STATEMENT BY MR. EVERETT

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats. Representative Garth Everett will be making remarks with respect to a resolution. We will be voting on that subsequently. He does have guests here, and we are going to be doing all the resolution votes subsequent to Representative Everett and Representative Sturla's remarks.

You may proceed, sir.

Mr. EVERETT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have a resolution that will be in front of us today commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, and I have with me today, if you would stand up in the back, Will Baker, the president of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation; Harry Campbell, the Pennsylvania executive director; Bill Chain, senior agricultural program manager; and Lane Whigham, outreach and advocacy manager. They are in the back and I welcome them here to our chamber today to commemorate their 50th anniversary.

Fifty years ago, back in 1967, the folks from the bay area recognized that the beautiful Chesapeake Bay was not so beautiful and they formed the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and came up with a motto that we still have today to "Save the Bay." They soon learned that they had a lot of work to do and the work continues today.

Just as a little educational point, the Chesapeake Bay is a 64,000-square-mile watershed and 50 percent of the water, the fresh water that goes into that 64,000-square-mile bay, comes from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The good news is that in 1972 Congress passed the Clean Water Act and things started to move forward. But it is an ongoing process and the Chesapeake Bay Foundation was instrumental in forming the Chesapeake Bay Commission, which Representative Sturla and I serve on, a three-State legislative organization. Over the years the Bay Foundation has been active in creating some great legislation, nutrient management, the CREP program (Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program), and I think most importantly they have a very, very robust education program that serves more than 35,000 students every year and includes the Susquehanna Watershed Education Program here in Pennsylvania.

The Bay Foundation not only talks about things, it does things. It has done more than 6,300 acres of wetlands, 20,900 acres of forested buffers, and planted more than 2.3 million trees in the watershed.

It is my pleasure to be a part of the restoration of the bay, and here in Pennsylvania it is restoring clean water in our local watersheds across the Commonwealth. There are encouraging

signs. The bay has gotten three good report cards. We have made it up to – we used to consistently get F's. We have made it to C and we want to get all the way to A, and with the help of the foundation moving forward, we will be able to do that.

The 50th anniversary is a significant achievement, but it is just a start, and I want to congratulate the foundation on 50 years of hard work and look forward to working with them as we go forward. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Murt, if you want to come down. He is going to be speaking on two resolutions, HR 318 and HR 240.

I will just caution, when Appropriations comes back, I will have to switch over if we are not done by that time.

Members, please take your seats.

Representative Murt, you may proceed.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I thank my colleagues for supporting HR 240, which recognizes the hard work and dedication of Pennsylvania's fire police officers or dedicated volunteers that provide emergency assistance and risk their lives serving the citizens of our Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, in addition to many duties, these volunteers regulate traffic, provide safe landing zones for helicopters, and ensure that emergency areas are clear for firefighting during an emergency. What many people do not understand is that these individuals must abide by an oath of office and be sworn in by a judge or a justice. They are authorized to enforce Federal and State laws and arrest individuals violating such laws including, but not limited to, provisions pertaining to fire department activities, firefighting techniques, and emergency vehicle operations.

Mr. Speaker, in short, they represent everything that is best about the men and women who dedicate their lives to public health and safety, our safety. They have shown that good law enforcement officers are driven by a strong and sincere motivation to help better the lives of others, to shield those who cannot protect themselves, and to make a positive difference in the world. They are driven by a sense of duty and commitment to community service, and they demonstrate their commitment by assisting those in the community, notwithstanding the inherent risk and dangers of the job. The reality is they often find themselves in potentially dangerous situations. For that, I thank my colleagues for passing HR 240.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

You may speak on 318.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, each year more than 16,000 babies are born with some form of ichthyosis and a recent study has determined that approximately 300 babies are born each year with a moderate to severe form of ichthyosis. Ichthyosis is a family of genetic skin disorders characterized by dry, scaling skin that may be thickened or very thin. This rare skin disorder can present medical complications such as dehydration, infections, chronic blistering, overheating and rapid calorie loss. There is currently no known cure for ichthyosis.

Mr. Speaker, besides the common scaling condition of the skin and depending on the severity, there are associated psychological symptoms due to the abnormal appearance of the skin. Ichthyosis is disfiguring for most affected individuals. In addition to the numerous medical complications, such as dehydration, infections, chronic blistering, overheating, or rapid calorie loss, patients with ichthyosis are subject to various psychological conditions, such as depression and so forth. Patients are often ostracized and suffer from isolation, low self-esteem, and depression.

As I mentioned, Mr. Speaker, there is no cure for ichthyosis, though dedicated researchers and physicians continue to develop effective ways to help manage the disorder. Parents are also playing an important role in sharing different treatments they are receiving with fellow parents of affected children and affected adults.

Mr. Speaker, during the month of May, family and friends are encouraged around the world to join together, use their voices, and raise awareness about the challenges and the hopes of the ichthyosis community. By declaring May "Ichthyosis Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania, we are adding our voices to that chorus.

STATEMENT BY MR. CUTLER

The SPEAKER. Representative Bryan Cutler is recognized to speak on HR 300.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I want to thank everyone for their support of HR 300. I wanted to briefly describe what was contained in it. As many of you may know, I have the privilege of being our legislative appointee to the Trauma Foundation and one of our duties on the statewide Trauma Foundation is the accreditation of our trauma centers, many of our local hospitals who care for folks who have been tragically injured.

Well, one of the things that we routinely evaluate is data from those trauma centers, and I wanted to highlight the role of the trauma registrar in how they abstract the data and put it into the registry that we use. A trauma registry is an important management tool composed of a file of uniform data elements that describe the injury, event, demographics, prehospital information, diagnosis, care, outcomes, and the cost of treatments for these injured patients, needed to operate a trauma center. The trauma registrar is a vital part of that role and an integral part of the team. The overall performance improvement process at a trauma center and public health is directly dictated by the data that they enter. In addition to the data abstraction, the trauma registrar engages in other processes, such as create reports for us to do data analysis and research assistance throughout the Commonwealth.

It is important to acknowledge that high-quality data begins with high-quality data entry, and it is the trauma registrar who is on the front lines and responsible for performing that important task. Trauma registrars come from diverse medical backgrounds, such as nursing, medical records, computer science, or medical informatics, among many other traits. The registrars must be continuously learning and increasing their knowledge in their respective fields.

As a board member, I owe them a great debt for the accuracy and the quality of the work they do and I appreciate you supporting them as well. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Cutler.

Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is always a great honor to introduce the young people of our Commonwealth who have excelled and gone beyond, but before that, I stand before the body today as the chair of the Coal Caucus, 88 members, and it is my pleasure to introduce to you my cochair from the Democratic side, the lady from Greene County, Pam Snyder.

I would like to thank the King Coal Association for putting together this pageant and for always recognizing the importance of coal. With us today from the association in the back are Becky Mitchell and Lisa Allison. Thank you, girls.

Morgan is a senior at Carmichaels Area High School and plans to attend Duquesne University with the hopes of becoming a pharmacist. She is a hardworking and dedicated

individual who is an outstanding role model for other young ladies in my district. Morgan is the Carmichaels Area High School's class of 2017 valedictorian – yes, please – and was the 2016 Outstanding Spanish Student, 2016 Outstanding Physics Student, and the 2014 Outstanding Scholar of the Year. She is a member of the National Honor Society, Senior Standing Committee, newspaper staff, yearbook staff, senior high band, senior high chorus, ladies ensemble choir, county chorus, drama club, and captain of the varsity cheerleading squad. She is a busy young lady.

It is my honor to present to Morgan, on behalf of this entire body, this citation as the 2016 Bituminous Coal Queen. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

AMBASSADOR DANI DAYAN PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. We are going to keep the doors closed, because at this time Ambassador Dayan is going to be addressing our chamber.

He represents the State of Israel to communities throughout New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Delaware. He was actually born in Buenos Aires and is the first Hispanic Consul General of Israel in New York. He established a reputation as a significant public figure, lecturer, and entrepreneur. He has served as chairman of the Council of Jewish Communities in Judea and Samaria and as the Council's Chief Foreign Envoy. In these roles he has opened doors to the major seats of government worldwide and conducted regular meetings with foreign diplomats and journalists. He holds a bachelor's degree in economics and computer sciences from Bar Ilan University and a master's degree in finance from Tel Aviv University. He is fluent in Hebrew, English, and Spanish.

Ambassador, please join me at the rostrum and welcome to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Yes, you may come up here, Ambassador. Come right up to the rostrum. Thank you so much. Thank you, my friend.

AMBASSADOR DAYAN. Thank you so much.

It is a great honor and privilege to be here today as we mark the 69th anniversary of the reestablishment of the modern State of Israel. And I say "reestablishment" because the Jewish State in the ancient Jewish homeland is 3,000 years old as it is 69 years young.

I would like to share my deep appreciation to Speaker Turzai, Leader Reed, and Leader Dermody for inviting me to speak from this esteemed podium.

Our first Prime Minister, David Ben-Gurion, used to say that "In Israel, if you do not believe in miracles, then you are not a realist." Today, ladies and gentlemen, we celebrate not one but a string of miracles. We celebrate the miracle of our ancient people, that in 2,000 years of exile we never forgot Jerusalem and Zion. Every single Jewish wedding for 2,000 years, whether in Yemen, in Poland, or elsewhere in the world, always ended with the groom, in his most intimate moment of his life, pledging allegiance to Jerusalem.

We celebrate the miracle started by the vision of Theodor Herzl, the founder of modern Zionism, that converted that yearning into a political movement. Zionism is the most just and the most successful cause of modern history. We celebrate the miracle of the establishment of the modern State of Israel and

our success to defend its existence against all odds. We paid a heavy price – we still do – but never asked a foreign country to send its soldiers to defend us. We were forced to build a mighty military, but make no mistake: we will never be like war-loving Sparta; we will always be peace-loving, peace-seeking Jerusalem. We celebrate today the miracle of the ingathering of the exiles, welcoming to our shores millions: survivors of the Holocaust and refugees from Arab countries, the persecuted Soviet Jewry and the endangered Ethiopian Jewish community.

We reunified Jerusalem, our only capital since the days of King David and forever. For the first time in history, all religions enjoy full freedom of worship in the Holy City and in the Holy Land. We miraculously revolutionized our economy, putting Israel today in the global forefront of technology and innovation in medicine, science, agriculture, water, cyber security, autonomous vehicles and more. We proudly share our knowledge and capabilities with countries in Africa and anywhere that need them. We are among the first to assist regions stricken by earthquakes or floods, from Haiti to Turkey, from Nepal to Peru, and I am proud to state that we are the only country in the world to extend humanitarian aid to the suffering Syrian people inside Syria, disregarding the fact that they are an enemy country.

On behalf of the State of Israel, its government and its people, I want to thank all of you for your staunch friendship. This was demonstrated by the significant legislation that was passed through this chamber last session, sending a clear message: Pennsylvania stands with Israel. Now, if a company wishes to discriminate against Israel, it can no longer do business with your State government.

I am also happy to acknowledge that Israel's Innovation Authority is now in the final stages of formalizing a framework with the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development to identify opportunities for collaboration between Pennsylvania and the State of Israel, Pennsylvania and Israeli companies, for the development of products with the potential for commercialization in the global markets and bringing jobs to Pennsylvania and to Israel.

Ladies and gentlemen, to conclude, let me quote another former Israeli Prime Minister. In these days in which we witness a vicious, well-funded, orchestrated campaign to delegitimize Israel, let us remember the words of the late Menachem Begin: "We returned to our own ancient homeland, the land of Israel, and re-established our sovereignty, not through the right of the power, but through the power of the right."

Thank you so much. Shalom from Jerusalem.

STATEMENT BY MS. DELOZIER

The SPEAKER. Representative Delozier is recognized to speak on HR 324.

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to thank my colleagues for their unanimous vote in designating May 10, 2017, as "Annual Stigma Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.

Research conducted by the Pennsylvania Mental Health Consumers' Association found that 79 percent of Pennsylvanians said they believe society has stigmatizing thoughts, words, or actions against individuals with physical and intellectual disabilities. Most people do not realize the impact this has. The stigma prevents those with disabilities from accessing buildings, obtaining employment, living independently, engaging in the community, and reaching personal goals and aspirations that they all have.

To end this stigmatization, I am joining in the efforts to encounter greater interaction with people with disabilities and to increase education on the subject and awareness. One way is through this House resolution, which brings attention to it where many people do not think that there is a need, but with the Annual Stigma Awareness Day in Pennsylvania, we are encouraging people to examine their own stigma against those with disabilities and challenges the way that they think.

Tomorrow I invite my colleagues to join me at 10 a.m. in the rotunda to unveil a documentary entitled "What Are You Thinking?" This film, which will be shown at a variety of locations statewide in the coming months, aims to bring attention to the issue, help people recognize and become aware of their own stigmatizing thoughts, and educate the public about how they should be thinking and behaving with those with disabilities.

The one thing that we always have and many times I do with my kids is people are different and you accept those differences, because we all have issues that we can deal with, but the one thing that we can do is educate, make sure our kids know that just because there are differences does not make it any better or any worse, just different.

So I invite you to the press conference tomorrow. In addition to the press conference, the documentary will be available for viewing tomorrow at the top of every hour from 11 to 3 in room 146 of the Main Capitol.

I appreciate your willingness to vote for this and also to help in bringing awareness to the fact that differences should not divide us but bring us together.

Investments in community and transportation projects like bike paths also have an economic impact on local communities. Cycling locally promotes buying locally, and I do not know about you, but I am delighted to see more and more children back on their bikes riding to school and sports and activities. So please, I encourage all of you to support your local communities in bicycle revitalization projects as an investment in our constituents' health, businesses, aesthetic, and the overall quality of our life.

I will be riding next Monday – and I am hoping you will be joining me – I will be riding in the State's annual executive Bike to Work Day. I invite all of you – the Speaker and leaders and all of our legislators – to join me in that fun ride around the Capitol.

I again thank my fellow legislators for their support of HR 301, and let us go out there and bike.
