WILSON HIGH SCHOOL WATER POLO TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. At this time we are going to move right into the citation, and I call up Representative Gillen and Representative Cox. They are going to be introducing the water polo team. I turn it over to Representative Gillen.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Cox and I are very fortunate to have as constituents the Wilson School District community and it is very rare that I have had anyone stand in this position and introduce a school district which has 17 State championships in a given sport. Water sports as a whole, the Wilson Bulldogs in West Lawn have won over 30 State championships.

I would ask that our friends in the back, the rest of the Wilson Bulldog Water Polo Team, as well as their coaches, Adam Filer and Justin Raffauf, if they would stand just to be acknowledged for the tremendous achievement, not only in this school year but historically at Wilson High School. Ladies and gentlemen, Wilson High School Bulldogs.

You are welcome to be seated. Thank you very much.

I do not know what more can be said when you introduce a team and a high school that has 17 State championships in water polo under its belt, but I would like to briefly add that this is a school which excels academically. Representative Cox and I have had the great privilege to walk the halls with Dr. Rudy Ruth, who was also a tremendous water polo player and a coach at Wilson High School. And I believe the current water polo coach, who is a Penn State graduate in 2007, is also an honors teacher in math and precalculus. What you are immediately impressed with when you go through Wilson High School is the excellence not only in interscholastic sports but academics.

They came back to defeat North Penn High School for the State championship, showed a lot of character in doing that because earlier in the season that same North Penn Water Polo Team had defeated Wilson.

There are five members of this squad which made the All-State Team. Two First Team All-State, that would be Matt and Justin – actually Matt and Carter; and there were two on Second Team All-State, Tristan and Quinn; and Preston was honorable mention All-State. Because of their academic excellence, because of their excellence in the pool and their willingness to fight and come back hard against a team that had previously defeated them, Representative Cox and myself wholeheartedly acknowledge the superior effort in the pool and in the classroom of the Wilson Bulldog State Championship Water Polo Team. Thank you, ladies and gentlemen.

STATEMENT BY MR. MACKENZIE

The SPEAKER. Representative Ryan Mackenzie is recognized to speak on HR 142. Representative, the floor is yours.

Members, we do not have many speakers today. If we could give them their due here, our undivided attention, we would appreciate it.

Representative Mackenzie is recognized to speak on HR 142.

Mr. MACKENZIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in regard to HR 142, which recognizes March 2015 as "Greek-American Heritage Month" in the Commonwealth.

Today there are more than 1.3 million Americans of Greek ancestry. Greek philosophy, art, and cuisine have had significant impacts on American culture. It was in the ancient polis that the idea of democracy first began – ideas that influenced the Founders of our nation and led to the constitutional republic America is today.

March is noteworthy for Greek-American heritage because the modern nation of Greece declared independence from the Ottoman Empire on March 25, 1821, restoring a free state after nearly four centuries of oppressive rule. When working to reestablish the independent state, Greek Commander Petros Mavromichalis declared to the citizens of the United States that "It is in your land that liberty has fixed her abode and...in imitating you, we shall imitate our ancestors and be thought worthy of them if we succeed in resembling you."

Our close partnership continues, and throughout the 20th century, Greece has been one of only three nations to ally with the United States in every major international conflict, and to this day the Greek nation remains a reliable strategic partner and steadfast ally to the United States.

Therefore, I thank my colleagues for their support of Greek-American Heritage Month and the role that Greek-Americans play in our economic and cultural development of our nation and this State.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative.

STATEMENT BY MS. RAPP

The SPEAKER. Representative Kathy Rapp is recognized to speak on HR 139. My understanding is that Representative Samuelson and Representative James will be joining her at the podium.

Please, everybody, let us give our undivided attention to Representative Rapp.

Ms. RAPP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to my colleagues for supporting HR 139.

Col. Edwin Drake is known as the Father of the Petroleum Industry. Colonel Drake was born on March 29, 1819, in Greenville, New York. Colonel Drake left home at 19 and spent time working the railways. Ill-health forced him to retire in 1857 but opened a new opportunity for him.

While staying in the same location as the founders of the first oil company, the Seneca Oil Company, Drake was hired to inspect the oil springs on their property right outside of Titusville, Pennsylvania. He was given the title of "Colonel" by one Mr. James Townsend, one of the investors, even though he was never an officer or ever in the military. Drake arrived in Titusville in 1857, a lumber town at the time with a population of 157 people.

Prior to Colonel Drake's well, the oil from the site was skimmed from little springs on Oil Creek. The oil was used for lighting and to lubricate machinery. Yes, it was right on the surface to be scooped up for use, but with greater demand, once the oil was found to be cheaper and safer than other fuels on the market, Drake was charged with a mission to produce a more profitable amount of oil, considering that the seep, as it was called, only produced 3 or 4 gallons a day.

Drake attempted mining for the oil to no avail and started studying the techniques of drilling salt wells and decided to bore for the oil. He began in May of 1858 and almost immediately found it impossible to maintain a borehole in the loose rock and soil just below. He solved the problem by driving sections of pipe into the ground until bedrock was struck, and from there the drilling continued until the top of an oil deposit was reached at a depth of 69 feet in August of 1859. With the spread of Drake's techniques, Titusville and other northwestern Pennsylvania communities became boomtowns.

Unfortunately, Drake did not patent his drill pipe methods and never became a success in oil speculation. He worked various jobs in Titusville and then moved to New York, Vermont, and New Jersey. In 1870 after years of poverty, he returned to Pennsylvania, settling in the town of Bethlehem. The people of Titusville helped him with a stipend and in 1876 the Pennsylvania General Assembly voted Drake a pension.

Drake died in 1880 in Bethlehem, but his body was reinterred in a tomb in Titusville's Woodlawn Cemetery. Inscriptions on the tomb extol his contributions to the oil industry.

The documentary on the History Channel, "The Men Who Built America," gave mention to Colonel Drake. He was a great entrepreneur who truly is the Father of the Petroleum Industry. Being mentioned along with Carnegie, Rockefeller, J.P. Morgan, Henry Ford, and others, Drake played a significant role in our history and in the industrial revolution that helped

make the United States a great nation. Today I daresay most of us arrived here today because we still benefit from that oil and of the entrepreneurial risks of men like Colonel Drake.

Thank you for your support of this resolution to honor Colonel Drake.

STATEMENT BY MR. SAMUELSON

The SPEAKER. Representative Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to add my voice to Representative Kathy Rapp in honor of the legacy of Col. Edwin Drake, who drilled the very first oil well in the United States of America right here in Pennsylvania.

I know Colonel Drake is commemorated in northwestern Pennsylvania at so many historical sites, but we also have a historical marker in Bethlehem because in retirement he did move to the town of Bethlehem and lived there for almost a decade and established himself as a civic leader.

So I rise today to say that Colonel Drake made so many important contributions to the history of Pennsylvania in communities all across our State.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. JAMES

The SPEAKER. Representative James.

Mr. JAMES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In his 39th year Edwin Drake was hired by investors for a whopping \$1,000 a year for the purpose of finding crude oil in commercially viable amounts.

Why Edwin Drake? Well, as a former railroad worker, it seems that Drake could travel across the country for free. At that time crude oil was just being refined into lamp oil, known as kerosene, and that was replacing the market for whale oil.

Why Titusville? Investors had heard stories of oil actually bubbling up from natural oil springs.

Why in 1859 was Drake finally successful when so many others had failed before? Because he had devised a method of drilling using 10-foot sections of cast iron pipe, which prevented the collapse of the borehole.

Well, by now you know that Colonel Drake and Uncle Billy Smith started drilling in August of 1859, struck oil at 69 1/2 feet later that same year. Drake became the Father of the Oil Industry. Drake Well in Venango County became the birthplace of the oil industry, despite claims from Canada, Poland, Texas, and Germany.

Unfortunately for Drake, he failed to patent his drilling invention, lost all his wealth in oil speculation in 1863, and died broke in 1880, an all-too-familiar story in the history of the United States. Still without him, where would we be today?

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Ms. RAPP. Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you and thank my colleagues for joining me here today, and I thank you for your positive vote in recognizing Colonel Drake as a great entrepreneur in the State of Pennsylvania. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Murt, on unanimous consent. Members, I would ask for your attention here. Representative Murt will be speaking on unanimous consent.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, yesterday minus 43 years was the last day that U.S. troops remained in South Vietnam. Over 53,000 Americans died in the Vietnam war.

It is an understatement to say that the Vietnam war was unpopular. Across the nation and this Commonwealth, people took a moment to recognize the great sacrifice and dedication of those who served in Vietnam.

As before and since, young citizens in my own legislative district and across the Commonwealth volunteered their service in defense of this great nation. Some made the ultimate sacrifice, while others continue to cope with the damages from trauma suffered in places like la Drang, Khe Sanh, Hamburger Hill, and many others. They suffer from Agent Orange-related illnesses and diseases, the early onset of diabetes, post-traumatic stress, and other maladies. Unfortunately, many of our Vietnam veterans, our constituents, have to fight the VA (Veterans' Administration) to have access to the services and the health care that they have earned.

They continue to work postservice in our hospitals, our factories, our hometowns, and so forth. They came home to empty airport terminals; no ticker-tape parades or grateful American receptions or celebrations, which is the status quo with our men and women returning from Iraq and Afghanistan.

Pennsylvania is well-known as a haven to veterans and is one of the most veteran-populous States in the Union. The high school that lost more of its graduates in the Vietnam war is Thomas Edison High School, which is located in north Philadelphia. The high school that was third in casualties was also located in Philadelphia; that was Father Judge High School.

Vietnam-era veterans make up a large contingent of the veterans that live in this State as well. We owe it to them to take the time to remember their sacrifice, honor their service, and ensure that all returning veterans in the future are supported, well taken care of, and are treated as the heroes that they are.

One other aspect of the Vietnam war, Mr. Speaker, that was grossly, grossly unfair was the fact that young men from impoverished neighborhoods, young men of color, young men from the lower end of the socioeconomic spectrum fought in Vietnam and died in very, very disproportionate numbers. This is a very sad legacy of the Vietnam war.

And finally, the last thing I want to say is, we now have veterans' courts that allow men and women who return from Iraq and Afghanistan, that suffer from post-traumatic stress or other types of emotional or psychological trauma, to be given some extra consideration in the adjudication of their criminal acts and so forth. Those kinds of considerations did not exist, and there are still men who suffer from post-traumatic stress and other problems from their service and combat in Vietnam, that are still serving time in some of the prisons across the Commonwealth, and this is a population to which we need to be attentive.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the good gentleman, Representative Godshall of Montgomery County, the maker of the bill.

Mr. GODSHALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to submit comments for the record, please.

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir. Thank you very much. They will be accepted.

Mr. GODSHALL submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

HB 66 amends the Municipal Authorities Act to prohibit an authority from making an acquisition of any project or a sale or transfer of water or sewer facilities until the acquisition or sale is discussed at a public meeting and the notes from the meeting include a discussion of the projected or anticipated public benefit that will be realized by the acquisition. The bill requires a projected or anticipated public benefit, no penalty to the authority if acquisition or sale is approved, but benefits to ratepayers not fully realized.

A "public benefit" is a rate reduction, improved service quality, improved service reliability, or other clearly defined benefit to the ratepayers of the authority.

The intent is to increase the transparency of authority acquisitions and divestitures and ensure a discussion of how an acquisition or sale will benefit current ratepayers of the authority. Ratepayers of an acquired system often receive the immediate benefit of improved service quality and reliability; however, the benefit to current ratepayers is often unclear.

A sale of water/wastewater facilities may also result in rate increases to ratepayers. However, ratepayers may receive the benefit of more reliable service or, if the system is troubled, benefit from the purchaser investing in infrastructure improvements to bring the system into compliance with DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) regulations. It is this type of discussion that must be included in the minutes of a public meeting.

The bill only applies to projects and water/sewer facilities owned by an authority. It does not apply to municipally owned facilities. PGW (Philadelphia Gas Works) is not owned by an authority. This bill does not impact PGW in any way.

The majority required by the Constitution having voted in the affirmative, the question was determined in the affirmative and the bill passed finally.

Ordered, That the clerk present the same to the Senate for concurrence.
