I rise today to thank my colleagues for the unanimous vote declaring May 2017 as "Blue Star Mothers of America Month" in PA. It is an honor to have my mom, Eva—

So real quick, Blue Star Mothers of America was founded in 1942 as a patriotic service organization to unite mothers who have sons and daughters who are currently serving in the United States military or are honorably discharged veterans. The group provides support for active duty personnel and their families, promotes patriotism, and assists various veterans' organizations, such as the Gold Star Mothers. For those who are unfamiliar, Gold Star Mothers are those mothers who have lost a son or daughter while serving in the Armed Forces.

As I have recently returned from active duty at Fort Rucker, Alabama, I am also keenly aware of the importance of having a family support unit while gone. Having support from those at home while you are serving away makes all the difference, and the emails and care packages boost morale and provide that little piece of home while you are so far away.

STATEMENT BY MR. MILNE

The SPEAKER. Representative Duane Milne is recognized with respect to HR 116, and he has a very special guest with him.

Representative Milne, the floor is yours.

Mr. MILNE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am honored today to introduce to the House Dr. Edith Mitchell, who is a resident of my legislative district and is also a pioneer and a leader in many respects for our Commonwealth.

Dr. Mitchell has been focused very heavily on cancer research, and she has a very particular niche that I think is very helpful for all of us to be aware of. Dr. Mitchell and others—

Members, please take your seats. We have a very special guest with us today. Members, please take your seats. Staff members, please, if you could, take your seats as well. Any conversations can go off the back floor. All guests, please take your seats. We have a very, very special guest with us today.

Representative Milne, can you please start – thank you, sir.

Mr. MILNE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Ladies and gentlemen of the House, I am delighted to introduce a guest of mine and a resident of my district, Dr. Edith Mitchell, who is a pioneer and a leader here in this Commonwealth in a multitude of ways, which I shall touch upon.

Dr. Mitchell has spent a lifetime focused on cancer research and has developed a very particular niche that I think is very useful and enlightening for all of us to be aware of. Dr. Mitchell and other scientists are increasingly focused on how slight variations in a person's genetic makeup can have a drastic impact on the way that cancer invades an individual's body. Understanding how these disparities can improve how the screening processes for cures are established helps doctors understand which treatments will and will not be effective and what is the best protocol for treatments. The scientific revolution that I just described, ladies and gentlemen, is happening right here in our Commonwealth at the Sidney Kimmel Cancer Center at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia, and leading this vital lifesaving transformation is my guest, Dr. Edith Mitchell, the founder of the Center to Eliminate Cancer Disparities at Jefferson.

Dr. Mitchell, as I mentioned, has dedicated her medical career to help individuals in medically underserved areas learn how simple changes in lifestyle can have a dramatic impact on their cancer care. Through her work and service, Dr. Mitchell has demonstrated the importance of community service and

outreach, especially to those individuals who may not have the means to seek out more conventional medical advice.

Dr. Mitchell has long demonstrated her dedication to country and community. While attending medical school, she entered the United States Air Force and received an officer commission through the Health Professions Scholarship Program. After completing her internship and residency in internal medicine, she entered active duty. I am pleased to report to you that Dr. Mitchell is not only an outstanding physician, she is a retired brigadier general from the United States Air Force, and in fact, she is the first female physician in the history of the United States Air Force to attain this rank.

Among her many community honors, Dr. Mitchell has received the Tree of Life Award from the Wellness of You, a Philadelphia nonprofit which recognizes health professionals who are committed to making a difference in community health, and she has also received the American Cancer Society's Cancer Control Award for her significant commitment to research, education, and diversity. No wonder, ladies and gentlemen, that the National Medical Association, which is the nation's oldest and largest professional society for African-American physicians, has appointed Dr. Mitchell as the organization's 116th president, commencing in 2015.

Her greatest impact, though, may be still right here in our Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Dr. Mitchell has continued to focus on creating strategic priorities to eliminate those disparities in health care and other types of medical treatments through her focus on innovative research, education and training, advocacy, community outreach, and quality medical care. She has engaged in this battle against cancer through clinical, translational, and population-based research, and she is collaborating with national organizations which can use her work to build upon her starts.

Dr. Mitchell is creating, leaving, and establishing a legacy of technical expertise, research, and critical new data discovery that will help thousands of Pennsylvanians and millions of citizens across the country ultimately, as they benefit from her work and leadership. In a very fundamental way, Dr. Edith Mitchell is literally creating a legacy of life.

STATEMENT BY MR. FARRY

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Farry is recognized on HR 341, sir.

Mr. FARRY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to bring recognition to the valued contributions our accelerant detection canines, also known as arson dogs, bring to our fire service, law enforcement, and our communities. Arson is one of the most expensive property claims in the United States, each year costing billions of dollars in property damage and resulting in hundreds of lives lost. It is important that law enforcement officials have every tool possible to combat these costly and sometimes deadly crimes. Arson dogs go through extensive training and are able to sniff out minute traces of accelerants that have been used to start a fire. Tests

have shown that trained dogs are superior to mechanical instruments in detecting accelerants at fire scenes. It takes an average of 30 minutes for an arson dog to cover the complete fire scene, but for a human, that task may take many days. The canines' abilities reduce the time needed by fire investigators to gather information about a fire, save the department and community both time and money, locate more accurate evidence samples, reduce the amount of costly analysis by laboratories, and assist in closing arson cases. They also act as a deterrent, resulting in a reduction of the arson problem.

Mr. Speaker, I want to thank our colleagues for their support of HR 341, which designates the week of May 22 through 28, 2017 as "Pennsylvania Arson Dogs Appreciation Week." By voting in the affirmative, we have paid tribute to the contribution of arson dogs that they make to our fire departments, law enforcement agencies, and communities, as well as giving special acknowledgement to all of our fire and law enforcement investigative agencies for their dedication and tireless service.

STATEMENT BY MS. DELOZIER

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats. I am now calling upon Representative Sheryl DeLozier on unanimous consent, and she has a very special guest with her today. So I would ask everybody to please take your seats.

Representative DeLozier, the floor is yours,

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May is Brain Cancer Awareness Month, so it is very appropriate that this guest comes to our chamber today. I am very pleased to be joined on the House floor by BethAnn Telford. BethAnn, whose home is in my district in Lower Allen Township, not only ran seven marathons on seven continents in 7 days in January, but also is a brain cancer survivor. An avid athlete from a young age, BethAnn was first diagnosed with brain cancer in 2005. In the 12 years since, she has undergone multiple surgeries related to the cancer, and she still has active cancer cells in her body, has seizures, and is blind in her left eye. Through it all, BethAnn has not let this disease dictate her life. She has completed and finished 6 Boston Marathons, 15 Marine Corps Marathons, the Lake Placid Ironman – not once, but twice – the Kona Ironman World Championship, and a 9-hour rim-to-rim trek of the Grand Canyon.

I know that many of you may have seen her on the news when they were doing stories of her latest accomplishment this past January. Her most recent marathon, as I mentioned, in 2017 was the World Marathon Challenge, and it was not something that I was aware of until I saw the news reports as to exactly what this is about. It allowed her to run on seven continents in 7 days, which included, obviously, she had to get from continent to continent. It started on January 23 in Antarctica and concluded on January 29 in Australia. She was the only cancer survivor and the only American woman in the race. BethAnn joined the race to raise global awareness about brain cancer and raise money for research. This was not the first time that BethAnn has partnered her running love with raising money for brain cancer. She founded a team as part of the Race for Hope-DC, and has helped raise more than \$800,000 for brain

cancer research. She has also testified before the FDA (Federal Drug Administration), lobbied Congress, and has two National Brain Tumor Society grants in her name.

BethAnn has many people that have supported her throughout her time fighting cancer as well as doing all of the races that have been so important to her. Some of those people are here with her today. We are joined today by her family, her mom and dad, Robert and Susanne Telford. We are joined also by Rob Long and Scott Shirley, the executive director of Uplifting Athletes and CEO (chief executive officer) of PLEDGE IT, that are here in the back. And some of you may recognize her dad, because her dad was a longtime staff employee, as he started as a page and then continued on in the mailroom over in the Senate, which he enjoyed. And his daughter, BethAnn's sister, followed in those footsteps and is a staffer over in the Senate as well, and she joins us here today. Would you please stand up.

BethAnn Telford is a true inspiration. I do not know many people that would not only fight the cancer but also fight for the cause. I ask my colleagues to please join me in congratulating her and wishing her many more successes as she continues her fight on both fronts.

Thank you very much, BethAnn, and thank you, colleagues.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. I understand Representative Davis is going to be submitting remarks on HR 317.

Mrs. DAVIS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, colleagues, for your unanimous support of PANDAS Awareness Day in Pennsylvania.

PANDAS stands for a Pediatric Autoimmune Neuropsychiatric Disorder Associated with Streptococcal Infections. That is a very different thing, and for parents, it is a very frightening thing. PANDAS occurs when a strep infection triggers a misdirected immune response, resulting in inflammation on a child's brain. The child quickly begins to exhibit life-changing symptoms such as OCD (obsessive-compulsive disorder), anxiety, tics, personality changes, a decline in math and handwriting abilities, sensory sensitivities, and restrictive eating. The PANDAS Network estimates that PANDAS affects as many as 1 in 200 children. My guests, Nicole and Tyler Harper, were not able to make the trip today because of Tyler's declining health and loss of numerous school days.

PANDAS is frequently misdiagnosed and mistreated due to the lack of awareness and conflicting interpretations and subjective observation in the medical community. The National Institute of Mental Health has dedicated resources to research and broaden awareness of the disorder, but PANDAS still remains a subject of much debate and controversy. But with our help, we can bring much-needed light to the debate over diagnosis. For the parents who have had to deal with these frightening neurological symptoms, there is no debating the facts. It is only a matter of spreading awareness so that the medical community can reach a consensus on its treatment and so that some insurance

companies can officially recognize those treatments. If you have questions about this condition, I encourage you to go online, find resources, and talk with the parents who have experienced this.

And as we make our liquor system more consumer-friendly, we should not be ignoring the fact that in many of these locations, these distributors sell those products, Pennsylvania products, and now we are replacing some of that space with wine and spirits, and my amendments were filed to make sure that we continue to make certain that we have got a great distribution system for the products made here in Pennsylvania, namely craft beers.

But after a conversation with the maker of the bill, I will be withdrawing those amendments, but working in the future to make sure that our manufacturers that also promote tourism in the State of Pennsylvania have adequate ability to sell their products here in PA.

So thank you, Mr. Speaker; I will be withdrawing those amendments.
