STATEMENT BY MR. PYLE

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from Armstrong, Mr. Pyle, is seeking recognition under unanimous consent relative to one of the uncontested resolutions that was just adopted. The gentleman is in order under unanimous consent.

Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am.

Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the support of the elected body here for resolutions 762, 763, and 764. Of particular interest is the kidney cancer resolution.

Mr. Speaker, every year over 144,000 Americans are diagnosed with kidney cancer, which is probably one of the most treatable forms of cancer. Early detection is key. Please, whenever you are getting your routine physical, take care of that.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Caltagirone, rise?

Mr. CALTAGIRONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to submit some remarks for the record, and I want to thank the members for their vote on HB 1803 yesterday. Thank you, sir.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will deliver the remarks to the clerk, and they will be noted in the record.

Mr. CALTAGIRONE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This bill, HB 1803, allows but does not require third-class cities with parking authorities to move the enforcement of their parking citations away from the criminal justice system and into a civil administrative process. We already allow our first- and second-class cities this same option.

We need to find savings, both large and small, in making State and local government more efficient and more responsive. HB 1803 will allow approximately 1,500 cases per month to be moved out of the magisterial district justice system and off the AOPC (Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts) system as well, just from the city of Reading alone.

There are numerous other third-class cities that would immediately also have the option of moving to the civil administrative system, if they would choose it. They are:

- Allentown
- Bethlehem
- Easton
- Erie
- Greensburg

- Harrisburg
- Hazleton
- Lancaster
- Pittston, and
- Wilkes-Barre

In addition, all the other third-class cities could benefit from this by forming a parking authority.

At times we are all annoyed by the inefficiencies built in to the way our cities do business. This legislation gives us a chance to help them do things better.

The SPEAKER. On the resolution, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Fayette, Mrs. Kula.

Mrs. KULA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today a somber but fulfilling duty falls to me, as I am entrusted to present a condolence resolution honoring former State Representative James E. Shaner.

Jim, as many of you knew him, passed away on April 15 at age 75, much too soon. He served in the House for 12 years, from '94 through 2006, and Jim was my predecessor, representing the 52d Legislative District.

Representative Shaner's time in the legislature, representing folks from Fayette and Westmoreland Counties, provided an exclamation point to a long career of public service. Jim started out teaching and coaching at Uniontown Area Senior High School, his alma mater. He also taught for Intermediate Unit 1 at Connellsville High School. As a matter of fact, when I had a group here that had won a State award, the teacher that was with the young people said to me, it is because of Jim Shaner that I am a teacher; he inspired me; he caused me to dedicate my life to teaching.

So it was only fitting that when Jim came to the House of Representatives, one of the committees he served on with distinction was the Education Committee. He also served on the Finance, Game and Fisheries, Tourism and Recreational Development, and Democratic Policy Committees, all of which reflected his keen desire to reflect the interests of the people who sent him here.

Everyone regarded Jim as a man of few words, but as a man, Jim said what he meant and meant what he said. You could count on that. Constituents, colleagues, supporters, and friends knew Jim as a straight shooter. He told you like it was, and you always knew where he stood. And just as important, you always knew where you stood.

As an elected official, Jim Shaner represented a type of candid dependability that set a good example for anyone in public service. As I succeeded Representative Shaner in this seat, I knew I had big shoes to fill. When I met Jim, as he contemplated retirement, he told me this was the greatest job he ever had.

Jim also had an active life outside of duties as a Representative – hunting, golf – but there was no greater passion in his life than the love he had for his family. His first and greatest love was his wife, Mabel. Jim and Mabel were the perfect couple. You never saw one without the other back home. They would have celebrated their 52d wedding anniversary this month. They could be found many Saturday nights at the local AMVETS dancing the night away.

Jim had just as much love in his life for his daughter, Shawn. Shawn said her dad taught her many lessons in life, and most of those lessons were taught by example.

Jim also had an extraordinary bond with his brother, Dwight, a magisterial district judge in Fayette County. Dwight and Jim were more than just brothers, they were best friends.

FAMILY INTRODUCED

Mrs. KULA. Please join me in welcoming Jim's daughter, Shawn, and his brother, Dwight, and Dwight's wife, Linda, who are seated to the left of the Speaker. Will you please stand.

The SPEAKER. Will our guests please rise.

Mrs. KULA. As every member knows, when you first come into the House, most people you meet will ask the same question: Whose seat did you take? And when I was asked and I responded "Jim Shaner's seat," the same response from everyone was, "What a nice man." That will always be how Jim will be remembered, as a nice man.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker thanks the lady.

On the resolution, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Lawrence County, Mr. Sainato.

Mr. SAINATO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Kula's remarks, I think, were beautiful. Jim would be very proud of Deb.

I wanted to say a few words, because I came in with Jim. We both came in in '94, along with Representatives Haluska, Readshaw, and Petrarca on the Democratic side that are still here. And what do you say about Jim? Jim was a passionate man. He loved his family, but he loved this institution of the legislature. He was here every time he was supposed to be here. He never would miss.

And I have to just tell one or two stories about Jim. I think it was my first or second term in the legislature, and Jim was in the hospital and he was not here, and a very big, important vote was coming up. And that is when we used to be here until 4, 5 o'clock in the morning sometimes. And it was about 10 o'clock at night, and we looked down the hall and Jim is hobbling down, and it is like, "Jim, what are you doing here?" He goes, "I have to make this vote." Now, he had just gotten out of the hospital. I mean, so that was the type of passion that Jim had.

And Jim represented this institution. We have our disagreements, but Jim would go across the aisle. He treated everyone the same. And as Deb said, Jim spoke his mind. He would tell it the way it was, whether you agreed with him or disagreed with him, but when he saw you later that night, you were still his friend. That was Jim Shaner, and he left that, I think, in many of us. And I think it showed when Jim was ill and I had sent the e-mail about "let's do a card for Jim" and the response was so overwhelming, and I am so glad we did that. We were able to get it to his family when Jim was in the hospital, and the comments that were put down for those who knew him were phenomenal, and for those who did not, they wanted to go up there and sign that card because they knew of Jim Shaner. So that is what it was about for Jim.

And you look back, you know, and I consider him, he was one of my best friends down here. He sat right in front of me, and he would always be there whenever people needed him. So I consider Jim an example for all of us. He represented the values of the people of his district. And he would always say, "what my people want," "what I want to do." And Jim was 68 when he retired, and he stayed one or two more extra terms,

but he had that passion because he wanted to do good things. That is why he ran for the job, to do good things.

So his memory, when we go back and think about it, it is always positive. As Deb said, when you think of Jim Shaner, you always say he was a nice man, and Jim truly was a very, very nice man. So, Jim, you know, he would be looking down upon us.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And he was a nice guy, and he loved his family and he loved his wife, Mabel. They were inseparable.

He was a great guy. I will miss him. And, you know, Mr. Speaker, Jim Shaner made this House of Representatives a better place, and I would just like to, on behalf of the Democratic Caucus, say that we are very sorry and join all of Jim's friends and his family in mourning his passing.

I just want to rise to thank the majority chairman of the Insurance Committee and the minority chairman for their outstanding work on this piece of legislation and their patience as we work through the different issues. Mr. Speaker, this HB 532 is landmark legislation, and I commend my colleague from York County for his steadfast pursuit of this. Essentially, this bill requires that children with special needs are afforded general anesthesia for routine dental care. Up to this point, children who have autism or have other types of developmental disabilities, who cannot sit still in the dental chair for fillings, cleanings, scalings, routine dental hygiene, have gotten compromised care. And the irony here is that frequently insurance companies will pay for general anesthesia for a special-needs patient if it is for an extraction or something serious, but they will not pay for general anesthesia for routine care. This bill requires them to do so. This is absolutely landmark legislation.

Mr. Speaker, one final thing. There are many children, many young adults with special needs, with developmental disabilities in the Commonwealth, who have lost their permanent teeth by the time they are 17 or 18 years old because they have not gotten the proper dental hygiene that general anesthesia will afford them to get. So I want to commend my colleague from York County for his compassion and for his persistence to this end. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the chairman of the Insurance Committee, Mr. Micozzie.

Mr. MICOZZIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from York County, Mr. Saylor, is seeking recognition for the second time?

Mr. SAYLOR. Yes, Mr. Speaker. I am just going to submit my remarks for the Journal.

The SPEAKER. Deliver them to the clerk and they will be noted for the record.

Mr. SAYLOR submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank chairman Micozzie and chairman DeLuca and the serving members of the House Insurance Committee for moving HB 532 to the floor of the House for voting.

I come before you today to urge support for HB 532, my legislation to require insurance companies to cover the cost of general anesthesia for children and developmental disabled patients.

Our journey of this bill, as some of you may recall, began over 10 years ago. And now – finally, the insurance companies agree with me – providing dental general anesthesia coverage for children and the developmentally disabled is the right thing to do and there are no increased costs for insurers. If anything, there are decreasing costs.

For parents of small children and children of any age with special needs, these visits to the dentist are more than uncomfortable – they are traumatic. Often, these children are extremely difficult to treat and they require general anesthesia in order to complete the necessary treatments.

Unfortunately, some Pennsylvania insurance companies do not cover general anesthesia for these situations. For most families, an insurance company's refusal to cover anesthesia eliminates that option for them. The result is either treatment with compromised outcomes or a denial of treatment altogether. Essentially, by refusing to cover general anesthesia for these patients, insurance companies are denying them adequate dental care.

My bill, the Children and Developmentally Disabled Patient Access to Quality Dental Care Act, would change that. It would require health insurance companies in Pennsylvania to cover the cost of general anesthesia for the dental treatment of developmentally disabled individuals who are difficult to treat and for children younger than 7 years old who need this anesthesia for a successful treatment.

Mr. Speaker, preventative health-care measures such as colonoscopies and breast cancer screenings have been major issues before the General Assembly for years. My bill is another such preventative health-care bill.

More than 30 States already require coverage of anesthesia for these patients, and similar legislation is pending in several other States. It is time Pennsylvania join those states in assuring young children and patients with special needs can receive the dental care they need.

I appreciate your attention and ask for your favorable vote of HB 532. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. JAMES. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in favor of SB 100. And I might be new to this legislative session of the House of Representatives, Mr. Speaker, but I am not new to the State Capitol, and I am not new to the issues contained in SB 100. The escalating costs of the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections, the budget and issues of prison overcrowding have been a concern for many people for many years, including me. Always there seems to be that before the Department of Corrections budget would go up, the Department of Education budget would go down. Mr. Speaker, I previously served as chairman of the Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on Crime and Corrections, so I am deeply familiar with these topics.

But now, Mr. Speaker, we have reached a final vote on this piece of legislation because many people worked together to get to this point.

I would like to commend the prime sponsor of this bill, the leadership from both sides, the partnership that was created for working together. So all of those involved in getting us here today, I say thank you for all of your hard work.

And, Mr. Speaker, passing SB 100 will allow the Commonwealth to enhance cost-saving sentencing alternatives without compromising public safety. We have the opportunity to save millions of dollars over 5 years and reinvest this money into programs which will reduce our prison population and lessen the likelihood of repeat nonviolent offenders.

Mr. Speaker, I urge an affirmative vote on SB 100. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin County, Mr. Marsico.

Mr. MARSICO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to rise and ask the members to support SB 100. This bill is the culmination of months of work by the Justice Reinvestment Commission, which studied how we spend corrections dollars and where it is wasted and how we can reduce the cost of those dollars without compromising public safety. This does not reduce sentences but creates a framework for smarter responses to crime. The JRI (Justice Reinvestment Initiative) included experts from across the Commonwealth – judges, victim advocates, corrections, chiefs of police, probation and parole, Department of Corrections, D.A.s, and members of the House and the Senate – from across the spectrum of the justice system, along with the Council of State Governments. This is the result of that effort, and I appreciate an affirmative vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?
The gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Caltagirone, is recognized on the bill.

Mr. CALTAGIRONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to echo and reiterate what was said. It also gives judges discretion at the front end, and it provides for the intermediate punishment and the expanding of programs. It is something that encapsulates all of what we have been trying to get accomplished in this body for the last several years. And under the leadership of Senator Greenleaf, Chairman Marsico, the Governor and his good office, and all the people that participated in JRI – both Chairman Marsico and I served on that – this is a big piece of what hopefully will be able to come to fruition in the savings in the overall scheme of the budget. I would urge an affirmative vote, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of SB 100. I want to thank the majority and minority leaders of the Judiciary Committee for supporting this measure. It has been long in the making. It is definitely going to result in reducing some of our costs in the area of corrections. It is going to provide some alternatives to folks who are nonviolent and just kind of sitting around in the system. It also provides some continuity to how we address this issue.

Now, I have filed an amendment to SB 100 because I think that a part of this progressive look at corrections, there needs to be a Pennsylvania intercouncil agency on reentry. We need to put corrections, welfare, economic development, health, and these other partners all in the same room, applying a collaborative effort toward dealing with making sure when we release folks that they stay out and do not end up coming back. Without that collaboration, it is going to be piecemeal, but I have been assured by the chair of the Judiciary Committee, the minority chairman, and I think he is a man of his word, and I am looking at him, Mr. Speaker. He is a man of his word, and he has assured me that we need to send this bill forward clean and without the interagency council on reentry, but it is in his committee and he will bring it out and allow the committee to give consideration to this.

But I think this is also central to our forward thinking as it relates to corrections, sentencing, and our system. So I rise enthusiastically in support of SB 100. And to Senator Greenleaf, we say thank you.

Mr. GEORGE. Mr. Speaker, if I may.

The SPEAKER. The House will please come to order. If we could hold the conversations down. We would appreciate it if the members could kindly hold the conversations down a little bit. Please take them to the rear of the House if necessary. The Speaker thanks the members.

On the question of suspension of the rules, the gentleman, Mr. George, is in order.

Mr. GEORGE. Mr. Speaker, the reason I ask the indulgence and the cooperation of this General Assembly is that there was a bill, and rightfully so, to do the proper thing. Never is there a time when any one of us, regardless of our party, ever would expect each other to do anything different but help those people who serve our country in the most honorable manner, our veterans. The other day I offered an amendment to this very bill, and it was soon found that the disagreement was because it was drafted to give those, all of those, regardless of the individual veteran, but to his wife and children, 6 weeks at \$50 a week; \$50 a week.

Mr. Speaker, we talk about all of us, including yourself, who get questions and inquiries from our constituents—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend just one minute.

I would ask the gentleman to confine his remarks to why we should suspend the rules and not necessarily on the merits of the amendment. The amendment is not technically before us.

Mr. GEORGE. I apologize to the Speaker. I would hope the Speaker would be a little bit flexible. I am not used to this kind of thing. Remember, Mr. Speaker, I just got my high school diploma the other night. Now I am applying to law school so I can fix the whole bunch of you.

Mr. Speaker, it is our duty as legislators to do what we can for our people. One of the biggest problems plaguing the Commonwealth is chronic unemployment, not only for the general public but for our veterans returning home from combat. I offered an amendment the other day to this bill when it was on second consideration and concerns were raised about the eligibility standards, eligibility standards that did not consider those little kids or that wife or that husband, that spouse. Mr. Speaker, I can think of no other reason than political games would be the reason to oppose suspension. This in some way has money out of the budget and it takes a mere \$60,000 out of a million-dollar budget.

I can think of no reason, as I said, to oppose the suspension. This vote is a vote to help our veterans gain employment in the Commonwealth. A vote against suspension is a vote against our

veterans. It is a slap in the face to those who have served us honorably. I could not say it any better and you could not either. We owe this to our veterans, and I ask for an affirmative vote on suspending the rules and an affirmative vote on the amendment. I thank you for your flexibility, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the motion to suspend the rules, the Speaker recognizes the majority leader, Mr. Turzai.

Mr. TURZAI. I would ask the members to please oppose suspending the rules. The underlying bill has been worked upon. We are going to work on this particular amendment in a bill fashion if we can reach a compromise, but I have asked the members to please vote against suspending the rules. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the motion to suspend the rules, the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Dermody, is recognized.

Mr. DERMODY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, suspending the rules to allow the George amendment to be included in this bill will not harm this bill; it will simply make it better. We need to suspend the rules because all we are doing here is establishing a \$50 stipend for unemployed veterans.

Mr. TURZAI. Objection, Mr. Speaker. The motion for suspension should just be on the motion itself, not on the underlying bill.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will suspend. The gentleman will please suspend.

The gentleman, Mr. Dermody, as leader, gets a little more flexibility. However, I would request that you stay focused on whether or not we should suspend the rules and not so much on the substance.

Mr. DERMODY. We should suspend the rules, Mr. Speaker, so that we consider an amendment that would give a stipend of \$50 to unemployed veterans to help their families, help their children, help them with transportation, day care, whatever it takes for them to get the job.

Mr. TURZAI. Objection, Mr. Speaker. This is beyond—

Mr. DERMODY. That is why we should suspend the rule.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, I want to thank everybody for their cooperation in moving this bill forward. I think it is a great thing for the Commonwealth and what we are going to do for those, help those who are unemployed to find jobs in Pennsylvania. This matches up good, quality jobs with our unemployed.

So I want to thank everybody for their cooperation in moving this bill forward. Mr. Speaker, I would like to submit remarks for the record.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. SAYLOR submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As the former owner of a small plastering company looking for skilled construction laborers, a consumer of goods provided by the hands of trained Pennsylvanians, and as a legislator wanting to address the issue of unemployment and job creation in Pennsylvania, I began looking at various workforce development investment programs initiated across the nation. The Georgia Works program which received national, bipartisan support became the model from which this bill grew. In Georgia, over 63 percent of participants in the program landed jobs and the unemployment trust fund reduced their drawing by \$6 million.

HB 1539 partners unemployed Pennsylvanians looking for jobs with businesses who can train them to meet specific needs for current open job positions. The Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry would administer the program that would align unemployed people with businesses to train them for up to 24 hours per week for up to 8 weeks in high-priority occupations. The participant would receive training with the employer while continuing to receive UC benefits.

Knowing a displaced worker can receive an unemployment check can bring great peace of mind to someone who wants to try something new. Let us say you took a new job in a new field and it did not work out. You might not be eligible for unemployment compensation anymore.

Now let us say you are a small business owner. You cannot afford to train someone. Companies are still struggling to get back on their feet and start hiring. By taking some of the risk and expense out of hiring, this program leverages unemployment trust fund dollars to stimulate job growth. These dollars invest the unemployed in new employment opportunities and provide companies with lower costs of hiring and training. And there are costs to businesses. There is time and training expenses and the business is invested in the trained worker.

The concept of the bill has not changed since I first introduced it last session: to provide an opportunity for unemployed workers to receive training with an employer while continuing to receive UC benefits. I am glad to see Governor Corbett liked the proposal and included it in his budget address as part of the Jobs First PA initiative. This is a voluntary program and there are additional provisions to address qualifications for both the participant and the business. To ensure the training provided is bona fide, it must be consistent with the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act. Lastly, subject to available funds the program incentivizes employers to hire unemployed individuals.

Most of us here today recognize the various employment challenges that many Pennsylvanians face. Our constituents want us to focus on jobs and getting people back to work. We have the opportunity here today to give the unemployed the skills they need to find work in an ailing economy. We can change the approach to unemployment in Pennsylvania so that it is no longer just a time to find a new job but a time to build the skills for your next job. With this program in place, being on unemployment is no longer a race against the clock but a stepping stone system that provides folks with the opportunity to learn the skills they would not otherwise have an opportunity to build – and to provide themselves with future of a promise to get ahead.
