STATEMENT BY MRS. SWANGER

The SPEAKER. Representative Swanger is recognized under unanimous consent to reflect on our guests here today.

Mrs. SWANGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The American Egg Board has proclaimed the month of May 2012 as National Egg Month to raise egg awareness and spread the "egg-cellent" news about eggs and the egg industry. Through the coordination of Paul Hostetter of PennAg Industries and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, this proclamation was written by the Department of Agriculture and signed by Governor Corbett.

I do not know if there is any other food that is more diversely used than the egg. It can be scrambled, fried, hard-boiled, soft-boiled, poached, deviled, pickled, and yes, even eaten raw, if you so dare. Eggs are used in an endless variety of recipes, and I am sure there is not a day that goes by that you do not eat eggs or foods made with eggs.

Eggs are an excellent source of protein. In fact, egg protein is the highest natural source of protein and is the standard by which other protein sources are measured.

Eggs are also an inexpensive source of nutrition. The average cost of a serving is 15 cents. I am pretty sure restaurants like IHOP offer breakfast all day long because there are folks that want the option to have "two eggs over easy" any time they want – breakfast, lunch, or dinner.

You probably do not realize how often people talk about eggs without even talking about them. For instance, we are told not to put all our eggs in one basket; many have been called a good egg; some have been told that they have egg on their face; we try to build a good nest egg; and sometimes we walk on eggshells; also, sometimes we egg someone on, and the list goes on and on.

Even after reading and learning about eggs – egg production, types of eggs – I was not able to find the answer to the age-old question, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?"

We can be proud that our State of Pennsylvania ranks number three in egg production.

It is my honor to have my constituent, Mr. Chris Pierce, appointed as the current chairman of the American Egg Board and president of Heritage Poultry Management Services in Lebanon County. Paul Hostetter of PennAg Industries serves as the State executor of the American Egg Board Program. The American Egg Board coined the phrase "The Incredible Edible Egg," so it is only fitting that Chris Pierce received this proclamation from the Governor for the American Egg Board, naming May 2012 as "National Egg Month."

STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Gillen, seeking recognition under unanimous consent? The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Seventy years ago, June 4 through 7, 1942, there was a great carrier battle in the Central Pacific. Admirable Nimitz called it a glorious day in our history. Seventy years ago the Battle of Midway—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend, please.

If we could kindly hold the conversations down, please. We recognize that we need to carry on some other business. I would appreciate it. It is just a little bit loud. If we could take the conversations to the rear of the House. I would appreciate if the members just turn the conversations down just a little wee bit. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Gillen, may proceed.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Seventy years ago the United States Navy stopped an invasion of Midway Atoll, located in the Central Pacific nearly midway between Tokyo and San Francisco. The United States aircraft carriers Enterprise, Hornet, and Yorktown met the Japanese carriers Akagi, Kaga, Soryu, and Hiryu. Those names of four Japanese aircraft carriers may not be especially memorable on the floor of the House today, but those four Japanese aircraft carriers were the same aircraft carriers from

which planes were launched in the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. In fact, the Akagi was the flagship aircraft carrier of both the Battle of Midway and the Japanese flagship aircraft carrier in the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor.

On board the Akagi was Mitsuo Fuchida, in charge of and commander of the air unit which led the attack on Pearl Harbor. In one of the most epic naval engagements of all time, the United States lost the USS Yorktown. The Japanese lost the Akagi, the Kaga, the Soryu, and the Hiryu. All four Japanese aircraft carriers that were involved in the attack on Pearl Harbor were sunk that day by the United States Navy.

In closing, I believe that we have a solemn and a sacred obligation to remember the sacrifice of all those that went down in ships and planes that day. We have a solemn obligation to remember those that defended the Atoll against the invasion force of the Japanese. And if we could give voice to those that died that day, they simply want us to do one thing, and that is remember.

Many years after this event took place, my dad said to me, "They don't make ships like that anymore," and he would have known, because he was in the South Pacific on the USS Hancock. He was not at Midway. He was an aviator and he knew something about aircraft carriers. My friends, today as we remember and I reflect on what my dad said to me many years ago, as he has passed away now some three decades, no, they do not make ships like that anymore, perhaps something else is true — they do not make men like that anymore.

than \$44,666,667 of the total aggregate amount shall be used to provide tax credits for contributions from business firms to scholarship organizations. No less than \$22,333,333 of the total aggregate amount shall be used to provide tax credits for contributions from business firms to educational improvement organizations.

(2) (i) For the fiscal years 2004-2005, 2005-2006 and 2006-2007, the total aggregate amount of all tax credits approved for contributions from business firms to pre-kindergarten scholarship programs shall not exceed \$5,000,000 in a fiscal year.

(ii) For the fiscal year 2007-2008 and each fiscal year thereafter, the total aggregate amount of all tax credits approved for contributions from business firms to pre-kindergarten scholarship programs shall not exceed \$8,000,000 in a fiscal year.

(3) (i) From the tax credits for contributions by business firms to educational improvement organizations, 10% of the available amount shall initially be set aside for contributions by business firms to educational improvement organizations that provide donations to career and technical schools and shall be distributed in accordance with section 1705-F(g).

(ii) Tax credits remaining from the amount set aside in subparagraph (i) after July 1 of each year shall be made available to business firms for contributions to any educational improvement organization and shall be distributed in accordance with section 1705-F(g).

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Roebuck.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

First, I would like to say that I support HB 2319 in that it will assist career and technical-vocational schools in fulfilling their mission, and that mission is to provide better career and technical education to our students. It is one of the several measures that I believe support our efforts to promote career development in this area.

My amendment addresses the funding amount of tax credits that these career and technical schools will at a minimum be able to get from the EITC (educational improvement tax credit) program. While the bill adds career and technical schools as being eligible to receive EITC funding along with other existing public schools through the educational improvement organization, because there is so much greater demand for EITC funds from educational improvement organizations than is available, the likelihood that these career and technical schools will actually get EITC funding in the near future is unlikely. To address this, my amendment sets aside 10 percent of the EITC funding going to educational improvement organizations for those educational improvement organizations that provide donations to career and technical schools. If there are tax credits remaining from this amount set aside for the EIOs for career and technical schools, those tax credit funds would be made available to other EIOs.

Mr. Speaker, if this is to be of real benefit to career and technical education schools, then indeed the money needs to be available, and I am asking then that this amendment be adopted by my colleagues. I believe the amendment is an agreed-to

amendment, and I would ask for the support of my colleagues. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Evankovich.

Mr. EVANKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. VITALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

First, I would like to congratulate the prime sponsor on bringing to the fore an important issue of reducing gun violence in this State. It is an extremely important issue, and I am glad he has taken it on as one issue important to him.

I have some concerns about the approach taken in this bill with regard to addressing gun violence. I think the imposition of a 5-year mandatory minimum without any possibility of parole or any sort of transitional program for the mere having a gun in your possession is not the best use of our correctional dollars. If I understand this bill, to get the 5-year mandatory minimum without any possibility of parole, you do not have to commit any other crimes other than having a gun in your possession you should not have in your possession.

Certainly those people who commit certain felonies, as outlined in this bill, like stalking or criminal trespass or others and are rightfully deprived of their right to own guns should in fact suffer some penalty if in fact they violate the law and have a gun in their possession. That is just wrong. But to impose a 5-year mandatory minimum for simply having a gun, I think, is the wrong way to go.

Let me just read one letter from the Prison Society in opposition to this bill. They say, quote, "Longer prison terms do not have a meaningful impact on recidivism.... For many offenses, treatment and programming is more effective than warehousing. There are viable cost-effective corrections alternatives to incarceration." They make the point that many people charged with crimes like this are not familiar with the penalties when they in fact commit the crime.

One of the problems here with the Stephens bill, it is enormously, enormously expensive. It is my understanding, after discussions in the Appropriations Committee, that the cost of this bill will rise over time and in 6 years will cost \$78 million. Let me repeat that. This bill, the cost will increase over time and will cost taxpayers \$78 million per year, and that price will only rise over time.

Mr. Speaker, \$78 million is a large price tag for a measure where there is no empirical evidence that it will reduce gun violence. Mr. Speaker, the problem with mandatory minimum sentencing is that it takes the ability of a judge to view the individual facts and circumstances of each case and the background of each person accused with a crime and it adjusts the sentence in such a way to do justice.

I would urge a "no" vote. Thank you.

Sudden cardiac arrest is the number one killer of youth athletes, and Phyllis and Darren Sudman, we know you are watching. They were here yesterday to watch the Senate send it back to us for concurrence. We are looking forward to a bill signing next week.

This bill is about awareness; it is about education; it is about saving lives; and frankly, it is about breaking the silence on our athletic fields and courts, breaking the silence from when an athlete drops and suddenly dies.

So thank you all for your support of this great legislation, and I congratulate the Sudman family for all their hard work.

**BILL ON CONCURRENCE

Hanna and Victor and Katherine Crum, certain lands situate in Curtin Township, Centre County; authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Governor, to grant and convey to the Centre County Industrial Development Corporation certain lands situate in Benner Township, Centre County; authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Governor, to grant and convey to Randy M. Thomas, or his assigns, a permanent utility easement across certain lands situate in White Township, Indiana County; authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Governor, to remove and release the restrictive use covenants imposed on certain real property situate in the Borough of Blossburg, Tioga County; authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs and the Governor, to grant and convey, at a price to be determined through a competitive bid process, certain lands, buildings and improvements situate in the Borough of Canonsburg, Washington County; authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Governor, to grant and convey to VARHA, Inc., certain lands situate in the Borough of Polk, Venango County; authorizing the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, with the approval of the Governor, to grant and convey to Ohiopyle Borough certain lands situate in Ohiopyle Borough, Fayette County, in exchange for Ohiopyle Borough granting and conveying certain lands to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to be added to those existing lands at Ohiopyle State Park; authorizing the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, with the approval of the Governor, to grant and convey to Kyle A. and Tamara J. Boltz certain lands situate in Union Township, Lebanon County, in exchange for Kyle A. and Tamara J. Boltz's granting and conveying certain lands to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, to be added to those existing lands at Swatara State Park; and making related repeals.

On the question,
Will the House concur in Senate amendments?

The SPEAKER. Moved by the gentleman, Mr. Baker, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Tioga, Mr. Baker, for a brief description of Senate amendments.

Mr. BAKER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

This legislation passed in the House that was singular in subject to a land transfer and a restrictive covenant to be released in Tioga County in the former Blossburg State Hospital, hopefully to be used for affordable housing. It then went to the Senate, and it was amended in the Senate in a bipartisan fashion that benefits members both across the aisle and on our side. It adds several more land transfer pieces to this legislation that benefits my good friend from Centre County,

Mr. Hanna, Messrs. Reed, Neuman, Mahoney, and Mrs. Swanger. These are all land transfer bills that are now combined into one, and I ask the members to kindly support the legislation.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Clinton County, Mr. Hanna.

Mr. HANNA. Mr. Speaker, while I would like to speak on the bill, I also feel a need to be certain that I do not have a conflict in this matter. In reading the analysis today, I am discovering that there is a Jack Hanna as one of the potential property owners in one of the parcels. While it would be unreasonable for me to think that I would not somehow be related to Jack Hanna, I do not have any idea who Jack L. Hanna is.

The SPEAKER. In the Speaker's opinion, if the gentleman from Clinton County wants to affirm that he does not know Jack, I do not think he has a conflict.

Mr. HANNA. I teed that one up beautifully, did I not?

The SPEAKER. It could not have been any better.

Mr. HANNA. In the interest of the rules though, Mr. Speaker, I would like a ruling from the Chair that I do not have a conflict. I do not know—I know a number of Jack Hannas, but I do not know Jack L. Hanna.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker sees no conflict and appreciates the gentleman drawing it to the attention of the House.

Mr. HANNA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order on the bill.

Mr. HANNA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What I would like to say about this particular transfer is this centers around a mining town in Centre County that was built around a clay mine and a brick factory. Both the clay mine and the brick factory have long since closed.

Earlier in the last decade, DCNR, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, acquired a great deal of the surrounding lands for State forest purposes. In the process it appears now that there were some deed overlaps, and they have created a cloud on the title of these six residences in the village of Orviston. DCNR, after survey work and clarification, just simply wants to make it clear that they never intended to acquire any of these six residences, these residential properties, and they are quitclaiming any interest they have in these six properties. That is the basis for the transaction in that particular parcel.

The other Centre County parcel is also in the 76th District, my district, in Benner Township, and it is simply a parcel of ground on an Interstate 99 interchange that is currently owned by DGS (Department of General Services) for the State correctional institution. The State correctional institution no longer uses that parcel, cannot use that parcel because it is separated from its main facility by I-99. They agreed long ago to transfer it to us once we had— It is part of a business park. Once we had a business prospect, they agreed to transfer it to us, and we now have that business prospect, and we are paying appraised value for that particular parcel.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

First, I want to say, aside from the Hannas who work in the House and on the floor, I do not know any Hannas.

Once again, Mr. Speaker – I got one laugh – the Senate has loaded up a bill that had one conveyance. It now has eight. Many of those conveyances were never reviewed by the State Government Committee. The bill in its current form might not violate the letter of rule 32, which, as you remember, is the way the Department of General Services lets us know whether the title is clear and other kinds of information that help us when we convey land. So maybe the letter of rule 32 was not violated, but certainly the spirit was.

We are supposed to review in committee property details – what it is used for now; what it will be used for in the future; what is the full consideration to be given for the transfer, if any; and what is the Department of General Services' appraisal of the property, including its valuation and a list of recorded liens and encumbrances; the date by which the land is needed, as well as the legislative district in which the land is located. In committee we should be able to interact with officials from the Department of General Services who perform these kinds – who are trained, who are experts in digging out these kinds of facts and elucidating the transactions.

The reason behind this, we are in an era here in which many people on both sides of the aisle are committed to reducing taxes and certainly many more committed to not increasing taxes. If we do not know exactly what we are conveying and what it is worth, we run the risk of having the taxpayer be cheated. To me, we should not be doing this and certainly we should not be doing this if we are members who are committed to not increasing taxes. This is not a tax, but it certainly acts the same way on our budget if we are letting valuable land go for under the price that the people ought to be getting.

I am familiar with one of the conveyances in this bill. It is in section 4 now. It involves a property in Blossburg, Tioga County. It was conveyed by Act 163 of 1986 to a nonprofit corporation with a covenant in the deed that it be used exclusively for health care and social services, and the covenant also says that if at any time the land is used for any other purpose or if the health and social service purpose ceases, the title would immediately revert to the people of the Commonwealth.

Now, I am not going to interrogate the maker of section 4 of this bill, but here are the questions that are still in my mind about that piece of conveyance of the bill with all of these conveyances: Are any health services being provided at this location at this time? If not, when was the last patient treated at this location? What is the status of the property at the current time? At this point this land may have in fact, although we are not recognizing it, reverted back to the Commonwealth and the people may own it. We had conflicting information on this issue from the sponsor and from officials from the Department of General Services.

In accordance with Act 163 of 1986, the State may own this property. That is the reason why reverter clauses are put in land conveyance bills. If we did that, we would want a legislature 20, 30 years hence to honor a clause that we inserted. I think we

ought to respect the people upon whose shoulders we stand and really get the facts straight about this piece of conveyance, which is in section 4.

Another property I am familiar with is in section 6. It is for 8 acres in Polk Borough, Venango County. It conveys land to a group called a charity, which does a wonderful job. I have nothing against this charity. In fact, I would like to praise it, Venango Area Riding for the Handicapped services. It is a social service program which uses horseback riding in terms of treating its patients. If VARHA should lose its customers from Polk Center, which is how it gets its population now, there is nothing to prevent that 8 acres and the adjacent 40 acres, which is already owned by the charity, by the riding for the handicapped association, from being sold to a Marcellus Shale company and being offered to drillers for an enormous amount of money, and who is the loser? The loser is the Pennsylvania taxpayer. Or since this property is on a corner, maybe a Turkey Hill or a Sheetz – I have nothing against those corporations either – or some such thing will end up on this property, make it much more valuable, and again, the taxpayer will be cheated.

If you remember, Mr. Speaker, with section 4, I talked about this. Many people from my side of the aisle did not vote for it. I said the same thing then, which I will say now. I am not voting for this because I think the procedure is violated in a very gross way by the Senate. I think procedure is always more important than a short-term outcome. I am sorry that there are other conveyances that people want in this omnibus bill, but please, you will vote your conscience no matter what I say, but I am urging you to vote your conscience. I will be voting mine, and I am voting "no." Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
