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The SPEAKER. One hundred and ninety-one members having voted on the master roll, a quorum is present.

Will all members please take your seats, clear the aisles. We do not have much business to conduct today. We have one introduction.

### GUESTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Located to the left of the rostrum, the Chair welcomes the president and CEO of the Pennsylvania Cable Network, better known as PCN, Brian Lockman. Seated with him are members of his executive team: Joel Bechtel, Debra Kohr, Melissa Hiler, Francine Schertzer, Matthew Hall, and Larry Kaspar, many of whom we have seen on television. Will you please rise.

They are the guests of Representative Gary Day.

### STATEMENT BY MR. DAY

The SPEAKER. At this time I would like to call on the good gentleman, Representative Day. He will be presenting to us HR 19.

Representative Day, the floor is yours.

Mr. DAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank all members today for being here, being part of this. I explained to our guests the importance to each and every one of us of PCN and also the importance to the people that we represent.

Today I rise to offer this resolution to recognize and honor this entity in the Commonwealth that plays an important role in what we do in this chamber every single time the mace is at the rostrum and we gavel into session. This is an entity that allows this very floor proceeding to be broadcast into homes, schools, and businesses so that everyone can view State government unobstructed, uncommentated on for us, and they can see what we do here.

The Pennsylvania Cable Network, commonly called PCN, and its 3 million cable subscribers has been providing educational content to this Commonwealth and all the viewers since 1979, and in 1995 began gavel-to-gavel coverage of committee hearings, press conferences, inaugurations, bill signings, and other interests to the public.

As a matter of fact, in this last inauguration they put out on their schedule that they were going to cover the inauguration and then also leading up to it showed inaugurations from the past so that viewers were given the opportunity to understand what should they be looking for in this inaugural speech from Governor Wolf, and it was very informative to me I thought, and I consider myself to be an insider. This nonpartisan, unedited, balanced coverage ensures that Pennsylvanians have



that reliable news information about what is actually going on. It is not just government and political coverage that draws in PCN viewers, from the most recent coverage of the Pennsylvania Farm Show, PIAA sports championships, factory tours, to its Gettysburg Battlefield walks, also in-depth interviews with Pennsylvania authors and some of our State's greatest heroes, our veterans. PCN truly offers something for everyone. And in particular, I know I have been called by them and said, "Hey, you have a bill that you're running and we want to understand more about that. We want the people of Pennsylvania to understand more. Come on our program. Talk about this issue."

As a former employee of an independent local cable operator, I have another insight into knowing that cable operators all across Pennsylvania take great pride in providing this service. I can tell you that the challenges faced by cable companies in the ever-increasing and changing demands of the industry are daunting. However, PCN is strong, strong as ever.

Through the years, PCN has done its best to keep up with the rapid pace of technology. They maintain superior quality for its viewers. In fact, PCN has kept pace with that ever-changing field of broadcasting by upgrading its services to high definition, a very expensive proposition. It has embraced the digital age in social media by making content available online and interacting with viewers via Facebook and Twitter.

It is no secret that PCN is nationally recognized as the premier State public affairs network and serves as a model for other States, and not one dollar of taxpayer money supports this type of program. Eighty-five percent comes from those local cable companies.

At this time, you know, I want to just join with the Speaker, and he has welcomed them to our body, and on this 20th anniversary of carrying our sessions, I think it is only fitting that because of the importance of PCN to this institution, to our democracy, and to Pennsylvania that we pass this resolution. This resolution will designate January 25 through 31 as "PCN: Pennsylvania's Neighborhood Week" in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Speaker, I ask for our membership to please vote on this, and I ask for their unanimous support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### STATEMENT BY MS. QUINN

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes members to speak on a number of the uncontested resolutions. We will begin with Representative Marguerite Quinn on HR 40.

Ms. QUINN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate your interest as well as the attention from my colleagues as I speak on HR 40, which recognizes the month of January as "Human Trafficking Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. Now, I would not be surprised if some of you, especially the new members, when you just heard me mention human trafficking, if you instinctively thought of a problem that occurs in a faraway land, in countries in which liberty and freedom are not revered the way they are in our nation, but so sadly, this is not the case. Human trafficking is now a global epidemic, one of the fastest growing crimes in the world and estimated to be a \$32 billion industry, making it second only to the illegal drug industry.

Human trafficking does in fact occur in the United States, in our Commonwealth, in our cities, counties, and the small towns that we represent. It is a dark, little-discussed industry, and it is basically modern-day slavery. Fifty percent of the victims are children. Eighty percent of the victims are women. The average victim is between 12 and 14 years old. In the past two decades, the commercial sexual exploitation has grown. The victims are estimated to be in the millions worldwide. The National Center for Missing & Exploited Children estimates that 325,000 children in the United States, Canada, and Mexico are at risk for being victims of sexual exploitation every year.

Mr. Speaker, the timing for HR 40 is no coincidence. As we look at plans for the Super Bowl this coming weekend, we see an event that is ripe for this type of horrific activity. The large crowd, the partying, the transient customers, and basically an overindulgent atmosphere will make Arizona a magnet for sex trafficking.

In fact, in 2011, when Arlington, Texas, hosted the Super Bowl, State Attorney General Greg Abbott said the game was known as quote, unquote, "...the single largest human trafficking incident in the United States." Wow.

Mr. Speaker, it is our responsibility, morally and constitutionally, to protect the victims of this insidious crime. We must recognize that it does in fact occur here at home, that our children are preyed upon and groomed by the predators. The Internet is typically the trafficker's first contact with the victim, and no, not all of the victims come from troubled homes.

Last session this body passed SB 75, and as a result, Act 105 is now law. It was bipartisan legislation that was much needed and will do a great deal in terms of addressing the crime, but it is imperative that we do not pull back and that we continue to learn more about human trafficking, realize it is on the rise, and that it does happen here at home. Education is the first step, and that is a step that each one of us can take. I thank you for your support of HR 40 and for supporting making January "Human Trafficking Awareness Month." By doing this, you are giving the victims a voice. Thank you.

#### STATEMENT BY MS. DeLISSIO

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Good morning, and it is my pleasure this morning to join the gentlelady from Bucks County on this very important initiative. I would encourage all of my colleagues to look at polarisproject.org, a Web site and a leader in anti-human trafficking across the country. They in particular offer tips as to how to recognize human trafficking. And two summers ago I had a very interesting experience in Lexington, Kentucky. I was at a conference and witnessed what I believed to be human trafficking firsthand, and as quickly as I thought I acted, it was not quick enough. And I was not the only one in this very nice hotel to observe this couple, a young lady and an older gentleman, and their somewhat odd and distracting behavior; a number of the hotel staff had too.

So in addition to educating ourselves, thank you for putting this word out to your own constituents to raise awareness so that we become more familiar with what those signs are. It does in fact happen in our backyard. So thank you very much.

#### STATEMENT BY MRS. DAVIS

Mrs. DAVIS. Good morning, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank my colleagues for supporting HR 20, which recognizes "Krabbe Disease Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.

Back in October you might have met the parents of Hannah, who was in my district, Vicki and Justin, who pushed tremendously for 2 years to get Hannah's Law passed, and thanks to all of you, you unanimously passed that. Unfortunately, 18 days later Hannah died with a spirit— She was an angel. That is all I can tell you. She was an angel that had a big following in Pennsylvania and across the country. I did talk to her parents this week, and it has been tough, but it is hard to— I did not plan to— I planned to do a speech, and I did not want to do a speech, because it is so important. This little girl raised awareness, and we did it, and I want to thank you.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. FARRY

The SPEAKER. Representative Farry.

Mr. FARRY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise with a heavy heart, joining my colleague, Representative Davis, to thank our colleagues for support of her resolution, HR 20, which honors a special little girl from Bucks County who left an enormous mark on this Commonwealth and country. As Representative Davis said, most of you probably have heard Hannah's name. That is because a year ago you unanimously voted in support of the new law that bears her name. Hannah was diagnosed with a genetic disorder known as Krabbe disease 4 months after she was born in January 2013, and she was given 2 years to live.

Krabbe disease is categorized both as leukodystrophy as well as lysosomal storage disorder, which affects the central and peripheral nervous systems. Tragically, unless a child is born in a State that screens for Krabbe disease at birth or there is a known family history of the disease, the vast majority of the children are diagnosed after being symptomatic and the disease is far too progressed to be treated.

Up until last year, Pennsylvania was a State that did not screen for this disease. Upon hearing of this devastating diagnosis, Hannah and her parents, Vicki and Justin, began their inspiring crusade to save the lives of other newborns. Hope for Hannah was born. Their campaign was successful last fall as Hannah's Law was signed into law, adding Krabbe and five other disorders to the list of genetic diseases hospitals must screen for in newborns.

Like many, I was devastated to hear the news of Hannah's passing last month. She was a vibrant little girl that not only changed our laws but she also touched our hearts. She was an inspiration to everyone around her, and we as a Commonwealth were blessed and lucky to have known her. Because she and her family opened up to the world with their story, they have succeeded in spreading awareness of Krabbe to millions, and Hannah's legacy extends far beyond Pennsylvania's borders. With the passage of Hannah's Law and this resolution today, we can ensure her legacy continues.

By bringing awareness to this terrible disease, we continue Hannah's cause and we continue the hope that she brought to families across the Commonwealth and this country. Mr. Speaker, I thank the members for supporting Representative Davis's resolution today.
