**ANNOUNCEMENT BY MR. RYAN**

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Ryan, would you please approach the rostrum for a special unanimous consent announcement.

Mr. RYAN. Thank you. With my voice I thought you would—

The SPEAKER. Members, I would ask everybody to please take their seats.

Representative Ryan, for this announcement do you mind coming up to the podium at the rostrum? Members, please take your seats.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, thank you so much.

Ladies and gentlemen, if I could ask, we have a very important announcement to make, and I would ask all of the members in the chamber who have deployed into a combat zone, if they would mind joining me up here, I would appreciate it. I would ask Representative Matt Gabler if you would come front and center.

Matt is deploying, those of you who are not aware of it, in January. He is going to Kuwait. The length of his deployment is not known officially, although Matt has somewhat of an idea how long that is going to be. But I wanted to speak to him today as both a former Colonel in the Marine Corps, retired Marine Colonel, and just hopefully you will get a perspective of what is about to happen. Whenever I would deploy my marines, soldiers, sailors, or airmen, we would have a very serious discussion with them, and I would like to do the same thing with Matt today, but I think it is worthwhile if you hear it.

The next time Matt sees his daughter, a birthday will have passed, a Thanksgiving will likely have passed. He will likely be gone for one entire Christmas season. His daughter, who is 1, will be 2, and that is a huge difference in the life span of a youngster. His wife will be in a situation where she will be the sole caregiver of the family while her husband is forward-deployed and is making as much of a sacrifice to defend this nation as anyone else is.

But today Matt's life will be changing in ways like you cannot possibly imagine. He no longer has the right to relax. He no longer has the right to sleep. He no longer has the right to think of himself, not that he ever did. He is a great leader. You see, if he makes a mistake coming in early January, someone is going to die. When he goes forward-deployed, he is going to have weapons, his soldiers will have weapons, and you do not know in an asymmetric type of warfare when that attack will occur, but it will. I recall a situation in Iraq where we had to put concrete barriers in front of a hospital ambulance entrance because the enemy would capture an ambulance, detonate a bomb out in the city, and bring wounded into the hospital and then detonate the ambulance, so that it would kill the doctors and the first responders. Matt is a medical service officer. He is a target. Please make no bones about it.

When he is deployed, one of the things I always told him and I told my son when he deployed to go to Iraq, that you have to remember no matter where you are, you are in a forward base, you are in a combat zone, the enemy is out there and that is why

you are armed. When you are preparing your operations on a day-to-day basis, that slightest detail that you forget will bring someone home in a body bag. When you are coming home, the greatest number of casualties occur in the first 2 weeks of combat in being deployed and the last 2 weeks. The worst thing that could ever happen is when you have to notify a family member that their husband, wife, son, or daughter died the last day of their deployment because they got careless.

Matt, this is one of those times where it is not just pushing a button because what we do here is extremely important, but this is one of those cases where your deployment is not over until the day every one of your soldiers gets home, not just to the base in the United States, but until they are back with their families. I told every one of my Marine commanders that when you deploy, your families that you have gotten their relative from, whether it is a grandson or granddaughter, son or a daughter, husband, wife, father or mother, that they have lent them to us. Your intellect, your capability, that superior judgment that Captain Gabler has is what is going to bring every one of those men and women home, and I just want him to know that as I am standing here today and I think all of us say this together, that we are here to support him and his family. I am saying this, Matt, whatever we can possibly do, let us know.

The majority leader has a token of appreciation. It is a blue star flag that your wife would hang in the room of your house to let your community know that you were forward-deployed.

The Speaker also has a flag, a blue star flag, that we would ask if you would be willing to hang in your office here at the Capitol so that we would be reminded that Matt like so many other thousands of Pennsylvania veterans and service members from the National Guard, that they are forward-deployed and that our decisions are affecting each and every one of their families.

I will tell you that Matt will be leaving here as a young person in his early thirties but will be coming back as a 50-year-old. The experiences that he will have, they will start to call him the old man. They call me the old man, but apparently it is for different reasons. But when you realize he will find out and he is seeing it as he does it already in his military career that this is a tremendously important responsibility that he has for which he can never waver in his support of those soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines and all of those forward-deployed. Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you.

Matthew, Representative Gabler, Captain, great friend. Representative Gabler actually worked in my office when I was the policy chair and a great friend. He took a leave of absence to go run for the seat that he has, went and worked very hard like all of you do to get elected in your districts. And, Representative Gabler, 10 years? This is your 9th year and you are going into your 10th year of service, correct? Well, Godspeed with you. His lovely wife is actually from my district, so every now and then I see them around my district because they are visiting with her parents.

Matt, we are all hoping that you are just completely safe. We thank you for your service to our country. We will miss you, but we know you are going to come back and tell us all that you have done with your fellow service men and women to serve the United States and the world. Thank you very, very much, my good friend.
