#### THE SPEAKER (MIKE TURZAI) PRESIDING

#### PRAYER

The SPEAKER. The prayer today will be offered by Pastor Stephen Rhoads of the Brooklyn Tabernacle, and he is a guest of Representative Bryan Barbin, our friend and colleague. Pastor Rhoads is with the Billy Graham Evangelical Institute, and I wanted to let you know that on September 15, Franklin Graham of the Billy Graham Evangelical Institute and Billy Graham's son and a well-noted pastor in his own right will be on the Capitol steps on September 15.

So at this time I would ask all guests and members to please stand.

And, Pastor Rhoads, the rostrum is yours.

PASTOR STEPHEN RHOADS, Guest Chaplain of the House of Representatives, offered the following prayer:

Thank you.

Let us pray:

Lord, we give You thanks at the beginning of this day and lift our eyes to You. Before we do anything, Lord, we give You praise that we woke up this morning with enough to eat and a place to sleep. So we submit ourselves to You and surrender to You and ask You for wisdom. I ask You for wisdom for my brothers and sisters here, that You would direct our eyes toward You, that You would free us from looking down in ourselves because no good thing rests in us but only rests in You as the author and finisher of our faith.

We ask that You would grant wisdom. We ask that You would grant courage, give understanding and spiritual insight, give discernment, Lord, to those that You have placed in this House. We ask that You would give them a boldness and a recognition of our dependence on You, because we need You. For all of the votes and the concerns and the conversations that will happen around legislation, Lord, that You would bring us back to fixing our eyes on You only. So I ask for each one in here that You would protect their position, that You would protect their families, and that You would grant us favor in this great State of Pennsylvania.

In this great State of Pennsylvania, Lord, I ask that You would grant favor and that Your grace would shine on this State, that this State would be known as a State that honors You and that respects You and that looks to You. But only You can do this, Lord, in our hearts. We are asking for something spiritual and something important and something permanent in this State. Wake this State up, Lord, to all that You have for it.

And we thank You that You answer prayer. We thank You that Your ear is inclined to our cry. We thank You that when we call on Your name, You answer. You promised that in any day of trouble we can call on You and You will answer, and we thank You for that.

So for all that we have asked and all that is ahead, just this day, we ask for Your favor and Your mercy, and we thank You for Your kindness on this body and on this State. We thank You for all of this and praise Your name. In Jesus' name. Amen.

## STATEMENT BY MS. ARTIS

Today I am honored to welcome some special youngsters who are here from the Houston School. Can they please stand along with the faculty? They are here with us today in the House chamber. I would also like to give a special acknowledgment to Ezechial Thurman, who is a music teacher for these young people; Reginald Day, who is Assistant Dean at Houston School, as well as David Bradley, founding director of LiveConnections. Please welcome the students from Houston School in the West Mount Airy neighborhood of Philadelphia, which is in my district. They are here, along with their faculty members from the school, as well as artists from LiveConnections, a music nonprofit in Philadelphia.

The students let their creativity shine by collaborating with LiveConnections on a yearlong project. The end result is a CD (compact disk) entitled "A Day in My Life." Every student from kindergarten to eighth grade contributed to this project. They wrote songs and poems, composed music, created a dance video, and performed the songs on the CD. Their songs express their powerful social conscience, strong ties to family ancestry, and big questions about the future.

Too many schools in Philadelphia and the Commonwealth are without strong arts programs. This program shows the power that high-quality arts programs have to motivate engaged learning, creativity, and critical thinking. It demonstrates the excellence that results when community partners like LiveConnections commit to supporting public education.

Each of you will have a CD that will be delivered to your office today. Let it be a reminder of these young people's outstanding contributions and how it is important to support arts in our schools. Let it also show what the children of Pennsylvania can achieve when they all have the power to be innovators, artists, musicians, and thinkers.

I also would like to note that these students will be in the east rotunda to perform from 12 to 1 today with a little bit of excerpts from the CD. So I please encourage all of my colleagues to go down and see our young people and encourage them and go out and give them a handshake. Thank you.

**BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION**

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 835, PN 3192**, entitled:

An Act designating a portion of State Route 74 in Cumberland County as the Marine Lance Corporal Gary Lee Ream Memorial Highway.

On the question,  
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?  
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.  
The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representative Steve Bloom has the floor.

Mr. BLOOM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to ask my colleagues for unanimous support of HB 835, which would name a portion of State Route 74 in Cumberland County in the memory of a Marine who gave his life while serving our country in Vietnam.

Marine LCpl. Gary Lee Ream was born on July 25, 1945, in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. He attended Carlisle High School and upon graduation followed a family legacy and entered the United States Marine Corps, where he served for 2 years.

Corporal Ream was stationed in the Quang Nam Province in the Republic of Vietnam as part of the 1st Platoon, C Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division.

The morning of November 3, 1966, was cool and rainy. Corporal Ream was serving as point man of a combat patrol near Hoi An. He was 20 years old. The patrol soon encountered an enemy lookout, a Viet Cong guerrilla who took off running toward a nearby village. Corporal Ream and the other Marine on point immediately gave chase, cutting the guerrilla off near a stand of pines. In the words of a fellow Marine who was on patrol with Corporal Ream that day, "It was here that all hell broke loose. They had walked right into an ambush in the pines – walked, hell, they ran right into it." Within seconds, Corporal Ream was hit and killed by enemy rifle and machine gun fire.

The job of the Viet Cong guerrilla had been to lure the entire American patrol into the deadly trap, but he failed because of the heroic actions of Corporal Ream. Again, in the words of another member of the patrol, "...these two Marines saved the rest of the squad from...walking into this ambush."

Lance Corporal Ream made the ultimate sacrifice for our nation in Vietnam. He was the recipient of numerous medals and commendations during and after his service. He may no longer be with us, but his bravery and his memory live on. There is no one who knows this better than his family.

FAMILY INTRODUCED

Mr. BLOOM. Please allow me to introduce the members of Corporal Ream's family who are here with us today. Seated to the left of the Speaker are his sisters, Jo Ann Layne, Jody Sollenberger; his brother, Wally Ream; his brother-in-law and niece and nephews, Earl Sollenberger, Toye Smith, Ronald Wilson, Jeffrey Ream, and Garyt Smith. Please join me in honoring their brother's sacrifice.

Mr. Speaker, it has been almost five decades since Corporal Ream gave his life, but what he did for us and his country should never be forgotten. Naming this stretch of roadway in his honor will ensure that he and his sacrifices will be remembered for generations to come.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you again to my colleagues for your support of HB 835.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Members, we would ask that everybody please stand in a moment of silence for the fallen Marine.

(Whereupon, the members of the House and all visitors stood in a moment of silence in solemn respect to the memory of LCpl. Gary Lee Ream.)

Will the House concur in Senate amendments?

The SPEAKER. Moved by the gentleman, Representative Ross, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Chair recognizes Representative Ross for a description of the Senate amendments and any remarks on the bill.

Members, please take your seats. The floor is Representative Ross'.

Mr. ROSS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HB 1690, the language that we sent over was removed and replaced by language as follows: language that includes and creates a wine-expanded permit that permits sale of wine from restaurants and hotels in the quantity of up to four bottles to go. There is language that provides for the direct shipment of wine to Pennsylvania consumers.

There are a series of changes to the State store system, including allowing the State stores to have the ability to open on holidays; to accomplish lottery sales at the State stores; to create customer loyalty programs, including coupons and sales.

The legislation creates a new casino liquor license.

It contains the language from House bills that we had previously passed over to the Senate, including HB 619 and HB 770. HB 619 adds an institution of higher education for a wine auction permit, and HB 770, which allows for the establishment of Mug Clubs, and there were changes to that bill as it was adopted in this language, by removing the allowance for food as part of the discount and also requiring that there be a mug per member.

Also HB 657, which permits a ski resort to hold a retail liquor license that is more broad than the current one, and under local option, allowing a referendum to take place to allow voters to make the determination whether or not a ski resort may be issued a liquor license in an otherwise dry township.

HB 1196, which clarifies franchise territories for beer and permits a territory to contain counties which are contiguous with one another. That is also a slight change from the language that we had in the earlier bill.

HB 1273, that allows for wine to be given at check-in at a bed and breakfast.

HB 1204, which permits limited wineries to hold and operate a restaurant liquor license at one of its additional board-approved locations.

We also expanded the eligible entities for special occasion permits, which earlier had been passed in other legislation out of the House, including ones for the Pittsburgh Development Corporation, neighborhood architectural nonprofits and municipalities, volunteer rescue organizations, Boy Scouts of America, Allan's Hope, achromatopsia, East Falls CDC (Community Development Corporation), Red Cross, North Light Community Center, neighborhood improvement district management associations.

We also codified the current Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board process regarding the liquid fuels exclusion under the existing code.

We create a license auction for restaurant licenses not renewed or revoked by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board.

We provide parity for our local wineries, distilleries, and breweries.

And we create a wine and spirits wholesale and retail privatization commission for an evaluation of the Commonwealth's liquor system.

That is a summary of the changes that are in the bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

#### VOTE STRICKEN

The SPEAKER. Wait, please. Strike the vote.

Representative DiGirolamo would like to have the floor.

Sir, you have the floor.

Mr. DiGIROLAMO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is not going to be a long speech. I have talked on this issue four or five times in the last 5 or 6 years. Around the State of Pennsylvania the Governor has had discussion, round-table discussion, on this heroin and prescription drug epidemic that we had. Our policy committee just had a hearing and it is a big problem. But I just want to remind the members that alcohol, alcohol by far is the most abused drug in this State and across this country, Mr. Speaker; the most abused drug.

And in the past, groups like the Fraternal Order of Police, the Chiefs of Police Association, the professional firefighters have put letters out opposing this kind of expansion of alcohol. We are going, Mr. Speaker, from 620 State stores that sell alcohol across the State of Pennsylvania to potentially 15,000 to 20,000 outlets that will now be allowed to sell alcohol; 15,000 to 20,000. Is that what we need for our State of Pennsylvania, Mr. Speaker? I do not think so.

I ask for a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. Representative James.

Mr. JAMES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand before you today in support of the House bill for a couple of, I think, very solid reasons. Since I have been elected to this office, I have had constituents back in my district, much like many of you have, very concerned and very curious as to why Pennsylvania operates the way they do. This usually follows somebody's vacation to any of 48 other States.

So what we are trying to do today is exactly what my constituents would like to see take place. This is the ability to purchase wine in grocery stores and to purchase four bottles of wine for personal consumption in restaurants. This is the direct shipment of wine to their homes from any State – Washington, New York, California, etc.

State stores will be able to stay open on holidays, so on the Fourth of July, for instance, which is right around the corner, our constituents will be able to purchase beverages for their activities without having to drive over the border, the famous border bleed.

We will have the ability to have special occasion events in support of organizations such as Red Cross or Boy Scouts, any volunteer organizations that are trying to do fundraising for local events.

So in short, this is what my constituents have asked for, and I ask all of you for your "yes" vote on this important bill.

This is a long time in coming. This bill has been worked on for over 5 years, and there has been a cooperation between both sides, both of our leaders on both sides, a lot of members putting input. There are actually over 15 bills that are combined into this bill, so it addresses a lot of concerns that our members have had over the years.

Again, as you know, I have been working on this for several years, and it is very rare that the Speaker and I agree on a liquor issue, but we do now. So I am asking all of you, again, to please support this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Costa.

Does anybody else wish to be recognized?

Representative Vitali, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the maker of the bill stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. If I may—

Mr. VITALI. Let me rephrase that. Will the chairman of the Liquor Committee from Chester County stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. He has agreed to do so, and you may proceed with interrogation.

Mr. VITALI. I just want to follow up on one of the statements made by the gentleman from Bucks County with regard to, I think he said 12,000 new locations that – maybe you said 1,200 – new locations where liquor will be sold. Could you just thresh that point out a little bit? If this bill becomes law, could you outline the places where liquor will be able to be sold that cannot be sold now?

Mr. ROSS. With all due respect to my colleague from Bucks County, I would have to disagree and say that I would not think there would be any new locations, because in order to use the wine-expanded permit, you have to buy a restaurant license, and the restaurant license already allows you to serve alcohol. So you are just transforming the place where you serve alcohol from one location to another. So I do not want to speak for him, but I am not quite sure what – I do not see any new locations being offered here.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Vitali.

In licenses and regulations, liquor, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages, further providing for license districts, periods and hearings, for issuance, transfer or extension of hotel, restaurant and club liquor licenses; further providing for liquor licensees and restrictions, for special occasion permits, for wine option permits, for liquor importers' licenses, fees, privileges and restrictions and for interlocking business prohibited; providing for wine expanded permits and for casino liquor licenses; further providing for malt and brewed beverages manufacturers', distributors' and importing distributors' licenses, for malt and brewed beverages retail licenses, for application for distributors', importing distributors' and retail dispensers' licenses, for distributors' and importing distributors' restrictions on sales, storage, etc., for retail dispensers' restrictions on purchases and sales, for interlocking business prohibited and for breweries; establishing the Pennsylvania Malt and Brewed Beverages Industry Promotion Board; further providing for limiting number of retail licenses to be issued in each county, for incorporated units of national veterans' organizations, for licenses not assignable and transfers and for renewal of licenses and temporary provisions for licensees in armed services; providing for license auction; further providing for responsible alcohol management, for local option, for public record, for surrender of restaurant, eating place retail dispenser, hotel, importing distributor and distributor license for benefit of licensee and for shipment of wine into Commonwealth; providing for Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Board; and further providing for unlawful acts relative to liquor, alcohol and liquor licensees, for unlawful acts relative to liquor, malt and brewed beverages and licensees and for identification cards, licensees and State Liquor Store Employees saved from prosecution. In distilleries, wineries, bonded warehouses, bailees for hire and transporters for hire, further providing for limited wineries and for distilleries. Establishing a wine and spirits wholesale and retail privatization commission.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes Representative Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

By way of background, I think most members know that the regulatory process kicks into play when we pass a bill and then the appropriate administrative agency – for example, the Department of Environmental Protection – then promulgates a regulation threshing out the details of the law we passed. I think as many members know, that this is a very long, potentially long and convoluted process in its current form, which can last up to 2 years or beyond in many cases.

My concern with this bill – and I think that is why I drafted this amendment – the bill itself to this very long and convoluted process adds the concept in many places of legislative days as

opposed to calendar days. In other words, there are many time periods scattered throughout the legislative process that have 30 calendar days to react, 14 calendar days to react, 6 calendar days to react, and so forth. This, in addition to that, adds legislative days in addition to calendar days, whichever is longer. And the problem with that is that because we go on breaks – let us say from July 1 to the third week in September – 5 legislative days can actually turn into 3 months. The same could be true in December when we also go on break. So 1 or 2 or 3 calendar days can turn into months, and this would add much time to an already too long regulatory process.

So what my amendment in its simplest form does is simply delete the concept of legislative days so that, simply, calendar days would be the time period where committees, for example, standing committees like the Environmental Committee, would have time to act on these regulations in various forms.

I would note that committees, in my view, are quite capable of reacting within reasonable calendar days, which are in current law. Committees can come in while the legislature is not in session, so that would reduce the need for this concept of calendar days.

I would also note that even despite this, the legislature already has significant input in the legislative process. Standing committees right now have opportunities when these proposed and final regs come through to give input to these regulations, and we also have members, for example, four legislative members on the Environmental Quality Board, who, as these regulations come to us in proposed form or final form, already have input.

So I would say that this amendment, by excising the concept of legislative days, keeps what is already too long of a process from getting longer, and I would ask for an affirmative vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Maher, on the amendment.

Mr. MAHER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This November 30 this House session will conclude. There are many who are uninclined toward so-called lameduck sessions. So from election day through the end of the calendar year, into the end of January when committees are formed, there is a window there that has no legislative days.

The gentleman's amendment is a bad idea because it would serve to create a substantial period of time on a recurring basis when any Governor, any Governor at all, could entirely avoid the oversight expected in the spirit of sunshine under the Regulatory Review Act by simply publishing regulations right around the election day, and the calendar days will have expired altogether before there is even a committee formed that can consider them. That is bad policy. It is an inevitable consequence of adopting this amendment.

In the interest of sunshine and oversight, I will ask you to be opposed. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Does anybody else wish to be recognized on the amendment?

Representative Vitali, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. VITALI. I would just point out – I would urge the members to discount the argument that the previous speaker made, because my amendment essentially takes this bill back to what existing law is, which does not have this legislative-day concept. So the fear that the previous gentleman was trying to create, I believe, simply is not the case, because this essentially takes it back to existing law with regard to the calendar-day concept.

The SPEAKER. Representative Maher, for the second time.

Mr. MAHER. There is an old saying, "You can look it up."

In the Regulatory Review Act, most of the deadlines in there refer to calendar days and legislative session days. That is the way it is, Mr. Speaker. I am not sure which version the gentleman was consulting, but by eliminating the legislative days, you are, in fact, eliminating legislative oversight. Thank you.

There is an ambiguity that is clear, a clear ambiguity that came to our attention in the past month that since this bill is coming before us, we thought it would be a good time to clear up that ambiguity. The way the law is written right now, it is not entirely clear if each body has a clock or if the one clock is shared by the two chambers, and there really is uncertainty, and all the great minds in this building have done their best to sort it out and look back on past history, without a concrete resolution.

So the purpose of this amendment is to resolve that ambiguity, and I hope you will join me in support.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Maher.

Representative Vitali, on the amendment.

Mr. VITALI. Will the maker of the amendment stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The good gentleman has indicated he will, and you may proceed, Representative Vitali.

The clerk read the following amendment No. **A07810**:

On the question recurring,  
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. We did have some interrogation and some floor comment on the amendment yesterday, but other individuals wish to speak. We are going to begin with Representative Barbin, then Representative Diamond, Representative Dush, and Representative Vereb.

Representative Barbin, you have the floor first.  
Mr. BARBIN. I rise in opposition to this amendment.

We had gone through the same issue before. The Child Abuse Task Force had recommendations. We wrote a bill. We looked at the bill. It was overreaching in areas. It was a bad balance from a business perspective in certain areas. We had to come back and amend it. If we accept this amendment, we will be doing exactly the same thing 6 months from now when the unintended consequences are clear.

The bill is a good bill the way it stands. I respectfully ask that this amendment not be added, because if we do add it, it is just going to put additional costs on universities in situations when we are not taking care of somebody under 18. We are really trying to impose additional obligations on a university in a situation where you are really young adults.

The SPEAKER. Representative Diamond.  
Mr. DIAMOND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the maker of the amendment stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. Sir, he has indicated that he will so stand.  
Representative Heffley, Representative Diamond will be asking some questions.

You may proceed, sir.  
Mr. DIAMOND. Mr. Speaker, just to refresh everyone's memory, the amendment before us would require university employees who deal with 17-year-old students in their classroom to obtain these background checks. Is that correct?

Mr. HEFFLEY. Yes.  
Mr. DIAMOND. Mr. Speaker, is there any occasion you are familiar with where someone who is under 17 would attend and partake in regular college courses?  
Mr. HEFFLEY. Yes, Mr. Speaker.



Mr. DIAMOND. Could someone as young as 15 sit in one of those regular college classes?

Mr. HEFFLEY. Yes. If they would qualify, they could be as young as 15, correct.

Mr. DIAMOND. Mr. Speaker, is there anything in Pennsylvania law that says that a college student who is younger than the age of 18 – we call it they have matriculated and become a college student – is there anything in Pennsylvania law that you are aware of that we treat them as having attained the age of majority?

Mr. HEFFLEY. The Federal law, but not State law.

Mr. DIAMOND. Federal law treats them as not being minors?

Mr. HEFFLEY. Emancipated minor.

Mr. DIAMOND. Emancipated minors. Okay.

On the amendment, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir. You may proceed on the amendment, sir.

Mr. DIAMOND. Mr. Speaker, this body has gone to great lengths to protect minors from those predators who would seek to target them for abuse.

Now, yesterday we heard from my friend, the gentleman from State College, saying that this would be an undue burden and expense on universities. However, I do want to clarify that a matriculated 17-year-old, if they are preyed upon, sexually abused, that is no less a heinous crime to me than a 12-year-old who is preyed upon and abused at a football camp.

And for predators the instance of first contact is really one of the keys. A predator in an authority position who a young person trusts, that creates a vulnerable situation. We have gone to great lengths to protect kids. I think we can argue back and forth whether we went too far or not, but it was not an impractical or a too-expensive solution when we talked about our Scout leaders having to spend I believe it was \$43 for these background checks. We did not say it was impractical or too expensive for our volunteers at churches to have to get these background checks. We did not say it was too impractical or expensive for a day-care worker who earns about \$11 an hour to get these background checks. I do not see how we can say that it is too impractical or expensive for a college professor who earns a six-figure salary to not go through the same background checks.

I see the difference between someone who is going to college and who is 17 and who is not yet 18. However, we do not allow those college students to buy lottery tickets. We do not allow those 17-year-old college students to register to vote. We do not allow those 17-year-old college students to go into a convenience store and buy a pack of cigarettes. They are still minor children under Pennsylvania law. And again, I do not think that having a 17-year-old being preyed upon and sexually abused is any less offensive than a 12-year-old at a football camp.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I believe we should approve this amendment. It really comes down to this: We either care about minor children or we do not. We either are in the business of protecting minor children or we are not. I believe this body has said we are, and for that reason I support the Heffley amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative.

Representative Dush. Waives off.

Representative Mike Vereb.

Mr. VEREB. Mr. Speaker, you know, the gentleman ahead of me there from Lebanon hit it, in my mind, hit it out of the park with his points. And I was quite thrilled, slightly moved by the passionate statement of fiscal stability and instability that this bill would cause to our good friends at places like Penn State University.

You know, I am a big believer in prevention, and I think the investment is prevention to have these background checks done. I cannot believe that we are less than 5 or 6 years from the scandal of Penn State and the scandals of the church and the scandals that just keep coming up and we are debating whether or not someone should spend a few dollars of their hard-earned money to do a background check.

I rise in support of this amendment, and let me just submit this to you all. This \$100, this \$40, whatever the price is, is one heck of a lot cheaper than the grand jury investigations, than the wiretaps and everything else that is used to bring these crumbs to justice. So, Mr. Speaker, I do not think this is a financial debate and I do not think this debate is— I cannot believe this debate is happening, that Penn State is only a few years ago and now everything is just great, there are no more victims. Give me a break. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Matt Baker.

Mr. BAKER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the amendment. As a member of the Board of Governors of the 14 State universities, PASSHE (Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education) supports the Heffley amendment and the 14 State university presidents and the board of trustees also support this amendment. I have an e-mail from them, actually, that says, "Any change to the law that makes it more inclusive...we support. We are already doing background checks of all employees..." and they go on to say, "The Heffley amendment would not result in more costs for the State System."

This is a good amendment, and I encourage the members to support the Heffley amendment.

The SPEAKER. Representative Conklin, on the amendment.

Mr. CONKLIN. I want to thank the Speaker.

Since my name was semimentioned, I just thought I would get up and just – a few things that were said.

First off, they were saying about church folks paying for it. That is all free. It was talked about that, for those of you who would check, you would find out that part of the contract with the APSCUF (Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties) employees is that if this passes, yes, the State will pay for it for them, so I guess if you do not mind spending more money.

Those individuals that we already passed the bill for, everyone must forget that we passed Act 15 that already encompasses those direct-care workers. That already passed.

For those individuals that keep bringing Penn State up, if those of you would really get into it, you would find out that the incidents that Penn State was involved with were dropped and found not substantiated. This happened at a private, a private, a private organization that had an individual who was not a Penn State employee that had been there at one time. It went to court. Penn State was not found guilty of any charges, for those of you who keep bringing it up.

Please forgive me for protecting my district, but I know the narrative is much better than the facts. The fact is simply this: We did a great bill a year ago. We encompassed individuals.

I realize we could have gone further. I realize every member of this chamber should have a background check because we have children coming in here. I do not know why we were excluded. I guess we are above those individuals. But at the end of the day when you are talking expense, when you are talking about what is happening, we did a great job. I understand the passion, I understand what they are going through, but many of the facts that we are saying today are simply not the facts. And please forgive me for standing up for my district, but when you talk about something like this – and I am going to go just a little bit off – I know I kid around and I know we like to poke back and forth; you are good individuals, but please be careful with your comments when you are directing blame at somebody or something. Remember, get the facts straight. Remember, a horrible incident happened that this bill would not have stopped. Nothing we have done would have stopped that in this bill. So do not use that incident. Let us use it for what it is. It is about protecting children. We did a great bill. When you are bringing up incidents, do not bring up incidents that did not occur with people that did not do them. If you stick to the facts, I do not have a problem, but when you go to the emotional part of it, of what the narrative was, that is not the truth.

So I am asking folks to vote "no" to this. I understand the passion, I understand on the surface it seems like a good idea, but at the same time we have done a great job, we did a great thing. Just vote "no," but please, leave my district alone. Quit bringing up wounds and scraping wounds off that are not true. I know you appreciate and it is a lot of fun, but you know, Mr. Speaker, let us be serious; let us talk about the facts. I know we do not put our hand on the Bible before we come in here, but still the truth is the truth. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Vereb.

Mr. VEREB. Mr. Speaker, how dare a member call out the integrity of another member on the floor for something they stated. It is a fact, and you can stick up for your university, but we are going to stick up for the victims.

Now, to sit there, Mr. Speaker, and suggest that the church and Penn State and these people are all pure, I just cannot believe in this year, in this month, that I am going to sit here and hear that Penn State University had no culpability in what went on. I stand for my district too. There are people from Penn State in my district too and Temple and every other college. But do you know what? There are victims, and we have a duty to defend victims of sexual abuse.

And my goodness, a background check. Every corporation, small and large, mandated drug testing, background checks just to go do a job. If they cannot afford it with their salary to pay for this background check, then tell your people to take it out of their pension.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Vereb. Representative Mark Mustio.

Mr. MUSTIO. And in this corner, weighing in at a lot more than when he first got elected. That is me, not Vereb.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to interrogate the maker of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. Representative Heffley has indicated that he will stand for interrogation, and you may proceed, Representative Mustio.

Mr. MUSTIO. I will say that the maker is looking much better after doing all those pushups.

I do have a question because I do not know the answer to it. Without your amendment, are these organizations able to conduct the background checks on their own without this amendment mandating that they do it?

Mr. HEFFLEY. If they so choose. This would be a minimum requirement from the State, so if those organizations so choose, they can go above and beyond. This would raise that minimum standard.

Mr. MUSTIO. But currently they can do what you are asking to be done in the amendment?

Mr. HEFFLEY. Correct. As noted earlier, the State System is looking to do this.

Mr. MUSTIO. Thank you.

## STATEMENT BY MRS. HILL

The SPEAKER. Representative Phillips-Hill is recognized on unanimous consent.

Mrs. HILL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, Representative DeLissio and I rise in gratitude to our colleagues for supporting this measure. We would also like to thank the Secretary of the Department of Education, Rivera, as well as the Pennsylvania National Guard and the Adjutant General, Anthony Carrelli, for their assistance in crafting this measure.

Mr. Speaker, you know, our military families regularly relocate across State lines. In fact, according to the U.S. Department of Defense, 15 percent of military families move each year. This makes it incredibly difficult, both logistically and financially, for our veterans, military members, and their spouses who have a teaching certificate to be recertified in a new State every few years.

This issue was brought to our attention by a constituent in my district. She holds a Pennsylvania teaching certificate, but it was inactivated while she and her husband lived out of State during his career in the United States Marine Corps. He retired. They moved back home to Pennsylvania to be near family, only to find out that it was incredibly difficult to reactive her certificate. Unfortunately, she is not teaching right now with that certificate.

This legislation will bring our military members, our veterans, and their spouses – people who have extensive experience and prove to be an invaluable asset – into the classroom to teach our children.

First, by expediting that application process and by setting the certification fee at \$10 and the educator discipline fee at \$25, we will reduce the time and financial barriers for our military members, veterans, and their spouses who are teachers.

Second, HB 2078 also allows Pennsylvania-certified teachers who become certified and continue teaching in other States to pick up right where they left off, with continuing education credits under Act 48, when they return to Pennsylvania.

Our members of the military and their spouses have had our backs defending our nation and defending our freedoms. This is another way that we can now have their backs when they are stationed in Pennsylvania or transitioning back into civilian life here in Pennsylvania. In addition, HB 2078 helps other Pennsylvania-certified educators who have spent time teaching in other States resume their careers as educators in Pennsylvania.

The SPEAKER. Representative Phillips-Hill, just suspend for a moment, please.
