HB 409, PN 1235 (Amended) By Rep. KAUFFMAN

SHIPPENSBURG UNIVERSITY FIELD HOCKEY TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Mark Keller and Representative Rob Kauffman are invited now for the purpose of presenting a citation to a championship team.

Representative Mark Keller, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. M. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is my great pleasure that the Shippensburg University Field Hockey Team won the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) Division II Championship in November, defeating Long Island University Post in the title game 2 to 1. The team's thrilling victory followed a 1-to-0 semifinal win over Millersville and a 2-to-1 quarterfinal win at East Stroudsburg. This was the second national title in Shippensburg history. They also won it in 2013 over LIU Post by the same 2-to-1 score.

The Shippensburg seniors started and finished their careers with national championships, compiling a record of 68 to 14, with four PSAC (Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference) tournament appearances and memories that will last a lifetime. Those seniors that are standing behind me are Taylor Fisher, Katelyn Grazan, Suzanne Muller, Cassie Rawa, and Miranda Wallace.

Taylor was named to the 2016 National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division II All-American Team. She excelled as the team's primary back-line defender, ranking third in the NCAA Division II with seven defensive saves. Also named as All-Americans were redshirt sophomore goalkeeper Ally Mooney and junior midfielder Brooke Sheibley, who are seated in the rear.

In addition, we want to congratulate head coach Bertie Landes, who was named the 2016 NFHCA (National Field Hockey Coaches Association) Division II Coach of the Year, after guiding the team to the national title, a path that included wins in three consecutive postseason games away from home. Ship also finished with the number one rank in the final NFHCA national poll.

Now, this may have been the most emotional year in history of Shippensburg University field hockey, as they played in memory of their late assistant coach and player, Amanda Strous,

who was slain in her Charlotte, North Carolina, apartment back in June, if you remember that. As Coach Landes put it, "...the only way we could honor her was to live our lives. This senior class, and this team, just wanted to leave a legacy. A life lived every day, with love for each other, caring, concern, and a lot of laughter."

I want to congratulate the Shippensburg University Women's Field Hockey Team on a well-deserved recognition and present them with this citation as such.

BERTIE LANDES PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Rob Kauffman.

Mr. KAUFFMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I, too, would like to personally congratulate members of the Shippensburg University Field Hockey Team on their championship victory. I was chatting with Coach Bertie and her seniors before they came up here and I was reminiscing. You know how in this body you lose track of time and you think you just did something last year or the year before, and I was reminiscing when they were here the last time and Coach Bertie told me that that was 2013,

and so these young ladies standing behind me, they were here in their freshman year and now they stand here again in their senior year. So these are obviously the best of the best, and we want to congratulate them and honor them today.

Shippensburg University is in Representative Mark Keller's district. But Shippensburg University also has something outstanding, and that is my constituent, Bertie Landes. They certainly do have an outstanding field hockey program and they have now won two national championships in large part due to the leadership of head coach Bertie Landes, who is here with us today. Wave. There we go. Thank you, Bertie.

Bertie has been a coach for 44 years, with the past 18 years leading the field hockey program at Shippensburg. During her career she has coached tennis, basketball, softball, lacrosse, and field hockey. Her work ethic, her knowledge of sports strategy, and team commitment have been passed on and shared with hundreds of female student athletes whom she has mentored during her tenure. But unfortunately, on July 31 of this year, Bertie is going to retire. Okay. All right. I know the team here will miss her, but like all of us, they wish her the best as she begins this new chapter of her life. And I guess we will just be seeing you around town more, Bertie. You will have more time on your hands.

But it is important to note those who take the time and devotion of their efforts to help shape the character of our young people and the way they play deserve the utmost gratitude, and I want to personally thank you, Bertie, and congratulate you for your devotion to the field of sports, to our youth here in the Commonwealth, and to mentoring young people for tomorrow.

So congratulations, Bertie, and I have a citation just for you.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt will proceed. Members, please take your seats.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today about 15 million people are suffering from the endocrine disorder known as Cushing's syndrome, and complicating the problem, many suffer without knowing treatment is available and critical to preventing further complications.

Mr. Speaker, Cushing's syndrome is an endocrine disorder that most commonly affects people between the ages of 20 and 50 years of age. It occurs when the body's tissues are exposed to excessive levels of cortisol for extended and long periods of time. The symptoms of the illness arise when they take hormones to fight asthma, rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, and other inflammatory diseases. The most common signs and symptoms involve progressive obesity and skin changes.

Mr. Speaker, those afflicted will notice weight gain and fatty tissue deposits, particularly around the midsection and upper back. Their faces will grow thicker and they will notice purple stretch marks on the skin of the abdomen, thighs, and arms. They will be slow to heal from cuts and infection. Mr. Speaker, if those affected do not receive prompt treatment, they can experience bone loss and unusual fractures, high blood pressure, diabetes, frequent or unusual infections, and a loss of muscle mass and strength.

This is why it is so important that we have passed HR 139 to declare April 8 "Cushing's Syndrome Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania. By doing this, we are drawing attention to those suffering in silence. They must know that treatment is available to reduce serious injury. The best weapon against this illness,

Mr. Speaker, is education, and we must make the public aware of this disease's symptoms to increase the chances of successful treatment and early intervention.

Mr. Speaker, I thank my colleagues for their support on this measure. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MS. DONATUCCI

The SPEAKER. Representative Donatucci, the floor is yours. Ms. DONATUCCI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank my colleagues for their support of HR 114, which honors those women who have heroically served our country as members of the Armed Forces. In 2016 the United States made changes to open all military positions,

including those in combat, to women. As a result, just a few months ago, the first three women began serving as infantry in the U.S. Marines. But women have been serving this country since the Revolutionary War, when women supported the troops, often in roles like nurses or cooks – roles that still subjected them to many of the hardships soldiers faced. Many women served in those traditional roles during the Civil War also, according to the Army. But in addition, more than 400 women disguised themselves as men in order to fight in the Union and Confederate Armies. An estimated 435,000 women served in World War I and World War II.

As we continue to see the role women play in the military evolve, it is time to honor them for their service and sacrifice on behalf of the United States. Despite an overall decrease in the veteran population, female military veterans are growing in numbers. Last year women made up more than 2 million of the 21 million veterans in the United States and Puerto Rico, and in Pennsylvania, there were more than 71,000 female veterans. Women continue to answer the call to service, comprising about 15 percent of active-duty and Reserve personnel in our country.

HR 114 honors all the female veterans who have heroically served as members of the United States Armed Forces. I have stood here before to fight for equality for women – equal pay and equal access to health care. This resolution is one more way we can recognize the significant contributions women have made and continue to make in our communities and our country.

An Act amending Title 4 (Amusements) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in general provisions, further providing for definitions; in Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, further providing for general and specific powers, for regulatory authority of board and for reports to board; in licensees, further providing for supplier licenses

and for manufacturer licenses; providing for airport gaming; and, in administration and enforcement relating to gaming, further providing for compulsive and problem gambling program and for prohibited acts and penalties.
