STATEMENT BY MR. BARBIN

The SPEAKER. At this time Representative Bryan Barbin will be speaking on HR 151, which we will be voting on later this morning, HR 151.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of HR 151. It is our annual resolution in support of Military Spouse Appreciation Day. The Military Spouse Appreciation Day recognizes the importance of the spouse in readiness to and well-being of our troops, and that has happened since 1984 with a proclamation by President Ronald Reagan. In '99 the Department of Defense decided that it should be standardized, and since 1999, this resolution and this remembrance is held on the Friday preceding Mother's Day.

I would just like to say that the military troops are the things that are keeping this country free, and our recognition of both the families, military families, and spouses are essential to the freedom that we enjoy in this country.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. BARBIN. I will submit the remainder of my remarks for the record.

Mr. BARBIN submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and all members of this Assembly for unanimous passage of our annual resolution supporting Military Spouse Appreciation Day to be celebrated this Friday, May 12, 2017.

Recognition of the profound importance of spousal commitment to readiness and well-being of our troops has been acknowledged since 1984. In 1999 the Department of Defense standardized its celebration to coincide with Mother's Day by declaring its celebration the beginning of Mother's Day weekend.

Mr. Speaker, may God bless all of our military spouses, our troops, and this great nation.

The SPEAKER. The House will stand at ease.

STATEMENT BY MR. KORTZ

The SPEAKER. Representative Bill Kortz and Representative Mike Reese are called to the podium.

Representative Bill Kortz, the floor is yours.

Mr. KORTZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to invite all of my colleagues who may be here on the floor that are part of the Lions Club to join Representative Reese and me, if you can. I know there are some members not on the floor yet, but if you are part of the Lions, please come down.

Mr. Speaker, thank you.

Today we will be offering HR 224 that recognizes the 100th anniversary of the Lions Clubs International. The first club was formed June 7, 1917, by Melvin Jones in Oak Brook, Illinois. A meeting was convened in Chicago, and their mission became to focus on community service. Think about that, 100 years ago Pennsylvania's Governor was Martin Grove Brumbaugh.

Today, Mr. Speaker, there are over 46,000 local clubs, with 1.4 million members in over 200 countries around the world. Seven hundred and thirty-four clubs are located right here in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Speaker, I am a proud member of the West Mifflin Lions Club, and I would like to introduce two guests that are here today from West Mifflin: Patrice "PT" Hlad and Paul Ludwig. Thank you both for being here today to participate.

Mr. Speaker, the Lions basic but accurate motto is "We Serve." For 100 years the Lions Club has focused on improving the lives of our most vulnerable citizens. Among their most visible programs is the eyeglass recycling program. After sorting, the glasses are distributed to those people in need. The tradition of the Lions focusing on vision issues can be traced back to Helen Keller, who addressed the 1925 international convention and challenged the organization to become "Knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." The Lions still

recognize their gratitude toward her as they annually recognize June 1 as "Helen Keller Day."

Mr. Speaker, I cannot let this recognition go by without also highlighting the ties to one of Pennsylvania's most famous exports, Little League Baseball. Back in 1939, Lion Carl Stotz of Williamsport asked local Lions Clubs and other organizations for their support for a youth baseball league he was forming. From those humble beginnings, Mr. Speaker, Little League Baseball began and is played around the world and concludes the season every August with the Little League World Series right here in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. It started by a Lion.

There are thousands of programs that are supported by the Lions Clubs in Pennsylvania and elsewhere that do not receive public recognition like Little League Baseball, yet for the local communities, they are just as important.

Mr. Speaker, I am proud to be part of the West Mifflin Lions, and I thank all my colleagues for being here today and for their support of HR 224.

And I would like to introduce my colleague, Representative Reese.

STATEMENT BY MR. REESE

The SPEAKER. Representative Mike Reese.

Mr. REESE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I also want to extend a very warm welcome to the members of the Lions International, particularly those who are my cohorts in Mount Pleasant Township. We have our district governor, Sam Snively, here today with us. Sam, thanks for coming.

Mr. Speaker, I have been a Lion since 2013, and I have witnessed firsthand the extraordinary work and noble community service performed by these great individuals. Whether they are fundraising to provide assistance to the needy families around this Commonwealth and our country or supporting great organizations like our Westmoreland County Blind Association or sending children with special needs to a summer camp or supporting our youth community sports endeavors, the impacts made by Lions truly improve the quality of life for all of us.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, it is an honor to stand here with my colleague, Representative Kortz, and the rest of my colleagues who are also Lions in supporting this resolution.

But at this time, with your permission, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce all of the Lions. If you could all stand up, please, and be recognized by our chamber. Thank you for coming.

STATEMENT BY MRS. WARD

The SPEAKER. Representative Judy Ward is recognized to speak on upcoming HR 295.

Mrs. WARD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May 6 through 12 is Nurses Week in Pennsylvania. Our Commonwealth has 217,000 registered nurses, approximately 51,000 licensed practical nurses, and over 15,000 advanced practice registered nurses, which makes nursing the largest licensed health-care profession in the Commonwealth.

Nurses are there for us when we enter into this world and, quite often, caring for us when we leave this world. In a person's lifetime they may experience many different types of specialty nurses in many types of settings, from an emergency room to critical care, OR (operating room) nurses to pediatric, geriatric, psychiatric, home-care nurses, as well as hospice nurses. Nurses are the backbone of medicine, supporting patients and assisting physicians and other health-care professionals.

Nursing is a very fulfilling profession but so often is underappreciated. If you know a nurse, please thank them for what they do for patients every single day.

I would ask for your support on HR 295, recognizing "Nurses Week" in Pennsylvania. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Ward.

STATEMENT BY MR. CALTAGIRONE

The SPEAKER. Representative Caltagirone is recognized to speak on HR 44, which we will be voting on shortly.

Mr. CALTAGIRONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to ask my colleagues to support HR 44. It will designate May 17 as "DIPG Awareness Day" in the Commonwealth, and that is diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma. It is a cancer that almost exclusively strikes children. This cancer originates in the middle of the brain stem and is very difficult to treat. After diagnosis the median survival time is 9 months. DIPG is the leading cause of childhood death due to brain tumors.

Today I want to raise the awareness about DIPG, but I also would want to take this opportunity to thank the members of the House for previously passing HB 46, which will raise much-needed research dollars for pediatric cancer research. Also, Mr. Speaker, I would implore the State Senate to take up and pass HB 46.

Mr. Speaker, we have much to do to find and fund a cure for pediatric cancer research and give these cancer warriors hope. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative.

DR. CEDRIC JIMERSON INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Representative Mark Gillen is recognized to speak on HR 232, which we will be voting upon shortly, HR 232.

Members, please take your seats.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I have a very special gentleman that I would like to introduce in just a moment. It would be enough to say that Cedric Jimerson served in World War II. It would be enough to say that he went on to become a chief surgeon at Community General Hospital in Reading. I have behind me Representative Caltagirone, who represents that area in the city of Reading. It would be sufficient to say that Dr. Jimerson was a past president of the Berks County Medical Society, but if you will bear with me just a moment, there is a fascinating story about Dr. Jimerson that I would like to share with you.

And I would ask a couple guests in the back, the folks, if they would not mind standing up, Rod, you and your good wife, Maryanne, in the back; and then if Susan Johnson could just

stand up for a moment over here. Thank you very much for coming. In a moment we will introduce Dr. Jimerson. I appreciate that.

Dr. Jimerson is 97 years old. He will be 98 years old in just a relative few months. Dr. Jimerson grew up in the horse-and-buggy era in the United States of America, and his own mother taught at a one-room schoolhouse, which he briefly spent time at.

Our resolution this morning generically recognizes those doctors and nurses and medics and first responders in general who not only served in the United States military but served the United States military.

World War II was an epic conflict that ended in the unconditional surrender of the Empire of Japan on September 2, 1945, on the deck of the USS *Missouri*. For several years prior to that unconditional surrender, Dr. Cedric Jimerson was serving in the European theater. He was a medical doctor who was attending to the wounds, the injuries, and the diseases of the Greatest Generation.

I had a historian say to me recently when I indicated I was going to have Dr. Jimerson on the floor of the State House of Representatives, he asked a very good question. He said, "How many medical doctors do you think are still with us from the Second World War?" And I said, "Have you met any recently?" And he said, "No." And I said, "I only know of one, and he lives across the street from our office."

He is still very active. I do not know if Dr. Jimerson is still going bowling with the group. Several World War II veterans that I visited recently at The Heritage of Green Hills are still going out bowling. Dr. Jimerson is very active in his community. Dr. Jimerson has never stopped serving.

And as I read through Dr. Jimerson's memoirs recently, it was not just his wartime service. If you follow the history of the Second World War, 60 to 80 million deaths, and you continue to follow the aftermath of the Second World War and displaced tens of millions of people, have you ever paused to wonder who cared for those needy throngs? Have you ever paused to consider medically as the displacement continued through the late forties and early fifties, have you ever considered who was out in the field working with those refugees?

He earned two Bronze Stars during the Second World War, and indeed, it is our honor today to have this gentleman, this patriot, this healer, this medical doctor, who esteems a love for country and compassion on those that were wounded, ill, frostbitten, and otherwise infirm. It is our great privilege to have the greatest of the Greatest Generation, Dr. Cedric Jimerson, who labored under an Army tent in Europe as the shells and the bullets flew around about him. We hear much of those first responders who run to the battle, run to the conflict. Dr. Jimerson was singularly focused on the art of healing at the risk of his own life.

Ladies and gentlemen, I ask for your attention in these closing seconds, because I do not know that this body will have another opportunity to recognize a World War II field-and-battle-tested surgeon. I present to you my friend, Dr. Cedric Jimerson.

STATEMENT BY MR. HENNESSEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Hennessey and Representative Samuelson wish to speak on HR 330, which we will be voting upon shortly.

Mr. HENNESSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand today with my colleague, Steve Samuelson, as chairmen of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, to thank my colleagues for your anticipated affirmative vote on HR 330, designating May 2017 as "Older Pennsylvanians Month" in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Historically, we also celebrate Older Americans Month in May, and several of my colleagues have also introduced a resolution to that effect here in the House.

As chairs of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, we want to ask all Pennsylvanians to take the time to acknowledge our older adults and the contributions they make every day to our society. They add to the fabric of our society and give texture to the world in which we live.

As many of you know, Pennsylvania has the sixth highest population of seniors in the nation. Since 2011, when the first baby boomers began turning age 65, 10,000 people across the United States every day reach that age. By 2020 we are told that the over-60 population in Pennsylvania will be 25 percent of Pennsylvania's total population. As these boomers age, we realize we must not only have adequate services and supports available to them, but we must recognize their expertise and the knowledge and contributions they make to our local communities.

This year's national theme is "Age Out Loud." So speak up and speak out and let people know of the contributions to our communities that our seniors make. Our seniors reinvent themselves through new work, new studies, and new efforts to volunteer in our neighborhoods, churches, and schools, and as the baby boomer generation enters, they are taking charge advocating for themselves and for others, striving to live in a more independent and healthy lifestyle and to live more meaningful lives.

So today we celebrate our older Pennsylvanians as they age out loud here in the Commonwealth. We thank them for continuing to share their talents, skills, and stories with us every day. They make Pennsylvania better. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. FARRY

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Farry is recognized to speak on HR 196, which we will be voting upon shortly, HR 196.

Mr. FARRY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to bring awareness to a serious medical issue, and that is the issue of skin cancer, which is the most common form of cancer in the United States, with current estimates that one in five Americans will develop it in their lifetime.

With summer quickly approaching and people spending more time out in the sun, it is very important and timely to bring awareness to the risk factors, prevention tips, and screening practices. Researchers estimate that 5.4 million cases of nonmelanoma skin cancer were diagnosed in 3.3 million people in the United States in 2012.

Melanoma is the deadliest form of skin cancer and will account for approximately 161,000 new cases and kill almost 10,000 people in 2017. The good news is, with early detection and treatment, melanoma and other skin cancers are highly treatable. Regular skin self-examinations to check for the signs of skin cancer and doctors' visits or screenings are the key to early detection.

If you have time today, I encourage you to stop and see the Pennsylvania Academy of Dermatology's station, which is set up in the East Wing Rotunda, off to the side by the fountain, where they are offering free skin cancer screenings and instructions on self-examinations. They will be there until 2 o'clock today.

And, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully request my colleagues' support for HR 196, which designates 2017 as "Melanoma Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month" in Pennsylvania. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MS. DONATUCCI

The SPEAKER. Representative Donatucci is recognized to speak on HR 250, which we will be voting upon shortly, HR 250.

Ms. DONATUCCI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand before you today acknowledging the importance of marking the third week of May "National Prevention Week" in Pennsylvania. Sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, National Prevention Week was created to broaden public awareness surrounding substance abuse and mental health issues.

As we embark upon the height of spring and the kickoff to summer, this year's theme, "Making Each Day Count," takes on a deeper meaning. This time of year symbolizes many celebratory occasions throughout our communities. Families are preparing for proms, graduation events, and weddings. Facilities

are gearing up for sporting events, outdoor gatherings, and other recreational activities. While we hope every friend, family member, and participant enjoys responsibly, we also know, unfortunately, the dangers that arise from the themes that will be highlighted during this health observance. The subjects that will be addressed are the prevention of youth tobacco use, underage drinking, and alcohol misuse, prescription and opioid drug misuse, illicit drug use among our youth, suicide, and the overall promotion of mental health and wellness. A number of town halls, social media campaigns, health fairs, and other educational assemblies will take place during National Prevention Week.

I encourage you all to find the opportunity to talk with both youth and parents within your local districts. You can present information regarding safe choices as they celebrate with their family and friends. As we share these resources throughout the Commonwealth, we also hope to aid someone suffering in silence or hesitant in making first steps to getting the help they need.

I would like to thank my colleagues for their anticipated support of HR 250, recognizing May 14 through 20 as "National Prevention Week" in Pennsylvania.

STATEMENT BY MR. JOZWIAK

The SPEAKER. Representative Jozwiak is recognized to speak on HR 328, and I know that he and Chairman Steve Barrar have some guests with us in the chamber today.

Mr. JOZWIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank my colleagues for voting for HR 328, commemorating the 75th anniversary of the Pennsylvania Civil Air Patrol. The Civil Air Patrol is the official civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force.

The Pennsylvania Wing of the Civil Air Patrol was founded concurrently with the Civil Air Patrol, and its volunteer members have served this Commonwealth and its residents for more than 75 years in cadet programs, aerospace, education, and emergency service missions.

The Civil Air Patrol Cadet Program was created in December of 1942, where nearly 900 cadets of this Commonwealth serve voluntarily in the Pennsylvania Wing Cadet Program along with 23,000 cadets in 52 wings nationwide.

Achievements in the Civil Air Patrol Program now serve this Commonwealth and our nation faithfully in all walks of life, including military service, education, industry, health care, agriculture, transportation, and the trades.

Cadet Garcia is a member of the award-winning Pennsylvania Wing cadet color guard and is wearing today the World War II Civil Air Patrol uniform.

And as Representative Jozwiak said, it is the 75th anniversary of the Civil Air Patrol Cadet Program. These individuals that were introduced by Representative Jozwiak are guests of Chairman Barrar and Representative Jozwiak, and we really thank you for being with us today. Thank you so much.

Mr. MURT submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Understanding history is critical to a full understanding of the human condition. History helps us appreciate why we live the way we do and why we are where we are as a people and country. Studying history allows us to learn from the mistakes of our past to make sure we do not repeat those errors and can make our world a better place. That is one of the critical lessons we must teach our children and why we must support National History Day.

National History Day in Pennsylvania is the Commonwealth's component of a national, year-long, classroom-based program that engages students in hands-on historical research and exploration. Each year more than 2,000 students participate in local contests with the support of their school peers, teachers, and parents to celebrate the importance of history and the brightest students of the Commonwealth.

National History Day is a national program to create an understanding and appreciation of history while developing the necessary skills and aptitudes of our diverse student population. It encourages students from 6th to 12th graders to research, write, and think critically about our nation's past. After competing successfully in the local and regional contests, more than 100 students, teachers, parents, and family members will gather for the National History Day in Pennsylvania contest. Students who participate in National History Day in Pennsylvania are better prepared for college and careers.

That is why it is so important that we designate May 13, 2017, as National History Day in Pennsylvania. It is a way to encourage students, teachers, and other residents of this Commonwealth to appreciate the history of our State and nation.

LORI LOCHETTO PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. It is my great honor and pleasure to recognize and congratulate a member of our staff, in particular the Speaker's staff, but she has served the entire chamber loyally, effectively, with much class, much grace, much intelligence for 35 years.

Lori Lochetto began her career with the House of Representatives when she was 19 years old. And I do not know how, she does not seem to have aged much despite working here. Following her graduation from Central Penn Business

School, she began working for former Representative Samuel Hayes on May 1 of 1982 and continued with Representative Hayes in his various leadership roles for nearly a decade, including I know he served as majority leader.

Lori's outstanding work ethic led her to responsible administrative positions with Representative Todd Platts, who went on to become Congressman, and former Speakers John Perzel, Sam Smith, and my own office as Speaker, and she has continued to excel in a position that, as you may know and I think most of you do know, carries with it an inordinate level of responsibility.

For the better part of two decades, she has been the individual responsible for the correct and timely movement of every piece of legislation considered by the House of Representatives. Stop and reflect on that. Every now and then we say, "Oh, something is not up." The fact is, we pretty much function quite, quite seamlessly because of Lori. She puts on the system each and every bill, each and every resolution for us to view on our computers or to look on hard copies. She tracks the movement of those bills to comply with our somewhat cumbersome House rules. When you get right down to it, we could not begin or end any session day without Lori Lochetto. Her position requires, and this is an understatement, attention to detail, and she is meticulous in her approach to every aspect of the position that she holds.

During my 4 years as majority leader and my tenure as Speaker alone, she has never missed a single session day. Her level of dedication is unsurpassed. Lori, we want you to know the sacrifices that you have made for our institution, democracy in Pennsylvania, serving the 12 million citizens of Pennsylvania, you are never flustered, you are always professional, you are always poised, and you are always prepared. We simply cannot thank you enough. We simply do not know that we are even going to be able to come back to work without you, by the way, although we know you have been training Laura very diligently over the past months, and we are very appreciative of that too. She is the one that prepared us for her departure and the transition leading into her departure.

MOTION TO REVERT TO PRIOR PRINTER'S NUMBER

The SPEAKER. Representative Bradford is recognized.
Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As you know, this bill came over from the Senate to bring Pennsylvania into compliance. A deadline is shortly upon us, and while I realize the amendments that were put in the House State Government Committee were well-meaning, I believe it puts an obstacle in terms of the deadline that we are up against.

So therefore, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully make a motion to revert to prior printer's number, PN 0555.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. On the motion— First of all, Representative Bradford, do you want to speak on the motion? Okay.

Representative Metcalfe, on the motion, sir. You may proceed.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
Mr. Speaker, I oppose the motion.

Has a motion been made, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The motion in front of us is a motion to revert to a prior printer's number.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. And the printer's number is 555 that the gentleman wishes to revert to.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you. I see it is now up on the board, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

So I oppose the motion to revert, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we have done a lot of work in the State Government Committee and members both in the House and the Senate to ensure that we can move Pennsylvania forward to comply with the Federal REAL ID Act, and we have done so with the most recent amendment in the State Government Committee so that we can make sure that we are complying with it at the same time as protecting Pennsylvania taxpayers and Pennsylvania drivers who do not choose to have the REAL ID, Mr. Speaker, in this two-tier system that has been set up through the amendment that also was set up, a similar system also set up by the Senate or at least that was their intent in their legislation.

Mr. Speaker, our amendment allows us to come into compliance, allows the department to do what they have to do to bring us into full compliance, Mr. Speaker, and once again, it does it in a way that protects the citizens of Pennsylvania from being forced into obtaining that ID if they do not choose and

also protects them from having to pay for it if they are not choosing to secure a REAL ID, Mr. Speaker.

But, Mr. Speaker, there are some drafting issues with the original Senate language, most specifically on page 2 of their original language, on line 28 where they were working to set up an alternative or an option to either have a driver's license or a REAL ID card, Mr. Speaker, and the language reads, "AN OPTION TO OBTAIN EITHER A STANDARD-ISSUED DRIVER'S LICENSE OR IDENTIFICATION CARD," Mr. Speaker. And that should have been not just for an identification card that PENNDOT issues to nondrivers, but it also should have included "or a REAL ID-issued driver's license," Mr. Speaker.

So there is a fatal flaw in the drafting of the Senate language that we would be reverting to, so if we hope to meet the deadlines that are approaching for the Feds to actually consider giving us another extension based on a good-faith effort here in the General Assembly, Mr. Speaker, then we need to pass SB 133 as we amended it in the State Government Committee, and we need to ensure that we do not revert to the prior language that came from the Senate that has this fatal flaw in the language, Mr. Speaker.

So I would ask for a "no" vote on the motion to revert to the prior printer's number, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you.
Representative Bradford.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

With all due respect to the majority chairman, I have viewed the language that he believes is fatal, and as well as the Senate lawyers, the lawyers for PENNDOT, the lawyers for the Department of Homeland Security, and after much debate and much compromise, a two-tier system has been set up. The Senate amendments allow us to come into compliance.

As you know, we have a deadline in the first week of June and we are quickly falling upon it. Our legislative calendar dictates that without crazy gymnastics, the ability to obtain access to Federal buildings will become in jeopardy within weeks and travel will be impaired within months.

I respect the opinion of the majority chair on this particular language, but lawyers at all levels of government, including those lawyers who the leaders of every caucus, including our Governor, are making representations to our Federal Department of Homeland Security, have made representations that we will move the agreed-to language. The Senate language, the word "language," has been agreed to by all parties. It allows us to end this and put it into the hands of the Federal government so that we can open the friendly skies and we can give access to Federal buildings to all of our constituents.

Again, I respect greatly the work of the majority chair and understand his concerns, but I would argue that a compromise has been reached and the time to move on from this issue is now. I would ask for your support for this prior – to this reversion to the prior printer's number so we can once and for all put this issue to bed and bring Pennsylvania into compliance. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative John Lawrence.

Mr. LAWRENCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I certainly respect the gentleman who just spoke with regard to the motion. I would encourage a "no" vote on the motion to revert to the prior printer's number.

The amendment that was inserted into the bill in the State Government Committee earlier this week contains several key protections that were not in the underlying bill as it came over from the Senate. Specifically, it gives the Department of Transportation specific direction on how this is to be funded. It also gives specific direction with regard to annual reporting going forward. That is not something that was in the Senate language and I think is very important so we see going forward how many citizens, how many residents of Pennsylvania actually are signing up for the REAL IDs. It also contains important protection language that no one in the State will be compelled to get a REAL ID against their will.

So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I would strongly encourage the members to vote "no" on the motion to revert to the prior printer's number. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Longietti.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would urge that my colleagues support the motion to revert to the prior printer's number offered by the gentleman from Montgomery County, and I think he very articulately stated how the original bill that came over from the Senate with, by the way, only two negative votes – 48 to 2 – how that has been vetted by a series of attorneys to say this is exactly what we need to do to move this issue forward.

This is an issue that affects our people back home. They are paying attention to this issue, and I have heard it when I have walked around my district, I hear senior citizens who are concerned, "Am I going to be able to get on an airplane?" I had a significant bus and tour company reach out to me and they travel to Federal facilities and that is the first, you know, that is the first stumbling block if we do not take care of this, and they specifically told me, you need to get this fixed in Harrisburg or we are going to have a problem and it is going to impair our business and it is going to impair tourism in the State of Pennsylvania.

I stand here as the Democratic chair of the House Tourism Committee. Tourism at the very least is our second largest industry in the Commonwealth. It is an economic generator. You know, our fundamental job is to make the lives of our constituents better and easier, and I firmly believe that if we do not revert to the prior printer's number and pass this and get it to the Governor's desk now, we are going to do the exact opposite. We are going to make it more difficult for our constituents, more difficult for our businesses, and we are all going to be held accountable for that.

So I would urge an affirmative vote on the gentleman from Montgomery County's motion to revert to the prior printer's number. Let us do what is in the best interest of our constituents. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Bill Keller.

Mr. W. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand in support of the revert to the prior printer's number. I think people should pay attention – this is one of the issues that affect people back home that they do not fully understand what we are doing up here. If we do not revert to the prior printer's number – June 6 is our deadline – June 6 you will not be able to enter a Federal facility that requires identification.

Now, one of the main things— We are very proud in Pennsylvania that we have a lot of our young people volunteer to go into the military and they will be graduating boot camp. Go think about your constituent who has a child graduating boot

camp, they pull up to the facility, give their Pennsylvania license, and they say at the gate, "This is no longer the right ID you need to get in this facility."

We are going to affect our constituents back home and they will not realize it until it is too late. This is the way we can meet the June 6 date, get this to the Governor's desk, and the Feds will agree that this is a good repeal of the act. I think everybody should really consider our constituents back home before they vote on this bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Keller.

Representative Brandon Neuman.

Members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats.

Representative Neuman, the floor is yours.

Mr. NEUMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And a different perspective on this piece of legislation and the urgency to revert back to the prior printer's number: we have to look at our Federal court system. If we cannot get this done – and every indication and communication I have received is that the Federal government is not going to accept SB 133 as amended in committee but they will accept the version that the Senate sent over to us to get to the Governor's desk and get this completed so our constituents have access to travel.

But even more important to that, in our judicial system if the Federal government does not accept SB 133 as drafted, we will no longer have a jury pool for jurors to get into Federal buildings. Our constituents that have cases, Social Security cases and other cases, in Federal buildings will no longer be allowed to attend their hearings. Attorneys will no longer be able to represent their clients. This is very, very important and could have grave consequences on our Federal court system. If we have no jury pool, you cannot have a Federal grand jury, you cannot have cases move forward through the judicial system. These are very, very important cases a lot of times that have violent drug dealers, have violent criminals that are going through the Federal court system. There will no longer be a jury pool and could bring our Federal court system to a halt here in Pennsylvania.

So I think it is imperative upon us that we revert back to the prior printer's number, understanding that the Federal government will accept what the Senate sent over to us and hopefully we can allow our constituents to continue to have full access to travel and continue to have full access to the Federal judicial system as it is intended.

So, Mr. Speaker, I ask that you support this revert, to revert back to the prior printer's number so that our constituents can enjoy citizenship in the United States as it is intended to be. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Bryan Barbin.

Mr. BARBIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I ask all members of the Assembly to agree to this motion to revert. It is a compromise by the Senate Republicans and Democrats. It meets the requirements of the REAL ID Act, which are Federal requirements. I will be traveling to Fort Benning to go to a graduation for my nephew in June. I would like to make sure that this is handled so that I can get access to the base.

The SPEAKER. Representative Cris Dush.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to quickly address something that was brought up—

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats.

Mr. DUSH. This card that I hold in my hand is my retired military ID card. It is REAL ID compliant. All right. The only thing that makes it REAL ID compliant is the information that is collected in order to verify your identification before that card is issued – a birth certificate with the raised seal and two other forms of identification.

We have military members like myself – retired, active duty – who are carrying around REAL ID. We have people who have passports around the Commonwealth who are carrying around REAL ID. They have also got the passport cards that are about the same size as this that fit in your wallet. They do not need to endure the additional expense that PENNDOT is going to want in order to create these new ID cards.

Mr. Speaker, this corrected language is compliant with the Federal requirements. All that is required for these ID cards is to show that it is REAL ID on the title of the card and also to have the underlying supporting documents. This bill handles that completely.

I support a "no" vote against this bill to revert. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative John Lawrence.

Mr. LAWRENCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I apologize for speaking for a second time, Mr. Speaker, but I do think – I do want to reinforce two points: First, as the gentleman from Butler mentioned earlier, the underlying bill unamended that we would be reverting to has a fatal drafting flaw as he noted – page 2, line 28 – and that is not insignificant. I would draw that to the members' attention, and I would again ask for a "no" vote on the motion to revert to a prior printer's number.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Reed, the majority leader, on the motion.

Mr. REED. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

You know, obviously, there is a great deal of concern out there that Pennsylvania not become compliant with the REAL ID law and how that would impact our everyday citizens, whether it be through air travel or entering into Federal buildings across the Commonwealth.

I know the State Government Committee has spent a lot of time and effort in formulating a proposal to become compliant with REAL ID within the timeframe that has been presented by the Federal government. Obviously, the Senate had a little bit of a different version of how to do so.

We would like to move forward with this proposal as it came out of the State Government Committee today, knowing, you know, there may be some further negotiations down the road over the next couple of weeks as we move to final legislation to actually get it to the Governor's desk so that we become compliant with the REAL ID law as prescribed by the Federal government.

So today I would ask that the members oppose the motion to revert to the prior printer's number. Let us keep this process moving. Let us get this bill out of the House, back over to the Senate, and let us get this finalized within the timeframe prescribed by the Federal government so that we do not have any increased burden upon our citizens that they do not need to deal with on a daily basis.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Leader Reed.

Representative Bradford.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In the same vein as what the majority leader just said, I would suggest that we revert, this goes right to the Governor, and we end this once and for all.

I realize this is not an ideological issue. This is not a Democrat or Republican issue. This is just a functioning government issue. It is access to our Federal buildings and our airports. There is already a compromise in place. The Federal government, the Trump administration, the Department of Transportation have agreed to this language. I think there is a compromise in place that will allow us to very quickly today revert to the prior printer's number, put this on the Governor's desk, and end the uncertainty that this has created in the Commonwealth. With a very simple vote today, we put this on a quick path to passage and ending this.
