But if any forget God and call not upon His name in truth, He will pour out His plagues upon you and they shall know who it is that judged ye children of men.

And now liberty and authority are with you, and in your hands let the government be on His shoulders, in all your spirits, that you may rule for Him, to whom the princes of this world will one day esteem it their honor to govern under and serve in their places.

Truly the name and glory of the Lord are deeply concerned in you as to the discharge of yourselves in your present stations, many eyes being upon you. Remember that as we have been belied about disowning the true religion, so of all government. And yet to behold us exemplary and Christian will not only stop our enemies but minister conviction to many on that account prejudiced.

And thou Philadelphia, the virgin settlement of this province, named before thou were born, what love, what care, what service, and what travail have there been to bring thee forth and preserve thee from such as would abuse and defile thee. O that thou may be kept from the evil that would overwhelm thee, yet faithful to the God of thy mercies in the life of righteousness thou may be preserved to the end.

So dear friends, my love again salutes you, wishing you that grace, mercy, and peace with all temporal blessings may abound richly among you. So says, so prays, your friend and lover in the truth, William Penn, from on board the Ketch Endeavour, June 12, 1684.

Today I rise to present the 2016-2017 PIAA Class 6A Boys Basketball Champions. My alma mater, Reading High School, the Red Knights, defeated Pine-Richland by a score of 64 to 60 before a sold-out crowd at the Giant Center in Hershey to bring home our first State championship ever and finishing the year with a 30-3 record.

This State title transcends sports. It needs to be noted that Reading is one of the only few purely public schools to win a State title this year and they did it with talented student athletes from Reading. This championship provides hope in our community and pride in our schools.

I have been a member of the House of Representatives for over 41 years, and I have to admit, today is one of the proudest moments for me in this body. Today our boys from Reading stand above the rest, today our boys ended a 118-year drought, and today our boys showed every child in Reading that they can achieve great things if they work hard and do the right thing.

The Reading community is proud of our student athletes, and we take pride in the many professional athletes, coaches, and alumni that we have produced over the years. We are also proud of the 20 district titles won by our Red Knights and proud of the distinction as the winningest high school basketball program in PIAA history.

But nothing compares to this moment. This State championship means more to our community than you can imagine. Mr. Speaker, the foundation laid at Reading High

School will carry these student athletes through their lives, and I am confident they will continue to achieve great things. Not all of these players will make it to the NBA (National Basketball Association), but rest assured, the ones that are not playing professionally will be the future leaders in our communities.

Mr. Speaker, today the Pennsylvania House of Representatives recognizes the talents and greatness of our Reading High School students, athletes, coaches, administrators, and our entire Red Knights Nation. As a 1961 graduate of Reading High School, I could not be more proud of this team and a community that lifted them up all along the way. Thank you.

And I definitely want to welcome the Red Knights to the House of Representatives today, and I also want to, you know, Mr. Speaker, I know that you are a very competitive person. I saw it yesterday on the House floor when you paused the bill, you did not stop the bill, and you like winning, but unfortunately, your home team of Pine-Richland, very formidable opponents, and they played their hearts out. They, unfortunately, did not win the State championship, and as Representative Caltagirone has said, our Red Knights have the most wins in school history over the 118 years and this is our first championship and we have been very close many times before, including 1973 when Stu Jackson played, when we were playing General Braddock, where we lost the game at the end on free throws with no time remaining on the clock. We also lost in 1991 when Donyell Marshall, and in fact, I got a chance to play against Donyell Marshall and it did not end well for me, but we lost in the semifinals against Glen Mills that time.

So there are a lot of people that were following our city, you know, our Red Knights from the city, the county who wanted to see this team, you know, do well, and again, these boys and the coach, you know, they put the kids, the community, on their backs and carried us. You know, we did not carry them to the State championship, they carried us, and I can remember watching the game as it was on PCN and streamlining it and just how proud I was of these boys, and I can even remember even the team managers, Lizette and Yarell, who, as I was watching the game, they were standing behind the bench with their phones snapping the players and everybody what was going on.

So we are just real proud of these kids and the job they have done, and I also want to recognize Coach Rick Perez as being the 6A Coach of the Year as well, and I also want to recognize Lonnie Walker as being the 6A Player of the Year as well. Congratulations, Lonnie.

Rest assured, the Reading High Red Knights are the best basketball team in the State of Pennsylvania this year, hands down. So again, thank you for the Red Knights coming up and, you know, continued success for all the kids moving forward.

STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER. At this time Representative Mark Gillen is called to the podium. I would ask all members to please take their seats.

Representative Gillen, you may proceed.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We have very unique and very special guests here with us today. This resolution acknowledges those who not only who served in World War II but continued to serve their country in Korea and through the Vietnam Conflict.

On September 2, 1945, Lou Cinfici sat on his perch on an LT-784 and not too far away sat the USS *Missouri* and he witnessed the unconditional surrender of the Empire of Japan ending the Second World War. During the Korean Conflict, he and his two brothers were on the USS *Sicily* together. The storied career continued in 1962 aboard the USS *Intrepid*, where he helped bring Scott Carpenter out of the water after his flight; continued through the Vietnam war in Da Nang where he was stationed. The Solomon Islands, in World War II, the Gilberts,

the Marshall Islands, Midway, and Lou Cinfici's footsteps also landed on the destroyed Japanese city of Nagasaki. As I read this morning out of Ecclesiastes, a particular verse struck me, "There is a time of war and there is a time of peace." I had a conversation with Lou not too long ago. He was relating that story of walking the leveled city of Nagasaki. He had walked in with a young lady who was trying to put her life back together, looking amidst the rubble for her possessions, and Lou Cinfici was there to help.

Not only was Lou Cinfici in uniform during the Second World War, Lou Cinfici's five brothers were also in uniform, and he told me a story of coming into the Panama Canal Zone and the captain of the ship had learned that there were six Cinfici brothers in uniform and he offered Lou the opportunity to get off the ship and not go into the combat zone. I think we are all pretty sure what Lou's answer to that was. In fact, nine Cinfici brothers from Reading were in uniform in and around the Second World War. I would say that it is probably in their DNA, because Morris Cinfici, his father, was a World War I veteran.

A very moving experience occurred in the Solomon Islands during the Second World War when Lou had learned that his brother was nearby, both of them in a combat zone, both of them in dangerous situations, and Lou got off of his ship and was able to embrace his brother and spend time with him.

Ladies and gentlemen, the Cinfici family embodies the American spirit. Though they were eyewitnesses to history, they made history. They were participants. Their mother and father did not send a son or a daughter off to war. They sent nine children into harm's way, and by the grace of God, all nine Cinficis returned home to continue that service.

We often refer to this as the Greatest Generation, but I pause in my own mind to wonder, what were the parents like of that Greatest Generation? What was it in their lives that produced that greatness? Faith; family; a love of duty, honor, and country.

Ladies and gentlemen, please pause to acknowledge Luigi Cinfici, sir, and his wife, Nancy.

GUESTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Located to the left of the rostrum, we are very honored to welcome Phyllis Yaffe, the Consul General of Canada, located in New York. She assumed her position in July of 2016 and has had a distinguished career in both the private and not-for-profit sectors. She has served as chair of the board of Cineplex Entertainment, lead director of Torstar Corporation, and as a member of the boards of Lionsgate Entertainment and Blue Ant Media.

For many years she served as a senior officer and ultimately a chief executive officer of Alliance Atlantis Communications, where she oversaw the popular "CSI" television franchise. She holds a master of library science degree from the University of Toronto, a bachelor of library science degree from the University of Alberta, and a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Manitoba.

With her today are Caroline Desrochers and Luc Santerre from the Consulate General, as well as Constable Sue Phillips.

CONSUL GENERAL PHYLLIS YAFFE PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. We are honored to have the Consul General address the House, and she will be accompanied by the constable. I would ask them to the rostrum.

We are very honored to have you here today, Ms. Yaffe, the Consul General of Canada.

Ms. YAFFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your kind words and for welcoming me in your House, even after last night. Thank you very much.

I have to say that this is a wonderful institution, a magnificent building, and as I mentioned yesterday in the Senate, these are the rooms that are the temples of democracy, and I just congratulate you on being able to serve in such a remarkable space.

I could not be more honored to address this distinguished legislative body in what I believe is a historic and a remarkable chamber and it stands as a powerful symbol of freedom and your choice to be governed in a democratic way. In the short while that I have been here, I have been struck by the genuine warmth of the people here in Harrisburg. I think this really symbolizes the extraordinary alliance and the deep friendship between our two nations. Canada and the United States share one of the closest relationships between any two countries in the world.

In 2016 bilateral trade exceeded \$635 billion, representing over \$1.7 billion worth of goods and services crossing the border every day. That means our countries have done roughly \$1.3 million of trade since I began speaking to you today.

Our relationship is really a model for the world. It is growing, it is balanced, it is fair, and it supports growth, innovation, and good-paying jobs in both countries. Canada's relationship with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is a particularly strong example of how closely our people and our businesses work together. We are natural economic partners, we have common industrial pasts, and we share similar ambitions for a future fueled by innovation. Canada is Pennsylvania's number one trading partner and export market and two-way trade, totaling \$19.9 billion in 2016. In fact, Pennsylvania sells more goods to Canada than to the next four largest foreign markets combined. But as I always say, these numbers only tell part of the story. The success of our relationship has been largely driven by the integration of our supply chains. We do not simply trade finished goods with each other. We build things together, and together we compete against the rest of the world.

This is my fourth visit to Pennsylvania since I began my role as Consul General last summer, and each visit has left me inspired and energized to do more. I look forward to deepening our cooperation, and I know that by working together, by ensuring the free flow of our goods and services across our border, and by keeping our procurement markets open to each other, there is no limit to what we can achieve together.

I talked a lot about our trading relationship. So let me end with a few words about our security partnership. We are linked by a vast web of commercial ties, but we are also linked by our joint commitment to the safety and security of our people. In a world that is too often marked by conflict, our two countries are joined by the longest undefended border in the world, and while

there is a lot of instability in the world today, I can say with full confidence that the Canada-U.S. relationship is stronger than it has ever been and we will continue to stand shoulder-to-shoulder with each other as partners, as allies, and most importantly as friends. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Consul General.

The Pittsburgh Penguins-Ottawa game is coming up to Game 7. I think we are going to be on different sides there, but otherwise I know we have a great relationship between the two countries and we are so honored to have you here in Pennsylvania and with our chamber.

As you know, we go back to 1682, our antecedents as countries are similar, but Pennsylvania as a colony goes back to 1682, when William Penn came here to found our colony on religious tolerance and we know what a great nation Canada is and how open and diverse and democratic it is. It is a wonderful country. Thank you for being with us.

Representative Vitali, you are recognized.
Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
Will the maker of the bill stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The maker has indicated she will stand for interrogation, and you may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Well, first of all, thank you for bringing up an important bill that, you know, really attacks an important problem.

Initially, could you just explain what the bill would do?

Ms. HAHN. So the bill that I introduced was brought to me by the district magistrates. They were looking for a tiered system for people with a DUI (driving under the influence) offense and then had their license suspended. If they had subsequent suspensions, stops for having a suspension while driving, but the initial was a DUI, they wanted a tiered system so that they have more teeth in the fines that they put in.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Now, I just want to be clear, because I am looking at section 1 of the bill, which starts on page 1, section (ii), and it looks like there are penalties for driving under a suspended license, second and third offenses that are not related to a DUI. Am I correct in that, that these incarcerations, mandatory incarcerations for second and third and fourth are simply for driving while your license is suspended, even if you committed no other offense?

Ms. HAHN. No. My bill is for DUI. The original offense had to be DUI.

Mr. VITALI. Right. But just to be clear, I am looking at page 2, line 16, where it says for "A second violation...." See, this amends section 1543, "Driving while operating privilege is suspended or revoked," and then it talks about a second violation of not less than 90 days in jail. Now, unless I am missing some language that is somewhere else—

Ms. HAHN. To create the following tiered penalty system for a person who drives while their license is suspended because of a DUI.

Mr. VITALI. Well, where does it say— That is probably what I just missed. So where does it say— Where is the DUI part? Is it on page 1 or 2 or—

Ms. HAHN. 1543(b)(1).

Mr. VITALI. Okay. 1543. Did you say (b) or (d)?

Ms. HAHN. (b), as in boy, (1).

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Okay. Okay. So it is. Okay. That is good. I mean, that is a big release. I just want to be sure. I just want to be sure. Okay. Thank you.

Ms. HAHN. You are welcome.

STATEMENT BY MR. METCALFE

The SPEAKER. Chairman Metcalfe, for a committee announcement.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I actually asked staff to allow me to pass on to you that I had a request to get up and compliment our Capitol Police for the actions that they have taken on behalf of the House of Representatives and the citizens of Pennsylvania over the last couple of days.

Anybody that has walked by my office has seen that there have been protesters in the area. It started off at our rally at 10 o'clock, the 10 o'clock rally Monday. The protesters went to my office, blocked access to my office. They came into our committee meeting of the House State Government Committee Monday around the noon timeframe and worked to try and disrupt the committee's activities.

Capitol Police, Mr. Speaker, ultimately made a series of arrests on Monday, arrested more of these protesting individuals off the floor of my Capitol office yesterday, Mr. Speaker. In fact, I was told that two of the individuals they arrested yesterday, when they were arraigned, one was from California and one was from Michigan, Mr. Speaker. So we have protesters coming in from out of State disrupting our activities here at the State Capitol.

And I just wanted to stand up and commend our Capitol Police, Mr. Speaker, and thank them, and they did such a professional job in ensuring that the people who are here at the Capitol are safe and secure. Their professionalism, their restraint in the use of force but in executing and using the necessary force needed to restore order and protect everyone else who was visiting the Capitol is to be commended. They did an excellent job, and we are blessed to have these professional law enforcement officers working here at the Capitol to ensure that we are all safe and our citizens that are visiting their Capitol are safe while they are doing so and safe from anybody that is here to protest, try and make trouble, and disrupt even those that are coming in. Amazingly, it is just crazy that we hear that they are coming in from out of State to create protesting opportunities here at our Pennsylvania State Capitol.

But thank you to the Capitol Police. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me a few moments to talk about the good job that they have done. And if you see a Capitol Police officer today at the Capitol and you are a member of the legislature, I would ask that you might take a moment to thank them for their service and thank them for working to keep us safe. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. Back in Pittsburgh there is a funeral Mass today for an outstanding Pennsylvania resident, John F. "Jack" Donahue. The founder of Federated Investors was 92 and died Thursday, May 11 of 2017. A Mass of Christian burial is being held today at the cathedral in Oakland, part of Pittsburgh.

He had 13 children, 84 grandchildren, 109 great-grandchildren. A West Point grad, he was a pilot in the Army Air Corps and learned to fly the multiengine B-29 bomber. He flew airlifts into Berlin after World War II and progressed to become the number one pilot in the Strategic Air Command. Leaving the Army in 1950 with honorable service, an honorable discharge, he began selling mutual funds across the kitchen table. He believed passionately that the entire country's citizens would turn to funds as the investment vehicle of choice because they offered professional money management for everyday working people.

He stayed in Pittsburgh despite having other offers, and in 1955 he and fellow Central Catholic grads, Richard Fisher and Thomas Donnelly, started Federated to create an investment management firm in Pittsburgh to support not only their growing families but many others. Today they manage more than \$360 billion in equity, fixed-income, and cash products for investors all across the world.

This is a gentleman that has done so much philanthropically for many in Pittsburgh and across the country. Just an example of that is that at Duquesne University, very privately he was supporting tuitions for well over 50 students at that university, obviously contributions to many Catholic hospitals and schools and charities throughout the Pittsburgh region and in the country.

I know that the funeral Mass is occurring today and many would have liked to have attended. We honor this great Pennsylvania resident.

So our appreciation should go out to our EMS community. So when you get back home, thank your ambulance, your EMTs, your EMRs (emergency medical responders), and your paramedics.

STATEMENT BY MRS. TOEPEL

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. Representative Toepel, on HR 294.

Mrs. TOEPEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank the members for their unanimous support of HR 294, which recognizes today as "Rare Disease Day" in Pennsylvania.

One in 10 Americans are diagnosed with a rare disease, and two-thirds of those are children.

I would like to submit the rest of my remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Toepel.

Mrs. TOEPEL submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

As cochair of the Rare Disease Caucus, it is my pleasure to stand with the rare disease community and recognize today, May 24, as "Rare Disease Day" in Pennsylvania.

Who makes up the rare disease community? It is our friends, neighbors, brothers, sisters, parents, and children; our coworkers, colleagues, Sunday school teachers, coaches, and doctors. Rare diseases touch all of us. In fact, 30 million Americans have a rare disease. That is 1 in 10 Americans. Two-thirds of those people are children. With more than 7,000 rare diseases, the challenges to find treatment protocols and cures are great. Even correctly diagnosing a rare disease can take years, precious years spent going from doctor to doctor without treatment.

I first got involved with this issue after meeting with a constituent. Joe Coyne came to see me about his son, Garrett, and the challenges he faced being diagnosed with Batten disease. Garrett has been courageously fighting this disease that currently has no cure. His family has held countless fundraisers and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to invest in research of this extremely rare genetic disorder.

Situations like his are hard to hear but necessary in understanding the challenges these families face. Ordinary activities become extraordinary balancing acts for families while attempting to keep some semblance of normalcy, especially for children. These stories and the maze of challenges faced by those with a rare disease led me to introduce HR 294, in order to bring awareness to the issue and challenges faced by this community. In this instance, time is not on our side. We need to work together to find better ways to assist those who get up each day and find a new battle is awaiting them. Let us do what we can to help in that battle.

I thank you for your unanimous support of this HR 294 and look forward to passing legislation that will bring additional attention to the prevalence of rare diseases and any measures this legislative body can take to assist them in their fight.

The SPEAKER. Representative McClinton.

STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER Representative Gillen, on HR 353.

You may proceed, sir.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HR 353 simply acknowledges Emergency Medical Services for Children Day in the Commonwealth.

A rather startling statistic in the United States of America, we have 30 million intersections with emergency medical services that children have either through illness or injury, and so not only do we want to acknowledge those first responders, but those that are training the first responders, because pediatric protocol is substantively distinctive.

STATEMENT BY MS. McCLINTON

The SPEAKER. Representative Joanna McClinton, on HR 320.

Members, if we could clear this podium area right here, please, or Representative McClinton, you can use the other one too. The other one is fine. But, members, I would ask you to please take your seats. Members, please take your seats.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And thank you to my colleagues for joining me as we recognize the voices of communities throughout the Commonwealth and designate May as the "National Community Action Month."

Philosophers have tried to explain social change and what it is driven by. Is it driven by evolution, conflict, natural cycles, economy, technology, and so on and so forth? And their theories have generally failed to provide a recipe for change. It remains a complex challenge, with no infallible formula for success.

I certainly do not have the perfect formula either, but I am sure I have one of the best ones, and that is community empowerment, the process by which communities increase assets and attributes and build capacities to gain access, to have partners, networks, and a voice in order to engage in continuous learning and strengthening our quality of life.

But who is responsible and how do we empower communities? We empower them with alliances between neighbors, community organizations, and the public and private sectors, through conversations and through synchronized action, creating relationships so that we can transform community circumstances, helping the people participate in life-changing actions and making them become part of something much bigger and stronger. Community organizations allow people to join together and combine resources so that we can achieve common goals. Statewide for over 40 years the Community Action Association of Pennsylvania has served the needs of member organizations by helping them to identify and sponsor professional training, serving as a resource development, advocating for public policy, and promoting legislation and regulations to support economic opportunity efforts, community development, and locally designed strategies.

The CAA represents 41 community organizations across this Commonwealth. We are appreciative for organizations like these because then the communities are empowered to make positive and lasting changes not only in Pennsylvania but throughout the entire United States of America and the world. They promote more than involvement. They promote participation and engagement in different sectors, they encourage community ownership, and they constitute the primary source of advocacy, education, and assistance.

I want to thank all of the volunteers and organizations that work hard day and night to strengthen families with the tools

needed to improve our living conditions, mobilize resources, and offer essential human services.

I will conclude with noting that last Saturday in my district we had the Cobbs Creek Community Day, and we could not have pulled it off without community action groups such as artists for kids, the Webster Street Community Organization, but also the Concerned Men of Cobbs Creek, The H.O.M.I.E. (Helping Others Make It Everyday) Foundation, the outreach arm of Saint Cyprian Church. These community groups came together, organized, helped us set up, and empowered our communities with what we need so that we can be neighbors and be responsible to take action towards change.

SUPPLEMENTAL CALENDAR C

BILL ON CONCURRENCE IN SENATE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE AMENDMENTS

The House proceeded to consideration of concurrence in Senate amendments to House amendments to **SB 133, PN 873**, entitled:

An Act providing for participation in the REAL ID Act of 2005, for compliance by residents of this Commonwealth, for reports to General Assembly and for publication; and repealing the REAL ID Nonparticipation Act.

On the question,
Will the House concur in Senate amendments to House amendments?

The SPEAKER. Moved by the leader that the House concur in the amendments.

The Chair recognizes the chair of the State Government Committee for a brief description of those Senate amendments.

Mr. METCALFE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, SB 133 authorizes the Commonwealth to comply with the Federal REAL ID Act of 2005, while protecting the rights of those Pennsylvanians who have no need for a REAL ID-compliant identification form, Mr. Speaker.

The bill in its current form reflects the work of both the House and the Senate. The bill will provide each Pennsylvanian with an option to obtain either a REAL ID-compliant license or an ID or a noncompliant license or an ID, the nondriver IDs, Mr. Speaker.

Under the bill, the Commonwealth cannot compel anyone to obtain a REAL ID. So it is going to be the citizen's choice, Mr. Speaker, which form of driver's license they will have. SB 133 was amended by the Senate to ensure that potential license holders know the difference between a REAL ID-compliant license and a standard license before they choose which one will ultimately meet their needs, Mr. Speaker.

The Senate retained important provisions requiring PENNDOT to report costs and usage of REAL ID-compliant licenses and IDs within 90 days and annually thereafter, Mr. Speaker. The Senate agreed to include additional language that expresses the legislature's intent that a standard driver's license applicant or holder will not be expected to subsidize the cost of the REAL ID for those who choose to get it, Mr. Speaker. This important provision will ensure that those who do not need a REAL ID will not have to bear any costs associated with producing REAL IDs for other Pennsylvanians that ultimately would like it.

My staff and I have worked with the Department of Homeland Security, Mr. Speaker, through the process. PENNDOT told us that they were not able to communicate based on our current law, the restricted implementation of the REAL ID. They provided us with a contact at the Department of Homeland Security, and my staff had many contacts with them along with contacts that we have made to congressional offices to ask for their assistance in helping us to move forward on this issue, Mr. Speaker. Congressman Scott Perry was particularly helpful in the effort and his staff. We appreciate that.

As we communicated with the DHS, they were able to review the language that we ultimately had sent to the Senate and let us know what needed to be added from their review based on what other States had done that had come into compliance or received extensions. They would not endorse our language, but they were able to review it and give us some additional pointers on what would need to be included to actually, hopefully, pass the review once we send it on up to the Federal government as passed and signed into law by the Governor.

Mr. Speaker, I believe that this bill provides a balanced approach to REAL ID compliance by acknowledging that many of our citizens may never need a REAL ID-compliant license, and thus, they should not be subjected to this Federal mandate. At the same time the bill clears the path for those who will need

a REAL ID in their future professional and personal lives, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the Senate-amended language we have not communicated with DHS on from my office. We are hopeful that the changes they made do not create any issues for us in that regard, but upon our review, our review ultimately ends in my support of this language. I think that the language, where we have legislative intent to ensure that drivers who choose each of the licenses do not subsidize the other drivers, I think that legislative intent, based on that language, certainly every driver is a taxpayer in this State and would not be expected to subsidize those products as a taxpayer either, Mr. Speaker, which deals with our cost issue.

So we are hopeful that the administration implements this in the right way, and the reports that we will be receiving will give us additional accountability measures that we can utilize to ultimately hold the administration accountable to ensuring that this is done efficiently and at a cost that the people will be able to ultimately secure the IDs they need and not subsidize each other's IDs when they do not need it.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

CONSIDERATION OF SB 133 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. Representative Bradford is recognized on SB 133.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SB 133 does one very important thing, it repeals Act 38 and clears the way for compliance with the Federal REAL ID law. It allows our four legislative leaders and our Governor to fulfill their promise to the Federal Department of Homeland Security by the June 7 deadline so that Pennsylvania will be in compliance. We can also ask for an extension from DHS, which will clear the way over the coming months for a smooth transition.

Now, I think it is important to note that after much negotiation, a two-tiered system has been arrived at, and it is going to be important that PENNDOT, our legislative offices, and our citizens understand that there are going to be some distinctions in the new system, so this rollout will be important, but it is not an impossible goal for us to work together and to make sure that REAL ID is done in a way in which our citizens fully comprehend the consequences thereof. It is going to be important to PENNDOT, though, to educate our citizens and for this legislative body to work with them for a smooth transition.

For those reasons I ask that we vote "yes" and move REAL ID compliance off the table once and for all. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Bradford. Representative Neilson.

Mr. NEILSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Late last year I informed both the House and Senate about this problem we were having, and I am glad they finally took it up and took it seriously.

And I do support this legislation because it does do exactly what we needed. It was to repeal the ID, to repeal the law we passed on this floor in 2012, and allows us to take another step. But I want to remind you that it is not over, because there are no guarantees that the Federal government is going to give us an extension. As it has been stated up here on the floor and in the Senate, there are no guarantees. In fact, one of the high-ranking officials in Homeland Security earlier this year stated there will be no extensions after January of next year and our driver's license will not be good for travel. So this is something we have to stay on top of, and this legislation now allows us to have that conversation.

Within the amendments that the Senate did, they do mandate that there is a report due to us, all our leadership and all our Transportation chairmen and our State Government Committee chairmen, both minority and majority, to make certain that we do get in compliance. So I look forward to revisiting this after the summer, after we get the costs, because costs are important. Now, when we talk about getting the new license, there might be a fee tied into this new REAL ID license. It might cost us \$5 more.

And the important part is about educating our constituents, because whether you have a son or daughter in Pittsburgh who may or may not get sick, you might have to fly out there. Because you chose the cheaper license – because we are giving our public the option – you chose the cheaper license, you may not be able to get on that plane, you might not be able to get on that plane. Now, hopefully, the department under Secretary Richards gets the extension in June, because if they do not extend this now in June, there are 283 Federal facilities that we will not be able to enter with our driver's license. That is 283 places in Pennsylvania. So if someone is deployed and comes home and you want to visit your child or grandchild and say hello to them because they have been deployed for 2 years, you may not be able to get on there if they do not let us have an extension, but there are no guarantees the Federal government has made us, no guarantees that they will extend any deadlines. We are just hopeful.

So today I stand in support of this hopeful legislation. I hope we can move forward and come in full compliance with the law – that is, to protect the public, not look over our shoulders, not put us in this big database that has been spoken about. It is supposed to help us, help us.

And just a note of fact, if anybody holds a commercial driver's license, some of the stuff that we do not comply with now, we do on our commercial-side driver's license, to make certain that you have one license from one State and a person on that license is that person, because the stats show you in the Federal government – there are reports out there – Pennsylvania is one of the licenses that are mostly duplicated and falsified throughout the country, us and Florida. It is really big. We are an easy license to duplicate. We have college kids running all across the country with Pennsylvania licenses that they buy online, swipe it in the bars, and go in. It is swipeable and everything. We have to upgrade our technology and make sure the public is safe.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative.
Representative Bill Keller.

Mr. W. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I do not know how to follow that, but I have never been a proponent of sending bills over to the Senate for the Senate to fix them. I have never thought that was a good idea. However, in this case the Senate absolutely did the right job. This is the right bill. This is what we need to move forward. Please concur in Senate amendments. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Cris Dush.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you.

This is going to be short.

First of all, to correct one thing, if the guys do deploy for a couple years and they come back, they generally have their military ID card. That is REAL ID compliant. They can get into the facilities.

Secondly, just one thing, because we talked briefly about the cost of this thing, I want to reiterate just one thing, the legislative intent is not for the Department of Transportation to use this as a license to create money and a revenue stream with a fee.

I have redone a number of IDs in the military, and I can tell you, this military ID is REAL ID compliant. It is a piece of paper that is laminated. Our driver's license, the difference between the adult license and the juvenile license is the juvenile license is red like this and it has got a red border; ours is red like this. All you have to do is change the format. It is a couple hours' worth of work. We are already collecting for my CDL and other CDLs. We are collecting the data already that makes them REAL ID compliant. It should be a very minimal cost to make the changes, and the fees, quite honestly, should not have to be any different. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Ryan.

Mr. RYAN. If I could, I stand in support of the bill, but I do want to just caution everyone so that you do not have the mistaken impression that REAL ID provides any degree of security for American citizens. As someone who has spent 40-some years in the Marine Corps and involved in counterinsurgencies, let me assure you, this does nothing to protect your securities. It does offer, however, some modicum of protection against law-abiding citizens. The RFID (radio-frequency identification) chip on those issues that make it RFID compliant can be supplanted with another type of technology to include a bar code, which provides no security. So we are going through a tremendous amount of effort to comply with something that provides no protection, very similar to taking your shoes off when you get into an airport now.

So I would just encourage you, if you think this is just complying for the sake of complying, Pennsylvanians who wish to comply can, those who wish to go other routes, such as myself that has a military ID, have that option.

But the last thing I just want you to think about, we do not work for the Federal government. The Federal government works for us, and when the laws that are passed at the Federal level make absolutely no sense, I would hope we would do this type of thing.

And I was not here when the first bill would have passed, but I would have been honored to have supported it at the time. So I stand in support of the bill because I think it provides a reasonable option for us to get around an unnecessary Federal regulation.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
