STATEMENT BY MR. SAMUELSON

The SPEAKER. On unanimous consent, Representative Samuelson will be addressing the chamber on HR 595. Representatives Watson, Hennessey, and Kortz are invited to accompany Representative Samuelson at the podium. I am sorry; in the well of the House. They are going to speak from the well of the House.

Representative Samuelson, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank the House of Representatives for your support today for this resolution. I want to thank Representative Tim Hennessey, chair of the Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, and I want to thank Representative Bill Kortz and Representative Kathy Watson, who are cochairs of the Alzheimer's Caucus.

We are joined by several guests today, including Mary Read from Lancaster County, who is an early-stage adviser for the Alzheimer's Association and runs a memory café for others. We have Paige Faulk, who is a support group facilitator, a professional from the Middletown Home who also serves as a trainer for other professionals. We have Clay Jacobs, vice president for programs and services for the Alzheimer's Association. And we also have Candy Yingling, who is the education and outreach coordinator for the south central chapter of the Alzheimer's Association. Those four individuals are over here to the left of the Speaker. I would ask them to rise.

November is Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month. This is a disease that affects over 5 million Americans, including an estimated 200,000 people who are under the age of 65. In Pennsylvania as many as 400,000 residents are living with

Alzheimer's disease or related disorders. Seven percent of Pennsylvania's nursing home beds are dedicated for patients with Alzheimer's, yet 70 percent of those people with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder are living at home. This is made possible by the dedication of Pennsylvania's 671,000 informal caregivers – the spouses, parents, children, siblings, and friends – who in 2014 provided 765 million hours of unpaid care. That is a value of more than \$9 billion.

The focus of this year's Alzheimer's Awareness Month is on how this disease impacts our informal caregivers. While caregiving is rewarding, it is also exhausting, stressful, and financially straining, all of which can compromise the caregiver's health and well-being. Caregivers are at a greater risk for cardiovascular disease, hypertension, and depression. Stress can also affect the care recipient, because when caregivers are stressed out, it increases the chance that they will have to place their loved one in a nursing facility.

The Pennsylvania Alzheimer's Disease Planning Committee, created to develop a State plan to address the growing Alzheimer's epidemic, finalized its report last year. Among the recommendations was more caregiver support, often called respite care. Respite comes in many forms, from hiring an aide to assist with caregiving chores to having a friend or family member cook meals or run errands. Respite helps prevent caregiver burnout as it allows the caregiver to rest, rejuvenate, connect with friends, or take care of their own health needs. Respite is key to successful caregiving.

So as we raise awareness of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders this month, let us also recognize the sacrifices caregivers make to keep their loved ones at home for as long as possible, and let us also remember to offer these heroes a helping hand from time to time so they can continue the important work that they do.

So I would like to thank the House of Representatives for unanimous approval of HR 595.

And now I would like to call on Representative Bill Kortz, cochair of the Alzheimer's Caucus.

STATEMENT BY MR. KORTZ

The SPEAKER. Representative Kortz, the floor is yours.

Mr. KORTZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I want to thank my distinguished colleague and chairman, Representative Samuelson, for bringing this good resolution to the House floor. I also want to thank all my colleagues for their unanimous support, and I want to thank all the caregivers in the organization that are here with us today.

It is a very, very tough thing to do. Let there be no mistake about it: this disease, Alzheimer's disease, knows no boundaries. It does not know race, it does not know gender, it does not know age, and when it strikes, it strikes hard. And unfortunately, there are millions of people that have passed away from this disease and there are hundreds of thousands that suffer with this currently in Pennsylvania. So thank you to all the caregivers for what you do, because you are the true heroes who take care of these people that are suffering tremendously.

I lost my mother, as many of you know, 10 years and 6 months ago to this dreaded disease, and every time we talk about it and the holidays come up, as it will this year, we will talk about Mom, because we all get together with my sisters and

we always have turkey dinner because she insisted you always be together as a family on the holidays. So we continue with Mom's tradition, and she will be with us in spirit this year.

Just yesterday I was talking to a woman; Martha is her first name. She is 80 years old, and I was wishing her a happy birthday, and she relayed to me how she spent her birthday with her husband, who is in Kane Hospital suffering from Alzheimer's, so there are a lot of people out there that have this disease.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your unanimous support.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. WATSON submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, I rise today in support of HR 595, Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month, as the cochair of the Alzheimer's Caucus. Alzheimer's disease is an epidemic, plain and simple. The disease not only robs families of the loved one they used to know, but it has a drastic effect on their caregivers.

It is imperative that we, as a legislative body, pay close attention to this population and be active participants in policies to help those suffering from Alzheimer's disease, their families, and their caregivers. A few years ago I had the honor and privilege of developing legislation which ultimately led to an Executive order by former Governor Corbett to form Pennsylvania's first Alzheimer's State Planning Committee. That committee released its findings to the General Assembly in June 2014. However, we need to continue the march and not let that study collect dust on a bookshelf. We need to ensure we have the adequate programs and services, as well as a strategy for the future.

As you know, Pennsylvania currently has the fourth largest population of 65 and older. There are 280,000 people living with Alzheimer's disease in Pennsylvania – that is 10 percent of the population – not to mention the 460,000 caregivers, who are the unsung heroes, sacrificing every day and dedicating their lives to care for their loved one, many times at the expense of their own health.

Given our demographics, we need to be ahead of the game, and I believe an Alzheimer's Disease State Plan will provide us with vital information on the current care options, medical research, and policy recommendations from experts in the industry.

Ms. BISHOP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Julian Abele, HR 534.

I rise today to recognize an African-American man whose identity up until now has never really been recognized or praised by the chamber for the many contributions in this House or the award-winning architectural achievements in both the Philadelphia area and across the United States. We recognize him today.

The man I am talking about is the late Julian Abele. Julian was an accomplished architect whose works are known throughout America. Julian, of course, has awards from colleges, and went on to design and supervise the construction of the Philadelphia Museum of Art and Duke University Chapel, as well as many other outstanding buildings across these United States, done, of course, by Julian Abele.

Julian Francis Abele was the most accomplished African-American graduate of the architectural program at the University of Pennsylvania, but he received very limited recognition during his lifetime, despite the many significant contributions to the buildings and the architectural trade profession. Julian Abele conceived the Duke campus but never had an opportunity to really see it because of the segregated South and its laws. His public building designs mimicked Roman, Greek, and Renaissance architectural eras.

My resolution pays respect to Julian Abele. His vision changed the skyline of Pennsylvania and other communities across these United States. Please support my HR 534 that pays tribute to Julian Abele, the first African-American architect student, who is one of the early 20th century's most adept building designers in Pennsylvania and across the United States.

Representative Bullock, on the resolution, please.

Mrs. BULLOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to honor Mr. Julian Abele, and I thank Representative Bishop for taking the lead on this occasion.

I would like to talk a little bit more about the importance of art and architecture in our community. I am privileged to represent the 195th District, which is the proud home of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, our national treasure. As we heard about Mr. Abele's contribution to this treasure, I am reminded about how extraordinary this building is. Here we are, two and three generations later, and the museum, this great building, still captures the heart and imagination of virtually anyone who has the pleasure to visit. Its larger-than-life steps, fountains, and columns have been the backdrop to many weddings, to movies like "Rocky," and to concerts like "Made in America." It has even stood as the grand stage of the Pope's most recent visit to Philadelphia. No matter how old you are and no matter how many times you have been, a trip to the Philadelphia Museum of Art can really make you think about your place in history and in this world. Philadelphia is fortunate to host this gem, and I am proud to host it in my legislative district.

A true trailblazer and scholar, it is hard to not be reminded of Mr. Abele's contributions to Philadelphia. You might know that he attended Cheyney University before becoming the first African-American student at the University of Pennsylvania's school of architecture, and the buildings he contributed to that

dot the Philadelphia cityscape include the Free Library of Philadelphia. These iconic buildings define the richness and elegance of the Ben Franklin Parkway in Philadelphia, and his contributions to these buildings will surely inspire generations of artists and architects, particularly young design professionals of color. Julian Abele left his mark in Philadelphia both literally and figuratively, and I am humbled to pay him respect today along with my colleague, Representative Bishop.

STATEMENT BY MR. HENNESSEY

The SPEAKER. Chairman Tim Hennessey, on unanimous consent, will be speaking on HR 595. Chairman Hennessey, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. HENNESSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As chair of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, I want to thank the members for your support of HR 595 to create more awareness of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders across this Commonwealth.

We are committed to helping those who suffer from this pernicious disease and also their caregivers and their loved ones. I was honored to serve on the Alzheimer's Disease State Planning Committee, which was the brainchild of Representative Katharine Watson here in the House. We have accomplished a great deal over the past few years in developing that plan, but we have a long way to go to assist our residents, the residents suffering from Alzheimer's disease and related disorders, and also their families and caregivers. Serving on the committee to develop the State plan was an eye-opening experience, and I believe we have presented a plan to the

administration with distinct goals and direction on where we should go from here. We need to see the State plan implemented, and I am happy to be part of that ongoing process.

The Alzheimer's Association of Pennsylvania has two wonderful chapters that cover Pennsylvania. I was honored to speak at the Walk to End Alzheimer's a few weeks ago in Philadelphia, where almost 15,000 gathered at Citizens Bank Park to march in support of research to defeat this disease. There were 28 such walks across the Commonwealth in the months of September and October. I urge our citizens and our members to participate in these walks whenever you can and to contact the Alzheimer's Association chapters in Pennsylvania with any questions about the disease, about the availability of care, and any questions at all you might have with regard to Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. These chapters continue to be a wonderful resource for those living with AD/DR and for their caregivers and their families.
