And the council is also very heavily loaded with physician slots and a variety of physicians, obviously very important members of the team, but the emphasis, Mr. Speaker, is absolutely on team, and we seem to pretty consistently overlook the role of our nurses, particularly as health care moves forward, and we need to correct that, Mr. Speaker.

There is not an opportunity to do that here on the floor. I sincerely hope that the Senate will correct this oversight, and I sincerely hope that our House and our members in the future will be more sensitive and aware of this issue and pass legislation in the future that includes a very broad team that includes nurses.

I will be a "yes" vote on this and, again, hope that the Senate corrects this oversight.
