STATEMENT BY MRS. DEAN

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes Representative Dean from Montgomery County who, on unanimous consent, seeks recognition. Without objection, she is so recognized.

Mrs. DEAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank the members of the House for passing this important resolution to recognize - retroactively; I apologize - April 15, 2012, as "Familial Dysautonomia Awareness Day," also known as FD and Riley-Day syndrome. This is a rare genetic disease that affects the autonomic and sensory nervous systems of children from birth.

Children with FD lack basic reflexes and instincts and cannot control their blood pressure or heart rate. The disease affects every major organ of their body. The life expectancy formerly was to be only until 5 years of age, but due to medical advances, children born with FD within the last 5 years will have a 50-percent chance of surviving to 40 years of age. However, they will suffer serious, chronic, and often debilitating symptoms that will prevent them from leading normal lives.

Like my predecessor, Josh Shapiro, and others before him, I introduce this resolution to bring awareness of the seriousness of it, and also to bring awareness of the need for screening. I recognize a very great leader in this area from my area, a father and a leading Rabbi in our area, Rabbi Lawrence Sernovitz, whose son suffers from this rare genetic disorder, for bringing this to awareness and attention, and I thank all of you for passing this resolution.

An Act amending Title 53 (Municipalities Generally) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in municipal authorities, further providing for administration and for money.

SB 375 came over in December of 2011 with a 50-0 vote, and then the House made some minor amendments in April of '12 and sent it back to the Senate on a 194-to-0 vote. The Senate, on June 13 of 2012, by a 47-0 vote, actually made a few more amendments, and the Senate amendments provide for membership on authority boards under certain circumstances: where a municipal authority is incorporated by a single municipality but serves parts of at least two counties and the service area outside of the incorporating municipality is five times larger than the incorporating municipality, the county commissioners in those counties would get to appoint members to the authority board. These additional members would represent authority customers on rates, service problems, and other issues.

As I indicated, this passed the Senate 47 to nothing on June 13 of 2012. It has moved out of Rules Committee, and we would like to put it on the Governor's desk. Please vote "yes." Thank you.
