### STEM ACADEMY PRESENTED

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Representative Corbin is invited to the rostrum for the purpose of presenting a citation to the national winners of the student spaceflight contest.

Representative Corbin, you may proceed when you are ready.

Mrs. CORBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to recognize the achievement of these outstanding students from the STEM Academy in Downingtown. STEM, as you most likely know, is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. The STEM Academy in Downingtown is the third high school in the Downingtown School District. It is a magnet program that draws students from the other two high schools, Downingtown East and West.

These students participate in athletics, performing arts, and other such programs in the afternoons at Downingtown East and Downingtown West, but during the bulk of the day they are exposed to a unique, specialized curriculum that prepares young people for exciting and rewarding careers in the fields of science and technology.

As a science person myself – I hold a degree in chemistry – I would have loved to have had the opportunity that these students have today at the STEM Academy. They are so privileged to have a school district like Downingtown that recognizes their talents and potential from such a young age and offers them the chance to develop their skills early.

The students here today are specifically being honored as the winning team of the Student Spaceflight Experiment Program, and I am hoping they will all give a wave when I mention their names. Joining us are Miranda McMillen, Christina Murray, Jenni Faust, Meghan Joyce, Avni Gulrajani, Connor McGrath, Cecilia Padilla, and Santina Zouras. Their teacher is Mr. Eric Daney.

This group of ninth grade students' experiments, "Adderall XR and Microencapsulation in Microgravity," will be flown to the International Space Station this fall, where the astronauts will conduct their research.

The students competed with STEM academies from across the United States. They were informed earlier this spring that they were one of 33 finalists, and last week they were informed that they were the national champions.

These fine young men and women represent not only Downingtown Area School District, my legislative district, and that of the 158th District, but the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Congratulations to all of you.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for giving me the opportunity to recognize these students.

**STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN**

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Will members please take your seats. We will be recognizing Representative Gillen, who would like to speak, as well as Representative Rozzi, on HR 102, the 60th anniversary of the Korean war armistice. Members, please be seated out of respect for our veterans.

The gentleman may proceed, when you are ready.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It was nearly 60 years ago that the armistice was signed ending the Korean war. Some have called it the forgotten war.

Just a couple days ago Representative Kavulich and I were visiting the World War II weekend together, and I had occasion to stop at a table. There was a gentleman there under the hanger. I know Representative Kavulich had the same privilege to meet some of those World War II heroes, but I stopped at a gentleman's table. He had no books. He had no pictures. He had nothing to sign, none of the same type of memorabilia that we would have normally associated with this particular event that has been going on annually for 23 years. But Hank Heim had a paper in front of him which I found remarkable. I spoke with his son about it. I spoke with Hank about it. He is one of those veterans who could not be here today. And I read the record of an aviator who flew 75 combat missions in World War II. I read about the record of an aviator who was at Pearl Harbor at Hickam Field. The further I went into the biography, I read about another part of his aviation history and service to his country. He was not done with Pearl Harbor and he was not finished with World War II, but he went on to fly 50 more combat missions in Korea, and it is not unlike the Korean war veterans that serve. I talked to Harry Kruse a few minutes ago outside the hall of the House, and he is still running a Lions Club event in Shillington coming up. They are still serving.

I asked some of the men, what of the phrase "the forgotten war" in between other conflicts, maybe not as noteworthy in the press, certainly lacking ticker-tape parades, fire engines, sirens? Is it really the forgotten war? How could we forget this service? How could we forget MacArthur's Inchon landing with 75,000 men and 261 vessels? He was told by others it could not be done – the seawalls are impenetrable; the tides are not favorable – but it had to be done because there was a rescue mission that needed to be accomplished.

How could we forget Chosin Reservoir, where machines and meds and men were frozen under 35-degree-below-zero temperatures? How could we forget their service in places like Pork Chop Hill? How could we forget their liberating, on several occasions, the South Korean capital city of Seoul? How could we forget the missing in action by the thousands that still lie entombed on the Korean Peninsula? How could we forget the tens of thousands who lost their lives? How could we forget the thousands who suffered debilitating injuries and frostbite? How could we forget this special era of veterans?

MacArthur when he left the Philippines vowed to return, and he indeed did return to the Philippines. And when he returned to Philippine soil in World War II he said, "By the grace of Almighty God our forces stand" once "again on Philippine soil..." and indeed, by the grace of Almighty God, our forces liberated South Korea from the Communist menace.

Is there any doubt in our minds about what happened in Korea? If any doubt exists, look at a satellite photograph and observe the north of the country – dark, foreboding, frozen in fear – and look at that same satellite photograph and observe what is happening in the southern end of the peninsula, and look at the capital city of Seoul and look at the industrial might and observe the lights at the southern end of that peninsula.

No, friends, you are not forgotten, and your service is not forgotten. No, you are not forgotten by an orphan who was liberated out of harm's way. You have not been forgotten by a civilian who now can go back to that place they call home. You are not forgotten, and I challenge us today that we do not forget.

With them also is author and historian Sharon Wells Wagner. She is responsible, as much as anyone else, in addition to the good offices of the chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee, Steve Barrar, for helping put this together. So I would ask those family members and staff to rise, if you would, just for a moment, please.

And one more time before Representative Rozzi comes up here, I would like to ask you to stand as your name is called, please: Mr. Harry Kruse – and we will acknowledge them as a group at the end – Harry, thank you for your service and thank you for sharing your daughter these years with my office as a staffer; William Berkey; Elvin Kreider; John Conlen; Bob Berns; John Hoffman; and William Mauger. Ladies and gentlemen, your patriots, your Korean war veterans.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

At this time the Chair recognizes Representative McCarter, who would like to speak on HR 342 in recognition of the 150th anniversary of Camp William Penn.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am joined today by Representative Vanessa Brown, chair of the Black Caucus, and two members of the 3d Regiment of the United States Colored Troops Reenactors. And we want to thank you very much for the unanimous vote on the resolution, 342, as we commemorate the anniversary of the establishment of Camp William Penn, the training camp for

African-American or colored soldiers who served the Union during the Civil War.

Mr. Speaker, as a former history teacher, I am honored to have the location of this encampment within my legislative district. Camp William Penn came about following the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, when colored or African-Americans were for the first time authorized to serve in the Union Army. The War Department issued a special order stating that the camp was to be established at Cheltenham Hills near Philadelphia as a rendezvous for United States African-American troops recruited in the eastern part of Pennsylvania on the land owned by Edward M. Davis, a member of the Union League, founder of Cheltenham Hills Land Association, and son-in-law of the noted Quaker abolitionist, Lucretia Mott.

The first recruits arrived at the campus – or at the camp; it was not a campus – at the camp's first location on June 26, 1863, and between that time and May 19, 1865, a total of 10,940 men in 11 regiments were formed and trained at the site's two locations. The records for bravery under fire and efficiency in the campaigns in which they participated gave credit to all of the nearly 11,000 rank-and-file Black soldiers and nearly 400 White officers who commanded them.

Two of the eleven regiments, the 6th and the 8th, were included in the 300 Fighting Regiments, a list selected from the entire Union force for superior fighting records by Col. William F. Fox. Five of Camp William Penn's regiments were present at Appomattox Court House to witness the surrender of General Lee to General Grant. And after the war ended, the soldiers of Camp William Penn pursued President Lincoln's assassins, and the 22d Regiment was chosen because of its "excellent discipline and good soldierly qualities" to lead the funeral procession.

The Allied Veterans Association of Pennsylvania erected a stone marker commemorating Camp William Penn on July 4, 1943, and on May 15, 1999, a historic marker was installed at what has been identified as the original gate to Camp William Penn. While very few remnants of the camp remain today, one can visit the site at the restored front gates and the historic marker. It should also be noted that recent research by two local historians – who are with us today in the back, Tom Wieckowski and David Harrower, who are currently writing a book on Camp William Penn's history – have located the exact original site of the first camp and identified two existent structures adjoining that location.

I also want to inform the members that there will be a formal celebration of the anniversary on Saturday, September 21, 2013, in La Mott, at the site of the camp. We would hope that members could join the citizens for the historical restoration of La Mott on that date to pay tribute to the contributions of these remarkable men.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to speak on this resolution and the opportunity to share information on what is truly one of the most remarkable stories of our nation's history on this, the 150th anniversary of the Camp's establishment, and the brave and noble soldiers who trained at Camp William Penn.

So I want to congratulate not only the members who were here but all the Korean war veterans who served during that time; of course, and all the other veterans.

Motion was agreed to, and at 3:38 p.m., e.d.t., the House adjourned.
