**STATEMENT BY MR. REGAN**

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman from Cumberland County, Mr. Regan, seeking recognition under unanimous consent?

Mr. REGAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to pay tribute to a wonderful person and an outstanding citizen in the 92d District. As you all know, the Boy Scouts of America do a great job in helping mold young men in our nation to be good citizens and leaders. I stand before you today to congratulate John Staz of Lewisberry for his 35 years of dedicated leadership as a Boy Scout volunteer.

John is a graduate of Camp Hill High School and Yale. He was the owner of Brookwood Farms, which is a large dairy operation in the region, and actively worked there until his retirement in 2000. John has been a Boy Scout troop leader since 1979, and in that time he has the distinction of having led 72 Scouts to the rank of Eagle, the highest rank in Scouting. Additionally, he has endured over 350 camping trips over the last 35 years. This example of selfless dedication to our youth is what makes our nation the best in the world. Men like John make us all proud to be Americans.

And so today it is my pleasure, along with Congressman Perry, to honor John Staz, and I ask John to please rise and be recognized. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### STATEMENT BY MR. THOMAS

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Thomas, seeking unanimous consent?

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you for acknowledging the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge, and with that acknowledgement you mentioned that this lodge is primarily in Philadelphia County, but this lodge, Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge, can be found in all four corners of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and throughout the world, but in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And we have the opportunity today to salute a man amongst men, a leader amongst leaders, a man who has dedicated his life to God, his country, and to his fellow people. Early in life he desired to be a better man by becoming a part of the Knights of Pythagoras. And for my Masonic brothers, they know – and Masonic sisters, you know – that the Knights of Pythagoras is where young people get an opportunity to get early exposure to how to become a good man and become a better man.

And so the Honorable Murphy J. Keller III has spent his lifetime associated with Knights of Pythagoras, but his most brightest opportunity was when he was raised as a Master Mason in Jericho Lodge No. 20 of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania. The Jericho Lodge No. 20 is in Pittsburgh.

But after being raised, he went on to be arched as a Holy Royal Arch Mason, Sheba Chapter No. 13, Most Excellent Grand Chapter Prince Hall affiliation in Pittsburgh. And after he was arched, he was then crowned as a Scottish Rite Mason in St. Cyrian Consistory No. 4. And not only after getting crowned he went to work, he went to work as the Past Commander in Chief, Past Thrice Potent Master, Scottish Rite Mason of the Year. And after being crowned, he was then created as a Shriner with Sahara Temple No. 2, Ancient Egyptian Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. And after being created, he went to work. He went to work as Imperial Youth director, former Imperial Youth deputy, Imperial Youth Deputy of the Year, and Past Potentate out of Pittsburgh.

And then he went on to be elevated as Illustrious Grand Inspector General of the United Supreme Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, northern jurisdiction, reaching the 33d degree; my brother and my friend. But then he did not stop after getting his 33d degree. He went on and worked to complete his ceremonial degrees on the York side

after completing it on the Scottish Rite side. So he went up both sides of the pyramid. And after going up the York side, Knights Templar Commandery, in 2012 he was selected and elected by over 20,000 Masonic brothers of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge from across Pennsylvania, from Erie to Chester and from one end of the east to the other side of the west of this great State. He was elected the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The majority having voted in the affirmative, the question was determined in the affirmative and the resolutions were adopted.

### STATEMENT BY MS. BISHOP

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. Bishop, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Ms. BISHOP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to pay tribute to the Glen Mills Schools in Delaware County, right near Philadelphia. The Glen Mills Schools remains true to its fundamental mission, the mission of transforming troubled youth into positive, contributing members of our society.

What sets Glen Mills apart? What makes it so different from others? Its unique approach to rehabilitation: Rather than simply punishing for past mistakes, Glen Mills Schools looks to change behavior by developing confidence and character. The Glen Mills difference is evident. They are treated as students, not inmates. They attend a school, not a detention facility.

Last year Glen Mills Schools proudly presented 226 GED (general equivalency diploma) certificates, over 2,500 career and technical educational certificates, and 27 high school diplomas. Alumni have continued their education. They have gone on to college. Some have entered into the workforce. And

some become businesspeople, business owners – just not business, but business owners – teachers, professional athletes, and even more.

Glen Mills Schools is now approaching 125 years dedicated to serving youth, and I would like to commemorate the hard work, the dedication, and the success of the school and its tremendous staff who are all with us here today. Glen Mills is a school of opportunities building character, building confidence and competence, and they are changing lives and making a difference one life at a time.

### STATEMENT BY MS. OBERLANDER

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the lady from Clarion County, Ms. Oberlander, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to offer my sincere appreciation to the membership in support of the resolution designating this week as "Charcot-Marie-Tooth Association Awareness Week." You have already been very gracious and met Jeana Sweeney. She is an advocate creating awareness for this disorder, which is the most commonly inherited peripheral neuropathy disorder, affecting one in every 2500, or 2.8 million people worldwide.

This disorder was identified over 125 years ago by Drs. Charcot, Marie, and Tooth, hence its name; funny name but a very serious disorder that progressively damages the nerve cells to the extremities. There is no way to predict how far or how fast this will progress, and the severity does vary from individual to individual. So things that most of us take for granted – things like brushing our teeth, feeding ourselves, clothing ourselves, and walking – can become very difficult for individuals who have this disorder.

Currently CMT has no cure. And the Charcot-Marie-Tooth Association is leading the charge in helping forward educational programs to doctors in the Commonwealth's medical colleges so that they may identify and treat CMT symptoms and that we might be able to find a cure.

So I just want to again say thank you for your support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank the members of the House for their unanimous support of Resolution 864, commemorating this month as the 100th anniversary of the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association – Police Chiefs Association, excuse me. If you would indulge me for a minute, I would like to give a special welcome to the chief of police of my own police department in Limerick Township: Bill Albany, the Limerick Township Police Department. We have a tradition of robust local governments in Pennsylvania, and as a result we have a large number of police departments in a wide variety of sizes from very, very large to very, very small. The Police Chiefs Association fills an important need for this Commonwealth by giving chiefs of police the opportunity to come together to discuss their challenges, to share their solutions, to establish best practices, to provide training and certification, and the never-ending pursuit for excellence. As a result, all of our police departments are better off, which means all of our municipalities and every citizen of this Commonwealth are better served.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. PAYNE

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin County, Mr. Payne, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. PAYNE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Motorsports Caucus, Representative Haluska and myself, we want to remind members that this Thursday is the NASCAR (National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing) Hauler Parade. Currently there are over 20 NASCAR haulers that have signed up; we could be as high as 30. They will be at the Farm Show building from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. The parade moves at 11:30, and it will go past Commonwealth Avenue.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. McCARTER

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery County, Mr. McCarter, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to thank the members for passing HR 850, recognizing the city of Philadelphia's efforts to become the first World Heritage City in the United States. The Organization of World Heritage Cities grew from the ideals of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, UNESCO, when they voted to create a World Heritage Convention from this First Symposium of World Heritage Cities held in Quebec City in 1991. And during that symposium, the delegates from 41 participating cities adopted a declaration to establish a network of World Heritage Cities. The Organization of World Heritage Cities, known as the OWHC, was founded then in 1993 during the second symposium held in Morocco.

Since that time the organization has grown to include more than 250 cities located throughout the world. The OWHC assists its members in adapting and improving on matters such as the preservation and development of their historic cities. The organization's members also participate in conferences and seminars around the globe dealing with the continued preservation of its member cities. Among the 250 cities are places like Venice; Paris; Quebec; Cracow, Poland; Liverpool in England; Istanbul; Brussels; Rome; Bordeaux; and Budapest.

Currently our own Philadelphia is working to become the first city in the United States to join this list. In fact, our famed Independence Hall is already recognized as a landmark by the OWHC. The addition of the entire city would certainly increase Pennsylvania's notoriety as a tourism location, not only within the continental United States but around the world.

Recently Philadelphia hosted Secretary-General Ricard of the OWHC to introduce him to the cultural and historical significance of the city. I want to personally applaud Mayor Nutter and the Global Philadelphia Association for taking this critical first step in making Philadelphia the first World Heritage City in the United States. By supporting this resolution today, we are sending a clear message that we support the city of Philadelphia in its efforts to become that first World Heritage City in the United States as well as our Commonwealth, and acknowledge the important role that the city has played in the shaping of our nation's history.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. READSHAW

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Readshaw, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. READSHAW. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is right that today we have passed HR 709, which honors the 200th anniversary of our "Star-Spangled Banner," which will be September 14. I would like to share with the members some facts that I obtained from the Smithsonian. Our original flag was commissioned by Maj. George Armistead, commander of Fort McHenry. Major Armistead said he needed

a flag "so large that the British will have no difficulty in seeing it from a distance." The original flag over Fort McHenry was sewn by widow Mary Young Pickersgill. The flag over Fort McHenry measured 30 feet by 42 feet so it could be seen by all. The flag survived a 25-hour bombardment by the British Royal Navy on Fort McHenry between September 13 and 14 of 1814.

Because of these actions, Francis Scott Key wrote a four-stanza poem recounting heroic defense of Fort McHenry and the city of Baltimore from invasion, representing the turning point of the War of 1812. The first verse of the poem became our national anthem in 1931 by adoption of a congressional resolution. "The Star-Spangled Banner" recounts a significant point in our nation's history. "The Star-Spangled Banner" symbolizes the resilience and perseverance of the American people. "The Star-Spangled Banner" symbolizes our willingness to defend our freedom.

Mr. Speaker, I thank you for this opportunity to speak on HR 709, and I believe my colleague from the Legislative District of the 145th has additional comments. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. CLYMER

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Bucks County, Mr. Clymer, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. CLYMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And thank you, Representative Harry Readshaw, for sponsoring HR 709, as you just mentioned, commemorating the 200th anniversary of the writing of "The Star-Spangled Banner," our national anthem. The Representative has rightly and correctly put the facts out about how this great national anthem was written, so I am not going to go into those details except to say that indeed after that terrific bombardment, the American flag was still standing. And no matter how often we hear the playing or the singing of the national anthem, it invokes a sense of pride and support and patriotism and honor. As a nation, we are blessed that we have a national anthem that invokes such strong feelings of honor and love of country.

So happy 200th birthday, national anthem and "Star-Spangled Banner." May the words of our great anthem continue to inspire future generations.

And at this time, Mr. Speaker, I would close with the fourth verse of our national anthem.

"Oh! thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand  
Between their loved home and the war's desolation!  
Blest with victory and peace, may the heav'n rescued land  
Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation.  
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,  
And this be our motto: 'In God is our trust.'  
And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!"

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Parliamentarian was hoping that the gentleman might have sung that verse for us instead of just reciting it.

Mr. CLYMER. Mr. Speaker, there is a gentleman on the other side of the aisle. I could not sing this song unless he was up here to do it, so we will not do it.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery County, Mr. Murt, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

We will come back to that.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SCAVELLO

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Monroe County, Mr. Scavello, under unanimous consent.

Mr. SCAVELLO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We often hear on the floor of this House that our Commonwealth's children are its future. Today I am honored to recognize 31 students from Monroe County who have their eyes on the big issues facing our State and this nation. These young people who participated this year in my "There Ought to be a Law" contest very well could be part of our next generation of leaders.

This is the first time I participated in this competition, which involved all four school districts in Monroe County, and students from the 3d through 12th grades were involved. I was so impressed with the entries. Many of the younger students wrote on issues which affect their schools, including the price of school lunches and the mandating of uniforms in our school buildings. The older students often took a wider view, writing on issues affecting our environment, such as recycling, along with anti-bullying laws, which could protect our Commonwealth's students. I was surprised to receive many entries advocating for a higher driving age in Pennsylvania; even more shocking was that these entries were written by students just a couple of years away from getting behind the wheel of a vehicle.

Participating in this contest was a great experience for me because it reinforced that no matter how young, our students are plugged into the many issues facing our communities, our State, and nation. I commend the parents and the teachers for their involvement in our children's education. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mrs. PARKER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Whenever members of our august body get up to speak, it is commonplace for each of us to begin our statements with the words, "I rise." Well, on today, Mr. Speaker, we have the great honor and privilege to celebrate the life and legacy of a woman who made the words "I rise" an anthem of sorts for people from all walks of life struggling against oppression of all kinds, and giving them a sense of hope and humanity through her powerful use of language, words, and creative synergy. The woman to whom I am referring was born Marguerite Annie Johnson but is known to us and the world as none other than Dr. Maya Angelou, who made her transition from this earth on May 28, 2014, at the age of 86.

To simply or solely try to define Dr. Maya Angelou as an "African-American poet or writer," as I have witnessed in recent days, in my opinion, does a disservice to her honor by putting her life's work in a narrow box that is too small to confine the greatness of her God-given gifts that she no naturally and willingly shared with the world.

On today we in this body can salute the varying roles she played in society. She was a mother to her son, Guy; a mentor and teacher to many. She was a best-selling and truth-telling author and poet. She was an actress; a dancer; a dramatist; a historian; a filmmaker; a civil rights activist; and my favorite, she was a prophetess of wisdom.

Often referred to as a "global Renaissance woman," Dr. Angelou was born in St. Louis and she was raised there in a very small rural town called Stamps, Arkansas. Opening her book of life, which is one of trial, tribulation, and eventually the power to overcome, and sharing it with the world via her seven-volume autobiography, ultimately teaching many of us that we are not alone in our daily struggles, is, Mr. Speaker, what I believe allowed her to acquire true world distinction.

Now, I was pretty amazed, but, Mr. Speaker, while we know that she spoke 6 languages, traveled and taught throughout the world, was only the second poet and the first African-American and woman to be asked to write a poem and be officially included in the Presidential inauguration in our nation – Robert Frost was the first when he spoke at President Kennedy's inauguration in 1961 – served on 2 Presidential committees,

received 3 different Presidential medals, won 3 Grammys, was nominated for a Pulitzer, twice for a Tony, received over 50 honorary degrees, and studied and was choreographed by Martha Graham and danced along Alvin Ailey, to those of us who embraced the love that she shared via her craft, all of those things that I just mentioned, they are nice, but to us she was, as Oprah Winfrey described, the "unshakeable calm" and "confidence" that we need to get through life's clouds.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I want to leave our body with two pieces of Maya's art. The first is a quote, and, Mr. Speaker, I think that we as elected officials and politicians and/or statesmen and women, whatever moniker you choose to reference what we do, we could benefit from this quote as it relates to working with our constituency, and I live by it and it has helped. Maya said that I have learned in life that people will forget what you have said, they will forget what you have done, but they will never, ever forget how you made them feel.

This next piece is her poem, and it is the one that I personally read when I sort of get down and need my spirits lifted, and it is called, "Still I Rise."

You may write me down in history  
With your bitter, twisted lies,  
You may trod me in the very dirt  
But still, like dust, I'll rise.

Does my sassiness upset you?  
Why are you beset with gloom?  
'Cause I walk like I've got oil wells  
Pumping in my living room.

Just like moons and like suns,  
With the certainty of tides,  
Just like hopes springing high,  
Still I'll rise.

Did you want to see me broken?  
Bowed head and lowered eyes?  
Shoulders falling down like teardrops.  
Weakened by my soulful cries.

Does my haughtiness offend you?  
Don't you take it awful hard  
'Cause I laugh like I've got gold mines  
Diggin' in my own backyard.

You may shoot me with your words,  
You may cut me with your eyes,  
You may kill me with your hatefulness,  
But still, like air, I'll rise.

Does my sexiness upset you?  
Does it come as a surprise  
That I dance like I've got diamonds  
At the meeting of my thighs?

Out of the huts of history's shame  
I rise  
Up from a past that's rooted in pain  
I rise.  
I'm a black ocean, leaping and wide,

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SIMMONS

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Lehigh, Mr. Simmons, rise?

Mr. SIMMONS. Unanimous consent, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is recognized under unanimous consent.

Mr. SIMMONS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to thank the members of the General Assembly for their support of HB 2204. Every Pennsylvania child deserves a stellar education that provides them with skills necessary to compete in today's world. However, while some children are able to exceed expectations in the classroom, sometimes additional classes, one-on-one tutoring, and specialized attention are necessary to prepare students with developmental difficulties the ability to excel in the classroom.

With that in mind, many years ago Pennsylvania launched our Early Intervention Services Program, which pairs specialized teachers with children who may be faced with developmental setbacks. The results of this program are quite extensive and exemplary. According to the Pennsylvania State Interagency Coordinating Council's 2012-13 annual report to Governor Corbett, 88.8 percent of preschoolers and 81.4 percent of infants and toddlers substantially increased the rate of their social relationship growth skills after receiving early intervention services. Likewise, 89.6 percent of preschoolers and 81.9 percent of infants substantially increased their knowledge skills after early intervention services. With special education costing twice per student as that of early intervention services, this produces a substantial savings for the Commonwealth, an approximate savings of \$3,905 per child.

There are currently five indicators that automatically trigger tracking and enrollment into Pennsylvania's Early Intervention Program. Children who are exposed to lead poisoning, are victims of abuse or neglect, are prenatally exposed to illegal drugs, are admitted to neonatal care units, or are born with a

very low birth weight, these are automatically tracked children. The bill that we just passed that was unanimously supported today adds one additional category: children that are homeless.

Today's passage of HB 2204 is a positive step in that direction. It represents the beginning of a student's ability to exceed in school, and more so, for life.

I thank you for your support on the bill, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MARKOSEK

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Markosek, rise?

Mr. MARKOSEK. For unanimous consent, Mr. Speaker, please.

Good afternoon, Mr. Speaker.

Today is June 3, and after today there are 27 days left in the month and 16, 16 scheduled session days left before the end of the fiscal year, and of course our budget gap, as we know, continues to grow. For the last 6 months our revenues have continually come in under estimate. The Governor's budget proposal could be out of balance by as much as, and it is only an estimate, but as much as \$1.7 billion, and I recall at one of our budget hearings, the Secretary of the Budget very specifically said that we are at the point where we just simply cannot cut any more. That was the Secretary of the Budget who said that.

### INTERROGATION

Since we have such short time remaining and we are in such bad financial shape, I wanted to interrogate my colleague, if he would stand, the majority chair of the Appropriations Committee, to answer some brief questions as we move forward on what the schedule would be relative to the budget.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Adolph, indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Very simply, Mr. Speaker, when do you expect the budget to be posted and what will the schedule be for our members to introduce amendments as well as study the budget, and when do you perceive that we would vote on the budget for final passage here in the House?

Mr. ADOLPH. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

And, Mr. Speaker, I do appreciate the inquiry regarding the budget process. Because of our House rules, I would imagine that we will put a vehicle in place probably the week of Monday, June 9, okay? And I am sure the amendment process will begin, and that is if the House moves first on it. Myself and Senator Corman have an arm wrestling contest scheduled later on and the loser will introduce the first budget. It is supposed to be funny.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Our members are laughing.

Mr. ADOLPH. But we have had weeks of negotiations with the Senate and the administration. The process is coming along very well. Obviously, as you mentioned, Mr. Speaker, the

revenue that has been coming in is very disappointing and troubling, and as we put together various scenarios, another month goes by and we have to change our scenario.

So it has been a work in progress, and I am looking forward to working with you and your caucus members in order to once again pass a budget on time on June 30.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and we certainly look forward to working with you.

But let me just make sure I am clear in my mind. If the budget is posted, say, next Monday, the 9th, I believe we have to have roughly a week and a half before we can actually consider the budget before it can be read over the floor, which would put us approximately 2 weeks away from right now or tomorrow, which really starts to get us pretty darn close to the end of the fiscal year, particularly in light of the fact that we have so many problems with the revenue and with the budget this year.

So I just wanted to make sure that I was clear. It does not sound like, to me, that we would actually be doing floor debates for at least about roughly 2 weeks from now.

Mr. ADOLPH. I think because of the way the House rules are set, I think that would be correct. And, you know, the way the calendar worked this year with the very late primary, there was some session time which I thought we needed, but because of the primary and such, which was something that this House had nothing to do with, we were not in session. And with the ever-changing revenue picture, it has been more of a struggle this year than in the past, but as this Governor has proved and what this majority caucus has proved, we will once again pass a budget on time.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the chairman for his graciousness, and our caucus and our Appropriations Committee and our members look forward to working with him and the other caucus as we get through this budget process. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker thanks the gentleman.
