It is an honor to be here today to be able to recognize the accomplishments of a local high school group. Behind me today is the Conrad Weiser High School Smokin' Motors Robotics Team. The team is coached by Jim Rumbaugh, and the team consists of Ingrid Rumbaugh, Stephanie Merkel, and Austin Frownfelter.

Smokin' Motors Robotics Team is here today because they are the winners of the 2013-2014 FIRST Tech Challenge Championship Tournament. The FIRST stands for "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology." The team also went on to win the East Super-Regional Championships.

But within that championship on the State level, they won an award that I think they are probably equally as proud of, and that is the Inspire Award. And if you meet this team and you talk to them, you will see that it is not something that they take lightly and it is not something that they glance away at or do not take seriously. The Inspire Award is given for community outreach, the makeup of their engineering notebook, and also their all-around performance. And the mission statement of the Smokin' Motors Robotics Team is to help other teams embrace gracious professionalism and have fun. And so this team, I had them in my office not too long ago, and one of the things I learned very quickly is that they live by their mission statement. And so in the midst of learning how to build a robot and utilizing the engineering skills and the mathematics skills and computer skills that are necessary for this type of accomplishment, they also made a lot of friends and they learned a lot about teamwork, not just among their individual team but also with the other teams that they work with. I have the distinct pleasure today to rise in honor of Tommie Dillione, the PIAA State Champion in the girls Class AAA 200-yard freestyle swim.

On March 13 at Bucknell University, Tommie, a senior at Council Rock North High School and a resident of Newtown Borough, Bucks County, won one of the closest races of the 2014 PIAA Swimming and Diving Championship when she beat out Parkland's Siena Salvaggio by just 0.04 seconds. Tommie rounded out her high school swimming career a day later by finishing third in the 500-yard freestyle.

Tommie will continue her aquatic pursuits at Penn State next year.

Joining us today in the back of the gallery are Tommie's dad, Thomas Dillione, and I want to congratulate both him and Tommie's mom. I am sure Tommie would agree that their guidance was an important part in her success.

I also want to mention the fact that Tommie had two great trailblazers that came before her in her older sisters. Maggie and Katie Dillione are both standout swimmers not only at Council Rock North but on the collegiate level as well at Case Western and Brown, respectively.

Please join me in congratulating Tommie and the entire Dillione family for Tommie's 2014 PIAA Class AAA 200-yard freestyle State title.

DALLASTOWN HIGH SCHOOL MARINE JUNIOR RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS ACADEMIC TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. I would invite Representative Saylor and Representative Ron Miller to the rostrum for the purpose of presenting a citation to the members of the Dallastown High School Marine Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps Academic Team.

The gentleman, Mr. Saylor, may proceed.
Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today along with my good friend, Representative Ron Miller, to recognize the significant accomplishment of the Dallastown High School Marine Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps here at the Capitol today. They are the national champions of the Marine Corps Academic Bowl. The Academic Bowl is a nationally recognized academic and leadership skills competition created exclusively for the JROTC students.

The championship, narrowed down to the top 195 teams, represented all service branches, with each service branch having one national champion. Teams began competing in November of 2013 with more than 3,000 JROTC participating in the rigorous assessment test – their knowledge of English, math, science, leadership, and current events.

After three very competitive rounds, the Dallastown team of Mike Mitchell, Alexandra Brunell, Brandon Nadaeu, James Ronald, Emily Corwin, Gunner Key, Garrett Forrester, and coach Cynthia Filpo-Diaz emerged victorious, placing first in the nation for the Marines. However, this is not the first recognition of national excellence for the Dallastown team.

Last year, for the second time since its creation in 2013, Dallastown beat out 42 other schools in 9 Northeast States to receive the Marine Corps Reserve Association Award.

The JROTC program is recognized by teachers and administrators for its ability to hone skills for those students who might be considered high school higher achieving, as well as its ability to lift others to the levels of personal discipline and academic success they may otherwise not achieve.

I remember a high school principal I saw quoted in a local newspaper who said that if I have four stories about high school and how it changed students' lives, three of those stories would come from the JROTC program and one from the rest of the school.

Today the Dallastown team is here along with its outstanding senior Marine instructor, Lt. Col. Joe Innerst. Colonel, welcome to the House of Representatives.

Mr. Speaker, today there are more than 3,000 JROTC units in existence in the United States for the Army, the Navy, the Air Force, Marines, and the Coast Guard. These programs guide students in the development of their patriotism, leadership skills, and physical fitness skills, and participation in their community. Today I am very proud of the Dallastown High School team as one of the very finest in the nation.

What I would like to note is that of this group, the coach that was mentioned to you, Miss Diaz, is a senior. The coach is actually a student. The coaches are the seniors because seniors in the program or at the school are not allowed to compete. This competition is among underclassmen. And I would note that four of the students that were part of this competition, this winning team, are underclassmen. They are sophomores. So hopefully they will form the core of a group for next year and they can repeat this performance again next year.

So just let me add my congratulations and say thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER. I would appreciate the members' attention.

The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Berks County, Mr. Gillen, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

A few moments ago in Representative Barrar's office, the chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee, I had the great privilege to spend a few minutes with William Gast and Betty Gast. I was not surprised with a lot of what I had heard because we had spoken before. But there are some elements of the story, of D-day and Omaha Beach and the Battle of the Bulge and Bergen-Belsen, that I thought were important to report to the body of the House of Representatives.

William Gast said that they were wildly received by the French people after the D-day landing. In fact, one particular village, it was liberated and an American flag was hung at 4:30 in the morning.

There were over 11,000 planes involved in Operation Overlord and nearly 7,000 ships. The stories tell us that approximately 2500 Americans lost their lives that day. And until Operation Overlord was consummated in August 19, 1944, there would be 20,000 Americans that would lay down their lives and nearly 100,000 Americans would be injured.

The names of the beaches that are familiar to us, Juno, Sword, Gold, Utah, and Omaha Beach, and it was on Omaha Beach that Bill's Sherman tank rolled into the water. As he listened and he felt relieved that his tank treads finally caught on something firm, for many of his comrades in Company A would never see the beach and would be forever entombed in that water.

The 743d went on later in the war, intercepted a train, and on that train there were concentration camp inmates from Bergen-Belsen. And Bill's company, the 743d Tank Battalion, intercepted that train which was on its way from one concentration camp to another.

Some have said that the heroes are the ones that did not come back. But I say to you today, yes, the heroes are those that did not come back, but the heroes are also those that were willing to lay down their lives for freedom, and we have one of those heroes with us today who came back with a Purple Heart, with a Silver Star, was knighted by the French government and received the Legion of Honor Award by the country of France.

William Gast and his Greatest Generation did not come to take, did not come to possess, did not come for treasure; yet there are 30,402 places in France where the United States possessed. There are plots of property, 30,402 plots of property that the United States owns in the country of France. There are 30,402 American men and women that are buried in the country of France, including nearly 10,000 at Normandy. F.D.R., in the

early morning hours of the invasion, prayed and said that some will never return, and those words obviously proved to be prophetic. Some will never return, but he asked Almighty God to embrace those who would not return.

Ronald Reagan visited those shores 40 years after the first June 6, 1944, invasion, and he said that God was our ally in this endeavor.

I am going to ask William and Betty Gast to stand just for a moment, and I would like to share a few final thoughts. If William and Betty Gast could stand just for a moment.

Mr. Speaker, yes, there were heroes that did not return. Mr. Speaker, there are tens of thousands of Americans that are buried in cemeteries overseas. Yes, there are heroes who did not return, but here is a hero that did return, and he returned to his sweetheart that was waiting for him. She had not seen him in 3 years. And it is hard to believe that this gentleman over here looking as spry and sharp as he does, with a youthful wife, served his country on D-day on the beaches of Omaha.

Sir, you are a hero. Sir, we will never forget your band of brothers or what you did for freedom for the United States of America as long as we live. God bless you, William. God bless you, Betty.

Mr. PAINTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the members for their unanimous vote in support of HR 731, which commemorates the fact that today, June 2, 2014, is the 90th anniversary of the day that President Coolidge signed into law the Indian Citizen Act. By this act, the first Americans became citizens of the United States of America. This law permitted Native Americans dual citizenship and that they would be recognized as United States citizens without having to forgo citizenship in their own tribes.

And by the way, yes, Mr. Speaker, I did say 90th anniversary. I did not say 190th anniversary as you might have expected. My mother is actually older than Indian citizenship.

The relationship between the first Americans and those of us who are immigrants or children of immigrants has sometimes been a difficult one. There has sometimes been injustice and pain. Today is not the day to catalog those events, but we should remember them. We cannot undo what has already been done, but what we can do is resolve to move forward together in a spirit of justice, in a spirit of equity.

The Indian Citizen Act of 1924 was an early step in that direction. Let us remember the anniversary of the act and resolve to continue moving forward together, all the communities that make up the United States of America, together with justice and with equality. Thank you.

I would like to thank the members for their unanimous vote in support of HR 822, honoring the 175th anniversary of the Pottstown School District.

Mr. Speaker, Pottstown had a school since the first log building was built in 1784 and has had a school board since 1838. It is one of the oldest school districts in Pennsylvania. We are not sure exactly which ones are the oldest ones because the records are spotty from so far back. But it is only fitting, Pottstown is in fact one of the oldest boroughs in Pennsylvania, the second oldest, I believe, after Norristown, but it has one of the first school districts.

In 1881 the Pottstown School District graduated its first high school students, a class of five young women, and Dr. Sparagana, our district superintendent, tells me that is because the boys take a little longer to mature. It was not until the following year that they graduated the first boys. He is the education expert, so I will have to defer to him on that.

But between then and now, the Pottstown School District has graduated over 19,000 students. And I wish all of the members could have been with me in Pottstown as the borough held a month of celebrations honoring this landmark occasion. There was a great deal of pride in the school district evident in Pottstown, and it demonstrates Pottstown's historic commitment and its continued commitment going forward to the uniquely American principle of universal public education.

So again, we salute the Pottstown School District on this landmark anniversary. I thank the members and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On that question, it is the Speaker's understanding that the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Cohen, has withdrawn his amendments. The Speaker thanks the gentleman.

Amend Bill, page 1, line 2, by inserting after "Pennsylvania" ; and designating the Pennsylvania Long Rifle as the official firearm of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

(6) Pennsylvania's gunmaking tradition has played an important role in the development of the United States of America.

(7) During Pennsylvania's early history, settlers placed chief reliance on their rifles for sustenance, security and survival.

(8) The Pennsylvania Long Rifle, a unique firearm that was different in principle and outline from any other weapon in the world, was developed by skilled gunsmiths in the Moravian communities of Christian's Spring, Northampton County, as well as by artistic rifle-maker Martin Meylin, in Willow Street, Lancaster County.

(9) The Pennsylvania Long Rifle was the first truly American firearm and, due to its exceptional accuracy and range, was considered the greatest achievement in the development of firearms during the 18th century.

(10) Playing an important role in the early years of the Industrial Revolution in Pennsylvania and New England, the Pennsylvania Long Rifle was also instrumental in the American fur trade and was carried west and south by frontiersmen as they

set out to expand the boundaries of the nation.

(11) The Pennsylvania Long Rifle has been lauded for its beauty and craftsmanship, as well as the ingenuity of the skilled gunsmiths who crafted it.

(12) The color combinations, carvings, engravings and graceful slenderness of the Pennsylvania Long Rifle cause it to stand alone and remain unchallenged as a primary example of early American art.

(13) Future generations deserve the right to appreciate the heritage of this long-barreled rifle, born to artistic gunsmiths in the communities of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Amend Bill, page 2, by inserting between lines 10 and 11

Section 2. Official State firearm.

The Pennsylvania Long Rifle is hereby designated as the official firearm of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Amend Bill, page 2, line 11, by striking out "2" and inserting

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Northampton County, Ms. Hahn, for a brief description of the amendment.

Ms. **Hahn**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The Pennsylvania long rifle has played a significant role in American history through its use in the French and Indian wars and the American Revolution. My legislation recognizes its contribution to the development of our country and its origin in the Commonwealth. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to the amendment?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Cohen.

Mr. **Cohen**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is hardly any great secret to many millions of people in Pennsylvania that many lives are threatened by gun violence. For instance, today, June 2, there is a television story on WGAL.com, channel 8, that a suspect shot a State trooper. "A Pennsylvania State Police trooper was shot Sunday night in West Hanover Township, Dauphin County." "Officials said David Ricker, 49, shot Trooper Michael Trotta four times outside a home in West Hanover Township, Dauphin County. The trooper is in stable condition at Penn State Hershey Medical Center." And it goes on and gives the details of this horrible crime. And unfortunately, it is becoming more and more common in Pennsylvania for State troopers to be shot.

Philadelphia, the city that I am proud to represent, has long been victimized by gun violence. Generally speaking, last year was an exception, but year in, year out, decade after decade, there has been more than one murder a day in Philadelphia. We are well at the pace of having one murder a day in 2014 as well. Recent headlines from newspapers in Philadelphia: May 27, 2014, "GUN VIOLENCE LEAVES TWO DEAD AND FIVE WOUNDED OVER MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND IN PHILADELPHIA"; May 22, 2014, "WITH TWO NEW VICTIMS REPORTED OVERNIGHT: MORE PEOPLE HAVE BEEN SHOT THIS MONTH" — May — "IN PHILADELPHIA THAN DURING ALL OF APRIL"; May 20, 2014, "PHILADELPHIA SHOOTING TOTALS CLIMB IN RECENT MONTHS"—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will suspend.

For what purpose does the gentleman from Butler County, Mr. Metcalfe, rise?

Mr. METCALFE. Mr. Speaker, I fail to see the relevancy of the speaker's argument because the Pennsylvania long rifle was not used in any of these crimes that he is talking about.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker appreciates the gentleman's point.

Mr. COHEN. Mr. Speaker—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will just suspend one— Let me continue to respond to that.

The subject of the amendment is naming a gun the official gun of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, I guess. While I can appreciate that the statistics are drifting a little off the primary subject of the amendment, I will be paying close attention to the gentleman's remarks.

The gentleman, Mr. Cohen, may proceed.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the fundamental problem is that people are dying in large numbers in Philadelphia and other parts of the State year after year, decade after decade from gun violence, and the legislature's response to this has not been particularly strong. There have been many demands by citizens in Philadelphia and other places for sensible reforms to cut down the availability of guns. These requests have, generally speaking, been ignored. The fact that so many murders take place and so many other shootings take place is not only tragic for the victims of these crimes, but is an enormous expense for the people of Pennsylvania.

We are now spending over \$2 billion a year in a \$28 billion budget—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will suspend.

The amendment does not deal with the availability or other causes and effects, and I would ask the gentleman to focus his remarks toward the actual amendment that is before us.

Mr. COHEN. Mr. Speaker, this amendment celebrates guns. To some people, guns are the greatest things that ever were invented and we ought to be celebrating guns 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. For some people though, guns are a daily threat to human life, and this amendment is an amendment of gross insensitivity to the many people in Pennsylvania who every day face the threats of gun violence.

We do not need an official State gun. We really ought not to have an official State gun. Having an official State gun celebrates weapons that pose a real threat to the lives of many Pennsylvanians. Yes, individual people have to fire the guns. If nobody fired a gun at a fellow Pennsylvanian, then there would be no threat. But the fact is, day after day, decade after decade, people have been threatened, people have been killed, people have been seriously wounded as a result of gun violence. We ought not to be celebrating guns. We do not need an official State gun. The official State things have generally been plants, rocks, things of nature. Guns are not caused by nature. Guns are made by humankind. We do not celebrate other human inventions. Mr. Hanna's underlying bill does celebrate a form of aircraft which is made in his district, but the general rule has been not to do that.

We have a budget difficulty which is a real challenge. We have to pay for many things that are very difficult to pay for. This is at best a distraction. It is not relevant to the urgent crises that we face, and having a State gun is deeply offensive to many people in Pennsylvania. We ought not pass this amendment. We

ought to show some sensitivity to the loss of human life that exists on a daily basis in Philadelphia and elsewhere. We ought not be debating this issue.

I would strongly urge the defeat of this amendment.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Saccone, rise?

Mr. SACCONI. Unanimous consent, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. SACCONI. I would like to submit some remarks for the record on HB 1728.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will deliver them to the clerk and they will be noted in the record.

Mr. SACCONI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. SACCONI submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

I want to thank my colleague from Philadelphia for adding the Bill of Rights to HB 1728 – he holds Ben Franklin's seat.

I want to tell this story about the Bill of Rights. Our precious Bill of Rights was passed on September 25, 1789. As you know, it contains 10 amendments and the First Amendment contains 5 freedoms. The first of those freedoms is the freedom of religion.

So the men who wrote it came in and passed it in the House and sent it over to the Senate. The very next act they took was to pass a resolution thanking Almighty God for helping them pass it. They sent that to the Senate where it passed and was then sent to President George Washington, who wrote a proclamation declaring our first day of prayer and thanksgiving. The first line of that proclamation says this: "...It is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God," and "to obey His will." It goes on for several eloquent paragraphs thanking God for His blessings.

I tell you this story because I have a copy of that proclamation on display in my office window this week and next. I hope you will take a look at this historic document.

I think the actions of our founders and those who penned the First Amendment reveal their true intent and frame of mind. Unfortunately, we have come to a point where we are afraid of the word "God" involved in government. Our history confirms God is no stranger to our government.

Our founder, William Penn's quote rings our beautiful rotunda, "That there may be room there for such a Holy Experiment...For the Nations want a precedent and My God will Make it the Seed of a Nation."

George Washington started the tradition of swearing the oath, the first act that welcomes in the President, on the Bible. He swore his oath on a particular verse, Genesis 49:13, and almost every President since has done the same, choosing different verses that suited their liking. He added the words "so help me God" to the oath.

Obama swore his oath on two Bibles, Lincoln's and M.L.K.'s, and finished with, "so help me God."

The Lincoln Memorial in Washington, DC, contains the Gettysburg Address, which contains this phrase, "that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom..."

The Jefferson Memorial contains Jefferson's famous quote, "God who gave us life gave us liberty. Can the liberties of a nation be secure when we have removed a conviction that these liberties are a gift of God?"

Now some have even said that mentioning God is unconstitutional, but our Pennsylvania Constitution was established with God's guidance. The first line of the Preamble states, "We, the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, grateful to Almighty God for the blessings of civil and religious liberty, and humbly invoking His guidance, do ordain and establish this Constitution."

Holy Scripture is inscribed in the Capitol over 50 times. Deuteronomy 32:7 is inscribed in the Apotheosis right behind the Speaker's chair in the House, and a quote from the Gospel of John 8:32 is on the ceiling. Our national Capitol has over 100 such references.

Some say our national motto is divisive; we have more important things to do.

In 1864 our 13th Governor, James Pollock, was appointed the Director of the U.S. Mint. He suggested the phrase "In God We Trust" be placed on our coins. On April 22 of this year we celebrated the 150th anniversary of that act.

- Put there to unite a country torn by civil war
- Wonderful Pennsylvania history story
- It is inclusive of all faiths
- Both instructive and inspirational
- Part of national movement (350 municipalities across the country have put it up)

President Kennedy reinforced its importance by saying, "The guiding principle and prayer of this Nation has been, is now, and shall ever be 'In God We Trust.' "

- Who would dare quibble with him?
- Our motto is chiseled in the granite steps of this Capitol.
- Who could imagine our government's motto would not be appropriate in our government schools?

Congress noted its spiritual and psychological value to our country. The Federal courts ruled that it represents a predominantly patriotic exercise. Some say, what effect does it have anyway?

Our Supreme Court ruled those words are instructional and inspirational. You saw that demonstrated by the Iraqi pastor who told the story that thousands of Iraqis threatened by terrorists to stop exercising their religious freedom are inspired by the motto they see on our currency. They know there is one place left on earth that still honors God.

I want to tell one more example from North Korea. In the darkest, most Godless country on earth, our motto gives them hope where hopelessness and despair are constant companions.

Our nation is sick and in denial of the sickness. Our youth are self-absorbed and rebellious. In our permissive society, they grow up undisciplined and self-centered. The culture celebrates vulgarity and pornography.

In a world of selfishness and greed, it teaches respect for a power higher than oneself. Our youth need positive role models and examples in front of them to elevate their thinking above themselves.

We need to teach them virtue over vice. Our founder, William Penn, told us, "A nation is not great by virtue of its wealth, but by the wealth of its virtue."

Our national motto is a message to our children, to America, and to the world. It is a message they want to know. It is one they need to know, that this country's prosperity and greatness is encapsulated in our national motto.

Our hope and our aspirations are held within it. We have to be as passionate about restoring our values as others are about destroying them. We should not be ashamed of those principles and should not shrink from the responsibility.

You have to decide whether you will allow others to determine the future of this country or you will determine it.

Promoting and celebrating this wonderful Pennsylvania story of our motto is a worthy undertaking.
