### STATEMENT BY MR. McCARTER

The students, teachers, administrators, and families of Wyncote Elementary, along with the entire community, will be forever indebted to Pat's quick action and her clear head.

In addition to honoring her here today on the House floor, Pat will also receive the Montgomery County Red Cross Heroes Award. It is everyday heroes like Pat, Mr. Speaker, that give us hope for all of mankind that we know what to do when circumstances arrive.

Mr. Speaker, at this time I would like to ask all of my colleagues to please join me in commending this remarkable woman for her most heroic efforts in saving the life of our wonderful little Ethan. Thank you.

**STATEMENT BY MR. EVANKOVICH**

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Evankovich, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. EVANKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today I rise in support of HR 574 and thank the members of the House of Representatives for voting in favor of it. HR 574 proclaims March 30, 2014, as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day."

None of us in this chamber need a history lesson about the Vietnam war, and especially not from a lawmaker that was one generation too young to have fought in that war. And while no words of mine can adequately honor the tens of thousands who perished or were missing, I do believe that we need a renewed display of appreciation for those who came home and in some cases without an appropriate welcome.

Mr. Speaker, the establishment of a special day would be an appropriate way for us to honor those gentlemen for all that they have done in all branches of our military. March 30 is a historically special day because it marks the date that the last troops departed Vietnam in 1973, which is why we have chosen March 30.

Mr. Speaker, I would ask that we give special recognition to Dennis Gianotti for his hard work and effort in bringing this issue to my attention and for making sure that we took action on it here today. Please join me in honoring the memory of those who so faithfully served by extending our gratitude to those heroes who sacrificed so much for our nation and returned home in many cases without a hero's welcome.

And, Mr. Speaker, if I can ask that the veterans in the rear of the House from the 54th District please rise so that we can give them an appropriate welcome home.

Welcome home, gentlemen. Thank you.

**STATEMENT BY MR. MAHER**

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Maher, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This year is the centenary of agricultural extension in Pennsylvania, and I am going to offer just a little bit of history because there are terms that we tend to use around here that you may not be clear about the derivation of.

Back in 1859 Congress passed an act to provide for funding of agricultural colleges in 10 States using Federal lands as the currency. Now, Pennsylvania's homegrown President, James Buchanan, added to his dubious distinctions in that office by vetoing this act. So it was not until 1862 when the first and perhaps greatest Republican of all time, President Lincoln, signed the law that created the land-grant system.

Now, what the land grant is, just so you know, is it allowed the States to sell land that they did not own. It was Federal land. And if there was not enough Federal land within the State, the States were issued scrip – little pieces of paper, really – that gave almost a title to that land and allowed the States to sell this land out far in the west. And that scrip fund, which continues today, was restricted for use in support of what has become Pennsylvania State University.

Now, it was not for another 50 years until the university's mission was expanded to provide for formal agricultural cooperative extension. That was on May 8, 1914. So we are just on the verge of that 100th anniversary. And today extension is so critically important for the 60,000 farms across our State.

And not too recently – not too long ago, an extension agent was a guy or gal who would come out and pick up the soil in their hand and smell the soil and advise the farmer, and he needed to be a jack-of-all-trades. But like so much in our world, extension has advanced thanks to the expansion of technology, and now the world-class research in agriculture that happens at Penn State and the knowledge of the faculty at Penn State can be delivered to farmers across the State with the actual best expertise available, and at lightning speed, so that if a bit of blight appears in some corner of the State, the word can go out across to allow farmers to know to prepare and do what they can to combat it – just as an example.

So I am delighted that you joined in voting in support of this resolution today to celebrate the centenary of Penn State Agricultural Extension and am delighted that the dean and others from the university have joined us for this occasion. They were previously introduced by the Speaker, but I will ask you to please just stand briefly and please join me in a round of applause.

I would like to take a moment this morning to recognize the 35th anniversary of our Pennsylvania Department of Aging.

As Pennsylvanians, we are fortunate to live in the only State in the Union which has a State lottery strictly dedicated for our senior citizens. Since its inception in 1971, the lottery has contributed over 23.7 billion – billion with a "b" – dollars to programs and services for our older adults. Last year alone our lottery contributed over \$1 billion to programs and services for seniors. Some of those include the property tax rebate, rent rebates, free or reduced fare transit rides, long-term-care services, prescription drug assistance through the PACE (Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract for the Elderly) and PACENET (Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract for the Elderly Needs Enhancement Tier) programs, and many other programs offered through the 52 area agencies on aging across our State.

And, Mr. Speaker, I ask the members of the House to join me in wishing the Pennsylvania Department of Aging a happy thanks – no, a happy 35th anniversary here as we celebrate it in 2014. Thank you very much.

**STATEMENT BY MR. SAMUELSON**

Our Department of Aging will touch even more lives in the years to come as baby boomers add to the ranks of our seniors, and a great many challenges lay ahead for the Department of Aging as we prepare for an increasing demand for services in the years to come.

This legislative body must continue working together to make sure that the Department of Aging has the resources it needs to continue its mission of "enhancing the quality of life of all older Pennsylvanians by empowering diverse communities, the family and the individual."

In science, business, medicine, law, the arts and the home, women have made significant contributions to the growth and development of our land. Their diverse service is among America's most precious gifts."

## **ROSA PARKS REMEMBRANCE DAY**

### **STATEMENT BY MS. BISHOP**

The SPEAKER. The lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. Bishop, is also recognized under unanimous consent.

Ms. BISHOP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Each year since 2001 I have had the honor and the pleasure of paying tribute to Rosa Parks here on this House floor. We have all heard her story of how she sat down and took a stand that changed the face of our nation. Her fight for civil rights began long before her civil rights disobedience act.

Rosa Parks was exposed to the reality of segregation as a child when she walked to school daily as white students passed by on buses. She was refused the right to vote twice. Once she was kicked off a city bus for refusing to enter through the back door.

In 1943 she joined her husband as an active member of the Montgomery chapter of the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People). She served as youth leader and secretary for the NAACP under the leadership of E.D. Nixon until 1957.

It was a rather cold evening in December 1955 when Rosa Parks started a fire storm just by sitting down, just by sitting down. She refused to give up her seat to a white man on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama, which led to her subsequent arrest, jailing, and a 382-day-long "buscott" followed. That is a bus boycott.

She said that, and we quote, "When I made that decision, I knew that I had the strength of my ancestors..." standing on my shoulders and walking behind me.

Rosa was found guilty. She was fined \$14 for her action. She was willing not only to spend the \$14, but her time, her security, her life for justice, civil rights, and racial equality.

Parks said she never broke a law and that was important with my last conversation with her before she passed. She never broke a law, but she was arrested for what was called civil disobedience.

Rosa Parks had the firm belief that the courage of one person could inspire others to make this country a better place for all. Her courage remains an inspiration to all of us today and reminds us that while much progress in the world has been made, true equality is still a dream.

Behind every Rosa Parks there is a quiet strength, a quiet hero, that goes unrecognized, and that is what Rosa Parks wanted everyone to be, a quiet hero. It is my hope that this chamber that we serve in every day, we continue to do the work that Rosa Parks would have wanted us all to do.

Rosa Parks made the decision to stand up by keeping her seat, by sitting down. She made that decision, and with that single act, more than 200 years of oppression, she kept her seat and hoped that it would erase the bitterness and get better as time went on.

That historic moment taught us all how to change and how change happens through the choices that we make.

We oftentimes hear on the House floor, that is a Republican or that is a Democratic issue and we cannot support that. We cannot cast an "aye" or we cannot cast a "nay." But on certain bills, sometimes they become stalemate.

Rosa Parks did not make excuses. She found a way. She made a way out of no way. Her action launched a movement. It reminds me of a statement the late Robert Kennedy made in South Africa in 1960. He said, quote, "Each time a man stands up for an ideal, or acts to improve the lot of..." other people, "...or strikes out against injustice, he sends forth a tiny ripple of hope, and crossing each other from a million different centers of energy... daring those ripples" to "build a current which can sweep down the mightiest walls of oppression and resistance."

So Rosa would have turned 101 years old this year. The enduring legacy of her demure yet feisty woman is that we all do something. If we do not, there will be no ripple, no wave, no change. As a grassroots activist for peace, she was decorated with many medals and awards, including the Medal of Freedom, the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor. However, the wave of change that she incited in our country is what we all cherish, treasure, and remember. And I hope that we are all waiting for that Rosa Parks moment when we can grab that moment and reach for the sky. If we fail, who knows, we might end up with a star that brightens the life of all on earth.

Thank you, Rosa Parks, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD**

Mr. HENNESSEY submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

As chairman of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, I am pleased to support the passage of HB 1702, PN 3132, sponsored by my colleague, Chris Ross. This legislation would establish a PA Community Adult Respite Services Program.

HB 1702 addresses a real need that is growing every day. More and more households are made up of "extended families" – working families who represent the "sandwich generation" – mom and dad, two or three kids, and grandma and grandpa – all living under the same roof. Whether it is due to the economy, the costs of institutional long-term care, or simply because they just enjoy being together to enjoy and share the intergenerational benefits, the phenomena of "extended families" is increasing.

HB 1702 will give working families peace of mind knowing that during those hours of the day when their elderly loved ones would otherwise be left alone, they will be safe and secure in a Community Adult Respite Services Program. I predict, given the numerous benefits that community respite programs offer, that this PA Community Adult Respite Services Program will prove to be a significant piece of Pennsylvania's long-term-care continuum.

Finally, HB 1702 meets the mandate contained within the federally mandated PA State Plan on Aging – to ensure that our older Pennsylvanians are cared for "in the right place, at the right time, and with the right intensity."

Ms. DeLISSIO submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

I have concerns about the effectiveness of this bill as follows:

It is my understanding that the Department of Health shall not commence enforcement until sufficient funding has been made available for its duties as prescribed by this legislation.

If the reason that this bill exists is so important, I do not understand the delay to require imaging centers to notify patients of the results as required. The Department of Health can subsequently conduct compliance reviews after funding is identified.

Furthermore, it is not clear why the Department of Health cannot incorporate these reviews into existing surveys, visits, etc., to imaging facilities. Neither the legislation nor debate addressed where the Department of Health could access funding or in what timeframe.

If the citizens read carefully and understand the fine print, HB 1642 is yet again an example of legislation that has no meaningful impact now or into the foreseeable future. If it were to pass the Senate, it would only be meaningful if imaging centers were to abide by the 60-day effective date. Compliance could occur when funding is identified. Or better yet, the Senate could provide for the funding since this legislation has been deemed such an urgent matter for the citizens of Pennsylvania.
