Pastor Ross has been married for 26 years to Alice Ross, who assists him in leadership at the church. They have five beautiful children, who range from elementary school to graduate school.

Pastor Ross has this goal in mind, to serve God and community as the church helps to rebuild and support the people and places that have often seen neglect.

And if I could just briefly testify, Pastor Ross' leadership in Divine Destiny makes a difference in our neighborhood where I live, where I serve, where I work, and he often partners with our office and community programs, and I am truly grateful to have him and his lovely wife as our guests today. And thank you, members, for your support of HR 245, which recognizes May as "Cystic Fibrosis Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. Approximately 30,000 children and adults in the United States and approximately 70,000 people worldwide are living with cystic fibrosis, and I do mean living with it in every sense of the word.

Today two of them are here with us. Please join me in welcoming to the hall of the House Joshua and Zachary Berkley from York Township. Josh and Zach are also joined by their mother, Cathy; their sister, Maddie; and German exchange student, Sofia. I have had the privilege of knowing the Berkley family for a number of years as their children and mine were involved in sports together.

As you know, cystic fibrosis is a genetically inherited chronic disease of the mucus and sweat glands that affects an individual's lungs and digestive system. There was a time when anyone diagnosed with CF did not live to attend elementary school. Research has allowed us to come a great distance since those days.

This can be evidenced and seen in Josh Berkley's incredible video that he made while attending Penn State University about the challenges of living with cystic fibrosis as a college student. Josh is a recent graduate of Penn State University with a degree in electrical engineering and an extensive résumé of philanthropic activity, raising money and awareness for cystic fibrosis with his fraternity as well as THON.

Zach will be graduating from Dallastown High School on June 2, and he is headed to SUNY (State University of New York) Maritime College. Zach is an accomplished athlete, playing soccer and lacrosse, and he has gained excellent public speaking and fundraising skills working with cystic fibrosis.

Both of these exceptional young men have bright futures as do many young adults living with CF. At present there is no cure. However, there are drugs on the market that control the symptoms and allow individuals to live productive lives, something that was not possible not that long ago.

Please join me in a round of applause for the Berkley family, and thank you again, members, for supporting this legislation.

Unfortunately, her insurance company deems this procedure experimental, which prevents her from experiencing life-changing benefits due to the financial costs that she and her family would incur.

Mr. Speaker, scientific literature shows evidence that bronchial thermoplasty is an established procedure that improves health outcomes while reducing costs over time. This outpatient procedure becomes cost-effective, because once it is performed in three sessions, the treatment is complete and does not need to be repeated, helping to offset any costs that can accrue annually.

Mr. Speaker, the fact is, those suffering from severe persistent asthma can become severely debilitated. Every time Michelle is hospitalized, she has to spend days or weeks in the hospital, including in the ICU (intensive care unit), all of which costs her insurance company thousands of dollars.

As noted in the resolution, Mr. Speaker, those treated experienced a 32-percent decrease in severe asthma attacks, an 84-percent reduction in asthma-related emergency room visits, and 66 percent fewer days lost from work, school, and daily activities. You may be interested in knowing that Harrisburg, Philadelphia, Allentown, Pittsburgh, and Scranton are 5 of the top 50 most challenging places to live with asthma, according to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation.

Mr. Speaker, I stand today to urge all insurance companies to cover this important procedure.

I want to thank you all for voting in favor of recognizing May 8, 2017, as "Bronchial Thermoplasty Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania. Together we can help provide our constituents with better health-care coverage tailored to their individual needs.

Like I said, I wanted to acknowledge Mr. Jim MacKenzie, member of the Pennsylvania Landscape & Nursery Association as well as the owner of Octoraro Native Plant Nursery in Kirkwood, Lancaster County, for providing us with plants this year, which are on our desks. Also, this nursery has been in business for 25 years and they specialize in container-grown mid-Atlantic and eastern regional native trees and shrubs.

The plants on your desk today are a mix of four species: sugar maples, pin oaks, American plums, and the blackhaw viburnum. The care instructions are noted on the tags that are attached. The plants were potted today by the Amish staff at the nursery.

Thank you also to the officers of the Pennsylvania Future Farmers of America association for bagging and tagging the plants as well as assisting with distribution. Today more than 12,000 students are members of the Pennsylvania FFA.

I would also like to thank Mr. Gregg Robertson, government relations liaison for the Pennsylvania Landscape & Nursery Association, for coordinating this event.

Lastly, thanks to all the members and, Mr. Speaker, leadership for supporting this HR 255. Thank you.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. BULLOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On HR 141 we would like to thank our colleagues for voting on recognizing May as "Mental Health Awareness in the Black Community Month."

And Representative Cephas and I would like to submit our remarks for the record. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Bullock, and thank you, Representative Cephas. Those will be accepted.

Mrs. BULLOCK submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, fellow House members, specifically Representative Morgan Cephas, for joining me as we help increase awareness and strengthen mental health services among communities of color.

While everyone, every community, is at risk for mental illnesses – it does not discriminate – historically, communities of color experience unique challenges in accessing mental health services, persistent racial inequality and race-based exclusion in the United States.

Dr. Martin Luther King once stated that "Of all the...inequality, injustice in health care is the most shocking and inhumane." These injustices in health care are present in mental health treatment as well and have translated into mental health disparities and barriers to treatment for African-Americans.

Despite progress made over the years, socioeconomic factors and inequities in access to health care and treatment continue to have an impact on the mental health in the Black community. According to the Health and Human Services Office of Minority Health, African-Americans are 20 percent more likely to experience serious mental health problems than the general population. Yet they, especially young African-American professionals, are less likely to seek treatment. Only an estimated 25 percent of African-Americans seek access to mental health services, while 40 percent of individuals from other racial groups seek care.

Prior experiences with historical misdiagnoses and access to affordable, culturally sensitive treatment may prevent many African-Americans from seeking care. For example, only 2 percent of psychiatrists, 2 percent of psychologists, and 4 percent of social workers in the United States are African-American.

It is for these reasons that in conjunction with the 2017 Black Brain Campaign, Representative Cephas and I are offering HR 141 to designate May 2017 as "Mental Health Awareness in the Black Community Month" in an effort to remove the stigma of mental health

in the Black community; to recognize the need of health-care policy reforms, interventions, and initiatives to eliminate mental health disparities based on race, ethnicity, education, income, or geography; and to increase awareness about this issue across Pennsylvania.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Miss CEPHAS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Let me first say on behalf of Representative Bullock and myself, we would like to say thank you to our fellow House members for supporting HR 141, designating the month of May 2017 as "Mental Health Awareness in the Black Community Month" for our State.

For those with mental health disorders like depression, seeking help should be considered a strength and not a weakness. But the standard perception of seeking treatment is shame, indignity, and embarrassment. Such characteristics are widely considered a stigma within the African-American community. One 2008 study found that more than one-third of African-Americans actively seeking treatment believe talking about their anxiety would lead them to be misdiagnosed, labeled a burden by their peers, with a portion of them not willing to even talk about their mental health issues with family members because of humiliation.

Along with cultural stigmas, the alarming statistics associated with race exclusion and lack of access does not help those that are in need of care. The Department of Health and Human Services notes that those who live below the poverty level are three times more likely to experience psychological distress than those who are comfortably above the poverty line and are less likely to even have the access they need in their immediate communities. Hunger, difficulty finding employment, homelessness, and lack of other vital needs were also destabilizing challenges identified by the World Health Organization as leading causes to depression and the need for immediate mental health services.

In addition to these issues, Mental Health Awareness in the Black Community Month also serves as an opportunity to attract and recruit more African-Americans and communities of color into the profession. As my colleague stated, 2 percent of psychiatrists, 2 percent of psychologists, and 4 percent of social workers in the United States are African-American, which can lend itself to creating an additional barrier for those interested in seeking treatment.

We all understand that cultural shifts take time, but that cannot hinder our efforts to increase awareness and strengthen the availability of mental health services. We must work to destigmatize this issue and educate our local communities for the sake of all those throughout the Commonwealth suffering in silence.

It is also a time to focus on ways we can create a brighter future for the more than 25,000 children who are currently in foster care across the Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, the family is a primary source of love, identity, self-esteem, and support, and it is the very foundation of our communities. Foster families provide a safe, secure, and stable home and a compassionate and nurturing environment to children whose own families are often in crisis. Foster families play a vital role in helping these children and their families heal and connect.

Sometimes dedicated foster families adopt foster children, resulting in an even greater need for more foster families to enter into the system and help. In fact, it is very important to note that Pennsylvania foster parents adopt more than 60 percent of the children that are in the child welfare system. Very important to note – 60 percent of the children in the system actually become adopted.

Mr. Speaker, the foster care system is only as good as the individuals who choose to be a part of it. Many families choose not to open their doors. They are scared of the risks involved. And if in your communities, for the Representatives out there, if they could let them know that it is foster care awareness month, to open their hearts and their homes, even if it is for an emergency placement of children, there is a long waiting list and there are not many foster homes out there.

STATEMENT BY MR. SCHLOSSBERG

Mr. SCHLOSSBERG. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to thank all of the members who are in the chamber for their unanimous approval of HR 219, which declares May to be "Mental Health Awareness Month."

Mental health and mental illness in general, my experience has been, is unquestionably one of the most prevalent diseases and disorders in the entire United States and it is also one of the most widely misunderstood. One in five Americans at some

point in their life will suffer from some form of mental illness and one out of every two will at some point, or excuse me, one out of every five Americans suffers from mental illness actively, one out of every two will at some point over the course of their life.

Yet of that massive number, which includes tens of millions of Americans, only 30 to 40 percent of those who have some sort of mental illness will seek treatment. There are many reasons for this, and this is an issue that the chamber has addressed consistently over the course of the past few years. But one of the chief things that keeps people from seeking treatment for mental illnesses is stigma. Stigma exists in many forms, but it is primarily defined by the fear of judgment of others, and really, that is one of the primary causes that keeps people from being treated. I will add stigma is a little bit more personal than that because it also comes down to how a person views themselves. If you do not acknowledge that you have some sort of mental illness, you do not seek treatment for it, and more often than not, if you do not seek treatment for it, you are not ultimately healed.

That being said, when it comes to mental illness there is good news. There is remarkably good news. People who are treated for mental illnesses more often than not can be cured and can live happy and good and productive lives, and we know that beating stigma actually helps with that and helps putting people into treatment.

Mr. Speaker, about 3 or 4 years ago I started discussing my own issues with mental illness, my own challenges with depression and with anxiety. I did so in the interest of trying to put a personal face to mental illness and to its aftermath, and in the course of doing, I hope I helped to shatter some of the stigma that surrounds mental illness. What I did and what countless of Americans – very brave, ordinary citizens – have done was try to put a personal face to mental illness, and by doing so, help encourage people to seek treatment for their diseases.

So I conclude with a charge to my colleagues and to anybody who is listening at home – first and foremost, if you are one of the Americans, one of the tens of millions of Americans who are mentally ill, I encourage you to tell your story. My own personal experience was absolutely stunning in that I never anticipated so many people would be so widely supportive and that my story would be received so warmly. Now, again I am not saying this to toot my own horn, I am really not, but I am saying this to try to give people courage and let them know that if you tell your story, you will probably be regarded in a higher light than you ever could have realized. And second, if that is not who you are or if that is not something that you feel yourself capable of, show support for those who say I saw my therapist today. Treat depression and anxiety the same way you would treat an appendectomy or a broken arm, and in so doing, we can encourage the millions of Americans who suffer from mental illness to seek the treatment that they need and they deserve. Thank you very much.

Representative Vitali, on the bill.
Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have some concerns with HB 939. I am not going to interrogate the prime, but if I mischaracterize what this bill does, perhaps he can speak after me and correct it. But it implies to Pennsylvania public officials, like State House members, for example, other public employees, like public school teachers and other State employees, and it involves the issue of pension forfeiture, and it basically says that any of these public officials or public employees, which I believe is a very broad category of people, who is found guilty of any felony or any crime punishable by more than 5 years in jail or any equivalent Federal offense relating to public office or public employment shall forfeit their pension minus what they contributed.

And I have a lot of concerns with, A, the issue of pension forfeiture generally, but two, just expanding it to any felony out there because I think that is a broad category of crimes and people. I think there is a fundamental unfairness when someone who might commit a crime who just started a public job and has virtually no pension commits the same act as someone who might have had a job for 25 years and might lose a pension of several hundred thousand dollars. Two people commit the same act and one loses several hundred thousand dollars more than the other. I think there is a fundamental unfairness to that.

Another problem I have with pension forfeiture is it is not just about the person who may commit the crime. What about his family? What about his wife who did nothing wrong and she was depending on this pension herself? My feeling is with regard to our Crimes Code and crimes by public officials generally, you have incarceration that can be imposed, you have restitution that can be imposed, you have fines that can be imposed, and I am just very, very concerned about the inequity that can occur with regard to these forfeitures.

Now, earlier today I shoved Joe Petrarca, and he had it coming to him, frankly, but because he is a person of a protected class, that could constitute a felony and cause me to lose a pension that I have worked for for 25 years. I just think that this— I understand the policy ends the maker is trying to achieve, that public employees should not engage in crimes, but I do think there is a fundamental unfairness in having someone who may have worked for their pension their entire life and have to forfeit the entire pension. I think this bill simply paints with too broad a brush.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

(2) provides goods or services [at] to a slot machine licensee or an applicant for a slot machine license that requires access to the gaming floor or a gaming-related restricted area of a licensed facility as determined by the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board.

* * *

"Nongaming service provider." A person that is not a gaming service provider or required to be licensed as a manufacturer, supplier, management company or gaming junket enterprise under this part or under regulations of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board and that provides goods or services:

(1) to a slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license for use in the operation of a licensed facility; and

(2) that does not require access to the gaming floor or a gaming-related restricted area of a licensed facility.

* * *

Amend Bill, page 3, lines 27 through 30; pages 4 through 8, lines 1 through 30; page 9, line 1; by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting

§ 1317.3. Nongaming service provider.

(a) Notification required.—

(1) A slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license that contracts with or otherwise engages in business with a nongaming service provider shall provide notification to the board prior to:

(i) the nongaming service provider's provision of goods or services at the slot machine licensee's licensed facility; or

(ii) the provision of goods or services for use in the operation of the slot machine licensee's licensed facility.

(2) Notification under this section shall be on a form and in a manner as determined by the board. The board may impose a fee, not to exceed \$100, which must accompany the notification.

(b) Contents of notification.—Notification under this section shall include:

(1) The name and business address of the nongaming service provider.

(2) A description of the type or nature of the goods or services to be provided.

(3) An affirmation from the slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license that the goods or services to be provided by the nongaming service provider will not require access to the gaming floor or a gaming-related restricted area of a licensed facility.

(4) An affirmation from the slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license certifying that the licensee or applicant has performed due diligence regarding the nongaming service provider and believes that the nongaming service provider and its employees will not adversely affect the public interest or integrity of gaming.

(5) Any other information that the board may require.

(c) Duration of notification.—The nongaming service provider notification required under subsection (a) may be valid for three years unless modified by the board. In determining the duration of a nongaming service provider notification, the board shall consider the following:

(1) The type or nature of the goods or services.

(2) The frequency of business transactions related to the provision of such goods or services.

(3) Any other information the board deems necessary and appropriate.

(d) Conditions.—A slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license that contracts or otherwise engages in business with a nongaming service provider shall be subject to the following conditions:

(1) The nongaming service provider or its employees shall only provide the goods and services described in the notification under this section.

(2) The slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license shall notify the board of any material change in the information provided in the notification under this section.

No fee shall be required for a subsequent change during the time for which the notification remains valid under subsection (c).

(3) The slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license shall ensure that employees of the nongaming service provider do not enter the gaming floor or a gaming-related restricted area of the licensed facility.

(4) The slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license shall report to the board an employee of a nongaming service provider that does any of the following:

(i) Enters the gaming floor or a gaming-related restricted area of the licensed facility.

(ii) Commits an act that adversely affects the public interest or integrity of gaming.

(5) The board may prohibit a nongaming service provider and any of the nongaming service provider's employees from providing goods or services to a slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license at a licensed facility if the board determines the prohibition is necessary to protect the public interest or integrity of gaming.

(e) Authority to exempt.—The board may exempt a nongaming service provider from the notification requirements of this section if the board determines any of the following:

(1) The nongaming service provider or the type or nature of the nongaming service provider's business is regulated by an agency of the Federal Government, an agency of the Commonwealth or the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

(2) Notification is not necessary to protect the public interest or integrity of gaming.

(f) (Reserved).

(g) Additional authority of board.—If, upon examination of the provided notification, the bureau determines that the registration or certification of a nongaming service provider is necessary to protect the integrity of gaming, the bureau may require the nongaming service provider to file an application for registration or certification and be authorized by the board prior to providing services at a licensed facility.

(h) Emergency notification.—

(1) A slot machine licensee may use a nongaming service provider prior to the board receiving notification under this section when a threat to public health, welfare or safety exists or circumstances outside the control of the slot machine licensee require immediate action to mitigate damage or loss to the slot machine licensee's licensed facility or to the Commonwealth.

(2) A slot machine licensee that uses a nongaming service provider in accordance with paragraph (1) shall:

(i) Notify the board immediately upon engaging a nongaming service provider for which the board has not previously received notification in accordance with subsection (a).

(ii) Provide the notification required under subsection (a) within a reasonable time as established by the board.

(i) Nongaming service provider list.—

(1) The board shall have the authority to prohibit a nongaming service provider from engaging in business with a slot machine licensee upon a finding by the board that the prohibition is necessary to protect the public interest and the integrity of gaming.

(2) The board shall develop and maintain a list of prohibited nongaming service providers.

(3) A slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license may not enter into an agreement or engage in business with a nongaming service provider appearing on the list under this subsection.

(j) Duties of nongaming service provider.—A nongaming service provider shall:

(1) Cooperate with the board and bureau regarding an

investigation, hearing, enforcement action or disciplinary action.

(2) Comply with each condition, restriction, requirement, order or ruling of the board in accordance with this part.

(3) Report any change in circumstances to the slot machine licensee or applicant for a slot machine license that may render the nongaming service provider ineligible, unqualified or unsuitable for the provision of goods or services at a licensed facility or use in the operation of a licensed facility. The slot machine licensee shall report any such change in circumstances to the board in such form and manner as the board may establish.

(k) Construction.—Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the powers and authority of the board under section 1202 (relating to general and specific powers) or the regulatory authority of the board under section 1207 (relating to regulatory authority of board).

STATEMENT BY MR. MOUL

The SPEAKER. Representative Moul, the floor is yours. Representative Moul is recognized to speak on HR 307, Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month.

Mr. MOUL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I want to say thanks to everyone for their unanimous decision to vote on HR 307, which recognizes May 15 through June 15, 2017, as "Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.

An estimated 3 out of every 1,000 children 6 through 17 years of age in the United States and in this Commonwealth are diagnosed with Tourette syndrome, a neurobiological genetic condition that has no cure. Tourette syndrome is a lifelong developmental disability that begins before a child reaches 18 years of age and affects children and adults of all races and ethnicities. Individuals with Tourette syndrome are often affected by tics, which are involuntary, rapid, sudden movements or vocalizations that occur repeatedly. Individuals with Tourette syndrome face periodic changes in the nature and severity of their tics as these symptoms wax and wane and change without forewarning.

Tourette syndrome has historically been misrepresented and considered to be a condition of emotional disturbance instead of a condition of chemical biology. Individuals with Tourette syndrome are often teased and not accepted by their peers and by the general public. The Pennsylvania Tourette Syndrome Alliance, Inc., has been established to promote awareness to provide support and disability advocacy for individuals with Tourette syndrome in this Commonwealth.

And I thank you for your vote, your affirmative vote on HR 307.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt is recognized on HR 230.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I just want to express my gratitude to my colleagues for their affirmative vote on HR 230, which recognizes "Military Service-Related Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness."

Mr. Speaker, as our nation continues to be drawn into conflicts around the globe, it is important that we remember that our task on the home front grows more challenging. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, almost a third of the Vietnam veterans, 10 percent of Desert Storm veterans, and 11 percent of Afghanistan war veterans suffer from a wound not visible to the naked eye. The RAND Corporation puts the number much higher to one in five of Afghan and Iraqi war veterans. That is 20 percent.

Post-traumatic stress injury can occur to anyone placed in a distressing situation, including victims of violent crime, victims of sexual assault, and few people experience as many of these situations as our military personnel. These men and women, whether they have witnessed combat or not, know that they are one directive away from the mission that will expose them to the horrible and life-threatening experiences. Many of them have been shot at or watched a buddy shot or killed.

People with post-traumatic stress disorder, Mr. Speaker, repeatedly relive the ordeal through thoughts and memories of the trauma. This may include flashbacks, hallucinations, and nightmares. They also may feel great distress when certain things remind them of the trauma, such as the anniversary date of the event. Those suffering may avoid people, places, thoughts, or situations that may remind him or her of the trauma. This can lead to feelings of detachment and isolation from family and friends, as well as the loss of interest in activities that the person once enjoyed.

Mr. Speaker, as legislators, it is our responsibility to care for those who have sacrificed so much for us, and this includes drawing attention to their problems as we search for ways to help them transition back to civilian life. Thank you for passing HR 230 to declare May "Military Service-Related Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Month" in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

STATEMENT BY MR. CHARLTON

The SPEAKER. Representative Charlton.

Mr. CHARLTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to recognize Pennsylvania's second largest industry, the tourism industry.

HR 321 declares the week of May 7 through 13 as "National Travel and Tourism Week" in Pennsylvania.

Tourism makes up almost 5 percent of the State's entire GDP (gross domestic product), attracting 193 million tourists a year. These visitors spend \$41 billion at our many attractions, hotels, restaurants, urban areas, historic sites, and amusement parks. Tourism employs men and women of all ages. It supports 498,000 jobs, everything from our children's first job to good-paying, family-supporting career wages.

Our tourism industry is thriving and we need it to continue to thrive. Four point one billion dollars in tax revenue has been generated for our State and local governments.

Tourism is not associated to any one region of the State. From the Poconos to Philadelphia, Erie to the Laurel Highlands, just about every part of Pennsylvania has something unique to offer visitors. Just remember, tourism is a homegrown industry. It is special. You can travel to other States, but you will not find Hersheypark, the Amish country, or Valley Forge National Historical Park anywhere else. People will come and go, but the dollars they spend will remain here.

So as we are here in the month of May and people start to go on vacations and weekend getaways, we should encourage and remind them to visit the Keystone State. Our State slogan reads, "Pursue Your Happiness," and with our tourism opportunities in Pennsylvania, you can do just that.
