Mr. MILNE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I, along with my colleague from Chester County, am here to recognize the Conestoga High School Men's Soccer Team. They are the 2011 PIAA AAA State Champions. They are from Tredyffrin/Easttown School District, which is down in Chester County. And behind me, I have three of their captains, the three captains, Ryan Balfour, Andrew Connors, and Clarke Fox. I also have Coach Dave Zimmerman, and back in the back with the other men on the team is coach Matt Konopka. Also behind me is the athletic director and assistant principal, Pat Boyle.

Conestoga has been ranked as one of the best high schools in the entire United States; not just the Commonwealth, but the entire United States. As a matter of fact, I was there a couple years ago to help present a citation recognizing it as the 17th best public high school in the entire United States. These players, I know, take great pride in the kind of team and the kind of chemistry that I know they have achieved as part of this men's soccer team.

In conclusion, let me just also share that this team I think is doing the very best about what athletics at the school level can offer. As somebody who played at a rival high school – in fact, the only bad thing about this team is they beat my alma mater along the way for that perfect season – but I can appreciate what they are getting out of this in terms of discipline and hard work and learning about how to reach goals and making some lifelong friendships. So I think they deserve, the fact that they are putting their energies into a very positive outlet like this, representing their school well, their community well, representing young people well in Pennsylvania. And just chatting with these young people at lunch, I can tell you we have many future leaders here for Pennsylvania who are going to do a lot of good things in this Commonwealth.

So with that, let me also make sure that the remainder of the team also gets a chance to stand. Conestoga Men's Soccer Team, if you all would stand in the back, let the House give you a round of applause for your State championship.

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Freeman, from Northampton County.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am joined by my colleagues, Representatives Brennan and Samuelson, who are also sponsors of this resolution and join with me in calling up HR 552 for the consideration of the House. HR 552 honors the life and memory of Freemansburg Borough Police Officer Robert Allen Lasso, who died in the line of duty on August 11 of last year.

GUESTS INTRODUCED

Mr. FREEMAN. With us today are members of Officer Lasso's family, whom I ask to please rise at this time to be recognized by the House. They are to the left of the Speaker. If they would please rise. They include his wife, Jennifer; his mother, Elsie Stem; his father and stepmother, Donald and Judy Lasso; his in-laws, Michael and Patricia Tallarico; brother-in-law Jonathan Braido; and nephew Justin Hawk. Also here today are two members of the Freemansburg Borough Council, councilmen Jim Smith and Rudolph Gallich, who are here to represent the borough. I should note also that Donald Lasso is a member of the Freemansburg Borough Council as well. The mayor of Freemansburg, Gerald Yob, and Freemansburg Police Chief George Bruneio wanted to be here today; unfortunately, they had other commitments and were unable to attend. I would like the House to please welcome our guests.

Thank you. You may be seated.

Police Officer Robert Lasso was a good and decent man. He was a loving and devoted husband, a loving and devoted father, a family man who loved playing with his daughter, Rose, and his son, Frankie, and enjoyed the simple things in life: watching football, going deer hunting, or working on his beloved Pontiac Firebird and his motorcycle. He was part of an extended family whose connection to the Borough of Freemansburg stretches back many generations, and he was an outstanding police officer. His personal traits of humor and kindness towards others blended so very well with his devotion to duty and his

deep and abiding love of the hometown that he grew up in and felt a great pride in being able to serve as a police officer.

Robert was a 1999 graduate of Freedom High School, studied at Northampton Community College, and graduated from the Allentown Police Academy in 2001. He went on to serve as a member of the Freemansburg Police Department for close to 10 years. On August 11, 2011, Officer Lasso responded to a disturbance complaint. While attempting to resolve the incident, he was attacked by two dogs and was hit by a gunshot, which took his life at the age of 31.

His courageous actions in attempting to resolve the incident resulted in the arrest of his assailant. His death both shocked and deeply touched the small community of Freemansburg, where Robert was a very well-known and much-loved figure. So beloved and respected was Officer Robert Lasso that over 2,000 people turned out for his funeral, which had to be held at the Northampton Community College to accommodate the large crowd. Half of those attending to pay their last respects were law enforcement officers from departments throughout Pennsylvania and beyond. They came from far and wide to pay tribute to one of their own who had made the ultimate sacrifice while in the line of duty.

The Reverend Richard Teitsworth of the First United Church of Christ in Hellertown best captured the true essence of Robert Lasso's life when he observed in his eulogy that "Robert put his heart out, not his hand." And when he also noted that the words "protect and serve" – protect and serve – "are not just words, they represent the life of Robert Lasso."

Officer Robert Lasso touched the lives of many people in his short time on this earth. He helped to make the community of Freemansburg, a place that he had grown up in, a safer and better place. He will be missed by many. I ask the House to please unanimously adopt HR 552 in honor of the memory of this much-beloved and outstanding police officer, Robert Allen Lasso.

The purpose of the underlying bill is to allow municipalities that have prisons, and under the new census numbers, be required to have of a recycling program, to not be forced to adopt a program if the prison has its own existing recycling program.

Mr. Speaker, I would ask that all the members support this. I believe this is an agreed-to amendment. Thank you.

An Act amending the act of January 8, 1960 (1959 P.L.2119, No.787), known as the Air Pollution Control Act, further providing for public review of State implementation plans.

On the question,

The SPEAKER. On that question, the gentleman from Delaware County has four amendments filed. He has indicated his intent to withdraw those amendments; however, I am recognizing the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, on the bill relative to the amendments that he is withdrawing. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I do not want to impede the flow of this bill so I will save my amendments for another day, but it is important to, I think, make certain points that were contained in these amendments. One, the first amendment I will be withdrawing would have increased permits, the permitting fee for air permits, and this fee increase is needed because Pennsylvania's air pollution program is entirely underfunded. It is understaffed and it has insufficient staffing to protect the air quality of Pennsylvania. This amendment would have enacted a schedule initially proposed by the Rendell administration but stopped by the Corbett administration. I am told by Secretary Krancer that they will be moving a fee schedule forward, and we await that.

The second amendment I will be withdrawing will require the Department of Environmental Protection to develop protocols for the collecting of air pollution data. Mr. Speaker, Marcellus drilling is an emerging threat for air pollutants: NOx (nitrogen oxide), SOx (sulfur oxide), VO2 (vanadium oxide), particulate matter, methane. We need methods for quantifying this data. This amendment would have put that into place and required the collecting of data.

The third amendment I will be withdrawing would have required an air permit for air pollution from Marcellus wellhead activity. Right now Marcellus wellhead activity is exempt from air pollution permits. The reason for this exemption is because the rules were initially set in the days of shallow gas drilling, where very little air pollution came from wellheads. With unconventional drilling and six and eight drills per wellhead, the air pollution consequences are much more severe, and therefore, there is permitting that should be enacted. So, Mr. Speaker, these are important amendments, but because I do not want to slow down this bill, I will be withdrawing them. Thank you for giving me the chance to explain that.

has determined that the waiver is knowingly, intelligently and
voluntarily made after having conducted a colloquy with the

sought is not one of the following:

(i) An informal detention or shelter hearing
under section 6332 (relating to informal hearing).

(ii) A hearing to consider transfer to criminal

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Montgomery County, Mr. Murt, rise?

Mr. MURT. Mr. Speaker, to speak in reference to my amendment on this bill. This amendment, being not filed timely, Mr. Speaker, we will not get an opportunity to debate it, so I would like to withdraw that amendment. However, I would like an opportunity to make a comment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order on the bill.

Mr. MURT. Mr. Speaker, grand jury investigations into the recent child sex abuse scandals, which have rocked Penn State and the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, have placed the issue of child sex abuse onto the front burner here in Pennsylvania, which is where it belongs. One in four girls and one in six boys has been sexually abused, and these statistics are known to be low due to a gross underreporting of child sex crimes.

Mr. Speaker, it is my belief that we should expand the current statute of limitations for child sex abuse. The refusal to address this has resulted in the protection of abusers for both criminal prosecutions and civil liability, and discourages victims from ever coming forth. In most cases, victims are unable to come forward until after years of therapy, and this recovery phase is frequently preceded by decades of emotional turmoil, substance abuse, and self-destructive behaviors.

Mr. Speaker, sadly, one of our distinguished colleagues here in Harrisburg bravely revealed to us that she was sexually assaulted as a young girl, at the age of 12 years old. It took her 66 years to find the strength to share her story and to encourage other victims to come forward. She is not alone. People who are subjected to sexual abuse as children are a unique class of

victim that requires an extended statute of limitations to allow them to come forward with their claims. Only by opening this window can we recognize their abuse and give them the respect they deserve as human beings and as U.S. citizens. The pain and the shame for both the victims and the perpetrators will not go away as long as the window remains closed tightly, preventing the truth from coming to light and maintaining the current restrictive statute of limitations for child sex abuse victims. Anything less than this is justice denied.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the bill?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Caltagirone.

Mr. CALTAGIRONE. Mr. Speaker, I plan to withdraw my amendment, but I would also like the privilege to make a few statements.

Mr. CALTAGIRONE. Pennsylvania happens to be one of the top seven States in this country that allows for those to file lawsuits and/or criminal actions up to age 50 on the criminal side – just a few years back this General Assembly extended that – along with the civil from age 18 up to age 32. So we did do that. The window has been opened. We are one of the top few States with such leniency as far as filing lawsuits or going for the criminal aspect, and I think that says a lot for what we have done in this General Assembly.

BILL ON CONCURRENCE
IN SENATE AMENDMENTS

The House proceeded to consideration of concurrence in Senate amendments to the following **HB 424, PN 3197**:

An Act amending the act of December 20, 1983 (P.L.260, No.72), referred to as the Public Adjuster Licensing Law, further providing for definitions and for license; providing for application for public adjuster license, for licensing, for issuance and term of license, for license renewals and for reciprocal licensing; further providing for fees, for bond and for contract; providing for written disclosure of financial interest; further providing for revocation, etc., of license and for violations; providing for civil remedy; further providing for administration and enforcement; and providing for persons licensed as public adjuster solicitors.

On the question,
Will the House concur in Senate amendments?

The SPEAKER. Moved by the gentleman, Mr. Godshall, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Godshall, for a brief description of the Senate amendments.

Mr. GODSHALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The amendments the Senate put in are agreed to by all parties. The first one was, the insured has the right to rescind the contract within 3 calendar days; previously it was 5 business days. The second one was the insured will be provided with a copy of the estimate for repairs upon the insured's request and supporting documentation. The third amendment was the contract must be disclosed that the public adjuster is not a representative of the insurer and is an independent licensee of the Insurance Department; previously the language did not include that the public adjuster is an independent licensee in the Insurance Department. Another amendment is the public adjuster cannot prohibit communication between the insurer and the insured, which was previously done on some occasions. And a provision was also added that a public adjuster must notify the insurer within 2 calendar days of entering into a contract with the insured. These were agreed-to amendments on a bill that was really put together last session. Representative Costa and myself had bills, both of them were passed unanimously in this House, sent over to the Senate, and had no action. This was a combination of the Costa-Godshall bill of last session, and I ask for a positive vote.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Micozzie.

Mr. MICOZZIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, HB 424 updates and modernizes the Commonwealth's law regarding the regulations of public adjusters. The enforcement provisions contained in this bill go far towards ensuring the public is protected from unscrupulous public adjusters. Also, Mr. Speaker, I personally want to thank Chairmen DeLuca and Costa, Representative Costa, for the bipartisanship that they displayed in getting this bill passed, and of course my good friend, Godshall. You are laughing? I ask for a unanimous vote on this bill.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. DeLuca.

Mr. DeLUCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support concurrence on HB 424. I want to commend Representative Godshall, working together with Representative Costa, for this long-overdue piece of legislation. I am glad to see that the public adjuster bill has been sent by the Senate back to the House. We have worked on this, myself, my good friend, Chairman Micozzie, have been working on this for a couple years, and I am glad to see that we sent this over to the Senate. The Senate did their job in sending it back to us so that we can vote on this.

Certainly, this is one step that we have taken in the world of insurance in protecting our constituents from any potential bad actors. Mr. Speaker, there are many honorable public adjusters in the market who can perform an important role when a disaster strikes, but this law has not been amended, let me say this, this law has not been amended for 29 years, and today is the time to make those updates, which we have done.

In closing, let me again thank Representative Godshall and Representative Costa, and also my good friend, Chairman Micozzie, for continuing to work together in a bipartisan manner in the Insurance Committee to get some of these important pieces of legislation that benefit the consumers of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania passed and sent to the Governor.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the majority leader, Mr. Turzai.

Mr. TURZAI. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of HB 424. Mr. Speaker, by passing this legislative proposal, the bill is going to the Governor's desk and will be signed into law. It is another example of a piece of legislation that has been debated through a number of sessions but did not get done. But again, with the hard work on both sides of the aisle, and with our good friends on the other side of the Capitol, we continue to be solution-oriented, proactive, and moving in a forward direction. This bill is good public policy.

As many of you know, a public adjuster is an individual hired by a policyholder when that policyholder has sustained a loss. The public adjuster represents the policyholder in all aspects of the claim process by analyzing the damages, reviewing the insured's policy coverage, and determining the

overall value of the damaged property. While a public adjuster may be hired to assist with personal residential losses, they are more often hired to assist with business losses. This particular piece of legislation makes sure that that profession is viewed appropriately and handled responsibly on a State level. We are moving forward in making sure that commerce in this State operates fairly and with a level playing field.

I salute the author of this particular piece of legislation, my good friend from Montgomery County, along with our respective majority and minority chairs of the Insurance Committee for their outstanding work. We all as part of the team are happy to see that pieces like this are not only being debated, but actually getting to the Governor's desk, a hallmark of this legislative session.

I urge everybody to please vote "yes." Thank you.
