The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1915, PN 3011**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, providing for supplemental online course initiative; and establishing the Online Course Clearinghouse Restricted Account.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On the bill, Representative Mike Carroll is recognized.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I applaud the gentleman for the effort here. I think it is fair to say and safe to say that online courses are with us to stay and there likely will be more of them into the

future. But, Mr. Speaker, what concerns me is that cost associated with this exercise, and I will concede at the onset that there is a loss leader here, where we are going to have free online opportunities for the first year, but, Mr. Speaker, purchase through contracts and negotiated prices scares me. We face the prospect of every single student in our public schools negotiating for an online course and asking our school districts to somehow negotiate that cost and still be able to maintain the level of services that they provide at a moment in time when our school districts, I think it is fair to say, are having a very difficult financial time.

So, Mr. Speaker, the prospect of online or cyber learning in every single school with every single student, at least to me, is somewhat terrifying when I consider the cost. I am not sure how a school district that opens the door to online learning is going to be able to shut that door when the price tag exceeds their ability to meet the obligation.

So, Mr. Speaker, I have grave concerns with respect to the costs going forward for this. I have grave concerns for the effect that this will have on our school districts' budgets. I have grave concerns as to how this affects school property taxes because these online courses do not come for free. As has been outlined in the various analyses of these bills, purchase through contracts and negotiated prices suggests that we are going to have a cost here, and I do not know how in the world anybody can measure what that cost is going to be looking out into the future 1 or 2 or 3 years.

So, Mr. Speaker, I think the prudent thing to do in this case is to hit the pause button. Let us think about the financial wherewithal of our 500 school districts and think about a better way to provide online learning directly through the Department of Education and minimize, if not completely eliminate, the need to negotiate contracts and incur costs that our districts cannot afford.

Mr. Speaker, I ask that we oppose HB 1915 for the moment, try and rectify the liabilities that exist for our school districts, and move this at a later date. So, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a "no" vote. Thank you so much.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Now, I have a number of members who have requested to speak on this amendment: Representative Barbin, Representative Thomas, Representative Santora. I will also, obviously, leave time for the maker of the bill to speak on this proposed legislation as well.

Representative Barbin.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also rise in opposition to this bill for similar reasons as those stated by the last speaker.

In the nineties we made a decision to spend about \$100 million on charter and cyber school payments. That amount now is \$1.5 billion that passes through the public high schools and then out to all the 160-some charters and the 14-or-so cybers. This does not have any way of avoiding the same problem that we had with the charters and the cybers. If you pass this bill without saying how we are going to eventually pay for it, all you really are doing is saying that public school districts, the real schools, will have an additional obligation to pay for online learning.

The best thing to do in this case, I agree with the last speaker, is put this on hold, get the charter and cyber school payments under control. I mean, you have got \$1.5 billion of the money out there. Get that part under the control of the public

schools and then come back with this but figure out a way to control the costs.

All this is, is another giveaway to anybody who says I can answer your problems with online education. That failed the last time when we decided that the money followed the students but did not have to be sent on to students. This is the same sort of problem.

The SPEAKER. Representative Curtis Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, can the author of the amendment stand for interrogation?

The SPEAKER. Representative Ortitay has indicated he will stand for interrogation. Sir, you may proceed.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, have we resolved any outstanding questions relevant to education in the '16-'17 proposed budget?

The SPEAKER. Sir, that is a budgetary inquiry, and I do not think that it is germane to this bill, but if you ask specific questions on the bill, the good gentleman is prepared to answer any of those questions.

Mr. THOMAS. Okay. Mr. Speaker, what is the cost associated with your program?

Mr. ORTITAY. Mr. Speaker, there should not be any costs associated to the schools for this. The fees will be – I am sorry; the costs will be recouped when the schools pay the fees to take the courses. And again, it is not mandatory for the school to enroll in this program. We are just strictly setting up an online catalog.

Mr. THOMAS. So, Mr. Speaker, you are saying that there are no costs associated with the development and implementation of this program and it is going to happen in America?

Mr. ORTITAY. Mr. Speaker, it is strictly voluntary. There is no cost associated with the school districts.

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, has the School Boards Association chimed in on your bill?

Mr. ORTITAY. Mr. Speaker, they are neutral.

Mr. THOMAS. Pardon me?

Mr. ORTITAY. Neutral. They have not chimed in.

Mr. THOMAS. How about the county commissioners?

Mr. ORTITAY. Mr. Speaker, no.

Mr. THOMAS. How about the school parents of your district?

Mr. ORTITAY. No.

Mr. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have concluded my interrogation.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Do you wish to speak on the bill, sir?

Mr. THOMAS. Yes.

The SPEAKER. You may proceed.

Mr. THOMAS. I just met the Rep, and so I believe that he is trying to do good work, but it is out of line and it is out of time.

Mr. Speaker, we have not resolved a budget for 2016-17. Mr. Speaker, I heard earlier today that we do not even have a handle on a revenue spend. So we do not know what we are going to be spending on education and we definitely do not know what we will be doing around charter schools.

Mr. Speaker, our constitutional duty is to a public education system that is adequate and efficient. Mr. Speaker, that is our priority, and therefore, Mr. Speaker, I think that it is only fair that we take care of that before we talk about these other expanded opportunities, and it might be an expanded opportunity that could end up complementing the existing

system, but let us deal with that first before we talk about these new challenges even if the new challenge is not connected to an associated cost.

I guess I am troubled, I am troubled by the notion if it happens and it happened the way that the author laid it out, it will be a point of education for me, but given the amount of time that I have been in America, I have not seen anything free. There is a cost associated with everything. And as my grandmother used to say, it is time to get scared when you are getting something that you do not have to pay anything for it or it does not cost you anything.

So let us get this budget out of the way and then maybe we can talk about these dreams. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Representative Jamie Santora on the— Waives off.

Representative Ortitay.

Does anybody else wish to be recognized prior to the maker of the bill?

Representative Ortitay, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. ORTITAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The original intent of this bill was to provide additional resources for the students of our Commonwealth. Now, people like me who went to a very small school did not have a huge selection of courses to take from, and it is almost unreasonable to expect a school to hire a teacher just based upon a student, for one or two students to take a course.

Now, all we are trying to do is to create an online catalog for schools to participate in, strictly voluntary, and provide extra choices for the students to take these classes. That is all we are trying to do at the end of the day.

So I would appreciate an affirmative vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Mike Carroll, the floor is yours.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, if there is any doubt that anybody in this room has as to whether or not there will be a cost to the school districts, I refer you to page 4, line 14. Page 4, line 14, makes this crystal clear that there will be a cost that will be negotiated that the school districts will have to pay for these online courses.

So, Mr. Speaker, to be crystal clear, to make sure that there is no confusion as a result of the debate that has occurred, page 4, line 14, I suggest, is the final arbiter of whether or not there is a cost. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Ortitay.

Mr. ORTITAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, the school districts do not have to participate in this program. The courses, of course, if they choose to purchase one, then yes, they would, but they do not have to agree. It is not a mandate that they participate in this catalog. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

An Act amending Title 20 (Decedents, Estates and Fiduciaries) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in anatomical gifts, further providing for manner of executing anatomical gifts.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage. The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representative Petrarca, you are recognized, sir. Mr. PETRARCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In 2011, 24-year-old Paul Corby was awaiting a heart transplant when his mother received a telephone call from the University of Pennsylvania telling her that because of her son's psychiatric issues, his autism, and the unknown and unpredictable effects of steroids on behavior, that he would be removed from the transplant list.

What this legislation does, simply, it prohibits noneligibility and discrimination of any potential organ donation recipient on the basis of physical and mental disability. Although there are national standards for transplant candidacy, this bill provides that as long as a recipient has sufficient help to ensure compliance with postoperative procedures, inability to comply with those requirements alone is an insufficient reason to deny transplantation.

This bill simply, again, ensures that the disabled have the same standing as the rest of us when it comes to organ transplantation in terms of being a recipient, and I ask for your affirmative vote. Thank you.
