That is your winning team.

Also providing assistance and support for the team were Greg Best, athletic director; Kala Johnson, scorekeeper; and Paul Shearer, their avid bus driver. Also with us today is the superintendent of Fannett-Metal School District, Jim Duffey. Jim, thank you for being here.

I just want everybody to understand the importance of this day, not only for Fannett-Metal School District, but also for the close-knit rural community that we affectionately call the Valley. REMARKS BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. We are about to take up a condolence resolution honoring Medal of Honor recipient Sgt. Leslie H. Sabo, Jr., United States Army. The Medal of Honor is the highest military decoration awarded by the United States government. It is bestowed by the President in the name of Congress on members of the United States Armed Forces who distinguish themselves by their gallantry in action.

Today we honor the life and actions of a soldier who was killed 42 years ago in Cambodia during the Vietnam war. Sergeant Sabo served in Bravo Company, 3d Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division. He died defending the members of his platoon.

Our tribute to Sergeant Sabo is noteworthy in that had it not been for the diligence of a fellow member of the 101st, the much-deserved Medal of Honor might never have been presented earlier this year in Washington, DC.

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Lawrence County, Mr. Gibbons.

Mr. GIBBONS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to offer HR 829 in honor of Medal of Honor recipient Leslie H. Sabo, Jr. He is a true American hero in every sense. Today we celebrate his valor and actions in the face of overwhelming enemy forces during the Vietnam war. We are reminded of how bravely and selflessly he gave his life to protect and save other American soldiers in his platoon. Sadly, the facts about what happened on that terrible day and his tremendous sacrifice were lost for decades in the darkness of the military archives. For nearly 30 years his family, his friends, and all Pennsylvanians did not know of this man's gallant actions. We now shine the light of truth and we correct a wrong. We honor Army Sgt. Leslie Sabo for his actions above the call of duty.

Amazingly, he died an American hero, but was born in Europe in the wake of World War II. When Leslie was a young boy, his family fled communism in Hungary. They escaped the cold grasp of the Soviet rule for the brighter, better life in the United States. His first glimpse of America came when Leslie was only 6 years old. They sailed past the Statue of Liberty and arrived at Ellis Island. His family entered the country that he would give his life defending only 16 years later.

The family soon settled in Ellwood City and took pride in their new American citizenship. As a child, Leslie is remembered as a good boy who liked to play jokes and loved to bowl and shoot pool. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Ellwood City, and there he met his future wife, Rose Mary, at a high school football game. They immediately fell in love. The couple was married shortly before Leslie went off to Vietnam.

Leslie's widow, Rose Mary, is here today, along with Leslie's brother, George, and other family members. We thank them for joining us today. We also are joined by dozens of people who have traveled here from Ellwood City who want to help us honor Leslie and participate in today's events. These are friends of his, some of our military veterans, as well as Leslie's biographer, Eric Poole, who wrote the book about the story of Leslie's final days as well as the Vietnam war. All of them were moved by Leslie's bravery and courage, and that is part of what led them here today. Let me share some of that story with you.

While many Americans dreaded going off to Vietnam, Leslie, a young immigrant from Europe, was ready for his part in the cold war. He understood firsthand the horrors of living under Communist rule. He wanted to defend the American way of life, even if that meant going off to Vietnam. Leslie wrote to his young bride nearly every day. He always spared her from

the horrors of war; never wrote about the terrifying battle or the awful rain, heat, and humidity. Only those who served can understand what it was like for Leslie and the other young men as they trudged through the jungles and rice paddies of Vietnam.

Leslie's letters home stopped when he and the rest of Bravo Company went into Cambodia. They were moving along a jungle trail on May 10, 1970 – Mother's Day – when Leslie Sabo, Jr., would repeatedly risk his safety and ultimately give his life to protect his comrades on the battlefield. About 50 American troops entered a clearing when they were ambushed. The enemy fire came from every direction – behind rocks, above from the trees, and inside bunkers. In his first act of bravery, Leslie charged forward to protect the wounded, taking out several enemies and driving them back. But Leslie was not done; with the Americans low on ammo, he ran low across a clearing to get more ammo and rearm his brothers and preserve the chance they had, any chance they had to survive. That is when he found a wounded American soldier lying on the ground. Suddenly a grenade landed near them. Without hesitation, Leslie bravely grabbed the grenade and threw it back toward the enemy. He then used his own body to shield the wounded soldier, bearing the brunt of the blast and suffering serious wounds.

The battle was still going poorly for the Americans. They were pinned down, taking fire, and at risk of being overrun. Wounded and facing a terrible situation, Leslie Sabo, Jr., did something extraordinary: He took the battle straight to the enemy. He began crawling across the field toward the enemy bunker where a North Vietnamese machine gun was devastating the Americans. They sprayed the area with bullets, but Leslie, now mortally wounded, kept crawling. With the enemy's guns roaring, Leslie took one of his grenades and pulled the pin. Then he waited. He knew that he could not throw the grenade too soon. And in his final action of his life, as his brothers in arms watched, he threw that grenade into the enemy bunker. The enemy guns were silenced, and Leslie Sabo lost his life. Leslie Sabo, Jr., made the ultimate sacrifice in that jungle in Cambodia, saving the lives of dozens of other Americans.

Back home in the U.S., his young wife, parents, and brother all grieved that terrible loss, but they did not learn what really happened that day. For nearly 30 years they did not know that Leslie died a war hero. The truth about his astonishing bravery and courage was lost in mountains of paperwork, lost and forgotten for three decades. Then in 1999, Vietnam veteran Tony Mabb was researching through the archives when he opened a box and found an unexpected file that revealed the truth of Leslie Sabo's actions that day. That set him on a long path to ensure that Leslie Sabo, Jr., received the honor that he deserved.

Finally this past May, Leslie Sabo, Jr., a man born in Europe who fled communism, grew up in Ellwood City, and gave his life for other American soldiers, posthumously received this nation's highest military decoration – the Medal of Honor. Leslie Sabo is now permanently honored here at the State Capitol. A few moments ago we unveiled a stone marker bearing his name in Soldiers' and Sailors' Grove. Another monument was unveiled yesterday in his hometown of Ellwood City. These will serve as a reminder to future generations that Leslie Sabo is an American patriot. His incredible bravery must

never be forgotten. On behalf of all Pennsylvanians we say thank you to Leslie Sabo and to his family. Your State and your nation are forever grateful.

Mr. Speaker, I ask all of our colleagues here to support this resolution. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Members and all guests will please rise for a moment of silence in respect of a distinguished soldier and in prayer for the family and friends.

Section 1. Short title.

This act shall be known and may be cited as the Lyme and Related Tick-Borne Disease Surveillance, Education, Prevention and Treatment Act.

Section 2. Findings.

The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

(1) Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases are carried primarily by ticks and pose a serious threat to the health and quality of life of many citizens of this Commonwealth.

(2) The most common way to acquire Lyme disease is to be bitten by a tick that carries the spirochete.

(3) In 2009, 5,722 confirmed cases of Lyme disease were reported in this Commonwealth, the highest number of cases reported in any state and representing a 76% increase since 2006. In 2011, provisional numbers of 7,484 cases confirm this ongoing upward trend.

(4) These trends illustrate the World Health Organization's (WHO) projections through 2010. The WHO states that Lyme disease will increasingly become a public health threat in the United States. Pennsylvania needs to be prepared to deal with this trend, which is already being observed in Pennsylvania's statistics.

(5) Lyme disease is most prevalent in southeastern Pennsylvania, but it is found across this Commonwealth.

(6) With proper precautions taken while engaged in outdoor activities, people can greatly reduce their chances of tick pathogen transmission by making sure that frequent tick checks are made and ticks are removed and disposed of promptly and properly.

(7) The early clinical diagnosis and appropriate treatment of these tick-borne disorders and diseases can greatly reduce the risks of continued symptoms which can affect every system and organ of the human body and often every aspect of life.

(8) Left untreated, Lyme disease can cause a number of signs and symptoms which can become quite severe.

Section 3. Legislative intent.

It is the intent of the General Assembly:

(1) To provide the public with information and education to create greater public awareness of the dangers of and measures available to prevent, diagnose and treat Lyme disease and related maladies.

(2) To ensure that:

(i) Licensees, insurers, patients and governmental agencies are educated about treatment options.

(ii) Licensees provide patients with sufficient information about treatment options to enable patients to make an informed choice as part of informed consent and respect the autonomy of that choice.

(iii) Pennsylvania government agencies provide unbiased information regarding treatment options.

Section 4. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Board." The Pennsylvania State Board of Medicine, the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine and the State Board of Nursing.

"Department." The Department of Health of the Commonwealth.

"Licensee." A licensed physician, a physician's assistant or certified registered nurse practitioner or other licensed health care professional.

"Long-term antibiotic or antimicrobial therapy." Administration of oral, intramuscular or intravenous antibiotics or antimicrobial medications, singly or in combination, for periods of more than four weeks.

"Lyme disease." The clinical diagnosis of a patient by a licensed physician or certified registered nurse practitioner of the presence of signs or symptoms compatible with acute, late-stage, persistent

infection with *Borrelia burgdorferi* or complications related to such infection or with such other strains of *Borrelia* that are recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as a cause of Lyme disease. The term includes infection which meets the surveillance criteria set forth by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and other acute and persistent manifestations of such an infection as determined by a physician.

"Related tick-borne illnesses." Cases of Bartonellosis, Babesiosis/Piroplasmosis, Anaplasmosis, Ehrlichiosis and other tick-transmissible illnesses as may be empirically associated with Lyme disease.

"Secretary." The Secretary of Health of the Commonwealth.

"State officials." The term includes the Secretary of Environmental Protection.

"Task force." The task force established by this act.

"Therapeutic purpose." The use of antibiotics to control a patient's symptoms or signs determined by a physician as reasonably related to Lyme disease and its sequelae or related tick-borne illnesses. Section 5. Task force.

(a) Establishment.—The department shall establish a task force on Lyme disease and related tick-borne diseases.

(b) Purpose.—The task force shall investigate and make recommendations to the department regarding:

(1) The surveillance and prevention of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses in this Commonwealth.

(2) Raising awareness about the long-term effects of the misdiagnosis of Lyme disease.

(3) The development of a program of general public and health care professional information and education regarding Lyme disease which shall include the broad spectrum of scientific and treatment options regarding all stages of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses.

(4) Cooperation with the Pennsylvania Game Commission to disseminate the information required under paragraph (3) to licensees of the commission and the general public.

(5) Cooperation with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to disseminate the information required under paragraph (3) to the general public and visitors of State parks and lands.

(6) Cooperation with the Department of Environmental Protection to test ticks and provide results and to publish on its publicly accessible Internet website.

(7) Cooperation with the Department of Education to:

(i) Disseminate the information required under paragraph (3) to school administrators, faculty, staff, parents, guardians and students.

(ii) Determine the role schools may play in the prevention of Lyme disease, including, but not limited to, prompt removal and reporting of tick removals to State officials.

(iii) Update policies to recognize signs or symptoms of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses as health impairments potentially requiring accommodations.

(c) Composition.—The task force shall be composed of the following individuals:

(1) The Secretary of Health or a designee.

(2) The Insurance Commissioner or a designee.

(3) The Secretary of Education or a designee.

(4) The Deputy Secretary for Parks and Forestry in the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources or a designee.

(5) The Director of the Bureau of Information and Education of the Pennsylvania Game Commission or a designee.

(6) Two physicians licensed in this Commonwealth, who are knowledgeable concerning treatment of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses and who are members of the

International Lyme and Associated Diseases Society.

(7) Two physicians licensed in this Commonwealth who are knowledgeable concerning treatment of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses who are members of the Infectious Disease Society of America.

(8) An epidemiologist licensed in this Commonwealth having expertise in spirochetes and related infectious diseases.

(9) Two individuals representing Lyme disease patient groups who may be a Lyme disease patient of a family member of a Lyme disease patient.

(10) One individual who is a Lyme disease patient or a family member of a Lyme disease patient.

(11) Two registered nurses licensed in this Commonwealth, one of which should be a certified registered nurse practitioner and both of whom are knowledgeable concerning Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses.

(12) The Director of Vector Management of the Department of Environmental Protection.

(13) An entomologist with the Department of Entomology of The Pennsylvania State University who has experience in tick identification and tick-borne diseases.

(14) A registered school nurse licensed in this Commonwealth who is knowledgeable concerning Lyme disease and tick-borne illnesses.

(15) Two veterinarians licensed in this Commonwealth, at least one of whom is a veterinary epidemiologist and both of whom are knowledgeable concerning Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses.

(d) Meetings.—

(1) Within 45 days of the effective date of this act, the Secretary of Health shall appoint the members of the task force. The Secretary of Health shall appoint a chairman of the task force.

(2) The task force shall convene within 90 days of the effective date of this act and shall meet quarterly.

(3) The task force shall issue a report with recommendations to the Secretary of Health within one year of its first meeting. The report shall also be transmitted to the relevant committees of the Senate and the House of Representatives. Nothing in this act shall prohibit the task force from making interim reports, taking agreed-upon immediate actions or responding to requests for such reports.

(e) Compensation and expenses.—The members of the task force shall receive no compensation for their services but shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in performance of their duties. Reimbursement shall be provided by the department.

(f) Department.—The department shall:

(1) Develop a program of general public and health care professional information and education regarding Lyme disease which shall include the broad spectrum of scientific and treating options regarding all stages of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses.

(2) Develop an active tick collection, testing and surveillance program in cooperation with the Department of Environmental Protection to provide a better understanding of, including, but not limited to, the full range of tick-borne diseases, geographic hot spots and levels of infectivity to be used in targeting prevention and education efforts. This effort may include veterinary data on tick-borne disease prevention, specifically dogs and horses and other animals as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have recommended.

(3) Cooperate with the Pennsylvania Game Commission to disseminate the information required under paragraph (1) to licensees of the Pennsylvania Game Commission and the general public.

(4) Cooperate with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to disseminate the information required under paragraph (1) to the general public and visitors of State parks and

lands.

(5) Cooperate with the professional associations of health care professionals to provide the education program for professionals required under paragraph (1).

(6) Cooperate with the Department of Education to:

(i) Disseminate the information under paragraph (1) to school administrators, school nurses, faculty and staff, parents, guardians and students.

(ii) Determine what role schools may play in the prevention of Lyme disease, including, but not limited to, prompt removal and reporting of tick removals to State officials.

(iii) Update policies to recognize signs or symptoms of Lyme disease and related tick-borne illnesses as health conditions potentially requiring accommodations.

(7) Cooperate with the Department of Environmental Protection to publish and make available on its publicly accessible Internet website the information developed under paragraph (2) to health care professionals and the general public.

(8) Cooperate with The Pennsylvania State University, Department of Entomology, Cooperative Extension Program for Integrated Pest Management, to disseminate educational resources about ticks, related diseases and integrated pest management for disease prevention as required under paragraph (1) to health care professionals and the general public.

(9) Identify and apply for public and private funding in order to carry out the provisions of this act.

Section 6. Required coverage.

(a) Tick-borne illnesses.—Except as provided in subsection (b), every health care policy which is delivered, issued for delivery, renewed, extended or modified in this Commonwealth by a health insurer must cover prescribed treatment for Lyme disease or related tick-borne illnesses if the diagnosis and treatment plan are documented in the patient's medical record, and it is documented in the patient's medical record that the patient has been properly informed of multiple standards of care, risks and benefits and able to exercise informed consent. Such treatment plans may include long-term therapies, long-term antibiotic or antimicrobial therapy and treatment as prescribed by the patient's attending physician.

(b) Exception.—Subsection (a) shall not apply to any of the following types of insurance:

- (1) Hospital indemnity.
- (2) Accident.
- (3) Specified disease.
- (4) Disability income.
- (5) Dental.
- (6) Vision.
- (7) Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) supplement.
- (8) Medicare supplement.
- (9) Long-term care.
- (10) Other limited insurance benefit plans.

Section 7. Effective date.

This act shall take July 1, 2013.

which may be sold separately: Provided, That no malt or brewed beverages sold or delivered shall be consumed upon the premises of the distributor or importing distributor, or in any place provided for such purpose by such distributor or importing distributor. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section or act, malt or brewed beverages which are part of a tasting conducted pursuant to the board's regulations may be consumed on licensed premises.

(2) No distributor or importing distributor shall sell malt or brewed beverages in a container containing one hundred twenty-eight fluid ounces or more without first requiring the purchaser to execute a numbered form providing for the purchaser's name and address and such other information as the board may prescribe. Following execution of the numbered form, the distributor or importing distributor shall affix to the container an identification sticker that corresponds to the number on the form completed by the purchaser. Records required under this clause shall be maintained in accordance with the rules and regulations of the board.

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Bucks County, Mr. Clymer.

Mr. CLYMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this is an amendment that I have offered in the past. And briefly, it says that it requires beer distributors to tag any kegs they sell in order to track who purchased that keg should it end up being used by minors. Mr. Speaker, we recognize that there is a crisis, an alcoholic addiction crisis among the youth of Pennsylvania and probably across the United States, and there is really no opportunity out there for them to see what we in the General Assembly are doing to bring about a better path for them to travel. And so, Mr. Speaker, this "tag a keg and not a toe" is legislation that I feel will send a good message to those who continue to experiment with drinking while underage. This is something, like I said, that we are all aware of. You pick up a daily newspaper and you see numerous articles in there about those who have been arrested while drinking underage, the DUIs (driving under the influence), all the serious problems that develop because of underage drinking. So this amendment is to be a step in the right direction to send the proper and right signal to our youth that we are concerned about them; we do not want them to drink while they are underage, and if they do, if this legislation should pass, those who bought the keg and are giving the alcohol to the underage would then be penalized.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House adopt the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Santoni.

Mr. SANTONI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the gentleman stand for one question, please?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. SANTONI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I could not quite hear his remarks, so I am not sure if you addressed this, but I was wondering, Mr. Speaker, if there have been any studies done, do you know of any empirical evidence

that shows that when you put registrations and add additional layers of bureaucracy on beer distributors when you do this registration, whether there is any empirical evidence that says that this reduces or in any way affects underage drinking?

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend just one minute.

If I could have the members' attention. Especially during interrogation, if we could hold the conversations down. It is a little hard to hear in here some days. Kindly take the conversations to the rear of the House. I would appreciate the members holding the conversations down.

The gentleman, Mr. Clymer, may proceed.

Mr. CLYMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, one of the purposes of this legislation, should it pass, is to develop a formula whereby we can see whether or not the impact this will have. It will be a positive impact because we know that these keg parties are very popular throughout the Commonwealth. In fact, I have an article here. I am glad the gentleman asked me the question because it said the risk of alcohol-related harm is greatest during the first few weeks of college, meaning that many students, when they go away to school, despite the warnings presented by the universities and colleges, will continue – not continue, some will continue; some will initiate drinking. So we know it is that serious problem. If we are going to take any meaningful steps to rectify this situation, this legislation would be a step in the right direction.

I mean, you think about it, we know that reading the newspapers about the State Police raiding parties, local police involved in these drinking parties in which too many of the young people are there and then they leave that party and they get themselves into a lot of trouble, and we do not want that. You know, their lives are just beginning and we certainly want the best for them. This legislation would go a long way in helping them to see that we in the General Assembly are concerned about their welfare, and therefore the need for this legislation. Thank you.

Mr. SANTONI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

That concludes my interrogation. I would just like to make a brief statement on the amendment, please.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order on the amendment.

Mr. SANTONI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the chairman's comments. I think, though, the true answer he could have said in one word. The answer is no; there is really no empirical evidence that suggests that his amendment would in any way help stop underage drinking. I understand and appreciate the social concerns he has with regards to alcohol abuse, and I stood with the Republican and majority chairman in dealing with a lot of the issues, as the Democratic chairman, on the social aspect of abuse of alcohol, and I think we are more than willing to do that as we move forward. This is just not the answer.

A couple other reasons I would suggest that we defeat this amendment: number one, again, there is no empirical evidence, no evidence that suggests this will in any way help anybody reduce underage drinking, because it will not. It puts another layer of bureaucracy. We are hurting the small business guy. We are asking him to do a little bit more. And again, if it was going to make a difference, I would say yes, but it really makes no difference, so why are we asking our small business men and women, why would we want to impose another burden on them? So that is another reason I suggest that we vote "no." There are lots of other issues, liability issues we have not

addressed. I just think there are lots and lots of questions related to this amendment that should be dealt with separately.

And also, this issue, this bill is really an issue dealing with trying to help our small fledgling craft brewery industry in Pennsylvania. Whether you enjoy an adult beverage of that kind or not, I think we all understand that that industry is growing, and this bill without this amendment would help in that aspect. So I would ask, respectfully, for both our side and the other side of the aisle to vote "no" on the Clymer amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

Mr. TAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is not agreed to. I have a great deal of respect for the maker of the amendment. This goes pretty far afield in terms of what our local distributors will have to go through. Frankly, we have to rely on law enforcement, because kegs are not the only way that our youth can consume alcohol. They can just, the extended version of this would be marking bottles and cans, and I think we need to leave this in the hands of our law enforcement at every level. And frankly, this amendment has been around a long time. This bill really has nothing to do with this amendment whatsoever. So I would ask for a "no" vote.

STATEMENT BY MRS. WATSON

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the lady from Bucks County, Mrs. Watson, under unanimous consent relative to the legislation just adopted.

Mrs. WATSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I will be brief.

As cochair of the House Alzheimer's Disease Caucus, along with my colleague, Representative Bill Kortz, I want to thank the members of the House for their affirmative votes on the passage of 2270. Alzheimer's disease has become an epidemic, plain and simple. The disease not only robs families of the loved one they used to know, but it has a drastic effect on their caregivers.

This legislation creates a committee that will report back to this chamber within a year of its creation. The information the committee gathers is critical to our Commonwealth in preparation for an estimated increase in those who have the disease. It is imperative that we as a legislative body pay close attention to this population and be active participants in policies to help those suffering from Alzheimer's disease and help their families and their caregivers. We need to ensure that we have adequate programs and services, as well as plan and develop a strategy for the future.

As you know, Mr. Speaker, Pennsylvania currently has the fourth-largest population of those age 65 and older. Currently there are 280,000 people living with Alzheimer's disease in our Commonwealth, not to mention there are 460,000 caregivers who are the real unsung heroes, sacrificing every day and dedicating their lives to the care for their loved one, many times at the expense of their own health and financial well-being.

Pennsylvania will join 39 other States that have or currently are in the process of creating their own Alzheimer's Disease State Plans. And given our demographics, we need to be ahead of the game, and I believe an Alzheimer's Disease State Plan will provide us with the vital information on the current care options we have, what medical research is available, and going forward and making policy recommendations from experts in the industry.

Mr. Speaker, again, I would like to thank my colleagues for their affirmative vote on HB 2270 and for recognizing me, Mr. Speaker. Thank you.

HB 2428 allows for the first time a designation determined by PENNDOT to be placed on the actual plastic driver's license card that designates anyone who produces a valid DD 214 discharge paper from any of the United States Armed Forces or the equivalent from our National Guard to be eligible for this designation at no cost to the veteran.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the maker stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. I am just wondering what policy is being attempted to be forwarded by this bill. What are we trying to accomplish here?

Mr. PYLE. Is the gentleman asking toward the member's motivation?

Mr. VITALI. No. The policy, what policy are you trying to forward? What is the purpose of this bill?

Mr. PYLE. The purpose is to put a "V" on a driver's license if you are an honorably discharged veteran.

Mr. VITALI. And why are you doing that?

Mr. PYLE. That goes toward a member's motivation.

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman, Mr. Vitali, seeking—

Mr. VITALI. I do not know if the maker is refusing to answer the question. My question is, what policy are we trying to forward by indicating a driver as a veteran?

Mr. PYLE. Mr. Speaker, if you would like to know, the purpose of this is to make available to our veterans a uniformity with Federal dictates for what constitutes an honorably discharged and what constitutes a veteran who is less than honorably discharged. With this card, they would be able to proceed to any VA (Veterans' Administration) Hospital in the State and apply for benefits available through the Federal government, or as many merchants in my area do who are very supportive of our veterans, they will offer discounts and bonuses. I will give you one if you would like to know the background of the bill. A gentleman in Freeport sporting a gigantic Navy tattoo on his bicep went to a home store to buy shingles, because on Memorial Day they offer an additional 10 percent off if you can prove you are a veteran. Now, despite this big tattoo, they would not accept that as proof he was a veteran. This card allows that to happen. I would like to make available any resource we can for veterans. If it comes out of a free offering from the private sector, all the better. That is less burden on the taxpayers of Pennsylvania.

Mr. VITALI. Now, how does a veteran prove his veteran status right now?

Mr. PYLE. Could you repeat, please?

Mr. VITALI. How does a veteran prove his veteran status right now for the purposes of benefits?

Mr. PYLE. They have to produce a VA card. Other than that, there is none. For them to qualify for this, they would have to show up with honorable discharge papers issued by the United States Armed Forces.

Mr. VITALI. Does PENNDOT have a position on this designation?

Mr. PYLE. They support the bill. They would need 12 to 18 months for implementation.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you.
