Dear Speaker Turzai:

Please accept this letter as notice of my resignation from my position as Pennsylvania State Representative of the 168th Legislative District. My last day in office will be May 10, 2016.

As you are aware, I was elected State Senator of the 9th Senatorial District on April 26, 2016 and will be sworn into office on May 11, 2016.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time serving as a State Representative in the House of Representatives since June of 2003. It has been a privilege working with so many other members and staff throughout the last 13 years and I am grateful for the opportunity that I have had to serve the constituents of the 168th Legislative District.

An Act amending the act of March 26, 1903 (P.L.71, No.71), entitled "An act relating to the location, construction and maintenance of viaducts and bridges in cities and adjacent territory; empowering the several cities of this Commonwealth to construct, or have constructed, bridges or viaducts over rivers, creeks, streams, railroads and private lands, or over and across any of them, for public highways, and to procure locations therefor by purchase or condemnation proceedings, whether the same be wholly within, or partly within and partly without, the city limits; authorizing said cities to unite and enter into a contract or contracts with the county commissioners of the proper county, and with railroad, street railway, and other companies and parties interested, or with any of them, for the erection, construction and maintenance of said viaducts and bridges, and for the payment of the damages caused by their location and erection; and forbidding any railroad company to pass under any such viaduct or bridge, without contributing to the cost of maintenance thereof," repealing provisions relating to contracts with railroads for maintenance of viaducts and bridges.

BAYARD RUSTIN HIGH SCHOOL ICE HOCKEY TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Truitt, the floor is yours, sir. Mr. TRUITT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is my pleasure to be here today to recognize the accomplishments of the Bayard Rustin High School Golden Knights Ice Hockey Team. Now, I have not presented – brought too many sports teams in here over my 5 years as a legislator, but I really think what these guys have accomplished is really special.

Think about the sport of ice hockey. Now, if you are playing baseball or if you are watching a baseball game and a player gets hit by a pitch going about 100 miles an hour, everybody in the audience goes "ooh," you know, they know that that probably hurt. Well, the goalie for this team, he is somewhere in the back, we looked it up on the Internet today, sometimes the hockey puck is going 100 miles an hour and his job is to get in front of that thing.

If you watch football, you will see that when a player gets tackled, he gets knocked down and he falls down onto the grass, which might not be too soft. But in ice hockey they call it checking, right? And when you check somebody, they usually smash them into a wall. That is pretty tough.

And I just learned from Coach Russo that when the players are on the ice – if you have ever noticed, an ice hockey game moves at a really, really fast pace – the players can only stay on the ice for about a minute at a time. It is a tough sport. It is a sport that I never played myself. So I was really impressed that these guys won the State championship, not once, not twice, but three times. So I hope that all of you will recognize how tough these guys are. Their colleagues are in the back left corner of the room. Coach Russo obviously does a fantastic job to get these guys to three State championships, and I hope that you will all give this team a big round of applause.

Mr. Speaker, dedication and hard work is the only way you get here to become a State champion, but like Representative Truitt said, they just did not win one State championship, they won three. Most of us have never won a State championship in our life. I know I never did and I would have loved the honor. But these are very, very exceptional, hardworking young men, and we just want to add our congratulations to the long list of people that have congratulated them over the past 3 years. They truly are champions in every way, shape, and form.

If we could, could we give our team here, the Rustin High School Ice Hockey Team, three-time State championship, can we give them a true House of Representatives welcome.

The SPEAKER. Yes; the rest of the teammates, they are in the back. Thank you for standing up. This whole group is the State champions. Really exciting. Thank you.

MACKENZIE BART PRESENTED

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to recognize Mackenzie Bart, an extraordinary young woman from Brockway, Pennsylvania, who has brought honor to herself, her family, her community, and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Mackenzie is a senior at Ohio State University studying to become a broadcast meteorologist. Yet it is her passion for education and her compassion for people that are an inspiration, that have earned her nationwide as well as international acclaim.

Prior to beginning her senior year at the Ohio State University, Mackenzie put herself and her talents before the people of Ohio and was named Miss Ohio. She served as Miss Ohio in 2014 and had the opportunity to compete in the prestigious Miss America scholarship competition. She represented her Pennsylvania roots well, winning a preliminary talent award and earned a position in the final top 10 at Miss America.

Mackenzie also won a STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics – scholarship and a grand total of about \$39,000 in scholarship moneys to fund her education. She had a multitude of other award-winning experiences during that memorable year, including winning the gold Duke of Edinburgh Award, an international award founded on the premise of empowering youth to grow and achieve, presented by Her Royal Highness Princess Anne at the British Embassy in Washington, DC.

After Miss America and stops for appearances on national television shows, Mackenzie committed to her year of service as Miss Ohio by traveling over 38,000 miles to visit, among other places, every single children's hospital and veterans home in the State of Ohio. And let me tell you, I have seen what she can do to bring smiles on the faces of children and anyone who watches her perform her ventriloquist acts. And as somebody who has been in a military hospital and miles away from anybody and family or people who had a personal connection, having someone like Mackenzie come in and perform in the way of those of us who are old enough to remember the Bob

Hope shows for our veterans overseas, they know how important that is that these veterans get the chance to talk about something other than their hospital environments, and the same thing goes for the children. I have no doubt that her time has lifted both hearts and spirits. She also educated many students about STEM, a topic that aligns with her career path and her dedication to service.

STATEMENT BY MRS. HILL

The SPEAKER. Representative Phillips-Hill, on HR 863.

Mrs. HILL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Before I begin, please join me again in welcoming Justin Shopp and his mom, Josette, who are seated in the back of the House, and his dad, Brad Shopp, who is up in the gallery. Thank you.

I rise today to thank you all for your support of HR 863, which recognizes May as "Cystic Fibrosis Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. CF, as it is commonly referred, is an inherited chronic disease that affects the lungs and digestive system of about 30,000 children and adults in the United States and 70,000 people around the world. There was a time not too long ago when children with cystic fibrosis did not live to attend elementary school. Today advances in research and medical treatments have further enhanced and extended life for children and adults with cystic fibrosis to the point where elementary school is an afterthought and just another step along the path to a very successful life living with a diagnosis of cystic fibrosis.

Cystic fibrosis is a progressive, genetic disease that causes persistent lung infections and limits the ability to breathe air over time. This defective gene and its protein product causes the clogging of the lungs and obstruction of the pancreas, which stops natural enzymes from helping the body break down and absorb food.

Research has made incredible strides in the fight against cystic fibrosis, and today it is our great pleasure to recognize people like the Shoppes, who not only deal with but live successfully with cystic fibrosis every day.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt, on HR 820.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, as our U.S. military continues drawing down the number of military personnel in harm's way overseas, our task here on the home front will grow more challenging. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, as many as one in five veterans from the conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq will suffer from a wound not visible to the naked eye.

Mr. Speaker, post-traumatic stress disorder can occur to anyone placed in a stressful situation, and few people experience as many of these situations as our military personnel. These men and women, whether they have witnessed combat or not, know that they are one directive, one order away from a

mission that will expose them to horrible and life-threatening experiences. Many have been shot at or watched a buddy hit or killed. Any of these events can lead to post-traumatic stress disorder.

Symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder are as varied as they are crippling. People with post-traumatic stress disorder repeatedly relive the ordeal through thoughts and memories of the trauma. These may include flashbacks, hallucinations, and nightmares. They also may feel great distress when certain things remind them of the trauma, such as the anniversary date of the event, certain smells such as the smell of diesel fuel, or even weather conditions.

Mr. Speaker, many military personnel who suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder do not like being touched on the back or loud sounds such as doors slamming or books dropping to the floor. Those suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder may avoid people, places, thoughts, or situations that may remind him or her of the trauma. This can lead to feelings of detachment and isolation from family and friends, as well as a loss of interest in activities that the person once enjoyed.

Mr. Speaker, I remind my colleagues that on the average, two veterans every day take their lives as a result of mistreated or untreated conditions of post-traumatic stress or other mental health or emotional challenges that a veteran has experienced.

Mr. Speaker, our veterans can also experience excessive emotions; problems relating to others, showing affection; difficulty falling or staying asleep; irritability; outbursts of anger; difficulty concentrating; and being jumpy or easily startled. The person may also suffer physical symptoms, such as increased blood pressure and heart rate, rapid breathing, muscle tension, and nausea.

As legislators, it is our responsibility to make sure that we take care of those who have sacrificed so much for us, and that includes drawing attention to their problems as we search for ways to help them transition back into civilian life. That is why I thank my colleagues for passing HR 820 to declare May "Military Service-Related Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder Month" in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. We owe this small token to our soldiers, sailors, marines, airmen, and coastguardsmen.

STATEMENT BY MRS. DEAN

The SPEAKER. Representatives Dean and Bullock are recognized to speak on HR 881.

You may proceed, Representative Dean.

Mrs. DEAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am delighted to stand here with my colleague from Philadelphia County to thank you, all of you, for the unanimous passage of HR 881, designating the month of May as "Bike Month," the week of May 16 as "Bike to Work Week," and this Friday as "Bike to Work Day" in Pennsylvania.

And to those of you who participated in the executive ride this morning around the Capitol in Harrisburg, did we not have some fun? Come on, Dave.

We all know that riding a bicycle is an excellent form of exercise with so many benefits. Bicycling is—

The SPEAKER. Representative Dean, please suspend for just a moment.

Mrs. DEAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Bicycling improves mental and physical health. It is part of a healthy lifestyle for men, women, and children to travel for recreation and fun but also to travel to work or to school.

We know that bicycle riders and motor vehicle operators share many of the same roads, so through this resolution, what we are trying to accomplish is to ensure everyone's safety by educating cyclists and motorists regarding the proper and safe operations of bicycles.

It is a great way to improve air quality and reduce traffic. Just ask my husband, who commutes from our home in Abington, Montgomery County, to his work in Northeast Philadelphia by bicycle any day he can. In full disclosure, he is commuting to where he sells bicycles. And bicycle commuting benefits both employees and employers. My district, this week, will participate in bike to work on Thursday.

Bicycling is also good for the economy. We know that millennials demand bicycling and pedestrian-safe communities and they will move there. That is why I am proud that Pennsylvania is a leader in developing more bicycle and pedestrian ways. The League of American Bicyclists noted that the communities of Franklin, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, State College, and York have made an investment in their communities by strengthening bicycling infrastructure in their regions and have designated them bicycle-friendly communities, and that is because of your leadership. With Act 89, Pennsylvania became an important part of this smart investment with multimodal funding.

So, Mr. Speaker, I thank you for recognizing me. I thank my colleagues for the unanimous passage of this resolution. And I have to say, I was on my bicycle ride this morning and I thought, you know what? The bicycle is symbolic. You know what? On a bicycle to move forward, you have to be pedaling and you need balance, and Harrisburg is no different. So I hope my House and Senate colleagues and the administration find the needed balance that we need as we bridge our differences for the common good and put together a balanced budget that puts the wind at the back of working Pennsylvanians.

STATEMENT BY MRS. BULLOCK

The SPEAKER. Representative Bullock, you are recognized.

Mrs. BULLOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to also express my support for Representative Dean's HR 881, recognizing May 2016 as "Bike Month," the week of May 16 through 20 as "Bike to Work Week," and specifically May 20 as "Bike to Work Day" here in Pennsylvania. I thank all of my colleagues for their support of this important measure.

As Representative Dean had mentioned, the resolution serves as a reminder that riding a bike is not only a wonderful way to help us get exercise but also cuts down on costs and the pollution of driving a car. People who bike to work save hundreds of dollars a year in fuel costs, reduce traffic congestion, and improve air quality in our communities. In fact,

a new study shows that bicycling could help cut carbon emissions from urban transportation by more than 11 percent. At a time when we are all so reliant on our cars, we really should be considering the more environmentally friendly ways of commuting.

Thankfully, more and more Pennsylvanians seem to understand the benefits of cycling. The bicycle commuting community in Pennsylvania has increased by more than 100 percent from 2005 to 2013. In my home city of Philadelphia, it has increased by a whopping 296 percent in the last decade.

I am particularly proud of Philadelphia, which has done its part to help boost bicycle ridership by launching its own citywide bike share program called Indego. This program has been very popular, with over 500 bikes throughout the city and more than 60 stations throughout our neighborhoods. I hope to see more programs like this replicated in our State and throughout our country.

I encourage everyone to take advantage of the many bike races and other events that are occurring throughout our State this month and throughout the summer. They provide a wonderful way to see Pennsylvania's beautiful scenery and to build camaraderie among friends and neighbors taking part in these events.

This weekend I will be sharing with a bike giveaway program in my district with the Strawberry Mansion Faith Based Coalition. In June I look forward to partnering with the Philadelphia Town Watch to host a Bike Ride for Peace throughout my district. These are just some examples, but I hope everyone will take a look at a similar way that they can also get out on their bikes in their communities.

Thanks again for your support of HR 881, and I look forward to raising awareness of Bike Month with my colleague, Representative Dean. I thank you for your time.

STATEMENT BY MRS. WARD

The SPEAKER. On unanimous consent, the Speaker recognizes Representative Judy Ward.

Mrs. WARD. I would like to thank the members for their support of HB 498 to allow newborns to be screened for NKH (nonketotic hyperglycinemia). NKH is known as glycine encephalopathy, a severe and rare disorder. The condition impairs nervous tissue, including the brain, leading to symptoms such as seizures, breathing and feeding difficulties, muscle limpness, and lethargy. This disorder usually becomes apparent soon after birth, but sometimes symptoms start to arise in later infancy or rarely in childhood or adulthood. It affects boys as often as girls. Unfortunately, the condition is not currently

curable, though treatments help limit the severity of certain symptoms. Through ongoing research, scientists hope to develop better treatments for this devastating disorder.

This legislation was introduced last session by my predecessor, Representative Jerry Stern of Blair County, after a grandmother in our district, Penny Brunner, asked him to introduce a bill to add testing for NKH as part of the newborn screening profile. Penny's grandson, Miles, was a beautiful newborn that unknowingly suffered from NKH. Because it went undetected, he currently suffers from severe mental and physical disabilities. Penny has created a charitable foundation called Smiles for Miles to create awareness for this disease.

This legislation, without a doubt, will save lives for newborns who can be screened and treated for this disabling and life-threatening disorder. Thank you very much.
