ROSA PARKS REMEMBRANCE DAY

STATEMENT BY MS. BISHOP

The SPEAKER. Would the lady from Philadelphia, Ms. Bishop, kindly come up to the reader's rostrum, unless you prefer to do it down there.

If I could have the members' attention. I would appreciate the members taking their seats. I would appreciate if they would hold the conversations down. If you need to have a conversation, kindly take it to the room at the back of the House.

As some members may be aware and others may not, several years ago legislation was passed that this House will take time to remember Rosa Parks, and at this point in time I would like to recognize Representative Bishop, who would like to speak on the Rosa Parks Remembrance Day, pursuant to State law. Could I have the members' attention.

Ms. BISHOP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The lady, Ms. Bishop, from Philadelphia may proceed.

Ms. BISHOP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is an honor and a privilege to be here today in remembrance of Rosa Parks, a civil rights activist whose bravery and strength gave birth to the civil rights movement in America.

Rosa Parks was a hero for decades. She made an impact on most of us long before we recognized and understood the power her actions represented. From that moment Rosa Parks used her life to make a positive impact upon our lives. The day she refused to give up her seat on the bus, she changed the world.

Rosa Parks confronted issues that lay dead for some 400 years. This issue lay dormant; it did not move until she moved the issue, and boy, did she ever.

When you sit or stay as she did in her seat, she swung open the doors to give us the freedom and the courage to reclaim our lives. When you think of her confronting a bus driver and an angry man who wanted her seat, people whose own upbringing and culture were focused on dominance, you realize what she risked by showing her bravery, asserting her rights in an era which a Black person asserting their rights just would not be tolerated. They had no rights.

I am a believer that certain aspects of our lives are put here for a reason. It is not often in our lives that we can say we truly admire and respect a person who has made an impact on us, but I can say to you today, I can say Rosa Parks's life made an impact upon us. The disobedience of this woman sparked the 381-day Montgomery bus boycott; the actions of one person, one person leading to resounding positive social change.

Today we celebrate her legacy in this House chamber, thanks to you and the vote you cast. Rosa Parks is an example for all of us to live by. And like her seizing on to what was right, it is important for all of us as representatives of the people to never lose sight of where we came from. Whether a small town or whether a large city, we all have the common bond of being elected by our peers – by our peers, not our underlings – and we all have the common bond, a goal of working to reform the system in a positive way, just as Rosa Parks did. We may not agree on how to get there, but it is our ultimate goal to get there.

Rosa Parks led the way to freedom because she was tired of being treated like a second-class citizen. Rosa Parks stepped up, stepped out of the shadows, and stepped into history. In her day she was one of the very few African-American people who had the courage to take a stand against the institutional bigotry of what that long, painful era in America was about.

The act of civil disobedience was about much more than keeping her seat. It was about standing up for justice and not getting pushed around anymore. For that she could have been writing her own death certificate as a martyr for civil rights.

In her book, "Quiet Strength," she writes, "Our mistreatment was just not right, and I was tired of it." That quote caused me to think about my own mother and grandmother and how strong they were. We all stand on the shoulders of Rosa Parks no matter what race, no matter what creed, no matter what profession. We salute her as a legendary American, a constant reminder of where we all came from and the accomplishments we have achieved and how hard the road was to travel.

February's Black History Month is relevant. It is a relevant time to evaluate our work here in the House chamber, to reflect on the symbolism and its significance for all people, just as Rosa Parks did for the civil rights movement for all of us, especially our women. We can ask ourselves, what have I done to make Pennsylvania, to make America a better place? We here are in a place of authority. We collectively can make a positive change. We can make positive things happen when we work together, but we agonize over every political aspect – who is going to say what and who is going to do what and who has done what.

We have the power, but too often we do not have the will. We can preach all we want and we can pat each other on the back all we want over some political gain, but it will never have the impact a tired Black woman who stood and just sat down and said enough is enough.

You know, often we admire the brave actions of others, but sometimes we cannot take that bold stand that they take. Rosa Parks gave us all new hope, which showed us that we can really take a strong stand for justice today. Rosa Parks was the symbol of every man and every woman in today's world. There is a Rosa Parks in each and every one of us. Most likely, all of us have a long stand of courage and career that reminds us that one person really can make a difference.

Thank you, ladies and gentlemen, and thank you, too, Mr. Speaker.

I think that is a flaw in this bill. Our State, county, and local governments, including our school districts, are buckling under the weight of these dinosaur pension plans. We need to begin to make the switch to defined contribution plans, where the taxpayer makes a contribution every year to an employee's retirement but is not left bailing out the pension plan like we are in these times today.

People say that we cannot afford to make such a switch because we need to use new-hire money to keep the old system going. That is the sort of reasoning which destines us to repeat the mistakes that put us where we and Allegheny County are today.

I will vote for this bill because I am sure it is the result of hard work and compromise, which in the end will improve the solvency of the pension plan, but we need to keep pushing for a switch to defined contribution plans wherever the opportunity arises. Our taxpayers no longer have them in their own employment benefit packages. I know they expect that the government benefits system will reflect what they have in their own lives and that the government will not continue to ask them to bail out these plans when the stock market declines, when policymakers and fund managers make bad investments, make unsound funding decisions, or enhance benefits in an unsustainable way.

I urge my fellow members as we go forward to support moving for new hires in many of these systems to defined contribution plans or hybrid plans so the taxpayer is not left holding the bag.

STATEMENT BY MAJORITY LEADER

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the majority leader, Mr. Turzai.

Mr. TURZAI. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

On unanimous consent.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. TURZAI. Sir, in continuing with a theme that has been stated by many on our side of the aisle, private-sector job creation continues to be at the forefront of the agenda that we have been moving, along with fiscal responsibility, over the last year.

In passing SB 1237 today, we amended the Keystone Opportunity Zone, Keystone Opportunity Expansion Zone and Keystone Opportunity Improvement Zone Act by creating a window of time to allow subdivisions to apply to the Department of Community and Economic Development for the designation of 15 new KOZs (keystone opportunity zones). The legislation will give the department the flexibility to designate 15 additional zones and extend existing zones upon local municipality application and approval. The zones promote development in deteriorated, underutilized, or unoccupied land.

Our good friend and colleague, the majority leader of the Senate, introduced this bill, and we think it is crucial to pushing a private-sector-jobs agenda in the State of Pennsylvania. As the Commonwealth seeks to enhance and maintain its manufacturing industry, it needs this tool, KOZs, in the toolbox to attract industry to locate and provide family-sustaining jobs.

I must tell you that with respect to keystone opportunity zones, as opposed to the cardboard check-handout approach over the past 8 years, the KOZ approach shows that if you have a competitive tax environment, it is one item that employers will utilize to locate here, stay here, expand here.

Some information with respect to KOZ economic data for past KOZs indicates that KOZs have consisted of 12 defined areas so far in 61 counties across Pennsylvania, covering more than 46,000 acres and over 193 subzones. Sizes of those KOZs have ranged from under 10 acres to over 500.

In Hazle Township, with respect to some of the KOZs that have already been in place, the property tax paid in 1999 was \$21,000; today it is providing \$4,850,000 per year. In Berwick, Columbia County, there has been a \$55,000 increase in local taxes; in 1999 those local taxes totaled only \$30,000. And in Briar Creek, Columbia County, by way of another example, there has been a \$600,000 increase in local taxes; in 1999 the local taxes totaled only \$10,000. A total of 38,000 jobs have been created since the inception of KOZs in 1999, and 48 percent of all investment made during 2010 was made in the manufacturing industry.

This is just a component part, it is not the singular answer to continuing to promote private-sector job creation in Pennsylvania. But this caucus has for the past year been focusing on private-sector job creation, and we think that the expanded KOZs is indicative of, you create a competitive tax environment, employers will stay, expand, or relocate here in Pennsylvania.
