BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1718, PN 2953**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, providing for online education initiative; and establishing the Online Course Clearinghouse Restricted Account.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.
The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Mercer County, Mr. Longietti.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, HB 1718, as we know, deals with creating a clearinghouse for online education and is certainly a worthy goal of this legislature. And the bill was improved in the amendment process, but I still have concerns with the bill as it is written, and particularly in a couple areas, Mr. Speaker.

First of all, for courses that are not related to the Keystone Exams, there is a certification process, what I will call a paper certification, and so all that needs to occur in that case is that the provider simply submits paperwork to the Department of Ed that says that this course is aligned to State standards. And the provider has to meet certain criteria, and one of those criteria is essentially that the provider needs to be a school entity, so that could be a school district, that could be a charter school – brick-and-mortar charter – that could be a cyber charter school.

And my concern here is this: We know that there are quite a number of school entities, particularly when it comes to cyber charter schools that do not meet AYP. They do not meet adequate yearly progress. They are, by the measurements that are there, falling down on the standard of making sure that kids are proficient, and yet we are going to allow them to submit a course to be included in the clearinghouse and to do a paper certification to say that that course is aligned to State standards, and that is the extent of the review that the Department of Education is going to have of that course. They are not going to actually examine that online course because it is not a Keystone

Exam-related course. They are just going to do a cursory paper certification, and I think that that diminishes the moniker of the Department of Education.

The Department of Education is establishing this clearinghouse and they are putting their moniker on it. And they are saying, these are courses that we believe are worthy of students taking on an online basis, and they are telling that to various school entities. And that is the extent of their review, because in that case, there is only a \$75 fee, so they are not going to do any kind of an in-depth review.

Now, under the legislation, the school district does, at some point in time, have some ability to comment on that course, but it is only after the course is put online and given that moniker by the Department of Ed and put on the clearinghouse. And it seems to me, and I know that our school districts are stretched thin as they are, but it seems to me that at the very least they ought to have some ability up front to review that course and comment and inform the Department of Ed whether or not that course really deserves to be on the clearinghouse. Now, not all school entities will take advantage of that, but they ought to have that opportunity up front, and unfortunately, in this legislation it is lost.

Another concern that I have is that even in the case of the Keystone Exam courses, we know that there will be a more thorough review by the Department of Ed. But we know, we all know in this building today, we know that our Department of Ed is already stretched thin. They have shrunk in size in terms of personnel, and although there is a \$750 fee associated with the review, a more stringent review, I question whether the Department of Ed is going to have adequate staff to really do the type of review that is necessary, and so that is certainly a concern.

And finally, Mr. Speaker, I have a concern about how the payment flows for these courses. When you look at the legislation, the legislation specifically states that the company or the provider can require – and these can be, by the way, for-profit companies – the provider can require up to 60 percent of the cost of that course to be paid prior to the completion of the course. Now, when you think about it, when we receive services like that and we have to pay 60 percent up front, that could be day 1, that could be the first day that that child starts that course, that 60-percent payment is paid by the school entity up front. I have a real concern about that.

I think that that is a cost that could be paid and the services not provided as they are supposed to be provided. I certainly would not enter into a contract like that on my own and pay 60 percent up front on day 1 not knowing what I am going to receive on day 2, 3, 4, and on down the road.

And so, once again, while I applaud the maker of the legislation for bringing this issue forward to us – the idea of a clearinghouse for online education, certainly worthy for our debate and consideration here – I think that this legislation even as amended is fatally flawed, and so I urge my colleagues to vote "no." Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Mr. DENLINGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of HB 1718, the creation of an online clearinghouse of courses for students in grades 6 through 12. The bill lays out a robust platform upon which our school

districts can build as they work to modernize in line with the rapidly changing ways in which education is delivered.

This amendment to the Public School Code will help bring our educational system into the 21st century, a time in which parents and educators look for expanded options tailored to meet the specific needs and wishes of individual students.

I applaud the movement of HB 1718, and I ask for an affirmative vote.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Samuelson. The gentleman waives off.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster County, Mr. Aument.

Mr. AUMENT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I first want to acknowledge my colleagues on the other side of the aisle for a number of amendments that were offered that helped improve this legislation, as well as my colleague from Bucks County for his amendment that he offered and the comments that have been made thus far on the floor.

I just want to make a few points, because I think there is some confusion over exactly what HB 1718 does, what HB 1718 does not require.

HB 1718 allows public school students the ability to customize and individualize their learning experience by choosing courses to meet their individual needs – looking at format, schedule, and quality. Courses could be online, they could be face-to-face, or in a blended learning format, and offered by a diverse group of providers ranging from institutions of higher education, private providers, other virtual schools, and other public schools. The experience of other States tells us that many entrepreneurial public schools and public school educators will also apply as providers. The ultimate goal of this legislation is to harness technology in a way that is beneficial to students, to educators, while preserving local control by ensuring local school district flexibility. It is one reason why the School Boards Association has come out in support of this legislation.

HB 1718 requires the Pennsylvania Department of Education to establish an online database of online courses available to public schools in the Commonwealth. My legislation ensures school districts have maximum flexibility. They can develop their own courses, they could contract with a provider, and/or utilize courses on the Pennsylvania Department of Education clearinghouse. This legislation, however, does not mandate the use of the clearinghouse, nor does it mandate that every student take an online course.

I believe online learning is a critical component of a 21st-century education system. During a House Education Committee hearing that we conducted earlier in the year, a testifier noted what online learning is not. Online learning is not about replacing teachers. Online learning is not about students sitting in front of a computer screen all day. Online learning is not about computers and tablets; it is about facilitating new approaches to learning and instruction.

I appreciate the work that has gone into this legislation. Again, my thanks to the School Boards Association for their dialogue and now their support of this legislation. I urge your support of HB 1718.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

So I fully support the bill, and I am dismayed that someone would not want online courses for charter schools, which are very successful, and I take opposition to someone who – or not wanting online courses for successful charter schools, especially when I represent one that is a National Blue Ribbon Charter School.

On concurrence in the Senate, the bill was amended to remove a provision of the House that had added requiring a mandatory 1-year sentence for arson of a historic resource. With that change, the Senate concurred in the House amendments by a vote of 48-0.
