GUEST INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. With the pastor today, we also have the associate pastor at Life Center Ministries, John Leach. John is down here to my left, and he is the guest of Representative Bryan Barbin. John, thanks for joining the pastor with us today. Thank you.

BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1845**, **PN 2584**, entitled:

An Act designating a bridge on that portion of State Route 2026 over the North Branch Blacklick Creek, Buffington Township, Indiana County, as First Lieutenant Theodore P. Pytash Bridge.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representatives, we are going to have an honor here, so I would ask everybody to please take their seats.

GUESTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. The Chair calls upon the majority leader on HB 1845.

Mr. REED. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I am honored today to present HB 1845 to this General Assembly, and before I talk a little bit about HB 1845, I would like to take the opportunity to introduce some guests that are here in the hall of the House with us today.

First, to the left of the Speaker are 1st Lt. Theodore P. Pytash and his wife, Brenda. If we could give them a round of applause, please.

Next, joining the Lieutenant are a number of family and friends who came with him to the Capitol today. I would like to introduce each of them, and if they could stand as I call their name and if we could recognize them at the end. First we have

Lindsey and Josh Tabor, daughter and son-in-law; Ryan Pytash, son; E.J. and Cassidy Pytash, son and daughter-in-law; Kylie Tabor, granddaughter; Steven Tabor, grandson; Brin Pytash, granddaughter; Chrissy and Jack Hoover, sister and brother-in-law; Karen Donaldson, sister; David Pytash, brother; Ray Lanzendorfer, sister; Mark Lanzendorfer, friend.

If we could give them a round of applause.

First Lieutenant Pytash was, actually, originally from Cambria County. He grew up in Vintondale. He was drafted into the Army, beginning his service during the Vietnam Conflict in 1969. In 2002 Lieutenant Pytash was awarded the Silver Star for his service during the Vietnam Conflict. The award was for the following: "For" his "gallantry in action while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam on 31 May 1970. On this date, Lieutenant Pytash distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous action while serving as Platoon Leader, 3rd Platoon, Company A, 4th Battalion, 9th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division. Lieutenant Pytash was 'walking point' when the platoon unknowingly entered a large, well-concealed enemy base camp with trenches, bunkers, and tunnels. Heavy...fire was immediately encountered. The platoon's M-60 machine gun jammed during the firefight and men of the platoon were required to crawl up and down the line dragging ammunition and another M-60 forward to use in maintaining fire support. Lieutenant Pytash also called for fire support from artillery, and then from helicopter gun ships, and when both of these efforts had failed, he requested tactical air support. The platoon was under intense enemy fire for approximately 45 minutes and had used most of its ammunition. Just as air support jets began making their bombing run, Lieutenant Pytash ordered the platoon to move as fast as possible back down the trail. His quick thinking and decisive leadership undoubtedly saved the lives of many men in his platoon that day. Lieutenant Pytash's gallant and courageous leadership was in keeping with the highest tradition of military service and reflects..." upon him and his service to his platoon, the United States Army, and the United States of America.

His service in Vietnam came to a conclusion almost a year later on September 1971, when, during another reconnaissance mission, a booby trap was triggered. The lieutenant was injured, and after some time recuperating, he returned to the United States and began a family with his wife, Brenda.

In addition to the Silver Star, he was awarded the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Purple Heart, Army Commendation Medal, and the Bronze Star Medal.

Mr. Pytash and his wife now live in Armagh in the southeastern corner of Indiana County.

It is an honor to be able to recognize his service, his sacrifice, and his legacy by renaming the bridge over the north branch of the Blacklick Creek in Buffington Township after 1st Lt. Theodore P. Pytash.

I would encourage my colleagues to vote in support of HB 1845 and once again want to thank Lieutenant Pytash for his service to our country during the Vietnam Conflict. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. MAKO

The SPEAKER. Representative Zach Mako is invited to speak at this time, and then I will be following him on this great occasion.

Representative Mako, the rostrum is right there in front. And he will be speaking on HR 608.

Representative Marcy Toepel will be submitting remarks on this resolution as well. You are not going to speak. But, Marcia, you will be speaking too? Representative Marcia Hahn will also be speaking on this resolution.

Representative Mako, if you could start, please. Thank you. Mr. MAKO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to thank my colleagues for their unanimous vote on HR 608, recognizing December 7, 2017, as "Great Law Day" in Pennsylvania.

Three hundred and thirty-five years ago at this time—

The SPEAKER. Members— I apologize, sir. Please suspend.

Members, this resolution honors, essentially, the founding of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, for which we are all so greatly honored to serve. This is, really, one of the fundamental dates of importance in the history of the United States let alone of our history, not the founding of the United States but how the Colonies came to be settled and the notions of freedom that came to this country beginning in the Colonies. Pennsylvania stands first and foremost amongst that early Colonial history.

So I am going to ask everybody to please take their seats, and I am going to ask all members, if you have conversations, to take them off the House floor.

And at this time I am going to ask the Sergeants at Arms to close the doors of the House.

Representative Mako, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. MAKO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As he just mentioned, 335 years ago at this time, Pennsylvania's first legislature met in what is now Chester from December 4, 1682, to December 7, 1682. At the conclusion of these 4 days of meetings, the legislature passed a series of statutes that have become known as the Great Law. These laws set in motion the enduring principles of representative government and were the brainchild of our founder, William Penn. They were the foundation of a stable government in Pennsylvania by providing for the maintenance of records, establishment of courts, conduct of trials, prevention of election fraud, and control of taxation. Many vital freedoms of Pennsylvanians, particularly religious freedoms and freedoms of worship, were also included.

In conclusion, Pennsylvania would not be what it is today without these early legislators and the Great Law. We owe them a debt of gratitude.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. TOEPEL submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Three centuries ago men and women did not enjoy the many freedoms that we have now.

Thankfully, William Penn worked to draft a set of statutes to define the rights for all Pennsylvanians. At a meeting of the legislature in 1682, the Great Law was passed. Those statutes included the enduring principle of representative government, religious liberty, and many other vital freedoms.

They also established the foundation of a stable government in the Commonwealth by providing for the maintenance of records, establishment of courts, conduct of trials, prevention of election fraud, and control of taxation.

STATEMENT BY MS. HAHN

STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. Members, we have guests with us here today in connection with this resolution and with respect to the Great Law.

First of all, the Great Law is back, where I am standing, in the back left-hand corner of our chamber. Back there are these wonderful individuals, I believe David Carmichael. David? David is back there, and is Josh Stahlman with him? Josh is back there as well. The Director of the Pennsylvania State Archives is David Carmichael. You should take the opportunity to meet that great gentleman right back there. Josh works with David, and then to my left – oh, is Heidi back there too? Okay. Heidi Mays, everybody, is the Director of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives Archives. If you could give her a warm welcome as well.

Now, think about this. This body, in which each and every one of you serve, met for the first time 335 years ago this same week. It was during that week in 1682 that the Provincial Assembly first met in Upland, Pennsylvania. I want to tell you what the committees were at the time that they came up with. There were Elections and Privileges, Justice and Grievances, Foresight, the Grand Committee to Consider the Laws, and the Grand Committee to Consider the Rates for Artisans – five committees.

It is not clear who served as the first Speaker in 1682, but there was a Speaker of the House. But it is believed to be Thomas Wynne, William Penn's physician, although some have suggested that it was Nicholas More – M-o-r-e – a friend of William Penn.

There were only these counties in existence at the time: Bucks, a round of applause from Bucks County; Philadelphia County; Chester County, there we go; and there were three others, which became the State of Delaware later: New Castle, St. Jones, and Deal. It is presumed that each county had seven Representatives at the time.

The Great Law is a series of 71 statutes submitted by William Penn. They were enacted by Pennsylvania's first legislature. "The preamble and laws reflect Penn's belief that religion and politics were intertwined." He insisted on the freedom of worship. "The first 'Chapter' in the 'Great Law' emphasizes clearly that no one shall be 'Compelled to frequent or Maintain any Religious Worshipp place or Ministry...' " but that everybody had the ability to practice the free exercise of their religion. Many laws did reflect the Quakers' religious beliefs, however, and officeholders did have to profess their belief in Jesus at that time.

Additional provisions included the "specification..." of "weights and measures, regulation of a 'Publique house,' maintenance of records, establishment of courts, conduct of trials," and "eligibility of voters...." Throughout his tenure, "Penn gradually expanded the authority of the Pennsylvania Assembly. By the late Colonial Period, it was one of" if not "the most powerful legislatures in...America."

Anybody who wishes to go back to the corner where the Great Law is, you may have your photo taken there. Please avail yourself of this great historical opportunity.

(1) An individual who is under twenty-one years of age may purchase, attempt to purchase, possess or transport liquor or malt or brewed beverages if all of the following apply:

(i) The individual is at least eighteen years of age.

(ii) The individual is an officer, employe or intern of the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement of the Pennsylvania State Police.

(iii) The individual has completed training specified by the bureau.

(iv) The individual is acting within the scope of prescribed duties.

(v) The individual is acting under the direct control or supervision of a bureau officer who is an adult.

(2) Individuals under twenty-one years of age may not consume liquor or malt or brewed beverages.

(3) The Pennsylvania State Police shall promulgate regulations prescribing the manner in which compliance checks are to be performed. Compliance checks under this subsection shall be conducted in a manner consistent with the regulations. Regulations shall require, at a minimum, all of the following:

(i) Prior to participation in the compliance check, the officer, employe or intern shall undergo training approved by the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement.

(ii) A person licensed to sell liquor or malt or brewed beverages that is found to be in compliance with 18 Pa.C.S. § 6308 (relating to purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages) or 6310 (relating to inducement of minors to buy liquor or malt or brewed beverages) during a compliance check shall be

notified in writing of the compliance check and the determination of compliance.

(iii) A person licensed to sell liquor or malt or brewed beverages that is found to be noncompliant with 18 Pa.C.S. § 6308 or 6310 during a compliance check shall be immediately verbally advised by the supervising bureau officer and shall be notified in writing of the failure to comply within ten working days of the date of the compliance check.

(4) The provisions of this subsection shall expire December 31, 2022.

Section 2. Section 411(d) and (e) of the act, amended June 8, 2016 (P.L.273, No.39) and November 15, 2016 (P.L.1286, No.166), are amended to read:

Amend Bill, page 5, line 19, by striking out "2" and inserting 3

Amend Bill, page 7, line 3, by striking out all of said line and inserting

Section 4. Repeals are as follows:

(1) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under paragraphs (2) and (3) are necessary to effectuate the addition of section 211(g) of the act.
