HATBORO-HORSHAM HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING BAND PRESENTED

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is my distinct honor and privilege to welcome the Hatboro-Horsham Marching Unit here to the Capitol this morning. They are seated in the back, and some of the members are up here to my left.

They are winners of the 2012 Cavalcade of Bands Grand Championship held on November 10 at Hersheypark Stadium. They earned their title with a score of 95.25 out of 100 during the competition that included 41 other participants, and they stood out as the best of all 42 there that day.

So, Mr. Speaker, it is my honor and privilege to recognize my alma mater, the Marching Hatters from Hatboro-Horsham, and bring them to the Capitol. If my colleagues would join them, welcome them with a warm round of applause, I would truly appreciate it.

I just want the young men and the young women of the marching unit to know how proud we are of your accomplishment. We thank you for representing our community in such a positive manner. LESLIE NICHOLAS PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Next I would like to invite Representative Mundy to the rostrum for the purpose of presenting a citation to Leslie Nicholas.

Ms. MUNDY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is my distinct pleasure to introduce a remarkable educator from my district, Mr. Leslie Nicholas. Mr. Nicholas is a language arts teacher at Wyoming Valley West Middle School and has been honored with a national award for teaching excellence.

He received the National Education Association for Teaching Excellence at a salute to excellence gala held in February. Known as the Academy Awards of public education, the gala is an annual celebration of the men and women who work in America's public schools. After a yearlong competitive process, Mr. Nicholas was among the top five finalists and ultimately was selected with the highest honor as the nation's most excellent educator. What a remarkable achievement, and how proud we should be here in Pennsylvania to have that distinction.

Mr. Speaker, standing before us today is the best educator in the entire United States. Mr. Nicholas was nominated for this award by the Pennsylvania State Education Association and selected by a group of peers who recognized his dedication and commitment to his students.

Mr. Nicholas truly has an incredible gift for inspiring his students and bringing learning to life. His students have already benefited from his award: Last fall they received digital arts training, which they used to create an original video honoring their beloved teacher. Mr. Nicholas has brought great distinction to Wyoming Valley West School District and to himself by earning this much-coveted award.

Mr. Nicholas is joined today by Mrs. Linda Houck from the Wyoming Valley West Education Association.

Mr. Speaker, we in the House believe it is important to recognize and acknowledge the remarkable achievements of citizens in the Commonwealth, and so I am very proud to present Mr. Leslie Nicholas with this citation. On behalf of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, I commend you,

MATT MCGLOIN PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. If I could have the members' attention, I would like to invite Representative Flynn to the rostrum for the purpose of presenting a citation to Matt McGloin.

Mr. FLYNN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The movie "Rudy" is the story of a football player who by all accounts had little talent but a lot of heart, and with that heart and daily effort, won over the skepticism of his family, friends, and teammates. In persisting through 2 years on the scout team at Notre Dame, Rudy finally got the chance to dress with the varsity and make it on the field for one play.

Matt McGloin of Scranton, Pennsylvania, lived a dream much the same as Rudy, with one enormous difference: He became one of the greatest quarterbacks in the long history of Penn State football. Unrecruited, Matt walked on to one of the greatest sports programs in the history of intercollegiate athletics: the Pennsylvania State University program coached by Joe Paterno.

He chose to walk on to Penn State football under the tutelage of Paterno, and McGloin sought his measure as a man against world-class athletes – the very athletes that Paterno and his coaching staff recruited to State College.

For 3 years Matt fought the tide of his circumstances. Unrecruited and oftentimes seemingly unwanted, he stayed, he fought, he persevered. His will and determination accorded him the opportunity in competition with the heavily recruited quarterbacks.

Through his daily demonstration of grit, tenacity, and superior skill, he forced those on the coaching staff to admit that day in and day out he was the better man in practice and the better quarterback.

His tenacity and incredible fortitude made him the starter on a team that never sought his talents. He began his time at Penn State unsought and without there ever being consideration of him ever being the starter. He fought, he practiced, and with deep belief in himself and a confidence that pushed him forward day after day, he forced the issue to the point where this walk-on earned a scholarship, and ultimately, the starting job.

In the darkest hour of Penn State football, he chose loyalty to Penn State; when others fled in the midst of the program's hour of need, his fidelity to his teammates and to his institution was inspiring.

Matt McGloin constantly learned and improved, and with the departure of Joe Paterno and the arrival of Bill O'Brien, Matt found a mentor who realized the capacity of his skill and his inherent qualities as a leader of men.

When given the full endorsement of his coaches, he showed himself to possibly be the greatest walk-on in Division I college football history. He demolished Penn State's single-season passing record with 3271 yards passing, finishing his career with 513 completions, 6,390 yards passing, and 46 touchdowns, and only 19 interceptions.

McGloin was awarded the Burlsworth Trophy for being the nation's best walk-on this past season.

At Penn State, a place where heroes and legends persist, he leaves as one of the most prolific passers in the school's history, and in 2012 he had the greatest single season of any quarterback in the history of the storied program.

Matt McGloin left Scranton, Pennsylvania, a boy driven to prove himself the equal of anyone. He finishes his collegiate career as a man who led a team to a magnificent season in a year where every broadcaster and pundit predicted the Penn State football program would crash and burn and instead had one of its best and most impressive seasons ever.

West Scranton's Matt McGloin, when so many around him disappointed, exceeded every expectation except possibly his own. He became the number one passer in the Big Ten Football Conference, enjoying the greatest single season of any Penn State quarterback, leading the Nittany Lions to an eight-win season and helping his coach on his way to becoming the Big Ten Coach of the Year.

As Matt McGloin's State Representative and his neighbor, I wish to congratulate him on his guts, his commitment, his loyalty, and his courage. And now as he graduates and moves on to his next set of challenges, if the past is any predictor of his future accomplishment, I will be the first to cheer him on the first time his number is called in the National Football League.

Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues to give Matt McGloin and his family a rousing General Assembly welcome.

Mr. PETRI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to identify for the members that this is legislative day for the life science industry. This is an industry that supports hospital medical research. Pennsylvania has the first hospital, medical school, and college of pharmacy located in our State.

We have just come up with a vaccine for blood-based hepatitis B, right here in Representative Quinn's district, so congratulations, Representative. There are 13 world-renowned research institutions, and Pennsylvania is home to the leading NIH (National Institutes of Health) award-winning projects.

The industry employs 80,000 Pennsylvanians and generates wages in the range of \$8.15 billion. We are ranked fourth in the nation among related patents, and despite an economic recession unprecedented in our lifetime, there has been a 13-percent increase in companies in Pennsylvania over the past 5 years.

So March 19, 2013, has been designated as "Life Sciences Day," and I want to recognize my colleagues who serve on the Life Sciences Caucus: Representative Briggs, Representative Kampf, and Representative Molchany. Congratulations to the industry and to Pennsylvania, and most importantly, to patients in Pennsylvania and in the world who will benefit from discoveries in Pennsylvania.

Mr. KRIEGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The underlying bill does some important things with regard
to the traditional separation of powers. Presently there would
need to be a warrant or a court order for the subpoena issue for
the search to continue. This bill would change the law so the
prosecuting officer – the district attorney or the Attorney
General or their designee – could issue an administrative
subpoena.

One of the safeguards in the present law is a civil action that is permitted for anyone aggrieved by this process, and given the fact that we are breaking down, to some degree, the separation between the judiciary and the prosecuting function here, I thought it was important to adjust the civil cause of action to make a couple things clear. Right now the law is that damages can be awarded and attorney's fees can be awarded to an aggrieved party.

As an additional safeguard, since we are changing the law, my amendment would require that damages, if they are otherwise warranted, would be required to be awarded, equitable relief that is appropriate would be required to be awarded, and would also set forth that if that action is successful, attorney's fees would also be mandatory. And again, that is to make sure that a person that otherwise may not be able to defend themselves, given this expansion of the prosecutor's authority, would be able to do so.

So I would ask for your support for this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The bill before us today revises and expands an existing intergovernmental group and changes it to the Pennsylvania Long-Term Care Council within the Department of Aging. The council is made up of many public officials, members of the administration, members of the legislature. It also includes representatives of the general public and many stakeholders.

This amendment makes sure that the meetings of this council are covered by the Pennsylvania sunshine law, and I urge a "yes" vote for the sake of openness and transparency.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Lebanon County, Mrs. Swanger.

Mrs. SWANGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I oppose this amendment for the following reason: First of all, I do not think this is the proper way to accomplish what the good gentleman wants to accomplish. The advisory council that I am proposing is advisory only. It does not take official action; therefore, it could not be considered an agency according to the definition under the law.

And while if we did amend this, if we did approve this amendment, these meetings would have to be advertised in newspapers across the Commonwealth, so I cannot imagine what kind of extra cost this is going to put on the department.

We have the assurance of the Secretary of the Department of Aging that these meetings will be advertised by public notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. So I therefore oppose this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Samuelson, for the second time.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Under the sunshine law, meetings have to be advertised in the location where they happen. If a meeting would happen in Harrisburg, it would have to be advertised in the local newspaper in Harrisburg, not in every single newspaper across the State.

And the gentlelady from Lebanon County, who actually has a wonderful bill here before us today, this advisory council is going to do some important work for the State, and when you think about it, one of her reasons to be against this amendment was they are advisory only. Well, let us think about what they are advising. They are advising the Pennsylvania Department of Aging and the legislature about long-term care. The last time I checked, long-term care is a line item in our budget that totals hundreds of millions of dollars. So this council is made up of members of the public along with publicly elected officials in the legislature and publicly appointed officials in the administration. The topic is about something of interest to the public: how Pennsylvania spends hundreds of millions of dollars in long-term care. I wonder what the big secret is here. What would be the harm of having these meetings open to the public and making sure that the public and the press have a chance to hear the very important advice that this Long-term Care Council is going to give to the State?

So I think we should stand up and defend the sunshine law. We should, because there is some ambiguity about this, I think we should make clear on this floor of the House today and by this vote, I think we should make clear that we expect that this advisory council will be a public council and its meetings and its deliberations will be open to the public.

I urge a "yes" vote to include the sunshine law in this bill, and I urge a "yes" vote for the sake of openness and transparency. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Chester County, Mr. Hennessey.

Mr. HENNESSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I urge the House to defeat this amendment. This is really not necessary. First of all, the intergovernmental council that is referred to in the bill is not a State agency. It does not make a

whole lot of sense to bring them within the State agency, the sunshine law which governs State agencies.

Secondly, we have the assurance from the Secretary of Aging that he intends to be open and forthright with the public so that we have that kind of public observation of these kinds of proceedings that are going on by this advisory council. If we say that every advisory council in this Commonwealth has to be subject to the sunshine law, we are probably dealing with 50 or 60 or 70 agencies, and there is no need to affect them when we have the assurances of the Secretary of Aging that it is going to be an open process.

I urge the members to defeat this amendment because it is unnecessary. This is really a case of where if it is not broken, you do not have to fix it. This does not need to be fixed. We ought to defeat the amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Freeman.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the Samuelson amendment.

At a time in Pennsylvania where the public is demanding greater transparency in government, this amendment makes a great deal of sense. The council, although advisory, is still an arm of the Department of Aging, and as such, their deliberations are very important. Their recommendations will have an impact on setting public policy within that department. That should be a matter for the public to know about, and the best way to ensure that is to have them come under the Sunshine Act.

I urge the members of this House to please embrace this amendment. It is a good-government amendment that makes complete sense, and to oppose it makes no sense whatsoever. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Lebanon, Mrs. Swanger, for the second time.

Mrs. SWANGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to emphasize that this council is advisory only. They take no official action. If we were to approve this amendment, I think we would be opening up Pandora's box and we would have to consider each advisory council as a, quote, "agency," and I really do not think we would like to do that.

There is nothing secretive about this process. As I said, the meetings will be advertised in the Pennsylvania Bulletin, and I think the chair of the council could decide to open them up. I do not see why they would not. As I said, there is nothing secretive about it. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady, Ms. DeLissio.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I, too, applaud the maker of this legislation for this Long-Term Care Council. In my previous career I had the opportunity to attend a number of the meetings of the previous iteration of this council, and over a fairly lengthy career focusing on older adults, I was struck by the makeup of the council, grateful for the inclusion of one consumer and one caregiver in the council of 29, but am really clear, Mr. Speaker, that that is not really sufficient. Pennsylvania ranks second and fourth in terms of percentage and absolute numbers of older adults, and those of our citizens, our constituents, who are 70 and 80 and 90 years old, are quite capable of representing their own views directly at the table.

So this amendment asks for a minimum of two consumers to be appointed to this council, and it also takes it from one caregiver to two caregivers. I think the chamber needs to note that the majority of care is given in non-facility-based settings. Most of the care to our older adults is in fact delivered at home. So of those two caregivers, one of them should have personal family caregiving experience. Having these additional appointments to the council will strengthen the council's experience and expertise that they will be sharing with the department and subsequently to the benefit of all of the Commonwealth's citizens.

So I respectfully request the consideration of all my colleagues for this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Lebanon County, Mrs. Swanger.

Mrs. SWANGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also oppose this amendment offered by the good lady. The reason I am opposing it is we have already been asked by the Department of Aging to reduce it from our originally proposed 31 members to 29 members because they felt it was getting to the point of being unwieldy, and I agreed.

This also would be a duplication of membership. We already have provided for consumer and caregiver representations on the council, and the extra two members of course would add extra cost. There would also be spots for these members, as suggested by the good lady, on committees within that council.

So again, I do oppose this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in strong support of the DeLissio amendment.

This council that we are voting on today is not set in stone. In fact, just a week ago in our Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, we adopted an amendment that changed the makeup of the council, and that was an agreed-to amendment by members of both parties. During that meeting Representative DeLissio said, you know what? I think we need more representation from consumers, and I think we also need more representation from caregivers. When we are talking about long-term-care issues, we should not have a council made up only of folks who are members of the Cabinet, members of the administration, members of the legislature, and a handful of members of the public. We need more representation from consumers and caregivers.

Representative DeLissio announced her intentions publicly during our committee meeting, and I applaud her for bringing this issue to the House floor to add one more consumer and one more caregiver to the makeup of this council.

I urge a "yes" vote on the DeLissio amendment.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. DeLissio, for the second time.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment is not meant to be duplicative of the current makeup of the council. It is indeed intended to ensure that there is appropriate consumer representation here. So I would not describe this as duplicative in the least.

In terms of the cost of those additional two members, that cost is de minimis. It is related to, I believe, just travel expenses, and given the wealth of information and the wisdom that both a caregiver and an additional consumer could bring to the table, it is, if you do a cost-benefit analysis, very much worth whatever de minimis cost is there.

And last but not least, very often we leave out of our public policy development those people most affected by that public policy, and in this case, that is indeed our 70-, 80-, and 90-year-old citizens. And personally, I think by voting against this amendment, it is a vote of no confidence that those folks who are older adult consumers have something to contribute to this council and that their contribution is indeed worthwhile. And not only that, just one person is not sufficient to represent those interests.

So with that in mind, again I urge everybody to give this very thoughtful consideration. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

The lady, Mrs. Swanger, is recognized for the second time.

Mrs. SWANGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to let everyone know that in 2009 this council was deactivated under Governor Rendell's administration because the then Secretary of Aging felt it was not needed and he did not want it to function.

I think we are reactivating something that is necessary. I do not think we should be quibbling over how many members represent this and that. I think the consumer members and the members of the family caregivers associations or the family caregivers themselves will have ample opportunity for input, and I urge my members to please oppose this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Samuelson, for the second time.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I agree with the gentelady from Lebanon on this point: It is good that we are reactivating this council. It is going to provide an important function and give the State some important advice on long-term care, but I am surprised that the gentelady would oppose adding one more consumer and one more caregiver. The input of the caregivers and the consumers is very important. This is a 29-member council. We should not limit their input to just 2 of the 29 members. This is a very good amendment, and I think it is an improvement to the council.

I urge a "yes" vote on the DeLissio amendment to get more input from consumers and caregivers who are directly involved in long-term-care issues.

I have introduced this bill in direct response to an instance in Berks County where three volunteer fire companies merged to save resources and better serve the community, yet they were then hit with a realty transfer tax bill for thousands of dollars.

Volunteer fire companies play a vital role in communities across Pennsylvania, and I believe it is both fitting and appropriate to give volunteer fire and rescue companies exemption status because many of them have taken steps to merge or consolidate to save on resources, including three Berks County fire companies located within my district. Currently some real estate transfers are exempt from the realty transfer tax, including transfers among family members, governmental units, religious organizations, shareholders or partners, and to or from nonprofit industrial development agencies.

An Act amending Title 35 (Health and Safety) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, further providing for powers and duties of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency and for disbursement of fund amounts by agency.

On the question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Montgomery County, Ms. Harper.

Ms. HARPER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Would the gentleman stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Ms. HARPER. Thank you.

I notice that this bill deals with PEMA (Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency) and counties. In my county there have been concerns raised about consolidation of 911 centers, and also the funding formula for 911 centers. Does this bill deal with either of those issues?

Mr. BARRAR. Yes, Mr. Speaker. This does deal with that. It does not mandate consolidation, but what it does is allows PEMA to make suggestions to county 911 centers on cost-cutting measures and ways to save money and to bring down the overall cost of the operation of the 911 system.

What was the second part of your question?

Ms. HARPER. The second part of my question was whether your bill deals with any changes to the funding formula for 911 systems?

Mr. BARRAR. Mr. Speaker, this bill does not, but we are actually working with the groups involved with PEMA, with the county commissioners, who have been complaining about the fee structure here, and the different groups involved in representing the 911 operators and the groups. And we are working on a rewrite of the 911 law that, hopefully, we will have ready sometime near the end of the year, but right now this measure here is one of PEMA's top priorities, to get this done. If we do not get this piece of legislation done soon, this will be, basically the 911 system could face some type of functional bankruptcy.

Ms. HARPER. So to reiterate, this bill allows for consolidation but does not require it, and does not yet deal with any changes to the funding formula, which your committee is intent on working on in the future?

Mr. BARRAR. Yes; you are correct. There are no mandates in here on any consolidation.

Ms. HARPER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Harhai.

Mr. HARHAI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I understand the subject matter and potential content of this bill was discussed earlier when it was before the House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee. My understanding is that there was a conceptual agreement with that language but some concern that it did not clearly express the relationship between the counties and PEMA, and that to keep the bill moving forward, the interested parties were asked to work together on more accurate language. Is this that language, the result of those discussions?

The SPEAKER. Was the gentleman seeking to interrogate the gentleman, Mr. Barrar?

Mr. HARHAI. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. I apologize. The gentleman, Mr. Barrar, may proceed and respond to the interrogation.

Mr. BARRAR. Yes, Mr. Speaker, you are correct. This language represents, basically, the final product that has been agreed to by all the groups involved – the PEMA director, the county commissioners – and our committee staff has worked on this, and I think everybody is pretty much satisfied with the final language.

Last year, the last time this was voted on, there were three negative votes. We are hoping this time that we get a unanimous vote on this. We have spoken to them and think we have answered their questions on this.

Mr. HARHAI. That is great, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to make sure we got that on record as the correction.

And thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate it.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker thanks the gentleman.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Barrar.

Mr. BARRAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Real quickly on this piece of legislation. This legislation will amend our 911 emergency telephone law by authorizing PEMA to provide county 911 centers with cost-cutting suggestions on consolidation, regionalization, and shared service and shared technology, and further requires wireless 911 fund disbursements to be applied to the current year only, thus moving away from the current cost carryover system that was quickly bankrupting the 911 system and 911 fund at this point.

So I would ask the members for a "yes" vote on this. This is an important initiative for PEMA. We really need this done before the budget session starts. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
