The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Barrar.

Mr. BARRAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment just covers all school personnel contracts. It just extends the provisions of the bill to every contract. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Snyder County, Mr. Fred Keller.

Mr. F. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is an agreed-to amendment, and we would ask for support. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Will the maker of the amendment stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Barrar, indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. I understand the bill generally. It basically requires 48 hours' notice of a collective-bargaining tentative agreement before the school board votes on that agreement and approves it. Now, this extends what has to be given, that 48 hours' notice, to any proposed employment contract for a professional educator who is not a member of an employee organization.

Now, what I am trying to get at is, who are we talking about here? Could you give me a number of examples of someone who would be added, whose contract would be added by your amendment?

Mr. BARRAR. Yeah, this would cover the superintendents, principals, possibly some school nurses, psychologists. There are a lot of employment contracts that are done within a school district that are not part of the collective-bargaining unit.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Now, I understand the first piece of it – the bill in chief – because there is a lot of pressure on the part of unions and they can bring a lot to bear, and it is important to maybe have a counterbalance of the public weighing in on them. But with regard to these individual contracts, what is the reason to expose these individual contracts to this 48-hour period?

Mr. BARRAR. Well, these contracts are negotiated most of the time in secret. The purpose of the amendment is to give the taxpayers, the people who have to pay the bill, 48 hours to review it before their action can be taken on the contract, so they have an opportunity to be heard, a chance at a public meeting before the vote is taken to stand up and make a comment whether they are for or against, whether they support or oppose the provisions of the contract.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. That concludes my interrogation. I would just like to speak on the bill.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order on the amendment.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. I will note at the outset just to give members additional information. PSEA (Pennsylvania State Education Association) does oppose this amendment.

But I mean, my concern here is how much do we want to – the public generally has a right to know, and for the bill in chief with regard to these huge contracts, you can make a very legitimate argument that this is going to have a significant impact, being so much of the school budget. But when you get into these individual contracts, I just have some concerns of how much individual pieces like this do you really want to expose to public scrutiny and comment and how much of a benefit is that. So I would sort of distinguish the bill in chief from these individual contracts with the right to have the 48 hours' notice.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery County, Mr. Painter.

Mr. PAINTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Would the maker of the amendment stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Barrar, indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. PAINTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I wanted to know if the amendment would reach employment contracts entered into by charter schools or cyber charter schools.

Mr. BARRAR. It would only extend to public school districts only.

Mr. PAINTER. That concludes my interrogation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Mercer County, Mr. Longiotti.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Mr. Speaker, in the amendment, the term "professional educator" is used. I wanted to ask whether the amendment or the bill defines what a "professional educator" is.

Mr. BARRAR. Can you repeat that again?

Mr. LONGIETTI. Sure.

Mr. BARRAR. I am having a hard time hearing that.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Yes, Mr. Speaker—

The SPEAKER. Will gentleman suspend a minute.

It is not exceptionally loud in here, but perhaps if members would just hold the conversations down a little bit, especially during interrogation, it is helpful.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I notice that the amendment uses the terminology "professional educator," and I wondered whether the amendment or the bill in chief defines what a "professional educator" is.

Mr. BARRAR. That term is used throughout the School Code.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Mr. Speaker, I am relatively familiar with the School Code. I am not going to say that I know it all verbatim, but my recollection is that the School Code uses the term "professional employee." Are you referring to a "professional employee," Mr. Speaker, or can you refer me to the section of the School Code that defines "professional educator"?

Mr. BARRAR. Okay. I do not have that section in front of me, but both terms are actually used within the School Code.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Mr. Speaker, I guess I have a concern for clarity here, because my recollection, as I said, is I believe the School Code uses throughout the term "professional employee," which is a laundry list of folks, by the way, but I do not recall seeing the terminology "professional educator" specifically in the School Code. So, Mr. Speaker, if you could direct me to where that is, that would be helpful. Do you know where that is in the School Code?

Mr. BARRAR. We will have to get that for you.

Mr. LONGIETTI. All right. Mr. Speaker, on the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order on the amendment.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I understand what the gentleman is trying to accomplish in this amendment. My concern is that I believe the term "professional employee" is used in the School Code, and the gentleman may want to — may be contemplating professional employee, but the term "professional educator" is used in this amendment. I think that is problematic because it is not clear what that is.

When you think of educator, typically you think of somebody who stands in front of a classroom and delivers instruction to folks. When you look at the word "professional employee" in the School Code, and I do not have that right in front of me but I recall from recollection, it is a laundry list of folks. It includes a whole lot of folks that do not stand in a classroom and deliver instruction. It goes beyond superintendents and principals. I believe it is psychologists, school nurses. I know there are some folks that I am not even thinking of that are in that definition.

So I think for clarity purposes, this amendment needs to be redrafted. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
