STATEMENT BY MRS. BROWN

The SPEAKER. Representative Brown has the floor. And you may proceed, Representative.

Mrs. R. BROWN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to bring your attention to HR 249, which establishes the week of June 1 through 7 as "AED Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania. Everyone should know what an AED is – an automatic external defibrillator.

Sudden cardiac arrest is one of the leading causes of death in the United States and over 350,000 people will suffer from sudden cardiac arrest this year. Nearly 2,000 people under the age of 25 die from sudden cardiac arrest each year. It can happen to anyone, anytime, anywhere, and at any age.

During the 2013-14 session, I sponsored Act 35 of 2014, a new law that established an AED program within the Department of Education, directing the agency to issue an invitation for bids every 2 years for the costs of AEDs, in hopes of our schools being able to obtain the devices for a lower cost and having each of our schools have these available for students, staff, and visitors.

Time is of the essence when it comes to sudden cardiac arrest. The average response time for first responders once 911 is called is 8 to 12 minutes. For each minute defibrillation is delayed, the chance of survival is reduced approximately 10 percent.

With that, it is extremely important that we take every effort possible to ensure that AEDs and other potentially lifesaving devices are available in our schools, especially during sporting events. Please ensure that your local schools have AEDs available to protect your constituents, as there are still many schools in our Commonwealth without them.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to my colleagues for your support of HR 249.

He was also a member of the championship 800-meter relay team event indoors.

He is ranked first in the State and sixth in the nation in the 200-meter and 300-meter dash events held indoors. He also holds the second fastest time in the indoor 200-meter dash in the history of the Commonwealth. He was also nominated as a candidate for the Pennsylvania Gatorade Track and Field Athlete of the Year. This long but incomplete list of Terrance's accomplishments demonstrates his skill and effort.

Of course, we know that success is rarely experienced in a vacuum. There is one other young man I would also like to recognize, Mr. Speaker. Jayland Washington, who is also a senior, joined Terrance to enjoy many victories as a

4-by-100-meter relay team championship at the PIAA. Together they became the State champions and the only team to run under 42 seconds, broke three invitational meet records, and set the State in records at Downingtown East. They were both District 1 and Ches-Mont champions as well as indoor record holders. These exceptional young men were coached by Damien Henry and Paul Hadzor and supported by many family members and friends. A number of them are with us today. They are seated in the rear of the House, and I would ask them if they would please rise.

Mr. Laird, with his speed – and we hope to see him in the future Olympics – will be attending his freshman year at Penn State University.

Once again, please join me in congratulating these incredible athletes and their successes. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Boy, two outstanding individuals. We wish them the best. Really outstanding. For all of those that may think they are fast, the fastest 200 ever in the history of Pennsylvania, I believe, for the one young man. That is amazing.

Thank you all for joining us today as well as some guests and friends of Ken's that are with us as well.

Ken Brandt loved his family, serving his community, his friends and neighbors, and he loved this House of Representatives. He truly had a passion for this place. And after completing 18 years here, Ken's affection for the House of Representatives and the people who served here was obvious to anyone who knew him. He had a special way of talking about this place, and he always felt very honored to have served here.

Ken was a true public servant. After leaving here, he continued to find ways to serve his community and make it a better place for the people who live there. Ken was a people person, and as former Representative Sam Hayes said when he offered remarks at Ken's funeral back in October, "Kenny Brandt was an easy person to get to know." And because Ken was such an easy person to get to know, he touched and influenced many lives in his 77 years, and one of those lives that he touched was mine.

I first met Ken 38 years ago in June of 1979. I do not remember the date, but it was probably very close to this one, when I started here as a summer intern in Ken's Capitol office. I was a freshman psychology major with little interest in government or politics. As a matter of fact, I do not even know that I knew what a State Representative was before I started my internship, but I needed a summer job and Ken needed a summer intern. It was a good summer. I had a lot of fun, went back to college to continue my education in psychology.

But Kenny Brandt had other plans for me. A year or so later he was elected to leadership, and I guess he needed some more staff, so he called me and asked me if I would work part-time in his district office while I was finishing up at college. I reluctantly agreed. Upon graduation, he offered me a job in Harrisburg working on the Policy Committee, which he chaired at the time, and I would spend 18 years here on the staff.

When I would later decide to run for the House, the same House seat that Kenny Brandt held, he was my biggest supporter. And on the night of my primary victory, I can say without a doubt that Kenny Brandt was probably the happiest guy in that crowded room that night. During my time as a legislator, Ken continued to watch over me. He was a regular visitor to my local office and often e-mailed me when we were voting here on the House floor. As I said, Ken loved this House of Representatives and he was one of those PCN (Pennsylvania Cable Network) viewers that watched religiously, continued to follow the good work that we did here. As I stand here today, I honestly do not know what I would be doing if I had not met Ken Brandt back in 1979, but I know for sure that I would never have become a member of this House of Representatives.

In the past few days as I have reflected on my memories of Ken, I recall, obviously, many, many stories but one stuck out. He came into my office in Elizabethtown one afternoon. We were talking about what I was doing up here and I was bragging about the fact that I was going to have an aisle seat in the House of Representatives, I was moving over one, and he listened to me and he said, why did I want to change my seat, and I said, well, it was a better seat, and he then informed me something I did not know, that he had sat in the same middle seat for his full 18 years here as a legislator. A middle seat, you know, everybody wants those, right? He could have moved, obviously – he had a lot of seniority; he was a member of leadership – but he stayed in that one seat for his entire time. He explained that that is where he began his service and that is where he was going to end his service. I remember Ken saying that Dave, you know, every seat in that House of Representatives is a good seat

and it is an honor to be sitting in any one of them. Ken that day clearly disagreed with my decision to change my seat. I do not think he understood the significance of the aisle seat today. But we disagreed on that and we never discussed it again.

But today I think we could all agree that, Ken, you have got the best seat in the House.

With the Senate's concurrence, this bridge along State Route 1011, also known as Castile Run Road, will forever honor this young patriot, an Army infantryman who was killed in an ambush in Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam, on February 28, 1966. He was just 21, a native of Clarksville, a graduate of Jefferson-Morgan High School, and gone from our midst far too soon. He graduated high school with my brother, and I still remember as a young girl how the news of his death rocked our small community.

I recently spoke at Memorial Day observances back home and recounted how the Memorial Day weekend brings us together to remember the sacrifices of all those who answered our nation's call. Brent McClellan answered that call and paid the ultimate sacrifice. In preparing this legislation, I learned that Brent, assigned to 1st Platoon, B Company, 5th Cavalry in the 1st Cavalry Division, was one of 38 Americans killed that last day of February in 1966 in Vietnam. It was a bloody day and a bloody year. More than 6,000 Americans died in 1966 in Vietnam.

We cannot repay the sacrifice of those who sacrificed their lives defending us, but at the very least, we can and we must remember them. Heroes such as Brent should give us pause. They loved our country so much they would do whatever was necessary to defend it. As I am sure it is with all of you, I find it difficult to express appreciation for sacrifices such as Brent's. Please keep him, his family, and all of our fallen heroes in your thoughts and prayers.

Thank you again for your unanimous vote. And thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In this case, my reading of the gentleman's language would have it such that if an SRBC employee currently left the SERS system, i.e., for something like maternity leave and came back at a subsequent date, that they could return to service in SERS. Without this language, such a woman would not be able to return service in her pension system. Obviously, there is the potential to have impact on certain populations that are particularly problematic.

For that reason I ask support for amendment 1450.

The **SPEAKER**. Representative Tallman, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. **TALLMAN**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We just passed my amendment on this past vote, which actually added clarifying language that when you do move from SERS or PSERS to the Susquehanna River Basin Commission, you become a new employee, and since the Susquehanna River Basin Commission is not a State agency, I do not think the footprint rule even applies, so I am asking for a negative vote. Thank you.
