**SOUTHERN COLUMBIA HIGH SCHOOL
FOOTBALL TEAM PRESENTED**

Lebanon High School and Point Park University; the daughter of Effie and Paul LaQuatra, who are also here today; and she is currently the entertainment reporter for WTAE in Pittsburgh.

You may be familiar with Elena, as she was Miss Pennsylvania Outstanding Teen in 2007 and Miss Pennsylvania Teen USA in 2010, but what is even more impressive is how Elena has accomplished all of this with the complete loss of her hearing. Due to bacterial meningitis at the age of 4, she lost the hearing in both of her ears. Without the help of a cochlear implant, Elena is totally deaf. However, due to her hard work,

rehabilitation at the DePaul School for Hearing and Speech, and a loving family, Elena has never let her disability define her and she is now a role model for others.

Elena will represent Pennsylvania with pride at the 2016 Miss USA Pageant. Please join me in congratulating Elena and her family for her many accomplishments.

STATEMENT BY MR. KELLER

The SPEAKER. Representative Bill Keller is recognized on unanimous consent.

Mr. W. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As I said, currently there is much talk about Harrisburg being broken today. We hear it constantly every day, but now I will talk about one of our success stories.

This spring the EITC program, the educational improvement tax credit program, will celebrate 15 years of providing Pennsylvania children with much-needed educational opportunities. The Bridge Foundation has helped more than 14,000 families in 60 of Pennsylvania's counties to choose the best available educational opportunities for their children.

Joseph Crecelius, to my left, as the Speaker just announced, is a stellar example of how successful this public-private partnership has been in changing lives. Let me talk about Joe's success story. Six years ago Joe was a student at the Philadelphia Performing Arts Charter School. His teachers recognized his academic abilities and encouraged him to apply to the St. Joseph Prep High School. He did in fact apply and was accepted, but of course there was one big stumbling block – tuition. The search for scholarship assistance led Joe to the Bridge Foundation. Joe was lucky at the Bridge Foundation. The CSX Transportation has operations in South Philadelphia. They promptly offered their scholarship support to Joe, but his success did not end there. Joe's community rallied around him, and South Philadelphia businessmen Leon Silverman, Eli Stein, and Carmen D'Amato also offered Joe scholarship assistance.

Between the Bridge Foundation; CSX; the local businessmen; and his family, Maurice Edwards and June Crecelius, Joe was able to attend St. Joseph Prep, one of the most highly rated high schools in the State.

At the Prep Joe's academic abilities flourished. Joe kept his end of the bargain up and graduated at the Prep at the top of his class. As a result of Joe's high school academic success, he had many colleges to choose from. He chose the University of Scranton because of the university's highly rated biology department.

The story again does not end there. The Bridge Foundation put aside a little money each year for 15 years so that one day they would be able to offer a college scholarship to one of their many deserving students. I am happy to announce today that Joe has received the first Bridge Foundation college scholarship. So Joe received help from high school and now in college.

As you can see, many pieces had to fall in place to make this success story a reality. Most important in the whole story is Joe's dedication to his education. This young man worked hard to make this happen, and all of us in this chamber should take pride in knowing that we played an integral part in this success story. Joe's goal is to become a doctor. When that day comes, we should all feel we collectively changed the life of one of Pennsylvania's gifted students. Joe is truly an example that education is the key to a bright and successful future.

I would like to recognize him and his family again. And thank you all and thank you for the EITC program. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MRS. DEAN

The SPEAKER. On unanimous consent, the Chair recognizes Representative Dean to speak on HR 746.

Representative Dean. Representative Dean, the floor is yours.

Mrs. DEAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I thank my colleagues for their consideration and passage of HR 746, designating March 30, 2016, as "Pennsylvania Female Veterans Day."

Women have a long, courageous, and often unrecognized history in providing military service to our country. Women traditionally, in the olden days, served as nurses, typists, clerks, and other support roles. Prior to the Civil War, women who wanted to serve on the front lines were forced to disguise themselves as men in order to serve. It was not until the end of World War I that women were permitted in the military, and only during wartime.

With the passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act of 1948, women were finally allowed to serve as permanent members of the military and entitled to veterans benefits. In the last two decades, the value of women in the military has continued to be recognized with landmark achievements such as the first women to graduate from the Virginia Military Institute and the Citadel, the first female fighter pilots flying combat missions in Iraq, and the first woman to command a United States naval ship.

In 2015 we saw yet another extraordinary achievement for women in the military with the first female graduates of the Army's elite Ranger School as well as the Department of Defense announcing that women will be fully integrated into all positions.

The number of United States female veterans totals more than 2 million, a number which represents 10 percent of the total of all U.S. veterans, and this Commonwealth's female veterans number more than 71,000.

The selflessness and bravery that these women exhibit in keeping our country safe and protecting our freedoms does not go unnoticed and is truly humbling.

Today we rightly salute their accomplishments. Thus, I thank you, the House of Representatives, for designating March 30 as "Female Veterans Day."

And, Mr. Speaker, with your permission, with us today I am honored to tell you that we are joined by several veterans, and I would call their names and ask that they stand. They are in the back of the hall of the House. Would that be okay, Mr. Speaker? I think so.

The SPEAKER. Yes. Please proceed.

Mrs. DEAN. Thank you.

With us are Genesis Medina-Arc, private, U.S. Army; Bioncia Hooper, sergeant, U.S. Army; Janelle Spadoni, sergeant, U.S. Army; Tanna Gibble, staff sergeant, U.S. Army; Tracy Wylie-Perry, sergeant, U.S. Army retired; and they are traveling today with S. Sgt. James Simmons. Thank you, James.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It certainly is an honor to be in their presence, and I thank you for the passage of the resolution.

The SPEAKER. Representative Dean, thank you so much for bringing these outstanding individuals who serve our country, these servicewomen who serve our country on Pennsylvania Female Veterans Day. We are greatly appreciative.

My aunt, who has passed away, served during World War II in the U.S. Navy, and it was one of the greatest honors she had ever had and regularly talked about her fine experience as serving this country.

Thank you so much for being with us today and for what you do for our country.

Thank you, Representative Dean.

STATEMENT BY MS. McCLINTON

The SPEAKER. At this time the Chair calls upon Representative McClinton and Representative Kinsey. They are recognized to speak on HR 742. I know they have some guests to introduce as well.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, fellow House members, for helping Representative Kinsey and me recognize the sisters of Alpha Kappa Alpha, Inc.

For over 100 years the sisters of Alpha Kappa Alpha have lived up to their creed to cultivate and encourage high scholastic and ethical standards, to promote unity and friendship among college women, to study and help alleviate problems concerning girls and women in order to improve their social stature, to maintain a progressive interest in college life, and to be of service to all mankind.

There are currently more than 20 chapters throughout Pennsylvania, from Erie to Pittsburgh to Harrisburg to Philadelphia and its suburbs. Initiation into the sorority is an honor given to the best of today's minority women students and graduates.

Many prominent Pennsylvanians whom I know are members of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, including our Public Utility Commission chairwoman, Gladys Brown, with whom I had the pleasure of working with as counsel in the Pennsylvania Senate and who is with us today, the Reverend Lorina Marshall-Blake, the president of the Independence Blue Cross Foundation and president of Philadelphia's Omega Omega chapter.

Honorary membership is one of the highest honors for the sorority. Among those who have been granted honorary membership are Eleanor Roosevelt and the Nobel Peace Prize winner Jane Addams, whose work helped in the formation of the League of Nations, which later led to the United Nations.

Once again, thank you for your support in recognizing these leaders, and to the many members of Alpha Kappa Alpha, congratulations and thank you for your continued service and leadership.

I will now turn it over to my cosponsor.

STATEMENT BY MR. KINSEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Kinsey, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. KINSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, I want to thank Representative McClinton for taking the lead in honoring and sponsoring Alpha Kappa Alpha Day.

Mr. Speaker, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority had its humble beginnings as a vision of nine college students on the campus of Howard University in 1908, led by one of the greatest visionaries of her time, Ethel Hedgeman Lyle.

AKA, as they are affectionately known, has always been an advocate for the less fortunate and a representative for change in our community. Throughout the years the ladies of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority have instilled in its members the qualities of sisterhood and service to our community and throughout the world. The ladies of AKA Sorority are committed to scholarship, leadership, civic engagement, and public service.

Mr. Speaker, this organization has developed a distinguished list of Who's Who throughout the years, members such as Coretta Scott King, Rosa Parks, Maya Angelou, Ella Fitzgerald, C. Delores Tucker, and Marian Anderson, just to name a few. With more than a dozen chapters and over 1,000 members across our Commonwealth, the ladies of AKA still maintain their credo, "To be supreme in service to all mankind," and they do this while enriching the minds of girls and women, encouraging them to be lifelong learners.

Mr. Speaker, I ask that my colleagues join Representative McClinton and me in welcoming the ladies of AKA to the House of Representatives. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please join me in welcoming the ladies of Alpha Kappa Alpha.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representatives. We appreciate it.

STATEMENT BY MS. McCLINTON

The SPEAKER. Representative McClinton is going to be recognized now to speak on HR 741.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, fellow House members, for helping me recognize the importance of safe drinking water.

The first World Water Day was established by the United Nations more than 20 years ago. The goal then was to ensure that developing countries have access to a safe water supply. While that is still a very valuable goal, we have realized, even closer to home, that clean, safe drinking water is not guaranteed. We have all heard about the tragic lead contamination that is currently affecting the city of Flint, Michigan, but unsafe water hits even closer to home. Just last week USA Today had a report that found that Pennsylvania has the highest number of schools and day cares with high levels of lead in their drinking water. Water in Pennsylvania schools and day cares tested for high lead over 37 times during the 2012 to 2015 school years.

Locations do not make a difference, Mr. Speaker, to lead contamination either. High lead was detected in schools from Erie County in the northwest to Bucks and Chester Counties in the southeast and to Wayne County in northeastern Pennsylvania and even down to Butler County in the southwest.

Lead in drinking water for children is especially dangerous, as many studies link lead in the brain to learning disabilities and other long-term health issues.

Once again, thank you for recognizing the need for clean, safe water here in Pennsylvania and all across the globe. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you so much, Representative McClinton. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. NEUMAN

The SPEAKER. Representative Neuman is recognized on HR 750, on HR 750.

Mr. NEUMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to my colleagues for unanimously supporting a resolution that recognizes science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics for our next generation to make sure that they are being prepared to work in a global job market, to make sure that we are connecting job creators and educators so that our locals in Pennsylvania, our next generation, have jobs of the future.

So thank you for your support, and I encourage people to check out BotsIQ. It is a tournament that all our students from around the State compete in in California, Pennsylvania, and they go to a national tournament. So I encourage you to look up BotsIQ and encourage your students in your schools to participate. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

But we did not have to worry because we have a great team, and the other coaches stepped up to help out in place of Robert in his time of need and actually players came and helped coach the team that weekend. So we had national champion coaches and players helping us to participate in our sport. So they are a great team and they really help one another.

WHEREAS, The East Stroudsburg University Field Hockey Team is being honored upon capturing the 2015 NCAA Division II Field Hockey Championship; and

REMARKS BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. Today we bid farewell to a friend, colleague, family man, and a great person. Our deepest sympathies are with the family and friends of Hal Roach, particularly his wife, who serves this House of Representatives as well.

We mourn Hal's loss by celebrating his life. Many of us knew him as the Director of Security and Safety for our House. He can best be described as a person who enjoyed the job and took it seriously. For many of us as we came through this door here to my left, he was the first person to greet us when we entered the hall of the House. His "good morning" or "good afternoon" put things in the proper perspective. He was a consummate people person. He had a great smile, was warm and gracious. He always put people at ease because he treated everybody with respect and dignity. He would help to show our guests where to sit, always very helpful. He was a stickler for the rules, thank goodness. If you were a staff member, he checked your badge. If you were a guest, he checked the list to make sure you were on it. He was determined to make sure that things were safe but that they were also smooth and professional.

He enjoyed listening to the debates on the House floor. He would inform members in the anterooms of what bills were running. This was a man that cared about this institution deeply. I could not believe it when I had heard that he passed away because I had just seen his great smile the day before.

He often spoke about his wife, Jenifer; his daughter, Heather; and sons, Harold, known as H.M., and Patrick. Could you please stand at this time. Thank you. To you, Jenifer – Jenifer works in inventory for our House – and to your daughter, Heather, and her husband, Brian; your son, Patrick, and his fiancée, Amanda, and I know we also have friends here, Paul and Carol Deibert; their son, Steve. God bless each and every one of you.

Hal was an inspiration. He was a person of faith and lived life serving others. He will be sorely missed by this great institution.

I would like to invite up to our podium here Representative Knowles, Representative Tobash, Representative Neal Goodman, and Representative Sue Helm, I believe, also. If they could come up to the podium, and I think Representative Knowles and Representative Tobash have a few words, but if the other two members could come up behind them as well, I would appreciate it.

REMARKS BY MR. TOBASH

The SPEAKER. Representative Tobash.

Mr. TOBASH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Harold Roach, Hal, captain in the Pennsylvania Air National Guard, Ready Reserves, a major in the Civil Air Patrol, Upper Bern Township chief of police, and our Director of Safety and Security.

So Hal, he was a serious guy when we came on the floor, and he was often a man of very few words, but as the Speaker mentioned, you know, a really inspiring smile. But you know, when you caught him on the right day or, really, when you hit his hot button – riding his motorcycle – his eyes would light up, I tell you. And when it was a day like today, you know, a little

colder than I think you should be on a motorcycle but it was sunny outside, it was not raining, and he talked about the ride from Schuylkill County down here, it really, really brought him happiness.

And his life, you know, was not always happiness. I mean, I got that. It was soon after I was elected into this House of Representatives that he informed me that your mom had passed away, Martina, and he lost a son in Timothy, and I could see how that wore on him. And then, you know, with you guys, with Heather and Harold and Patrick, he had happiness and he had renewed happiness in his new wife, in Jenifer. So you know, I got to see those different sides of Hal.

We had an incident a couple years ago in the district, and Hal really was steadfast in his commitment to security, and I have to tell you that my staff felt so secure. The confidence that he instilled made everybody feel certainly much better, so we appreciated that work.

You know, as much as he loved riding his motorcycle and the happiness that he found, I have to tell you that he really loved working with all of you. He was really honored to be working with such an outstanding group.

So certainly here we will continue to miss Hal's watchful eye, and we are happy for what he brought into the House of Representatives.

REMARKS BY MR. KNOWLES

The SPEAKER. Representative Knowles.

Mr. KNOWLES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Hal Roach was a very special guy. There were four things that he was proud of: He was proud of his family, he was proud of the fact that he was a cop, he was proud of the fact that he was a Skook – for those of you that do not know what a Skook is, a Schuylkill County person is a Skook – and he was very proud of the fact that he was in charge of security here.

Hal, when he would speak to the guests, the pride that he had in this institution showed. He was very respectful but he was very certain, to be sure, that people behaved themselves when they were guests in this chamber. I can remember – and I would give Hal a hard time; I guess you cannot believe that – but I remember one time he was standing over there and Speaker Turzai came on the floor, and he said, "The Speaker is on the floor." I said, "Who the heck are you talking to, Hal?" But he took great pride, he took great pride in that job.

He and I became friends, he and I became friends through the years. He was kind enough – this was the kind of guy he was – he said, "Here, I want to give you my personal cell number so that when you're coming down from Schuylkill County" – this was when he lived up home in Schuylkill Haven – he said, "if you have any problems or any questions about the roads, feel free to give me a call and I can let you know how things are," because he would generally be heading on down before I would.

But when I would bring guests on the floor if Hal was here, I would say "Hal, tell them a little bit about this chamber." He was so knowledgeable of this chamber. I mean, we have our tours, the tour people who give tours, but when it came to this chamber, nobody knew more about the history and about the different elements of this chamber than Hal Roach.

So, Mr. Speaker, I thank you for allowing me to say a few words. Hal was a friend, he was a very special guy, who will be sorely missed by all of us here in the House of Representatives. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you.

REMARKS BY MR. GOODMAN

The SPEAKER. Representative Goodman or Representative Helm?

Representative Goodman.

Mr. GOODMAN. I think that my colleagues have summed it up very well. I know that all of us miss Hal, and especially that constant reminder that when you walk in – my office is out through this door – he was always the first person that you saw with a smile on his face when you came onto the floor and he was always the last person as you were walking off.

And we often shared, as Jerry and Mike had mentioned, you know, the different things that were going on in Schuylkill County – what the weather was like and the different events that were going on and how our different athletic teams were doing – and as Mike mentioned, on a day like today he would absolutely love to drive down on a motorcycle.

Hal was just one of those guys that you meet that never seems to have a bad day. We all know that he was struggling with his health before his passing, but it just never seemed to faze him. He was just one of those guys that whenever you met him, he always had a smile on his face, he always said good morning, and he always meant it.

I rode up with Hal on the day that he passed, and he had mentioned that it was going to be snowing back in the district. I was shocked when I had heard of his loss, but I think those of us who were able to attend the funeral up in Schuylkill Haven saw that not only was he someone whom we all cared about very much here, but in his own community, the showing of support by the law enforcement officers up there, and just everybody. I mean, he was a special man. And if they say when you go that you will be remembered as being a great guy, that is something to be remembered. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

REMARKS BY MS. HELM

The SPEAKER. Representative Helm.

Ms. HELM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Hal Roach, what a friend, what a gentleman. We all loved him in here. He was only my constituent for a short time, but he was always here for me. We always had questions, and he always knew the answers. So we felt comfortable going to him to ask him a question. We are also lucky to have worked with him and to have shared his life. We will always miss him and thank you so much. We were just so fortunate to have him here with us for the time that we did. We will miss him forever, and thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representatives.

Section 1. Sections 1.1 and 7 of the act of May 3, 1933 (P.L.242, No.86), referred to as the Cosmetology Law, amended or added June 30, 1984 (P.L.479, No.100), are amended to read:

Section 1.1. Membership of Board.—(a) The board shall consist of [thirteen] nine members: [the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs; the Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection in the Office of Attorney General, or his designee; three public members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, which members shall represent the public at large; and eight professional members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, which members have had at least five years practical and/or managerial experience in the majority of the practices of cosmetology and shall be actively engaged in the profession.] four members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, with one member appointed by the President pro tempore of the Senate, one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one member appointed by the Majority Leader of the House of Representatives and one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives. No [more than one professional] member shall be currently employed as a vocational education teacher of cosmetology in the public schools. No more than two [professional] members of the board shall be currently affiliated with a private school of cosmetology. No other person who has been affiliated with a private cosmetology school within three years prior to nomination may be nominated. Members currently serving on the board shall continue to serve until the expiration of their terms and until successors are appointed and qualified according to law, but for no longer than six months.

(b) [Professional and public members appointed after the expiration of the terms of current board members shall serve the following terms: two professional members and one public member shall serve one year; two professional members and one public member shall serve two years; and two professional members and one public member shall serve three years. Thereafter, professional and public members] Members shall serve three-year terms. No member may serve more than two consecutive terms.

(c) [Seven] Five members of the board shall constitute a quorum. The board shall select, from among their number, a chairman, a vice chairman and a secretary.

(d) Each [public and professional] member of the board shall be paid reasonable traveling, hotel and other necessary expenses and per diem compensation at the rate of sixty dollars (\$60) for each day of actual service while on board business.

(e) A member who fails to attend three consecutive meetings shall forfeit his seat unless the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs, upon written request from the member, finds that the member should be excused from a meeting because of illness or the death of an immediate family member.

(f) In the event that a member of the board dies or resigns during the term of office, a successor shall be appointed in the same way and with the same qualifications as set forth in subsections (a) and (b) and shall hold office for the unexpired term.
