STATEMENT BY MS. HAHN

The SPEAKER. Is the lady from Northampton County, Ms. Hahn, seeking recognition under unanimous consent?

Ms. HAHN. Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The lady is in order and may proceed.

Ms. HAHN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is my privilege to acknowledge the guests that are here from the 138th Legislative District in Northampton County. They are representing the Turn Bath Pink project for the Borough of Bath.

Turn Bath Pink was one of the initiatives undertaken by Mayor Fiorella Reginelli-Mirabito, or Fi as the rest of us know her, who took office in January. It is a fundraiser for cancer research, and the choice of colors is in honor of the mayor being a survivor of the breast cancer diagnosis she received 4 years ago.

I appreciate if the members would hold the conversations down. I appreciate your courtesies.

Mr. ADOLPH. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I stand here today with the honor of welcoming two – that is right, two national champions from Delaware County. Joining me today are the Broomall-Newton Babe Ruth 13-Year-Old Baseball Team, who are the 2014 Babe Ruth League Baseball World Champions; also the Broomall-Newton Babe Ruth 15-Year-Old Baseball Team, who are the 2014 Babe Ruth League Baseball 15-Year-Old World Champions.

The Babe Ruth League is a nationwide Little League that seeks to make better citizens through proper supervision of regulation competitive baseball, in addition to promoting mental and physical development. In the six decades that the Babe Ruth Championship has been played, only one team in Pennsylvania has ever won the championship. That is right. This is intended to become a long-term and trusting relationship in which the supported person becomes an extension of the family. Lifesharing is a high-quality and long-term-living situation that provides an individual with a disability choice and true community integration.

Mr. Speaker, mentoring is truly the backbone of any productive community. Mentors educate our children, teach job skills, and share a lifetime of expertise with new generations. In many ways, you can judge a community's quality of life based on the strength of those who give back to others.

In that way, the Lifesharing Program is an invaluable resource to our community. The mentors in the program open their hearts and their homes to those with developmental and intellectual disabilities. When a mentor takes in and cares for an adult with special needs, they give something money cannot buy – a helping hand, a home, and a loving family. Through their actions, these mentors show that we all matter and we all deserve to live life to the fullest. These families are more than home providers; they are teachers, advocates, families, and truly a family unit.

For the person being mentored, Lifesharing offers the opportunity to live in the community of their choice. By sharing their mentor's home, individuals are able to take part in the everyday but critically important activities of family life, while still receiving the supports they need. Mr. Speaker, these individuals can socialize with family and friends, manage household chores, discover new hobbies, and learn new skills to the best of their abilities. Lifesharing helps individuals lead fuller, more independent lives in the communities they love.

While there are many programs that offer mentoring services, Lifesharing is an example of how to do it more efficiently, with greater consumer satisfaction and with greater success, and as the need for these services increases, it is critical that Lifesharing continues to stand as an example of how to improve the lives of those who cannot always help themselves.

Thank you for designating October as "Lifesharing Awareness Month." Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. MIRABITO

The SPEAKER. The Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Lycoming County, Mr. Mirabito, under unanimous consent relative to one of the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. MIRABITO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, last Friday, October 3, was Manufacturing Day.

From textiles in the southeast to the steel industry in the west and countless industries in between, our State has an incredible manufacturing history. Manufacturers are an extremely important part of our national and State economies, responsible for 47 percent of total U.S. exports and for 12 percent of the United States' gross domestic product. Manufacturing supports 17.4 million American jobs, and standing alone, manufacturing in the United States would be the 10th largest economy in the world.

Studies show that for every dollar spent on manufactured goods, an additional \$1.48 of economic activity is generated. These investments spur new products and innovative manufacturing techniques. In fact, nationally, manufacturers are responsible for approximately two-thirds of private-sector research and development.

As our young people graduate from high school and college, excellent career paths are available in manufacturing as it holds high-paying jobs and a need for skilled workers. The average manufacturing worker in the United States earns \$77,000 annually, including pay and benefits.

And while these opportunities exist, the industry has worked to dispel common misconceptions of the manufacturing industry – that manufacturing involves working in dangerous, outdated factories. Manufacturing today is technologically advanced and sophisticated, and we need a workforce prepared to meet the challenge.

Mr. Speaker, our office is about to hold its third Students for Manufacturing tour for students in our district to meet with area manufacturers so they can see firsthand what will be required of them when they seek a manufacturing job. Taking students through local manufacturing facilities shows them that manufacturing jobs can be rewarding and high-paying, which will hopefully slow down the brain drain, especially in rural Pennsylvania and keep young people living and working in our State.

Please join me in recognizing all manufacturers as we did on October 3, and thank you, members, for your support of HR 1013.

At least 40 percent of our young people between 11 and 12 years of age report that their friends have been victims of verbal abuse in relationships. Among teenagers in dating relationships, 30 percent have been text-messaged up to 30 times an hour by an obsessive-compulsive partner to find out where they are, what they are doing, or with whom they are with.

With all of those points in mind, today I rise with a heavy heart to once again offer this resolution to designate October 6, 2014, as "Demi Brae Cuccia Day" in Pennsylvania.

Born August 14, 1991, Demi was the daughter of Gary and Jodi Cuccia, who are honoring her memory through the Demi Brae Cuccia Awareness Organization.

This resolution is being offered in recognition, and most importantly, to raise awareness of the tragic impact of teen dating violence on the health and well-being of our families and communities. Please join me in supporting this resolution honoring the memory of Demi Brae Cuccia. Thank you.

A Resolution honoring the life of Theodore Van Kirk, navigator for the Enola Gay during its mission to drop the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, during World War II.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. The House will come to order.
I would appreciate the members taking their seats.

The question is, will the House adopt the resolution?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Dan Miller.

Mr. D. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, Theodore "Dutch" Van Kirk was born and raised in Northumberland, Pennsylvania, and although his life would take him across the globe, Northumberland was always his home base.

Dutch joined the Army Air Force Cadet Program in October 1941, before Pearl Harbor. He was commissioned the following year and sent to defend England. He flew 11 missions while in England, often serving as the lead aircraft responsible for both group navigation and bombing. He would later fly missions in North Africa as well. After 58 missions over two continents, Captain Van Kirk returned to the States to train navigators and to wed his wife, Mary Jane, in 1943.

As the war slowly drew to a close, Dutch was approached by Colonel Tibbets to join him on a special mission.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend one minute, please.

I would appreciate if the members would please take their seats. Thank you.

The gentleman, Mr. Miller, may proceed.

Mr. D. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Dutch later recalled in an interview that he was told by the Colonel, "We're going to do something that I can't tell you about right now, but if it works, it will end or significantly shorten the war." Dutch thought, "Oh, yeah, buddy, I've heard that before."

Of course, Dutch would end up part of the crew of the Enola Gay, and several months later their actions did significantly shorten the war. When asked about this great and terrible day, Dutch said, "We were fighting an enemy that had a reputation for never surrendering, never accepting defeat. It's really hard to talk about morality and war in the same sentence. Where was the morality in the bombing of Coventry, or the bombing of Dresden, or the Bataan Death March, or the Rape of Nanking, or the bombing of Pearl Harbor? I believe that when you're in a war, a nation must have the courage to do what it must to win the war with a minimum loss of lives."

Mr. Van Kirk retired from military service in 1946 as a major, having received the Silver Star and Distinguished Flying Cross. He earned bachelor's degrees and master's degrees in chemical engineering from Bucknell University and became a marketing executive with DuPont. In his many travels, Northumberland was always home as he regularly visited the READING AIR Show and farmers market, often interviewed about his contribution to history.

Besides his son, Thomas, who joins us here today with his son, Tom, survivors include another son, Larry; two daughters, Vicki Triplett and Joanne Gotelli; six more grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

I had the pleasure of meeting Dutch in my hometown in Mount Lebanon where the Van Kirks live today, where they have a habit and a history of always helping out community causes.

A couple of years ago we were looking to build a veterans memorial, and it was a big undertaking for our town, so we needed a person to come help kick it off and make sure that we were getting the attention that we needed. Dutch Van Kirk came, not from Mount Lebanon where his family was, obviously he was a big visitor of Northumberland, but he came of his own accord.

And I will tell you, even at the age that he was, his story and how he communicated and what he told us about his efforts, the crew of the Enola Gay, their mission of that day, was the highlight that I know no one in the room would ever forget. And I take it as a personal honor of myself to having met the man and had the opportunity to talk to him and to understand a little bit more about the mindset and what it meant in that day for him to protect our country the way he did.

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Northumberland County, Ms. Culver.

Ms. CULVER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I join my colleagues in honoring and remembering Theodore "Dutch" Van Kirk and welcoming his family to the House of Representatives.

Dutch was a native of Pennsylvania, having been born and raised on a farm near the Susquehanna River in Northumberland County, part of the 108th District, which I proudly represent.

To his family, Dutch was a husband, father, and grandfather, someone who they spent their everyday lives with, doing everyday interactions. But to the people of the 108th District, Theodore "Dutch" Van Kirk was a hero. He was a legend.

The people of the 108th District not only believed that Dutch helped to end the war but that he potentially saved millions of lives. Dutch and the crew of the Enola Gay changed the course of history.

A few years ago the Borough of Northumberland had a parade to honor Dutch, and I had the privilege of meeting him at that event. The mayor of Northumberland quoted in a local newspaper, "When he came to town I found him very gracious and humble about the honor. But the honor was all ours."

After the parade there was a book signing. There was a book written about Dutch called "My True Course: Dutch Van Kirk Northumberland to Hiroshima." And at the age of 92, Dutch signed every book and there was a line several hours long, and

at the end of the day they even ran out of the books. And he did not just sign the books, Dutch spoke with every individual that came through the line and either shared a personal story or asked someone about their own lives. Talk about a man who displayed much kindness and determination. He was an inspiration to all who attended the parade and the book signing.

And visualize if you will, we have a parade with all kinds of old Army vehicles, reenactors, and people all along the parade route were waving the American flag to honor him and his accomplishments. He inspired many young children to want to be just like him when they grow up.

The people of the 108th District were honored that Dutch considered the Borough of Northumberland home and that he chose it as his final resting place. At both the viewing and the funeral, I had the opportunity to meet his children and grandchildren, and it was obvious what kind of father and grandfather he was by how gracious and warm his children were. His services were attended by family, friends, students of history, and people who frankly had never met him but wanted to honor this great man, the hero, the legend.

The one thing that really stood out is that Dutch made an impact on every life that he touched. In his honor, as he was being laid to rest in a cemetery, a Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress flew over his graveside service held on August 5 in Northumberland, which thousands of people came to see.

I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting HR 965, which honors the life of Theodore "Dutch" Van Kirk. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

A Resolution honoring the life of World War II veteran Harry Weiland, Sr., and extending condolences to his family.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Evankovich.

Mr. EVANKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I stand here with my good colleague from Westmoreland County to thank you for helping to honor a member of the Greatest Generation. Mr. Speaker, Harry "Hack" Weiland was 89 when he passed away in August. He was a resident of my hometown of Murrysville for the last 58 years. Hack was a quiet man, and few knew of his courageous service during World War II.

Now, Mr. Speaker, as we all know, one of the greatest parts of our job is that we go out and we get to meet some of the greatest people in our State. Mr. Speaker, on the day where I was supposed to meet Hack, he was unfortunately too ill to be

there and passed away a short while later. So while I never knew him, I am amazed at the feats that he was able to accomplish. Hack was a member of the little-known, elite Alamo Scouts, a Special Forces Army unit that operated in the Southwest Pacific Theater from 1943 to 1945. They were under the personal command of another great Pennsylvanian, Lt. Gen. Walter Krueger, then commander of the U.S. 6th Army. General Krueger created this special volunteer unit made up of small teams, which operated almost solely behind enemy lines. Their primary mission was to gather intelligence.

The Alamo Scouts performed 106 known missions behind enemy lines, mainly in New Guinea and the Philippines. Remarkably, the 127-person unit, of which Hack Weiland was a member, never lost a single man throughout the war.

Staff Sergeant Weiland earned many medals in his service. To name a few, he earned the Expert Infantry Badge; the Combat Infantry Badge, Special Forces Tab; Silver Star with oakleaf; Bronze Star with oakleaf plus V for valor; Good Conduct Medal; and the Asiatic-Pacific Medal with four campaign stars. He was eventually inducted into the Soldiers and Sailors Hall of Valor.

GUESTS INTRODUCED

Mr. EVANKOVICH. Upon return from the war, Mr. Weiland became an accomplished family man and a carpenter. Mr. Speaker, one of his sons is here with us today, Harry Jr., and his wife, Paula. I would ask that they please rise for recognition.

Mr. Speaker, I am sure that no words of ours can adequately describe the sorrow those who know him must feel at their loss. Sergeant Weiland was a true American hero, and we will forever be in his debt. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House adopt the resolution?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland County, Mr. Krieger.

Mr. KRIEGER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Like Representative Evankovich, I never had the pleasure of meeting your father, but I can tell you, around Delmont, I heard about him all the time.

And many of us in western Pennsylvania are used to seeing obituaries of World War II veterans. In fact, many of us probably read the obituaries just to see who we know that has passed. It was unusual. The Alamo Scouts, those of you who do not know, are the forerunners of the Special Forces. They were the best of the best. And from talking with other family members, Mr. Weiland was the most humble of men as well. Like many heroes of that generation, you would not have known what he had done for his country. BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1243, PN 4179**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in firearms and other dangerous articles, further providing for Pennsylvania State Police and for limitation on the regulation of firearms and ammunition.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the maker of the bill?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from Montgomery County, Mr. Stephens, indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I know we have been away for a week, but what is in the bill now?

Mr. STEPHENS. Well, very simply, there is a provision that would require the State Police to transmit mental health records for those that have been involuntarily committed to the national background check database, and then there is another provision that would allow a challenge to local ordinances that may be unconstitutional in this Commonwealth.

Mr. THOMAS. Now, when you say a challenge to ordinances that are unconstitutional, does that mean challenges to local ordinances that have been declared unconstitutional or interpreted as being unconstitutional?

Mr. STEPHENS. No. What I said was a challenge to ordinances that may be unconstitutional.

Mr. THOMAS. Oh, that may be unconstitutional.

Mr. STEPHENS. Yes, sir.

We will not know until it is actually litigated, and that is actually the impetus for the amendment that was added to my bill, is to allow a challenge to get to the court, because as it stands right now, no local ordinances have been successfully challenged before the court, and therefore, no local ordinances have actually been enforced either. So in order to get a local ordinance enforced, we would somehow need a court to determine that it is lawful for those ordinances to be enforced. As a matter of fact, your own district attorney from Philadelphia opined that the city of Philadelphia could not enforce any local ordinances there because they are in fact unconstitutional, and she was, prior to being a district attorney, a judge of course.

Mr. THOMAS. Whom are we talking about? Lynne Abraham?

Mr. STEPHENS. Yes, sir.

Mr. THOMAS. Okay. That has been some time ago.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate the explanation.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Is the gentleman seeking further recognition on the bill?

Mr. THOMAS. Yes.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. THOMAS. Let me start out by thanking the author for this bill. He started out on a really good path and started out on a path that is going to have some good benefits for Pennsylvanians across the State. But, Mr. Speaker, if we had stayed on the path that he had carved out, we would be at a good place right now. But, Mr. Speaker, it has been amended in a way that has poisoned the entire tree, poisoned it in a way that his good deeds that started out in the beginning have been covered with confusion, distrust, and outright disrespect to the people at home.

And, Mr. Speaker, because we have some time off, I had a chance to talk to the family of the three children that were mowed down at Germantown and Allegheny. I have talked to families of child victims, victims who have been running around using guns almost as though they were officially empowered to do it, even though some of them are 12, 13, and 14 years of age. Mr. Speaker, I have talked to families of police officers who in some cases are outgunned and outmanned by those who believe that the Second Amendment gives them the right to run around and use guns in whatever way that they want. And, Mr. Speaker, as some of those families have said to me, Representative Thomas, you know murder, homicides, and things are down in Philadelphia County, but there is a callousness, there is a callousness, a culture of callousness, which has people running around, using guns at 11 o'clock in the morning, 2 o'clock in the afternoon, 4 o'clock in the evening while people are going home from work.

Some of you probably remember just a couple weeks ago, right in front of Einstein Hospital, kids had a dispute, and I think it was a 17-year-old that came with a gun and just started shooting, and an innocent woman who was pregnant ended up facing that tragedy. Now, Mr. Speaker, this was in front of Einstein Hospital, where there was a crowd of people trying to get home from work. And so, Mr. Speaker, the Constitution that we uphold, we admire, we treasure, empowers local municipal officers to do that which is best in the interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the people within the municipality. And so, Mr. Speaker, I cannot in good faith support HB 1243 and say that I care about the baby who is dead because she was sitting on her steps getting her hair plaited.

Mr. Speaker, I cannot support HB 1243 now that it has been infected with that ugly amendment that will empower you and me and the National Rifle Association to bring, to even think about suing our municipalities. I do not know of one of the over 2700 boroughs, townships, county officials in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania that would do anything against the interest of the people that they represent. My mayor, your mayor, your county commissioner, your borough township officer, Mr. Speaker, those are people that have been elected to do what is best in the interest of the people that they represent. They did not articulate the Pennsylvania uniform firearms law. It is not their fault. It is not their fault that the law was created in

a way that preempts many things that they can do at the local level. But, Mr. Speaker, I stand today for those who have been victimized by senseless violence brought on in the hands of a child with an illegal gun.

I support the Second Amendment, but, Mr. Speaker, that young man that killed that woman while she was pregnant, he should not have had a gun. He did not have a Second Amendment right. And I am not going to support anything that made that fool look like he had access, he was covered under the Second Amendment. He was not covered under the Second Amendment. The baby that was killed while she was sitting on her steps and the young man came down the street and just started shooting. He did not have— He was not covered by the Second Amendment. And we ought to stop using the Second Amendment, that precious, that precious anchor of our Constitution to protect these punks that really should be off the street and should be barred from getting their hands on guns. And for those adults that put guns in their hands, we should hold them to the highest level of responsibility, so if the punk kills somebody, you need to be found guilty also.

Mr. Speaker, let us not go down this road. Let us respect what the author intended when he crafted this bill. Let us not send something to the Senate that destroys his good intentions and his desire to try and do something for all Pennsylvanians, but, Mr. Speaker, we are at a crossroads. It is time to draw the line in the sand. I am standing today for the poor and families that are wondering what tomorrow is going to look like because their babies or their loved ones have been gunned down by some fool who never should have had a gun in their hands. It is unfortunate that in many of our counties, children can get guns before they can get a book to read, and until our local officials cut that path off and make it difficult if not impossible for these kids, for these people who are mentally ill, folks who are perpetrators of domestic violence, folks who are felons, they should not be allowed to walk around with guns in their hand.

And so, Mr. Speaker, we have an opportunity now to send a message that that is what we stand for, not the madness that is contained in HB 1243. I stand to vote "no," and I encourage my colleagues, whether you are from the north, south, east, or west, do the right thing today. Represent the people that you were sent here to represent. Vote "no" on HB 1243, not because it was intended wrong but because it has been poisoned by an amendment that should not be in the bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Frankel.

Mr. FRANKEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to this bill, not because the underlying legislation is not a good idea, because it is, but unfortunately, we chose to amend this piece of legislation, this basically good piece of legislation, to remove the ability of our local governments to act in the best interest of their citizens by enacting sensible gun laws that would protect them.

And let us talk about what that is. What we have seen is an effort by local governments encouraged by their local law enforcement agencies to address the scourge of illegal guns on our streets, and one of those mechanisms has been a mandate that folks report lost and stolen weapons, a very simple thing, that if you own a gun, you need to be able to know where it is stored and know if it is lost or stolen, because what we do know is as we trace back weapons that are used in crimes, that the

original owner says, oh, yeah, that weapon was lost or it was stolen from me and I never reported it, but it was ultimately, we know, that most of those weapons were sold in a straw purchase transaction to criminals. This is what our local governments and our local law enforcement agencies are trying to stem the tide of. We have not acted here in the legislature. We have had this legislation in front of us for years, but we have not been able to move it, really because we have the NRA (National Rifle Association), which is the author of the amendment that was put into this bill that wants to have standing itself, the NRA wants to have standing itself to be able to sue our local municipalities who are trying to address the scourge of illegal weapons in their cities. Why? Because we here in Harrisburg have abdicated our responsibility to pass this type of sensible legislation.

Many of us believe that with rights that most of us support under the Second Amendment come responsibilities, and one of those responsibilities is the reporting of lost and stolen weapons, which our local governments, dozens of them across the State of Pennsylvania, have deemed necessary to pass on a local level because we would not do it on a State level. We should not undermine their efforts to pass legislation to protect their citizens and give their law enforcement agencies the tools that they have asked for, that they have asked for.

So unfortunately, because of the amendment that was placed into 1243 that would give standing to the NRA to sue our local governments, I must ask for a "no" vote on this. I hope that my colleagues will join me in supporting our local officials and local law enforcement agencies by rejecting HB 1243. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the lady from Philadelphia County, Ms. DeLissio.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, is the maker of the bill available for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Stephens, from Montgomery County indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am curious, the municipalities that have passed legislation that are maybe not in conformity with State law, is there a particular reason why the State has not taken action with those municipalities? Has not the State government had that opportunity all along?

Mr. STEVENSON. Mr. Speaker, certainly the gentlelady is free to introduce any legislation she would like and offer it through the legislative process, and it would be considered as appropriate.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So, Mr. Speaker, I am not sure that answered my question. I can interpret that answer, however, to be a yes, the State has had that opportunity to take the action that we are now giving to a private membership organization.

Mr. Speaker, I think if the State has chosen to not do this for whatever reason on its watch over the years through the Attorney General's Office or whatever would be the appropriate forum, I think deciding then to advocate that State government—

The SPEAKER. The lady will suspend one second.

Are you still interrogating?

Ms. DeLISSIO. I am done. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Okay. The lady may proceed on the bill. You are in order.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The State is then, by virtue of this legislation, abdicating its responsibility, putting government's responsibility in the hands of a private membership organization, and, Mr. Speaker, whether it is this issue or any other issue, that is just bad policy, it is bad precedent, therefore the potential to be very bad legislation, and I would encourage a "no" vote. Thank you.

An Act amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, further providing for the offense of carrying firearms on public streets or public property in Philadelphia.

On the question,

Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia County, Mr. Taylor.

Mr. TAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

If we all recall the debate on 1243 that not only happened today but a few weeks ago, where many of our colleagues got up and described the horrific conditions in our city, I think we can stipulate to the fact that there is a great deal of pain and suffering in Philadelphia. I would dare suggest that if we went to a Hollywood producer and said, can you come up with the most horrific, sad, and senseless scenario so that we can make it part of a movie, we would not come up with something more sad, more horrific, and more senseless than what has gone on in Philadelphia in just the past 6 weeks.

And we have a bill here I think that gets to the problem and gives law enforcement an added tool to go after those criminals who were callous enough to walk out of their house with a gun that they do not own and a gun that they do not have a license to carry. And just let me add to what our colleagues have said and give you two very alarming statistics. Since I was elected legislator – and I am embarrassed to give you this statistic, but it is true – in my time here in Harrisburg, 10,000 Philadelphians were murdered; 10,000, since I have been elected, have been murdered on the streets of Philadelphia. Probably in the neighborhood of 30,000 people were shot, but 10,000 were killed in Philadelphia in my time here.

In 2007 there was a murder in Philadelphia every 22 hours. Now, what are we going to do to get to that in this bill? This bill creates a mandatory minimum sentence of 2 years in jail for those who would walk the streets of Philadelphia with a gun that they do not have a permit to carry and a gun that is not theirs in a vehicle that is not theirs. That to me, that definition

says "criminal," and for those of you that are concerned about the prior bill that we just passed, that we are limiting the amount of different laws in different jurisdictions, we are not creating a new law here.

Way back in the seventies, Philadelphia had a different standard for carrying than the rest of the Commonwealth. And whether you agree with that or do not agree with that, that is a fact that back in the seventies we created a new standard for a permit that allows you to carry a concealed weapon or a nonconcealed weapon, and all we are doing is allowing the mandatory minimum sentence along with the fact that the gun is not yours and in a vehicle that is not yours.

And I imagine there is a scenario that we can think up where there is a possibility of a law-abiding citizen being caught up in this. But keep in mind that it is an offense that a district attorney has to prosecute in a city where he has unfortunate opportunities each and every day to prosecute people who have killed and shot other human beings.

So with that, Mr. Speaker, I would ask your support for 1091. We think this is a tool that will have an effect. Law enforcement throughout the southeastern part of the State is in favor of this bill. Certainly the district attorneys are. And I would ask for your support.

The SPEAKER. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Mr. Vitali.

The gentleman will try a different mike. For some reason, it does not seem to be working.

Mr. VITALI. How is this?

The SPEAKER. That one seems to be working.

The gentleman, Mr. Vitali, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

First of all, I would like to salute the maker of this bill for his excellent work in dealing with gun violence in Philadelphia. I share his concerns. I think he has correctly identified a very serious problem and has acted in a very zealous way to try to address that problem.

My own feeling is that people who wrongfully carry firearms— Well, people who commit crimes with firearms should be prosecuted to the full extent of the law and go to jail for a long time. I think people who wrongfully possess firearms also ought to be punished commensurate with the facts and the circumstances of each case.

I think the problem in this bill is in the details. The problem in this bill is that a person can get a mandatory of 2 years in jail who really has not committed any other crime than wrongly possessing a gun. The gentleman suggested scenarios. I recently read an article which created the following scenario. A father wants to take his son and his family to a basketball game. They are playing in a dangerous part of the city. A neighbor gives him a gun, and he takes it with him just in case anything goes wrong. Perhaps the father cannot get a gun on his own correctly, because while he was in college, he may have smoked some marijuana and prevented himself from getting a permit to carry. Under that scenario, this father, who really did little wrong, did some wrong, would be subject to that 2-year mandatory minimum.

I think that for our judicial system to do justice, the judge needs to have the ability to look at the facts and circumstances of each case, to both look at the gravity of the offense but also look at the background of the defendant and then decide whether 2 years is appropriate, 3 years is appropriate, 10 years

is appropriate, a year and a half is appropriate, 6 months is appropriate. But if a judicial system is functioning properly, a judge needs the ability to evaluate the facts and circumstances and do justice.

Now, the gentleman from Philadelphia said, yes, the district attorney does have some discretion here in whether to seek the mandatory minimum or not, but when you give the district attorney that discretion, you are shifting the ability to sentence from the judge to the prosecutor. The way we have built our system of justice, we want the judge, not the district attorney, to determine sentences.

We elect judges to long terms and expose them to retention elections, not candidate-to-candidate elections after their first election, because they need that impartiality, they need that ability to escape from the passions of the moment, from the passions of the political process, and do justice to each individual. District attorneys, sometimes they have higher political ambitions. Sometimes district attorneys run for mayor, then run for Governor. Sometimes district attorneys run for the State House. District attorneys are more a creature of the political system and are more subject to the political pressures. So it is the judge, not a district attorney, who should be making these decisions relating to sentencing.

So although I salute the maker of the amendment for his zeal in wanting to oppose severe sentences for people who possess guns, I think at the end of the day it is the judge who really needs to continue to have the ability to look at the facts and the circumstances of each case and to do justice with each case. If we do have that judge who was too lenient, then the problem is solved by dealing with that judge, not tying the hands of the 99 percent of the judges who do their job.

So I regrettably would ask those who can, I understand coming into an election period, we all cannot do the right thing here, and I do not blame people who will not do the right thing because it does subject you to political attack, but if you can do the right thing, I would urge you to do that and vote "no" on this bill. Thank you.

FAREWELL ADDRESS BY MR. STEVENSON

Mr. STEVENSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Speaker Smith, Majority Leader Turzai, Minority Leader Dermody and fellow members, after watching these farewell speeches for many years, I am well aware that emotions can make this moment difficult. I am reminded of that anonymous quotation, "The human brain starts working the moment you are born and never stops until you stand up to speak in public."

My years as a member of this body have been challenging, and it has been a rewarding chapter in my life. Today I am pleased to have the opportunity to express my gratitude to those who have been such a part of this experience. Let me begin by thanking the people of the Eighth District for their support during my tenure. One of the most rewarding aspects of this position has been the ability to get to know so many wonderful people from Mercer and Butler Counties. Thank you.

Next, to the many Harrisburg staffers; committee staff; leadership staff; Chief Clerk staff; Jennifer Keaton, my PRC (public relations coordinator); Lynn and Spizz; and others

who serve here with professionalism, often under pressure, and whose work is often taken for granted, thank you.

I am proud to welcome the members of my office here today. It has been a distinct pleasure to work with these friends who have provided outstanding and professional service for many years. From my district office, Office Manager Nancy Leone and Outreach Specialist Laura Moore. From my Harrisburg office, Executive Director Joann Drabenstadt, Administrative Assistant Lisa Shenfeld, and Administrative Assistant Jason Weiser. Also seated with them is my strongest supporter for 43 years, my loving wife, Sue. Thank you all. Please rise and be recognized.

I would also like to express my gratitude to my fellow members of this House, to the Republican Caucus. It has truly been an honor to serve on our leadership team for the past 4 years. Thank you. Thank you to my colleagues in leadership for challenges met and friendships forged. To my many friends on both sides of the aisle, thank you for your friendship, for your help, and for your good humor.

Close friendships are also common among the members we sit near here in the House. To those good friends in the rear, along the aisle – you know who you are – thank you. I am being cautious about mentioning people by name for fear of missing others, but I would be remiss if I did not mention my friends from the bipartisan dinners on the third floor of the Firehouse, the ECC and the ICC.

As has been noted by others, as members of this House of Representatives, we share a lineage that extends back over 300 years. For each of us, the experience is similar, and yet it is different. The members I know believe that in a democracy, the purpose of public office is not to fulfill personal ambition; it is, rather, an opportunity to serve. What I have experienced are men and women of good faith and good intentions who work diligently to serve people, the people who sent them here, to honor the founding principles of this nation and this Commonwealth in the arena of ideas, where differences can be expressed, arguments made, and votes taken.

Recently, after hearing family discussions with our daughters, Sarah and Emily, and their husbands, Scott and Jarred, about my upcoming retirement, our 8-year-old grandson, Eli, asked what retirement meant. His mother, Sarah, explained that in retirement I would not be going to work anymore. "Does

that mean," he asked, "that Granddad won't have to go to Harrisburg anymore?" "No," said his mother, "he won't." "And he won't have to go to his office in Grove City anymore?" "No, he won't." "And he won't have to go to all those meetings and dinners anymore?" "No, he won't." "Good. Then he'll be just Granddad."

It has been an honor to serve as a member of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. It has indeed been an honor, and now it will be an honor to be just Granddad.

Mr. HACKETT submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank my colleagues for their support of HB 2464 to amend the PA Crime Victims Act to ensure a victim's right to be present during a trial is preserved.

This issue was brought to my attention by the Delaware County Women Against Rape organization. From their perspective, defense attorneys routinely ask that sexual assault victims be sequestered, even when the district attorney has said they do not expect to call the victim in rebuttal.

For many years sexual assault victims in the Commonwealth were present during all proceedings, including the trial of their case. Unfortunately, they are now almost always sequestered, before and after testifying. Some view this as a defense tactic designed to further harass and intimidate the victim. Sexual assault victims have objected to this tactic, and according to Delaware County Women Against Rape, it has even caused some to question whether they should have reported the crime in the first place. Jurors also sometimes question why the victim does not remain in the courtroom to the conclusion of trial and often conclude that the victim does not really care enough about the case. The Pennsylvania Office of Victim Advocate also supports this legislation because they feel that being present for the trial helps the victim attain a certain amount of closure. Advocates also believe it shows the offender that the victims will not be intimidated.

Currently Pennsylvania is one of only seven States that has not addressed this issue of victim sequestration. This bill, HB 2464, addresses that issue. It is supported by the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Rape, the Pennsylvania Office of Victim Advocate, and the District Attorneys Association.

Thank you again for your support of this important bill.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. HARHAI. Mr. Speaker, I, too, want to submit some comments for the record for HB 2302. Thank you.

Mr. HARHAI submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

My HB 2302 will establish a new State program to provide grants, on a competitive basis, to municipalities for property maintenance code enforcement in order to prevent and eradicate blighted property conditions.

While the Uniform Construction Code properly regulates new construction, additions and alterations, it does not regulate the ongoing maintenance and repair of residential buildings or most commercial buildings. Only a well-designed, properly enforced maintenance code,

staffed by well-trained professional inspectors, is the key to communities maintaining their housing and commercial stock in proper working order.

Property maintenance codes are a critical tool that municipalities have in not only fighting blight and deterioration but in maintaining a safe, healthy, tax-vibrant community as well. In recent years the Urban Affairs Committee has worked to develop and improve a number of measures to address blight and property abandonment, which the General Assembly saw fit to enact.

However, in committee hearings and informational meetings, we have frequently heard from municipal officials throughout the Commonwealth, be they urban, suburban, or rural, about a large missing piece of the puzzle – the lack of adequate resources for property maintenance code enforcement. My legislation will help to rectify that problem by providing a stream of funding for municipalities to develop property maintenance codes and ordinances as well as funding to hire qualified, professional property maintenance inspectors.

In this day of ever-shrinking municipal budgets, HB 2302 will provide a needed boost in encouraging municipalities to develop property maintenance codes and enforce them with qualified people.

I would like to thank the stakeholders, including the various municipal associations, the Housing Alliance of Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania Association of Building and Code Officials, as well as DCED (Department of Community and Economic Development) officials, who were helpful in crafting and refining this legislation. I would also like to thank Chairman Gillespie and his able staff for facilitating the advancement of this measure.

HB 2302 will help to keep neighborhoods throughout the Commonwealth clean and free from conditions that detract from the appearance and safety of the community. I am grateful for the overwhelming support it received from the House today.

An Act amending the act of August 24, 1963 (P.L.1175, No.497), known as the Mechanics' Lien Law of 1963, further providing for definitions; and providing for State Construction Notices Directory, for failure to file notice of furnishing, for notice of commencement and notice of furnishing, for notice of completion for informational purposes, for notice and for prohibition.

The SPEAKER. Moved by the gentleman, Mr. Killion, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Killion, for a brief description of Senate amendments.

Mr. KILLION. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The Senate made several changes. They changed the effective date of the legislation from July 1, 2015, to December 31, 2016. They created a project threshold of \$1.5 million. The bill as it left the House had no threshold. They created a new requirement that contracts have written notice advising subcontractors that a notice of commencement has been filed. They extended a period for filing a notice of furnishing from 20 to 45 days. They added a requirement that a notice of completion be filed within 45 days, added language to state that the notice of completion shall not be considered by a court in determining compliance with other timing requirements under State law. And finally, they established a criminal penalty for coercion and provided for damages for abuse of the directory.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. TURZAI submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

HB 473 represents years of work on the important issue of modernizing our Mechanics' Lien Law to allow owners to more easily identify who is working on their projects. This will help ensure that subcontractors are paid. This is a win-win for owners and those subcontractors who work on their projects.

HB 473 creates a "notice of commencement" process similar to that which already exists in many other States, including Ohio and Michigan. This legislation creates it as an optional tool that can be used by owners, and it is not a mandate.

The truly revolutionary aspect of HB 473 is that it creates an Internet Web site directory known as the "State Construction Notices Directory" on which owners would file notices of commencement, and which subcontractors could simply log onto the Web site and obtain basic information on the project, and conveniently file a notice of furnishing to inform the owner that they are a subcontractor on the project. The State of Utah already has such an Internet system.

The creation of this Web site is directly the result of the prime sponsor's out-of-the-box thinking on how best to make the notice of commencement process convenient to the population that it will be serving.

I truly believe that this bill will become a highly used tool in the construction industry that will reduce the number of payment disputes involving construction projects.

I would like to thank the majority and minority chairmen of the House Labor and Industry Committee for their hard work on this bill. This represents a bipartisan win for Pennsylvania.

Mr. MARSICO submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, HB 2465 addresses a significant public safety problem regarding persons convicted of the most serious sex offenses. Many of these sex offenders are sent to prison and serve their full term. They are not granted parole because often they refuse treatment and fail to cooperate. When they are released, they are free to go without any oversight or supervision.

This bill will address that situation by requiring a sentencing court to add a 3-year probation tail to whatever sentence is imposed. That will mean that a person who maxes out will be required to serve 3 years under probation supervision, either by the court or the PA Board of Probation and Parole. This will allow authorities to keep tabs on these people who pose a high level of risk to our communities.

I appreciate an affirmative vote on this important piece of legislation.
