STATEMENT BY MR. WHEATLEY

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair at this time recognizes Representative Wheatley to speak on his resolution, HR 598.

Mr. WHEATLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you and my colleagues for their affirmative vote on HR 598.

My resolution designated December 1 as "World AIDS Day" in Pennsylvania. World AIDS Day has been commemorated annually since 1988 to increase public awareness of the HIV (human immunodeficiency virus)/AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) pandemic and to remember the millions of individuals diagnosed with HIV and AIDS and the global challenges associated with eradicating this deadly disease.

Unfortunately, because AIDS is not in the news as much as it used to be, people believe the disease has disappeared; sadly, that is far from the truth. According to the United Nations, there were over 36.9 million people worldwide living with HIV and AIDS at the end of 2014. In that same year there was a reported 1.2 million AIDS-related deaths.

In the United States, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that nearly 1.2 million people are living with HIV, and frighteningly, 12.8 percent of those people are unaware of their infection.

This disease hits minorities the hardest. Although African-Americans represent approximately 12 percent of the United States population, they represented nearly 44 percent of the new infections in 2010. Among the States, Pennsylvania is ranked 10th highest in cumulative reported HIV cases. In addition, the State Department of Health estimated that 28 percent of the 35,219 HIV/AIDS patients in the Commonwealth had unmet needs for HIV primary medical care in 2009. It looks as if that number is starting to improve.

Thankfully, the overall number of HIV-related deaths in Pennsylvania has been declining. This is most likely the result of the use of highly effective drug therapy, as well as other improvements in HIV survival.

The theme of the 2015 World AIDS Day is, "The Time to Act Is Now," which signifies that there is no better time than right now to recommit to the goals of achieving an AIDS-free generation, to celebrate the tremendous progress that has been made in expanding access to HIV prevention, treatment, and care services, and to focus on an end to AIDS as a public health threat.

Again, I want to thank you and my colleagues for their vote on this important resolution. Prevention is important in combatting HIV and AIDS, so let us make sure people are reminded to protect themselves from this terrible disease.

On this terrible evening, 7 terrorists attacked, killed, and injured hundreds of innocent people, including citizens of 19 different nations, at a stadium, 2 restaurants, 2 bars, 1 cafe, and 1 concert hall. According to Paris officials, 129 people have died and many more have been injured. Countless families and friends are no doubt suffering as well.

These incidents are reminiscent of September 11, 2001, when our country was also victimized by the brutality of terrorism. As citizens of the United States, we truly feel the pain of the French nation. I believe it is imperative that we honor the victims of these tragic attacks and the people of Paris who must live with this aftermath, and I thank you for supporting a resolution that will communicate our sadness and support and give condolences to the victims, their families, and the residents of Paris.

Let us stand with Paris. Vive la France. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, as we discussed yesterday, we urge all Democratic members, all the members to vote "no" on HB 1618. This should remain in the control of the Governor's Office.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. O'Brien, on final passage.

Mr. O'BRIEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Let us take a moment and read from the fiscal note on this. "It is projected that the costs for the Office of State Inspector General shall increase beyond those of the current Office of

Inspector General, perhaps by as much as \$1,000,000...;" \$1 million.

It is interesting, earlier today in State Government we had a discussion on "paid for by the taxpayers of Pennsylvania," and a theme that was struck a few times was whether it is \$1, \$100,000, or \$1 million, it is the taxpayers' money. Well, we have an office here, through the Casey and Ridge and Rendell and Corbett and now the Wolf administration, that has operated seamlessly with no shame attached to it, and yet, and yet, we decide that in the midst of this budget impasse, in the midst of this agreement, that there needs to be additional funding. We choose, we choose to spend \$1 million for no apparent reason. What fiscal folly.

I will be a "no" vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Cohen, on final passage.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I join the minority leader and the Representative from Philadelphia in opposing this legislation.

This legislation takes a very good nonbureaucratic program developed by Governor Casey and followed by every other Governor of both parties and enmeshes it in bureaucracy, political dealmaking, and uncertainty. This bill is a hindrance to honest government. It is a hindrance to effective government.

I join in urging a "no" vote on this bill. Governor Wolf has indicated he will veto it. I think that is very wise of him. I think passing this is an exercise in futility. Again, I urge a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentlelady, Mrs. Fee, on final passage of her legislation.

Mrs. FEE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We are not changing what the Inspector General is doing today, so there is zero fiscal impact with this bill. But while my goal is to not impact any Democrat, any Republican, any sitting Governor, or the existing Inspector General, I, personally, am looking out for the taxpayers and the hard taxpayer dollars that are sent to Harrisburg.

So thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the lady.

The gentleman, Mr. Regan, seeks recognition on final passage of the underlying bill.

Mr. REGAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I had the privilege of serving as the Deputy Inspector General in Pennsylvania under a prior administration, and I will say that I think this is an excellent bill. I think it will certainly improve the autonomy of the Inspector General.

I know from experience that many times investigations that would arise would be run up the flagpole to the Governor's chief counsel or to the Governor himself. I do not think, in that position, the Inspector General should be impacted on which way to go or even given advice or counsel from the administration on which way to go. I think this is a very important bill to give this independence to the Inspector General so he can follow the leads wherever they may go.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.
