Mr. EVANKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this afternoon we rise with great pride to speak about some achievements from some outstanding athletes from Franklin Regional High School in Murrysville, Westmoreland County, my alma mater. These young men truly reflect the meanings of dedication and commitment.

Mrs. DAVIS. It is truly an honor and a privilege for me to introduce to you the Bristol Wardogs football organization. Wardogs Football and Cheerleading started as the Bristol Tigers in 2000. The program changed names in 2004 in honor of the War Dog Memorial that was set to be placed at the Bristol Township Municipal Building.

Just like the name represents, the War Dogs in this military were not mascots. They were highly trained and proficient. These teams standing before you pay tribute to the name.

We face many economic and social challenges in our community, and many of these exceptional young men come from trying situations and circumstances. I wanted to talk about the Arbor Day resolution. I ask for unanimous consent.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. MARSICO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Every year, as you know, we take the opportunity to celebrate Arbor Day by introducing a resolution recognizing Arbor Day, and of course, on your desk are seedlings to help celebrate Arbor Day.

I would like to thank Octoraro Native Plant Nursery from southern Lancaster County for providing us with the seedlings this year, which of course are on your desks. These seedlings—If I could have the attention of the members, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Members, please take your seats.

Mr. MARSICO. Once again, these seedlings are redosier dogwoods, which is a native riparian species that is used frequently in river and stream restoration projects. They are very vigorous growers and their stems in the winter are bright red and are frequently gathered for use in Christmas arrangements. In the spring they bloom with a white flower and develop berries that are loved by birds and other wildlife. They grow to about 12 feet in good conditions but are easily trimmed to smaller sizes. Cutting them back also results in the plant producing more of the red stems used in decorations.

I would also like to thank Mr. Gregg Robertson, the president of the Pennsylvania Landscape and Nursery Association, for coordinating this effort.

Lastly, I would like to thank the Future Farmers of America for helping to distribute the seedlings to the members as well as leadership and the members for supporting this resolution.

Hopefully my colleagues had the opportunity to participate in an event in their legislative district recognizing the importance of being good stewards of our environment. Each Earth Day as I think about the events and activities designed to promote environmentally friendly concepts, such as recycling and energy efficiency, I am reminded of my grandparents' generation. They were experts at repurposing everything and conserving energy out of necessity during difficult economic times. As we became more prosperous, it was easy to forget the lessons of their generation. Earth Day reminds us of those lessons and the positive impact we can have on the environment.

Mr. Speaker, Chairman Marsico recognized Arbor Day was April 25. As chairman of the Chesapeake Bay Commission this year, I find the recognition of these two important events occurring so closely in the same time period to be appropriate. We have learned much about the importance of riparian buffers in protecting our groundwater, streams, and watersheds. Restoration of the tree canopy along our many miles of streams plays an important part in meeting our obligations to reduce and control storm water erosion, reduce nutrients flowing into our waterways, and enhance water quality.

I encourage all to incorporate the good intents of Earth Day and Arbor Day throughout the year as we work to foster greater environmental awareness.

STATEMENT BY MRS. SNYDER

Mrs. SNYDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to thank my colleagues for their support of HR 808, which designates today, April 28, as "Workers' Memorial Day" in Pennsylvania. It also commemorates an important worker protection law, the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Act, or OSHA, which took effect on April 28, 1971.

In 2012 nearly 4,400 workers nationwide, including 163 right here in Pennsylvania, lost their lives from workplace injuries. Millions more suffered nonfatal work-related injuries or illnesses.

Workplace deaths touch a variety of industries, from construction and transportation to agriculture and manufacturing. Sometimes disastrous workplace accidents garner media attention for a few days, but many times our workers die with little or no recognition, which is an unconscionable disservice to their memories.

In my district, factory employees, coal miners, linemen, and others risk their lives every day just by reporting for work. Our workers deserve to show up to their jobs each day and feel confident that their employers and elected officials are doing everything they can to keep them safe.

That is why this day is so significant. We need to reaffirm our commitment to Pennsylvania's workers who contribute so much to this great State and deserve the best protection we can offer. In 2014 we are more than well-equipped to provide the necessary resources to ensure safe work environments.

Thank you for taking the time to honor the workers killed or injured in the workplace as well as their families who have suffered as well.

I leave you with the motto for Workers' Memorial Day: "Remember the dead, fight for the living."

Workers' Memorial Day is an opportunity to recommit workplace safety and provide good jobs that offer a healthy working environment for all their employees. Safe, healthy work environments contribute to a healthy and safe community for all.

HR 813 recognizes the Greater Wilkes-Barre Labor Council and Workers' Memorial Day in Pennsylvania. Rep. Snyder just recently highlighted some information. I would like to remind the members in this hall, this is a memorial resolution. And in 2013 over 3 million individuals were affected by nonfatal work-related injuries and illnesses. She said over 4,000 working fatalities occurred nationwide. Can I repeat that? Here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, over 4,000 workers died. Here in Pennsylvania, over 163 passed this year.

This year the Greater Wilkes-Barre Labor Council held its ninth annual Workers' Memorial Day event and candlelight vigil on April 24 to honor both Pennsylvania workers and those across the nation. At that event, the lives lost were honored and families of those who perished in the line of duty were recognized and supported by our community.

We must encourage workplace safety, observe the rules and regulations set in place, and protect our employees and take every necessary step to ensure that safe, healthy, and hazard-free workplace. Supporting our workers as they labor to provide all of us our homes, our roads and bridges, our schools and parks, buildings like this magnificent creation – this incredible building, the true example of skill, art, and craftsmanship for all of us to use and enjoy. Their work provides all of us with the appropriate infrastructure to do our work and provide our families and our communities a productive and thriving Commonwealth.

In closing, I cite the words of Helen Keller, who said that a nation is not just moved by the mighty efforts of its heroes, but by the aggregate sum of every honest and hardworking member of our society. Each and every tiny push together moves our nation forward.

(1) The addition of section 311(c) of the act shall take effect in 60 days.

(2) The remainder of this act shall take effect immediately.

The **SPEAKER**. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Northampton County, Mr. Samuelson.

Mr. **SAMUELSON**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment protects the Pennsylvania Lottery Fund and makes sure that it benefits senior citizens. Specifically, this amendment would prohibit the use of the Lottery Fund to pay lawyers, accountants, brokers, financial advisors, any of those professionals associated with a private management agreement of the lottery. We saw Governor Corbett last year propose that the lottery management be run by a company in England, and while he has withdrawn that proposal, you know and I know that that proposal costs the senior citizens of Pennsylvania \$4.4 million. Funds have been withdrawn from the Pennsylvania Lottery, which is supposed to benefit seniors, and instead have been paid to a law firm in Baltimore, \$3.3 million; a consultant in Chicago, \$850,000; a

law firm in Philadelphia, \$210,000; a total of \$4.4 million. Now, these funds, if used in the Pennsylvania Lottery, could have provided 213,000 additional prescriptions, could have provided 9,000 additional property tax rent rebates, could have provided about \$84,000 more for each of the area agencies on aging in every county in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Speaker, I urge that amendment 6623 be adopted so that no Governor, whether it is the current Governor or a future Governor, so that no Governor can take money away from the senior citizens of Pennsylvania and give it to lawyers and consultants. This amendment would protect the senior citizens of Pennsylvania, and I urge a "yes" vote on amendment 6623.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Centre County, Mr. Benninghoff.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Respectfully to the member's amendment, which I know he has put a lot of time and energy into, I think we need to, as a membership, keep in mind that it is very broadly written and it will not only affect the area of interest he is speaking of but any contracts that the lottery may enter. I do not think there is a member on this floor who does not want to do their very best to preserve the senior citizen programs that we provide as a Commonwealth. That is our goal as a Commonwealth, and we believe that this will be an impairment on the lottery's ability to do that and could have an impediment or negate current contracts.

I would respectfully ask the members to vote against this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

Is Mr. Samuelson seeking recognition for the second time? I do not see anybody else.

The gentleman is in order and may proceed for the second time on the amendment.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I respectfully disagree with the majority chair of the Finance Committee. As you can see in the amendment language before you, this amendment is specifically tailored, and you can read this in lines 18 and 19 and 20 and 21, specifically tailored to lawyers, accountants, brokers, lobbyists, advertisers, financial advisers, or other consultant "...engaged in connection with the study, evaluation or...exploration of,...a private management agreement...."

Now, I have met with the folks from the Pennsylvania Lottery, including their legal counsel, and one of our House legal counsel has also met with the folks from the Pennsylvania Lottery, and they have agreed that because this is specifically tailored to professionals associated with a private management agreement, it would not affect those ongoing contracts that the gentleman from Centre County refers to.

So I say once again that it was about 15 months ago that the Governor of Pennsylvania said he wanted to privatize management of the Pennsylvania Lottery, send the profits to England instead of keeping them in the Lottery Fund where they could benefit our senior citizens. It has been 15 months, but so far we have not yet had a vote in this House of Representatives on whether you agree with Governor Corbett, whether the money in the Lottery Fund should be used for senior citizens or the money in the Lottery Fund should be used for lawyers and consultants. So today is the day we get to have a vote on this

amendment. We get to say whether or not we agree with Governor Corbett. It is time for each of us as we represent the senior citizens in our legislative districts to decide, whose side are you on? Are you on the side of the lawyers and the consultants and Governor Corbett, or are you on the side of the senior citizens and will you vote for amendment A6623 to protect the Lottery Fund for the future benefit of our senior citizens here in Pennsylvania?

I urge a "yes" vote.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. DeLissio.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support amendment A06623. I think it is interesting that the bill in chief itself is reducing that percentage rate of return from 27 percent to 25 percent so we can ensure the lottery stability, ensure growth, and the rate of return. Here we have an amendment that is also protecting that revenue so it is not used for things other than the intended purposes and the amendment is somehow not in line with the bill. I disagree. I support the amendment. And \$4 million does go a long way. My background is long-term care. We all have lots of seniors in our districts, and I am sure they would appreciate a "yes" vote.
