these
services every day. If they are going to be coordinated into one
portal, it would probably be good to have their input in the
development and the procedures so that we do not have the
advisory board recommending one thing and them trying to do
something separate.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from
Pike County, Mr. Peifer.

Mr. PEIFER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the gentleman from Lancaster trying to improve
this bill. I can tell you that the Policy Committee looked at some
of the recommendations that are included in this amendment.
We really felt that the agencies that he is describing are already
going to be very active in developing this portal system with
DCED (Department of Community and Economic
Development). We see them very instrumental in the operation
and development of this program in working the everyday
operation of this portal and its effectiveness.

What we were really trying to do with a seven-member
board, Mr. Speaker, was have an independent set of eyes look at
this system and provide for a business approach to a portal
system, because we know that this system, to be effective, has
to be very user-friendly. And number two, we understand that
businesses have to be able to navigate through this system,
hopefully have a positive experience in whatever form or permit
or license they are looking for so they return to that portal over
and over again.

So although I appreciate the gentleman for trying to work
and improve the bill, I really think the agencies that he is
already mentioning are going to be active in the role of

development, and I see the seven-person advisory board as more
of an independent set of eyes and ears to help the advancement
through feedback of the system.

So I would ask the members for a negative vote on
amendment A8305. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the
amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman,
Mr. Sturla, for the second time.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I understand the concerns that the gentleman expressed, who
is the prime sponsor of the bill. The concern that I have, though,
is that these are legislative appointees. They are not necessarily
independent; they are hand chosen. And depending upon what
they decide, it was said that, well, they are going to be
consulting with these Secretaries of these departments as the
process goes along. If that is the case, then there really is not a
need for an advisory board if all the consultations are going to
happen outside of the advisory board. Then it is just a
perfunctory board where somebody gets to come and cast a vote
and we all feel good about ourselves.

If, on the other hand, there is actually going to be work being
done on that advisory board, then I think that the Secretaries of
those departments that are going to be affected by the
recommendations of this should actually be part of it.

And again, if all the negotiations are going to happen on the
side anyway, then there is really no need for a board to be there
in the first place. You can still say, "You all can show up and
we can negotiate stuff on the side and we will try and make
government better and we are all the better for it and we do not
need to establish more government commissions," and things
like that. If we are going to have a commission, let us make it be
one that actually is a commission that works.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the

Certainly understanding the intent and the concern of the

that process to make the permitting process smoother and more
efficient and more effective in Pennsylvania. They have already
gotten that opportunity. Let us get the outsider's perspective, get
those recommendations over to the Cabinet-level officials, and
then let us get the job done in the end.

So regretfully, I would ask that the members oppose
amendment A08305. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Since the KOZ program's inception in 1999, it has led to the creation of thousands of jobs across the Commonwealth. My amendment seeks a fair opportunity to create a significant number of jobs in rural areas by requiring a set-aside of three of the new zones for counties of the fifth through eighth classes. It also makes a few minor cleanup changes to the underlying bill.

And I would ask my colleagues for an affirmative vote on amendment 8308, and it is my understanding that this is an agreed-to amendment, and I would appreciate your vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**BILL ON CONCURRENCE
IN SENATE AMENDMENTS**

The House proceeded to consideration of concurrence in Senate amendment to **HB 169, PN 2961**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of December 19, 1988 (P.L.1262, No.156), entitled, as amended, "An act providing for the licensing of eligible organizations to conduct games of chance, for the licensing of persons to distribute games of chance, for the registration of manufacturers of games of chance, and for suspensions and revocations of licenses and permits; requiring records; providing for local referendum by electorate; and prescribing penalties," further providing for legislative intent, for definitions, for games of chance permitted, for prize limits, for limits on sales, for distributor licenses, for regulations, for licensing of eligible organizations and for special permits; providing for club licensees; further providing for revocation of licenses, for enforcement, for local option, for advertising and for prohibited persons; providing for civil penalties; further providing for penalties; and making editorial changes.

The SPEAKER. Moved by the lady from Cumberland County, Ms. Delozier, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Speaker recognizes the lady, Ms. Delozier, for a brief description of Senate amendments.

The Speaker recognizes the lady from Cumberland County, Ms. Delozier, for a brief description of the Senate amendments.

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On this concurrent vote, the changes from when we had sent it over, no new games will be permitted. Weekly limits are set at \$25,000. Fire and EMS (emergency medical services) emergency services can also hold raffles with a \$50,000 limit. Clubs with liquor licenses will submit a semiannual report to Revenue versus PSP (Pennsylvania State Police). It requires Revenue to post these reports on their Web sites and give a copy to the Pennsylvania State Police. LCE (Liquor Control Enforcement) will conduct random audits in 5 percent of the club licensees a year. Violation of the Small Games Act does not constitute a strike against the liquor license, as current law states. Under this version, a club must have three violations of the Small Games Act before LCE can enforce a penalty against the liquor license. Civil penalties are now imposed. The intentional or willful failure of a club to provide accurate reports will result in a 6-month license suspension, and criminal fines remain the same as current law.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Bucks County, Mr. Clymer.

Mr. CLYMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I had debated this bill several months ago so I am not going to go through all the reasons why a person should not support this legislation, but I do want to make one comment. My comment is simply that it does lead to addiction. No matter how you cut the cake and how many ways you twist it, with this increased gambling that we are going to see if this bill should pass and be signed into law, it does increase addiction. It will hurt families and children, mothers and wives, older people who will spend their money because of the huge increase in limits.

So with those thoughts and reflections, Mr. Speaker, I will be a "no" vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Chester County, Mr. Schroder.

Mr. SCHRODER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the small games of chance law is a bill that has an impact in literally all of our communities across the State, and I believe the impact has been overwhelmingly positive.

The small games of chance law allows our nonprofit organizations, whether they be VFWs (Veterans of Foreign Wars), fire companies, or PTAs (parent-teachers' associations), to raise valuable, needed funds for their volunteer nonprofit organizations to go to charitable purposes and to keep these organizations afloat.

Mr. Speaker, this is the first revision, the first update, and the first improvement of this law since it was enacted back in the mid-1980s. Since that time, as we all know, the figures, the winning figures, the payout figures have not been updated and have not kept up with inflation, and we are changing that today.

Also, additional enforcement has been placed in this legislation, which will allow law enforcement to deal more effectively with violators.

Mr. Speaker, I want to commend the gentlelady from Cumberland County for her diligent and active work in getting us to this point where we are literally on the verge of sending this bill to the Governor's desk. I want to thank the members of the Gaming Oversight Committee for their work. I want to thank my colleague, the Democratic chair, the gentlelady from Philadelphia. And I believe that when we vote this bill out of this chamber today on concurrence, we can all leave this chamber with a sense of pride and accomplishment for a job well done for aiding our communities, our charities, our volunteer organizations to continue their mission and their important work.

So, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a "yes" on concurrence. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This bill is not one that is unfamiliar to all of us in this chamber. We have seen many versions. We have seen many reiterations over the years. We are looking for this compromise, and I think this is a strong bipartisan compromise where we brought in as many people as we possibly could to the process.

At this point in time we are going to go into a budget season. This budget season is going to be a tough one. As we have all said, the money is short in State and Federal government. This bill will allow for our nonprofits in our communities to fill some of the gaps that the State and Federal government and local government can no longer do. This is a support system that our communities need to support scholarships, to support our baseball teams and softball teams, to support our local parks and recreation areas.

As we move through this, I want to say that there has been a lot of input, a lot of bipartisan compromise with all of our State agencies and with all of our agencies, and interaction with the groups outside of State government. I want to thank them, and I ask for an affirmative vote on HB 169 to send this bill to the Governor's desk to help our communities and help ourselves and make sure that our communities still can help us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
